Black-Eyed Susan Salad
Place a crisp lettuce leaf on each salad plate; a slice of pineapple on lettuce; one-half of apricot on each slice of pineapple. In the center of the apricot place a fresh canned prune. Pour over this a dressing made of 6 tablespoons of French dressing, 2 tablespoons of orange juice, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, mixed together with a spoon.

Apricot Ice Cream
1 No. 2 1/2 cup of peeled apricots in syrup, 3/4 cup water, 1 package orange jello, 1/4 teaspoon salt. Drain the syrup from the apricots and 3/4 cup of water; heat to the boiling point; add package of orange jello and salt. Mash apricots fine then add to the first mixture. Set in Keweenaw until cool. When cool fold in 1 pint of whipped cream; pour in trays and freeze.

Devil's Food Cake
2 cups white sugar, 1/2 cup butter. Cream sugar and butter thoroughly. Add 3 whole eggs, one at a time and beat until sufficiently creamy; add 1/2 cup buttermilk and 1/2 cup melted chocolate. Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon of baking powder, 1 teaspoon of soda. Add alternately with one cup hot water with the grated rind of one orange. Place in oven in three layers at 400 degrees and turn the gas down so that the oven is at 300 degrees and bake for 25 minutes.

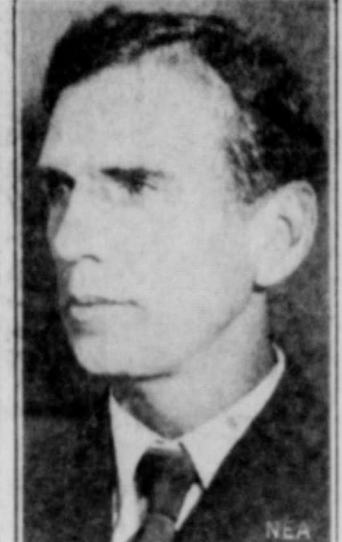

ANOTHER SENATOR DIES IN HARNESS

Senator Robert B. Howell of Nebraska died in harness. He was a regular republican. He was serving his second term. He was an authority on utilities. He had a long and honorable career as a public servant at home before he was elected to the senate. His successor will be a democrat, appointed by Governor Charles W. Bryan. This will give the democrats 60 senators of the 96 membership of that very august body. Thomas J. Walsh's successor will be a democrat.

All of which is a reminder that The Austin American carried a remarkable front page article in a recent issue. It carried this caption: "What About the Next Six Months?" It was bristling with readable ideas and remarkable facts. It dealt with the gold standard and the \$20,000,000,000 worth of bonds and other obligations with gold interest and gold principle at the rate of 26 grains to the dollar as per the contract made by the government when it sold the bonds and issued gold certificates. It was a reminder that private debtors owe billions of dollars, that property values have been reduced to the minimum, and that there is not gold enough in the world and has never been sufficient to pay these obligations of the debtor class in gold at the present valuation as fixed by the few nations now on the gold standard. There are many western senators. Almost to a man later along in the year these senators are going to have something to say about silver and its remonetization. They are organizing. They are perfecting their plans.

What will the harvest be when the national lawmakers begin their grinding at the regular session of this democratic congress with an overwhelming majority in senate and house?

CHAMPIONS OF SILVER ARE BUSY

Silver is bobbing up again. It may bob up very aggressively in the near future. Silver champions plan to place before President Roosevelt their plea that the white metal be used to get more hard money into circulation as part of the administration's permanent banking statute. Senator Dill of the State of Washington has re-introduced his bill authorizing the government to buy in the open market \$250,000,000 in silver "to remove the surplus known to be in the metal marts of the world." Senator Dill is very clear about the purpose of his bill: "It is but the first step in an immediate proposition to restore silver; that when this is done then we will be in a position to say to England and India and the other silver countries that they must help us maintain silver and hold up its price through international agreement prohibiting dumping of the metal and debasement of silver currency."

Senator Key Pittman of Nevada is the president pro tem of the august body known as the upper branch of Congress. He is a champion of silver and will go all the road. Those who know the plans of the Lone Eagle of Idaho predict that he will speak for the white metal and its partial restoration as the running mate of gold as a stabilizing medium—intended for use in the silver using nations of the Orient and Latin-American nations.

DID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK

The state legislature had adjourned for the day and many of its members were in the lobby, most of them in little groups discussing this and that. Many of them are men who, from newspaper reports, spend much time on the floor of the House and Senate fighting each other. But as you see them this evening, meeting in a social way, they seem quite friendly. It may be just the calm before another storm tomorrow! Among them are several newspaper men who are members of the legislature. They lend a dignity to the body that one cannot help but observe.

I noticed James E. Barrett, managing director of the Biltmore, passing from group to group with a welcoming smile and a hand-shake here and there.

Like the average members of all legislatures, most of them try to do the best they can for the state as a whole, but, of course, being just human many of them make some awful mistakes.

Wells Maintaining Levels of Lakes

ST. PAUL.—Water, forty-four hundred millions gallons of it, is used every year to maintain the levels of 12 lakes in Ramsey county.

The water is pumped from deep wells, ranging from 450 to 690 feet in depth, to combat nature with its droughts.

The restoration of lake levels was begun in 1924 at White Bear lake and has continued every year since that time. The yearly flowage of artificial additions to the 12 A T & S F Ry lakes is 4,400,000,002 gallons at a cost of \$26,450, or \$6 per million gallons.

Modern Dairy Methods Explained

The following article, written for the Ranger Times by Bob Montgomery, manager of the Oakwood Jersey Dairy, explains how a modern dairy is kept sanitary and the milk kept at a high standard.

Have you visited your dairyman?

Do you approve of the conditions under which your milk is produced?

To the many citizens of Ranger who wish to know why Cream-Kist milk is demanded by so many homes, we wish to say, our loyal customers have made an investigation of the methods of production here in the dairy.

They found our tubercle-tested, registered Jersey cows in fine condition, being cared for in sanitary barns and clean carrels and drinking fresh well water.

We use the electric milker, finding it more sanitary than hand-milk and each cow's udder and teats are washed and sterilized just before being milked.

Milk is airtight and cooled to a low temperature immediately after milking then bottled and capped by machine and delivered to you cold for safety.

All dairy utensils and bottles are thoroughly washed and sterilized again just before using.

Our milk house is kept fresh; painted, always free of flies and unpleasant odors.

The employees of this dairy are given a physical examination every six months by our city health officer.

To produce Cream-Kist milk we spend both labor and money. We could produce cheaper milk but we would not call it Cream-Kist.

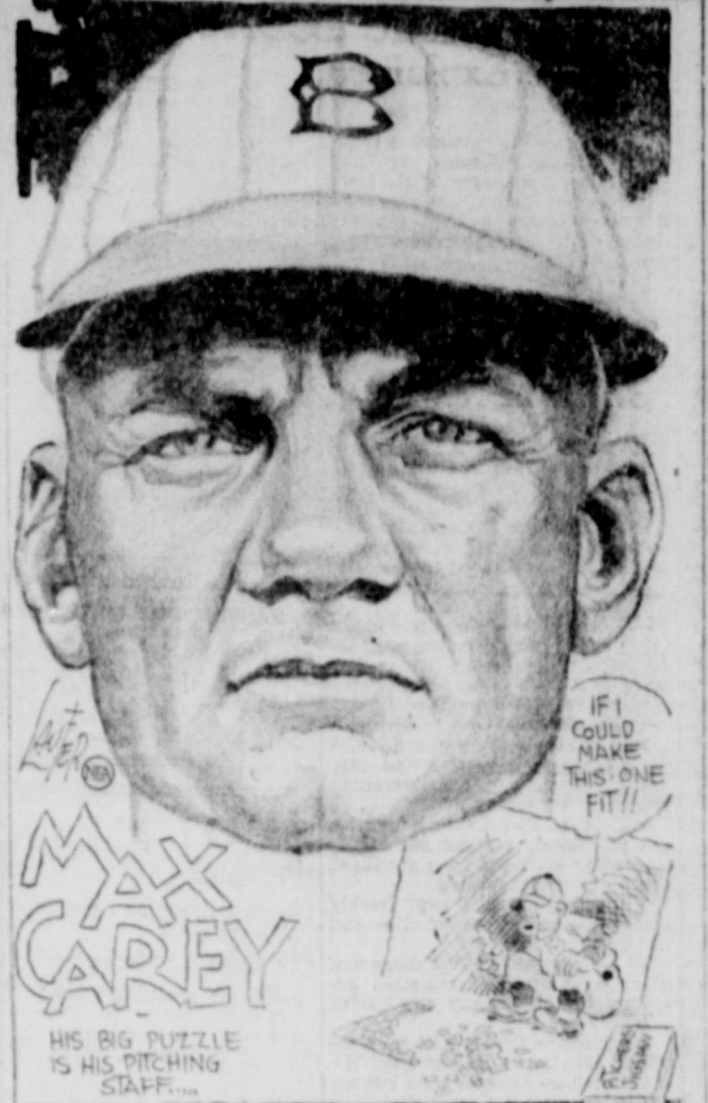

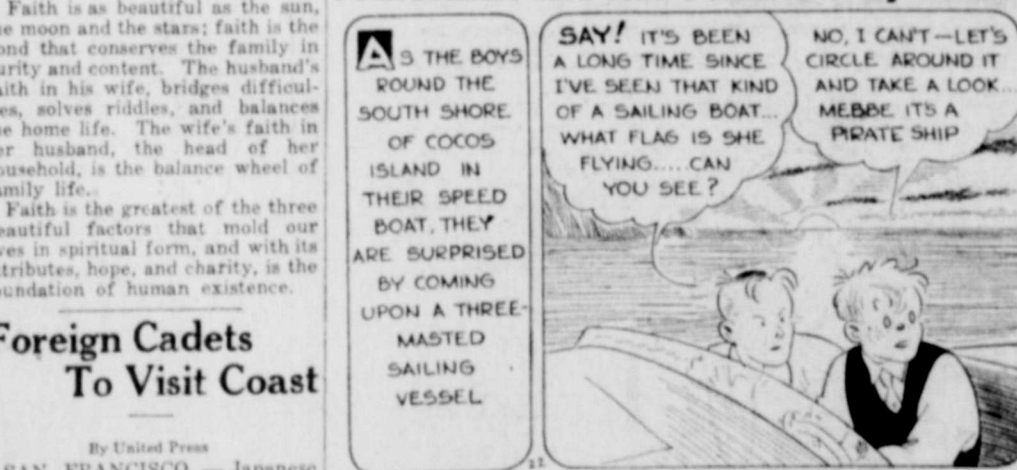

1933 Frenchmen Are Healthier

By United Press

PARIS.—That the average young Frenchman of today is a better physical specimen than his father at the same age is indicated by army figures, although health experts have voiced a warning against violent sports superinducing cardiac troubles.

The army data, which shows a steady improvement in the young men of recent years, is based on the so-called Piguet Index, to which all army recruits are submitted for examination. This system consists in adding the candidate's weight to the figure of his pectoral circumference and dividing the sum by his height.

When the quotient is below 20, the subject is strong; if between 20 and 30, he is of medium resistance. A result above 30 denotes subnormal physique proportionately as the figure grows.

For the year 1932, according to the military index for Parisian districts, 38.37 per cent of the recruits were in the strong class, 45.55 per cent in the medium, and only 16.08 were classified as feeble. In 1932 the total average was similar, the figures being: first class, 37.75 per cent; middle class, 46.20 per cent; weak class, 16.03 per cent.

Only 5 per cent of those called for service were turned away under the heading of physical exemption.
