Allred Carries County And State Run-Off Ballot Schools Of Perryton District Will Open Tuesday, September 11 Cattle Buying Continues With Purchase 933 Head In County

ROUTH RELIEF PROGRAM NETS \$12,205 HERE

Phase 483 Head First Three Days Of This Week Valued At \$5,923.00

Tuesday Is Delivery Day

Must Be Owned Since April 1 To Come Under Buying Program

Following the plan outlined by the State Department, the inspectors and appraisers spent Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in Ochiltree county, buying the cattle offered for sale under the Emergency Routh Relief act and purchased head, valued at \$5,923.00, bringing the total for the county to date 483 cows purchased, worth \$12,205.

In order to speed up the delivery of these cattle and serve more problems each Tuesday afternoon is made for the buying of cattle trucks at the stock pens. This buying will be held at 4:30 o'clock and all cattle that have been signed will be eligible for sale any Tuesday evening.

Some reports have come to the county agents office that certain men have been buying cattle and offering them for sale to the government in a few days after the purchase. This is a violation of the act and any violator will be punished accordingly.

The seller of cattle to the government must have owned the cattle since April 1, 1934, the present time, or in case of calves, from birth. The route of the inspectors for this week are being made up and will be mailed out. Monday, September 3, the appraisers will work the southwestern part of the county for J. L. Flowers, C. S. McLaughlin, C. E. Bryant, Dave Williams, J. G. Flowers and W. L. Pope. On Tuesday and Wednesday will be in the northwest part of county.

At date there have been about 483 head of cattle that have not been appraised and are being held out as fast as the appraisers make the rounds. The attention of the producers is called to the fact that they can get up the work on their herds by the program in general by having the animals offered for sale in the separate pens, one for calves, for yearlings and the other pen animals of two years or more.

WOMEN'S HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUBS OF COUNTY HOLD ANNUAL EXHIBIT

The Women's Home Demonstration clubs of Ochiltree county will hold their annual county exhibit on September 6-7-8, with public showing on the final day. This is the second annual exhibit since the starting of the home demonstration work in this county on July 1, 1933.

On Thursday, September 6, the women plan to arrange booths while on the following day the products and booths will be judged. On Saturday, the exhibit will be open for the public to see.

The exhibit this year will be of interest to everyone. The exhibits will include vegetables, fruits, preserves, pickles, preserves, jellies and dried products in bulk. Other than food products, home made rugs, bed spreads, towels, quilts, dresser scarfs, dresses, scrap-books and soap will be exhibited.

The education exhibits will be placed by each club. Some of the local merchants will have exhibits on canning equipment and the like. The judges for the exhibits will be Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, Canadian Home Demonstration agent, and Miss Ruby Adams, Pampa Home Demonstration agent.

The women's Home Demonstration council will have a special called meeting Saturday, September 1 at 1:30 o'clock to make final plans and arrangements for the exhibit. It is very important that each club have a representative at this meeting. The labels for canned products will be distributed and the clubs will draw for booths.

The exhibit last year was held in December, this being necessary because the work started so late in the year.

ALLRED TO BE NEXT GOVERNOR OF THE STATE

Carries Ochiltree County By Vote Of 471 To 396 In Saturday Primary

Light Vote Is Recorded

Only 777 Voters In County Turn Out For Selections On State Ticket

With no county races on the second primary ballot, Ochiltree county voters took slight interest in the state run-off ticket and only about half the voting strength was accounted for in the election held Saturday.

The result of the county ballot showed a preference for Allred in the governor's race, with 471 in his favor as compared to 396 for Hunter. Only one voting precinct in the county, Huntoon, failed to give Allred a lead in the election.

The results of other candidates on the short ballot were: For Lieutenant Governor, Woodul 453, Moore 245; for Attorney General Woodward 550, McCraw 180; for Railroad Commissioner, Smith 432, Pundt 282; and for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Sharp 365, Lattimore 315. Complete unofficial returns by voting precincts can be found on another page of this issue of the Herald.

Over the state, Allred is maintaining a lead over Hunter by 44,346 votes and is assured of the gubernatorial nomination, on the face of returns from 252 out of the state's 254 counties, with 221 complete. The final count represented a total vote of 948,746 with an estimated 12,000 votes remaining untallied in the unofficial count. Of this total Allred received 496,546 with Hunter totaling 452,200. Walter Woodul received a majority for Lieutenant Governor, William McCraw for attorney general, Lon A. Smith for railroad commissioner and John H. Sharp for supreme court justice.

For the first time in four years the Tri-State Fair will have a full representation in the implement sheds.

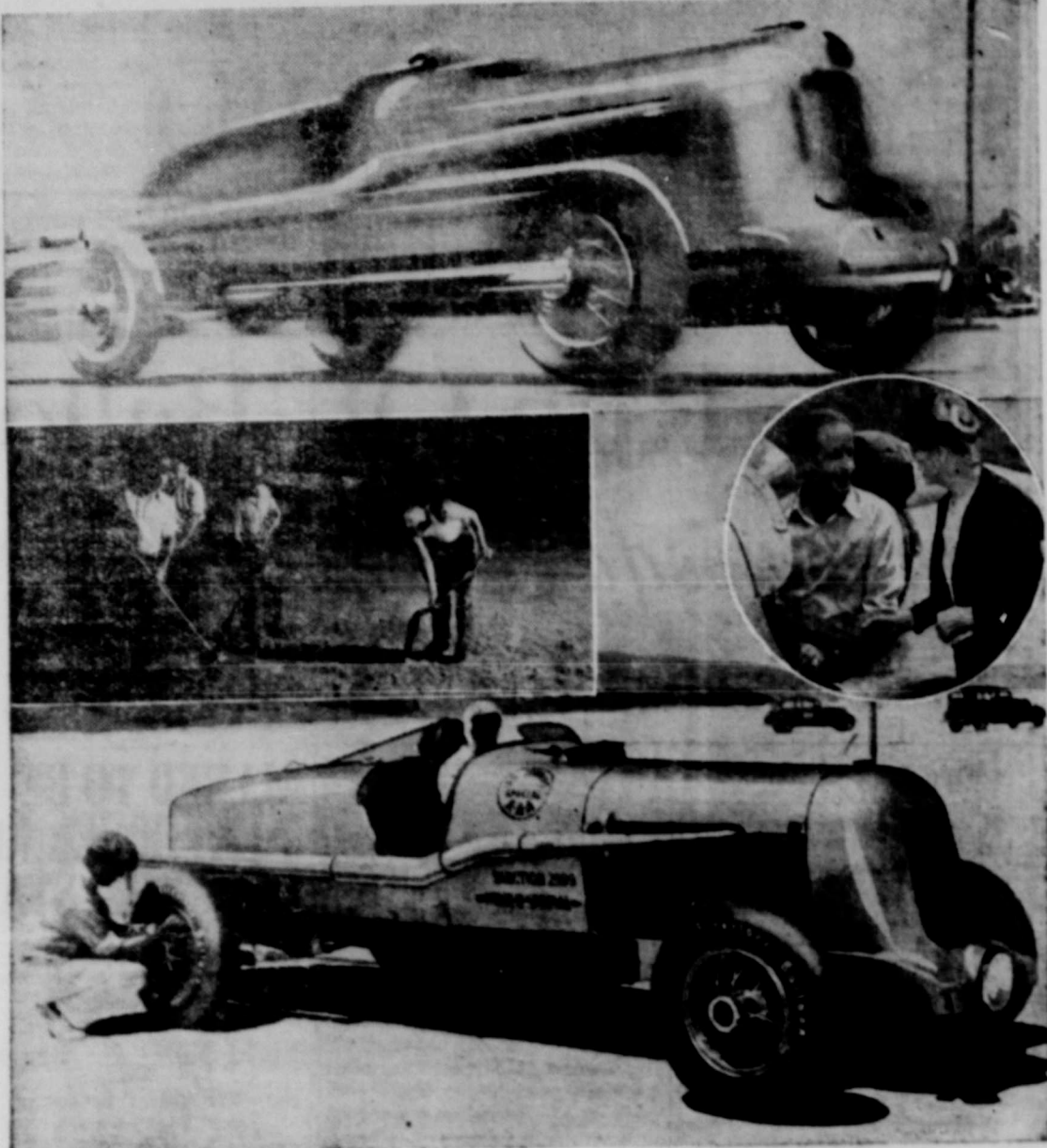

Records Fall as Ab Jenkins Speeds More Than 3000 Miles in 24 Hours



Ab Jenkins, veteran speed king, shattered 77 world, international and A.A.A. speed records in his recent 24-hour run on the hot salt desert at Lake Bonneville, Utah. Jenkins is shown above hurtling through space at an average speed of 127.2 miles per hour including all stops for a distance of more than 3,000 miles, — through the

scorching heat of the day, and the black of the night, with temperatures as high as 120 degrees. The inset at the left shows workers on the desert. Previous to the run, holes on the course had been filled with crushed rock as hard as granite with knife-like edges. At the right Jenkins is shown receiving congratulations of his proud mother.

The lower photograph shows a tire check-up of the big 2 1/2-ton 240-horsepower machine by E. Walde Stein, Firestone field representative who saw the tires, battery and spark plugs made by his company come through this greatest of all endurance runs without trouble of any kind.

ON TEXAS FARMS

That trench silos came into their own this year is indicated by reports from every section of the State. The one of six Jackson county farmers who salvaged their perishing corn crops by making silage of it is typical. So satisfactory was the resulting feed that each of these men plan to plant a crop for silage in the future.

Shortage of feed isn't a trouble of "grown ups" all by themselves. It affected Leonard West, El Paso county youthful pigeon raiser, and made him decide to dispose of his flock of 500 birds. The market wasn't encouraging so he canned 250 of them under the supervision of Miss Irma Sealy, home demonstration agent.

Subirrigation has an advocate in Mrs. J. L. McElroy, member of the Cliff home demonstration club in Schleicher county, who has enjoyed fresh tomatoes right through the worst of the drought. "It doesn't take as much water or labor. We have tomatoes of the same varieties and age undersurface irrigation and they are not yet bearing," she said.

Baylor county has gone for garden subirrigation 10,520 feet strong. Seventy-six families have put down that much tile, one family as much as 500 feet. A speed of 100 tile per day was attained by a great many men of these families, and one boy who made them for sale became so good that he could turn out 300 daily.

Wild and excited cries of food shortages should be stilled when it is learned that the 1934 pack of commercially canned vegetables plus carryover stocks is expected to be 15 percent more than that of 1933 and only 7 percent less than the five-year average when there were great surplus supplies. Home canning figures will also probably show an increase over 1933 as these figures have followed a rising curve for several years.

Some watering, careful cultivation after the watering and a mulch of barnyard manure are factors in the success with shrubs which Mrs. H. N. Harrison of Kleberg county is enjoying in spite of the drought. She has used many native shrubs that are drought resistant which have helped, but responsible for her "good luck" more than any of these items she regards the fact that she started with prepared shrub beds with the soil thoroughly pulverized.

In the fall of 1933 Clyde Keeney of Eldorado put up the first trench silo of feed ever to be stored in Schleicher county. "Proof of the pudding was in the eating" and the only trouble he had with his livestock in relation to this feed was keeping them off the wagon while he was scattering it. Last year he stored 2700 bundles of feed in the trench. This year's plans are to put up ten or fifteen thousand bun-

dles if the drought permits. Two trench silos were dug in Brazoria county in 1932. This year there are 75 in use in that county. The two in 1932 carried about 15 tons of silage. In less than three full years this amount has increased to approximately 11,250 tons.

PLAN AID IN FEED SHORTAGE SITUATION

COLLEGE STATION.—Every available help that the agencies of A and M College can give to aid the State in the existing feed shortage will be made immediately available according to plans made here. To this end a meeting was held in the Experiment Station conference room, presided over by A. B. Conner, director, at which various phases of the situation were presented by members of the Experiment Station, the Extension Service and the College teaching staff.

With this pooling of information it was decided to line up and get before the public facts relating to the problem in the order of their immediate importance. The conservation of hay and other roughage now standing in the fields, will be treated by C. N. Shephardson, in charge of dairy husbandry. Cotton plants and burs as feed, Dr. G. S. Praps, State Chemist will work on. Fall forage planting in South Texas and small winter grains for grazing will be handled by Dr. P. C. Mangeldorf, agronomist. Fall forage for the central section of the State and legumes for winter plant-

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Urge Culling Herds

or Dairy Stock Cannot Pay Feeding Bill Oklahoma Specialist Asserts

Stillwater, Okla.—Still another reason why dairymen should cull their herds, getting rid of the less productive cows, is found by John Boehr, extension dairyman, Oklahoma dairyman, Oklahoma A. and M. college, in the drought.

The hot, dry summer has reduced pastures to far below normal and damaged all grain, hay and other crops so that the dairyman faces not only high feed prices for a short supply, but prices for dairy products which are still low to moderate. Among advantages to be found in culling, Boehr points out:

Enough feed can be produced for a small herd on the farm. But if a large part of the feed is bought, very few herds can pay a profit above feed cost.

If a dairyman removes the poor producers, even if half his herd, and sells them even for a ridiculously low price, he is still ahead because he saves the cost of feed, about \$40 a cow a year and gets some cash. In one herd, Boehr found a very profitable cow, but the other six in the barn all were "boarders" who ate up the profits of the good cow. If the farmer had given away the six cows, he would have profited by saving enough to feed the good cow five or six years. Labor, housing and other costs are lowered by culling. If only profitable cows had been kept, we would have had no surplus of dairy products to depress the price for all dairy products.

Through records of butterfat produced and feed consumed by each individual cow in the herd, made possible by testing in dairy herd improvement associations at low cost to the farmer members, accurate culling of the herd is made possible, Boehr pointed out. In addition, more economical production is obtained through feeding in correct proportion to production and the herd may be improved by keeping the better animals for feeding.

DON'T ABANDON CATS

Thousands of tourists are let the cat out of the bag, much to the detriment of wild life, according to the officials of the American Game Association. Leaving on vacation, these thoughtless persons put their pet cats in paper bags and abandon them along the highways in remote sections, leaving the cat to scratch out and live off the land. The domestic cat reverts to the wild over night and destroys an incalculable number of wildfowl, principally birds and rabbits. Humane societies will mercifully destroy unwanted cats. Why penalize wildfowl, sportsmen ask, and declare they will kill all stray cats found in the wild. Please don't abandon cats in the country, officials of the association plead.

The sneers and jibes against the banker which for so long a time have been gradually appearing, will it ever be possible to measure what the unreasoning bias and criticisms have done to America? Bruce Barton has said squarely on the head of the following statement: "The banker has been flooded with money and wisecracks against him. Most of these are not true and their influence is unfortunate. America will pay a heavy price in the future if it now allows its bankers and banks to be undermined."

and denunciations at political meetings and loose talk in high and low regarding banker banking did more to break down the financial structure of our country than any inherent fault in banking system.

Bankers Lost Before Depositors. The most always remember that a depositor lost a dollar, the banker lost his all. Deposits in banks are again mounting, proving conclusively that the bank is not an enemy, useless institution; that again as confidence in it is restored, the necessities of the people compel its patronage. We are not but steadily moving out of the trough of despond. People are looking forward.

It is the emotional reaction to the depression is no longer gainers, we are beginning to look at ourselves and our circumstances with some degree of composure. The very distresses of our people situation have pierced complacency.

The chief factors that mold public opinion have become more rational and have begun to realize the utility of uninformed expression. We are beginning to see that unreasoning all is a lack of information.

It will even now go forward with intellectual courage? Will we allow, as a people, in our half-truths, our half-information, our wronging after false gods, our untrained intelligence, our inadequate training can solve the problems of our social order. There is the undiscovered land that calls to the explorer. Therein is the life of democracy.

FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD FINDS BANKING BETTER

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A review of the Federal Reserve Board indicates that the condition of operating banks, particularly in country districts, has improved in recent months, as shown by the fact that the banks have been able to reduce their indebtedness to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and to others.

The July bulletin of the board in reviewing these findings says: "At the same time progress has been made in making available to member banks funds that had been tied up in closed banks."

Banks in financial centres have been out of debt to the Federal Reserve Banks for a long time and in other parts had a large volume of reserves. At the beginning of the year there were still many banks throughout the country, however, that carried a considerable load of indebtedness.

Country Banks Reflect Improvement. The liquidation of indebtedness to these banks reflects in part improvement in business conditions and the consequent ability of members to repay bank loans which had been frozen. It constitutes strengthening of the banking position.

The board pointed out that the condition of member bank indebtedness has been continuous since the spring of 1932 except for a brief period during the banking crisis in the spring of 1933. The review said: "The 1932 liquidation of indebtedness of member banks to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation was accompanied by an increase of their borrowings from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. In the past year and a half, however, indebtedness of member banks to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation has also been reduced."

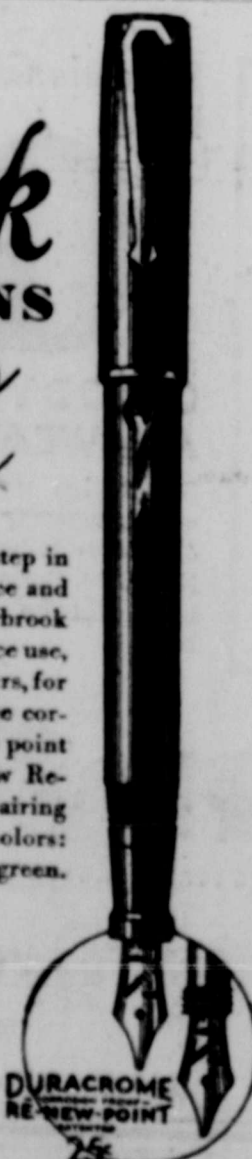

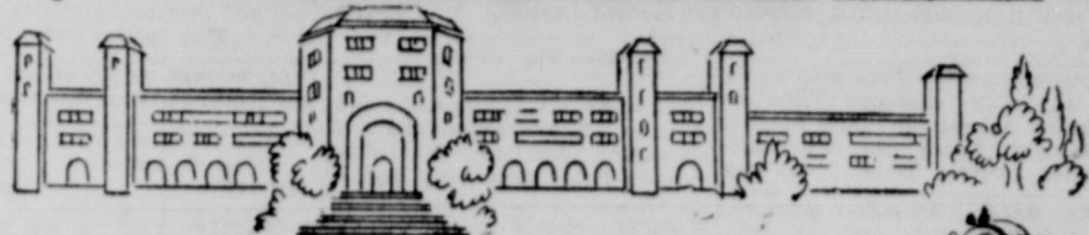

In the afternoon the Junior and Senior High school teachers of the Perryton school will begin classification of students. The rural teachers will get their schools in readiness for the opening Tuesday morning.

TEXAS CATTLE HERDS DWINDLE

EXPECT TO REDUCE CATTLE BY TWO MILLIONS IN U. S. BUYING DRIVE

Austin, Texas.—Representatives of the Texas Southwest Cattle Raisers' Association, the Gulf Coast Cattle Raisers' Association, the drouth relief service, Bureau of Animal Industry, State Livestock Sanitary Commission and railroads met at Houston Wednesday to coordinate the cattle buying program in Texas and attempt to inform the public generally of the problems of the program.

C. Z. Crain, head of the surplus commodities department of R. D. McCrum, cattle movement supervisor of the Texas Relief Commission, attended the meeting from Austin. Explaining the county quota basis, Crain said it was necessary to limit the shipments from each county to 450 head per week in order to avoid congestion at pens and processing plants. He explained that the processing plants can handle only about 70,000 head of cattle per day at capacity. At the same time, Crain said he had been assured from Washington that the buying program will be continued "until the emergency has been met."

To farmers and ranchmen whose herds have not yet been reached Crain declared that the program will continue until every cattle raiser has had a chance to sell the animals he wishes to cull from his herd.

As a result of the government's program, the cattle population of Texas, estimated at near 7,000,000, is expected to be reduced by approximately 2,000,000. Already, some 600,000 head have been shipped from the state.

Under the quota arrangement, the most acute cases of distressed cattle are to be handled first, Crain said. In addition to the 450 head for shipping purposes, condemnations of cows unfit for shipment will bring the total sales per county per week up to approximately 650 head. One visit to a pasture doesn't necessarily mean that it is the last. After animals hardest hit by the drouth have been eliminated, federal agents may return later to buy other undesirable animals, and further reduce the surplus.

Crain again asked cattle owners to bear in mind that field representatives are working just as fast as quotas will allow them and that every effort will be made to reach distressed herds.
