

Wheeler Wins District Opener

The Wheeler Mustangs opened district play last Friday night at Claude. The battle of the Mustangs turned out

to be the battle of who could capitalize the most on the opponent's mistakes. The inability of both teams to

make extra points kept the game tight, with the Wheeler Mustangs taking a one point win 19-18 over the Claude Mustangs.

The Mustangs of Wheeler looked like they would take control of the game early as they held Claude on its first possession and forced a punt. A Wheeler misquid would turn those thoughts around in a hurry. Wheeler fumbled the punt return, and Claude recovered it at the Wheeler 20 yard line. Two plays later, Adrian Cordova scampered around the right end for an 18 yard touchdown. The extra point kick was no good and Claude led 6-0 with 8:56 left in the first quar-

ter. The Wheeler Mustangs would get on the scoreboard early in the second quarter as Arron Dunnam found Kirt Boedeker behind the Claude defenders for a 30 yard touchdown pass. The kick was blocked leaving the score 6-6 with 11:52 left in the second quarter. Claude would get their second score of the night after they knocked the ball loose from Arron Dunnam and recovered it at the Mustang 12 yard line. Jason Fanelli scored from 1 yard out, but the extra point was no good giving the Claude Mustangs a 12-6 lead. Wheeler would come back with just under a minute left in the first half. Arron Dunnam again found Kirt Boedeker behind the Claude secondary for a 35 yard touchdown pass. The extra point was good, and Wheeler went ahead 13-12 at the end of the half.

The second half would start similar to the first as the Wheeler Mustangs would receive the kickoff and fumble. Claude recovered it and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown, swinging the momentum of the game back to Claude. Wheeler would have to hold Claude on two extra point tries. A face mask penalty was called against Wheeler on the first try, but the Mustangs were still able to keep Claude from scoring the extra point. Claude would lead 18-13 with 11:45 to go in the third quarter. Neither Wheeler or Claude would score in the rest of the

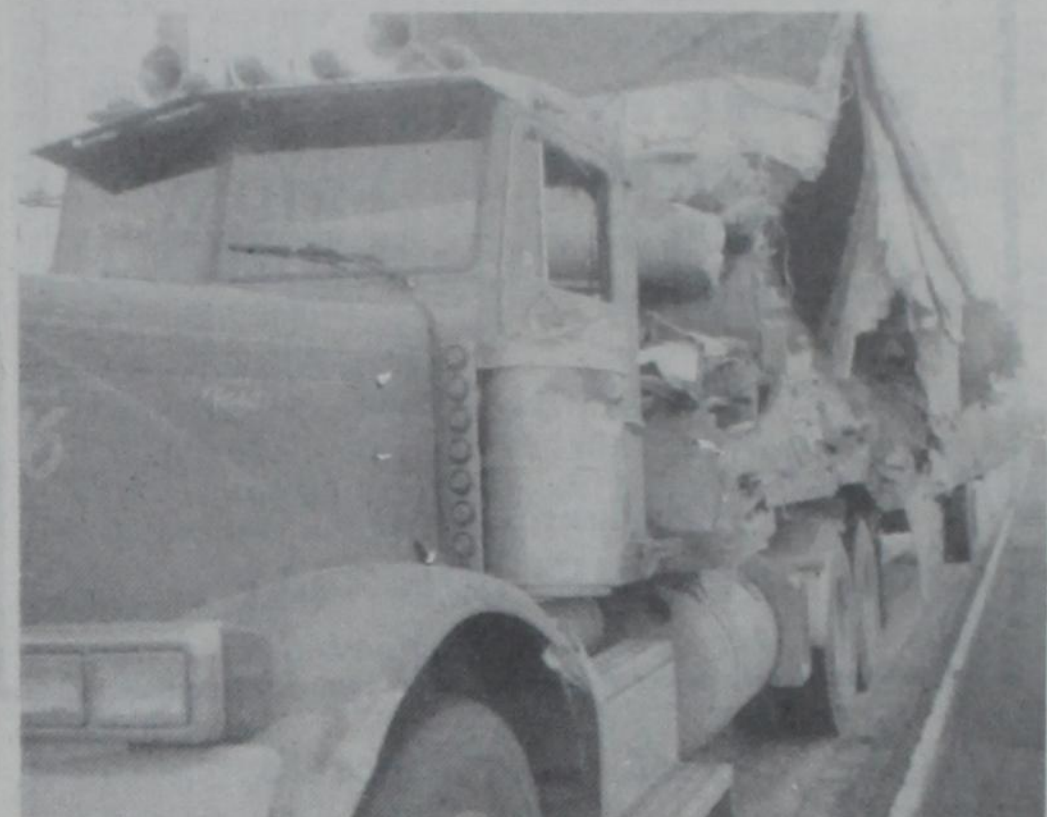
Mr. Caldwell has been a member of the Wheeler County Livestock Show board of directors for several years.

Mr. Randy McCurley, president of the First State Bank of Mobeetie and Wheeler, accepted the plaque for the Caldwell family.

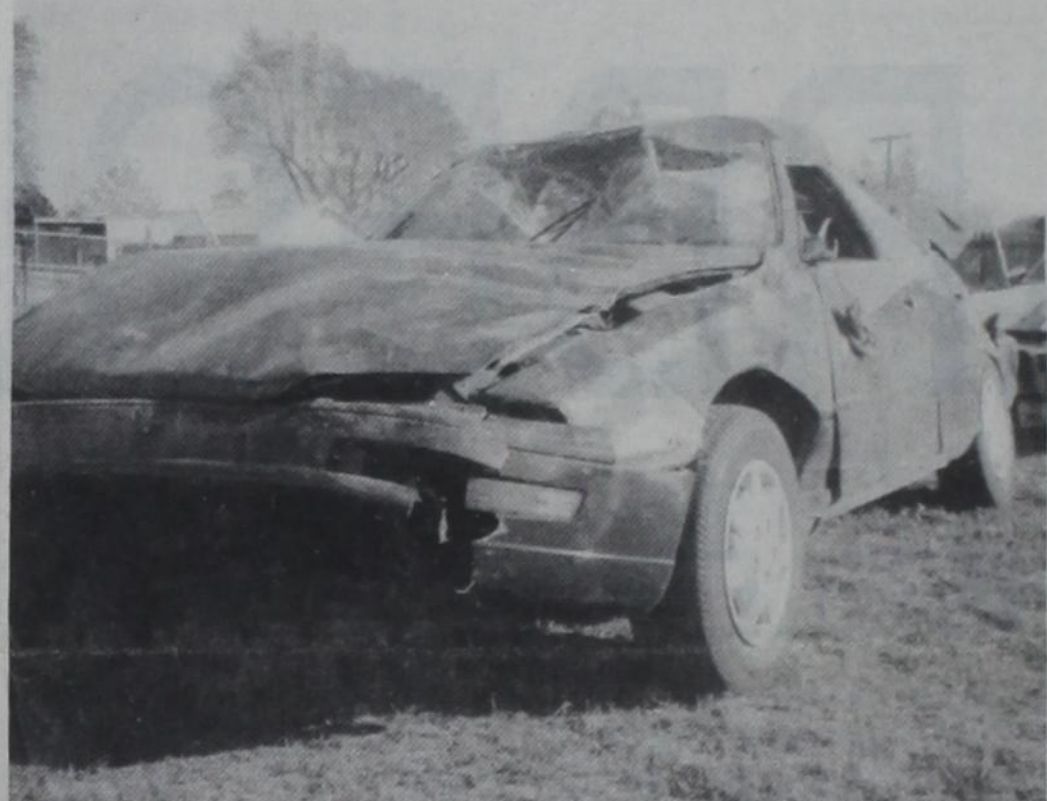

NO INJURIES: Wheeler ambulance and fire and rescue were called to the scene of this two vehicle accident on Tuesday morning at 7:24. A pickup, traveling north on Highway 83, approximately 5 miles north of the county line road, veered to the left of the center line. The pickup from Hereford was pulling a loaded flatbed trailer. The pickup and trailer sideswiped an 18-wheeler. The 18-wheeler saw the pickup coming across the center line and attempted to pull to the right and avoid the collision. The 18-wheeler, loaded with hay was heavily damaged as the picture shows.



SEATBELTS WORK: The driver of this Camry crawled out of the overturned vehicle with very little more than a scratch. The vehicle was traveling north on Highway 83, approximately 2 miles north of the Briscoe turnoff. Driver reached for something on the floor and veered to the right, running off the edge of the pavement. She overcorrected, traveled across the highway, across the barrow ditch, up an embankment, over a fence and into a pasture. The vehicle appeared to have flipped and rolled to a stop some 30 yards into the pasture. Wheeler ambulance and fire and rescue departments were dispatched. The driver signed a release and did not require transportation. She was wearing her seatbelt. The accident happened around 9:00 A.M.

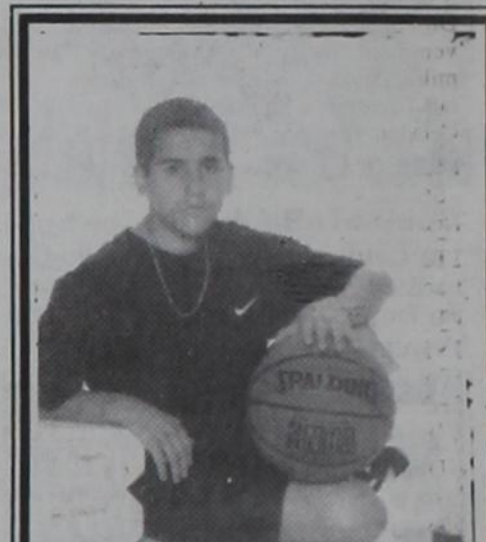

I remember at least 4 wild rides in my lifetime, and each time horses were involved.

I think it was the summer after I graduated from high school, and I wanted to go to college, but money was tight and we were still in the depression.

I don't remember how but my parents got a bunch of turkeys, and since through them I would get help for college, it was my job early in the mornings to take them to the pasture to graze on grasshoppers. They'd catch grasshoppers till they got full and it got hot, then they'd return to the house on their own. We had a dog that went with me every step I took; dogs are one of man's most faithful companions.

The turkeys, like guineas, find every turtle, toad or snake. And that summer, "to my shame", I killed 30 some snakes. I apologise to God and His Creation for killing when it wasn't necessary.

The dog got bitten one day by a rattlesnake very soon his leg began to hurt and he didn't want to walk; he'd hold up his leg and whine, so I'd carry him as far as I could, and then he'd have to walk some. I needed to hurry to get help for him. At the house we held his leg in kerosene and then he used his instinct and went to the creek and laid in mud. He lived to be with me on that day of the wild ride. That day when the turkeys started to go back I decided to drive the horses in for my Father was to use them that day and it would save me time by not having to go back after them. The saddle horse was gentle, he was used to a lot of kids riding him.

I easily caught him and swung on his back by his mane (couldn't do it now) but I could then. I slowly and gently started rounding up the horses. And started them towards the barn. They began to feel frisky and wanted to play, and that just suited the dog, most dogs love to chase horses. And soon I was in for a wild ride, no bridle or any way to control the horse. Soon horses were running every way, my saddle horse would run right upon a horse and that horse would "kick up" with both hind feet, and my horse would have to quickly swerve to keep from getting kicked. At the time it seemed like a long time that this went on, but it probably wasn't too long before a mare started straight toward the barn and my horse right behind her. When my horse stopped in the corral, I held his mane and gently slid down, I had to stand there a little bit before I could stand on my own. I made it to the house and laid down. And the next few days every muscle complained loudly when I moved. An angel must have ridden with me that day, sent there by my praying parents. I look back and think that must have been the case several times when it could have been death—instead.

Not too many days after that wild ride I found myself on the steps of W.T. with muscles still complaining and I climbed the many steps.

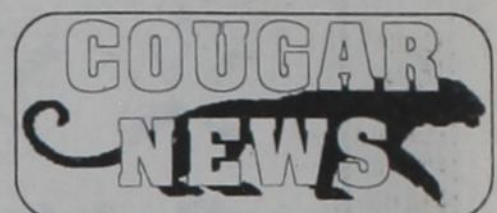

In Memory of Lina Jackson

(Letter to the Editor)
Lina Jackson died on October 8th, 1998. That event was dutifully noted in the news media, but there is a story that was not noted that should be told because it touches our lives.

As a child, Lina was a prisoner in one of Hitler's death camps at Dachau and Auschwitz because she was a member of a gypsy family, one of the groups targeted by the evil system.

When governments have seemingly insurmountable problems they invariably find a scapegoat to blame, usually those of a different race, religion or political philosophy. Lina felt that cruelty and carried in her body the infamous mark of the despised, the number tattooed on her arm. The marks upon her spirit were burned also within but just as real. She lived without dwelling on the misfortune, which is a testimony to God giving grace in every time of need.

Every time I visited Lina, she had a spirit of friendliness and helpfulness that put me at ease. That strength of her spirit was greater than any political philosophy that would crush mankind. The philosophy that man is the measure of all things always brings forth the extreme of selfish anarchy or the slavery of despotism. The philosophy of God as a creator and master always brings forth freedom, peace and joy, which gave Lina the strength to continue through circumstances that we prefer not to even dwell upon.

At the entrance of Dachau there is a memorial with the famous words of Santana engraved—"Those who can not remember the past are condemned to repeat it." It is very evident that mankind did not learn the lessons of history. In the 53 years following WW II, millions have been murdered at the hands of others, often by those of like race, religion or nationality.

Wheeler Soil Conservation District's Annual Report

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District and are actively engaged in farming or ranching.

The current Board of Directors consists of Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton, Eric Zybach, and John McDowell Jr.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Natural Resources Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current NRCS staff consists of Fred Allison Jr., District Conservationist; and Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist. Elizabeth Barrera is employed as District Clerks. Don Humphreys is an Earth Team volunteer.

The SWCD works closely with the NRCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1998 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been involved with the development, servicing of EQIP and revising of Food Security ACT (FSA) plans. The Conservation Reserve Program Sign up 16 was busy in Wheeler County. The office worked 200 applications. Contracts were developed on 80 for 15,000 acres.

This year the Wheeler Field Office developed eight EQIP contracts on 3,410 acres. Practices cost shared under these programs include cross fences, water storage facilities, terraces, pipelines for livestock, and grass seeding.

Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD/NRCS for 1998 include: Land users provided assistance - 500; Conservation Plans (New and Revisions - 188 on 22,500 acres; Terraces and Diversions - 1600 feet; Grass Planting - 5,000 Acres; Livestock Pipelines - 1650 feet; Fences - 12,480 feet; Four Conservation Presentations were given with 100 people attending. These are only a few of the conservation accomplishments for 1998.

Farmer's Union Hails Final Farm Relief Prog.

The final farm relief package agreed upon by Congress and the administration is a major victory for America's producers, the Texas Farmers Union said today.

The package contains a total of approximately \$6 billion in assistance for the nation's farmers and ranchers, an increase of nearly \$2 billion over a plan President Bill Clinton vetoed last week because of insufficient funding. The new package is expected to be approved by Congress later this week.

Senate Democratic Leader Tom Daschle announced late yesterday that a deal had been reached on the overall amount of the plan, and that the additional economic assistance will be provided in the form of market loss payments, based upon production in 1998; increased relief to areas suffering multi-year disasters; and modifications to tax policies affecting farmers.

In addition, the bill will include mandatory price reporting for all livestock sales, a measure strongly supported by Texas Farmers Union to address the need for more timely price information in a livestock marketing system influenced by ever increasing concentration.

Farmers Union has been a leader in advocating a more adequate farm relief package to better address the losses suffered by farmers due to natural disasters, crop disease and historically low commodity prices. Farmers Union had urged President Clinton to reject the first plan in order to force improvements to the package.

"This is a major victory for rural America," said Texas Farmers Union President Wes Sims. "This package will better ensure farm families have additional resources to survive this difficult year. Without the persistence of President Clinton and Senator Daschle, and their negotiating leadership, the further assistance would not have been forthcoming, and we greatly appreciate their efforts."

Sims also noted that Congress will have more work to do next year. "The funding in this bill will help producers offset income losses for this year, but next year will be even more challenging. There is no question Congress will need to address some of the longer term issues facing agriculture, including the need for an adequate farm safety net."
