Great Opportunity For The
Farmers to Hear
The Facts

T. B. Gallagher, general freight and passenger agent of the Santa Fe, under date of March 7, again calls attention of the people of Hereford and vicinity to the "Cow, Sow and Hen" demonstration train operated by the railroad in cooperation with the A. & M. College of Texas, which will reach Hereford at 8:30 a. m. Friday, March 30, and remain here for a little over an hour. It is hoped that hundreds of farmers and their wives will avail themselves of this rare opportunity to examine the exhibits on the train and hear the talks by experts in each line. Mr. Gallagher in his letter to the Chamber of Commerce, says:

"The College has a message for the farmers of your locality, and is sending its leading representatives to deliver it. They are also furnishing three cars of dairy cattle, hogs and poultry for the demonstration and exhibition purposes. The speakers from the Agricultural College will be leaders in their respective departments.

"The train will be on time, and the meeting will be started promptly. A lecture car will also be provided so that there will be no discomfort even in inclement weather.

"A survey of Texas industrial conditions shows that during the depression of the last year or two the milk cow, brood sow, and hen saved many a family from financial disaster, and the speakers who will be in your city at the time indicated will deliver a detailed story about it.

"I am extending you a cordial invitation to attend this demonstration, and solicit your help in making the occasion a success; any assistance you may render us in securing a large attendance from the surrounding country will be very highly appreciated."

JUDGE FORFEITS ABE McNEIL BOND IN CANYON CASE

Judge Henry S. Bishop forfeited the bond of A. A. McNeil in court Monday and ordered the bondsmen to make good the \$2500 bond.

McNeil was found guilty of violating the liquor laws last year and assessed a penalty of one year in the penitentiary. The case was appealed and affirmed. Soon after the case was sent to the higher courts McNeil disappeared but a few weeks later wrote to his bondsmen from Mexico that he did not intend to come back soon.

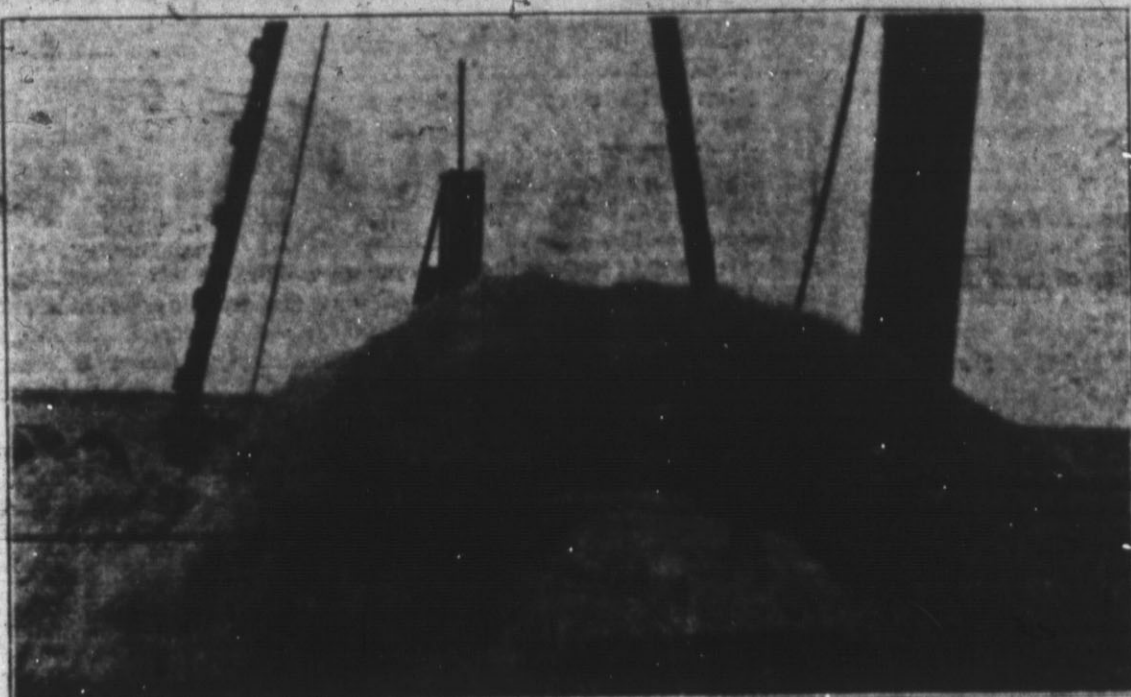
The bondsmen will now have to pay the \$2500 bond.—Randall Co. News.

Parker and Lip- secomb Attended Two Conferences

G. A. F. Parker and Rev. L. N. Lipsecomb of the Methodist church are back home after a very pleasant and profitable trip to Clarendon and Plainview in the interests of the church.

They attended a meeting of the board of trustees of Clarendon College last Wednesday, where they received the annual report of President Geo. S. Slover. This is Dr. Slover's sixteenth year as president of the institution, and his present year's report was the best in the history of the college. Dr. Slover was reelected as president for another term, and the faculty for the ensuing year was also named. S. H. Condon, son-in-law of W. B. Farmer of Hereford, was reelected Dean of the institution. Plans were laid at this meeting for a cooperative boarding house for ministerial students.

The Plainview meeting was in the interest of past due payments on the Centenary fund. Dr. J. E. Crawford of Ft. Worth, Centenary secretary for the central and northwest Texas conferences, delivered an address, reviewing the achievements of the Centenary since 1918, when the campaign was launched. "Marvelous indeed has been the progress at home and abroad and the future holds even more glorious things for the church if every subscriber will redeem his pledge," said the speaker. Rev. Hardy, presiding elder of the Plainview district, and the preachers and laymen present, voiced the opinion that while times are hard and money is scarce the Great Western wing of the church will not fail in this strategic hour.

Gripping Revival at Baptist Church Continues

Evangelist Woodie Smith And Party Continue Steady Gains

Few revival meetings have ever so gripped the community as the one now in progress at the Baptist church. The Woodie Smith Evangelistic Party, consisting of Smith, the preacher, Ogden, the song-leader, and Miss English, the accomplished young lady pianist, are proving themselves great favorites among the young people of Hereford, as well as the church members of mature years.

During the week there have been five services held daily, besides the two adult prayer meetings. One of the great meetings is that of the young people each evening at seven o'clock, led by Mr. Ogden. Great interest in Bible reading has developed, some of the young people reading more than a hundred chapters a day. A great social is to conclude these meetings so devotedly engaged in by these young people. Mr. Ogden is a great leader of young people.

The Junior Meeting each afternoon at four o'clock is a wonderful gathering. About two hundred youngsters attend. All the Evangelistic party attend this service each time. On Wednesday afternoon was held the "Bible Obedience Service." An unusually large attendance was on hand. Mr. Ogden worked a little slight-of-hand performance with the doll, Billie Obedience, to the great delight of all the children. A practical lesson of careful obedience to parents and those in authority was the application. There were many calls for a repetition of this service. Perhaps the request will be granted by Mr. Ogden, as the children have a great "pull" with him.

Evangelist Smith is increasing in popularity every day with his congregations. This, however, is not a result of his preaching soft words about sin, nor of his compromising the gospel call to make it easy. Two of his evening themes this week have been, "A Prayer Meeting in Hell" and "Hell a Place of Literal Fire." He invites the lost to seek their salvation. He declares they may sorrowfully repent of their sins or be forever lost in a terrible hell. Just because he does believe the unconverted are being hopelessly lost, he stresses the inquiry of belief. He declares that it is not considered a great sin by many, but that unbelief is the blackest of all sins in God's sight; and the one sin for which the lost are damned. He bases salvation wholly upon the merits of the shed blood of Jesus Christ, and makes a clear deduction between salvation and church membership and a life of works. The saving grace of God has come upon adults and children as a result of the evangelists' pungent preaching.

One cannot write about Miss English's great work as accompanist on the piano. You just have to see her and hear her "tickle the ivory" to appreciate her work. She is an alto singer of real merit, and a great leader of Juniors. This party would be irreparably hurt in its effectiveness without this little brunette pianist. She's a wonder!

In addition to the congregational singing of many of the old songs and the choruses, the party is bringing some great messages in solo, duet and trio. Their "negro spirituals" supply seems inexhaustible. This is accounted for in the fact that Mr. Smith is a (Continued on Last Page.)

CANYON TO VOTE ON CITY COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

The city council has called an election for April 3 for the purpose of determining whether or not Canyon shall adopt the Commission Form of Government.

At this election the voters will name the three elective officers of a commission form of government, the mayor and two commissioners. Under the law these shall serve for one year only, and after the first year they shall be elected for a term of two years.

A petition was recently circulated and presented to the city council asking for an election upon this proposition. More than one hundred voters signed this petition.

Under the law, the three officers may employ a city manager, or look after the city's affairs themselves and not employ the manager. The manager plan is the most popular in this country.—Randall Co. News.

Masons of Texas Pay Fine Tribute At James' Grave

Rev. J. R. Sharp reached home Thursday night from Dallas and Cleburne, where he attended the funeral services of his father-in-law, William James. Mrs. Sharp and baby remained in Dallas with the family for the time being.

Mr. James, Past Master of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas, was accorded a tremendous tribute by thousands of Masons and other friends. The Ft. Worth Star-Telegram reported the services as follows:

"The funeral of William James, former Fort Worth business man and prominent Masonic official of Texas, who died here Thursday, was held in Cleburne Sunday afternoon and was more largely attended than any burial service in the history of that city, according to reports. The body of Masons who gathered for the funeral is said to have been one of the largest and most distinguished ever assembled for such a rite in Texas.

Rev. C. E. Snowden, Rector of the Episcopal Church of the Incarnate of Dallas, preached the funeral sermon at the Cleburne Episcopal Church. The Grand Commandery, Knights Templar, conducted the pre-burial services. The Grand Lodge of the State conducted the services at the grave. The active pallbearers were Thomas Fletcher, George Montgomery and Simon Alexander of Fort Worth, Judge William Polindexter and W. O. Hopper of Cleburne and Wilbur Keith of Dallas.

Officials from all branches of Masonry in the State were present, and Cleburne was thronged with friends from Fort Worth, Dallas and other Texas cities.

A special interurban car took the body and many floral offerings from Fort Worth to Cleburne at 11:29 a. m. Sunday. Two other cars of Masons and friends from here followed. A special car also was operated from Dallas. Many of the inmates of the Home for Aged Masons at Arlington attended the funeral; the home was founded through the efforts of James, he was secretary and treasurer of it at the time of his death and devoted most of his time to it."

SPRATT WILL TRY LOS ANGELES FOR MARKETING CAPONS

FARMERS ARE HITTING THE BALL DAILY

TOO BUSY TO COME
TO TOWN AFTER
FINE RAIN

THIS FALL WHEAT

Still Lives. Remarkable
Ability to Stand
Drouth

"If you have any business with a farmer these days," said a Hereford merchant Friday, "you will have to go to his farm and follow him as he circles the field."

The farmers are all busy, taking advantage of the recent rain, and oats and rye and spring wheat and barley and a little of everything else is going into the ground in marvellous quantities all over this section. The all-over thing is conspicuous by its presence and a real small grain crop for 1923 look most promising.

A point that is causing universal comment is the fact that the fall wheat is still in our midst—and not dead at all as so many pessimists predicted before the rain. True, not so much of it is coming up nicely, but examination of the fields shows a remarkable spread-out root system, with the roots curled in every direction underground. Another rain on this stuff will actually insure a dandy good fall wheat crop.

The outstanding feature of the Plains country is the ability of grain in the ground to stand apparently unlimited drouth and still come again for a bumper crop. The seed does not rot and the insects do not bother it much. People who come here from other sections are continually amazed at the recuperative powers of wheat planted in the fall and subjected to drouth. Come to the Plains!

Cotton Planting Season Near: How About Your Seed?

The cotton committee of the Chamber of Commerce again asks The Brand to call the attention of the farmers in this community to the fact that the committee has on hand a limited supply of the Acacia cotton seed purchased for the purpose of encouraging cotton raising in this community. The time for planting this seed is rapidly approaching and soon it will be impossible to secure pure seed at anything like the price these seed are being sold at: \$1.25 per bushel.

The seed is handled by Jones & McLean, without cost, and is sold by them for cash. If a farmer is shy the cash the three banks have arranged to discuss the matter of loans with their customers.

VEGA MAN BURN- ED TO DEATH BY GASOLINE FLAMES

Lester V. Campsey, 20, was fatally burned Wednesday evening when a gasoline tank exploded on his farm seven miles southeast of Vega, and died at St. Anthony's Sanitarium in Amarillo at 6 o'clock Thursday evening.

Campsey was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Campsey of Vega. He is survived by his parents, three brothers and four sisters. The Campsey family have lived at Vega for three years, moving to that town from Paducah.

Mr. Campsey and his brother, Oscar, had been plowing on the farm all day Wednesday, and when the day's work was done they went to their gasoline reservoir for a supply of gasoline for their car. The younger boy carried a lighted lantern and when the cap was removed from the reservoir the vapor was ignited and the tank exploded. Campsey was burned about the body, arms and legs, the brother suffered minor burns about the hands and arms.

International Sunday School Lesson

Jesus in Gethsemane—Luke 22

When Jesus had partaken of the Passover feast with his disciples, he took his customary walk to the Mount of Olives to the beautiful garden of Gethsemane. Eleven of his disciples followed him, Judas being absent.

When he was at the place, and knowing the disciples might in severe trial "go back on him", he said, "Pray

that ye enter not into temptation."

He parted from them a little further, knelt, and falling on his face continued long in prayer. As one talks to a human parent, so he talked to God:

"Father if thou be willing, remove this cup from me; nevertheless, not mine but thine be done." Not the cup of the dread of death, was Christ seeking to have withdrawn. Something far deadlier than death, was this cup of suffering in his hour of supreme agony. Divinity suffers not from flesh wounds, but his cup of bitterness is the sin of the world; malice which human hatred devised; all that is detestable in human ingratitude; all that was pestilent in human hypocrisy; to be misunderstood and to know that those for whom he gave his life love, darkness rather than light.

And there appeared an angel unto him from heaven, not to remove this cup but to strengthen him for the struggle to the end. Being in agony for others, he prays more earnestly till bloody sweat rolls from his face. Such a prayer is beyond our comprehension.

When Jesus was thus praying he came over to where the disciples were and found them exhausted with weariness, but asleep, and said, "Why sleep ye? Rise and pray, lest ye enter into temptation."

While he was speaking a detachment of Roman soldiers, Pharisees, scribes, and the Levitical guard of the temple, led by Judas, were approaching. Judas drew near to Jesus and pointed out the Christ by giving him the kiss of treason. With an aching heart, but to lash the hardened conscience of the traitor, Jesus rebukes him, "Judas, betrayest thou the Son of Man with a kiss?"

Then they seized him and brought him to Annas, the high priest's house. From there they took him to Caiaphas and then to the Sanhedrin where the final decree of blasphemy was passed against him.

Peter followed afar off and later in the courtyard thrice denied his Lord. The other apostles fled. Was the suffering on Calvary greater than in Gethsemane? Two of the hardest things to bear in life is lack of understanding, and to have a friend fall in time of need.
