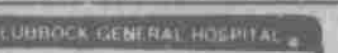

Final rites for Minister A. C. Christman, Sr., former minister of the 20th & Birch Church of Christ, were held in Dallas, Texas at the Southern Hills Church of

Christ on Thursday, October 26, 1989 with Douglas Howie presiding and Jack Evans, Sr. as eulogist.

He was born to Ollie and Ruby Christman in Caldwell, Texas on April 24, 1930. His childhood was spent in Dime Box, Texas and it was there that he received his early education, graduating from Fairview High School. He furthered his education in 1951 by being one of the very first students to enroll at Southwestern Christian College.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

The Critical Early Years

School reform in the 1980s has put the emphasis at the wrong end of the education spectrum. Let me mention just two examples.

Earlier this month, the National Endowment for the Humanities released a Gallup Poll indicating that many college students graduate with significant gaps in their knowledge of history and literature. NEH coupled release of its poll with a call for colleges to increase undergraduate requirements.

In 1983, *A Nation At Risk* warned of "a rising tide of mediocrity" in our schools. The response was a rush by states to increase high school graduation requirements, mandating more math, science, English, and so on. That trend has not abated. Just this month Virginia's top education officials proposed raising graduation requirements for the third time in six years.

Not so fast, please! Raising requirements for high school and college graduation may improve the knowledge and skills of some graduates. But these reforms fail to address the underlying problems of education in America. Graduation requirements don't speak to the students most in need. And they don't put the focus where it needs to be—on the early school years.

We don't lose students in college. We don't even lose them in middle schools. It's true, the problems become glaring at the secondary level. But as a high school math teacher married to a third grade teacher, I can say—on the basis of long experience—thousands of

discussions with elementary teachers, and countless family conversations—that any elementary teacher can identify those students who need additional assistance in the early years to assure their success later on.

Our education system as currently structured doesn't allow us to provide the help so many five- and six-year-olds (and preschoolers) need. Society recognizes that college professors require ample time for preparation, research,

grading papers, and meeting with individual students. It's not unusual for professors to teach just 12 hours a week.

Yet we expect kindergarten teachers to teach 24 children every morning and another 23 every afternoon—and squeeze preparation, professional development, and meetings with parents into the after-school hours.

College professors are provided an office, telephone, and at least a shared secretary. Elementary teachers have no office, perhaps two phones for 30 teachers, and no secretarial support. College professors are recognized as professionals and are granted a controlling voice in determining curriculum and instructional materials. In most states, elementary teachers still have little or no say.

We must start reforming our education system at the ground floor. It's time to grant elementary schools and their teachers the same kind of resources and respect that we appropriately devote to universities and their faculties.

If we're serious about improving the knowledge, skills, and numbers of our high school and college graduates—we must make dramatic improvements in class size and other learning conditions for young children.

Most of all, we must re-examine our attitudes about those who teach children in the critical early years. They are the professionals who build the foundation on which our house of education stands.

Children remain America's most precious resource. The younger they are, the more care, assurance, and attention they need. It is time we began to treat them that way.

Health Editorial:

Cleidocranial Dysostosis

Cleidocranial dysostosis is a condition whose cause is unknown. It is believed to be passed down genetically.

This condition is characterized by abnormalities of the skull, teeth, jaws and shoulder girdle. The sutures or seams where the flat bones of the skull join, often remain open thus making the head seem short and wide. The defect of the shoulder girdle, from which the condition derives a portion of its name, ranges from complete absence of clavicles (collar bone) to partial absence of thinning of one or both clavicles. Because of the clavicle abnormalities, the patients have unusual mobility of the shoulders and may be able to bring their shoulders forward until they meet. The jaws are also involved in this condition. Cleidocranial dysostosis is characterized by exhibits orally as a high, narrow, arched palate (roof of the mouth), and a cleft palate appears to be common (a condition where the roof of the mouth does not close). The maxilla (upper jaw) is underdeveloped and smaller than the normal relationship of the mandible (lower jaw). One of the outstanding oral findings is the prolonged retention of the baby (deciduous) teeth and subsequent delay of the permanent teeth. Thus multiple impactions occur and are often the first manifestation of this condition to be recognized. The roots of the teeth are often somewhat short and thinner than usual and may be deformed. The air sinuses may be underdeveloped or absent. There is no specific treatment for cleidocranial dysostosis, although care of the oral conditions is important. The retained baby teeth should be restored if they develop cavities, since their extraction does not necessarily induce eruption of the permanent teeth. A multidisciplinary approach to treatment of these patients utilizing the general dentist, pedodontist (children's dentist), orthodontist, and the oral surgeon can assure that all the oral ramifications of the disease will receive adequate treatment.

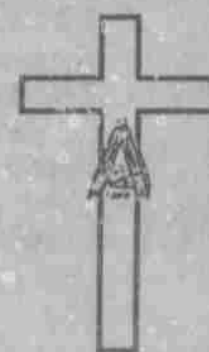

Hugo And California Earthquake Chastises

The devastation caused by Hurricane Hugo and California's recent earthquake brings out the best in most Americans--the desire to help the victims. Unfortunately, such disasters also bring out the worst in a few--greed and a desire to profit from the suffering of others.

The Better Business Bureau (BBB) urges donors to use their heads as well as their hearts when making contributions to disaster relief charities. Donors should be wary of appeals that dwell on tragedy but don't specify how donations will be used. Before giving, would-be donors unfamiliar with the soliciting organization should not hesitate to ask questions about its purposes, programs, and finances, and ask for literature that describe what relief activities are planned. Remember, never give cash. Make checks out to the charity, not to an individual. Don't succumb to pressure to give money on the spot--if the charity is a legitimate one, they will be happy to give you time to check them out. And, as always, call the Bureau if you have a question about a charity. Our information is quite extensive.

Abernathy Book On King Widley Attacked

Atlanta, Ga. -- Black political leaders from throughout the nation spent much of last week attacking a book which alleges that slain civil rights legend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. had sexual affairs with several women and was involved in a physical fight with one of the women the night before he was assassinated.

The book "And The Walls Came Tumbling Down" is the auto-biography of King's right-hand aide Rev. Ralph Abernathy. Abernathy confirms rumors which have circulated for years about King's extra-marital affairs. But critics have accused Abernathy of lying. In addition, another King associate Rev. Bernard Lee charges that Abernathy was so intoxicated on the night before King's death that "he was in no position or condition to see anything."

Others have accused Abernathy of being a bitter man who feels left behind and was simply "attempting to make some money with the book."

Racism Charged In Hastings' Ouster

Washington, D. C. -- Supporters of ousted Black federal judge Alcee Hastings have labeled the U. S. Senate vote convicting him on conspiracy charges "an act of racism."

Last week the Senate voted to strip Hastings, Florida's first Black federal judge, of his judgeship. Supporters are angry

because Hastings was convicted by the Senate of the same charges a jury found him innocent of several years ago.

Miami supporter and physician Dorsey Miller charged that the decision "sends a chilling message to Black folks all over the country that we have not yet overcome."

Hastings was accused of conspiring to accept a \$150,000 bribe. A jury found him innocent of the charge in the early 1980's but a group of white Florida judges pushed for and eventually got a Congressional hearing of the case.

Earthquake Hit San Francisco Blacks Hardest

San Francisco, Cal. -- Many poor an Black residents of the San Francisco-Oakland area have accused the national media and some government officials of ignoring their plight in the wake of the recent devastating earthquake.

Blacks seeking temporary shelter at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Elementary School in Oakland said they lacked the financial resources and support systems available to most well-to-do earthquake victims. Shelter director Jack Frank said, "They've got nowhere to go. They are trying to put their heads together but they aren't coming up with anything and nobody is here to help them."

Washington, D. C. -- Despite eight years of economic recovery under the Reagan administration,
