

Local Sales Tax Figures Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$115.2 million in local sales tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check for \$17.7 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$141.1 million,

up four percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$13.4 million for a 1985 total of \$104.7 million, a 13 percent increase.

San Antonio received \$7.4 million, pushing 1985 payments to \$52.7 million, up 14 percent over last year.

Locally, Mount Pleasant received \$137,651.61 for a 9.47% increase over last year while Talco received a payment of \$3,202.18, making the 1985 payments to date total \$22,361.84, showing a 2.23% increase from last year's payments.

Blossom received \$1,454.75, marking an 11.42% increase over the 1984 payments for the same period. Totals to date are \$12,662.64 for Blossom.

Deport received \$1,635.25, a 12.56% increase over payments last year of \$8,619.55. 1985 payments to date total

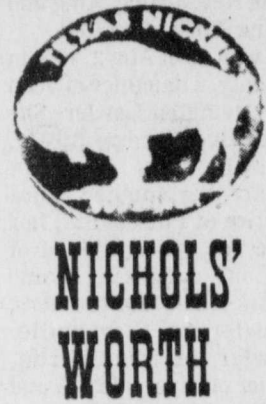
\$9,701.85.

Paris received \$248,686.95, an 8.41% increase over last year.

Bogata received a check for \$3,149.75 for an 8.39% increase over the 1984 payment of \$2,781.24. Total

payments to date are \$22,786.75.

Clarksville received \$25,796.81 for a 4.19% increase over last year while Detroit received \$1,187.70 for a 36.40% increase over last years total of \$5,884.44 to date.

Rebels Drop Tough Bi-District

The Rivercrest Rebels played a hard ballgame Friday night in Mt. Vernon against the Quitman Bulldogs. The Bulldogs took the victory 35-0 in bi-district competition.

The Rebel team wasn't supposed to get into the playoffs at all this year. They deserve a lot of credit for their performance during the season. Freshman quarterback Bradley Woods made an impressive start in his high school football career. He showed he could run the ball as well as complete passes. The Rebel defense has also done a tremendous job this year in containing their opponents.

The Quitman Bulldogs ranked sixth in the state, proved to be just too good Friday as they scored time after time. The team did have some problems with the Rebels, however, as they forced fumbles and intercepted passes. Bradley Wood intercepted one pass in the Bulldog endzone to prevent a Quitman score. Wade Smith also made an interception in the final period to stop a Bulldog drive. The Rebels forced three fumbles by a team that doesn't usually make them.

Rivercrest came closer to scoring on the Bulldogs than any team they played this year. The Quitman boys had to stay on their toes all the way through to keep from making costly mistakes.

Jeery Belcher and Clint Stephenson were called on time after time to carry the ball. They gathered respectable yardage figures. Fumbles and penalties hampered the Rebels early in the contest. The rain-soaked field added to the Rebs problems Friday night.

A costly fumble on the Rebel 22 set up the first Quitman score with 7:21 left in the first period.

Bradley Woods got off to a good start on their next drive with the aid of a roughing the kicker penalty by the Bulldogs. He completed two passes to Tony Jasso and completed a 23-yarder to Chris Anderson. Clint

Stephenson made a good run gaining 39 yards on the play. The Rebs failed to make the first down and turned the ball over on the one.

The Bulldogs with the aid of two long pass completions, put another score on the board with 7:11 remaining in the half. Their extra point kick was good for a 14-0 lead.

The Rebel defense tightened up and closed off the Bulldog ground game. The two team spunted the ball back and forth for the rest of the first half. Quitman ran one punt back for a touchdown, but it was called back because of an illegal block by the Bulldogs.

The halftime score stood at 14-0.

Quitman added another score with the help of a 29 yard quarterback keeper by Raymond Peek. Two plays later the Bulldogs carried into the endzone. The extra point was good for a lead of 21-0.

Bradley Woods proved he was just as valuable on defense, as he pulled down an interception in the endzone to save a Quitman touchdown. The Rebels took over on the 20 but had to punt the ball away as the Rebs passing game couldn't connect with the receivers.

Wade Smith pulled down an interception early in the fourth period to give the ball back to the Rebels. Jimmy Lewis went in as quarterback to free Bradley Woods as a running back. The Rivercrest squad couldn't get things going against the tough Quitman boys, however, and were forced to punt the ball away.

The Bulldogs went into the endzone again with 6:36 left in the game. They led 28-0 following the extra point kick. They scored one more time with 3:17 remaining to bring the final tally.

Terry Giddens, head coach for the Rebels, allowed some of his younger players to get some playoff experience during the final period. The Quitman coach, however, left his starters in for most of the game, despite his large lead.

Please, everyone cooperate with this and get the town cleaned up as it will be the last chance before next spring.

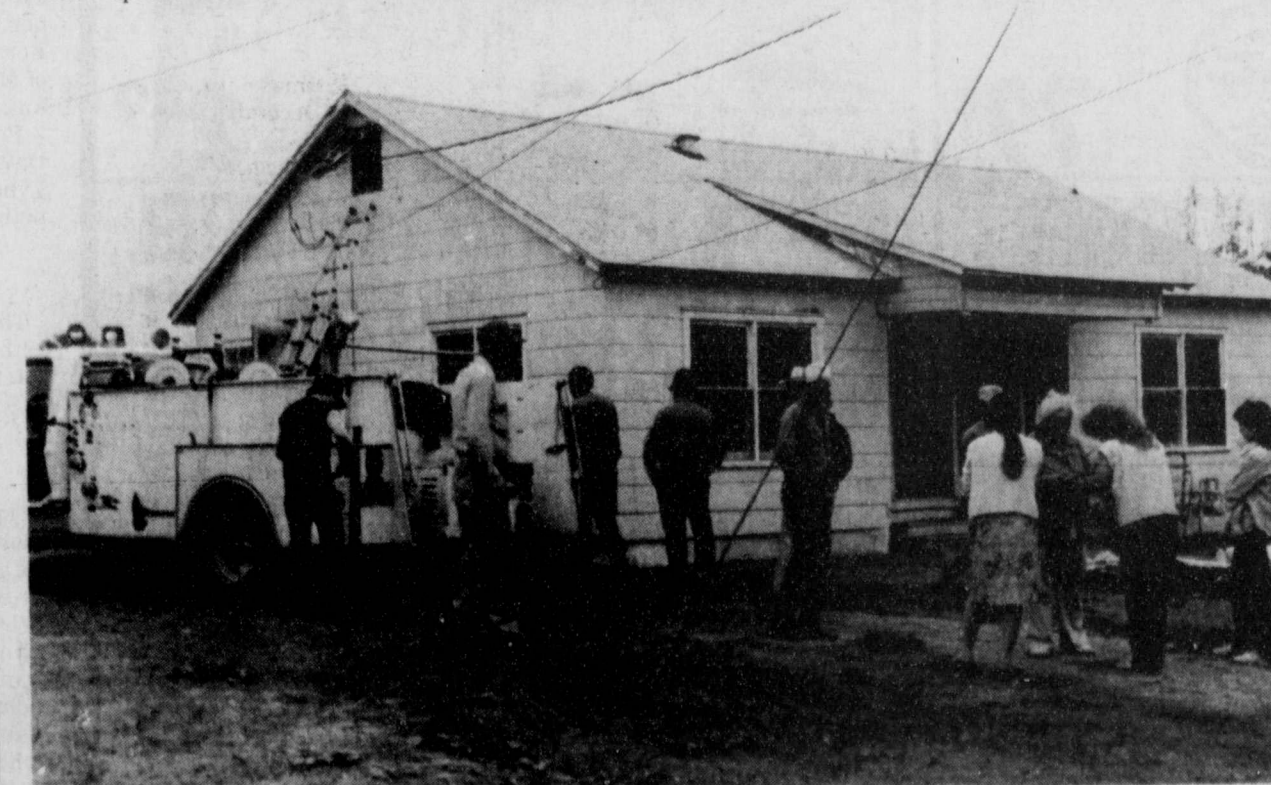
Thanksgiving Service Scheduled

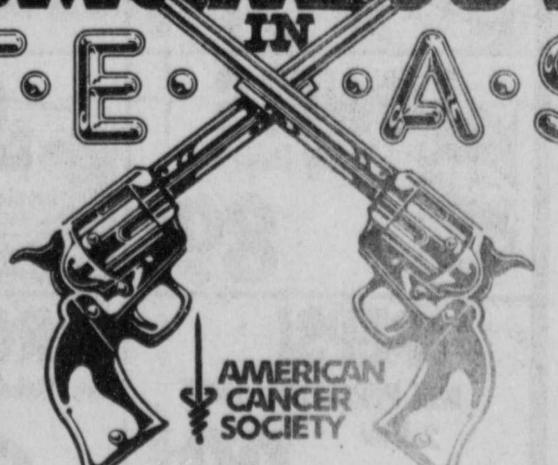
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Pictures, Stories Still Needed

October 11 Mrs. Pokie Whitby of Joliet joined a Trovco group at Los Angeles airport for a 23 day tour of the South Pacific.

The first stop was the island of Tahiti and the town of Papeete where they toured the island and visited the Gauguin Museum and their ship harbor. Next stop was the Bora Bora Island where the people are under the French government. There are mostly English speaking people who also speak Mavri language which consist of only 14 letters of the alphabet. From Bora Bora they went to Cook Islands to the village Rarotongan resort where they enjoyed the shore line drive and a traditional native feast called "Umakai" in the home of the MacQuarie's. The overnight flight to Aitutaki Islands where they took a lagoon cruise to an uninhabited island and returned by same course. Next flight was to Melbourne Australia where they toured the Fitzroy

Gardens and Captain Cook's cottage. Captain James Cook is credited for discovering the Cook Islands and New Zealand. They flew from Melbourne to Canberra, which is the capital of Australia. The city was designed by Chicago architect Walter Burley Griffin in the year 1912. A coach tour took them on the Embassy Row where the tour guide pointed out the Americana Embassy. Leaving Canberra for Sydney where they visited the Sydney Opera House which is built over the water in the bay. A coach drive took them to the area of Manly which has many bathing beaches. At Mid-day they boarded the sail boat Sydney for a picnic lunch and a sail around Sydney Harbor. Then a visit to the Kaola sanctuary where they saw the red and grey kangaroos, wombats, Kaola Bears and Dingo Dogs. Next was the flight from Sydney to Christchurch, New Zealand where they took a coach tour of the city to see the beautiful landscape yards and gardens and crossed the famous Little Avon River. By motorcoach they traveled on to Melford Sound, where neither words nor pictures can capture the overwhelming beauty and majesty of this place. There they took a 2 hour boat tour to the opening of the Tasmanian sea. On to Rotorua by plane where they were entertained by a Maori Concert. A tour through the famous thermal area of Whakarewarewa, which is boiling mud pools and steaming geysers. Then they visited a Maori village where local people use thermal activity for domestic purposes. On to the Agrodome where they were entertained by performing sheep which was a

live stage show. On to Auckland and another bus tour along the harbors where they saw the ship "Greenpeace" that was sunk by the French recently, they also visited the Art Museum. Next day they departed for the island of Fiji and the town of Nandi where they took a bus tour of Fiji Coral Coast to Nakabuta Village they also visited the farmers market. A flight to Suva took them to the Orchid Island to see the exhibits of the Melanesian Cultures, returning to Nandi in the afternoon.

On all of the islands they enjoyed the native feast and entertainment dressed in their native costumes and the drums.

The last day at Nandi was a day of leisure before the evening flight back to Los Angeles.

On their return they crossed the Equator and Dote Line and arrived in Los Angeles November 3 and Mrs. Whitby returned home November 7.
