State Rests In McKee Murder Trial At Lamesa Gang Warfare Claims Racketeer King

Lieutenant Of Capone's Clan Is Found Dead

Lorenzo Juliano, Known As Boss Of Liquor Syndicate And Bomber, Is Beaten To Death By Rival Gangsters

Auto Is Wrecked

Grim Signal Of Gangster Is Given That Cook County's Fight Against Crime Not Ended; Is 40th Victim

CHICAGO, June 20. — Another king of racketeers fell today, the grim signal of the gangster that the banding of Cook county's forces against crime had not ended his bloody war for the profits of liquor and vice.

On the ledger of gang war casualties for 1930, was written another name, number 40 for the year—Lorenzo Juliano, boss of a big alcohol syndicate, bomber, reputed lieutenant of the Capone clan and suspect in more than one murder. He was found dead in a wrecked automobile.

Questioned in Bombing
Three years ago the Italian was questioned about the bombing of the homes of Senator Charles S. Deneen and Judge John A. Swanson, then a candidate for state's attorney. Dynamite was found in his home.

He was indicted by federal grand jury at Joliet, Ill., on a charge of transporting liquor between that city and the distilleries of the suburbs fringing Chicago on the south and he was the reputed concessionaire of a slot machine syndicate.

First reports said the Italian had been slain by machine gun fire, but after examination of the body Coroner Herman N. Burdese said the victim had been beaten to death.

While the war among the underworld enemies was being renewed, it was the first killing in the "racket" since the assassination of "Jake" Zerkow.

Small Flays Love, Mayfield And Mrs. Ferguson

CORPUS, June 20. (P) — State Senator Gust C. Small of Wellington, Tex., seeking the democratic nomination for governor, spoke here tonight in the interest of his candidacy. He was introduced by Wayne R. Howell, city attorney of Corpus.

Senator Small asserted that if either Senator Thomas B. Love, Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson or Earl B. Mayfield were nominated by the democratic party, "Texas will go republican in 1932."

MUSKOGEE, Okla., June 20. (P) — Braving flames caused by a burning 20,000,000 foot gas well, half a mile north of Muskogee, Mrs. Elizabeth Mills, owner of the well, tonight carried to safety Betty Ann Davidson, who was playing near by when the fire broke out.

The child's mother, Mrs. Jack Davidson, seized the little girl and started running when the flame shot upward, but stumbled and the child fell from her arms. Mrs. Mills then rushed in and carried the girl to safety.

Mrs. Mills, the major owner in the well, is the only woman oil operator in this part of the state.

Love To Speak Here Today On His Candidacy

State Senator Will Carry His Campaign For Governor To Lubbock Voters In Speaking On Courthouse Square

Senator Thomas B. Love, of Dallas, is expected to arrive in Lubbock today shortly after noon for a scheduled speaking at 3:30 o'clock in the interest of his candidacy for governor, according to announcement last night by John L. Radcliff, president of the local "Tom Love For Governor Club."

A platform is to be erected on the southeast side of the public square where Senator Love will speak.

On State Tour
The candidate opened his campaign for governor last Saturday night at Austin. He spoke Thursday afternoon at Decatur and that night at Wichita Falls.

During his West Texas tour the Senator will discuss the "attempt to disfranchise Texas democrats who refused to vote for Al Smith in the presidential race" and the \$20,000 which he says John J. Raskob sent to Texas in 1928 to be used in Smith's campaign.

He spoke last night at Amarillo and is scheduled to speak this morning at 11 o'clock in Plainview. Monday he will speak at El Paso, Tuesday at Pecos, Wednesday at San Angelo and Thursday at Abilene.

Warn Candidates On Assessments

Candidates for offices in the coming primary elections must have their assessments paid by midnight Monday or their names will be omitted from the ballot, according to announcement Friday by J. K. Wester, chairman of the Lubbock County Democratic Executive committee.

The ballot will go to the printer on Tuesday morning and at that time will be complete regardless of whether all names who were certified have paid the assessments or not.

Mr. Wester stated yesterday that several of the candidates have not paid the certified amount and asked that each of them be urged to do so at once.

C. O. Moser, Vice-President Of American Cotton Cooperative Association Speaks At Two Meetings Friday

Guarantees Signed
Two Hundred And Fifty Business Men And Farmers At Mass Meeting; Delegations Come From Other Counties

LITTLEFIELD, June 20. — A branch office of the Tex. Cotton Cooperative Association was virtually assured Littlefield today, following two meetings at which C. O. Moser, of Dallas, vice-president and secretary of the American Cotton Cooperative Association, spoke to gatherings of business men and farmers of Lamb county.

As explained in his speeches, Mr. Moser stated that a branch would be located at Littlefield if sufficient interest to insure successful operation as well as the delivery of 18,000 bales of cotton a year were evident.

Business Firms Close
There were 80 business men present at a conference with Mr. Moser this morning, and more than 250 farmers and business men present at a mass meeting this afternoon.

Both sessions were held at the Palace theater. Local business houses closed their doors between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon for the mass meeting.

In addition to Lamb county folks, delegations were here from Crosby, Hockley, Hale and Terry counties. The Hockley county delegation numbered more than 20, headed by W. B. Cope, and included that a branch office be located at Leveland. They urged Moser's attendance at a meeting there soon, which

Extension Of Highway Seen

Major Traffic Artery From Seymour To Lubbock Would Add Important Outlet For City, J. H. Hankins Says

The extension of Highway 24 from Seymour to Lubbock would provide a means of providing a major artery of traffic to the expanding outlets of the South Plains capital, according to opinion expressed yesterday by J. H. Hankins, chairman of the highway committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Hankins yesterday expressed gratification over the proposed extension in view of Port Worth and Dallas traffic. The local chamber of commerce has been aiding Port Worth agencies for the last two years in securing designation of the road southeast to Beaumont and also has been cooperating in the western extension.

"Highway 24 will bring heavy traffic into this city from Wichita Falls, as well as Port Worth and Dallas," said Mr. Hankins. "This highway would connect with the Carlsbad-Cavern route at Dickens."

Announcement was received from Port Worth yesterday that agencies and individuals of that city were uniting in support of the movement to extend the road and which will eventually hookup with the new Jackboro highway out of Port Worth and provide the state's only arterial road from the southeast, at Beaumont, to the north-west at Lubbock.

TO STUDY DRAFTING

Approval Given Legislation For War Time Action

WASHINGTON, June 20. (P) — Congress gave final approval today to legislation to authorize a committee to study the problem of drafting the nation's resources in time of war.

Its purpose is to have the commission ascertain the best method by which congress may propose an amendment to the constitution to draft the nation's resources in wartime in order to promote peace and to equalize the burdens and minimize the profits of war. Specific provision was made to prohibit a study of conscription of labor.

The resolution had been before congress in various forms since the World War and had been sponsored by the American Legion and other patriotic organizations.

Extortion Charged By Student Of Tech In Damage Suit Here

Two Firemen Save Moody, Friends From Having to Walk Home After Auto Carrying Gov. Catches on Fire

SAN ANTONIO, June 20. — "Jim and Ed," two San Antonio firemen saved Governor Dan Moody and his three friends from walking back to San Antonio this afternoon from the Randolph field dedication when the automobile in which the Governor was riding caught on fire near the north entrance of the field on the San Antonio-Houston road.

The car was driven by J. C. Clifton, manager of the Stephen F. Austin hotel in Austin, and Mrs. Clifton and A. D. Boone, an Austin photographer, rode with the Governor.

Fire shot from under the hood while the car was traveling slowly in the traffic jam. J. B. Walling, state highway patrol officer, attempted to extinguish the fire with a small hand fire extinguisher carried on his motorcycle. The car finally was pushed into a ditch where the flames burned themselves out.

Two San Antonio fire trucks stationed inside the field were attracted by the smoke and flames, but the heavy traffic inside the field delayed them until the fire was out.

Five fellows, "Jim and Ed," said the Governor after he was back in San Antonio, "they brought us back to town in their car in fine shape. Nope, don't know their other names."

Five Held For Triple Murder In Poker Game

Bodies Of Victims Found In Abandoned Well; Each Shot Through Head; One Man Is Accused Of Slayings

ROCKMART, Ga., June 20. — Bill Huley, his two sons, Fred and Ray, son-in-law, Tom Hicks, and L. O. McCullough were held to the grand jury today on charges of murder for the deaths of Cliff Jones, Lige Harper and Ernest McCullough.

The bodies of the three men were found late yesterday in an abandoned well near here. Each had been shot through the head.

A chain of circumstantial evidence which led from a poker game with high stakes to the lonely well was shown by the state.

Hicks accused Fred Huley of the slaying in a statement made to Solicitor General S. W. Ragdale.

Ragdale said Hicks told him he and his father-in-law had some trouble and that Huley went to his house Thursday night.

"The next day," he told Ragdale, "Fred told me 'you needn't be hiding. I killed three of them and put them away.' He also told me my wife had a lot of nerve and that she helped him clean up the place."

Search for Murderous Maniac Reaches Impasse; Two Suspects Are Arrested

NEW YORK, June 20. — Search for the murderous maniac who has killed two persons in Queens and threatens by letters to slay 13 more, reached an apparent impasse tonight. Of two suspects arrested today, one was cleared definitely and police expressed doubt the other had any part in the killings.

Joseph Oswald Clark, an escaped inmate of the Creedmoor state hospital for the insane, in Queens, who was arrested in Philadelphia, was definitely absolved of connection by Acting Assistant Chief Inspector Sullivan a short time after he was brought there.

Detectives doubted that a man arrested in Newark, N. J., today and who said he was John D. Calvan of Boston, had any connection with the killing. The only evidence against him was an approximate similarity to descriptions of Joseph Velluto, an insane slayer who escaped from the King's Park hospital.

Pink Parrish Will Support Clint C. Small

Lubbock Man Withdraws From Race For Governor After Being Drafted By Friends; To Make Statement Today

In a telegram addressed yesterday to the Morning Avalanche, Senator Pink L. Parrish, of Lubbock, declared that he is withdrawing his name as a candidate for governor and will throw his support to Clint C. Small, of Wellington.

The telegram read: "Withdrawing my name as candidate for governor. Will support my friend Clint C. Small, and will have statement for papers tomorrow."

Drafted By Friends
Senator Parrish's name had been filed on the ticket by friends of Crosby county, his former home. At the time his candidacy was filed, Senator Parrish was en route to Toronto, Canada, to a Shrine convention and could not be reached for a statement. His statement of yesterday was the first he has made since the filing of his name.

A telephone conversation Thursday with Lee Satterwhite, campaign manager of Senator Small, revealed that Parrish had decided to withdraw. Mr. Satterwhite, however, asked the Morning Avalanche to defer announcement until Senator Parrish had made it public himself. The decision was received yesterday in a telegram addressed to

Defense Will Open Its Case This Morning

Nineteen Witnesses Used By Prosecution In Afternoon Session; Details Given Of Sparenberg Slaying May 1

Officers on Stand
Case Expected To Extend To Next Week; Eye-Witnesses Relate Account Of Fatal Shooting Of Billingsley

AMESA, June 20. — The state's case in the Ira McKee murder trial was brought to a dramatic close late today after a parade of 19 witnesses in the afternoon session had presented a vivid account of the fatal shooting of W. R. Billingsley, Sparenberg merchant, May 1. The prosecution rested about 5:30 o'clock and court was adjourned until 9 Saturday morning, although defense counsel announced ready to present witnesses.

Attorneys indicated that the case would extend until Monday or Tuesday.

Widow Testifies
High spots in today's session was the testimony of Mrs. Billingsley, widow of the slain man, and Mrs. Emma Mayhall, alleged companion of McKee at the time he is charged with slaying Billingsley. Mrs. Mayhall also is indicted in the homicide.

The state closed its case, subject to rebuttal testimony, after J. W. Smith, sergeant of the state's ranger force, left the stand, Smith followed A. M. Bennett, local deputy sheriff, who testified four or five times during the afternoon.

The afternoon was marked by an increasing number of objections on the part of the counsel for McKee. There were several objections that had to be argued on a point of law and the court instructed the sheriff to withdraw the jury to permit argument on the part of attorneys.

The state sought to introduce testimony to show that the defendant had been in the vicinity of the slaying the night it occurred, that he spent the night in the vicinity of the slaying.

Negroes Saved In Explosion

Two Hundred Seventy-Five In Municipal Hospital Taken To Safety Following Blast In X-Ray Room

ATLANTA, Ga., June 20. — Approximately 275 negro patients at Grady hospital, municipal institution, were taken from the wards today when an explosion and fire in the X-ray room endangered the building.

The explosion was caused by the flitting of a quantity of "x-ray film," and although dense yellow smoke poured from the windows of the building, none of the patients suffered injury.

Two policemen patrolling the grounds at the time of the blast were knocked down but were uninjured and aided firemen in running a hose into the X-ray room.

The negro patients, including surgical cases, were carried on stretchers to a vacant lot nearby, until they could be returned to wings uninjured by the fire.

Favorite Steps Of Pioneers To Be Revived This Evening In Ballroom Of Hilton Hotel

Fred Spikes, One Of Leaders In Promoting Event, Gives History Of Old-Time Dance In This Section

Days of the 20's and 30's will be lived again tonight when the "Old-Time Gully Jumpers" meet at the Hilton hotel ballroom for an evening of square dances, waltzes, heel-and-toe, polkas, Schottisches, "new shoes," etc. Fred Spikes, one of the pioneers of the dance, will give a history of the dance.

Spikes, J. H. Hankins, J. F. Hankins, Oscar Lykes, Fred Spikes and others of Lubbock, C. D. Dean, of Dallas, and other old-timers, assisted by their wives and the cooperation of Manager H. (Swede) Kling and Mrs. Kling of the Hilton.

Fred Spikes has been a leader in promoting the event. J. H. Hankins will be floor manager and J. A. Whittington of Tabor, Okla., fiddler. Music and guitar music will accompany the fiddle.

Famous Dance Fiddler Mr. Whittington has been a famous dance fiddler on the South Plains from earliest days when this was a cow country and nothing more. He has been a prize winner in many fiddlers' contests all over West Texas. "He's a good fiddler, a good fiddler and a good man," says Fred Spikes.

Mr. Spikes himself, tells interesting tales about early dances, when such an event was often a three-day party. "We used to go 50 miles, horseback, in buggies, men and women alike, to a dance, and stay two or three nights," he says.

Held On Ranches "The big dances in those days were at the principal ranch headquarters. A favorite gathering place was the 3-H ranch house of the St. Louis Castle Co., on the Yellow canyon, near the Crosby-Garza county line. John T. Beal was ranch manager and Dink Logan, boss.

"Other popular places were the Matador ranch in Motley county, Spur ranch in Dickens county, Cross-O ranch in Lubbock county and T-Bar ranch in Lynn county. The ranch would furnish food and beds, and the dancers would pay the fiddlers.

"We didn't get as far north for dances as the T-Anchor ranch at Canyon or the KIT, north of Amarillo. Important ranch headquarters to the Panhandle, but after driving by a team in 1890 from Kaufman county, 50 miles southeast of Dallas, to Yellowhouse canyon with my parents and eight brothers and sisters, a 30-day journey, my father and I freighted lumber by ox team from Amarillo, the nearest railroad town.

Lubbock county was organized the next year.

Few Since 1900 "The old-time dances fell away about 1900, and since then there have been few of them except an occasional barn dance at the George Boles ranch headquarters, which was four miles east of Lubbock until 1920, when it was transferred to the former Cross-O headquarters, 10 miles southeast of the city.

"But a lot of the old-timers on the South Plains became interested in a revival of the fun three years ago, when Henry Ford added to his flivver fame by advocating the square dance and similar steps. We have had a few very successful parties, and the dance on Saturday night is designed to bring back old-time friendship and memories. Now it is expected that visitors will be from 150 miles away, including people from Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Pecos, Lamesa, Post and all other towns in the area.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

JUNE 22, 1930

General Topic: The Risen Lord and the Great Commission.

Scripture Lesson: Matt. 28:1-10, 16-20.

1. Now late on the Sabbath day, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulchre.

2. And behold, there was a great earthquake: for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and came and rolled away the stone, and sat upon it.

3. His appearance was as lightning, and his raiment white as snow.

4. And for fear of him the watchmen did quake, and became as dead men.

5. And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, who hath been crucified.

6. He is not here: for he is risen, even as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay.

7. And go quickly and tell his disciples. He is risen from the dead; and he is now before you in Galilee: there shall ye see him: lo, I have told you.

8. And they departed quickly from the tomb with fear and great joy, and ran to bring his disciples word.

9. And behold, Jesus met them, saying, All hail. And they came and took hold of his feet and worshipped him.

10. Then saith Jesus unto them, Fear not, go tell my brethren that they depart into Galilee, and there shall they see me.

11. But the eleven disciples went where Jesus had appointed them.

12. And when they saw him, they worshipped him: but some doubted.

13. And Jesus came to them and spake unto them, saying, All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth.

14. Go ye therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

15. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.

16. Then Christ's resurrection Sunday, April 8, A. D. 30.

Place Jerusalem.

Introduction.

The women who were at the tomb last week had a dreadful story to tell. It is the story of the resurrection of the Son of God. This is one of the most wonderful things that have ever happened in the world.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the foundation of our faith. It is the power that gives us life and hope.

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victory of heaven's King over earth's sinfulness, of life over death.

The Resurrection.

"It was blackness of despair for the disciples. The Master had indeed raised Lazarus from the dead, but now the grave held Jesus himself fast. With him they had buried all their hopes. No conspiracy on the part of these dejected disciples to revive Christianity with the announcement that Jesus was alive, though he was not, is conceivable. If it be said that the women imagined that they had seen angels and Jesus, and so restored the hopes of the disciples, it is to be observed that the disciples did not believe the women. If it be said that the narrative is conflicting, one must remember that this story is independent in the testimony. In simple truth, no theory has yet been advanced that harmonizes with the fact of the revival of a dead Christianity save the fact of the resurrection of Christ. The disciples saw Jesus."—Prof. A. T. Robertson.

"There Was A Great Earthquake." V. 2.

"And behold, there was a great earthquake." Matthew is going backward a little with this verse for the earthquake. "Ideally foot place where the arrival of the women at the tomb, which was at the break of dawn. 'For an angel of the Lord descended from heaven.' If ever these celestial beings came to earth, it would be to attend the birth and the resurrection of the Son of God. 'And came and rolled away the stone.' The women, as they approached the tomb, were wondering about the great stone that closed the entrance, and how it could be moved by their feeble strength—a fine example of the unconscious of worry. They did not know about the sealing of the tomb and the Roman guard in front of it, or they would not have attempted their errand at all.

"He Is Risen, As He Said." V. 6.

"He is not here." He was in the world but not in the grave. "For he is risen, even as he said." These women had been with Christ throughout his ministry. Probably each of them had heard him prophesying that he would rise from the dead on the third day. This is the most stupendous announcement ever made—more wonderful even than any proclamation of the

birth of Jesus at Bethlehem. It is the most blessed for us, taking away the fear of death forever. It placed the crown of triumph on the life of the Saviour. "Come, see the place where the Lord lay." The empty tomb would be more convincing than the stone rolled away. When Peter and John, who came next, running, entered the tomb, they were powerfully impressed by the sight of the grave cloths in which the body of Jesus had been wrapped, and especially by the headbands, lying there rolled up in the shape of the Lord's head, like a chrysalis shell from which the butterfly had emerged. (John 20:1-9)

The Appearance Of The Risen Lord, Vs. 9-17.

"The New Testament is an effect, the cause of which lies in the fact of the risen Christ. If Jesus Christ had remained buried in the tomb, the story of his life as recorded in the New Testament would have doubtless been buried with him. The death of Christ shattered the faith of the disciples. This is evident from a study of the con-

duct of the disciples between the death and appearance of Christ. It is a question as to whether we should have heard anything more about them, or any further messages from their lips, had not the risen Christ appeared to them and reinstated their faith."—Dean William Evans.

"And behold, Jesus met them, saying, All hail." No one but a true historian would have related, in those days when women were not held in honor as they are now in Christian lands, how the Lord showed himself first to a woman. A false historian would have told how the risen Saviour showed himself to the Sanhedrin and Pilate to confound them, or to the chief of the apostles, Peter and James and John.

The Report Of The Guard, Vs. 11-13.

Matthew interrupts his narrative at this point to relate the report of Christ's resurrection made to the chief priests by the Roman guard, the dismayed meeting of the Sanhedrin, and their bribing the soldiers to say that while they (the soldiers)

doubted, the disciples came and stole the body of Jesus, a falsehood attempted by the Jews even to this day. The Sanhedrin agreed to protect the soldiers if Pilate should threaten to punish them, for it was death for a sentinel to sleep on duty; but it is inconceivable in the first place that the soldiers would be asleep, and in the second place, that they would confess it when the confusion meant death and in the third place that the disciples would have taken such a step. We know that they were honest men. They died for their faith in Christ, based on his resurrection. Men do not die for the sake of a cheat which they themselves have accomplished.

"We are not to think of the Lord's resurrection as a mere appendix to our religion. It is a fundamental part of our Christianity. We are justified in believing in Christ as our Lord only by the completed fact of his resurrection."—Rev. D. W. Faunce, D. D.

"Go Ye Therefore." V. 19.

Because I have authority, therefore I command you to go forth. Because I will empower you, therefore go. Because there is no other

way to get the gospel to all the world, therefore go. It is to be noted that the first two letters of the word, "GO!" The people will not come to Christ? Then it is our business to go to them with Christ. "And make disciples of all the nations." Christ said he was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel; but he sends his disciples to all the lost sheep, of all lands and races. "The method by which Jesus proposes to subdue all things unto himself appears to be utterly inadequate. To teach, to make disciples, to baptize these disciples, and to instruct them further in the faith! Good Master, are these the weapons of our warfare? Not thus do the princes of this world contemplate conquest, for they rely on monster guns, ironclads, and engines of depth-dealing power. Yet what are these but proofs of their weakness? Had they all power in themselves they would not need such instruments. Only he who has all power can work his bidding by a word, and dispense with all force but that of love."—C. H. Spurgeon.

"Teaching Them."

Teaching them to observe all

things whatsoever I commanded you." "We men are, as our best, always learning, always reviving, correcting, supplementing what we have learned heretofore; never able to express ourselves positively on subjects which deeply interest us, without feeling that we, or others, will trace shortcomings, or exaggerations, or elements of paradox or falsehood, in what we say. Our Lord is haunted by no such apprehension as this. He is confident that what he has taught his disciples will hold good for all time; for all races and classes of men; for characters, moods of thought, moral and intellectual atmosphere the most diverse. As he said, 'My words shall not pass away' (Matt. 24:35), so now he fearlessly bids his apostles teach the nations. He reigns, alike in the moral and the intellectual world; and he is certain of the authority of the commission which he gives to teach."—Dean H. P. Lid-

"I Am With You Always." V. 20.

"And lo, I am with you always." Literally, all the days; dark days, bright days, busy days, restful days, "all the way my Saviour leads me."

And notice the verb, "I am." To Christ, the Lord of eternity, all time is one, and present. The name of Christ, as of the Father, is "I Am." Remember his great saying, "Before Abraham was born, I am" (John 8:58). "So shall we ever be with the Lord" (1 Thess. 4:17). "Even unto the end of the world." The miracle reads, "The consummation of the age," the close of this world-age. The coming of the Holy Spirit, and his constant abiding with Christians, is the fulfillment of this great promise. "This last and wonderful word in Matthew is a worthy close for any book, for any career, even for the life of Jesus the Son of God."—Prof. A. T. Robertson.

Jones Adds Another British Open Crown To Trophies

Atlanta Wizard Scores 291 For 72-Hole Grind To Win By Two Strokes Over Two Rivals

Leo Diegel And MacDonald Smith Tie For Second Place With 293's; Horton Smith And Fred Robson Tie For Fourth Place In Event

HOYLAKES, Eng., June 20. (AP)—Bobby Jones, scoring 291 and holding a two-stroke lead over Leo Diegel and MacDonald Smith, tied for second place, today won his third British Open Golf championship crown after one of the greatest battles of the golfing centuries.

Horton Smith and Fred Robson, veteran British pros, tied for fourth place with 293's. Long Jim Barnes, with 297, tied for sixth.

Equals John Ball's Feat
With the amateur title taken last month at St. Andrews, Jones has matched the feat of the famous amateur, John Ball, who 49 years ago won the British amateur and open titles the same year.

Britain's glory in today's thrilling fight went to Compton, whose third round of 68 broke the Hoylake record by two strokes and revived British hopes by giving the blonde giant a three round aggregate of 218 and a one stroke lead over the American amateur.

British hopes rested in him but he floundered out in 43 and tumbled home in 38 for an 81.

Jones played steady golf until disaster visited him at the eighth. So appalling was the downfall that the mighty Bobby marked a seven on his card after being within a few yards of the green with his second shot.

Reserve Strength Tells Story
Jones' great reserve strength, nerve and cooling genius enabled him to finish the round in 75 strokes for a 72 hole total of 291 with a steady string of fours on the home-ward trek, broken only by one five.

Dr. S. O. Netherton Is Found Guilty Of Slaying Wife To Get \$100,000 Inheritance; New Trial Denied

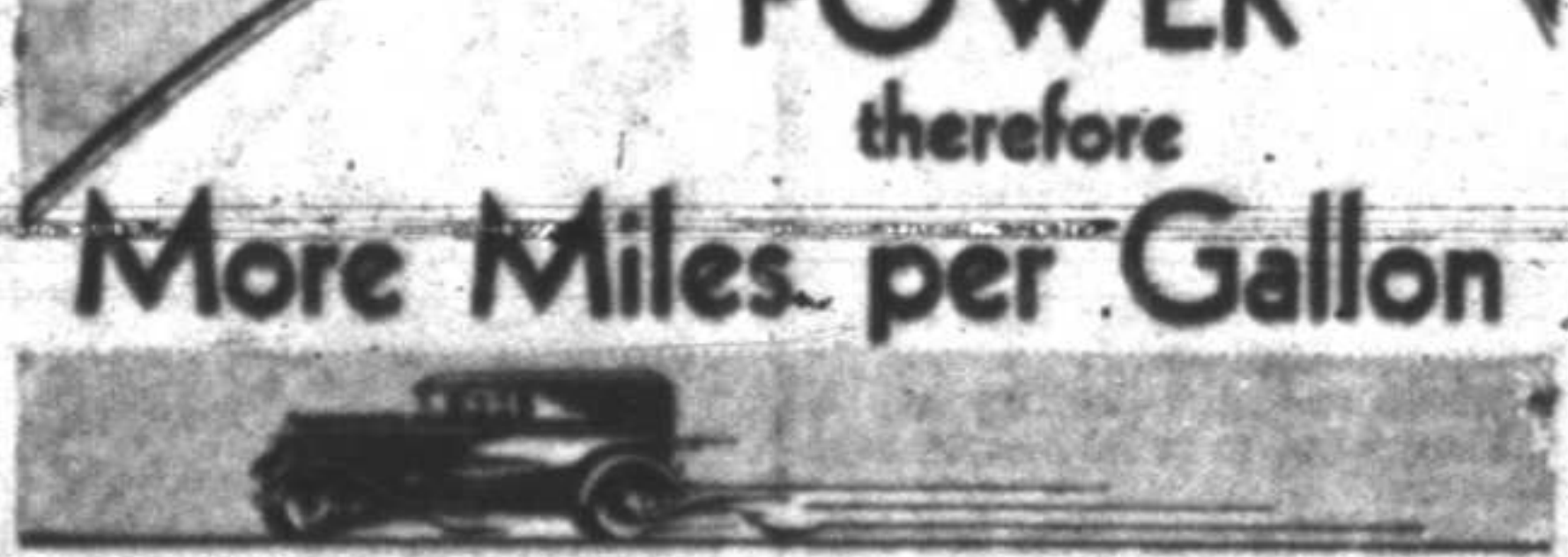

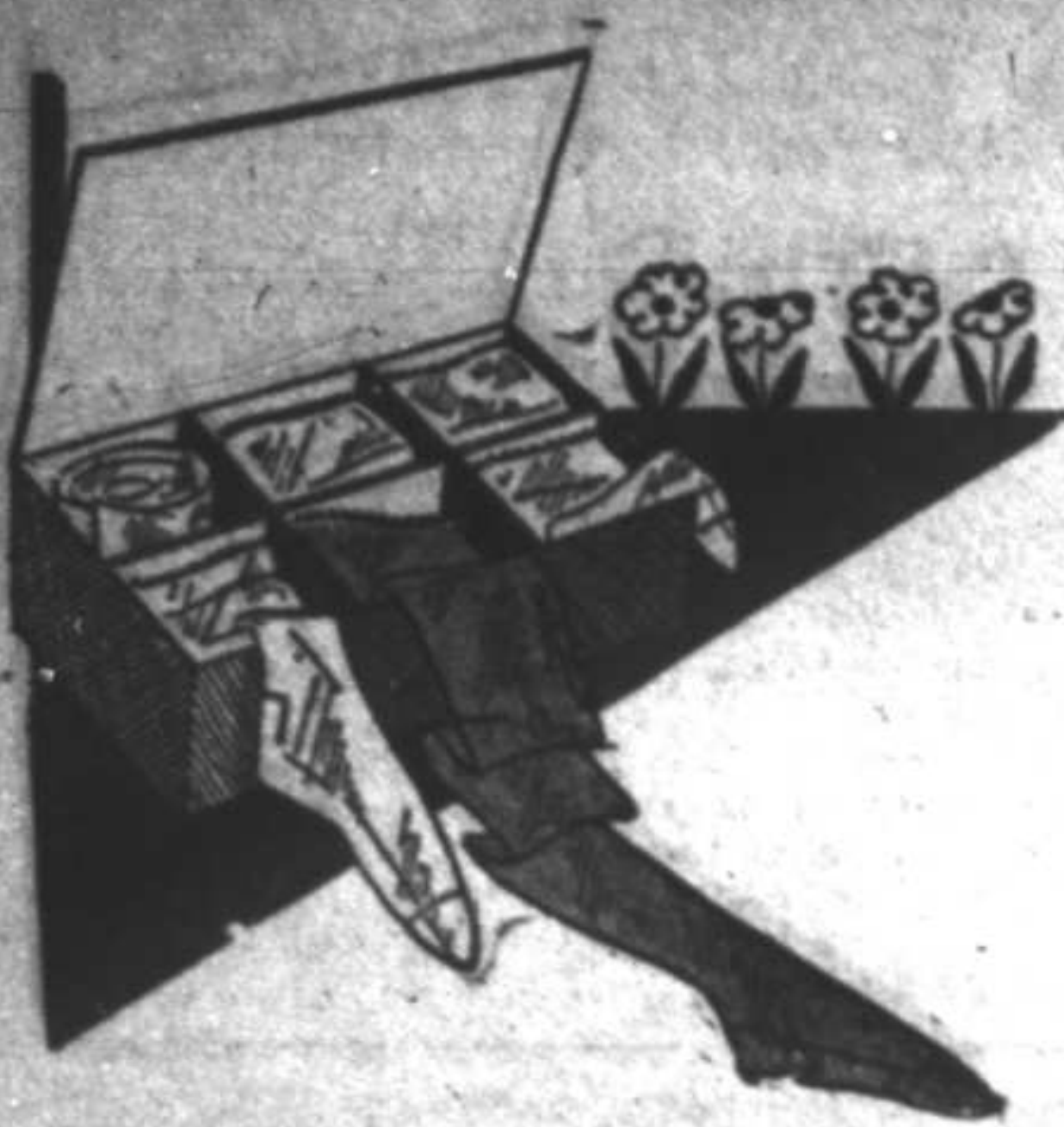

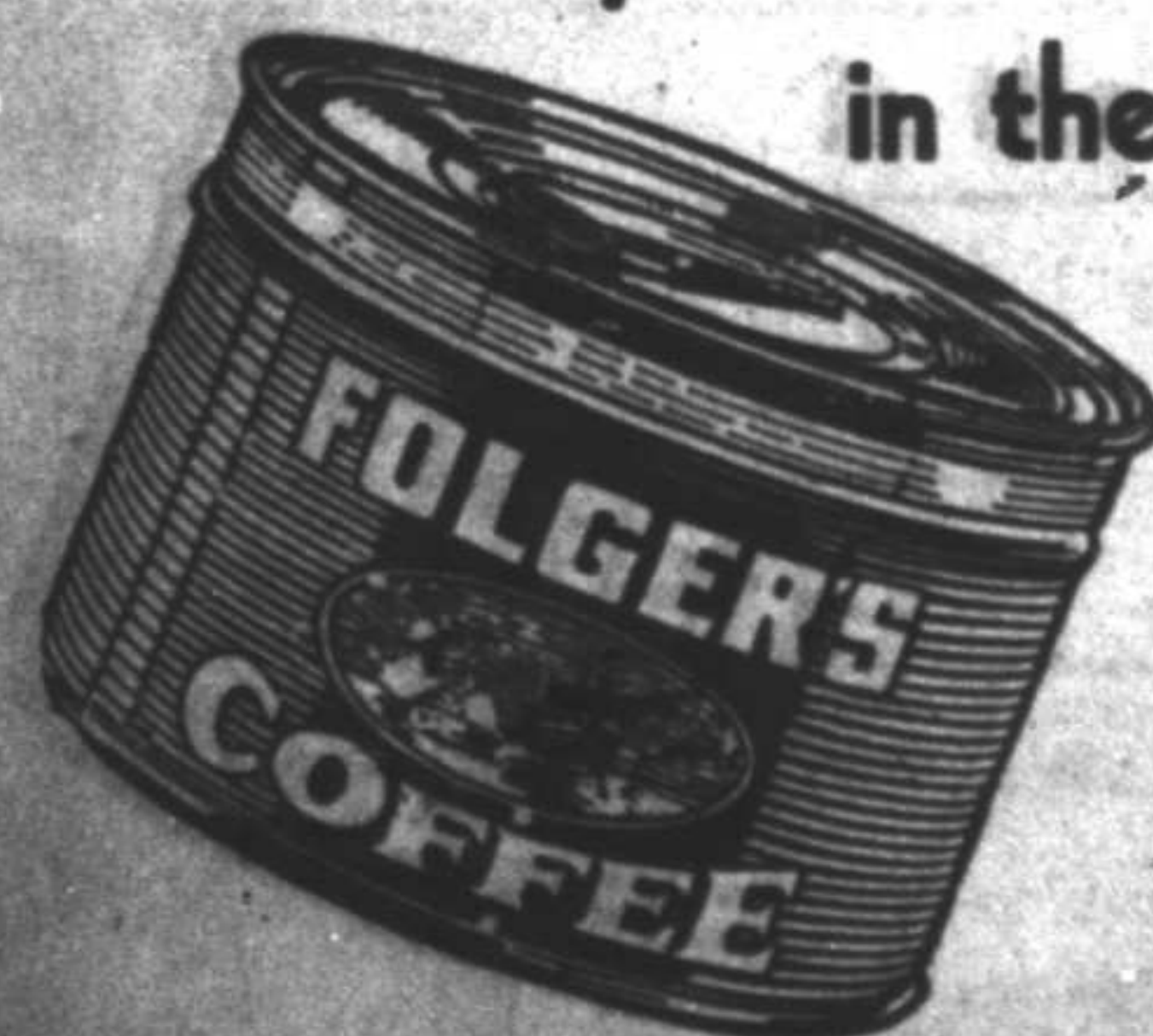

city and was seen there briefly the next day.

Benetti First Witness.
W. H. Benetti was the first witness, followed by J. J. Gentry, from whom the defendant was alleged to have borrowed some gasoline for his car. J. O. Heath, a minister, testified to having been at the Gentry home when the request for gasoline was made.

Velma Bryce, daughter of Mrs. Mary Bryce, was recalled to the stand to tell the details of the shooting. She stated that she had stood on the porch of the Bryce home, across the street from the filling station owned by the Bryces. "Did you see the holdup?" she was asked.

"Yes, I could see it through the door. I saw my brother through the glass—saw him throw up his hands," she replied.

C. J. Kreser, garage owner at Sparenberg, told of how W. R. Billingsley had called at his garage the night of the shooting, to borrow Kreser's shotgun. "He left with a gun," he testified in response to question of the district attorney.

Shots Heard

Later, "about as long as it took Mr. Billingsley to walk from the filling station," he testified, he heard "four or five pistol shots." He also said he heard the report of a shotgun, two reports in fact.

Lee Billingsley, a nephew of the dead man, testified to the operation in a Lamesa hospital on his uncle.

D. W. Richardson, living six miles north of Hamlin, told of the appearance at his place of the defendant, Mrs. Emma Mayhall and her little girl, the day before the Sparenberg shooting. He recalled a car wreck near his place, in which Mrs. Mayhall was injured.

Identifies McKee
"I saw that man at the car accident," he testified, pointing to McKee in the courtroom. He also told circumstances of the calling of a physician to treat Mrs. Mayhall.

George W. Martin, at whose farm home five miles southeast of Sparenberg, McKee and Mrs. Mayhall and daughter spent the night of the shooting, testified as to the events of that affair. He identified McKee and said he was the man who came to his place about 10 o'clock that night.

Ida Mayhall, the star juvenile witness of the morning, was recalled to the stand. Her appearance and the examination brought an objection, which was overruled. She was asked why she had accompanied her mother on the trip to a nearby house to get some water the night of the shooting.

"Because I was told to and because I was afraid he would kill me if I did not," she said.

E. M. Cave, a farmer living five and three-quarters of a mile from Sparenberg, told of Gaston Martin and another man, whom he identified as McKee, coming to his place early in the morning following the Sparenberg holdup and shooting to "borrow gasoline." He said McKee, on leaving, stopped frequently, as he walked away, to look at him.

Fred Cave, a son, gave similar testimony.

Doctor Testifies
Dr. J. C. Lovelace, testified to seeing and attending Mrs. Billingsley at Sparenberg the night of the shooting. He also told of the statement the wounded man made in his presence regarding his condition.

Mrs. W. R. Billingsley, widow of the slain man, recalled to the stand, told of statements her husband made after he was shot. "My husband said that the last shot was the one that had killed him," she stated. She said her husband's statement was a voluntary one.

Mrs. Billingsley reiterated statements of her husband, "that he said he hit him with the gun after he was shot, that striking him with the gun over-balanced him and that McKee, when hit, did not fall to the ground."

There was no cross examination.

Mrs. Mayhall, companion of McKee at the time he is alleged to have killed Billingsley during an attempted filling station robbery, testified that she was forced to accompany McKee when the latter made his wild flight from the scene of the tragedy.

Left Engine Running
"I was driving with McKee," the woman said, "and when he came to Sparenberg he told me to leave the engine in the car running while he went to see a fellow."

"After I heard several shots McKee came back and told me that a man had knocked him down and he had to shoot him. He told me that if I told anybody he'd kill me."

Ida Mayhall, the woman's daughter, corroborated her mother's testimony in a childlike fashion when later called to the stand.

"I distinctly saw my husband shot," Mrs. W. R. Billingsley, the widow, stated at the outset of her testimony Thursday night. She was the first state witness to be used, a change having been made by Thomas L. Price, district attorney, in his plan to first use Mrs. Emma Mayhall.

"He was lying on the concrete at the time," she stated, adding that the concrete in question was the "porch in front of the cafe."

"I heard three gun shots fired before I got there," she continued. "I stopped when I heard the fourth shot fired."

Saw the Man
Mrs. Billingsley said she was "15 or 20 feet" from the man in whose hand she saw a pistol and who had fired the shots at her husband.

"I saw him down on the concrete and I saw this man shoot," she continued. "He was down on the concrete. This man says I don't guess that you will think I am joking now, and then he walked away."

Mrs. Billingsley said that she heard her husband say it was a "dirty trick to hold up a widow's car."
