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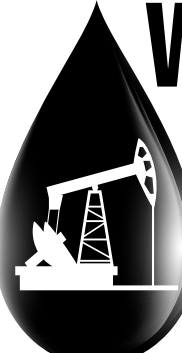

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Reflections: The Least of These - Love Costs

Twenty years ago, Jan. 23, 1999, Graham Staines, an Australian missionary to India, was burned to death along with his two sons, Philip, age 10, and Timothy, age 6. Staines was 57. For 35 years Graham had ministered to lepers in a remote tribal village in India where he established the Mayurbanj Leprosy Home in 1982. In 1983 he married his wife, Gladys, who joined him in the work.

The mob that killed Graham Staines and his sons was apparently a hard-line Hindu organization intent on retribution for the missionary's effectiveness in converting members of the lower cast to faith in Jesus Christ. After the attack, Gladys Staines forgave those who murdered her husband and sons. She remained in India with their daughter, Esther, and continued their ministry among

the lepers. She stated, "I cannot just leave those people who love and trust us. I have high regard for the people of India and their tolerance."

The government of India awarded Gladys Staines the fourth highest civilian award in 2005, Padma Sri, in recognition for her outstanding contribution to India. She has been called the best known Christian in India after Mother Theresa. In 2015 she was awarded the Mother Theresa Memorial Award for Social Justice.

Their story was recently made into a movie entitled The Least of These and released into theaters on February 1. It appears the movie will be shown in a limited number of theaters for a limited time. The Executive Producer for the film, Victor Abraham, said the movie "beautifully illustrates the power of love, hope and forgiveness to overcome hate." It is a gripping reminder of the cost paid by followers of Christ in every generation and the power of God's love through Jesus Christ. According to Christianity Today "215 million Christians experience high, very high or extreme levels of persecution."

Most of us suffer little for our faith. Few of us

will ever be required to shed our blood or give our lives. But such global persecution of Christians is widespread. Everyone who follows Christ in every time and in every place is called to follow the instructions of Scripture: "Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse. Rejoice with those who rejoice, and weep with those who weep. Be of the same mind toward one another; do not be haughty in mind, but associate with the lowly. Do not be wise in your own estimation. Never pay back evil for evil to anyone. Respect what is right in the sight of all men. If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all men. Never take your own revenge, beloved, but leave room for the wrath of God, for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay," says the Lord. "But if your enemy is hungry, feed him, and if he is thirsty, give him to drink; for in so doing you will heap burning coals on his head." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12:14-21).

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Lady Hawks sweep Western Nebraska in four game series to improve to 5-3 on the season

BIG SPRING – The Lady Hawks came into the 4 game series with the Lady Cougars of Western Nebraska with a 1-3 record after having a hard time scoring runs in their first three games. But in the fourth game of the season against McLennan Howard College finally found their swing and scored ten runs to get their first win of the year. Since that game the Lady Hawks have not looked back and have been on fire at the plate. Howard College built a four-run lead in the second inning and then held off Western Nebraska's charge. Western Nebraska scored seven runs in the game and tied the game with home runs by Glawson in the third, Baesler in the fourth and Glawson in the fourth. The Lady Cougars also had a double by Hogan in the fourth and took the lead on a 2 run RBI single by Kelly in the sixth to go up 8-6 before the Lady Hawks rallied in the seventh to get the win.

Marissa Salinas was the winning pitcher for Howard College. She al-

lowed just one hit and zero runs over one inning and walked one. Marin Musicant also threw two and a third innings in relief out of the bullpen and did solid work as well. Glawson took the loss for Western Nebraska. She pitched one inning, allowed five hits and four runs. Julia Grib got the start for the Lady Hawks and allowed seven hits and six runs over three and two-thirds innings and struck out one.

Howard College hit two home runs on the day. Neff went deep in the second inning and Gonzalez put one over the fence in the first. The Lady Hawks racked up 13 hits in the game with Angelina Garcia, Lani Graft, Neff, Paige Hallam and Addison Lewis each getting multiple hits in the game. Lewis, Hallam, Neff, Graft and Garcia each had two hits to lead Howard College offensively.

Western Nebraska scattered 11 hits in the game. Kelly, Hogan, McMillan and Glawson all had multiple hits for Western Nebraska. Kelly went 3-for-4 at the plate to lead Western Nebraska's offense in the loss. Western Nebraska didn't commit a single error in the field but the Lady Hawks big sticks were too much for the Lady Cougars and Howard Colleges last inning rally would set the tone for the rest of the series.

In the second game of Wednesday's double header between Howard College and Western Nebraska, the Lady Hawks once again jumped out to an early lead but then let the Lady Cougars tie it up in the middle innings before coming back strong late in the game to finish them off 6-3.

The Lady Hawks had just one dinger on the day when Garcia hit one deep in the first inning. Garcia went 2-for-4 at the plate to lead Howard College offensively in the game. The Lady Hawks played a clean game defensively as well and didn't commit a single error in the field. Western Nebraska racked up seven hits on the day with Hogan and Mills each getting multiple hits for the Lady Cougars in the loss.

On Thursday, during the first game of their second straight double header with Western Nebraska Howard College left no doubt in 14-7 drumming of the Lady Cougars at home. Davis scores 26 points, No. 12 Houston beats UCF 77-68

ORLANDO, Fla. — Corey Davis Jr. and the No. 12 Houston Cougars dominated at both ends of the court — again.

Davis scored 26 points on 8-for-13 shooting and Houston had another strong defensive effort to beat UCF 77-68 on Thursday night.

"If you just take a white picket fence and put it around the paint, that's how our defense is," Cougars coach Kelvin Sampson said. "They made some difficult shots tonight, but we didn't give up any easy shots."

Armoni Brooks added 14 points for Houston (22-1, 9-1 American Athletic) and Galen Robinson Jr. had 12 points and seven assists.

"Give them credit, they have a lot of talented

offensive guys," UCF's B.J. Taylor said. "Pretty much everybody they put on the floor, even the guys off the bench, are good offensive players. So, you don't make those guys uncomfortable, they're going to make shots."

Taylor scored 16 of his 21 points in the second half for UCF (16-5, 6-3), and Aubrey Dawkins and Tacko Fall each added 13. Taylor hit a stepback 3-pointer to pull the Knights within eight with 1:19 left.

UCF shot 42.6 percent from the field, going 8 of 24 from 3-point range. The Knights were 14 of 27 on free throws.

"I really believe it's our senior leadership and me and Galen being two of the better defenders on the team," Davis said. "We've just been playing hard and everybody else has been feeding off of it."

Houston took a 12-4 lead, only to see UCF respond with a 13-5 run to tie it at 17. Following a timeout, the Cougars put together a 10-0 run, holding the Knights scoreless for six-plus minutes.

"The first half, we dug a hole for ourselves (and) the second half we responded and played the way we're capable of," coach Johnny Dawkins said. "When we're playing against a team that's that good, it's a tough hill to climb."

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Contract Bridge

Test your play

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump. North has just opened the bidding with one club. North leads the king of spades, which you duck, the queen of spades, which you also duck, and then the jack, taking your ace South played the 4-5-7 of spades, at that point as the suit was led. How would you continue?

West	East
♠ A Q 4	♠ A K 2

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Hearts and South leads the queen of diamonds. How would you proceed?

♥ K Q 1 3	♥ A 10 7
♦ A K 5 2	♦ 4
♣ Q 5 2	♣ A 6 3

1. This is one of those golfing situations where you are certain to make the contract no matter how the defense cards are divided -- provided you play correctly.

The proper play is to lead the queen of diamonds at trick four. If the queen goes to the king, you have nine tricks, covering all of the spades, three hearts, four diamonds and one club. If the queen holds the trick, you then switch your attention to clubs.

Looking out the king, after which you have nine tricks, covering all of the spades, three hearts, four diamonds and three clubs.

If you started instead by cashing the ace of diamonds before leading the queen, you could lose five tricks if the opponents allowed the queen to hold and you later lost a club to the king. You could, of course, continue your strategy by playing the 4-5-7 of clubs. Only the queen of diamonds held at trick four secures the contract too quickly.

2. Whether you make six depends partly on how the opposing cards are divided and partly on how you elect to play the hand. All kinds of possibilities do, but they may arise if your choice is to lead the king of diamonds and not the ace. This might appear to be the best way to start the play, but actually it is not.

The line of play must like your suit well is really quite simple. With the diamond lead, play a spade and let the king win from diamonds.

With the diamond lead, no matter what makes are different, you will have a diamond and the ten of hearts and diamond jumps. This sequence of plays will make the contract if the spades and hearts are divided normally, neither 4-3 or 4-2, yielding 12 tricks, three hearts, four diamonds and one club. If the queen holds the trick, you then switch your attention to clubs.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Feb. 8, the 39th day of 2019. There are 326 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On Feb. 8, 1587, Mary, Queen of Scots was beheaded at Fotheringhay Castle in England after she was implicated in a plot to murder her cousin, Queen Elizabeth I.

On this date:

In 1693, a charter was granted for the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg in the Virginia Colony.

In 1862, the Civil War Battle of Roanoke Island, North Carolina, ended in victory for Union forces led by Gen. Ambrose E. Burnside.

In 1904, the Russo-Japanese War, a conflict over control of Manchuria and Korea, began as Japanese forces attacked Port Arthur.

In 1910, the Boy Scouts of America was incorporated.

In 1922, President Warren G. Harding had a radio installed in the White House.

In 1924, the first execution by gas in the United States took place at the Nevada State Prison in Carson City as Gee Jon, a Chinese immigrant convicted of murder, was put to death.

In 1952, Queen Elizabeth II proclaimed her accession to the British throne following the death of her father, King George VI.

In 1965, Eastern Air Lines Flight 663, a DC-7, crashed shortly after takeoff from New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport; all 84 people on board were killed. The Supremes' record "Stop! In the Name of Love" was released by Motown.

In 1968, three college students were killed in a confrontation between demonstrators and highway patrolmen at South Carolina State University in Orangeburg in the wake of protests over a whites-only bowling alley. The science-fiction film "Planet of the Apes," starring Charlton Heston, had its world premiere in New York (it went into general release the following April.)

In 1989, 144 people were killed when an American-chartered Boeing 707 filled with Italian tourists slammed into a fog-covered mountain in the Azores.

In 1992, the XVI Olympic Winter Games opened in Albertville, France.

In 1993, General Motors sued NBC, alleging that "Dateline

NBC" had rigged two car-truck crashes to show that 1973-to-87 GM pickups were prone to fires in side impact crashes. (NBC settled the lawsuit the following day and apologized for its "unscientific demonstration.")

Ten years ago: Robert Plant and Alison Krauss won five Grammys, including album of the year, for "Raising Sand." R&B singer Chris Brown was arrested on suspicion of making a criminal threat (he was later sentenced to five years of probation for beating his longtime girlfriend, singer Rihanna). The NFC rallied to a 30-21 victory over the AFC in the Pro Bowl.

Five years ago: In an assertion of same-sex marriage rights, Attorney General Eric Holder announced that same-sex spouses could not be compelled to testify against each other, should be eligible to file for bankruptcy jointly and were entitled to the same rights and privileges as federal prison inmates in opposite-sex marriages. On the first day of medal competition at the Sochi Winter Olympics, Sven Kramer of the Netherlands led a clean sweep by the Dutch in the men's 5,000-meter speed skating while in slopestyle's Olympic debut, U.S. snowboarder Sage Kotsenburg won the first gold medal of the games.

One year ago: The federal government stumbled into a shutdown that would end by morning, its second in less than a month, as rogue Senate Republicans blocked a speedy vote on a massive, bipartisan, budget-busting spending deal. For the second time in a week, the Dow Jones industrials plunged by more than 1,000 points as a sell-off in the stock market deepened. Hundreds of thousands lined the streets of Philadelphia as the Eagles celebrated their Super Bowl victory with a parade.

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Realmuto traded from Marlins to Phillies for three players

MIAMI (AP) — In October, J.T. Realmuto's agent predicted the Miami Marlins' All-Star catcher would be with another team by spring training. He was right.

Realmuto was traded Thursday to the Philadelphia Phillies for catcher Jorge Alfaro, two pitching prospects and \$250,000 in international signing bonus pool allocation.

Along with Alfaro, the Marlins acquired highly regarded pitchers Sixto Sanchez and Will Stewart.

Realmuto had been with the Marlins longer than any other current player. Last fall his agent, Jeff Berry, said Realmuto informed the Marlins he wouldn't sign a long-term contract with them and predicted a trade.

Philadelphia, still pursuing free agents Bryce Harper and Manny Machado, has bolstered its lineup with the additions of Realmuto, shortstop Jean Segura and 2013 NL MVP Andrew McCutchen. The Phillies had the worst batting average in the major leagues last year (.234) and were third in strikeouts (1,520). They led their division with the second-best record in the NL one week into August, then went 16-33 over the final 49 games and finished with a losing record (80-82) for the sixth straight season.

Miami's rebuilding project will probably continue for several years under CEO Derek Jeter, whose group bought the team after the 2017 season.

The Marlins had been talking for months with other numerous teams about a Realmuto trade before deciding to send him to their NL East rivals. Miami pitchers and catchers report to spring training Wednesday.

Alfaro is expected to replace Realmuto as Miami's starting catcher. He hit .262 with 10 homers in his first full major league season last year.

Sanchez, a hard-throwing 20-year-old Dominican right-hander is considered a top prospect. He has a 2.48 ERA in 48 minor league games over four seasons but pitched just 46 2/3 innings in Single A last season due to right elbow inflammation.

Realmuto was a first-time All-Star in his fourth season last year. He hit .277 and set career highs with 21 homers, 74 RBIs and an OPS of .825. He turns 28 in March.
