FORMER POW TELLS OF WAR CHEST'S AID

Testifying to the great work done with funds from the United War Chest, Robert A. Palmer, former flight officer in the United States Army Air Force, told today of some of his observations of the work of American war chest among prisoners in Europe.

Held prisoner by the Germans in several camps in 1943, he had plenty of opportunities to study the activities and has related some of these observations, as proof of the effectiveness of the work.

While in Stalag Luft III, a German prison camp, for aviation personnel, he observed that the Germans had very few medical supplies and that they were in such a state of need that they were forced to use such supplies as they had.

Another case related was that of a paratrooper who had been wounded in the ankle. Gangrene set in and again it was American medical supplies which saved his life. These supplies were furnished by United War Chest funds.

Morris Knight, chairman of the War Chest drive which opens here Tuesday, today urged the people of Ranger to lose sight of the importance of the drive just because the war is over.

"When the War Chest works calls on you, please give generously. Give according to your ability. Our boys did," Knight stated.

LIBERATED PRISONER VISITS HERE

Sgt. Arturo R. Camacho, who was held a prisoner of the Japanese from the fall of Corregidor until he was liberated September 12, 1945, has arrived in Ranger for a visit with his sister, Mrs. Petra Camacho.

When liberated Sgt. Camacho was in a prison camp on Luzon, a tiny island just west of the mainland of Japan about five miles from Olongapo which is about 35 miles from Manila. He stated that when the plane bomb hit Hiroshima, the shock wave felt on the island and that the explosion was much the same as an earthquake. There was a tremendous vibration on the island which caused windows to rattle and buildings to tremble.

He stated that he moved very well at the hands of the Japanese, but added that many of his buddies were cruelly treated. Their food was very poor, and consisted mostly of porridge. He stated that he had seen three times a day and once in a while some soup.

It is his belief that the Japanese people are definitely glad that the war is over and that they were led through it. He stated that Japanese confidence of victory began to wane with the appearance of American planes over Japan.

On a visit to Mr. Camacho and his sister, Mrs. Petra Camacho who has been stationed in El Paso and who is enroute to a camp in Kansas.

It is generally conceded that this drive is equally important with the war loan drives and that this is the American public's opportunity to complete their job at home just as the boys did on the battle fields.

R. E. Garner, manager of the Arcadia theatre, which is serving as an agent for the sale of Victory bonds, stated Saturday that sales at the theatre are pitifully low and the same report was made by A. E. Crawley, postmaster.

POPPIES TO BE ON SALE SATURDAY

"Poppies to honor America's dead warriors of two World Wars will be worn in Ranger on Saturday, Nov. 10. Mrs. Roney Jones, President of the American Legion Auxiliary, announced today.

The little red flowers will pay tribute both to those men who have died for their country in the present war and to those who fell 27 years ago in France as a Belgium among the swaying poppies. The money that is received for the flowers will be used to aid the afflicted veterans of both wars and their families.

Extensive preparations for the observance of Poppy Day are being made by the Unit of the Auxiliary here under the leadership of Mrs. Jones and Mrs. E. W. Gordon, Unit Poppy Chairman. Everyone in the city will be able to buy the flowers of remembrance from the many volunteer workers for the Auxiliary who will be on the streets all through the day.

The flowers are made of crepe paper on the pattern of the wild poppy of Flanders. Making the poppies has helped these veterans keep their minds and fingers occupied, causing the otherwise tedious months to pass quickly and at the same time furnishing the men with a means of livelihood.

ALLEN NO. 1 ENCOUNTERS OIL AND GAS

Oil circles were in a stir Saturday when it was learned that both oil and gas had been encountered in the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company's Allen No. 1 about fourteen and a half miles east of Ranger.

The show encountered between 2995 and 3000 feet and blew in during a drill stem test. The well was being tested Saturday, and officials reported that the well probably will be drilled deeper.

The well is located on the C. E. Allen lease in the J. H. Price survey and is located 200 feet from the south line and 535 feet from the east line.

Interest was also running high in a Keryn Oil Company well near Cisco which was reported to be bailing oil from the Ellenburger limestone. The test is near Nimrod about 7 miles southwest of Cisco in Eastland county. The well is the Keryn's No. 1. Harveston in section number 161 of the H. & T.C. survey, block 3.

R. N. Fix is drilling at 1425 feet on his No. 1 O. J. Coston, six miles west of Ranger in the S. J. Robinson survey. This well will test the Olden shallow pay sand at about 1450 feet.

SALESMANSHIP CLASSES TO OPEN TUESDAY

Miss Floeda Palmer, itinerant instructor with the Industrial and business extension training section of the division of extension of the University of Texas, announced Saturday that classes in salesmanship will be opened Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock at the high school building and any person in business in Ranger who wishes to take the course is eligible to do so.

The classes are being sponsored by the public schools and the Chamber of Commerce and will be held on November 6, 8, 13, 15, and 20. A registration fee of one dollar is the only charge in connection of the course and at the end of the lessons, those who successfully complete the work will be awarded a certificate from the University of Texas. No tests will be given in connection with the course.

Miss Palmer who will give the course has a number of years experience in the business world as well as an instructor and has the respect of both a business person and an instructor.

Chinese Offer To Conciliate With Communists

CHUNGKING (UPI) — The Chinese government submitted 4 apparently conciliatory proposals to communist representatives while opposing troops skirmished and maneuvered for position in north and south China and Manchuria. It was disclosed today.

Minister of Information K. C. Wu announced that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's spokesmen, during the past two days, have made the following proposals to officials of the Yenan - Communist government.

1. That both sides order their troops to stay where they are now. 2. That if communists withdraw 10 kilometers from railways, the government will let railway police guard the rail lines. 3. The government is willing to consult with the communists before using railways for moving of occupation troops. 4. The peoples political council will organize a commission to investigate "the rights and wrongs in China's civil war."

SEND PROTEST TO SECRETARY DARE LEADERS TO CROSS LINE

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A group of independent unions threatened today to "show a picket line" around next week's labor-management conference, to protest the government's failure to invite unaffiliated unions.

Edward G. Wilms, chairman of the independent unions of New Jersey, said he had telegraphed Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach to protest the "brush off" given the many smaller unions which are not affiliated with such national groups as the AFL and CIO.

"John L. Lewis, Philip Murray, William Green and other labor leaders will have to speak in the back door or cross the picket lines in order to be present at the conference," Wilms said. He promised that the picket lines would be there when the conference opens Monday.

Meanwhile, the battle over the new administration wage-price policy raged in intensity, with the administration exerting full pressure to force settlement of disputes by collective bargaining.

The War Labor Board last night returned all wage issues in about 1,000 pending cases to the parties for collective bargaining. The move swept the WLBA's docket clean of all disputes in which the parties can apply the newly amended wage-price policy.

Bigger Market Indicated For Peanut Crop

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 4.—A new market for Texas peanut crop, estimated at 394,000,000 pounds this year, was forecast with an announcement from James A. Stewart, vice president in charge of American Can Company's research and development division, that new canned peanut products are being tested.

Mr. Stewart said that his company's research department has canned experimentally peanut scrapie, peanut sweetbush, baked peanuts and soy beans in tomato sauce, peanut soup and chocolate pudding with peanuts. He added that results of this experimental canning indicate these products can be commercially packed.

The high nutritive value of peanuts, one of the best sources of vitamin B1, together with the nut's widely popular flavor, should create an excellent market for such items, the company official continued. As an indication of the importance of peanuts in the diet of the American soldier, he said that more than 62,000,000 cans of the nuts were supplied the government during the first six months of 1945. During the war the military forces used 100,000,000 cans of peanuts annually.

The can company is continuing its research on canning the peanut in various forms, he said further.

Urges Planting Of Cover Crops To Hold Soil

Many tons of precious topsoil from the peanut fields of Texas will be washed down the river this fall unless farmers plant adapted cover crops just as soon as the peanut crops are harvested.

The removal of the peanut crop leaves the soil wide open to erosion, leaching and wind damage. Farmers just can't afford to allow their fields to go through the winter months without a protection cover of grass or legumes.

Soil from which peanuts have been dug usually is ideal for the planting of cover crops. Fields free from weeds and grass require very little soil preparation. Usually cover crops can be drilled in with no prior soil preparation.

These cover crops while protecting the soil from erosion through the winter can be turned under in the spring as green manure. They add organic matter and fertility to the soil and prepare it for the succeeding crop.

Farmers may obtain further details on the planting of cover crops from their County A A Office, local committees, county agent or other agricultural workers.

WORLD LOOKS TO U.S. FOR HOUSING PLAN

WASHINGTON (UP)—The war's end has precipitated the world into a global housing crisis with the United States the only unscathed nation remaining to lead the rebuilding program, according to Jacob Crane of National Housing Agency.

Crane reported 26 nations have sent their housing experts to study United States planning during the past two years in preparation for a postwar building program. More are on the way with Belgium and France planning to open housing study offices in this country. Great Britain has had such an office for some time, Crane said. Crane explained these agencies have a dual function of gathering ideas and of purchasing construction materials.

He said visiting experts are interested in United States methods of construction and financing, floor planning, materials, and statistical research. Crane believes the United States has seized the lead in housing as in many industries partially because war halted construction in almost every other country.

He acknowledged that the United States public housing system is based on the British and that Russian city planning is greatly advanced. He said the United States has borrowed ideas from these countries as well as from other progressive nations like Sweden and Brazil. "It's a fair exchange," he reported.

Crane predicted postwar housing will emphasize individual homes rather than apartment buildings and group projects wherever possible. Britain, Belgium and the Netherlands he feels, will probably continue to build many terrace or row type dwellings.

Crane's predictions indicated no great revolution in construction materials. He said Belgium and France will continue using brick and tiles as formerly.

Noting that war devastated countries are interested in both temporary and permanent buildings, Crane suggested that the United States developed "land utilities" project could be adapted as a temporary measure in temperate climates where the housing situation is acute.

United States housing experts introduced "land utilities" projects in Puerto Rico as a slum clearance method during the war when construction materials were unavailable. Land was cleared, divided into plots, and provided with sanitary facilities. Squatters and slum dwellers were then allowed to build their own mobile shacks on the site.

Crane pointed out that it is the general housing program that interests most countries, not just slum clearance. He said most governments have realized they must assist in housing programs. He cited examples of Britain, United States and Russia all of which are aiding war veterans to buy or build their own homes.

Crane has been sent to leading cities in Latin America as well as to Britain, France and Italy to consult on their housing programs. During the past two years he has planned tours for and advised housing representatives from more than 25 countries.

Small Towns Had Biggest Per Cent Of Retail Stores

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 3.—Fifty per cent of retail stores in Texas were located in towns of less than 5,000 population during the period 1939-1940, recent statistics prepared by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research show.

In a current series of studies contained in five volumes, titled Texas Retail Trade, the Bureau reports that 18.7 per cent of the retail stores were located in cities of 100,000 or more population.

31.2 per cent were in cities of from five to ten thousand inhabitants, and 50.1 per cent were in towns of less than 5,000.

"Total retail sales in Texas in 1939 amounted to \$1,803,716,000," Mrs. Clara H. Lewis, editor of the study, said. "Of this, 31.2 per cent was for sales reported for

age, and he immediately got a job as shine boy for the Japanese officers.

It was one means of getting more food to eat. Gear made the humiliating march down Manila's Dewey Boulevard to Bilibid prison, and although starving and sick with malaria, he was transferred to Cebu, an hour's ride later. After being taken to four other camps, he finally came to the Shinakawa Hospital.

Here the Japanese experimented with the prisoners taking spinal fluid from them, mixing it with soybean milk and vitamins, and then re-injecting it. Gear said he was to be among the next to be injected before the Japanese got to him.

"Nothing troubles the Jap more so much as shyness, because they have no polish," the sailor said. And that one can be polished by the Red Cross kept in fairly well fed—at least it was enough to live on—during the last terrible months of captivity.

Reorganization Of Agencies To Favor Farmers

The reorganization of Department of Agriculture agencies recently announced by Secretary Anderson, recognizes the effectiveness of farm committees by

giving them additional responsibilities. The reorganization is strictly administrative. It does not affect farm legislation, such as the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act and the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1933 which are still on the books to help farmers deal with farm problems.

It will be some time before streamlining of the activities involved can be completely effective,

since the new P M A consolidates functions previously performed by 14 agencies of the Department of Agriculture. At any rate, administration of the Agricultural Conservation Program, Commodity Loan, crop insurance and milk, butterfat, beef and sheep and lamb payments will continue without change under the elected county committees. Additional functions will be added to the work of county committees as the reorganization plan is processed.

The principal aim of the new organization is to centralize responsibility for USDA farm programs and actions affecting the production, price and marketing of farm products. In the future, farmers will deal with only a single office on these matters... the County Office of their Agricultural Conservation Program (AAA) Committee. The new plan should give better and more direct service to farmers and to the public.

Growth of Steel Industry Traced By Zimmerman

CHICAGO, Nov. 2 — Growth of the American steel industry from a trickle of iron in a furnace in Saugus, Mass., 300 years ago to a producer of vast tonnage and infinite variety was traced here tonight by R. E. Zimmerman, Vice President, Research & Technology, United States Steel Corporation of Delaware, in a speech before a group of physical scientists as part of the celebration of the golden jubilee of the automobile.

Steel, Dr. Zimmerman said, achieved its growth by helping other industries to grow. Among customer industries which increased the variety of their demands for ever-new steel compositions he mentioned the railroads, the automobile, petroleum, electrical and farm equipment manufacturers.

"No single enterprise in America has done more than the automotive industry to inspire the rapid development of numerous alloy steels for mechanical purposes," Dr. Zimmerman commented.

Dr. Zimmerman told how requirements in the petroleum industry have grown more exacting as drillers went deeper and deeper. Special steels also have been developed for refinery service at elevated temperatures, he said.

The final factor which has profound and continuing influence upon both progress and variety in steel, Dr. Zimmerman asserted, is the progressively closer association of science with industry.

Throughout the period of development in the alloy steel field, Dr. Zimmerman said, the carbon steels were the target of intensive metallurgical research because of their vast economic and technical importance. As a result, he added, the carbon steels have become varied, versatile and refined to a degree not even imagined 50 years ago.

FIGHT LOOMS OVER CHARTER FOR TEXAS CIO

SAN ANTONIO (UP) — The Congress of Industrial Organizations opposed today to fight a group of San Antonio businessmen for the use of this labor organization for its own name.

Under terms of a charter granted the Congress of Industrial Organizations, a corporation formed by San Antonio businessmen—labor groups have been forbidden to use the name or the initials CIO in the state of Texas.

The corporation, described as an "educational" organization of Texas industrialists was granted a charter yesterday by the Secretary of State in Austin.

TO STUDY CHARTER

WASHINGTON (UP) — A peace-man for the Congress of Industrial Organizations said today that the national CIO will study the charter granted by Texas yesterday to the "Congress of Industrial Organizations" formed by a group of San Antonio businessmen as an "educational organization."

The Texas charter prohibits the national labor organization from using the abbreviation CIO in the state of Texas.

The national headquarters of the labor organizations said that it had not yet received details on the case. But an official said that "if ever there was a case in which the restraint of equity has for its purpose the deceiving of people, this is it."

The comment was taken to mean that the labor organization would probably contest the right of the businessmen's group to the name. A CIO spokesman charged "this is just one of the many gauds planned to discredit our organization."

Business Still Good Despite Downward Trend

AUSTIN, Texas. — Although there is a current downward trend in Texas business and industrial activity as a whole, in some of the current business, factors still compare favorably with that during the corresponding month a year ago, Dr. F. A. Buechel, economic analyst with the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

He pointed out that dollar sales in 1951 independent stores in Texas during September were 9.5 per cent above those of the same stores in September, 1944, while the cumulative sales of these stores for the year to date exceeded those of the first nine months of 1944 by 9.4 per cent.

"Along the lines of retail trade that made sharp gains over September last year were lumber and building material establishments with a gain of 31 per cent," Dr. Buechel said. "Also, shoe stores showed an increase of 2 per cent; and gains in filling stations, women's specialty shops and motor vehicle establishments amounted to 18.3 per cent, 13.4 per cent, and 11.4 per cent respectively."

Building permits in more than 40 Texas towns and cities amounted to more than ten million dollars during September, which was more than four times the total for the same month in 1944.
