

BABE CLOUTS PAIR TO THE HOME RUN RECORD LITTLEFIELD AND TAHOKA BATTLE TO SCORELESS TIE AT FAIR

TWO MORE TILTS ARE LEFT FOR BAMBINO

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Carrying on in a furious September finish, Babe Ruth today knocked out two mammoth home runs to tie his great record of 59 accomplished in 1921. The mighty slugger of the New York Yankees stands at the brink of establishing a new mark since he has two more days left in the campaign.

The King of Swat is one home run in advance of his record in 1921, for at that time, number 59 fell during the Yanks 15th-record game, while today's was New York's 153rd.

Horace Lisenbee, of the Senators, was the victim of Babe's first rap today. It came in the first inning with the socks empty. In the fifth, Paul Hopkins, a young pitcher, who just joined the Washington club, received a baptism of fire when Ruth drove out No. 59, with the bases full. That gave Ruth three homers in the last two games, two of which were dropped with the socks slacked.

Some 50,000 fans rejoiced with Ruth and gave him a great ovation when he equaled his former standard, Lou Gehrig, his teammate and rival for home run honors this season, was the first to congratulate Ruth with a handshake at the plate. At the Yank's August, a warm reception awaited him from his co-players.

This has been the greatest month in Ruth's home run career. With fifteen this far, his best previous monthly achievement was thirteen in June 1921.

The first three months of the current season found Ruth and Gehrig deadlocked with 25 apiece. Early in the present month they were running neck and neck again, when Gehrig, clipped a home run in Boston. They were on Labor Day and tied the slugger at 45. Then Ruth started stepping out and Ruth has hit 14 while Gehrig made but one.

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TAHOKA DRIVES DOWNFIELD HALTED

A scoreless tie—a victory won and a victory lost—was the result of the encounter yesterday afternoon at the Fair Ground park as the Littlefield and Tahoka football teams battled furiously in the third classic of annual exhibition. Thrice the Tahoka eleven penetrated the Littlefield defense in an on-ward march for a touchdown—but three times the Littlefield gridironers threw the advancing offense back. "Paw" Edwards, right half of the Tahoka aggregation, was the flash of the offense work of the Lewistown and was a consistent gainer throughout the tilt. Munn, running mate of Edwards, too, was impressive, and a good ball totter and effective for occasional yardage. The passing ability of either club was nothing to boast of and frequently the aerial attack was resorted to and no benefit was derived from it from a standpoint of either eleven.

Goetz, hefty fullback of the Tuckermen, lead the offensive attack of the Littlefield organization and was a smashing tackler on the defense, helping stop many attacks by the Tahoka eleven. An unusual number of penalties were assessed to both machines in the game yesterday. Possibly it was due to the over-anxiousness of the two clubs.

POVERTY PINCHES EXILED PRINCESS

ONCE EMPRESS OF RUSSIA,
WOMAN NOW RESIDES IN
COPENHAGEN COTTAGE

COPENHAGEN, Den., Sept. 29.—Once the dazzling beauty and central light in the oriental splendor of the court of Peter and Maria Feodorovna, 89-year-old dowager empress of Russia, is now living the spartan life of a humble citizen.

Her home is a modest seaside residence, "Hyolore," just outside of Copenhagen, bought years ago by her sister, the late Queen Alexandra of England. It is without central heating or stoves or any kind, for it was built as a summer residence only.

The fabulous wealth, the gorgeous jewelry, the vast property of the dowager empress are no longer here. Everything has been confiscated, and the once shining crown in the armament of European courts is so poor that her son-in-law has to manage the royal stables of Gorm Rasmussen, owner of a string of provision stores in Chicago, to support them.

Amid this comparative poverty, the empress knits and embroiders and sells her handwork at the charity bazaar for the benefit of Russian forces. Her bed of wood or coal have three lights, the fuel value of coal, 144, is used to condense, since the moisture has been removed.

She married the Grand Duke of Russia in 1866, who later became Emperor Alexander III. The greater part of her childhood she spent at the so-called Yellow Palace, now the residence of Princess Vicky, formerly Eleanor, Margaret Green of New York.

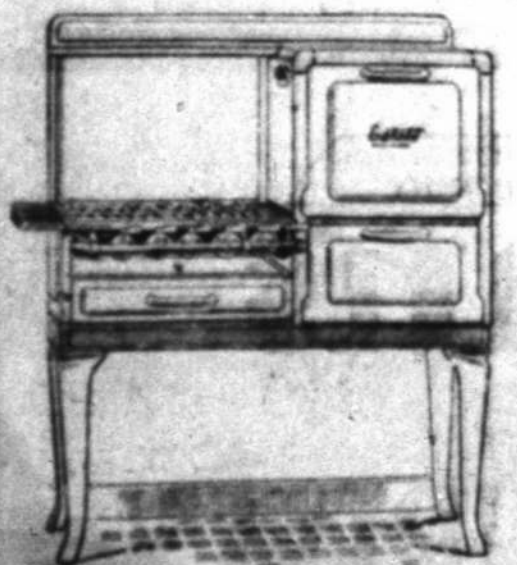

LONE AMERICAN TO ENTER GRAND PRIX

GEORGE SOUDERS DEFIES FIFTEEN EUROPEANS TO AUTO RACE

(By Associated Press)
BROOKWOOD, Eng., Sept. 28.—A single American automobile racer, George Souders, has challenged fifteen crack European racers for the \$5,000 first prize at the British Grand Prix on October 1st.

The entry list, now closed, is the most representative of any international automobile race in the last ten years.

The Grand Prix is the last of the series of five races which constitute the World Speed Championship. The first was won by Souders at Indianapolis. The next three—French, Italian and German—were won by Benoit Brooklands track. France has nine entries, two of which will be driven by Englishmen. Great Britain has three entries and Italy three.

The British Grand Prix is reserved for cars of 1,500 c.c. capacity, with a minimum weight of 1,500 pounds, including standard equipment. No ballast may be added in order to obtain this weight. No mechanics are carried. The race begins from a standing start.

The race is 25 miles over the famous Brooklands track. It includes the noted French race. A thrilling fight between the American and French racer is expected on the dangerous "railway corner," on which so many racing cars come to grief.

Diary Tells Story Old West, Drink By Drink Narrator

TUCSON, Ariz., Sept. 28.—(AP)—A little saloon keeper, who for many years has been telling the story of the old west, died here today.

The chronicler was George O. Hand, California infantryman and Tucson saloon keeper. His diary came to light recently when the archives of the Arizona Pioneer Historical society were rearranged.

Everything from saloon brawls to national politics apparently intrigued the interest of the frontiersman, who frankly violated western tradition by drinking his own stuff.

Many of his entries were as terse as they were candid.

"Boys all tight. Hand included." Among the excerpts for 1875 were:

"Thursday, January 7—I kept sober all day."

"Monday, March 8—Fine morning. Nothing new. French Jo on horse, rode a new with Billy Wall and got shot on the right side. Great excitement. Piest here, consumed 30. Wall arrested, put in jail. No more excitement. Last evening Mr. Souders while in the character of Lord Dunsenry was shot in the leg."

"Monday, March 22—No one killed today."

Start Excavating On Tech Building

Lubbock, due to its good fire record, has an unusually low rate for a city of its size. Mr. Perkins declared.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Prohibition enforcement officials are not required to report to United States attorneys violations of dry laws coming to their knowledge.

The government held in a brief filed today in the supreme court in an appeal by John P. Donnelly, former federal prohibition director for Nevada.

Donnelly was convicted in the federal district court for Nevada on the charge of having unlawfully withheld from the United States attorney for that district information which had come to him charging James A. Curran with violating the prohibition law by hauling intoxicating liquor into Reno.

The sanitary commission and its inspectors are gradually making headway against the tick, according to Harold Dew, chief inspector.

INTERESTING IF TRUE

Psychic Congress Told That Medium Is Able to Lift Self into Air Without Outside Aid

CLEVELAND, Sept. 29. (AP)—The performance of a medium who was able not only to displace objects but who is able to displace himself without visible means of locomotion were cited today before the International Congress for Psychic Research, by Dr. Von Schrenck Notzing.

The medium given the pseudonym Karl Weber, raised himself in the air without wings 25 times during June, July and August, 1924, Dr. Notzing said. The medium's position was generally horizontal and he remained in the air at the height of four feet six inches for about 25 seconds, the doctor asserted.

On one occasion this medium was said to have floated four feet from the point where he rose into the air.

AUSTIN MAN BUYS LARGE FARM NEAR LITTLEFIELD

LITTLEFIELD, Sept. 29.—W. E. Dozier, of Austin, has purchased two sections of land near here which he has improved for a medium up-to-date farm. He has planted 1200 acres in wheat. This work has been done by tractors, and he has purchased his combine, confidently expecting a large crop next spring. The recent heavy rains have put splendid season in the ground for wheat planting.

ARMY GIVES ITS MEN USEFUL EDUCATION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. (AP)—The young man who enlists in the army for a few years of adventure, or for any other reason, is likely to leave it, if he does, with a useful education.

Of 159 different courses of instruction planned by various branches of the service for 1928, many affect the future, as well as the immediate prospects of the enlisted man.

He can study photography, prepare himself for mechanical pursuits created by the rapid development of aviation and radio, learn to be useful in the medical field, to give lessons or cure them of their ailments, become a clerk, an electrician, an automobile mechanic, or an expert in handling explosives.

Courses in drafting, surveying, map reproduction are open to him, together with stenography, typewriting, carpentry, welding, baking, cooking, meteorology, telephone electricity, music, and any number of other lines of endeavor in which a civilian can make a living.

BROCK AND SCHLEE TO TRY TRIP AGAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29. (AP)—William S. Brock and Edward E. Schlee, American aviators who abandoned their round the world flight after going from Newlands, land to Europe, thence to Japan, declaring on their arrival here today that they "sure will" try to make the trip again. They brought with them from Yokohama aboard the liner Korea Maru their plane, "Pride of Detroit."

The plane was unloaded from the vessel to a barge, before the dock was reached and rushed to Crissy Field, where the ladder was attached and adjustment made and plane discussed.

The fliers were then to hop across San Francisco Bay to the Oakland municipal airport, when they expect to return to Detroit. They were undecided today whether to attempt the flight to Detroit in one hop or by easy stages. They hoped to be able to start next tomorrow.

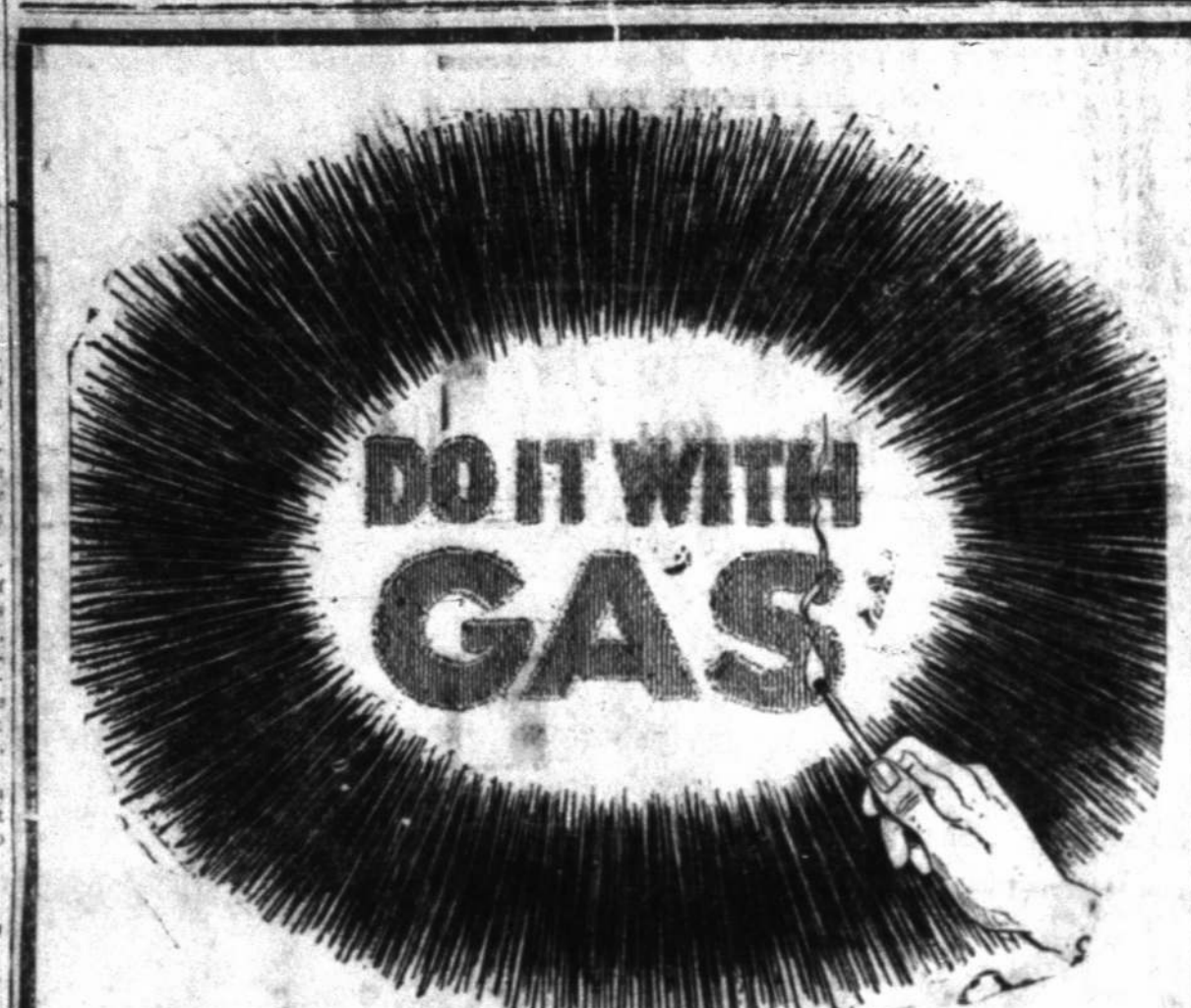

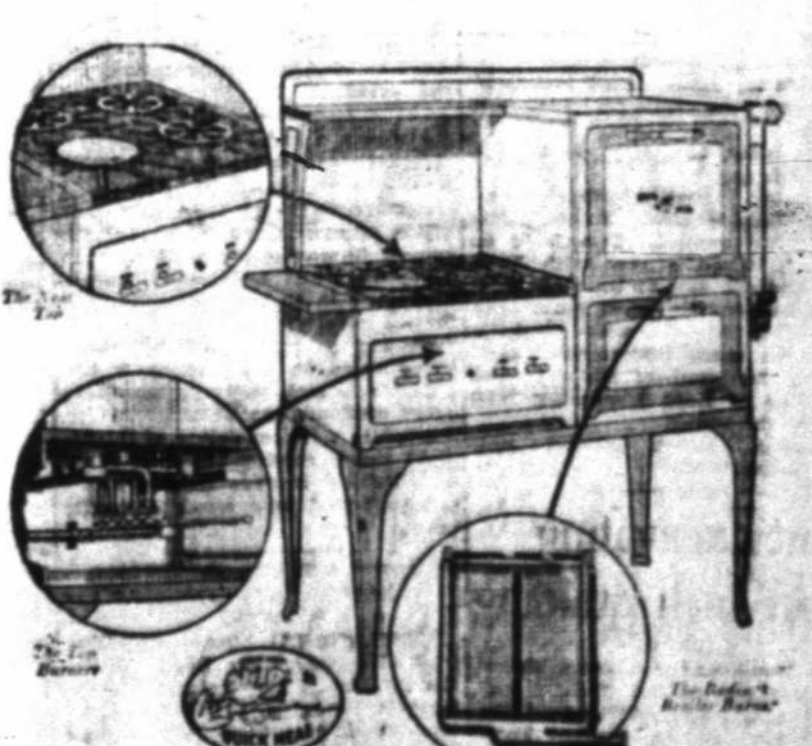

No Stadium Drive At Texas This Year

AUSTIN, Sept. 29.—Members of the Board of Directors of the University of Texas Memorial Stadium association have voted not to hold a drive for stadium building funds this year. At the last meeting of the directors it was deemed unnecessary to add units to the stadium for the next two or three years, since it is believed that the present seating capacity of 46,000 persons will be large enough for the present.

The first stadium drive was held in 1924 when about \$150,000 was raised. Every year since a drive has been put on and the funds amounting to about \$31,000 have been raised enabling the completion of the present horseshoe-shaped structure.

Texas University Lists Cambridge In Forensic Tilt

AUSTIN, Sept. 29.—A debate with Cambridge University has been the first to be arranged on the forensic schedule for the University of Texas, according to W. O. Moore, debating coach. The debate will be held in Austin and has been set for November 15. The subject has been set as "Resolved: That the power of the press has increased, is increasing and ought to be diminished." The Texas team will represent the negative side of the argument.

This debate has been arranged through the Institute of International Education, an organization fostering many projects for the betterment of international education. The team, according to information received by Mr. Moore, has been selected by the National Union of Students and will probably consist of one student each from universities in England, Scotland and Wales.

According to the University of

Texas forensic calendar, October 15 is the last day upon which students may enter for the interschool debate tryouts. The first preliminary tryout will be held October 28 at which time the contestants will be eliminated to 24 and of the best six of these, three will be later selected to meet the Cambridge University debaters.

There will be other debates arranged for the year, Mr. Moore said. Four of these will be with universities in the Missouri Valley and will probably be with the Universities of Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas and Arkansas.

AUSTIN, Sept. 29.—Selection of Miss Elizabeth Edwin of Dallas has been made by freshman girls living in the new Alice P. Littlefield dormitory of the University of Texas as president of the first house council for the dormitory. Miss Natalie Matthews, also of Dallas, was elected vice-president. Miss Mina Marie Mueller of Mercedes was elected secretary, and Miss Elizabeth Edwards of Dallas, treasurer.

There are 140 freshman girls who are living in the dormitory, according to Miss Mattie Lockett, director. The building, which was erected as a gift from the late George Littlefield in honor of his wife, was completed shortly before September 18 of this fall in time to open for the present school year. Miss Marian Hicks of San Antonio is assistant social director of the new building.

REPUBLICAN WOMEN SEEK TO BETTER KNOWLEDGE OF THEIR VOTERS

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The old adage, "It is never too late to learn," is being taken out of the moth balls and aimed by women members of the Republican party who have decided that being old enough to vote does not mean being too old to go to school.

The art of campaigning and the business of political work will be the major subjects on the curriculum of the School of Politics which will be open to Republican women the last week in September at the Women's National Republican Club of New York. Supervised by a score of instructors, this will be the third political school to be conducted by the party since women were enfranchised in New York State. Its director is Mrs. Arthur L. Livermore.

Evening sessions for business women will be available announced Miss Alice Hill Chittenden, president of the club, who also said that lectures will be broadcast for those who cannot attend the sessions. Fifty business women have enrolled in the evening classes and 200 are registered in the day sessions.

Attorney General Albert Ottinger, Charles D. Hilles, vice chairman of the Republican National Committee; Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Ogden L. Mills, Senator James W. Wadsworth, Jr., and Congressman John Q. Tilson of Connecticut are some of the national party leaders who have been invited to address the school.

Each student will be given ten pieces of literature which can be used for supplementary reading. They constitute the alpha and omega of political knowledge, and have been especially prepared for the school.

"The School of Politics has been planned with two definite aims. It will place before the women-voters fundamental facts of the political questions of the day. It will also give women-voters practice in public speaking on these same subjects so that they may in turn broadcast these facts still further in connection with the Presidential Campaign of 1928."

FARMERS URGED TO CHECK ON COTTON

ANALYSIS OF SEED AND BOLLS EMPHASIZED BY A. AND M. COLLEGE

(Special To The Avalanche) COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 29.—Now is the time for the cotton farmer to check up on the results of his year's work by getting square down to brass tacks on certain phases of his production, J. S. M. College, of the agronomy department, A. and M. College, points out.

Among the questions that cotton grower should ask himself, Mr. McGofford said, are the following: Was the planting seed used this year a good one, one that would be preferred for next year? Did the seed germinate ninety percent, or better? Were they clean, free from disease, free from insects, and did they produce strong, healthy plants? How long was it from planting to flowering and from flowering to the first open bolls? Were the plants close jointed, strong, healthy and well fruited? Were the bolls large? Were the bolls of all plants alike? How many bolls were there to the pound? Just exactly what was the acre yield? Was the harvest 250 pounds of lint to the acre or was the cotton production carried on at a loss?

"Cotton is grown chiefly for the lint, it produces seed, therefore the grower should be sure that the variety grown produces a good, strong fiber that will meet the demands of the market," Mr. McGofford said. "If the farmer is unable to determine himself whether the staple is at least one inch long, if it is hard and strong, if all the fibers are of approximately the same length, if there is a heavy body of fibers on the seed, he may be sending his sample of lint to the Textile Department of the A. and M. College, get such information. If your cotton does not come up to the requirements of a good variety, don't start next year's crop with poor seed. Get pure seed, of a good variety, from a State certified seed breeder."

HEART DISEASE IS FATAL TO FORD KIN

BROTHER OF AUTO MAGNATE SUCCUMBS WHILE IN COTTAGE NEAR HOME

DETROIT, Sept. 28. (AP)—A victim of heart disease that had troubled him for weeks, John Ford, wealthy real estate operator and brother of Henry Ford, died alone in an unoccupied cottage in Fordson last night.

The body, lying on a bed left in the cottage by its last tenant, was found shortly before 6 o'clock this morning by Fordson police and Robert W. Ford, a son, who began search when Mr. Ford failed to return to his home from a meeting of the Fordson city council of which he was president.

The cottage, recently purchased by Mr. Ford, is but a few squares from the Ford home, and it is believed Mr. Ford went to the place to inspect it when he was stricken.

Pending the formality of a post mortem examination, the body was held today in an undertaking establishment in Dearborn. It later will be removed to the Ford home where funeral services are to be held Friday, with burial in Grand Lawn cemetery, not far from the spot where William and Mary Litogot Ford settled when they came to the United States from Ireland, and where Henry and William Ford were born.

Charles T. Earl, deputy coroner, who inspected the body, and Mr. Ford's physician, Dr. A. L. Sherwood, joined in the opinion that death was due solely to heart disease. There were no marks of violence on the body.

Mr. Ford was last seen when he left the council meeting at 9 o'clock. The discovery of his automobile near the house led searchers to the cottage, the door of which was unlocked.

Mr. Ford had been prominently identified with state and civic affairs. As a partner in a local real estate firm and an officer of two banks, he became wealthy. Until about ten years ago, he was a dairy farmer with a 40-acre farm adjoining the family home. He was interested in farm problems. He was a member of the state fair board.

Mr. Goodloe also touched upon the spirit which prompted the Amarillo boosters to bring a special train to the fair.

"We believe it has cemented a feeling between the two cities which the civic leaders of both places have looked forward to for some time," he said, "and we hope to have the visit returned at the earliest possible time."

BURNING OVER OF FIELDS PROTESTED

PRACTICE MEANS GREAT WASTE OF ORGANIC MATTER IN SOIL

(Special To The Avalanche) COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 29.—While the burning over of fields is not practiced as much now as was formerly the case, there is still too much of this being done and every year millions of dollars worth of valuable plant food goes up in smoke, to say nothing of the value of the organic matter destroyed, E. A. Miller, agronomist of the Extension Service, A. and M. College, said in a recent discussion over Station WTAW of the value of organic matter.

"The average plant food value of the stalks and leaves of cotton plants is \$1.50 an acre, corn stalks \$1.50 an acre, wheat straw \$1.75 an acre and oat straw \$1.50 an acre," Mr. Miller said. "Other crops are in proportion but in addition to the actual plant food, there is always the big value of the organic matter. Many farmers underestimate the value of organic matter in the soil and as a result the soil fertility has been decreasing. It should be remembered that soil fertility is the basis of profitable agriculture and that without a certain amount of organic matter there can be no really fertile soil. There are three necessary conditions for a fertile soil, as follows: The soil must be in good physical condition, it must have plenty of available plant food and it must have good water holding capacity. One of these conditions will always be the limiting factor and the yield will be determined by what is ever lacking. All three of these soil conditions may be obtained usually by providing sufficient organic matter. Organic matter may be provided by plowing under manure, cotton stalks, corn stalks, weeds, grass, cover crops, green manure crops, including legumes, etc."
