## NOTE TO PATRONS OF SCHOOL

## MEMOIR OF MRS. C. JOHNSON

Mrs. Annie Tongate Johnson was born in Freedom, Indiana, January 7, 1855. She was the oldest of a family of ten.

In early womanhood she was married to Cornelius Johnson. To this union were born seven children all of whom died in infancy except Mrs. L. H. Lance with whom she made her home for more than twenty-three years.

The deceased leaves beside her daughter, Mrs. L. H. Lance, three brothers, W. B. and E. B. Tongate, Brownwood, Texas, O. K. Tongate, Brownfield, Texas, and two sisters, Mrs. A. W. Jackson, Chillicothe, Texas, and Mrs. D. C. Moore, Wilson, Texas. The husband preceded her to the world beyond more than 25 years ago.

She and her husband first moved from Indiana to Kansas. After a short sojourn in Kansas, the family moved to Ft. Worth, Texas, where she lived until after the death of her husband in 1900. For some years she lived with Mrs. Lance at Chillicothe, Texas. In 1910 she moved with the Lance family to Ochiltree County where she lived until her death, August 6, 1925.

At the age of 20 she professed faith in Christ as her Savior and united with the First Baptist Church, Ft. Worth, of which church she was a member until after she moved to Ochiltree county. At the time of her death she was a member of the Perryton Baptist Church.

She leaves beside the loved ones a host of friends all of whom join in sincere sorrow with the bereaved friends.—Contributed.

## TO TEACH KINDERGARTEN

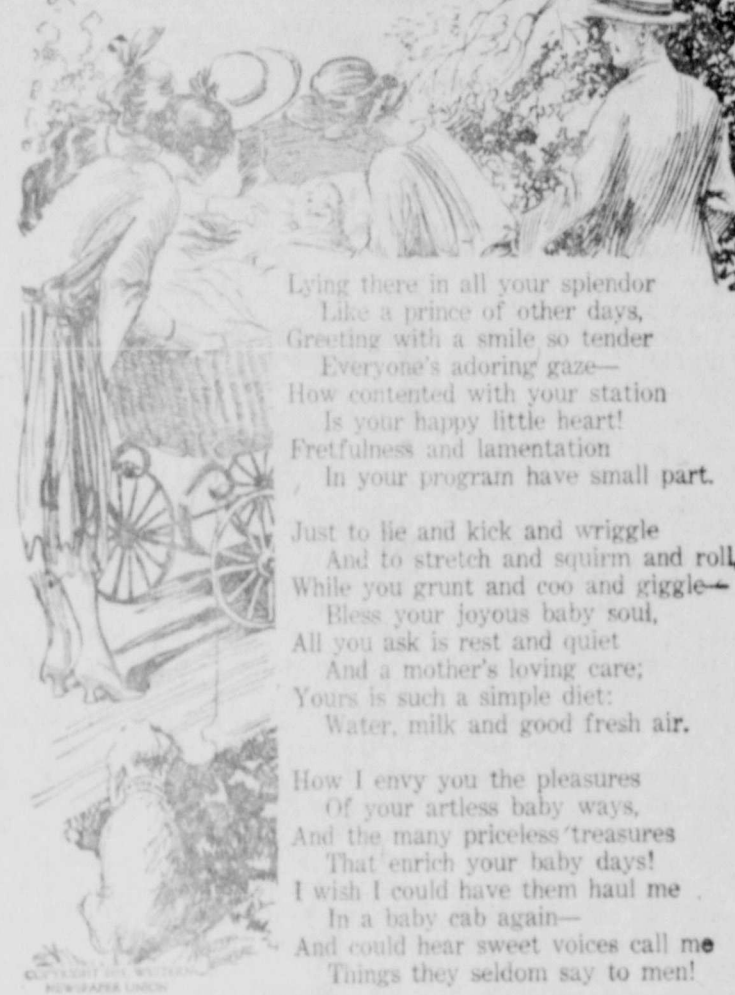

## NEW SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS ASSUMES DUTIES

Prof. W. B. Irvin and Mrs. Irvin arrived on Tuesday of this week from Abilene, Texas where he has been taking graduate work this summer at the Simmons University, to take up his duties as superintendent of the schools of the Perryton Independent School District. Prof. Irvin comes to us from Pampa, where he has been engaged for the past four years. He was employed as athletic coach at Pampa for two years and for the last two years he served as superintendent of the district. He was coach of the Pampa team that played here several years ago and, if our memory serves us right, he made "us like it" at that time. Prof. Irvin's record at Pampa stands out for itself. For one year he was secretary of the Consolidated Institute at Canyon and has also been chairman of the resolutions committee and a member of the executive board.

### RIGHT AND WRONG FARM ORGANIZATIONS

Within the last two or three years it has begun to percolate a little bit to those who dominate business and labor organizations that all the advantage gained by government special privileges will avail them nothing if farming perish. They learned this during the war and began to understand then a little bit of how dependent they are upon agriculture.

Ten or fifteen years ago, in farmer's meeting, it was customary to discuss things from the standpoint of fairness. "We want only what is right and fair." Well, you are not going to get what is right and fair unless you go after it, and just as capital found through co-operation, and

just as labor found through selling their products co-operatively, that they get more for it, agriculture must apply these same principles of organization. You do not suppose that capital reached its position of advantage, that it got the edge on all the rest of use, by talking. And labor has not reached its position of advantage with out trial and tribulation, and the expenditure of funds without end.

Just day before yesterday I noticed that in the four years the Typographical Union had spent 18 million dollars of funds contributed by the members of that union for the purpose of putting over the 44-hour week. Contrast that expenditure—and much of it must have been wasted—with the howl that went up when the Farm Bureau Federal Grain Growers, Inc., did not work out as advertised.

Now before agriculture can get

anywhere with organization we must get some comprehension of the cost. We must likewise get comprehension of the fact that these things did not come easily to capital or labor. This thing was drilled into me. I had talked about organization and believed in it for a good many years, but when I was in Washington, while the war was on, I noticed organized business influencing things and getting what it wanted. But I found that the men who were responsible for agricultural policies were up against it because none of them could find out what the farmers did want. There were representatives of farmers' organizations there, each one pulling against the other, and no one could speak authoritatively for agriculture.

And out of this experience, earnest farmers developed the organization which ultimately became the American Farm Bureau Federation, and I had a little something to do with that myself.

We all know what has happened in the last five years, but the underlying basis of organization is sound because it seeks to apply to agriculture, the same principles of organization which capital and labor have applied so successfully to get more money for themselves. Organizations for social and educational purposes do not have much influence. I still believe that the one kind of organization which may do for agriculture something approaching what the United States Chamber of Commerce does for business men and the American Federation of Labor does for labor must have its foundation in local co-operative business enterprises. The effective organization for farmers must be a union or organizations specifically designed to "get the money." And the only way that the further obtaining of advantages and special privileges from the government on the

part of capital and labor can be prevented, is for agriculture to go after it, too. They will talk sweetly to you, labor and capital, and evidence great interest in the farmers' welfare. That interest displays itself only when the situation is about the same as in the case of the colored man who pulled the pickaninny out of the stream because he had the bait in his mouth. You will get equality for agriculture only as agriculture earns equality through the development of organizations which will force it.

It used to be the belief that the people of the country grew stuff to make business for the fellow in town and that is still the idea in some of the cotton growing districts of the old South. I know of towns, while they have no regular organization, yet every man living in that town is organized to separate the country fellow from everything he raises. None of them know that the only excuse for the existence of a town is to do things for farmers so that farmer can better afford to hire someone to do than to do it for them selves. All that the town has coming is an opportunity to render service developing a base for supplies for facilitating the marketing of products to such a degree that the people will be encouraged to grow more. Then business will develop because the demand for service will increase.

Now, you know, organization is not all of it. The basis of co-operative marketing, for example, must be the regular production of good stuff. Otherwise you cannot develop a business. Suppose, for instance, that Henry Ford turned out flivvers which were as variable in their performance as some of the stuff that farmers' organizations try to sell. Would Henry have built up the business he has? You demand good things when you buy. Those who

buy your stuff demand the same thing of you. Organization is important, but the production end of the business is the first thing of importance, and agriculture always will be a multiplicity of little independent manufacturing plants.

**FARMER SHOULD LEARN.  
ONE KILLED, IT PAYS.  
THE BEATER IS BEATEN.  
TO THE LAST MAN.**

Rubber jumped to 80 cents. That made everybody gasp. Then it went to \$1. Now it has reached \$1.12. That is because His Majesty's British subjects, who control the rubber market, know how to manage prices.

American farmers see crops prices dropping, and they are always uncertain. That is because farmers who COULD control the price of food have no efficient organization. They have something to learn from the Rubber Trust, and a few other trusts.

At Johns Hopkins University Baltimore's magnificent seat of learning, the able scientists report progress in the preparation of insulin, the remedy for diabetes discovered by young doctors in Canada.

The insulin diminishes the amount of sugar in the blood, thus curing diabetes. From insulin, as used hitherto, Johns Hopkins scientists have eliminated various chemical elements. One remaining is called "fraction I.2." This highly concentrated insulin, injected into the blood of a rabbit, reduced the sugar in its blood from 113 millimeters per cubic centimeter to 89 within one hour.

The sentimentalist who thinks it a shame to experiment with live rabbits would change his mind if he had a father or mother dying of diabetes.

Robert Shroyer, twenty-eight, beat his wife in Frederick County, Maryland. Shroyer was tied to the whipping post, ten lashes were applied to his back, "with a regula-

tion blacksnake whip." The wife-beater deserved the ten lashes and ten thousand.

But it is the first time in a long time that a white man has been officially whipped in Maryland. Did it really do any good?

The man, for some reason, decides to beat his wife and does so.

The people of a great State, for some reason, decide to beat the man and they do so.

What's the difference? Why not make the man work for his wife about six months, instead of letting a great State imitate a wife-beater?

Bricklayers fight masons, union against union. There ought to be arbitration, for the sake of working people.

The bricklayers and plasterers might ask themselves this question:

"Suppose presidents of railroads quarrelling among themselves, should shut down their railroads and refuse to carry passengers. How long would the public stand it?"

Railroad presidents are too intelligent for that sort of nonsense. If they were fighting among themselves, they would keep it to themselves. That is why they are railroad presidents.

Thirty-four Minnesota volunteers in the Civil War formed a "Last Man's Club." The club has just held its fortieth annual reunion. Four are living, one too ill to attend. One of the three present was unable to stand, so they drank to the last man sitting.

One of these days there actually will be on this earth some last man, woman, or last child. For in time this world must die. Science and the Bible teach it.

What kind of creature will that last human be? What shape, what language? How much will he or she know?

Will the human race, having moved up to the highest possible point, gradually go back to barbarism at the end, as the individual in extreme old age goes back to childhood?

Will the last man know how to talk to the other planets, and will he know just what is going to happen to him after he dies, or will he be like ourselves, still wondering, with only faith to comfort him, and save him from painful thought and speculation?

## Discovers New Wonder of the Sea

Beebe expedition which just returned. Deep sea fishes with "show window" or transparent stomachs; others with "lighting" plants of their own; are some of the wonders brought back.

### INJURED BY WOLF DEVELOPS RABIES

Ford Hayes, a boy who was injured by an attack of a coyote while out on a fishing trip on the Washita a week ago last Sunday near Cordell, is reported to have developed rabies from the effect of the bite of the wolf. In the fight with the coyote which attacked him Hayes face and arms were considerably lacerated from his encounter with the animal. In a second fight with the wolf it was clubbed to death by John Hayes and Roy Lovins, other members of the party.

It was feared from the action of the wolf that it had hydrophobia and the injured boy was taken to the hospital at Clinton for treatment, and the head of the wolf sent to Oklahoma City for analysis. It was reported that no traces of rabies were found in the wolf head but the young man who was injured has already developed a decided case of hydrophobia and is in a most pitiable plight with no hope for him. It is said that the patient in his lucid moments warns those who are attending him to be careful and realizes his condition. This is probably the only human case of rabies ever known in this part of the country, and a sad one it is said to be. —Elk City Journal.

### "LOST WELL" GETS HEARING AT AUSTIN

In further substantiation of Joe Heydon's promise to open up the "Lost Well" on or before the 16th of August, is the following account of the granting of a permit to Mr. Heydon to open the well, as told in the following dispatch by the Associated Press from Austin.

"Permit was granted yesterday by the oil and gas division of the Texas railroad commission to Joe Heydon, former circus trooper and soldier of fortune, to reopen an oil well, which he claims was dug 1,117 feet by the Spaniards in 1849 in Wheeler County.

Heydon claims the well was dug as a shaft to a silver mine and that when oil was struck the Spaniards cemented it with "gyp" rock, and that when he recently opened it, oil stood within twenty feet of the top of the hole.

He claims he learned of the well through aged Spanish documents which he produced."—Wheeler News Review.

### DEVELOPING THE FARM MANAGERS OF TOMORROW

By Walter B. Remley Agricultural Extension Department International Harvester Company.

"Listen friends, how's the Boy's and Girls' Club Work going in your community? Is there a pig, calf, lamb, poultry, garden, potato, canning, sewing or other kind of club. If there isn't, there ought to be—absolutely ought to be.

Are your County Agricultural Agent, your county Farm Bureau, your county Fair Association, your civic clubs, your schools interested in club work. If they're not, they ought to be. There aren't any grounds for denying that.

Why the need for club work? Think; Here's an illustration which I used in a talk on club work from this station last spring, but I'm going to use it again, for it can't be emphasized too strongly. Listen!

"What is a boy? He is a person who is going to carry on what you have started. He is to sit right where you are sitting and attend to those things you think are important when you are gone. You may adopt all the policies you please, but how they will be carried out depends upon him. Even if you make leagues and treaties, he will have to manage them. He is going to sit at your desk in the Senate and occupy your place on the Supreme Bench. He will assume control of your cities, states and nation. He is going to move in and take over your prisons, churches, schools, universities and corporations. All your work is going to be judged and praised or condemned by him. Your reputation and your future are in his hands. All your work if for him and the fate of the nation and of humanity is in his hands. So it might be well to pay him some attention." And the same thing goes for the girls.

These things are important, not only because the majority of America's leaders in practically all lines of business, government, science, etc. have always come from the farm, but also to increase the efficiency and maintain the importance of agriculture.

Our nation is outstanding among the nations of the world. As Americans, we're proud of it and we want our nation to maintain that leadership. But as the farm is the bulkwork and the feed basket of the nation, we are even more interested in agriculture. We want farming methods to be more efficient, we want soil fertility maintained and improved, we want a higher quality of grain and livestock, we want better farm homes and a more comfortable standard of living. Above all we want farming to be more profitable.

The lean years that agriculture has had to contend with since the war have convinced everybody of that. The statement that all wealth originates in the soil is no longer questioned. We need efficient farmers and we need farm leaders—intelligent, fair-minded, aggressive men, who are schooled in business; men of vision, who will work patiently and judiciously to have agriculture accorded its rightful place in the scheme of American industry; men who will continue to educate farmers to standardize and grade their products, cheapen their costs of production, to adjust production wherever possible to the demand and to perfect co-operative marketing, so that the farmer may have more assurance of securing a fair return on his investment and labor with what he could get from a similar investment in some other business. There are many things to be solved, but withal farm life is the greatest in the world. Every farm boy should be glad that he was born on a farm for considering everything his chances for success in life, are greater than had he been born anywhere else.

Boys' and Girls' Club Work is one of the best agencies to equip a man to do the things I have just enumerated. It molds boys and girls into healthy, vigorous, patriotic citizens, because under what is called the 4-H banner, they are instructed to train the head to think, plan, reason; train the heart to be kind, be true, be sympathetic, train the hands to be useful, be helpful, be skillful; train the health to resist disease, enjoy life, health to resist disease, enjoy life, health to resist disease. And all club make for efficiency. And all club members must take and live the following pledge, "I pledge my head to clear thinking, my heart to greater loyalty, my hands to longer service, and my health to better living for my club, my community and my country. There could be no finer dedication of self and service to the community, state and country.

Club work is practical because it takes boys and girls at the age when they are bundles of undirected energy and directs this energy in the right way. It enables them to apply in actual practice the principles and

theories they are taught in the class room. It vitalizes agriculture to the highest possible degree. It impresses upon them the value of industry and courage. It makes them efficient and intelligent. It interests farming and better home conveniences and develops a community pride and consciousness that nothing else could. It gives them a better opportunity to make money and some of the best prizes annually awarded are trips to the International Livestock Exposition, to Washington and other places of interest. There are many instances on record where club boys or girls have in a few years made enough money from their club projects to go to college or into business for themselves. Club work under the proper guidance is the very next thing to an agricultural college education and even more practical in some ways.

Lee County, Iowa, that neat little pocket down along the Mississippi River in southeastern Iowa is one of the best examples of what properly organized, aggressive club work can do for a community. It is the home of the biggest and most successful single breed pig club in the world. Stated by C. D. Streeter, a prominent lumberman of Keokuk, the county seat, in 1920, it has steadily grown until it had more than 200 members in 1923 and 1924 and has now been limited to 100. Each boy and girl in it is in partnership with some business man, of Keokuk or other town in the county. The Hampshire is the breed being raised. The club is fostered by the Lee County Hampshire Swine Breeders' Association, which is an organization of farmers, bankers and other business men.

Five years ago there were very few purebred hogs of any kind in Lee County. Today there are more than 3,000 purebred Hampshires on Lee County farms and the county has become noted as a center for good Hampshires. Just a few months ago, according to Alex R. Moffat, Lee County Club Agent, a Texas man wired for a car load of Hampshire sows. Large numbers of the boys and girls are continuing to build up herds of purebred Hampshires from the pigs they secured in the club at little or no cash outlay. And in many instances they have convinced their dads of the greater value of purebred hogs and of breed feeding practices and methods of sanitation.

Jersey, Holstein and Guernsey dairy clubs under the direction of the Lee County Better Dairying Association have also been started this year. Mr. Emile F. Renaud, Keokuk jeweler and public spirited citizen, is the prime mover back of this organization. The county is also noted for other clubs besides its champion pig club. There are for example sixteen girls' clothing clubs with 180 girls enrolled and seven poultry clubs composed of eighty boys and girls.

I could go on indefinitely telling about individual cases of Lee County boys and girls and what club work has done for the county's agriculture and business, but time will not permit. Aside from the commercial phase of the question, club work by bringing the business men and farmers together has aroused and developed the greatest community spirit ever known in Lee County. There are cordiality and understanding and Keokuk and Lee County have been lifted right out of the old rut and placed upon a new plane of civic endeavor. They breathe and thrive upon the spirit of:

"If you want to have the kind of home town  
Like the kind of a town you like  
You needn't slip your clothes in a grip  
And start on a long, long hike;  
You'll only find what you left behind,  
For there's nothing that's really new,  
It's a knock at yourself when you knock your town.  
It isn't the town—it's you.

You wouldn't expect, if you minded your soil,  
Bumper crops that you used to get;  
Nor aught but runts from feeding that stunts;  
No payment without a debt.  
One gets returns from what he earns.  
Something must first be due.  
If your town doesn't pay, look at it this way:  
It isn't the town—it's you.

## THE SPIRIT OF THE PLAINS

The following letter was read by Miss Kathryn Pryor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Pryor, at the graduating exercises of the Farnsworth Grade School last spring. The letter was written by Miss Kathryn to her older brother, Leroy, who lives in California. Mr. Pryor has had a number of inquiries for copies of this letter so we are reproducing it in the Herald so that all may read this clever description of our great plains.

wouldn't be surprised if the mirage fairies do not take me away into their real home where I will see the real lakes and forests, just like I almost see them in the mirages.

Anyhow I think it is wonderful to just keep on following the Mirage Fairies, for though each one disappears when you get too near you know there is always another just as beautiful beyond and beyond that, and if I keep on loving them and following them, maybe some day I will walk right into one and be in faire land.

## Use of Power on Farms, Big Item

### Agricultural Worker Able to Till Three Times as Many Acres.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

As a result of the increased use of power and labor-saving machinery in farming operations and the opening of new lands well suited to the use of machinery the average agricultural worker in the United States is now able to care for almost three times as many acres of crops as an individual could handle 75 years ago, according to a study recently made by the division of agricultural engineering of the United States Department of Agriculture. At the same time the hours of labor on the farm have been reduced and farmers have been relieved of much of the monotony and drudgery which formerly characterized their work.

Power and labor together account for approximately 60 per cent of the total cost of farming and a better knowledge of the power requirements of farm operations and the adoption of more efficient types of power units will do much to cut down production costs.

#### Second Only to Railroads.

The primary horse power available for use on farms is greater than that used in mining and manufacturing, and is second only to that required for railroads. The total power used annually on farms amounts to nearly 16,000,000,000 horse-power hours and the annual cost amounts to a total of nearly \$3,000,000,000.

Up to the present little scientific study has been made of the basic power requirements of various farm operations. Although the plow is one of the oldest agricultural tools for which power is required, the fundamental requirements of plow design are still unknown and no satisfactory method of measuring the actual work done by a plow has yet been discovered. The University of Wisconsin has conducted experiments which show that it is possible to run an ensilage cutter with one-half the power ordinarily used by this machine simply by employing proper speeds and an improved blower.

Farm power is derived from animals, gas engines, (including tractors, trucks and automobiles) steam engines and electric, wind and water motors. Up to about sixty years ago little power other than that furnished by animals was available to farmers. The small gas tractor, the truck, the automobile and electric power have only become important as sources of farm power within the last ten or twelve years.

The estimated total numbers of power units now on farms in the United States is as follows:

Great opportunities exist for the cutting down of the cost of farm operations through the reduction in the labor requirements of each operation and by a better application of the power used. Before such savings can be effected, however, it is necessary to make a thorough study of the basic power requirements, and of the factors which affect these requirements. Among these are: Climate, character of the soil, depth of plowing, cultivating, etc.; condition of the crop, size of fields, size and type of power units needed and mechanical efficiency of the tools or machines employed by the farmer.

Topography is a factor to be reckoned with in considering the power requirements of farms in any particular locality. In the Central West the land generally is smooth and is not cut by many streams or ravines. This condition encourages the laying out of large fields and makes possible the use of large machines and power units. In Eastern and Southern states, however, the land is frequently hilly and cut by ravines and streams making small and irregular-shaped fields necessary. This, of course, discourages the use of large machines and results in a predominance of small farms.

Probably the most serious drawback to the efficient use of power in agriculture is the extreme seasonal demand. In each type of farming followed there is usually some single operation which requires a large amount of power for a limited time and it is usually this operation which determines the minimum amount of primary power that must be available. In the corn or cotton belt the operation requiring the maximum power is that of planting or cultivating—in hay or small grain it is harvesting. Such conditions result in what is termed a low-power load factor and a high cost per unit of power utilized. The peak load could frequently be reduced by reducing the acreage of the crop which requires this power, but as a rule the farmer is justified in retaining such a high acreage of the crop in question because of the relatively high net returns which may more than offset the higher cost of power used in this operation.

Other factors which have an important effect on the efficiency of farm power are the diversity of operations and the small power unit commonly employed under the control of one worker.

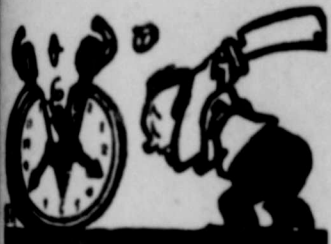

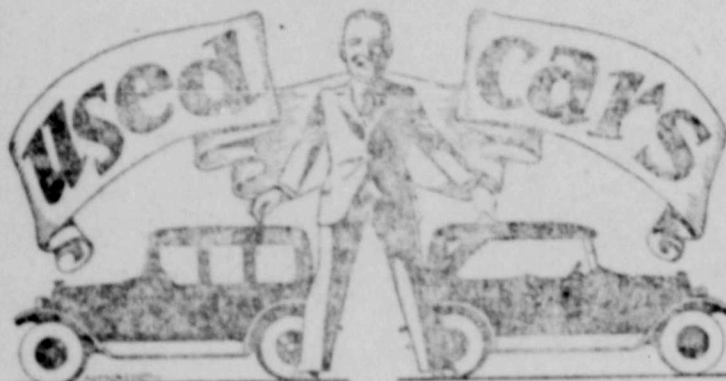

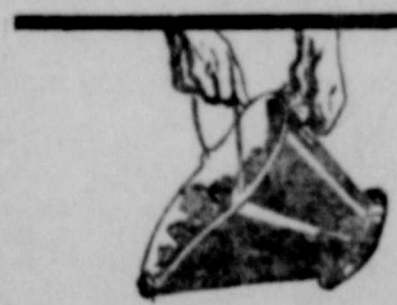
