## Liquor Control Board Makes Five Raids In RRC

Fifteen local and state officers made five raids in Red River County Saturday night and Sunday morning on three private residences and two cafe-recreational type establishments, making 15 arrests.

Pleading guilty to possession of beer for sale in a dry area and paying fines of \$203.50 and \$103.50 were Antonia Cortez II of Annona and Travis Mitchell of Detroit.

Inspector David Floyd of Paris with the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission said that the raids were made in the north, east, and west parts of the county, with two in the Bogata area.

Floyd filed complaints against Cortez and Mitchell and the others for consumption of alcoholic beverages during prohibited hours, disorderly conduct and public intoxication. Red River County Chief Deputy Carl Wolfe arrested five Mexican nationals during the raids and they were picked up Tuesday morning by the Border Patrol for deportation.

Officers participating in the raids were Red River County

Deputies, officers with the Parks and Wildlife Commission, the State Liquor Control Board and the Department of Public Safety.

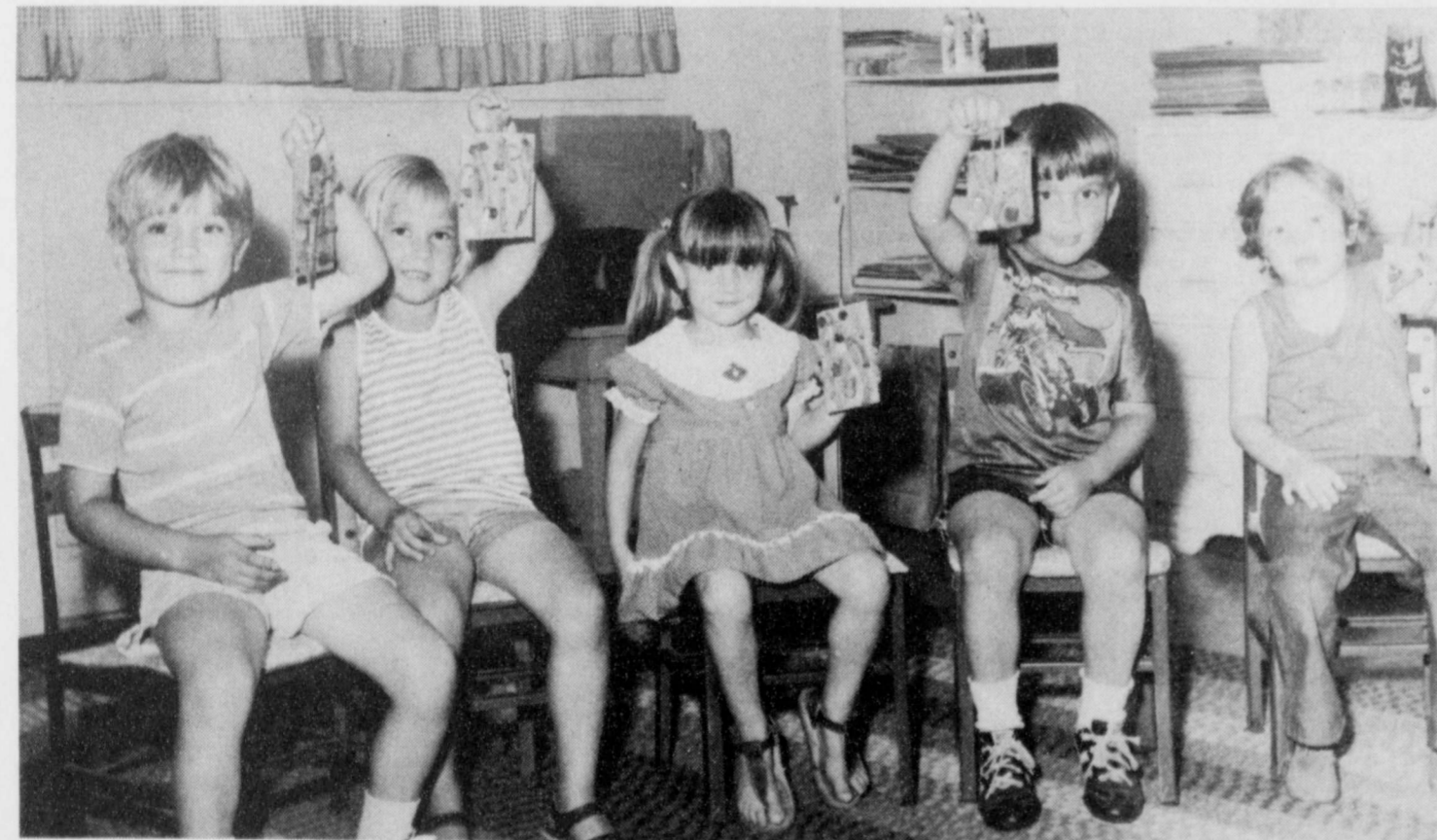

## Employer's Deadline To Report Tax Return Near

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the second quarter of 1978 by Monday, July 31. If the

quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited. Persons who have deposited

the entire quarterly tax liability in a Federal Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until August 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," the Internal Revenue Service said.

Employers should use the preaddressed Forms 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office.

IRS Publication 15, "Circular Employer's Tax Guide," provides more information and is available free from local IRS offices.

## SBA Opens Drought Loan Offices

Although nearly 2,400 Texas farmers have either interviewed or filed drought loan applications totaling approximately \$28 million, SBA Regional Director, Alicia Chacon, announced the opening of six more offices to serve those Texas farmers who have not yet applied.

For farmers who suffered drought damage and resultant financial hardship, the filing deadline is October 11, 1978, which is unchanged from the original date established when the disaster was declared. "Before the deadline occurs we expect considerably more applications to be filed and are therefore moving some of the existing offices and opening new locations as well in an effort to be as accessible as we can to the 220 counties that are eligible for drought disaster loans," said Chacon. The disaster offices will be located in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Harlingen, Lubbock, Temple, Laredo, Amarillo, Pecos, Marshall, and Abilene. The Laredo, Pecos, and Abilene offices will not be open until July 5. Each office will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily, Monday through Friday. SBA Disaster Office Managers are recommending that the farmers come in

person to pick up an application and then return it in person. This assures that the application is complete, which in turn expedites processing of the loan.

The following information should be submitted with applications for drought loan assistance.

(1) A copy of the legal description of land, i.e., deed, mortgage, real estate contract, etc.

(2) Copies of tax records. The applicant should keep the originals as file copies.

(3) A copy of the latest ASCS Notice for allotments and yields.

(4) If claiming a loss on pasture, indicate type of pasture and the number of months of normal grazing and pasture produced.

(5) If land is rented crop share, indicate percentage division and list only your share among the share of the acres.

The Physical Disaster Loan Program for farmers will include unrecovered production costs on 1977 crops at three percent for the first \$250,000 and 6 1/2 percent thereafter. Lamar, Titus, Franklin, Red River, Delta, and Hopkins counties are included for eligibility in the drought program.

## Ambulance Membership Total Nears 1,700

The subscription drive for Loyd Ambulance Service was approaching 1,700 members at mid-week, according to Mrs. Elvin Loyd, co-owner-operator of the private plan.

The goal for the drive is 2,500 minimum subscriptions and August 1 has been set as the final cut-off date for signing up. Those wishing to become members may do so only at the time of the annual subscription drive each year.

Duane Benson, co-chairman of the Committee appointed by Clarksville Mayor John Morris which has strongly recommended the Loyd Service, says the time is growing very short

for those to subscribe who may wish to do so.

"It looks now as though the present Red River County ambulance service will end on July 15," Benson said, "and we are hopeful that the Loyds will establish some sort of interim service by then if at all possible. Those not members at that time will be required to make payment upon service."

Under the Loyd plan, a rather standard one among subscription services, members pay an annual fee, \$25 per family and \$15 per individual, for medically-required ambulance service for an unlimited number of miles within a 50 miles radius.

Non-members will be charged \$50 per call and \$1 per mile from the point of pickup, with assurance of payment before the service is rendered. The only exception will be a valid emergency call, and non-subscribers will even then be billed at the regular rate.

These applications may be completed and mailed with the fee to Loyd Ambulance Service, P.O. Box 1264, Clarksville. A spokesman said applications are available in Bogata at the Funeral Home and several businesses; in Annona at the Annona Screen Door and Rogers Grocery, as well as Brem's Used Cars and other locations; in Avery at Med-

ford's and other businesses; and in Detroit at stores and the City Hall.

The present plan under which the present Red River County Ambulance Service is now operating, expired on June 30, but a tentative program has been reached, officials believe, to carry it on until July 15. Following the County release of the service in May, the City of Clarksville agreed to assume the operational expense for the month of June only.

However, several City and County officials have now informally agreed to divide the July 1-15 expenses, with the City paying salaries and the County meeting other expenses.

The plan is now entirely unofficial but County Judge Fred Fisher and a City official both said there is a good chance that such a plan will be ratified by both the Commissioners Court and the City Council at their meetings scheduled for July 11.

### Roadside Advertising Signs Cost Owners

An illegal roadside advertising sign has cost its owner a \$1,000 fine and drawn court orders to get the sign down by August 1.

The penalty in the Smith County case is the stiffest since the Texas Highway Beautification Act went into effect in June 1972. Other cases have been prosecuted but fines have been on the lower side of the \$25 to \$200 range of possible fines.

The beautification act prohibits outdoor advertising signs altogether along state-maintained roadways in some areas. In any event, no such signs may be erected unless the owner has a license and, also, a permit authorizing each sign. To get a license the sign owner files an application and bond form and \$25 fee with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation right of way division in Austin. A \$2,500 bond is required in each county to a maximum of \$10,000 for the entire state. After receiving the license, the owner must get a permit for each sign from the department district office where the sign is to be erected.

In the Smith County case, the owner did not have a license nor did the sign have a permit. Neither would have done the owner any good, however, since the sign was in an area where

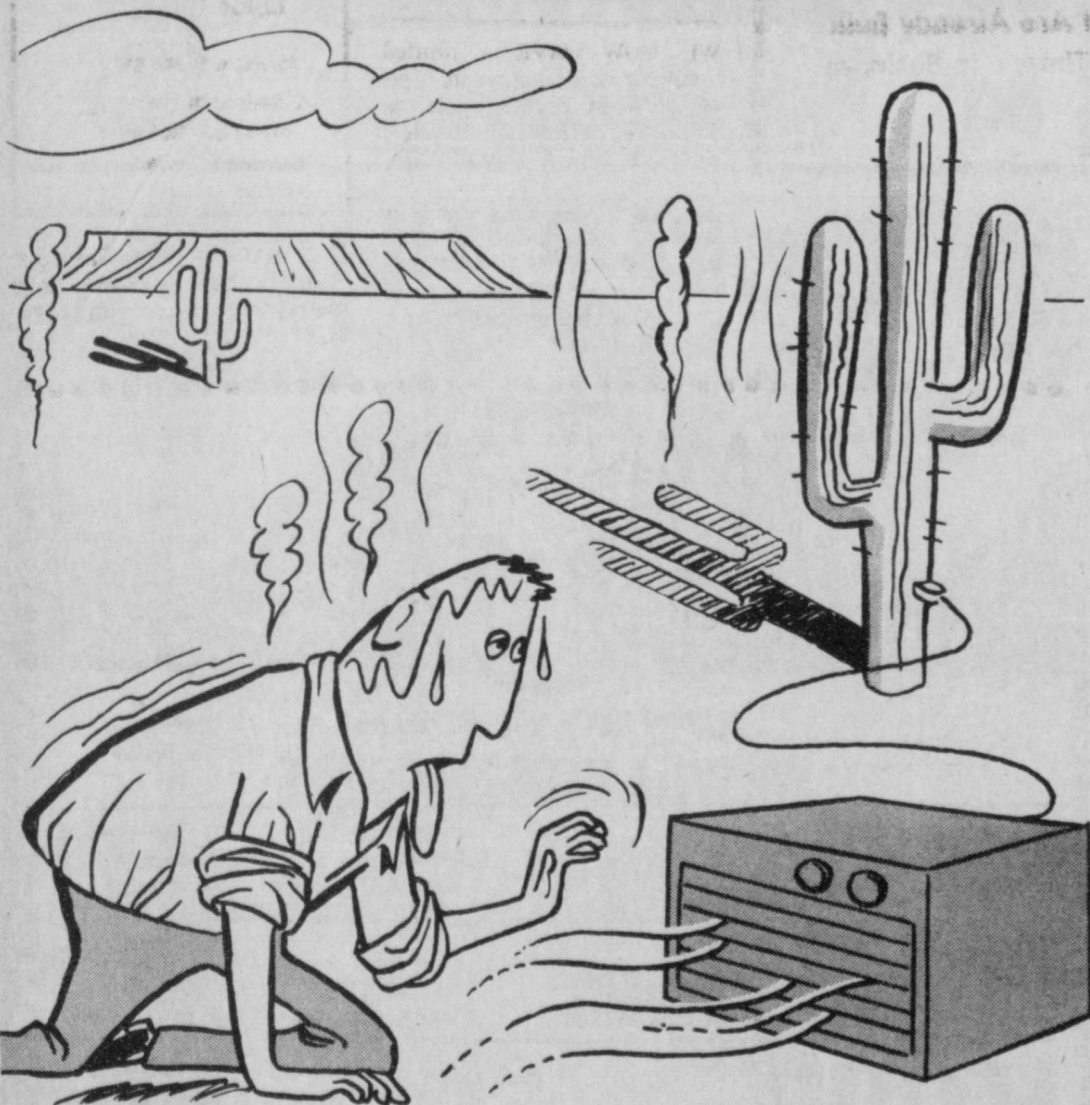

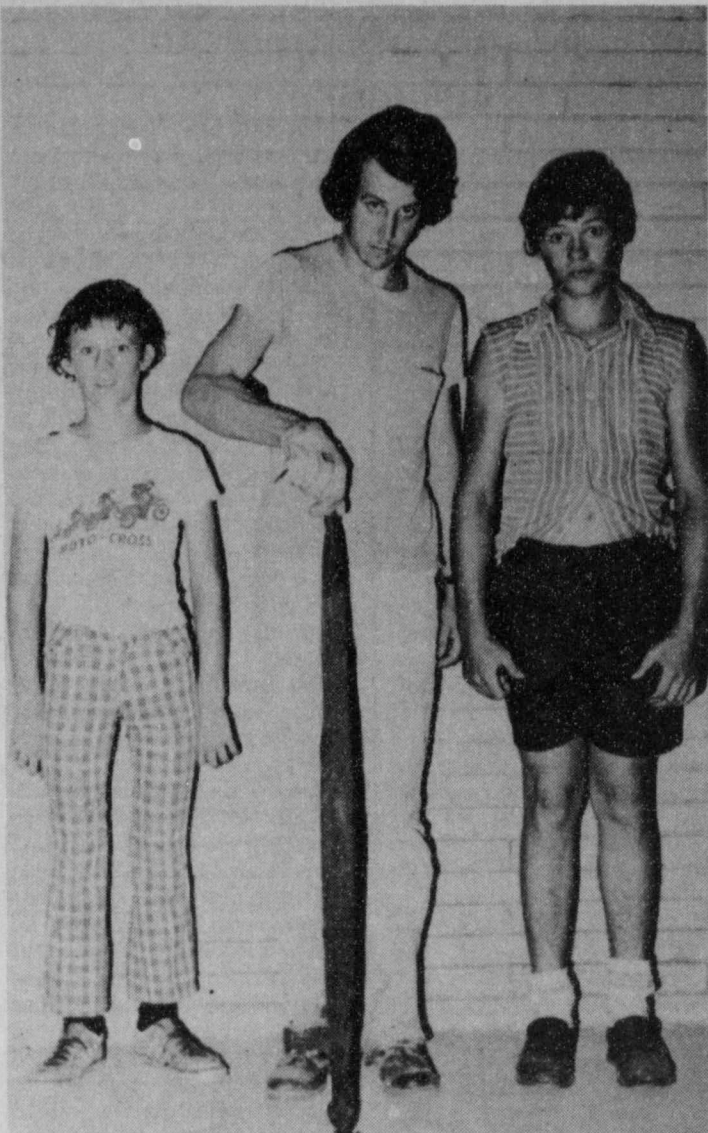
