New Deal Takes 3rd in Regional Meet

The past week at New Deal was filled with basketball. The New Deal Lionesses won their bi-district tilt last Tuesday night and traveled to the Region I tournament at Canyon.

The Lionesses defeated Ropesville for the bi-district crown, 45-40. Ollie Mae McNeely took game scoring honors with 23 points, Darlene McDougal had 11 points, and Shirley French 8 to complete New Deal's scoring attack. Sharla Briggs led Ropesville with 17 points.

Ropesville led New Deal 8-6, at the end of the first quarter, and then took a 20-17 halftime lead. New Deal bounced back in the third quarter with 13 points to Ropesville's 6 to gain a lead of 4 points. In the final quarter, Ropesville again outscored the Lionesses 14-15, but to no avail, as that left the score 45-40.

Betty Ransom led the Claude scoring attack with 36 points, only two points short of the entire Happy output. Happy was led by Sissy Sutton with 24 points.

Happy led at the end of the first quarter, 14-13, but Claude forged ahead to take a half time lead of 25-21. Claude broke the game wide open in the last quarter, holding a 43-34 third quarter lead and outscoring Happy 15-4 in the last canto.

The third place game began at 5:15 p.m. with New Deal meeting Happy for the honors. A tremendous fourth quarter brought New Deal's Lionesses their victory, 50-42. Ollie Mae McNeely won the duel for scoring honors from Sissy Sutton, 30 points to 25.

Happy led New Deal 11-9 at the end of the first quarter and 21-10 at intermission. New Deal tied the score, 28-28, at the end of the third quarter, and they swamped the losers, 22-14, in the final stanza.

Backed up Miss McNeely was Shirley French with 10 points, while no other Happy girl scored in double figures.

In the championship game immediately following, Claude defended its regional championship successfully by defeating Cotton Center, 69-61.

Betty Ransom, who literally burned the nets off the hoop as she poured 39 points through, was the high scorer. Miss Ransom had 11 field goals and 14 free throws to outstrip everyone on the floor. Theda Prather scored 30 points for Cotton Center, but didn't get as much support.

Claude took a first quarter lead of 19-10 and never fell behind. They led at the half by a score of 34-30. Claude increased its lead to 49-40 going into the final period.

Cotton Center rallied in the fourth quarter by outscoring Claude, 21-20, but the rally came too late and wasn't strong enough.

Nancy Hindley had 18 points and Shirley Oles 12, to support Miss Ransom's scoring surge, while Jody Barrett had 16 and Judith White had 11 for Cotton Center.

Named to the All-Regional Basketball Team were Miss Ollie Mae McNeely, forward, and a senior at New Deal, and Miss Caroline Isaacs, guard and a senior at New Deal. Both of the girls have given outstanding performances throughout the year, and the honors come as a very fitting end to this basketball season.

Other tornado disasters and storms have proven beyond a doubt that a community which is prepared will suffer very little loss of life from a storm. The U. S. Weather Bureau, the Highway Patrol and local authorities all coordinate their activities in an effort to give adequate notice of tornado danger. From the time of the Take Cover Signal, however, you are on your own. It is hoped that this drill will assist you to be ready for a tornado emergency.

For each of the past 11 years, Public Schools Week in Texas has been set aside as a special time to place increased emphasis on our educational system.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with their school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our leaders of tomorrow with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period March 6-March 10, 1961, as PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK in Texas.

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

If you are retiring in the near future, you can speed the delivery of your first check by bringing all necessary evidence with you on your first visit to the district office, so stated John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office.

Almost everyone who applies for monthly benefits must prove his age. A birth certificate recorded at birth is the best evidence, but if not available, there are many types of evidence which will prove age, such as baptismal certificates, an insurance policy, family Bible, etc.

Evidence of recent earnings may also be needed to establish your monthly payment. The 1960 withholding tax statement (Form W-2) is the best evidence for an employee. The self-employed should bring copies of the two previous years' tax returns and evidence to show that tax returns were filed with Internal Revenue Service. A cancelled check, money order stub, or bank receipt is sufficient evidence to show that the return was filed.

If married, and your wife is also applying for monthly benefits, evidence of her age will also be required.

Mr. Hutton stated that if you have any doubt about what evidence will be needed to process our claim, call the social security office before you retire and the representative will be glad to explain just what evidence you might need. If you have the necessary proofs when you apply for benefits, it will help speed up your first check.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Plainview each Tuesday at 10:00 a.m. in the county courtroom, and he will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

County Agent Urges Cotton Fertilization

Cotton fertilization can be most effective and profitably done by fertilizing according to soil test recommendations, according to

Hale County Extension Agent, Ollie Limer. Results from cotton fertilizer demonstrations conducted in Hale County in 1960 pointed out this fact very clearly. These demonstrations were conducted as a part of the 4-Point Fertility Program.

Robert Schoppa who farms 1 1/2

miles north of Prairieview, produced 150 pounds more lint cotton per acre by fertilizing based on a soil test recommendation of 65-52-0. That cotton receiving the 65-52-0 produced 845 pounds of lint per acre, whereas the cotton receiving no fertilizer produced 695 pounds of lint per acre. This figure is an additional income of \$30.18 per acre above the fertilizer costs in favor of the fertilized cotton. A treatment of 50-52-0 produced 816 pounds of lint per acre. This treatment, 50-52-0 brought in an additional net income of \$23.45 per acre above fertilizer costs.

Another demonstration on the W. F. Holloway farm 1/2 mile east of Petersburg, also bore out additional merits of fertilizing according to soil test recommendations. Cotton fertilized according to a soil test recommendation of 42-34-0 produced 755 pounds of lint per acre as compared to the check treatment of 0-0-0 producing 623 pounds per acre. This additional 132 pounds of lint cotton per acre brought in an additional net income per acre of \$28.89 above the fertilizer costs.

Wayne Miller, who farms 2 miles south and 5 miles east of Happy Union produced 857 pounds of lint cotton per acre by fertilizing with 40-60-0. This was in contrast to 634 pounds of lint per acre produced with no fertilizer. This yield increase of 163 pounds of lint per acre gave a gross return of \$44.05; less \$9.40 for fertilizer leaving a net additional profit per acre of \$34.65.

Now is the time for you farmers to take you soil sample so that the recommendations will be returned to them in plenty of time to plan their fertilizer program, says Ollie Limer.

The Juliette Low Friendship Fund will be received from each troop in the district. This is the birthday pennies that Brownies and Girl Scouts give each year in observance of their birthday.



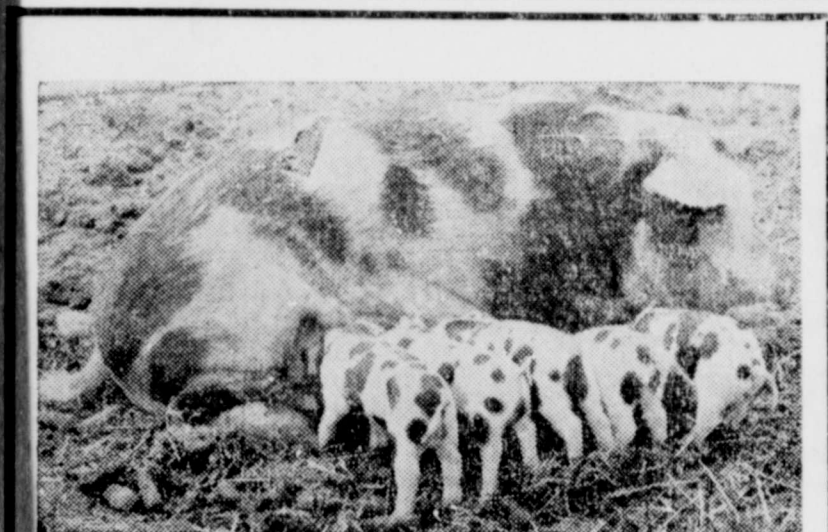

70,544 Bales Ginned in Area

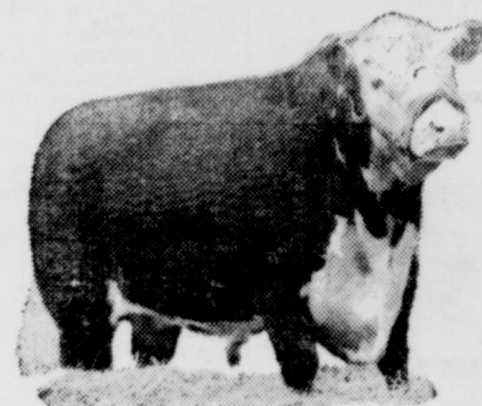

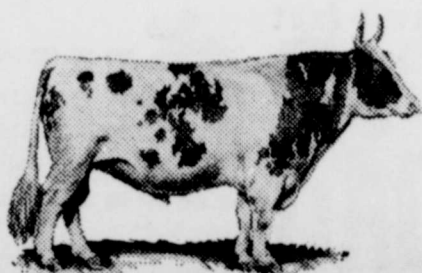

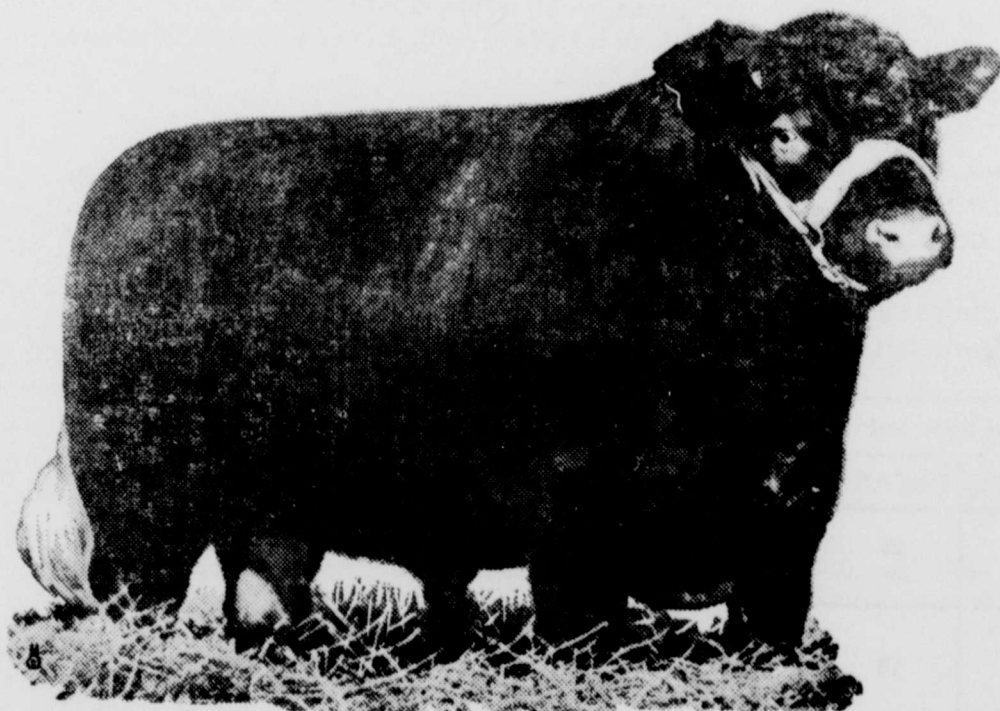

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Flame cultivation to control weeds in cotton was first used at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1959, and the results were so encouraging that a research project on flame cultivation was established in 1960. The main objective of this research program was to determine the effects of flame weeding on the cotton while killing weeds. The research program included tests with the different tractor speeds, pressure settings, cross and parallel flaming, size of cotton at first flaming, use of both the standard and "midget" burners. The results of the flaming program are being released this week by Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director of the Foundation.

Pre-emergence flaming was done just as the cotton plants were beginning to break through the ground. Careless weeds, and crab grass were killed 100% by this pre-emergence flaming. No difference in the weed kill was detected between the cross and the parallel burner position. Purple nightshade, which made up about 90% of the weed population, was not killed by the flame. Hoeing time was cut in half to about one hour per acre with pre-emergence flaming. Two to three percent of the cotton seedlings had emerged and almost all were killed. Lint cotton yield varied from 667 to 799 pounds per acre, with different flaming methods, as compared to 679 pounds per acre from the unflamed plots. The average yield of all the flamed plots was 707 pounds per acre. This indicates there was no decrease in cotton yields through the use of flame cultivation.

Where the 'midget' burner was used early beginning when the cotton was 4 inches high and the standard burner later, the cotton yielded 102 pounds more than the unflamed plot. It is believed that this early flaming helped kill thrips and fleahoppers.

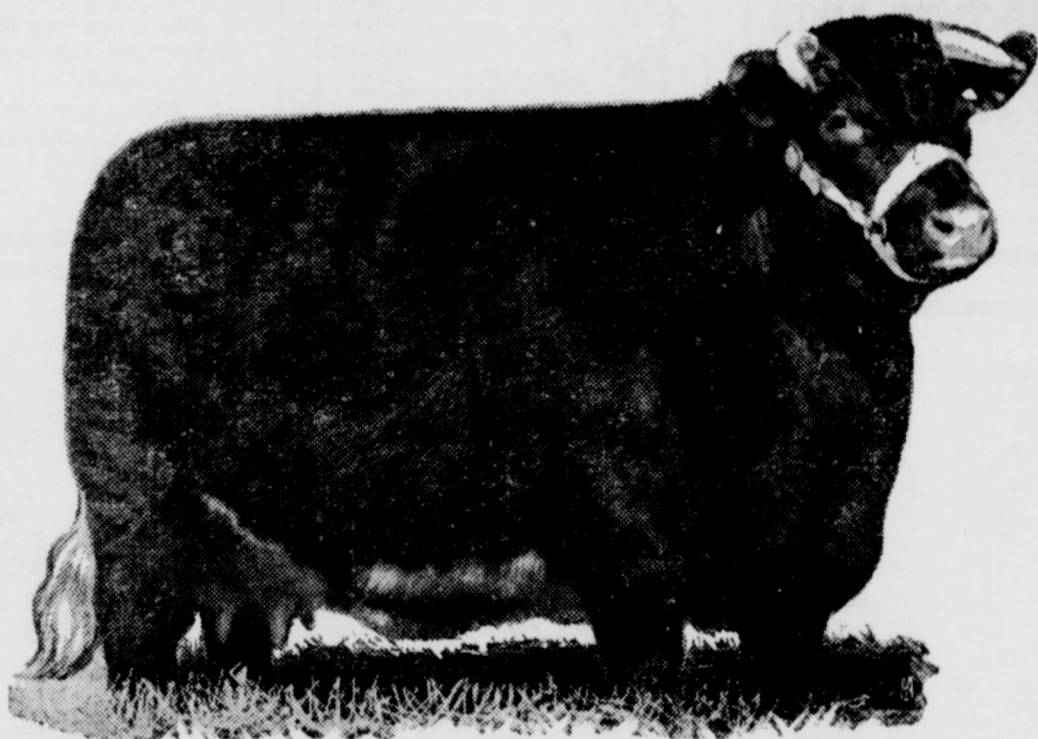

Now Is Season To Check Weeds In Wheat Field

Now is the time to begin planning a program of noxious weed control for 1961. Bindweed and other noxious perennials will be emerging about April first. Those farmers wishing to treat bindweed during the second quarter, April, May, and June, should sign up with ASC for the cost sharing practices between March 1st and March 21st.

The application equipment and operator for applying chemicals to bindweed on farm land will again be available free of charge through the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District. The District will also be treating bindweed on the rights of ways of county roads and railroads, upon the request of the farmers. The contract with the State Highway Department was renewed again this year whereby the Weed District will apply herbicides to the highway rights of way for bindweed control.

It is obvious to people passing through Hale County that much progress has been made toward the eradication of bindweed here since the Weed District was or-
