10 Accidents Are Reported

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$12,699.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1970 shows a total of 30 accidents resulting in 0 persons killed, six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$23,664.00.

The final entry in the 1969 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,551 persons killed, an estimated 223,000 suffered injuries, and an estimated property loss of \$955 million was sustained.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960 Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1978 they will have increased 100 per cent."

Homemakers Haven

Spring has officially arrived and party time is in the air. Decorations on cakes and cookies are always pleasing for the youngsters and very attractive for the adult parties also.

Try using colored or silver candies to form letters, festoons, or borders around the cake. Use a toothpick to draw or space the design lightly in the frosting. Then, using tweezers, carefully place the candies on the design.

Initials may be added to frosted cupcakes by writing on frosting with melted chocolate. Use a little paintbrush or a toothpick for this.

Nothing looks more inviting than a simply frosted cake garnished with fresh dainty flowers. For spring--coconut makes a very pretty background for these colorful spring flowers. Remember, place flowers on the cake just before serving.

For patriotic cake, cut paper patterns for 1776 and star design and place on cake. Sprinkle the cake generously with powdered sugar, then carefully remove patterns. Use the date in center of cake and place the stars in the corners.

Remember to make the punch ahead of time and thoroughly chill in the refrigerator.

CHERRY PUNCH

2 pkgs. cherry Kool Aid (mix as directed on pkg.)

3 c. sugar

1 c. white Karo

1 qt. tea (ready to serve)

1 large can apple juice

1 large can pineapple juice

If desired, add 1 quart gingerale when ready to serve.

NEAT TRICK -- Make ahead and freeze in ice cubes. Thaw as needed. Cubes make good coolers for punch bowl. A cherry could also be placed in some of the cubes for decoration.

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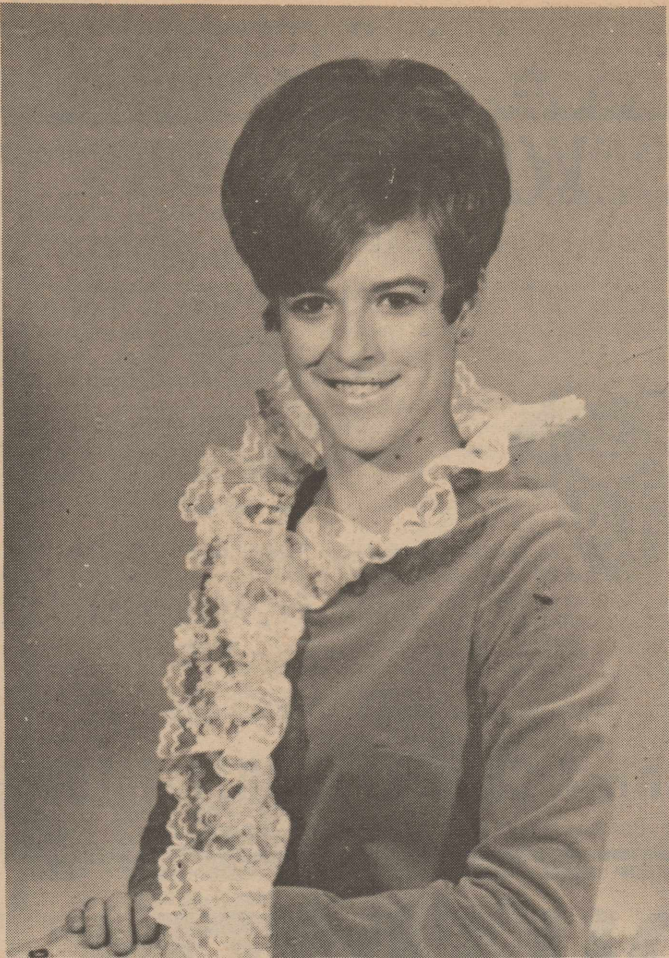

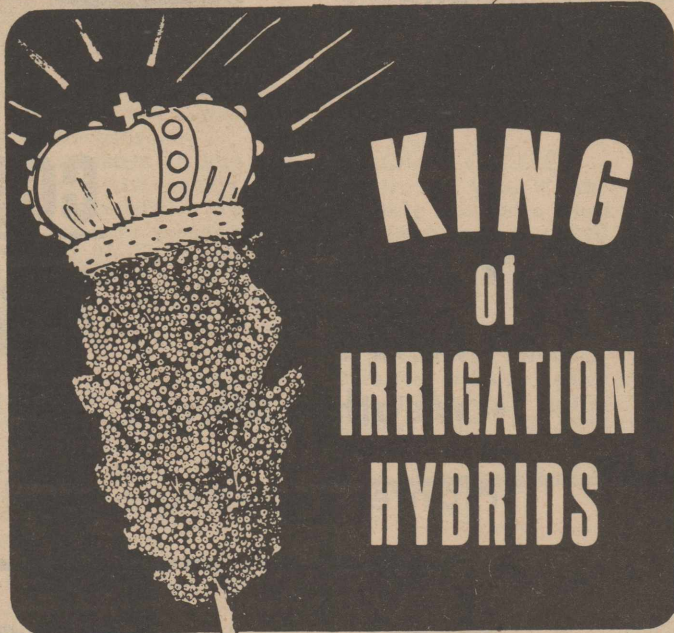

Financial Facts

Did you ever hear of the "Brasher doubloon?" It is regarded as the most valuable coin in the world today. Once owned by George Washington, it is now worth \$150,000. Actually it is a \$16.00 gold piece.

On May 29th, 1965, this numismatic masterpiece was stolen. It had been on display with other coins at the Sterling Memorial Library. The famous library is located at Yale University in New Haven, Connecticut.

The doubloon was one of six made by Ephraim Brasher, a goldsmith. Being a good neighbor, he gave the coin to George Washington in 1787. The coin had been given to Yale about thirty years ago.

Thank to Richard F. Andrews, an insurance company investigat-

or, the coin was recently recovered.

A doubloon is a former Spanish gold coin.

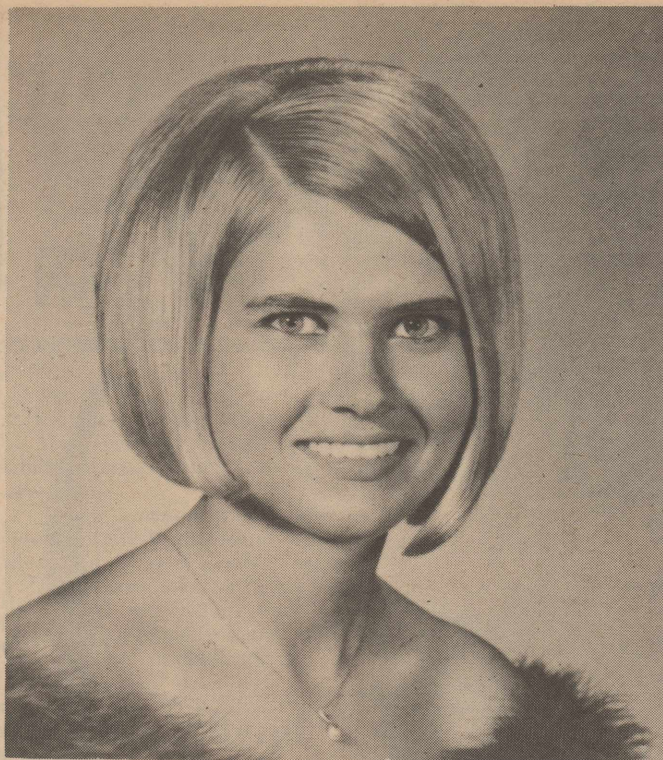

Ramsey Seeks Re-election As Railroad Commissioner

Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey said here today that a stable federal policy on limitation of foreign oil imports is necessary for the orderly development and regulation of the petroleum industry in Texas.

Ramsey is seeking a second full elective term on the three-member Railroad Commission in the primaries May 2.

A consistent federal policy of restrictive imports would not only be beneficial to the domestic industry but also would give the Railroad Commission a more firm basis to determine its policies, Ramsey said. "This is not just an oil industry problem," Ramsey added. The state government relies heavily on taxes from the petroleum businesses for support of its programs, including services, schools and universities. "Additionally," Ramsey said, "some 210,400 employees in Texas alone with a \$1.6 billion a year payroll are directly dependent on the petroleum industry."

"Oilmen and their families, as any other group, have a right

to know where they stand," Ramsey said. Unlimited foreign oil imports and the inconsistency of federal policy, Ramsey said, leaves the oilman, royalty owners, landowners, and state government in much the same position as the housewife with a heavy budget who has no idea what the family income will be from month to month.

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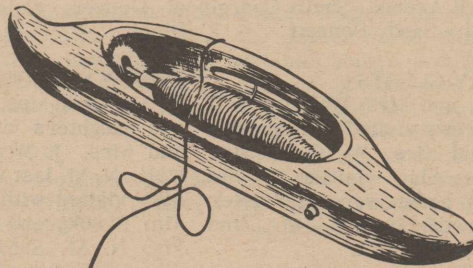

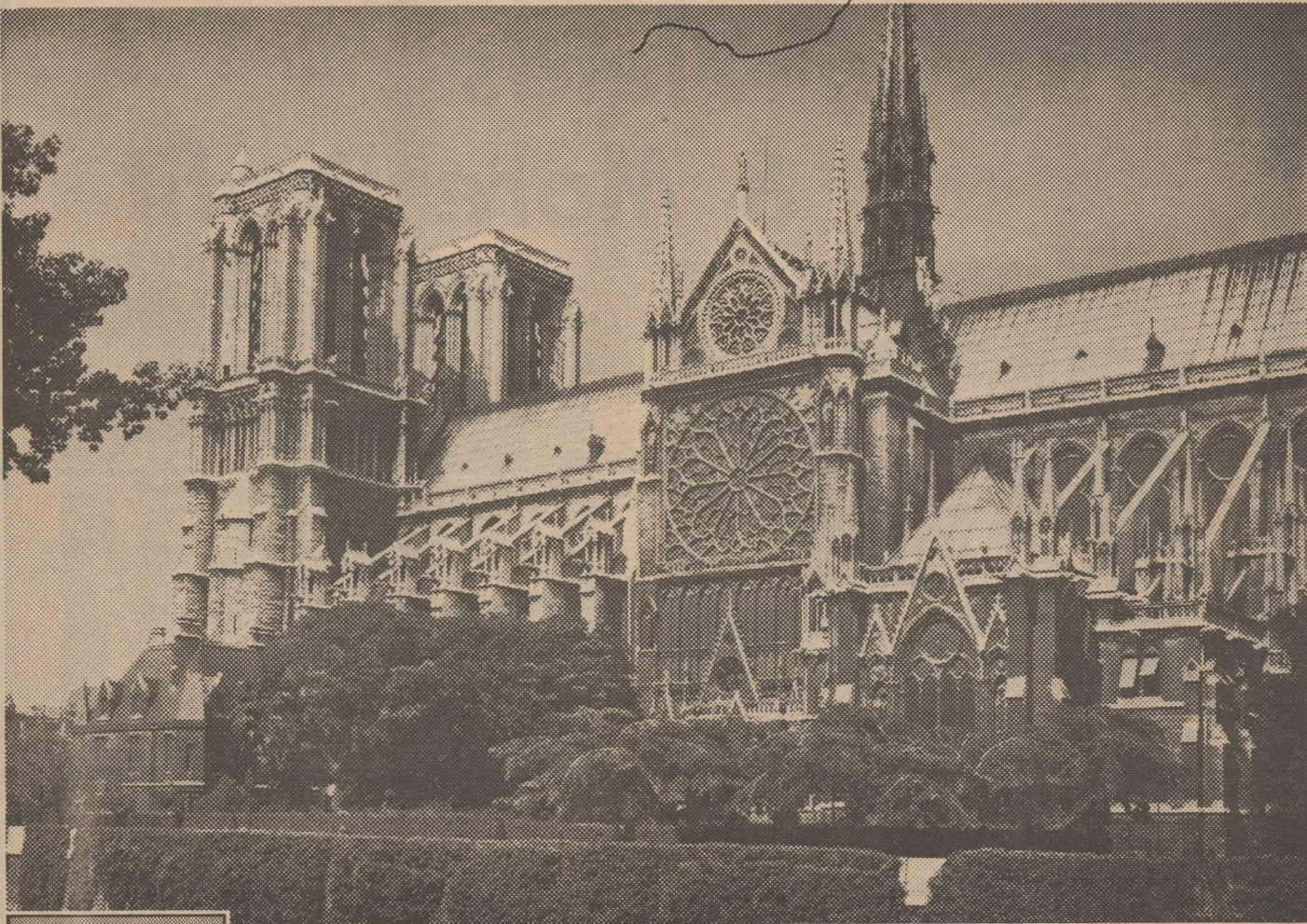
