Second Lubbock County Road District Is Created Seven Perish In Rising Waters Of Trinity River

Heavy Rains Cause Overflows; Damage To Property Great

Reports Over Crippled Communication Lines Tell Of Deaths Near Livingston; Others Feared Lost

City Is Flooded

Families In Various Areas Forced To Take To Trees; Crop Damage Said To Be Large In Section

(By Associated Press)
LIVINGSTON, May 13.—Seven lives were reported to have been lost by a flood which swept down Polk county tonight from the Trinity river and tributary creeks. Swollen by torrential rains, the flood of several families was in sub. hundreds of thousands of property damage was caused. Livingston, in the center of the flooded district, was in darkness, its water supply cut off, and isolated from the outside world by swirling waters which inundated the railroad and highways.

Many Are Marooned
Reports trickling in as rescue parties returned from heroic efforts to remove persons reported marooned in tree tops indicated that ten persons had been swept to death and that others probably could die as the torrents engulfed homes.

It was feared that the food supply here would run low and that a later famine would develop unless pumping station, put out of commission by the rising water, could be restored within the next 12 hours.

Workers were kept frantically busy throughout the night rescuing marooned families and it was impossible to take precautions against military conditions which might lead to an epidemic.

Family Of Four Drowns
At Long Cane three, and a half miles north of here, a family of four was reported marooned in tree tops, but when rescue parties light their way against swirling events to the spot, the four apparently had been drowned.

One of the rescue boats was overturned by the swift current and a party was forced to return to Livingston without a further search.

Dr. White Heard By Graduates Of High School Here

"True greatness requires great conviction, great courage, great sense of values and great spirit of humility," Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist church, told 236 members of the Lubbock high school senior class, who will be graduated at commencement exercises Wednesday evening, in a baccalaureate sermon Monday evening at the First Methodist church.

"There have been four outstanding conceptions of greatness—physical, intellectual, social and spiritual," he said. Spiritual or moral greatness should include all values contained in the other three.

"This is an age of sentiment. Many live on the surface. Many seem not to have a single conviction for which they would die. Many would surrender convictions rather than suffer much inconvenience because of them.

"There must be mastery of many fears, many hesitations and doubts before one achieves greatness.

"Ability to see what is worthwhile and seize it, pushing aside trifles, is an indispensable quality of greatness.

The court meets at noon with Chief Justice Charles A. Quinn of the state supreme court presiding and the committee of impeachment managers from the lower house prosecuting.

Local Man Breaks Both Legs In Fall; Youth Is Injured

Jim McMeekan, Carpenter, Suffers Double Fracture In Tumble From Scaffold Late Monday

Both To Recover

Dudley Wallace, 9 Is Hurt When Struck Down By Car In Front Of Home; Possible Internal Injuries

FALLING from a scaffold while working on the new poultry plant of the Lubbock Poultry and Egg company, Jim McMeekan, carpenter, 310 Avenue V, suffered the fracture of both legs late yesterday afternoon.

He was carried to the West Texas Hospital where examination revealed both bones fractured in both legs, the bones protruding from the skin on the right leg. Physicians characterized the fractures of a very serious nature.

Confined For Several Weeks
At a late report last night, Mr. McMeekan was reported to be resting easier. He is expected to be confined for several weeks.

McMeekan is an employee of the McMillan Construction company.

Dudley Wallace, nine-year-old son of Mrs. Myrtle Wallace, 630 Avenue M, suffered a fractured skull and possible internal injuries yesterday when struck by one of the Lubbock Laundry company's cars.

The lad had been digging a trench in his yard to allow the water to drain off and was sitting on the curb as the laundry car drove up to the house. The driver of the car, not noticing the youngster in front of him, started up, striking the lad to the ground.

At the West Texas sanitarium where he was carried for treatment it is thought that the injuries will not prove serious.

Identified As Difficult
Otis McClanahan, Velma, Okla., who came to Petrolia thinking that the body might be that of a brother, drowned May 19, 1928 in the Red River near Burk Burnett, was unable to identify it. He had thought that a fractured arm received by the brother might be noticeable, but the body's absence of arms obviated the possibility of a check.

The Petrolia city marshal was looking into the possibility of murder. The coroner after an inquest announced no verdict.

Des Moines University Is Opened By Court Order After Faculty Is Fired

DES MOINES, May 13.—A court order today reopened Des Moines University, Baptist fundamentalist institution, after it had been closed indefinitely Saturday night by the trustees.

District court granted an injunction against the board's action, which resulted from a student and stone bombardment of the administration building as a protest against the ousting of the entire faculty, including President Harry C. Wayman.

Although classes were ordered today, the students' ministerial association, including several ordained Baptist ministers, adopted a resolution protesting the "domineering attitude of Dr. T. T. Shields, president of the board."

We advise all Baptist union churches," the resolution said, "to withhold support from the present board until Dr. T. T. Shields and Miss Edith Reiman resign or are removed."

Shields denies rumor. Meanwhile, at his home in Toronto, Dr. Shields, cleared Saturday of rumors involving himself and Miss Reiman, the board's secretary, today said that marks received by students attending classes against the board's order would not be recognized.

Shooting Occurs On Downtown Streets Of Amarillo

AMARILLO, May 14.—Mrs. Grace Morrison of Plainview was fatally shot in front of a hotel in the downtown section here tonight by Mrs. L. P. Stallworth of Amarillo. Mrs. Stallworth turned her gun over to police and admitted firing the fatal shots.

Mrs. Morrison died on her way to the hospital, three bullets having taken effect.

In surrendering to police, Mrs. Stallworth charged that Mrs. Morrison had come between Mrs. Stallworth and her husband.

The slain woman has been making Amarillo her home temporarily while her 12 year old daughter has been attending a local academy. Her husband was notified by telephone of the shooting and said that he was starting for Amarillo immediately.

County To Aid In 2nd Subway Cost

Lubbock County will pay one-ninth of the cost for installation of the proposed \$100,000 underpass on Avenue H, county commissioners decided Monday when petitioned by the City of Lubbock.

Two-ninths of the cost will be paid by the State Highway Department, and the remaining two-thirds cost will be paid by the Santa Fe Railway company and the City of Lubbock.

City funds were provided for the project when \$350,000 worth of municipal bonds for street improvements were voted here last September.

Oil Field Workers, Aided By Switch Engine, Will Attempt To Pull Tools From Gas Well; Try Shooting Today

(By Associated Press)
BORGES, May 13.—Oil field workers, with the aid of a switch engine, tomorrow will begin the hard task of hauling out the white hot drilling rig and tools which occupy the center of the Phillips Company gas well, flaming since Sunday morning when it ignited, burning thirteen men.

The rig and tools must be removed before an attempt to snuff out the blaze with nitroglycerine can be made. At present it is impossible for anyone to go within 75 yards of the fire without protection.

Once the pit is cleared, Orville Wineman, veteran torpedo man rushed here from Papa after water and steam had failed to check the flames, will approach the well in an asbestos suit and drop a charge of solidified nitro glycerine into the crater. Thirty quarts of the explosive, in a capsule seven inches thick and four feet long, will be used. The charge will be set off by electricity.

Persons who viewed the fire today marveled that any of the thirteen men working in the huge natural pit escaped when an accidental spark turned the crater into a blazing inferno. Only eleven of the injured remained in the hospital tonight.

Entire Town Put Under Quarantine

WINSTON, Mo., May 13.—(P)—A quarantine closed this northwestern Missouri town of 300-odd inhabitants today, after an epidemic of typhoid fever which had resulted in one death.

George Taylor, 17, died today in St. Joseph while fifty other persons, including a third of the students in the consolidated school, were ill and seventeen more were in St. Joseph hospitals.

New District Includes All Of County Except South-east Corner; District No. One Is Left Out

Slaton Is Excluded

O'Neal Heads Committee In Presenting Issue Before Commission; Opposition Voiced By J. T. Pinkston

LUBBOCK County Road District Number Two was ordered created Monday afternoon by the county commissioners, in regular session at the courthouse, and marks the first step toward the third attempt of this county since last December 1 to vote a bond issue to pave its highways.

The commissioners' action followed the filing of a petition with them in January, immediately after the defeat of the second bond issue.

Leaves Slaton Area Out

As created, the new road district will include all but about 100 sections of land in the southeastern part of the county, including the city of Slaton. It lies north and west of that part of the county bounded by the north line of road district number one, running from the east county line to the north-west corner of section 43; thence straight south along the east line of sections 43, to the south line of block 1; thence west one mile; then south along the east line of block 30 to the southeast corner of section 3; thence west about half a mile south of Posey to the east line of section 70, about one mile east of New Hope, and then south along the east line of section 70 to the county line.

Pinkston Is Opposed
Action taken by the commission was not unanimous. J. A. Pinkston, Slaton commissioner, voting against it.

The matter was brought before the body by Charles F. O'Neill, chairman of the organization formed in January to prepare the next road bond proposition. In the room at the time were to be seen a number of the leaders in the past two campaigns, all sides of those hectic events being represented, although none but O'Neill spoke to the commission. 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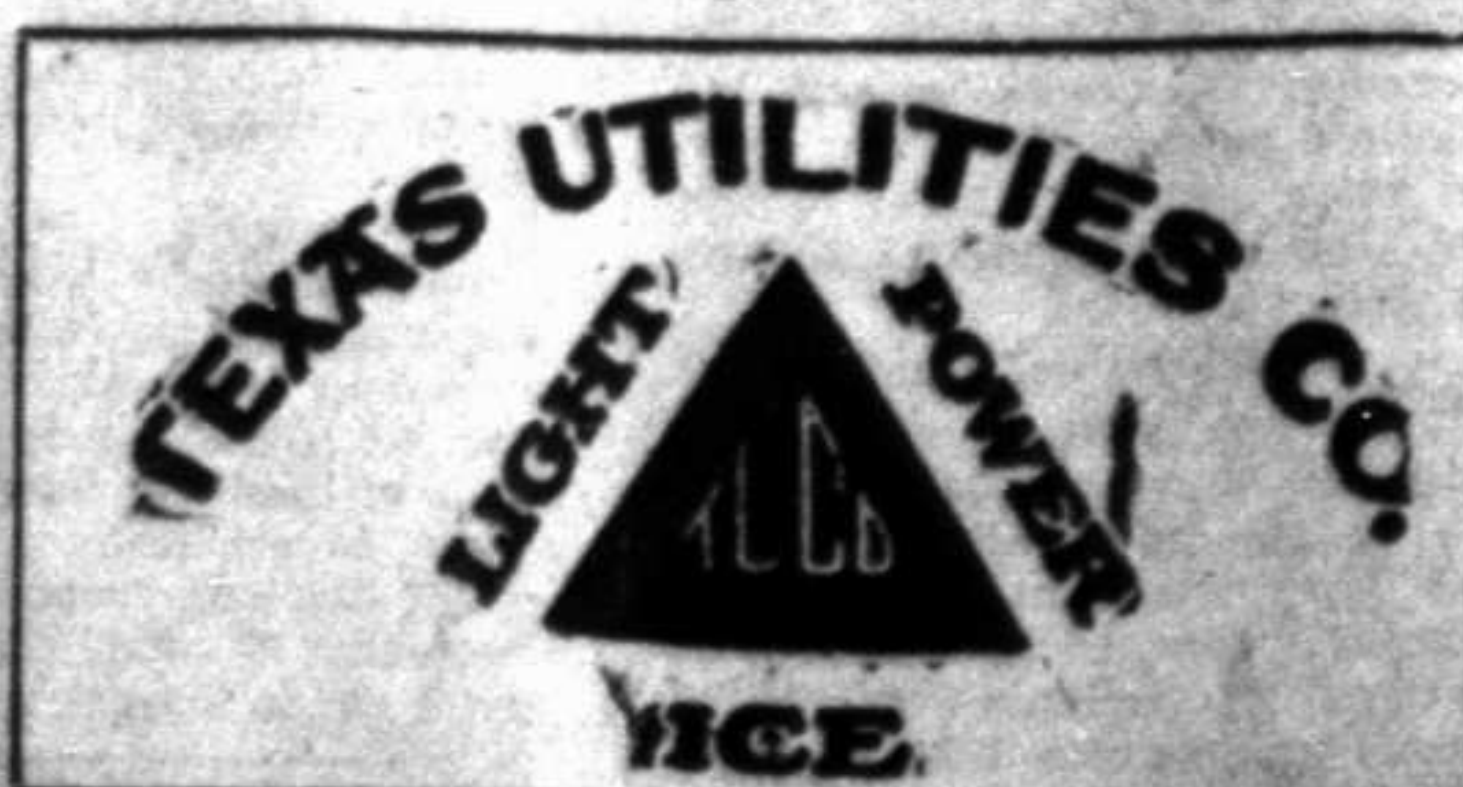

How to Achieve Beauty

By MADAMS RUBINSTEIN

With summer approaching more and more swiftly bathing days are coming, when most women of all ages will be displaying their bare limbs to the public gaze quite comfortably and altogether in complete accord with fashion.

For fashion, as well as comfort, will not tolerate stockings for active swimming wear. They are quite passé. Smooth, brown legs are the vogue for swimming, and even for some sports wear when they are seen above short, turned down socks.

It behooves the mature woman especially, to consider the appearance of her unclad legs this season. Children's legs, browned by the sun, are pleasant to look upon. Even when bruised or bitten, or shadowed with downy hair they have a childish charm that is part health and part unconscious, delightful grace.

But in the young or mature woman, the same effect is apt to be less charming. She needs a more dignified, more consciously considered liveliness to match her otherwise well groomed appearance. Careless childish bareleggedness is not, for her after she leaves her teens and early twenties.

First of all, let us consider the matter of superfluous hair—if that happens to be one of the good looks

problems of your legs. If it is not long or coarse, bleach it—don't try to remove it, for if you do, it may have a tendency to grow darker and coarser and you will have to keep at it constantly.

Equal parts of peroxide, lemon juice and ammonia water make a satisfactory bleach. Apply it nightly until the hairs are light golden in color. Then omit its use until they begin to darken again. The continued use of this bleach will also weaken the hairs gradually.

But if the growth of hair on your legs is coarse and long, by all means remove it. There is only one safe way to do this permanently; that is by the electric method. But there are effective temporary ways which are really very practical.

One is to use wax preparation. Applied melted and snapped off almost dry, it lifts out the hair with a part of its roots. The hair returns, but it takes longer to grow back than when a depilatory or razor is used.

Shaving is the least expensive and simplest way to remove leg hair. Use a safety razor and shave the legs dry without the use of cream or soap. The hair will return and it may grow slightly coarser, but it will not return any faster or any coarser than when wax or a depilatory is used. And there is less danger to the skin from shaving—barring accidents—than from some of the stronger depilatories, although many are virtually harmless.

Does this problem of removing superfluous hair seem to mean an endless beauty task? It is not difficult, really, and if it happens to be one of your problems, by all means master it, rather than let it embarrass you.

Rains In Texas Bring Advances In Cotton Price

DEFENSIVELY SPEAKING
A word in defense of the Tech baseball team which returned Sunday morning from a disastrous road trip through central Texas is necessary because of considerable adverse criticism reaching the ears of the Tech fans. The Tech team lost six games to Texas A. and M., St. Edwards University and Daniel Baker on successive days. Most of the games were lost by close scores after the locals had threatened to cop.

The conditions under which Coach Higginbotham's baseball team played these games last week were anything but the most favorable. At least, three of the games were played after the squad had been on the road most of the night before. Several games were played without an hour's sleep the night before. It must be remembered that weather conditions in Lubbock prior to the road trip had not allowed the Tech aggregation to stay in playing condition. A late start coupled with bad weather after their season opened, put the Matadors at least a month behind the teams they met on the jaunt.

Two of the teams met on the trip were as two of the strongest college teams in the state this season. The Texas Aggies boast one of the strongest contenders for the Southwest Conference title while the St. Edwards University nine heads the list in the Texas Conference. Daniel Baker won the championship of the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic association with exceptionally strong pitching. In practically every game played last week, the Matadors outthrew their opponents and lost the decision when their defense cracked under the strain of the trip. Coach Higginbotham's team was undoubtedly weak at shortstop, but this one defect could not have caused the string of defeats.

PROVEN UNDER FIRE
While the Waco Cubs were piling up their commanding lead in the Texas League race, fans and critics throughout the state were convinced that the Tech team was playing over their heads and would undoubtedly crack under stiff competition. Several days of lethargy on the part of the Tech last week caused the boys to pull the old reliable, "I told you so," but the performance of the league leaders in turning back their critics at the present time, the Houston Buffs, proved beyond a doubt that Derrill Pratt's pupils are of the calibre that can stand up under fire. On successive days, Saturday and Sunday, Waco defeated Houston in Waco with an improved brand of baseball. These wins were convincing and marks the team that ambles around the Amicable Building during their off hours as serious contenders for the first place position.

No one team stands out above the rest at the present time in the heated Texas League struggle. Only six games separates the Wacoans in first place from the Shippers of Beaumont in last place. Almost a month of the 1929 season has gone by and the race is more uncertain than it apparently was on April 17. Few developments have occurred since that time. George T. Stallings, Veteran Big League Pilot And Baseball Player, Dies After Game Battle For Life

Man Who Led Boston Nationals To Championship In 1914 Was Cheerful To The End

HADDON, Ga., May 13. (P)—Death today claimed George T. Stallings, 63, veteran baseball player and manager who wrote his name among the immortals in 1914 when he led the Boston National League club from the cellar in July to a world's championship. The veteran pilot died at his plantation home near here while he slept, bringing to an end his courageous battle of nearly a year against heart disease. On advice of physicians, Stallings came to his plantation home where it was hoped the change in climate and rest would restore his health. After rallying from his first grave illness, Stallings told the first newspaperman who called on him: "Well boys, the umpire up yonder (pointing skyward) has two strikes on me but the old man's not out yet."

Remained Cheerful
Throughout his illness, remained cheerful and never lost interest in the game to which he devoted the major part of his life. When desperately ill last summer he asked for scores of his club's games daily and although unable to join his team this spring, he kept in close touch with its progress. Stallings, a native of Augusta, Ga., the home of Ty Cobb, first attracted notice as a manager of the New York Yankees, which club he built up from a tail-ender when he took control in 1909 to runner-up in 1910, but it was not until 1914 that his genius as a baseball tactician attracted widespread notice and won for him the title of "miracle man," which clung until his death.

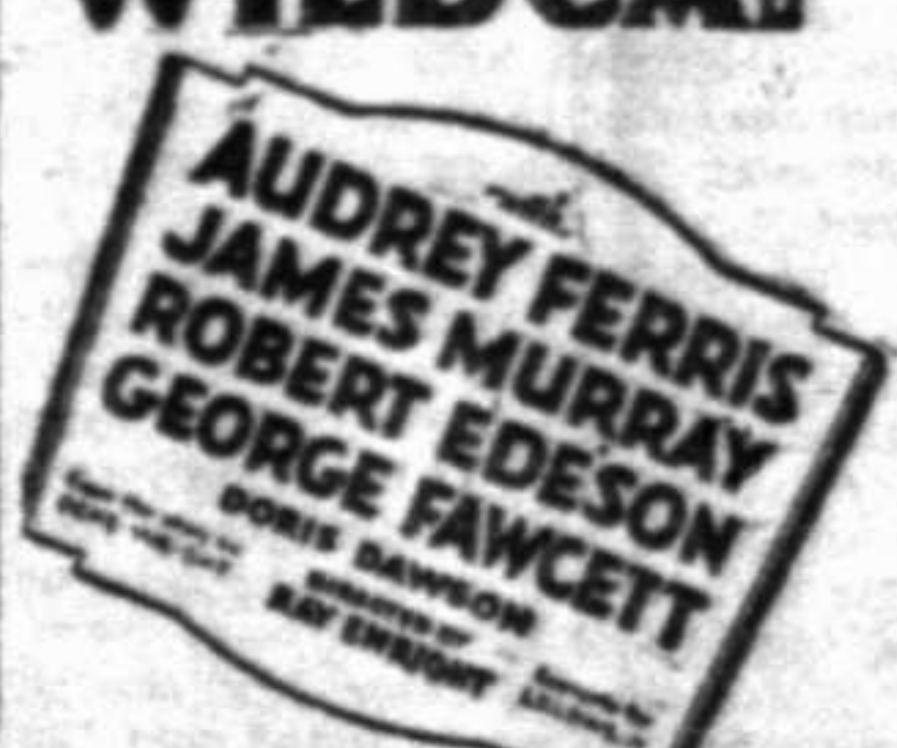

Texas To Become Republican, Says Creager In Meet

First Shipment Of Amarillo Helium

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The first shipment of helium from the government's new producing plant near Amarillo was made this week when a tank car filled with about 200,000 cubic feet of helium was dispatched to Langley field, Virginia.

This is one of the two specially built helium tank cars owned by the army air corps. It carries helium under pressure of about 2,000 pounds per square inch and when the car reaches Langley field the helium will be discharged into other containers for use in the lighter-than-air craft. The car will be returned immediately to Amarillo for reloading.

The new plant is operated by the bureau of mines at Soncy about seven miles west of Amarillo. The helium is extracted from natural gas having a helium content of 13.4 per cent, produced from the chloride structure lying northwest of Amarillo.

TORONTO, Ont., May 13. (P.)—The Rev. Dr. T. T. Shields, chairman of the board of trustees of Des Moines university today said that Dr. H. C. Wayman, deposed Saturday as president of the institution, had shown "absolute lack of discipline and control in administering the affairs of the university."

In a telephone conversation with the Buffalo Evening News, Dr. Shields said selection of Dr. Wayman as president "was the greatest mistake the university had ever made," although he himself had suggested Wayman's name when the vacancy occurred in the presidential chair at the institution.

MINDEN, Ia., May 13.—The minister who complains that golf is luring his parishioners away from church services on Sunday will never get any sympathy from Dr. P. J. Wagner, minister of the Congregational church of Minden.

Dr. Wagner has his church full of golf devotees every Sunday morning. Then, after the services are over, he goes out to the links and plays golf with them!

As a result, Dr. Wagner's church has an active membership of 475—although the population of Minden is only 400.

Even Serves as "Pro"

Dr. Wagner not only looks with a kindly eye on golf, and goes out to play Sunday afternoon, but he helped organize the Minden Golf Club in the first place, and spends as much of his time as he can spare serving as the club's unpaid "pro," teaching duffers how to eradicate slices and hooks.

From all of this it might be gathered that the relationship between the church and the golf club in Minden is unique. It is. And Dr. Wagner is entirely responsible.

He came to Minden four years ago—a big, strapping giant of a man, with an enviable record as a football player and track man in college. Before he had been here long he noticed that the chief Sunday diversion of Mindonites was getting in the car and driving 20 or 30 miles to some nearby city to see a moving picture show. He felt that better recreation ought to be made available closer to home.

Helped Organize Club

So, one day about a year ago, Dr. Wagner called on two of the town's leading citizens, H. A. Purney and Arthur Mauer, and discussed golf with them. He suggested that they organize and build a club of their own.

The idea caught on, and today Minden has an excellent golf course, covering 40 acres of land three miles outside the town. When the club needs to fix the greens, build new paths, smooth the fairways or repair the clubhouse, the members pitch in and do the work themselves. Dr. Wagner, a skillful golfer, has taught any number of his congregation how to play the game—and recently, when a tournament was staged, it was held under the church's auspices.

"I have a big church, and my members don't all come from this town, they live all over the county," says Dr. Wagner. "My day begins early, usually a round of golf and then work, visiting the sick, seeing the children, taking care of church business, and so on."

How It Began

"I used to see these men working hard every day in the week. They had plenty of work to do except on Sunday. Then I saw them planning their Sundays so they could skip out of town and visit the bigger towns nearby. I said, 'See here, Pastor Wagner, you start out after them. I did go out on the links with them and played golf and after the game I'd say, 'See you tonight at the young people's society meeting.' And say, that stunt worked."

Army Planes To War In Mid-West And Make Air Raids On Cincinnati, Other Ohio Cities And Later On At New York

WASHINGTON, May 13.—A night bombing raid on New York City, destruction of an enemy airbase with live ammunition, and daylight attacks on Cincinnati and other Ohio cities are planned by the army air corps for its gigantic war games in Ohio.

The air maneuvers, which will see the largest peacetime concentration of air forces ever attempted by any nation, will begin at midnight, May 15 and continue night and day 10 days.

The principle of refueling heavy airplanes in mid-air, demonstrated successfully by the army endurance plane Question Mark, will be turned to practical military use for the first time when a night bombing raid on New York City is staged from Dayton, Ohio.

Refuel In Air

The giant bomber, one of the new Keystone "Panthers," will leave the clouds and head for New York. A refueling plane will meet it near Middletown, Pa., in the heart of the Allegheny mountains, and supply 250 gallons of gasoline.

The bomber will arrive in New York under cover of darkness, fly over the Battery and drop two parachute flares, each representing a 1,000 pound bomb—enough to tear the Woolworth building in shreds and cause more damage than could be repaired in years of reconstruction.

Drop Bombs

With its bombs dropped on the metropolis, the big plane will fly over New York for 15 minutes, report its progress by radio to the ground, and head west to receive 200 gallons of gasoline at Middletown on the flight to Dayton, which will be reached by dawn.

The raid will be made to demonstrate the feasibility of bombing a large city from a distant base, flying 1,544 miles with a 6,000 pound load without touching the plane's wheels to the ground.

Cincinnati is to be made the objective of a mass attack of air forces on the afternoon of May 18, when more than 200 planes—bombers, pursuit, attack and observation—stage a battle over the city, which is to be defended by squadrons of pursuit planes.

As the battle rages in the air, the story of the conflict will be broadcast from a radio plane to the ground, where it will be sent out over a national broadcasting chain.

Concluded May 26.

The maneuvers will be concluded May 26 with a demonstration of the terrific striking power of military aircraft. An "enemy" airbase, with hangars, planes and personnel outlined on the ground by old condemned planes and panels, will be destroyed by machine-gun fire and a downpour of live bombs.

Maj. Gen. Dennis E. Nolan will be in command of the combined maneuvers, with Brig. Gen. Benjamin D. Foulois in charge of the air forces. General Foulois will watch the maneuvers from a plane and act as "umpire" for the games, while General Nolan will direct a critique after each day's battle.

GENEVA, May 13. (P.)—Switzerland, it appeared today, is not in favor of even the most modified prohibition. In halting yesterday an initiative bill to authorize local option as to prohibition of hard liquor was beaten badly. Every one of the 24 Swiss cantons rejected the

Smithsonian Hopes To Re-Crete Old Dinosaurs From Fossil Beds Found In New Mexico; Make Trips This Summer

WASHINGTON, May 13. (P.)—A fertile bed of bones of animals which roamed in New Mexico 150,000,000 years ago will be explored this summer by an expedition from the Smithsonian institution.

New chapters in the life histories of dinosaurs, giant turtles and other reptiles are expected to be revealed in the remains uncovered several years ago by geologists surveying coal veins.

Piece Out Story

From their finds the scientists hope to be able to piece out a little more of the story of the world's life in the era, earlier than the ice age, when the plants that compose the coal burned today were waving in the winds.

The exploration, covering a territory 100 miles wide and 70 miles long, is expected to yield precious remains of horned, armored, duckbill and flesh-eating dinosaurs.

Average 25 Feet

Animals averaging 25 feet in length are promised from bones unearthed in incomplete research. The character of the fossils, rather than their size, is believed to hold the most for science, however.

One Forlorn Heath Hen, Last Of Dying Breed, Is Left On East Coast Island

BOSTON, May 13.—On an island off the Massachusetts coast dwells perhaps the loneliest creature in the world.

It is a heath hen, the last of its species, sole survivor of a variety of grouse that is all but extinct, notwithstanding expenditure of more than \$100,000 by the state of Massachusetts to preserve this relic of colonial days.

Numerous Once

Three centuries ago the heath hen was a numerous species in the vast flocks of North American wild fowl. A few years ago the last known colony made its final stand on Martha's Vineyard. Ornithologists joined in the effort to save them, and have participated for perhaps the first time in watching the extinction of a species. Even with their watching, only little of the tragedy is revealed.

Final annuals are reported by Dr. Alfred O. Gross, professor of biology at Bowdoin college, who since 1923 has studied the rapidly thinning colony, working under supervision of the state division of fisheries and game.

Thirteen Remained

In the spring of 1927 only 13 birds of which but two were females, were counted. By autumn the flock dwindled to seven. In the ensuing winter one by one the flock dropped until 1928 opened with three males.

One of these was definitely identified as last last summer. Since December 8 last only one bird has been seen.

Allan Keniston, superintendent of the hen reservation, and Dr. Gross have patrolled the haunts of the birds without finding more than one male this spring. Thornton W. Burgess, the naturalist, and others offered rewards for reports of other heath hens, but none was found.

Last of Kind

"It is reasonable to infer," says Dr. Gross, "that the lone bird at West Tisbury is the very last of his kind."

"How long this bird will continue to live, whether a day or a year or longer, only time can answer. It is the intention of the Massachusetts state division of fisheries and game to allow the last heath hen to live its remaining days in a normal way among the scrub oaks plains of its ancestral home on Martha's Vineyard. As long as it lives it will be carefully observed and protected."

"Never in the history of ornithology has a species been watched in its normal environment down to the very last individual."

Nye contended this would relieve the surplus situation.

Paris Recovered

Parts of skulls and skeletons, buried for ages under hundreds of feet of rock formations and brought to light as the solid coverlet was worn away by weather, may receive further interpretation in the light of more complete findings.

Dr. Charles W. Gilmore, curator of vertebrate paleontology of the National museum, will head the expedition. Other members will be N. H. Boss of the Smithsonian and George F. Sternberg and Charles Sternberg, both of Hays, Kas.

The field of exploration lies more than 40 miles north of Gallup, N. M. and overlaps in part the Navajo Indian reservation. The men expect to return early in August.
