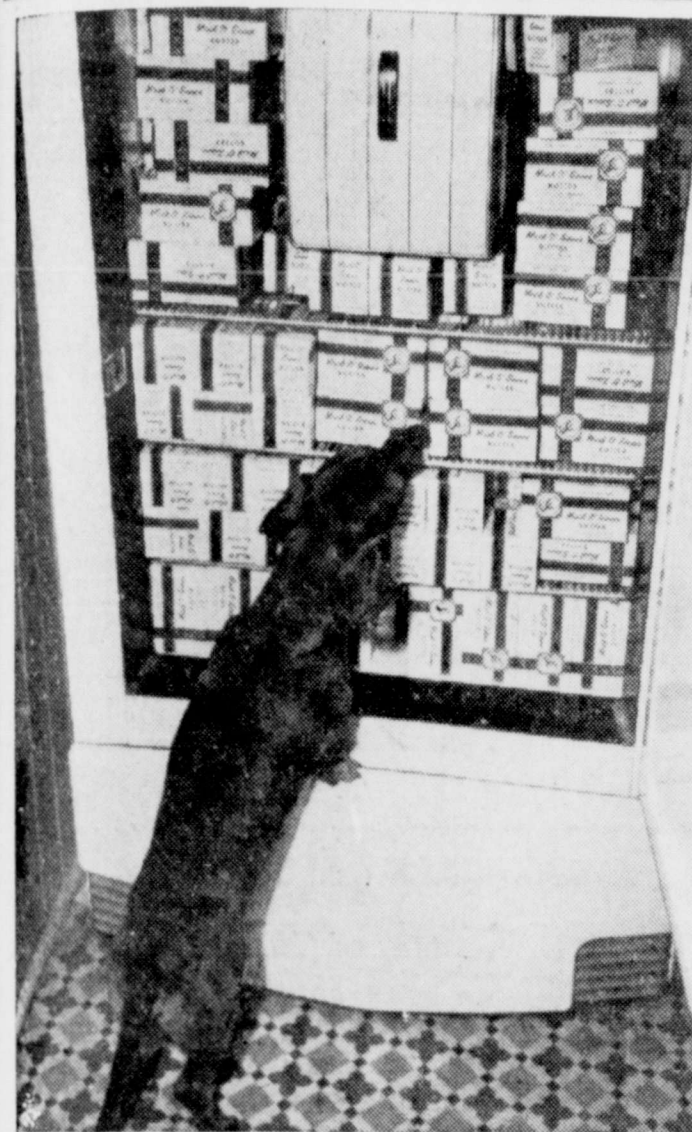

Lone Star Begins City Water Equipment Being Made To Carthage Field Ready for Spring

The Lone Star Gas company has begun construction of 79-mile pipe line that will tie the gas field near Carthage in Panola county into the company's 5,000-mile network of transmission mains, according to Elmer F. Schmidt, Lone Star vice-president in charge of the transmission division.

The new 14-inch line, extending due west from Carthage and joining the company's present pipe line network at Opelika in Henderson county, will secure additional gas reserves for the company and strengthen the local gas supply and that of nearly 300 other towns and cities served by Lone Star.

The line will carry a maximum pressure of 1,200 pounds. It will extend through Panola, Rusk, Smith and Henderson counties, south Brownsboro and run south of Tyler and north of Overton and Henderson.

Practically all the pipe necessary for the project has been received and two construction crews have started work on the 79-mile line, one at Carthage and the other at Opelika. Motorized saws were used to clear the right-of-way of trees so the pipe line construction men could start work. Aptly named "tree fellers," the saws are equipped with rubber-tired wheels to permit them to move under their own power at a speed approximately the walking distance of men operating them. Small trees can be cut in several seconds and those of "bushy" size are felled as easily as a mower cutting weeds.

J. J. Collins, city water commissioner, announces the appointment of Luke Baker as water superintendent.

Mr. Baker has been engaged in this type of work for 17 years and his training and experience in maintenance and operation qualified him to be licensed by the state board of health as a Grade B operator. To receive a license from the state board, says Hal Lavery, city secretary, one must have had several years' training and a certain knowledge of water analysis, methods of treating to produce a pure, potable water. Incidentally, Grade A is the highest type license issued.

The Cisco water department is now readying its equipment for the heavy consumption of spring and summer months. Leaks are being located and repaired, lines are being checked for pressure and, as fast as possible, meters are being removed for cleaning, calibration checked for metering accuracy, so every water consumer's meter will register the water he uses.

Some materials used extensively by the water department that were on the critical list during the war, are gradually being made available and as deliveries of these items increase, other contemplated improvements will be started and announced to the public, the secretary said.

Mrs. Ransom Mosley, 80, a resident of Cisco for more than 10 years, died Friday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arthur Freeman, in McCamey. Deceased had been making her home there for the past year.

She was born at Sodom, Fla., March 1, 1866, and with her husband came to Cisco from Madison county in 1906.

Funeral services will be held at East Cisco Baptist church at 2:30 this afternoon, the officiating ministers being Rev. Evan Holmes and Rev. Fronie Blackwell. Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery beside her husband, who died in October, 1920. Mrs. Mosley's grandsons will serve as pallbearers and Thomas funeral home will be in charge of the body.

Mrs. McKinney, 88 Laid to Rest in Oakwood Saturday

Mrs. George D. McKinney, 88, died at 2:30 a. m., Saturday at her home eight miles southeast of Cisco. She had been seriously ill only a few days.

Mrs. McKinney was a native of Georgia and came to Eastland county with her husband in December, 1900. He died in 1920 and is buried in Oakwood cemetery. She had been a member of the Methodist church since the age of 13 years.

The funeral was held at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the late home, conducted by Rev. Allen A. Peacock, Cisco First Methodist church pastor. Burial was in Oakwood cemetery here beside the husband with Thomas funeral home in charge.

Lee & Moore Will Open Drug Store at 500 D Avenue

Dudley Lee and Joe Lea Moore, recently discharged after serving in the United States navy for more than three years, have leased the building at 500 D avenue and will open an up-to-date drug store and pharmacy about the middle of April, or as soon as the building has been worked over and thoroughly modernized. Several thousand dollars will be expended in the work, which is already under way.

New fixtures of the latest type will be installed and the stock of drugs and drug accessories will be new and complete, Mr. Lee stated Saturday.

Mr. Moore, a registered pharmacist, will be in charge of that department. While in the navy he served as chief pharmacist mate on the USS Lake.

Both young men were born and reared in Cisco, have many friends and are competent business men. Lee is a son of Dr. and Mrs. W. P. Lee and Moore is the son of Mrs. W. W. Moore.

Head of Telephone Union Willing to Talk with Comp'ny

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 23. — America's telephone workers today settled down to await March 7, or government intervention, in their scheduled nation-wide work stoppage.

Admittant in their strike intentions, but with gates left ajar for federal authorities to step in, heads of most of 50 member unions of the National Federation of Telephone Workers (Ind.) today were enroute home. The executive committee of the group had further conferences ahead in connection with the proposed walkout of 260,000 communications workers.

NFTW Chief Joseph A. Beirne reiterated that the federation was willing to resume negotiations with any management representative who requested that discussions be re-opened.

Beirne was to meet Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach in Washington next week. And there was hint of a strong possibility that mediation machinery might be set up in time to halt the walkout.

Cocky CIO Finds General Motors a Hard Nut to Crack

DETROIT, Feb. 23. (AP)—The high command of the CIO United Auto Workers reported today that it was getting nowhere in negotiations to settle the 95-day-old General Motors strike and accused the company of stalling.

The chain of daily conferences between the company and union was snapped at 9 o'clock after a two-hour morning session, which James F. Dewey, federal mediator, said made no progress toward breaking the deadlock.

Dewey set the next meeting for 10 a. m. Monday and left for his home in Chester, Pa., to spend the weekend with his family.

At Washington, the labor department said it was satisfied with Dewey's handling of the case and that negotiations would not be asked now to transfer their conferences to the capital.

Navy Is Confident That the Merger Has Been Whipped

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. — The navy is increasingly confident it has whipped the proposed army-navy merger, which has never been popular with the public. Officers who were singing blues a month ago are now all smiles. They figure public has lost interest; congress is loath to reopen issue; Truman has spoken his piece and won't have anything more to say. Indications are navy is right. House committee on expenditures in executive departments, where hearings have been held, has the bill pigeonholed. Committee attaches say it isn't scheduled to be brought out "in the foreseeable future."

Significant advance indications of this year's United Mine Workers demands, threatening bituminous coal strike after April 1, came from convention of District 5 in Pittsburgh. This is one of the largest miner districts and its heads were elected with John L. Lewis support. District's resolved in favor of same pay for 35-hour week as miners now get for 48 hours; more vacation pay; 10 cents per ton "royalty" on coal production to go into a welfare fund. Also Lewis himself has indicated he may renew effort to force inclusion in his union, or a subsidiary, of mine foremen and other supervisory employees. This issue caused two weeks' strike last fall but was deferred till a more propitious period — which apparently meant a hook-up with wage demands in which the rank and file is more interested. Operators are determined on foreman question; might be more unyielding than on wages, which could be passed on to consumer if government approves.

Only 11 of 32 Detroit Dairies Are Now Functioning

DETROIT, Feb. 23. — The customary milk bottle was missing from the doorsteps of 750,000 Detroiters again today as a dairy workers' strike entered its fourth day.

Only 11 of the city's 32 dairies were operating — providing less than one-third of its usual daily consumption of 1,000,000 quarts of milk — and for thousands of residents it was a case of trekking to the nearest "emergency milk depot" set up to allocate two quarts to each family.

City health officials in a special plea urged residents "if you don't have children and don't really need milk, don't buy any."

Champ War Wail Red Army Ordered Reached Texas and to Increase Its New Mom Saturd'y Military Might

DALLAS, Feb. 23. (AP)—Little Johnny Camera, looking more like a just-found lost puppy than the champion wail of World War II, reached at long last today the wondrous end of his trans-Atlantic trail of devotion.

With the sort of a whimper and grin a lost dog gives when he sees his master, 12-year-old Johnny climbed down from an American airlines flagship at Dallas airport late today — straight into the arms of his new "Mom," 52-year-old Mrs. A. D. Thompson of Waxahachie.

Johnny's face wore the grin the German's didn't wipe out when their bullets killed all of his family in Italy. It was the grin that won for Johnny the tough hearts of all the fighting men of the 36th Texas division.

Johnny had to sneak aboard an army transport in Italy, and battle it out with U. S. immigration authorities, congress and airline priorities to get here, but he made it today.

BOX SUPPER TUESDAY.

A special song, "Ten Pretty Girls," will be sung by ten pretty girls. The event will be sponsored by young women of the Homemaking club.

MOSCOW, Feb. 23. — Generalissimo Stalin and Marshal Zhukov told the Red Army on its 28th birthday Saturday that it must not rest on its laurels, but must strengthen its military might.

Stalin, in an order of the day, said that the army should "guard the peaceful creative labor of the Soviet people . . . and make the boundaries of our country unattainable for enemies."

The army newspaper Red Star devoted two-thirds of a page to an article by Zhukov in which he said Red Army "experience is so rich and diverse that for years it will have an enormous effect on the development of contemporary military science."

Guns in the capitals of the Soviet's 16 republics fired 20 volleys Saturday at Stalin's order, in honor of the army.

PROPERTY LAW RULING.

DALLAS, Feb. 23. — Fifth Court of Civil Appeals has ruled that insurance policies of the late Dr. Abell D. Hardin composed a part of the community property estate until the death of his wife, Mrs. Pearl White Hardin, and that half the cashable value to that time belonged to her heir, Associate Justice Ben F. Looney, who wrote the opinion, said it was the first time that this particular phase of the Texas community property law had been ruled upon. The court reversed and rendered the judgment of Judge William M. Cramer in the 101st district court. Two \$5,000 insurance policies were involved in the suit.

THE NEW BIBLE.

Aside from religious considerations, which are not side issues for the scholars concerned, the 16-year-long revision of the New Testament, just completed, emphasizes the continuing vitality of that book. The 40 Protestant denominations of the International Council of Religious Education authorized the study. The council's secretary is Yale Divinity School's Luther A. Weigle.

The current revision of the familiar King James version is the first since 1881. Since then a new grammar of Biblical Greek has been evolved as a result of the discovery in Egypt of Papyrus fragments that made new interpretations seem imperative. The new book is just out. Another committee is at work on the Old Testament, its results to be given out some time later. There is a good

deal in those wordy books that will bear elimination.

The modern New Testament may annoy many readers used to the former one. But perhaps they will be willing to accept a few changes in their favorite passages if the revisions more nearly bring out original meanings. Ecclesiastical experts are attempting to give the world bibles as modern as this atomic age, while losing none of their ancient beauty or inspiration.

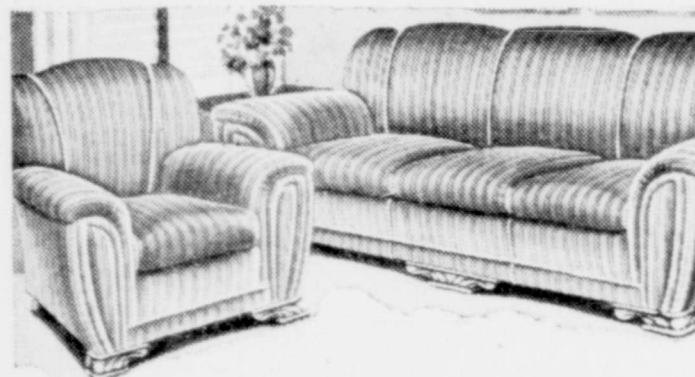

"Without faith it is impossible to please Him..." (Heb. 11:6). "Except ye believe that I am He, ye shall die in your sins" (John 8:24). These scriptures show the necessity of faith in Christ in order that one might be saved. Then since faith is essential, how may man obtain faith?

Many answer that faith comes by prayer, and teach the sinner to pray for "saving" faith. This is NOT true. In Jas. 1:6 we learn that one of the conditions of acceptable prayer is that one ask IN FAITH. Then before prayer is acceptable one must ALREADY HAVE FAITH! If he did not have faith, he could not ask in faith. And if he did not ask in faith he need not think he will receive. Since faith does NOT come by prayer, how does it come?

Rom. 10:17 says, "SO THEN FAITH COMETH BY HEARING..." In Acts 14:1 we learn that Paul and Barnabas, "SO SPAKE that a great multitude both of the Jews and also of the Greeks, BELIEVED." Peter once said, "... God made choice among us, that the Gentiles by my mouth, should HEAR the word of the Gospel, and BELIEVE." (Acts 15:7). Paul preached to the Corinthians and "... many of the Corinthians, HEARING BELIEVED and were baptized" (Acts 18:8).

Read Acts of the Apostles and you shall see that in every case of conversion on Divine record, the people believed AFTER, and as a RESULT or HEARING the word of God.
