McCracken Will Take Special Banking Course

James P. McCracken, executive vice president of the First National Bank, left Friday for two weeks attendance at the School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. This will be his first year at the School which requires two weeks resident attendance each year for three years to earn the certificate of graduation. Throughout the year between resident sessions students are required to do extension work involving problems in all phases of banking.

The School is sponsored by the Central States Conference, composed of bankers associations in 16 mid-western states. Attendance this year will approximate 660 bankers, ranging from junior officers and department managers to presidents, vice presidents and board chairmen of banks from more than 30 states.

The faculty of over 100 instructors consists of bankers who are specialists in their respective fields, practicing attorneys, business executives and members of a number of university and college faculties. The instructors comprise one of the most complete groups of men in their respective professions ever assembled for adult educational purposes.

HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL OPENS HERE SEPT. 12 WITH EASTLAND

The Cisco Lobos and the Eastland Mavericks will renew their football rivalry this year when they open their season against each other at Chesley Field in Cisco on September 12.

The Maverick-Lobo contest will be a non-conference affair begins on September 8. Plans since Eastland dropped to 1-A at the conclusion of the 1951 season. Both teams lost key players via the graduation route last year and will be fielding clubs that will be spotted with new faces.

The Lobos will begin drills on September 1 and will have two work-outs daily until school begins on September 8. Plans call for practice early in the morning and late in the afternoon.

Coach Jack Everett will arrive in Cisco on August 26 and will direct preparations for the fall season. He will be assisted by Jay Williams who comes to Cisco this year from Hermeleigh where he made an impressive record. Williams will replace Carrol Tatom as assistant coach. Tatom entered the Army on August 13.

THREE CISCO FIREMEN WILL GO TO ANNUAL TEXAS A&M SCHOOL

Three Cisco firemen will be among 1,000 from all parts of the United States and two foreign countries in attendance next week at the 23rd annual Firemen's Training School to be held at Texas A&M College. The school will be held all week.

L. E. (Lefty) Sublett and C. R. Hightower have been selected to represent Cisco, and one other fireman will be named to attend, Fire Chief Pete Clements reported.

Industrial and military specialists from New York and California, in addition to several other states between, have already filed reservations.

During the week-long school, selected firemen from Texas and out-of-state cities are given intensive practice and instruction in fighting almost every known type of fire.

Special equipment available to every city and town is used in fighting fires of the type for which it was designed and every fireman learns about that equipment by using it.

This year about \$30,000 worth of combustible materials will be used so that techniques for fighting such fires may be shown. Several commercial fuel and equipment companies will furnish the bulk of such materials along with specialized equipment for different types of fire-fighting.

Co-sponsored by the Texas Engineering Extension Service and the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals Association of Texas, the annual school is highly regarded by professional fire-fighters.

Cooperation in holding the school is given by the Trade and Industrial Education division of the Texas Education Agency, the State Fire Insurance Department at Austin and the Fire Prevention and Engineering Bureau at Dallas.

No estimate of the property and lives saved by firemen who were taught the best fire-fighting methods by the school is available. However, money savings alone through reduced fire premiums to participating cities has already amounted to more than \$1,800,000, according to H. R. Brayton, director of the school.

A three per cent credit on the key rate for fire insurance to cities which participate in the school is allowed by the State Fire Insurance Department at Austin.

Instructors for the courses in the school are hand-picked men with extensive experience in fighting special types of fires, but they spend very little time lecturing.

Most of the teaching is done right in the field while the firemen students handle the equipment and fight the fire.

This year most of the bigger blazes to be staged will be held in a 26-acre plot just north of the main campus at Texas A. and M. Brayton said that a new water line, complete with seven plugs, has been laid to the area, in preparation.

Registration for the school will be held Sunday, August 24, with firemen selecting one of four major courses of training. Registrants will be quartered in dormitories on the campus and fed in the college mess-halls.

Temperature Goes Over 100 Degrees 20 Straight Days

Temperature readings were 103 degrees in Cisco Thursday to make it 20 straight days of 100 degrees or higher, and the same was predicted for Friday.

Old timers believe that the 103 degree weather Thursday tied the all-time record of 20 straight days of mercury readings of over 100. If that is true and if Friday's predictions hold, the record will have been broken.

Several cool fronts have threatened to break the hold of the heat but the Canadian air hasn't had sufficient push to reach Central Texas. A mass of cool air was over the Panhandle Thursday, but weather experts believed that it would lose its battle to the hot front which continues to hold most of the state.

Little, or no moisture was in prospect for Texas and crops and pastures continued to burn.

Light Vote Seen For Election As Ballot Is Short

Cisco and Eastland County voters will go to the polls Saturday in the Second Primary Election to settle one precinct contest, help settle two county races and to take part in one state race. Only about half of the 7,250 persons who voted in the first primary in this county are expected to go to the polls.

County Clerk Virgil Love reported that only 70 absentee ballots were cast for the second primary, as compared with 275 in the first primary, indicating that interest in the coming poll is considerably less than in July.

The Cisco area vote probably will be heavier than in some parts of the county due to interest in the runoff between Arch Bint and J. E. (Edd) McCasles for County Commissioner, Precinct 4. Dothan, Scranton and Pleasant Hill also votes in the Precinct 4 race.

The two county races to be decided are the runoffs for county clerk and for county treasurer. In the clerk's race George A. Fox and Johnson Smith, both of Eastland, are on the ballot. Richard C. Cox and E. C. (Clyde) Fisher are opponents in the runoff for the treasury post.

The state race is for associate justice of the Supreme Court (Place 1) with Spurgeon Bell of Harris County and Frank P. Culver of Tarrant County on the ballot.

The ballot will list the name of Martin Dies for Congressman-at-large and Omar Burkett for State Representative, 76th District, without opponents. Dies failed to win a majority for the congress post by a few votes and his opponent withdrew. Mr. Burkett's opponent also withdrew from the state representative's race after the former legislator won a big lead over three opponents in the first primary.

Elsewhere in the county, there will be contests in several constable and justice of the peace precincts.

The candidates met Thursday night and decided that there would be no campaigning on election day.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. West Cisco residents will cast their votes at the city fire station, while those who live east of Avenue D will vote at the Cisco Gas Corporation offices.

Presiding Judge Fred Grist announced that his assistants in the West box will include W. W. Fowell, J. V. Heyser, Mrs. B. S. Huey, Mrs. F. B. Clampitt, J. V. Heyser, Jr., Earl Mayhew, Mrs. Troy Stewart, J. W. Cooper and Mrs. W. W. Fowell.

W. R. Huestis will be the presiding judge in the East Cisco box. His assistants will include W. W. Wallace, Kent Word, C. B. Dill, Mrs. C. P. Chick and L. M. Surles.

Due to the short ballot, the returns from the election are expected to be available shortly after the polls close. The usual election laws will be enforced at all boxes.

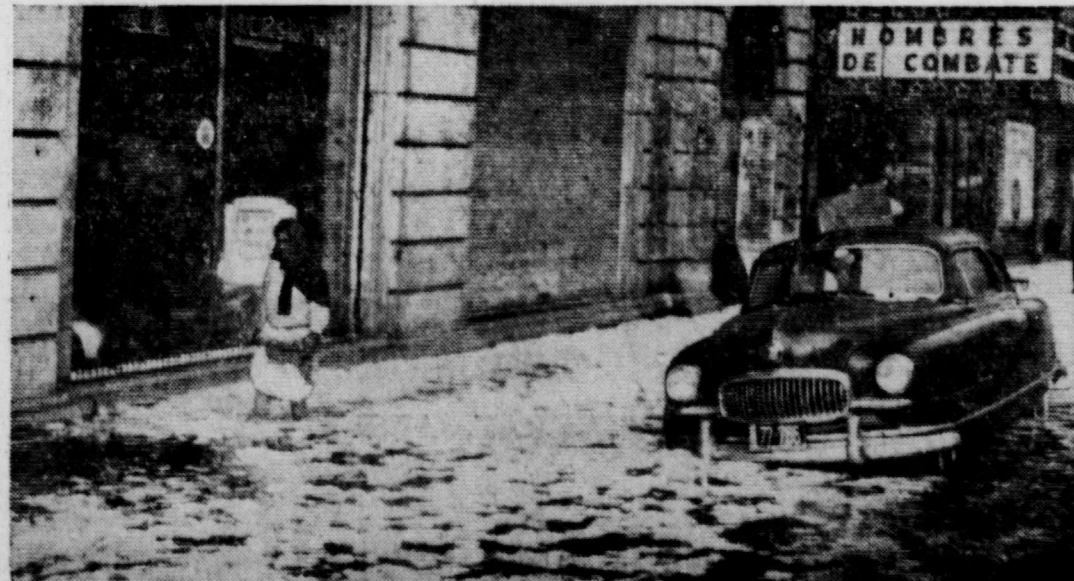
Local Girl Gets Degree At TSCW

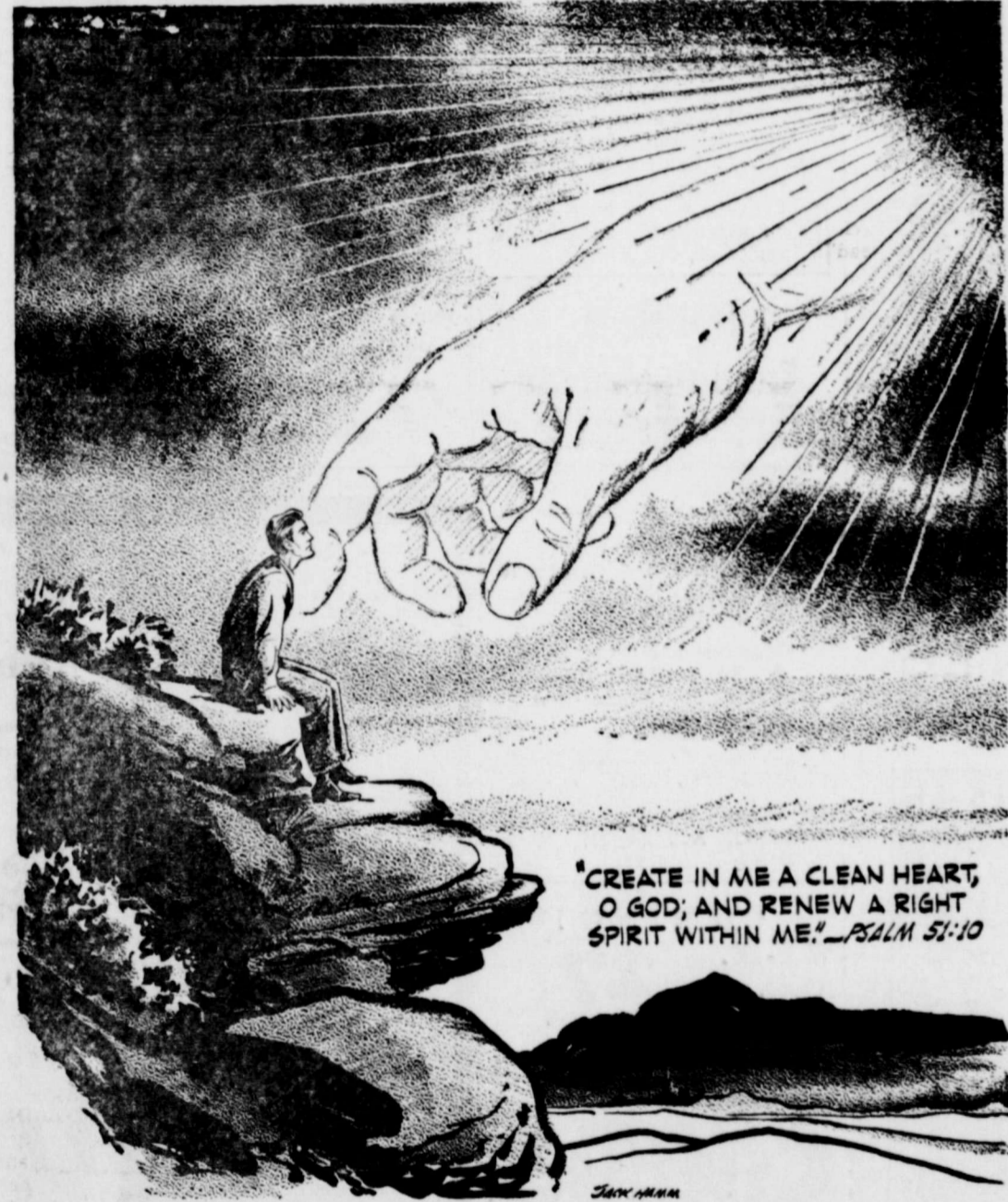
