LIGON NOW BEING MOVED TO LEHMAN ON NEW S. F. LINE

Ligon, in Cochran, once proud contender for county seat honors, is this week being bodily moved to the new town of Lehman to be built on the Doud extension of the Santa Fe railroad, to be run through Hockley and Cochran counties.

At this point, which is located about 2 1/2 miles south of Ligon, lots are now being rapidly sold, and a new town is destined to spring up there within the next thirty days. Already the telephone line from Littlefield has been built in, a garage and filling station is this week being erected. It is reported that the Whaley Lumber Co., have made arrangements to put in a lumber yard there immediately. GETS FREE ADVERTISING

30,000 People Daily in Dallas See Littlefield Invitation.

Through arrangements made by W. H. Badger, of the Yellow House Land Co., and Max L. McClure, of the Lee Theatre, with the United Projection Clock Co., of Chicago, Littlefield is to enjoy the benefits of a six weeks publicity campaign in Dallas.

On top of one of the tallest Dallas buildings, where 30,000 people pass daily, this company has installed a 16 foot clock, carrying around its face 12 different advertisements. On account of one of the spaces being vacant for the coming six months, Littlefield will have the privilege of extending her invitation to the Dallas public during that time. The advertisement reads: "Come to Littlefield, the fastest growing city on the South Plains; We welcome you!"

Mr. McClure has also made arrangements with this company to install one of the same type clocks, of smaller size in the Lee Theatre.

TEXAS UTILITIES CO. ORDER A BIG ENGINE FOR LINES

The Texas Utilities Co., of Lubbock have ordered a 1,200 horsepower engine and generator to be added to their Lubbock equipment, and it is expected to arrive sometime during this month.

This engine and generator is said to be the largest of its kind in this part of Texas, and is being shipped knocked down in several freight cars. When erected it will be 42 feet long, 16 feet wide and 22 feet high.

This new outfit will be used to generate electricity for the high line now in construction between Lubbock and Clovis, and passing through Shallowater, Littlefield, Amherst, Sudan and Muleshoe.

LAST OF THE Y. H. RANCH TAKEN OVER BY LAND COMPANY

This week the last roundup of cattle on the Yellow House ranch is being held, 3,500 head of these cattle being turned over to Jot Smith, to be shipped to Kansas pastures, and several hundred more going to the brother of J. P. White, and to be shipped to New Mexico.

M. H. Reed, of the Yellow House Land Co., arrived here Wednesday from Austin, and in company with his co-partners received 32,000 acres of land, the last of the Yellow House ranch to be thrown on the market.

Thus the cowboy is giving way to the farmer, and the wild cattle of the range are being supplanted by the milk cows of the pasture. This body of land received by the Company this week contains about 400 choice farms that will at once be put on the market for the home-hungry people who continue coming this way.

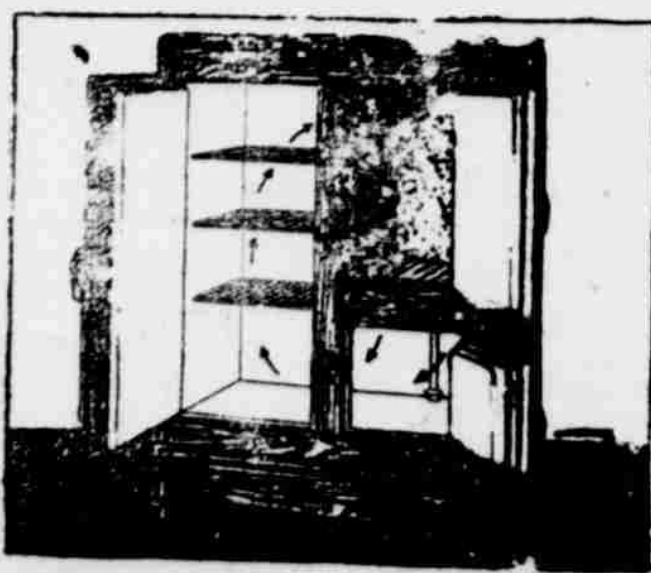

PLANT MAIZE AND KAFFIR

"There never was a better time for the farmers of the South Plains to raise lots of maize and kaffir corn," declare P. W. Walker. The heavy frozes experienced this winter through the oat belt of Texas killed most of the oats. Dry weather has prevented the planting of very much corn. The corn belt of the North has had trouble in getting a supply of seed corn, due to the early frozes last fall.

"The East Texas farmer has become accustomed to making his crops with red maize. He can not raise his own feed on high price land. The California chicken farmer can not get along without red maize. This is proven by the usual advances in red maize the latter days of December and early part of January, as at this time the California buyers are busy buying red maize for their spring requirement.

"Forty-two per cent of the present crops of Sudan and 60 per cent of the cane seed are still in the hands of the first buyers, which would make it unwise to plant very much of these. Farmers of this section will be wise who plant plenty of maize and kaffir with their cotton crops.

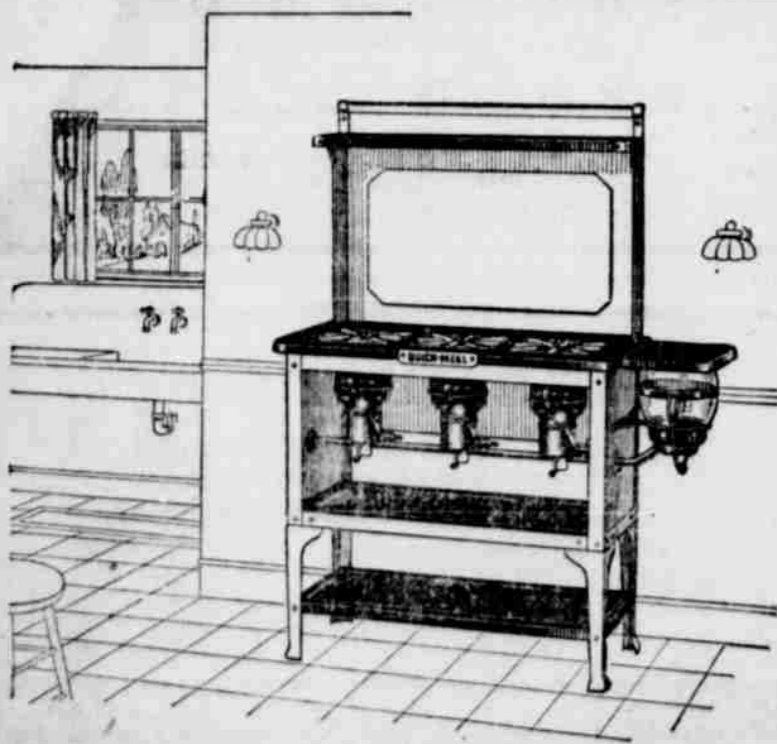

To the Resident Property Taxpaying voters of Littlefield Independent School District:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 2nd day of May, 1925, within said district, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Board of Trustees on the 30th day of March, 1925, within said district, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Board of Trustees on the 30th day of March, 1925, which is as follows:

On this the 30th day of March, 1925, the Board of Trustees of Littlefield Independent School District convened in special session with the following members present: Arthur P. Duggan, President; W. G. Street, W. O. Gray, F. A. Butler, C. W. Towes, Pat H. Boone and G. A. Stagers and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

There came on to be considered the petition of H. C. Arnold and twenty-six other persons asking that an election be ordered upon the question of (levying and collecting a tax for the maintenance of the public free schools in Littlefield Independent School District, and also upon the question of issuing bonds of said school district for the purpose of building and equipping school building making necessary repairs to present building in said school district; and

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that said petition is signed by at least twenty property tax-paying voters of said school district, and is otherwise in conformity with law, the Board is of the opinion that said petition should be granted, and said election as prayed for should be ordered:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF LITTLEFIELD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

That an election be held in said Littlefield Independent School District on the 2nd day of May, 1925, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, at which election in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said school district for their action thereupon:

Proposition No. 1

Shall the Board of Trustees of Littlefield Independent School District have the power to levy and collect annually a tax upon all taxable property in said school district for the maintenance of public free schools therein of and at the rate of not exceeding \$1.00 on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property in said school district until the same shall be discontinued as provided by law.

Proposition No. 2

Shall the Board of Trustees of Littlefield Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of said school to the amount of one hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars to become due and payable serially from one to forty years from date, and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of building and equipping new building and making necessary repairs to old building in said school district, and there shall be annually levied and collected on all taxable property in said school district for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due: (provided, that the maintenance tax and the bond tax together shall never exceed for any one year, one dollar (\$1.00) on the \$100.00 valuation of said property.) The said election shall be held in basement of Presbyterian church in said Littlefield Independent School District, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election: J. T. Elms, Presiding Judge, Silas Dixon, Judge, Arthur Mueller and O. V. Mayben, Clerks.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR MAINTENANCE TAX."
"AGAINST MAINTENANCE TAX."
"FOR ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

(As to each of the foregoing propositions) each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus

leaving the other as indication his vote (on the two propositions respectively.)

None but resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said Littlefield Independent School District shall be allowed to vote at said election.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue a notice of said election stating in substance the contents of this election order and the time and place of said election, and said Secretary shall post a copy of such notice at three different places within the boundaries of said Littlefield Independent School District which posting shall be done not less than three weeks prior to the date fixed for said election. And said Secretary shall cause a copy of said notice to be published once each week for three weeks prior to the date fixed for said election in a newspaper of general circulation which has been continuously and regularly published for a period of not less than one year in Lamb County, Texas, and in said School District.

Immediately after said election has been held the Officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Board of Trustees of said school district, and return the ballot box to the Secretary of said Board for safekeeping.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the General Election laws of this State, except as modified by Chapter 24, of the General Laws passed by the Thirty-seven Legislature at its regular session, 1921, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

**RULES GOVERNING VOTING
AT 7th ANNUAL CONVENTION**

By C. C. Watah, Pres. W. T. C. of C.
The following rules will apply for voting at the Mineral Wells Convention, to-wit:

1. Each town affiliated with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and in good standing on January 1st, 1924, shall be permitted to cast the

total vote of said town as the same appears of record on books of the organization as of May 1, 1923. Such vote shall be one vote for each paid membership in the organization. If a town has 40 paid memberships it shall have a vote of 40, etc.

2. The vote of each town shall be cast by a representative of that town who shall be selected by a caucus of the representatives of the town provided that the vote of no town shall be cast unless that town shall have at least one representative, a citizen of said town, who shall be present and on the floor to cast the vote of the said town.

3. A town may split its vote any way it may decide. For instance a town having 40 votes may if it desires cast 10 votes each for Amarillo, Sweetwater and San Antonio. Or in any location for offering or motion, it may cast a split vote.

4. There shall be no proxy voting of any kind.

5. A majority vote is a necessity for a decision, but on ordinary matters voting shall be viva voce, with the right to a roll call vote.

6. In the voting for the next convention city, a blackboard shall be erected on the platform and as each town votes the same shall be chalked up as voted.

7. In case of any contest the official records of the organization shall be binding.
