

## Urban voters may influence amendments

Attitudes of urban voters, especially those in Houston, are expected to wield a major influence on the fate of seven proposed constitutional amendments in balloting today.

Of the 750,000 Texans expected to go to the polls today, Secretary of State David Dean predicts 300,000 will be in Houston, where a mayor and city council are being elected.

He says the balance will consist largely of voters in Dallas, where a school board will be elected, and Austin, where voters will decide whether to sell the city's share in the South Texas Nuclear Project.

The proposed amendments range from a long-range water development program to a plan that would let an 81-year-old East Texan keep his farm.

Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton sponsored the proposition that would dedicate half the state's revenue surplus to water development. It would raise the interest rate permitted on state water bonds and would let the state guarantee \$500 million in water development bonds issued by local governments.

The second proposed amendment would let the state land commissioner issue titles for land held in good faith for at least 50 years but for which no legal title was obtained. It would help folks such as Jesse Johnson, who bought his 120-acre Leon County farm in 1928 but recently learned the state technically owns the land because of a defect in the original seller's title.

Proposition 1 would allow local governments to grant tax exemptions for renovating property in underdeveloped, abandoned or deteriorated areas. Elected officials could freeze taxes in the "reinvestment zones" and could issue bonds to finance new services to the areas.

No. 3 would create a panel to supervise state spending when the Legislature is not in session. The committee would consist of the governor, lieutenant governor, House speaker and the chairmen of four legislative committees, and could make state budget changes after the appropriations bill is in effect. The panel also could manage distribution of federal block grants that are not designated for a specific purpose.

The fifth proposal would extend a farm products tax exemption to livestock and poultry. An attorney general's ruling five years ago said the animals were not covered, although most local governments don't tax them anyway.

Under the sixth proposed amendment, cities and school districts could grant homeowners tax exemptions with a minimum of \$5,000, in addition to the \$50,000 writeoff provided by the 1978 Tax Relief Amendment. Exemptions would be up to 40 percent through 1984, 30 percent from 1985 to 1987 and 20 percent thereafter.

Another \$250 million in state bonds could be issued for the Veterans' Land Program under No. 7. The proposal also would raise the maximum interest rate from 6 percent to 10 percent. It would permit loans to the 13,500 veterans now in line for them.

## National sales tax plan considered

WASHINGTON (AP) — A national sales tax to finance Pentagon spending is being considered by Senate Republicans searching for ways to curb swelling budget deficits, sources say.

"It may not go anywhere, but it may," said one source who insisted that the plan is "purely, purely in a talking stage."

"There has just been some discussion about it, no written proposal," the source said.

Tom Griscorn, a spokesman for Senate Republican leader Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee, refused to confirm that such a proposal is under consideration.

"My boss, at this point, is not considering any specific tax proposal," Griscorn said. "We're awaiting a chance for the (Republican) congressional leaders to meet with the president. It is the president's program and it is his decision to make as to what is in his program."

Griscorn did acknowledge, however, that "Senator Baker has discussed the possibility of establishing a national defense fund, but there have been no recommendations for how such a fund should be established and if it was, how it would be funded. He (Baker) has not advocated a sales tax for such purposes."

The sources, who insisted on re-

maining anonymous, said Baker has discussed the plan with Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan, and it also has been mentioned to other Republican senators and White House budget director David A. Stockman.

The idea would be to provide money for defense spending "entirely from one source of revenue," such as a sales tax which would be in effect nationally for "a couple of years," the source said.

There was no indication of the level at which such a tax might be imposed or what goods would be covered.

Sources said it is not contemplated that such a measure would be enacted next year — an election year — although the aim would be to provide revenues for 1983 and 1984.

The Reagan administration has requested \$181.8 billion for defense in 1982, \$214.9 billion in 1983 and \$242.6 billion in 1984.

Public opinion polls show that increased defense spending enjoys widespread support, suggesting that linking a new levy to the military budget might be one way of lessening traditional opposition to higher taxes.

A national sales tax is among numerous plans that congressional Republicans have under study as they search for methods to shrink the budget deficit.

## Levi Strauss to close plant

The first major non-petroleum related industry to open up in Midland, the Levi Strauss jeans-making plant, will shut its doors Nov. 30, according to a statement released today by the San Francisco office.

"The jeanswear division leased facility has proven itself to be uneconomical despite our extensive efforts to remedy the situation," Levi Strauss officials explained in the release as the reason for closing. A spokesman this morning confirmed that inability to compete with the oil companies and those salaries was a major factor in leading to the plant's closing.

"Levi Strauss & Co. will assist its 210 Midland employees in securing employment in the area, which enjoys an unusually low unemployment rate," officials added.

Grant Billingsley, acting executive vice president for the Midland Chamber of Commerce and manager of the Economic Development Division, said, "The Chamber is sorry to hear of the closing, but we recognize the economic realities. They (Levi Strauss) are representative of an industry that is subject to cyclical changes of the economy."

"Most business people will understand the reasons for them making this decision," Billingsley added.

The employees, he said, "will be absorbed very quickly" by other companies.

The building and land had been leased from the Midland Industrial Development Corporation.

The decision by this company to locate in the industrial park was one of the first successful efforts of the Midland Area Sales Team, which was set up during the oil slump of the late 1960s and early 1970s to try and diversify Midland's economy.

Ironically, news of the closing came almost 12 years to the date after the announcement that Levi Strauss had selected Midland as the site of its 10th plant in Texas. Confirmation that the major jeans making plant was going to open a facility here came on Oct. 29, 1969, during a news conference at Midland Regional Airport.

Adding to the irony is the fact that Levi Strauss officials at that time cited a "dependable labor supply in the Midland-Odessa area" as a primary factor in locating a plant here. The inability to keep employees proved to be the determining factor in closing the plant, confirmed Sally Bryant with Levi Strauss in San Fran-

## Hussein wants Soviet weapons

WASHINGTON (AP) — King Hussein of Jordan, endorsing a Saudi Arabian Middle East peace plan as "worthy of consideration," is telling President Reagan that he is serious about buying Soviet weapons despite the administration's best efforts to dissuade him.

The Jordanian monarch wants to buy Soviet air defense weapons of a kind unavailable to him from the U.S. arsenal, said a senior official thoroughly familiar with Hussein's discussions with Reagan. He was not specific.

The official, who asked not to be identified, said Monday that the Reagan administration told Hussein that it is convinced the best interests of both countries would be served if Hussein maintains his traditional military supply relationship with the United States.

Hussein and Reagan planned to meet again today. The Jordanian monarch also had meetings scheduled with Vice President George Bush and members of Congress.

Meanwhile, U.S. officials who met with Hussein went out of their way to downplay speculation that the United States is interested in meshing the eight-point Saudi peace plan with the Camp David accord.

"I think it is very important that the Camp David peace process not be put in jeopardy," said Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger, echoing all senior U.S. officials who spoke on the subject.

However, the officials also said Reagan believes there are both encouraging aspects and serious drawbacks to the plan advocated by Saudi Prince Fahd. They cite what they say is the plan's apparent willingness to permit Israel to exist in peace with its Arab neighbors.

"We think there are hopeful things about the Saudi peace plan that indicate at the very least that it is possible for countries which have been enemies to sit down and begin a peace

### Demonstration of U.S. missiles on agenda

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — King Hussein of Jordan will get a demonstration of the U.S. Army's I-Hawk ground-to-air missile system during his weapons shopping trip to Fort Bliss next week, officials say.

Defense officials have said the monarch is in the market for such a system and Jordanian soldiers are being trained at Fort Bliss to operate the I-Hawk, according to Lt. Col. Ed McDonald, a spokesman for the army base.

McDonald said the 16-foot missile will be fired at a lying drone on Bliss ranges by the U.S. Army's 11th Brigade as Hussein watches during his Nov. 11 visit.

Jordan has purchased weapons, including the original Hawk system, from the United States for the past two decades.

Officials said the arms topic did not arise during Hussein's talks with President Reagan on Monday, but it is expected to be discussed when the king meets with Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig.

Fort Bliss officials were hesitant to discuss the missile firing and it was not on a schedule of events for the visit released to the press.

McDonald at first said only that the king would "go out and observe U.S. air defense units," but he later confirmed the missile firing.

Nine Jordanian soldiers currently are being schooled in the I-Hawk system at Fort Bliss and two other Jordanians are in officers' school there.

"We hope very much that that is what will ultimately come out of it all," Weinberger said. "I think the president's statement earlier about it is the adequate expression of what we feel."

Begin called the plan a description of "how to liquidate Israel in stages."

The Saudi plan calls for Israeli withdrawal from all occupied territory, the establishment of an independent Arab state in the West Bank and

Gaza Strip, as well as the affirmation of the right for the states in the region to live in peace.

Israeli diplomatic sources said a primary objection to the plan is that it does not mention Israel by name — an implicit symbol of recognition — and has no provision for peace negotiations with the Jewish state.

At a black-tie state dinner for 100 guests in the State Dining Room of the White House, Hussein told Reagan in a toast that their meetings had left him "more encouraged than I have been for a long, long period."

"I have a greater faith that all will eventually be right," Hussein said.

Reagan led off the toasts by describing the quest for peace in the Middle East as "one of the most vexing problems of the post-war world."

He praised Hussein as one who "has never abandoned the belief that people of good will through dedication and vision can find the means to bring peace with justice, dignity and security to his region."

In public welcoming ceremonies on the South Lawn of the White House on Monday morning, Hussein portrayed himself as a champion of the Arab cause.

Administration officials said he carried that attitude into his private meetings with Reagan, complaining about the "intransigence" of Israel, asserting the rights of Palestinian Arabs and contending that the status of Jerusalem, a holy city for Moslems as well as Jews and Christians, "is the essence of peace in the Middle East."

"Our objective has always been a comprehensive, total peace in the entire area, one which future generations can accept, protect and live with," Hussein said after a meeting with Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr.

## Terry Lowe resigns from police force

A city police officer whose Oct. 20 suspension was upheld by an administrative appeals panel last week has resigned from the force, apparently as a result of having his duties changed when he returned to work Monday.

Officer Terry Lowe, 32, a decorated Vietnam veteran and a member of the force for three years, was suspended indefinitely without pay by Chief of Police Wayne Gideon for allegedly mistreating a 17-year-old prisoner Oct. 16.

An appeals panel composed of the city manager, the personnel director and a police officer of Lowe's choice voted 2-1 Friday to uphold the suspension but limit it to 12 days. The panel refused to go along with Gideon's recommendation that the suspension be permanent, however.

When Lowe showed up for work Monday, he reportedly was told he was being reassigned from night

patrol duty to the relatively uneventful duty at Midland Regional Airport, a job many officers feel is a punishment tour for veteran cops who fall out of favor with administrative officials of the police department.

"The majority look at it as derogatory (to be put out there)," said a ranking member of the force. "It's considered Siberia."

"Anybody they have a problem with, they give him a demeaning job, hoping he'll quit," noted a former officer who said he went through the same thing before he resigned from the force.

In a related matter, City Councilman Jesse Hatfield today confirmed reports that two former police officers met with him privately Oct. 23 about what they claim are "major problems" in the police department in addition to the Lowe situation. Said Hatfield:

"I visited with a couple of 'em, yes. I talked to two ex-police officers for a

'Cowboy's' cousin carried family loyalty too far

By ED TODD Staff Writer. Tom Crosson, the 26-year-old cousin of federal fugitive James Monroe "Cowboy" Crosson, was sentenced to three years in prison by U.S. District Judge Lucius D. Bunton after the cousin had pleaded guilty to helping the "Cowboy" break out of the Midland City Jail last June 11 out of a sense of family loyalty.

"Cowboy" Crosson's girlfriend and her companion, also afforded Glenn Eugene Stewart, 38, a chance to escape. Stewart, who was bound to the Texas Department of Corrections to serve a sentence when he walked out with Crosson, later was arrested in Pecos. Crosson is still at large and reportedly is living in Juarez, Mexico.

The judge considered the attorney's argument and reflected on defendant's plea for compassion. Crosson said he has a 5-year-old daughter to look after and was concerned about her welfare.

"I CAN'T HAVE any sympathy for you, Mr. Crosson," Judge Bunton said, "but I do for your little girl."

The judge noted that the defendant's loyalty to his cousin was carried too far.

"I knew what I was doing when I left jail over here," Stewart told the judge. "I don't know what you should do."

The judge apparently had no qualms about what to do. He sentenced Stewart to five years in prison.

"What you did was extremely despicable," the judge told the cousin. He said he could "better understand" Crosson's getting involved in a "dope" deal wherein the greed for money would come into play than he could understand his part in the escape.

"I HAVE PAID dearly for my actions," the Odessa cousin told the judge Monday in pleading for a light sentence.

STEWART'S ATTORNEY, Robert Harris, proposed that his client had joined in the escape, as he was in fear of going to the Texas Department of Corrections. "He saw the opportunity

to walk out of the city jail," Harris argued. "I don't think he was in on the planning of it."

"Certainly I think loyalty to a family is important," the judge said, "but loyalty should cease" when it comes to helping a relative break out of jail.



Couple testifies Proctors tried to conceal loans

the bankruptcy proceedings, testified that he had reported the unlisted notes to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and to the U.S. attorney. He said he was bound by law to report unlisted assets in bankruptcy cases to the U.S. Justice Department.

ON THE WITNESS stand, Truitt outlined bankruptcy procedures at the request of the prosecutor, Assistant U.S. Attorney Mike McDonald of El Paso.

The couple, Leo and Juanita Proctor, were indicted following their filing bankruptcy for re-organization in 1978 after they got into a financial bind. The next year, they filed for straight bankruptcy and abandonment of their house construction business.

TESTIMONY BY government witnesses indicated that the Proctors had loaned two couples money, so that they could muster enough funds to make down payments on houses Leo Proctor was building for them.

DEFENDANTS' attorneys Greenhaw and Hart contended that White, who is in the construction business, owned the promissory notes and that the Proctors could not report the notes as their assets.

"If you adopted their position," Truitt conceded, "they'd be right in not listing it."

Evidence indicated that the Proctors' assets totaled between \$100,000 and \$120,000 and that they had real property valued at about \$640,000.

Under federal bankruptcy laws, the trustee garners the assets and pays the creditors proportionate shares of liquidated assets.

Robert R. Truitt Jr., the trustee in items to attempt to speed up the trial," Judge Bernie Weinman told the six-man, six-woman jury.

# Alcoholism an 'equal opportunity' tragedy

Dear Dr. Solomon: In one of your columns, you mentioned that men who drink too much and brag about their sex lives are doing just that — bragging — because alcohol interferes with a man's sexual performance.

My question is: What about women? Does alcohol affect them the same way? Or don't women drink too much? — Bryan, Detroit, Mich.

Dear Bryan: Alcoholism, like smoking, has become an equal opportunity disease. It does not discriminate between men and women.

A study conducted at the University of Utah College of Medicine revealed that many women alcoholics suffer from sexual, gynecologic and obstetric problems. The study included 44 women, 17 to 57 years of age. Their marital status ranged from single to divorced to separated to widowed.

Almost twice as many of these women (19 percent) said they had never experienced orgasm as is true of the general population (8 to 10 percent). An additional number of women said they even experienced difficulty in becoming sexually aroused.

In regard to gynecologic and obstetric problems, 40 percent of women alcoholics had had at least one miscarriage. Moreover, those with the longest histories of alcoholism were

more likely to have problems with infertility. Other significant problems included venereal disease and menstrual difficulties.

To repeat: Being female does not provide immunity against sexual dysfunction associated with excessive drinking.

Dear Dr. Solomon: Two years ago I had an abortion because my husband and I simply weren't prepared to have a family. Now we would like to have a child. Will the abortion have any effect on the pregnancy? — Fran, Anchorage, Alaska.

Dear Fran: The available evidence on the effect of an induced abortion on a subsequent pregnancy has been conflicting. One recent review of a number of studies suggests that it is not so much whether a woman has had an abortion, but the method used that determines whether a subsequent pregnancy will be complicated.

According to Dr. Willard Cates, chief of the Abortion Surveillance Unit of the Centers for Disease Control, none of the studies proves that induced abortions led to complications such as spontaneous abortion, prematurity or low birth-weight. When one of these does occur, however, it seems to be associated most often with dilation and curettage.

As I noted, however, the issue is still controversial, and the evidence still inexact.

Dear Dr. Solomon: A friend of mine, who is in his early 30s, has been told he has multiple sclerosis. Isn't this unusual at his age? — Don

Dear Don: There's nothing unusual about the age. Most people with multiple sclerosis are between 20 and 40 years of age. The disease rarely occurs after age 45.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I've read that some drug companies are starting to produce human insulin for diabetics. If diabetics have not been using human insulin until now, what have they been using? — Carl, Madison, N.J.

Dear Carl: Most diabetics who use insulin now take a combination of beef and pork insulin, which is slightly different from human insulin. One of its side effects is an allergic reaction which occurs in five percent of patients. It is hoped that human insulin will not cause an allergic reaction since it will be the same as that produced by the body.

Dear Dr. Solomon: A friend of mine was treated in a hyperbaric chamber because of a foot infection that the doctor said could require amputation.

Will you explain how this treatment is supposed to work? — Lil, Norfolk, Va.

Dear Lil: During hyperbaric treatment, the patient is given oxygen while he or she is in a chamber in which pressure greater than surface pressure is maintained. If an air bubble is obstructing a blood vessel, the pressure shrinks the bubble and thereby helps restore circulation. The oxygen also helps repair damage to small circulatory vessels and speeds the healing process.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My doctor says he's not going to advise for or against a coronary bypass operation; all he's going to do is give me the facts. What's your opinion? Is a bypass operation a good idea? — Keith

Dear Keith: It is difficult enough to make a recommendation about the advisability of surgery when the patient is known; it is impossible to make an intelligent recommendation from a distance.

Even among experts in the field, the value of the coronary artery bypass operation is in some dispute, partly because it is so difficult to evaluate the patient's quality of life following surgery. This is a very subjective area; a quality of life that may be very satisfactory to one person, may be intolerable to another.

A study of 100 coronary artery bypass surgery patients at the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York City showed that most of the 76 long-term survivors said they had substantial relief from pain and were generally satisfied with their condition.

The same percentage of patients who were working before the operation were working nine months after the operation. But a return to work may not be a useful indicator of a successful outcome since it deals with only one facet of life.

The fact is that any recommendation for surgery must be individualized; what may be right for one person may be a disaster for another. Apparently your doctor believes in giving you the facts and letting you make the decision. If this approach does not work for you, why not get a second opinion? But be advised that differences of opinion about the benefits of coronary bypass surgery continue to be the rule in the medical community.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have been told that I have gallstones, but that I do not need an operation — yet. The idea of surgery frightens me. Is there any way — for example, diet — that gallstones can be eliminated without the need for an operation? — Ginny

Dear Ginny: Experiments that have been under way for some time indicate that gallstones, which are bits of cholesterol in the gallbladder, can be dissolved with a natural bile acid present in the gallbladder, called chenodeoxycholic acid. The findings are now being reviewed by the Food and Drug Administration before approval for its manufacture is granted.

More than 900 subjects were included in the studies, and they have been followed for two years, while chenodeoxycholic acid produced some adverse side effects, such as diarrhea, it was found to be safe and effective in many patients. On the other hand, very little dissolution of gallstones was found in patients given a placebo.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I remember being told that normal blood pressure is 100 plus the person's age for the upper figure, and 70 plus the person's age for the lower figure. Does this rule still hold? I haven't heard it mentioned lately. — Peter, Great Neck, L.I.

Dear Peter: The "rule" you cite is not only misleading, it could be downright dangerous. A 35-year-old man walking around with a diastolic pressure (the lower figure) of 105 (70 plus 35) had better get to a doctor.

**Odessa man sentenced to die**

SILVER CITY, N.M. (AP) — An Odessa, Texas, man convicted of the murder of a Lordsburg restaurant owner has been sentenced to die by lethal injection on Jan. 21, 1982.

District Judge Norman Hodges pronounced the sentence Monday for Walter Scott Fennell, 21.

Defense attorney Mark Porter said an appeal would be filed this week. New Mexico's death penalty law provides for an automatic appeal of the conviction and sentence before the state Supreme Court.

A district court jury last week determined that Fennell receive the death sentence after convicting him of first-degree murder in the shooting death of Richard Bejarano.

Hodges also sentenced Fennell to terms of 10 years for attempted first-degree murder, 10 years for robbery while armed with a deadly weapon and 2½ years for unlawful taking of a motor vehicle.

The charges stemmed from a holdup-shooting at Bejarano's restaurant March 8 that left Bejarano dead and his wife, Karen, wounded.

The Silver City jury was the second to return a death verdict in New Mexico since the 1979 Legislature passed the state's death penalty law.

William Wayne Gilbert of Albuquerque was sentenced a year ago to die by lethal injection on his conviction on two counts of first-degree murder in the shotgun slayings of an Albuquerque couple.

The law states that the manner of inflicting death shall be by "administration of a continuous intravenous injection of a lethal quantity of an ultra-short-acting barbiturate in combination with a chemical paralytic agent."

The warden of the New Mexico State Penitentiary "shall provide a suit-

able and efficient room of place enclosed from public view, within the walls of the state penitentiary, and therein provide all necessary appliances requisite for carrying into execution the death penalty," the law states.

The last execution in New Mexico occurred in 1960 in the gas chamber at the penitentiary. Bejarano, owner of a Dairy Queen restaurant,

died of five gunshot wounds suffered in the robbery. His wife survived four wounds.

Two other men also were charged in the shooting. Sixteen-year-old Shane Lasiter of Odessa pleaded guilty and was sentenced to life imprisonment after he was declared an adult. Lasiter now is 17. Charles Cobb, also of Odessa, is scheduled to go on trial Nov. 30.

**Dome growth continues at Mount St. Helens**

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — A "moderate" level of rockfalls, avalanches and steam emissions in Mount St. Helens' crater indicates the volcano is continuing its latest non-explosive eruption, officials say.

That eruption, which began Friday, is producing a new lobe of lava on the northern portion of the lava dome in the volcano's amphitheater. "Seismic activity at the mountain is going down, but it's not down to low levels," Thom Corcoran, a U.S. Forest Service spokesman, said Monday.

The U.S. Geological Survey says dome growth is continuing, but at a much slower rate than on Friday and Saturday, Corcoran said.

**Two fighter jets collide**

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AP) — Two F-15 fighter jets collided during a refueling mission 22,000 feet over the Gulf of Mexico, sending one plane plummeting to a crash while the second limped back to base, an Eglin Air Force base spokesman said.

The pilot of the downed Eagle aircraft, who may have ejected from his aircraft, is missing. The second pilot was not hurt and his plane had only limited damage, according to spokesman Lt. Craig McDaniel.

Air Force and Coast Guard planes, boats and helicopters were scouring an area about 60 miles south of Panama City, Fla., where the plane crashed Monday night, McDaniel said.

An Air Force base systems command spokesman who refused to be identified said the pilot of the KC-130 refueling tanker reportedly saw what appeared to be an ejection seat pop out of the craft.

The KC-130 pilot also "saw something flying from the colliding aircraft, which may have been an ejection seat," he said.

"Someone reported seeing a flash," said Maj. Bill Campbell, a base information officer. "But the aircraft was not on fire when it was last seen," he said.

The least damaged jet made it back to Eglin with "some structural damage" and extensive fuel leaks, he added.

"We were lucky the second one made it back," McDaniel said.

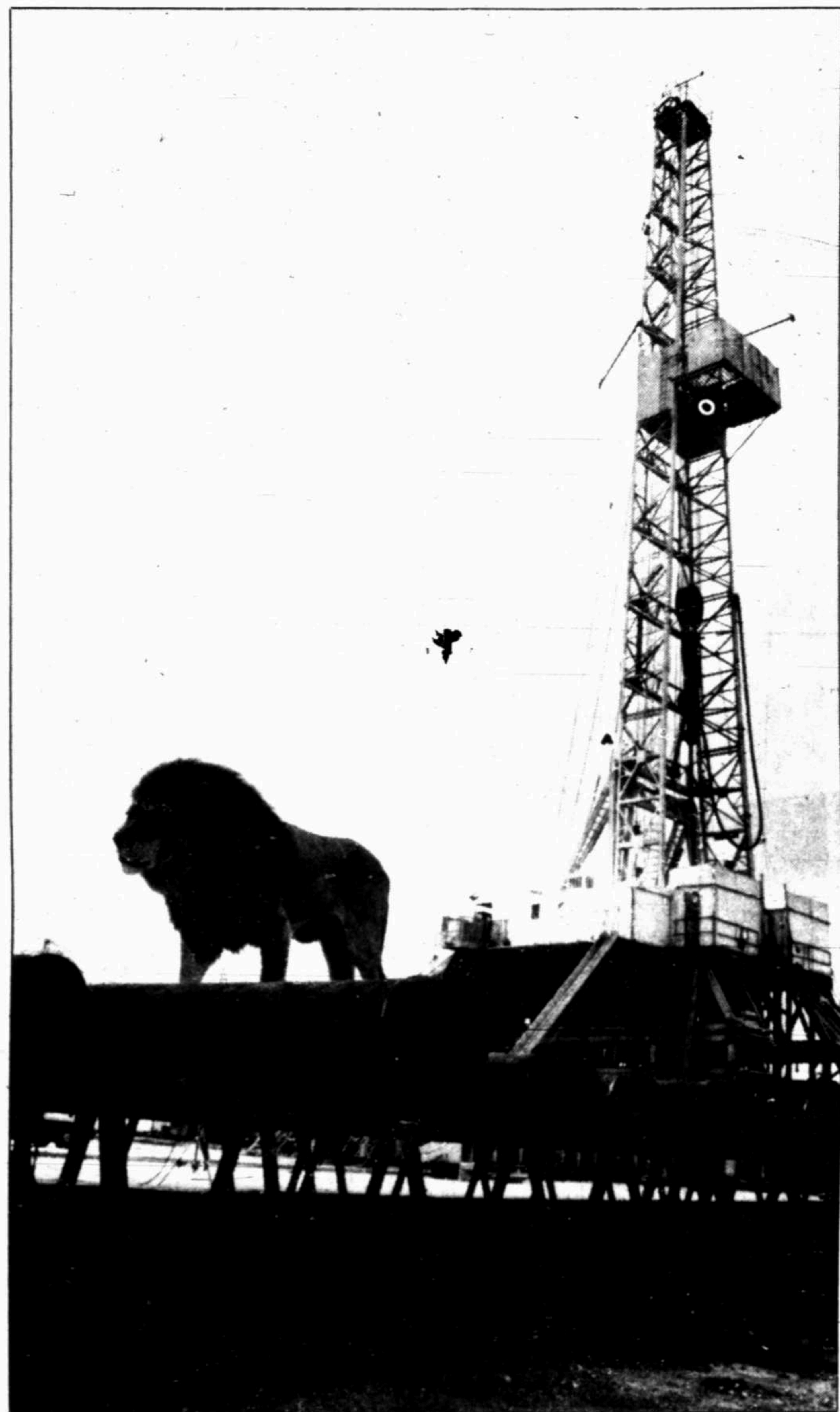

# Murdered nun called 'daughter of God'

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A 76-year-old nun who had been raped, beaten and strangled in a convent was remembered as a "daughter of God," a woman who "helped create good in us."

While police continued their search for the killer of Sister Tadea Benz, the Bishop of the Diocese of Amarillo asked mourners Monday to withhold their anger over her brutal slaying.

About 500 mourners attended a Roman Catholic funeral Mass at St. Laurence Cathedral and formed a two-mile-long procession to Llano Cemetery under drizzly skies.

"That this good and gentle nun who prayed for us, who helped to create good in us, should die such a senseless death is an absurdity," said Bishop L.T. Matthiesen, who celebrated the Mass.

"But she is not the first. The mystery of evil has been with us from the days of Adam and Eve."

"Surely this woman was a daughter of God," Matthiesen said. "And when we reflect on what happened this weekend, we can write our own history to the world. Shall we write it now in anger? Incredible as it may seem in the light of this weekend, I know that we must write it in the way of love."

Amarillo police said they had formed an investigative team with members of the Potter County Sheriff's Department, but said they had no new leads in the slaying.

Police homicide Capt. Jimmy Davis said he hoped the fact that possible evidence had been disturbed would not hamper the investigation. The homicide was not discovered for several

hours, because the nuns who found Sister Tadea's body thought she died of natural causes.

"Sometimes we've had crime scenes that were not touched and we were able to get everything that was there, and we still couldn't solve the crime. I don't know that any evidence was destroyed out there. We have no doubts that the sisters were acting in good faith when they thought the death was natural," Davis said.

Nuns who found Sister Tadea's body Saturday said they thought she had fallen and attributed blood on her face and on the sheets to a possible hemorrhage. Her body was sent to a funeral home.

Police were not summoned until later in the day, after the nuns found a broken pane of glass in the convent's community room.

Investigators went to the convent to investigate a possible burglary, but found nothing missing and learned that Sister Tadea had died.

Peace Justice L.B. Bartlett then ordered the funeral home to stop embalming the body and contacted pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann, who found the evidence of homicide and sexual abuse.

Police said the slaying had "marked similarities" to the July 9 death of Narnie C. Bryson, a 77-year-old Amarillo woman who also was raped and strangled.

Sister Tadea, born Martina Benz in Marbach, Switzerland, came to the United States from Colombia in 1932. She became a U.S. citizen in 1937 and had been at the Franciscan convent since 1944.

## Economic figures show business failures up

Towering interest expenses and sluggish sales are pushing U.S. businesses into collapse at a faster pace than during the recession year of 1980, according to the latest federal government and private economic figures.

Dun & Bradstreet, the economic information service in New York, reported Monday that there were 459 commercial and industrial failures in the final week of October, or 51 percent more than in the comparable week last year.

For the year through Oct. 29, business failures are up 41 percent from the corresponding 1980 period, Dun & Bradstreet said.

The government's latest economic reports indicated more bad news ahead for business despite a reduction Monday in prime lending rates at major U.S. banks.

The Commerce Department said orders for new manufactured goods fell sharply in September, while manufacturers' inventories rose. In a separate report, the department said the

value of new construction in September declined 0.4 percent, hitting the lowest rate since October 1980.

The department said orders for new manufactured goods fell 0.9 percent in September. That was better than the revised drop of 1.5 percent in August but it would have been worse if not for an 18.1 percent rise in defense orders.

More significantly, the department said the value of non-defense capital goods in September plunged 8 percent from August after being unchanged between July and August. That represents a steep drop in corporations' spending on plant and equipment, a key to the nation's manufacturing system.

Meanwhile, the department said the value of manufacturers' inventories rose 1.1 percent in September, the biggest jump since last February and a sign manufacturers will cut production to compensate for lower demand.

Separately, the F.W. Dodge Division of McGraw-Hill Information Systems Co. said in a report today that contracts for new construction rose at an annual rate of 2 percent in September.

## Exposure kills man stuck in car

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A 22-year-old man trapped for seven days in the wreckage of his car at the bottom of a brush-covered ravine has died at a hospital after suffering exposure and multiple injuries, officials said.

Gary Corbett's tiny foreign car went off a 15-foot embankment, landed at the mouth of a concrete culvert and was flooded by rainwater at least twice, authorities said.

Deputy Coroner Everett Mauger said Corbett, of Descanso, died Monday night at University Hospital two days after he was found in his wrecked car by a 12-year-old girl on horseback. Mauger said the cause of death would not be known until an autopsy was performed.

Corbett underwent surgery Monday and was suffering from internal injuries and "massive infection," a spokeswoman at University Hospital said.

Rescuers said the doors of the car appeared to be wedged shut, which had prevented Corbett from crawling out.

Corbett lost control of his car shortly after leaving his sister's home in Pine Valley about 40 miles east of San Diego, according to California Highway Patrolman Terry McAfee.

A large tree and heavy brush obscured the wreckage, authorities said. Marti Bennett, a flight nurse on the rescue helicopter, said the brush was so thick the crew couldn't see the car from the air.

"It's a miracle he was still alive," said McAfee. "It was cold and windy out there all week."

Sherri Musfelt of Alpine spotted the overturned car while horseback riding and rode home to tell her father.

"He was unconscious, and infection from his wounds already had begun," said McAfee.

Corbett regained consciousness while being removed from the car and "managed to grunt his name," said McAfee.

"He was very weak," said Bennett. "It's just incredible that he survived."

Susan Corbett, the man's sister, notified authorities that he was missing on Oct. 24. She said her brother visited her the day before and promised to call her that morning.

Harry Musfelt, 54, said the only reason his daughter saw the rear wheels of the vehicle at the opening of a culvert was that she was sitting high on horseback and was able to look down the embankment.

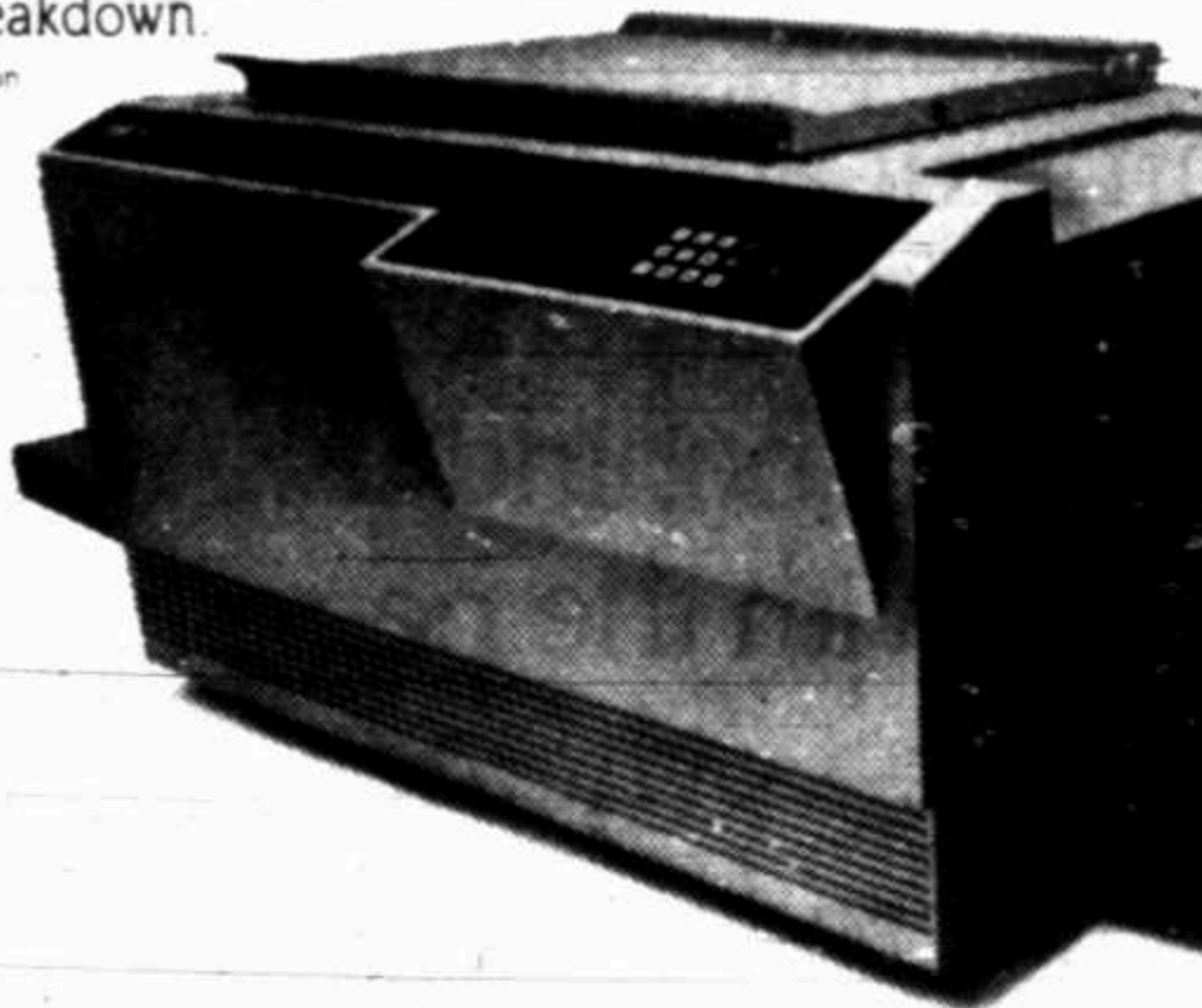

# Inmates release hostages

GRATERFORD, Pa. (AP) — The state's biggest prison remained in a state of emergency today as guards prepared a cell-by-cell search to find out how a gang of prisoners got the four guns they used to terrify hostages for six days.

The standoff ended Monday night when the seven inmate captors released the six remaining hostages from the kitchen of the State Correctional Institution after firing their guns to empty them of ammunition.

The hostages were unharmed and officials agreed to the inmates demand that they be transferred from the maximum-security state prison to an undisclosed federal prison.

Chuck Stone, a Philadelphia newspaper columnist called in by the governor's office to negotiate the release, said the burst of gunfire "sounded like cannons."

"THEN THEY CAME out with their hands up. The hostages came first carrying the guns," Stone said.

Gov. Dick Thornburgh announced later in Harrisburg that he would form a commission to study the hostage-taking, which followed an unsuccessful escape attempt by a group of prisoners. He said the commission will help insure that action is taken on tougher jail sentences, more cells, and other "lessons" drawn from the siege.

The governor also blamed Community Legal Services for putting the suspected inmate ringleader, Joseph "Jo Jo" Bowen, 35, of Philadelphia, back in the prison's general population in 1975.

Bowen, convicted of murdering a Philadelphia policeman and later a Philadelphia prison warden and deputy warden, had been segregated from other inmates. Thornburgh said Community Legal Services won a court order releasing Bowen from segregation that was approved by the previous administration over objections from prison officials.

Authorities said they hoped a search of the cells of all 2,000 inmates

would provide clues to how the convicts involved in the hostage-taking acquired a .22-caliber revolver, a .38-caliber revolver, a double-barreled, sawed-off shotgun and a single-barreled shotgun.

"WEAPONS ARE obviously a very important part of the investigation. The institution remains in a state of emergency," Correction Bureau spokesman Kenneth Robinson said.

The drama began Wednesday when at least four inmates tried to escape over a 30-foot wall with a makeshift rope. A tower guard foiled the escape by firing a warning shot. The inmates

returned three shots, fled to the kitchen and took 38 hostages, including 32 inmates and six prison staffers.

Twenty-nine inmate hostages were released or escaped during the weekend, but three inmates chose to stay behind with the captors holding the prison employees hostages, authorities said.

SEVERAL SHOTS were fired during the siege, including one last Thursday when a state trooper was bruised by what officials say was probably a ricocheting shotgun pellet.

Following their release, the three prison guards and three kitchen workers taken hostage were immediately brought to the infirmary, and prison physician Dr. Kemal Dincer reported

"everybody's perfect." Two diabetics among the hostages had received insulin and urine tests throughout the ordeal.

The freed staff hostages all returned to their homes Monday evening after being whisked away from the prison in cars. Troopers in riot gear left the prison, many of them smiling.

## IRS can't vouch for pension fund

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government says it is having trouble determining the long-term soundness of huge private pension funds, such as a scandal-plagued \$3.5 billion retirement fund run by the Teamsters' union.

The Internal Revenue Service said Monday that it can't guarantee that the fund's calculations for paying benefits to retirees in the future are actuarially sound.

IRS officials testified before the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, which was resuming hearings on labor racketeering today with an appearance by AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland. Ira Cohen, the IRS' chief actuary, told the panel Monday, "There is no universally accepted definition of actuarial soundness, even within the actuarial community."

MOREOVER, HE SAID, the IRS does not have authority under current law to determine whether a pension fund is actuarially sound.

His testimony led Sen. Warren Rudman, R-N.H., to suggest "maybe we ought to have a warning like the inspector general has on cigarette labels: These plans may not be actuarially sound. The IRS cannot guarantee that they are sound."

"That is correct," Cohen replied. But Cohen said the IRS does make sure pension funds meet less stringent standards on minimum funds and the Teamsters' Central States Pension Fund is undergoing that scrutiny.

The fund has been under federal investigation for years on charges of organized-crime influence and corruption.

The IRS has jurisdiction over whether the Teamsters fund qualifies for a tax exemption and is in the final stages of negotiations aimed at ensuring that the fund is properly run and keeps its tax-exempt status.

The tax-exempt status for the Teamsters' fund, revoked in 1976, was renewed in 1977 on grounds the fund complies with eight IRS conditions, particularly a guarantee of independent management of its assets.

Most of the fund's assets have been placed in the hands of the Equitable Life Assurance Society.

The issue of actuarial soundness arises under a 1974 law designed to give long-range protection to employers and workers.

WITNESSES FROM THE IRS and the Labor Department have underscored the government's difficulty and uncertain jurisdiction in determining whether pension funds are financially sound.

Rudman said "there seems to be a real blur" in the government's administrative authority over the funds.

Cohen testified that the Teamsters' fund, with 500,000 participants, has more than \$6 billion in unfunded liabilities.

But he said that does not necessarily mean the fund is in trouble and added that it is difficult to assess the actuarial soundness of the fund, particularly because of assumptions on changing interest rates.

"The interest rate reflects the likely return on all assets over a long period of years," Cohen testified.

## The fears of Europe

The fact that the growing European disarmament movement is partly manipulated by the Soviet Union and that it is partly founded on a combination of unrealistic hopes doesn't make it any the less real. Recently there were major rallies in Brussels, Paris, London and Rome; coming on the heels of similar demonstrations in West Germany, where the current peace movement is probably the strongest, those demonstrations have to be reckoned with.

There are no simple responses here. The European movement is itself an amalgam of different groups: unilateralists demanding nuclear disarmament in Europe regardless of what the Russians do; bilateralists demanding a reduction of forces on both sides, many of them people just as critical of Soviet escalation as of the West's. What is clear is that reminding responsible Europeans that Soviet forces pose more of a threat than American weapons — weapons that are themselves being deployed in response to that threat — is unnecessary. The attempt to remind others will almost certainly fall on deaf ears.

Yet it's also true that American attempts to talk tough and the casual remarks about limited nuclear exchanges to something less than total war have played to the Brezhnev peace offensive. So far, at least, the signs are that the tough talk has done more to scare our friends than to chasten our adversaries.

At this moment, the most im-

portant item on the agenda is negative — most particularly it calls for the restraint required not to say things that immediately need clarification or explanation. More generally, it calls for a consistency, both in speech and in act, that will begin to restore confidence around the globe that this country speaks carefully and with a single voice, and that it acts firmly but cautiously.

For a generation and a half, this country's nuclear policy has worked — has deterred war and Soviet adventurism in Europe — and has thus protected both Europe and, in some large sense, the peace of the world. Not in this century has Europe been at peace for so long. Our determination has not required bluster or threats or speculation to make itself felt.

What may be most important now, both for the substance and the image of peace, is to make it clear that we are, in fact, not afraid to negotiate — that indeed we insist on negotiations. Talks begin Nov. 30 on reduction of theater nuclear weapons in Europe. But if such talks are possible and necessary, how much more necessary the resumption of negotiations on strategic weapons and other issues. Negotiations themselves deprive the Soviets of one of their most effective propaganda weapons. They also restore to everyone else the only real source of hope. The administration should recognize the value of hard bargaining with the Russians.

## Cutting crazy records

The Guinness Book of World Records, at age 27, certainly hasn't broken any speed records in finally — and sensibly — deciding to stop publicizing new "world records" in certain categories of hazardous lunacy. Among the examples are: Eating such things as bicycles, entire trees, live ants, goldfish, chewing-gum and raw eggs in a shell. The very thought of eating those things is enough to make most people sick, but the acts themselves could have far more dire consequences.

Thus, said the book's editor: "People can do what they like, but we're not going to chronicle it. Maybe the obituary columns will, but we won't."

Many kids love reading the whacky facts in Guinness. So, news of the revised policy should come as a relief to parents who

may have worried that one of their youngsters would get hurt or sick trying to "get in" Guinness.

## Haig column sparks urgent phone calls

WASHINGTON — The column that was scheduled to appear Tuesday in this space reached the White House in advance and stimulated some urgent telephone calls from President Reagan and Secretary of State Haig. The story behind the column is more intriguing, therefore, than the original report.

I had written that Alexander Haig was top man on the president's "disappointment list" and that he "reportedly has one foot on a banana peel." I had cited incidents that allegedly had caused the president to lose confidence in Haig's judgment.

Haig was so disturbed over the column that he called twice to discuss it. He said it was obviously the handiwork of a top White House aide, who has been running a guerrilla campaign against him for nine months.

The campaign to discredit him, said Haig, also involved persons high in the Central Intelligence Agency and the Senate. "This damages my ability to carry out the president's foreign policy," he declared. He called it "sabotage of the president" by some of his own people. "It is just mind boggling," said Haig.

Later, the president telephoned to say the column was wrong. "I am very pleased with Al Haig and what he has done," Reagan assured me. "All that I have heard is that he has the confidence of leaders around the world. We haven't had a secretary who was so well thought of in years."

The president said he'd like to know "who is saying these things" against Haig but acknowledged amiably, "I guess I am asking the impossible." Yes, the identity of sources is one thing a reporter can't tell even the president.

Reagan reviewed with me the inci-

dents I had reported in the column. I had cited, for example, Haig's handling of Menachem Begin during the Israeli leader's recent U.S. visit.

According to my sources, Haig had favored placating Begin and had promised that the Israeli leader, in return, would not lobby against the U.S. sale of AWACS radar planes to Saudi Arabia. Begin, nevertheless, had spoken out against the sale.

Reagan said the promise not to lobby came from Begin himself, not second-hand from Haig. "Menachem told me he would not lobby against the AWACS sale," said the president.

"I got upset," he admitted, "when I got reports from the Hill that Begin had spoken against the AWACS sale. But Menachem said, no, he had just answered questions but had not gone out of his way to deliberately lobby. I accepted that and believed it."

After the Senate approved the AWACS deal, added Reagan, "the Israeli reaction was the minimum they had to say. I am not so unhappy

about it that it bothers me."

I had also reported in the column that the president was upset over Haig's "backdoor involvement" in helping to arrange for ex-President Richard Nixon's recent Middle East tour.

Reagan said no one had gone behind his back but that Nixon had advised him about the tour in advance. "Dick told me that he was going on to Saudi Arabia," said the president. "These were people he had known as president. I had no objections."

But there was one thing the president wanted to emphasize: Alexander Haig speaks for him on foreign affairs.

## Billy Graham, Sen. Rudman turned tide for AWACS sale

WASHINGTON — Evangelist Billy Graham and Sen. Warren Rudman of New Hampshire were the unsung heroes in President Reagan's cliff-hanging AWACS victory Oct. 28, though neither wants any public credit.

Reagan turned to the country's best-known evangelical preacher to offset anti-AWACS inroads in the Senate by the Moral Majority's Rev. Jerry Falwell, a friend and supporter of Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin. Parrying Falwell in talks to at least two senators, Graham made the case that AWACS in Saudi Arabia posed no military threat to Israel.

Help from Rudman, the only Jewish member of the Senate to support the AWACS deal, also came away from public view. His private remarks made a deep impression on Sen. Roger Jepsen of Iowa, who had declared himself totally opposed to the sale. Jepsen's switch at the last moment to support Reagan was in no small part caused by Rudman.

REAGAN'S B-1 DEBACLE

New doubts about President Reagan's proposed B-1 bomber program are rising because of confidential Pentagon cost estimates showing production figures far higher than the official Air Force estimates sent to Congress.

The Air Force originally said each of the 100 new bombers requested by Reagan would cost \$230 million. Defense Department officials shocked Congress by admitting last week they had underestimated actual cost by about \$90 million a plane.

But confidential estimates of the true cost, now under Air Force lock and key, show a further expansion of \$100 million per plane — a huge overrun that Pentagon officials do not want Congress to learn about. The B-1, killed by Jimmy Carter four years ago, is likely to be killed for good in Congress when the full story of escalating costs gets out next year.

### KEMP REMINDS REAGAN

Rep. Jack Kemp, who has criticized Ronald Reagan's budgetary and monetary policies lately, in an Oct. 23 letter reminded the president that nothing has been done about his campaign promise for tax-free enterprise zones in blighted urban areas such as the South Bronx.

Joining Kemp in signing the letter was a fellow conservative Republican, House Minority Whip Trent Lott of Mississippi, and four liberal Democrats: Reps. Robert Garcia of New York, Augustus Hawkins of California and William Gray and Bob Edgar of Pennsylvania. "The people of America's inner cities want concrete evidence that they are not the victims of recession," they wrote Reagan.

That reflects Kemp's fear that the permanent bureaucracy and the Reagan administration's emphasis on budget cutting are combining to suffocate the enterprise zones concept, the Republican Party's only plan for the inner city. Unless there is some positive action, Kemp is likely to go public with his complaints.

### A GAULLIST SOCIALIST?

Although French President Francois Mitterrand got along well with President Reagan at the Yorktown summit, some diplomats detected incipient Gaullist "pretensions" that could cause future problems with the U.S.

One of the first decisions by the new socialist president when he took over the Elysee Palace was to move his office out of defeated President Valery Giscard's room into the chamber that Charles de Gaulle occupied as president.

Mitterrand also ordered back every bit of furniture, rugs and curtains that de Gaulle had used, placing them exactly as before. This Gaullist "pretension" is viewed by some diplomats here as a possible cause of future friction between Reagan and Mitterrand, quite apart from their diametrically opposite economic views. In their talks at Yorktown and Cancun, Reagan and Mitterrand discussed many topics but came to grips with none at all.

JERSEY REVERSE COATTAILS  
Republican candidate Thomas Kean's 11th-hour television commercials stress his support from President Reagan in Tuesday's New Jersey gubernatorial election, but the

Democratic campaign of Rep. Jim Florio has kept away from Democratic governor Brendan Byrne as though he had the plague.

When the massively unpopolar Byrne turned up at a breakfast addressed by Florio, the governor stayed away from the candidate and did not even sit at the head table. John Deardourff, Kean's media consultant, loves to run commercials of some rare film footage showing Byrne and Florio side by side.

Although he won a second term in a stunning 1977 comeback, Byrne's popularity has been consistently low for eight years. Anti-tax sentiment directed against him is now reinforced by anger that the new indoor sports facility at the Meadowlands complex has been named the Brendan Byrne Arena (which also plays prominently in Kean commercials). Florio often encounters voters on the campaign trail asking him to re-name the arena.

## A lesson in survival from Israel

A friend and co-worker, a jolly fellow but a perfect liberal, was defending the Soviet Union. Liberals do that to avoid being thought of as, ugh, American nationalists. It was no big deal, he argued, for the Soviets to station troops in Cuba since we had stationed troops in Iran.

I didn't want to confuse him by explaining the difference between the combat forces the Soviets have in Cuba and the non-combat technicians we once had in Iran. There was another point I wanted to make.

"I see. If they do something and we do something, it even's out. Fair's fair. Okay, when one of them sticks a bayonet in your belly, you won't worry about it because no doubt one of our guys will have stuck one of theirs."

What my friend had temporarily forgotten was that he is not a disinterested third party to the two-party dispute between the Soviet Union and the United States. Whether he likes it or not, he is on one side and the Soviets are on the other. My country right or wrong but my country is not only a slogan but an existential fact.

To put it another way, nations are like ships. All of us are on the good ship, United States. All of the Soviets are on another ship, Mother Russia. If Mother Russia decides to fire a broadside and sink the United States, even those passengers on the United States who don't like the captain of their own ship will sink with it. Even those passengers on the United States who believe there is no real difference worth fighting over will sink. Our fate is tied to the fate of our nation.

I often say that the Israelis can teach us many valuable lessons and this is one of them. Israeli voters are, if you can imagine it, a 100 times more passionately partisan than we are. An Israeli election is a knock-down, gouge-'em-in-the-eye brawl. Character assassination is routine in Israeli political debates — but, on the issue of national survival and security, all the parties (except the communist) unite like a rock.

No Israeli politician would dream of gutting the defense budget or of undermining Israeli foreign policy as it affects national security. Even the Peace Now movement, which advocates a more conciliatory approach to the Arabs, supports a strong national defense. In fact, it is led by combat veterans who are still active reservists and ready to fight to defend their country. In other words, unlike American liberals, Israelis understand that however they may differ on how to run the ship, they are all on the same ship.

Contrast this with American liberals who often attack the American defense establishment as if it were an enemy. The sorry shape of our present defenses is a direct result of this liberal insanity. The sorry shape of our intelligence and internal security forces is a direct result of this form of liberal insanity which views those Americans who disagree with them as a more dangerous enemy than the Soviet Union. Too many American liberals see no difference between an American general and a Soviet general.

The solution lies with us, the people. We should demand that the issue of defense and national security be exempt from partisan politics. We can do that by ruthlessly eliminating from public office every single politician, regardless of party, who in any way acts to weaken national security.

Even in the Vietnam Era, the issue was clear. I argued then that those who opposed the war should debate that issue with the politicians who involved us, but that anyone, who in any way, helped the opposing side and attacked the military forces fighting the war, was a damned traitor and deserved to have his head cracked open with a baseball bat.

Treason is not protected by the First Amendment.

## Truly and Engle ready to pilot shuttle Columbia for orbital ride

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Columbia stands ready for a second triumphant tour of space, awaiting the supercold fuel that will power her pulsating 17,400-mile-an-hour orbital ride. Her astronauts pronounced themselves "all set...more than ready" for a Wednesday launch.

Joe Engle and Richard Truly arranged a sunrise visit to the launch pad, just hours after a large service structure had been rolled away, leaving Columbia bathed in floodlights, a glistening American bird poised for flight.

Countdown for Launch II continued today, as smooth as Columbia's maiden flight last April, aiming for a 7:30 a.m. EST Wednesday liftoff of the first spaceship ever ticketed for a return trip to space.

Officials foresaw no problems but fretted over the uncertainties of weather. The launch day weather forecast was acceptable, with scattered clouds, winds of 13 mph, visibility at 7 miles and temperature of 75 degrees.

Several hours were blocked out on the astronauts' schedule today to practice emergency landings in a modified jet plane on a 15,000-foot runway near the pad. They would use the strip Wednesday only if their shuttle engines quit early and they could not get into orbit.

"Since we got into the count, everything has gone bang, bang, bang," said shuttle test manager Donald K. "Deke" Slayton. He said it was smoother than preparations for Columbia's maiden flight in April.

The launch pad was busy early today as work crews checked power, environmental, navigation and communications systems, removed unnecessary equipment and made the cockpit ready for the crew. The schedule called for a 12-hour, 10-minute "hold" beginning in the morning, with the countdown resuming in the evening.

Early Wednesday, the crews will load the ship's huge external tank with 526,000 gallons of volatile fuels to drive the three main engines.

Engle and Truly are to pilot the spacecraft for 5 days, 4 hours, 10 minutes — more than twice the

duration of the first mission. They have a flight plan that is suitably more ambitious than the first, as they will conduct tests carefully designed to further stretch the limits of the ship's capabilities.

The astronauts, who have waited years for their first space journey, demonstrated their eagerness when they arrived at Cape Canaveral Monday after piloting separate T-38 jet planes from the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Air Force Col. Engle, 49, the commander, stepped to a microphone on the tarmac and told some of the hundreds of reporters covering the mission:

"We've been looking forward to it for a long time. We're ready to go. We're going to tune up and polish up tomorrow with the STA out on the strip, and day after tomorrow we're going to do the real thing."

The STA is the shuttle training aircraft, a Gulfstream II jet modified to handle like the shuttle during approach and landing.

"Columbia's ready, and Joe and I are more than ready; we're all set to go," said Truly, 43, a Navy captain.

The astronauts' families were flown to Cape Canaveral from Houston Monday in a NASA transport. They'll watch the liftoff from a special viewing site at the Kennedy Space Center.

Later today, the astronauts were to review the flight plan, receive a weather briefing, eat dinner at 4:30 p.m. and be in bed at 5:30 p.m. in crew quarters a few miles from the pad. They'll be awakened at 2:40 a.m. Wednesday, for breakfast, a physical exam, pressure suit donning and a van trip to the waiting Columbia.

During their five days aloft, the astronauts are to subject the spaceship's systems to more rigorous tests than did John Young and Robert Crippen in April as they take it another step toward operational readiness. A total of four test flights are slated before Columbia starts satellite-carrying missions late next year.

Engle and Truly will devote considerable time to testing a 50-foot mechanical arm intended on future flights to place payloads in orbit and to retrieve others for repair or servicing.

## Shuttle has bionic arm

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — On its second voyage into orbit, the Columbia will carry an ingenious bionic arm that will eventually turn the space shuttle into a satellite delivery truck.

In space, the arm can grab onto a 60,000-pound object the size of a boxcar and wave it like a handkerchief; on Earth, it is so weak it can't lift itself.

The device is a space crane, designed to lift satellites out of the Columbia's cargo space and release them in orbit and to retrieve other satellites for refurbishing on Earth. It is attached at the forward left side of the shuttle's cargo bay and controlled from the cockpit by an astronaut.

As long and thick as two telephone poles placed end to end, the arm is hinged at the elbow, moving about like an upper arm and a forearm. At the hand, the device loses its human quality. There are no fingers; only three wires that intersect to form a snare — called an end effector.

The booms that link the arm joints are tubes made of a carbon composite material so lightweight that it needs to be braced by a "strong-back" in the gravity of Earth.

During the Columbia's mission, the astronauts will practice with the arm for 22 hours just to get acquainted with its operation. On Earth they had to make do with simulation.

A report on the year's fundraising campaign, which began in September, will be given Thursday. This year's goal is \$75,000. All pledges and contributions are not in at this time, according to Tamra-Shae Oatman, executive director. She said that donations can still be made by contacting the PP

administrative office in Odessa or any of the nine clinics.

Contributions will be used to continue family planning services to residents of a 17-county region in the Permian Basin. The agency operates on a sliding fee scale so that many patients pay for services, but low income patients receive free or low-cost care.

"Financial support is therefore necessary to provide for those in need, and local donations allow the agency greater self-sufficiency from government assistance," said Ms. Oatman.

Preventive health care is stressed at Planned Parenthood. Physical exams for women, birth control methods and information, counseling and other services all help couples in planning the timing and spacing of their children.

"When birth control is used, abortions are prevented because unwanted pregnancies are prevented," said Ms. Oatman. "Planned Parenthood does not advocate abortion or provide abortions to patients, but the agency supports the 1973 Supreme Court decision allowing a woman and her physician the right to choose an abortion," she added.

The clinics are located in Odessa, Midland, Big Spring, Andrews, Ft. Stockton, Lamesa, Monahans, Pecos and Seminole. An information center is provided in McCamey.

## DEAR ABBY Girl's endless diet may have tragic end

DEAR ABBY: Our 14-year-old niece is suffering from anorexia nervosa (dieting to the point of starvation), but she has not been diagnosed as such because her parents refuse to seek further medical help. (They took the girl to two doctors. One said, "She needs to gain weight, and she wants to." The other doctor said, "You're lucky. I have a daughter her age and she's too fat!")

Abby, this girl is going to die if she doesn't get help soon. She is 5 feet 5 and is down to 75 pounds! She's pale and listless and eats literally nothing. It all started when she decided she was too fat and she quit eating. Now she's determined to stay "thin" and she's down to skin and bone.

Abby, is there some information, support group or information center one can contact to get literature about this terrible disease? Talking to her parents has done no good. Some doctors they have seen obviously know nothing about it. Please help me to help them. — CONCERNED AUNT

DEAR AUNT: There has been an alarming increase in the number of anorexia nervosa and associated disorder cases lately. 90 to 95 percent of which are women. The condition usually begins in the teen years when figure-conscious girls begin to diet because "thin is in" — then they become obsessed with the fear of getting fat and can't stop dieting. There are an estimated 10,000 victims in the United States alone, which about 15 percent die. Some cases die!

ANAD (National Association of Anorexia and Associated Disorders) is an educational, self-help organization in this country (serving Canada and several other countries) to address itself to this problem.

ANAD provides information about anorexia and provides referrals for counseling, treatment and support groups wherever you live. Write to: ANAD, Box 271, Highland Park, Ill. 60035. A self-addressed, business-size envelope with 37 cents postage speeds the response, but it is not necessary.

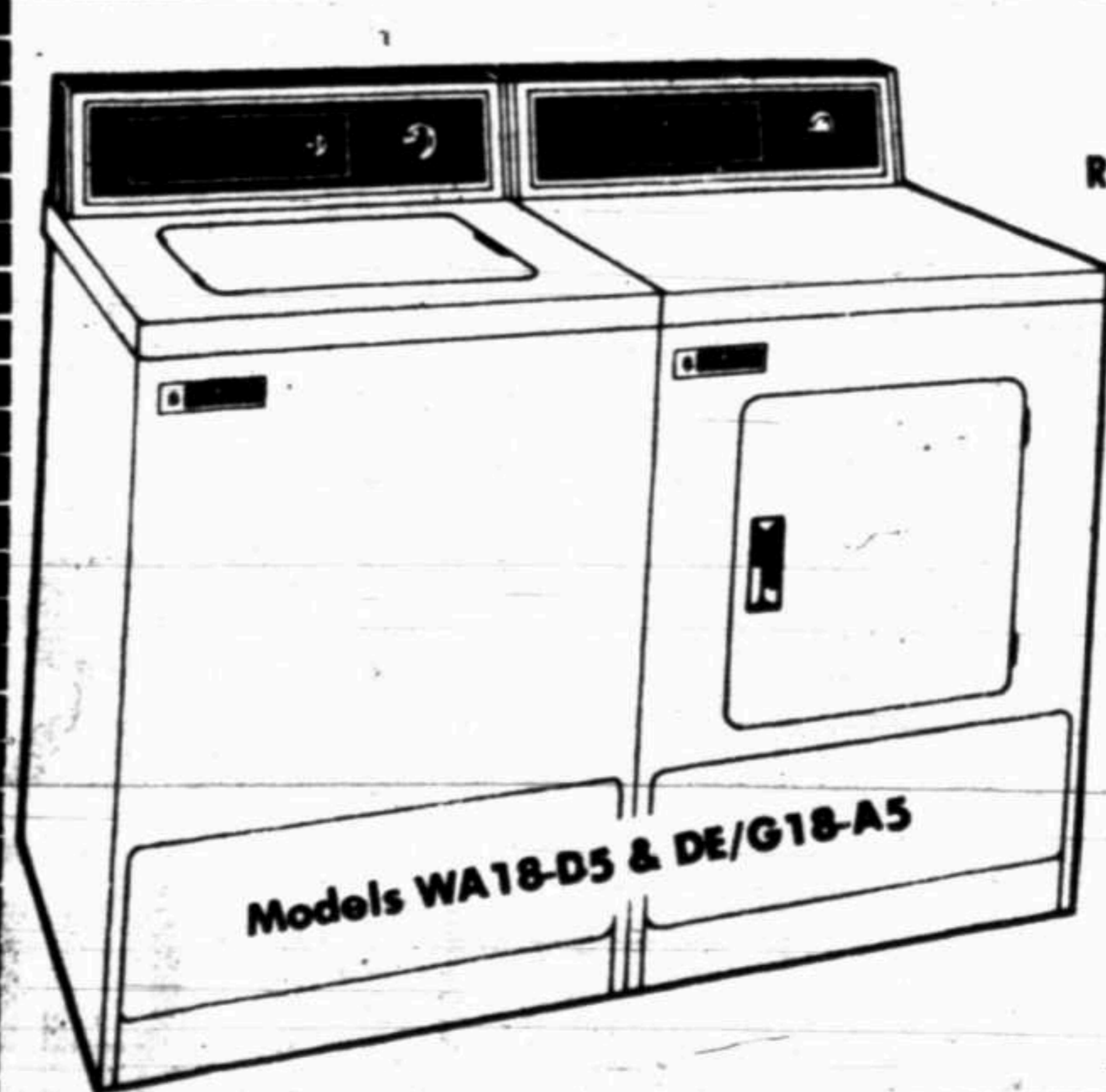

# FAA orders light airplane inspections

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Reacting to a crash in which part of a wing fell off a twin-engine plane, the Federal Aviation Administration has ordered emergency inspections "before further flight" of nearly 3,000 light airplanes.

The order, issued Monday by the FAA central regional headquarters in Kansas City, affects about 2,300 planes made by Beech Aircraft Corp. and almost 700 by Cessna Aircraft Co. All of

the planes are built in Wichita.

The Beech inspections stem from a fatal crash that occurred Oct. 26 at Mineral Wells, Texas, when the outer wing section fell off a King Air E-90.

The FAA ordered inspections for Beech Queen Air, Airliner 99, and King Air Series 90 and 100 models. All are twin-engine planes.

## Music is their universal language

At Christmas the family, which includes Mama and Papa and six children ranging in age from 21 to 4, gathers around the grand piano and enjoys the rewards of coming from a musical heritage. One plays a violin, another the oboe. The smallest, age 4, does her part. She dances ballet.

Part of the evening, Papa, who spends his days teaching, directing the orchestra (Betic Philharmonic Orchestra of Seville, Spain) and acting as the orchestra's manager, can be found in the kitchen raiding the "like-a-supermarket" refrigerator, calling it a "culinary symphony."

Mama usually plays the piano between four and five hours a day. She is a concert pianist.

"Mama, don't play anymore," 4-year-old Tanya will ask during those practice hours. It isn't because she doesn't enjoy the music, because she does. It's because she's tired.

Laughing, concert pianist Angeles Renteria explained during a recent interview, "Tanya likes to dance." And she dances as long as Mama plays.

The interview included her husband, conductor Luis Izquierdo, who is the guest conductor for tonight's Midland-Odesa Symphony performance, and Sam Woodward, the Midland-Odesa Symphony & Chorale's general manager.

Woodward's duties of the day also included acting as interpreter. Miss Renteria does not speak as much English as she understands, nor does her

husband. This writer understands very little Spanish and speaks even less.

It was, nonetheless, a most delightful conversation. Both are quite gracious and enjoy joking with one another. And laughter is a universal language.

So is music.

Both Miss Renteria and Izquierdo tour extensively, often to countries where they don't speak the language. It hasn't been a problem for them because, as Izquierdo said, "Music is a universal language. The universal language in music is that of Italian, whereas ballet's is French. I speak a little German and in Europe German is their second language."

"In the United States there is always someone in the orchestra who speaks Spanish," he said.

When Izquierdo is working with the orchestra prior to performance time, he imitates the expression he wants and "in a program such as the one being presented here, I do a little dancing. The conductor's art is that of mimic, of gesture, another universal language."

The symphony's program includes the overture of "Los Esclavos Felices" by J.C. Arriaga, "Concierto Breve para Piano y Orquesta," by X. Montsalvatge, "Sinfonia Sevillana" by J. Turina and the second suite of "El Sombrero de Tres Picos" by M. de Falla.

For Miss Renteria and Izquierdo, this trip is an exception. The two don't usually perform together.

## Boy may have Massachusetts' first meteorite

NORTH ADAMS, Mass. (AP) — A 13-year-old junior astronomer and his father took the day off to travel to Har-

vard University today to find out if the baseball-sized object the lad says fell from the sky into his family vegetable garden

is really a meteorite. The father, Anthony M. Sarkis, 37, an employee of General Electric's plastics division, said he was told it may be the first meteorite ever known to fall in Massachusetts.

Sarkis said he and his son, Anthony Jr., will take the object to Harvard for tests.

"We don't know what it is," said the elder Sarkis. "It had a tail on it. It could be a meteorite or a piece of a satellite."

The younger Sarkis, an eighth grader, said he was adjusting his tele-

scope in his front yard Halloween night when he spotted a red fireball shoot across the sky and disappear behind his house.



You can now try the club finesse, but if that fails you might be reduced to hoping that you can drop the queen of hearts to fulfill your game. Better technique is to tackle hearts first.  
 Cash the ace and king of hearts. If the queen drops, you again cannot lose more than three tricks. But the lady doesn't oblige. Now do you cross to dummy to take the club finesse?  
 Not yet. You have yet another chance. Continue with a third heart. If the hearts split 3-3, or West has the queen, the high heart in dummy will take care of a club loser, and the high trump is the entry to it. East can ruff, but he will, in effect, be ruffing your loser with his winning trump.  
 But hearts are 4-2 the wrong way, so now you have no choice but to use the

trump entry to dummy to take the club finesse. Fortunately that succeeds, and you end up making the same ten tricks as those players who took the club finesse at trick three.

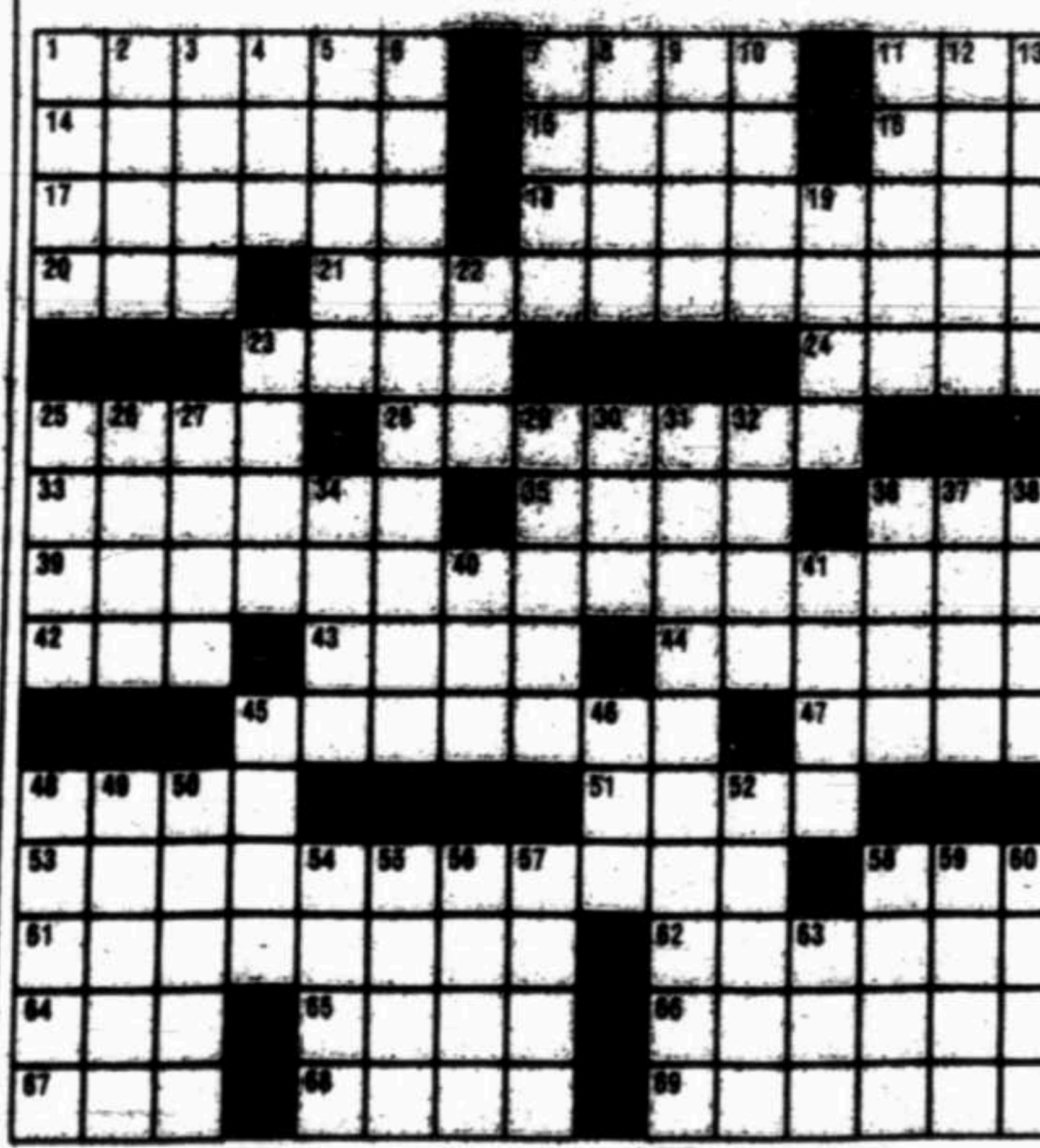

To give yourself the best chance to make your contract, it is important to test your possibilities in the right order. South's technique on this hand is an object lesson.  
 North-South bid a difficult hand quite well. Note that South could do no more than rebid spades as cheaply as possible until he learned that North had at least a couple of spades. And North had to bid a weak four-card suit at the two-level and then rebid two no trump to show his values.  
 West led the queen of diamonds. Before reading on, consider the hand from declarer's point of view and decide how you would give yourself the best chance to make four spades.  
 Obviously, there is no problem if spades break no worse than 3-1. You can cash dummy's trumps, get back to your hand with a diamond ruff and draw the last trump. Now you cannot lose more than two club tricks and a heart. Therefore, it must be right to lead a trump to the king at trick two. When West shows out on this trick, how do you continue?

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Film and television star Rock Hudson is expected to spend the next two weeks in a hospital after heart bypass surgery, described by his manager as "an unqualified success."

"His heart is functioning perfectly on its own, with no signs of any complications," said Tom Clark, personal manager for the 55-year-old actor.

Arteries feeding the heart muscle were bypassed in surgery Monday at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center.

"We're lucky they caught it this early," Clark said. "The doctors said he could have had a fatal heart attack within a month."

After his hospital stay, Hudson will recuperate at home for about six weeks, Clark said.

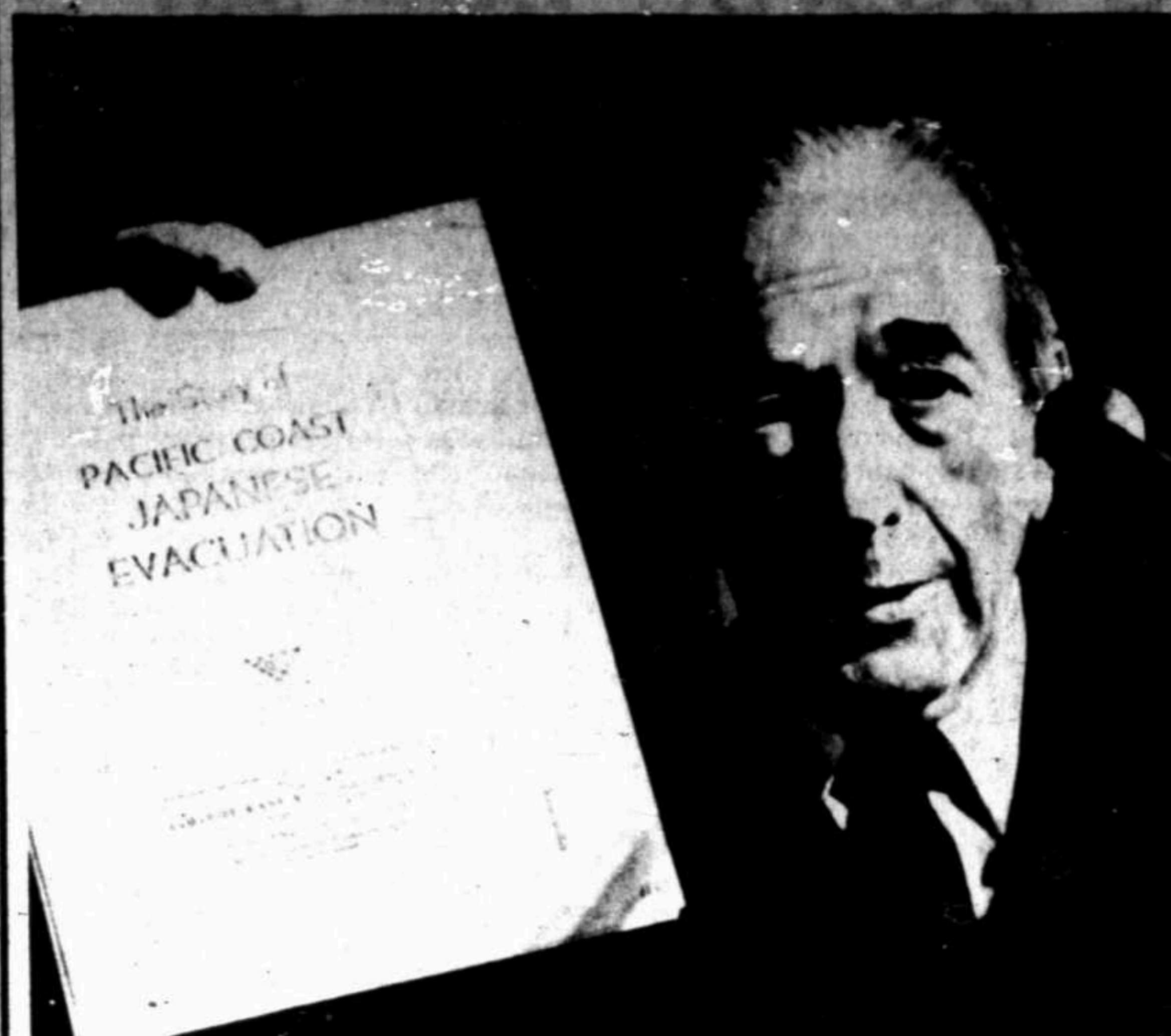

Official says uprooting Japanese had shadows of Kafka

WASHINGTON (AP) — An official who played a small, unwilling role in the uprooting of 120,000 people of Japanese ancestry during World War II says the experience was a wretched one that he hated.

Laurence I. Hewes was director of the western region of a New Deal small farmers' agency, the Farm Security Administration, when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. He was assigned the job of moving Japanese and Japanese-American farmers in California to 10 resettlement camps in the interior.

"There is something Kafkaesque in the evil of such an assignment," Hewes said today in testimony prepared for Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians. "Everything was so quiet and orderly."

"A field office in an Exclusion Area (which the evacuees had to leave) had the outward appearance of normalcy. Evacuees sat quietly beside desks, soberly answering questions as an official form was filled out."

"It was heartbreaking to witness the cooperation of human beings in preparations for their disposal," he said. "Loud expressions of rage and despair would have been a relief. The quiet acceptance of injustice was unnerving."

Hewes described the mood in California, where 110,000 people of Japanese descent lived, in the days after war broke out.

At first, he said, nothing happened, but then came word that a unit of the California National Guard from Salinas, Calif., had been wiped out in the fighting at Corregidor and public opinion took a sharp turn.

"Practically all political leadership joined the anti-Japanese crusade," Hewes said in his written testimony.

"One after the other they competed in vocal support of those who claimed that our Japanese neighbors were a clear and present threat," he said.

California Attorney General Earl Warren, later to become chief justice of the United States, led the call for anti-Japanese measures, he said.

The mayor of Los Angeles fired all people of Japanese ancestry on the city payroll and soon, Hewes said, "no official anywhere dared to challenge the wave of Japanese prejudice that swept the Pacific Coast."

Since many of the older Japanese-born farmers spoke little English, the government was forced to hire young Japanese-American farmers to help in the field offices.

"This was surely an anomaly," he recalled. "The federal government putting on its payroll people who it had identified as dangerous to national security!"

Non-American Japanese were prohibited, by California law, from owning land. Hewes job was to oversee the transfer of their leases to Caucasian farmers.

"We were haunted by another problem of which we only became gradually aware and that was the inferior to mediocre quality of the soil on which these small farms had flourished," he said.

"The magic of Japanese intensive cultivation could not be transferred," he said. "Quite a few people whose mouths had salivated at the thought of gaining possession of these flourishing farmstead had assumed that the lush production was due primarily to good soil. But the real input was not soil."

It is predicted Karpov, Korchnoi will play to a draw

MERANO, Italy (AP) — World champion Anatoly Karpov and challenger Viktor Korchnoi appeared headed for their seventh draw today in the 12th game of the world chess championship.

"It should be a draw," said one of the Soviet champion's seconds, grandmaster Lev Polugaevsky, shortly after Korchnoi sealed his 41st move Monday night.

"It looks like a draw," said another grandmaster, Jan Timman of the Netherlands.

Karpov, playing white, was a pawn ahead, but experts said they believed the challenger could hold the game to a draw with accurate play.

U.S. grandmaster Lev Alburt said he thought Karpov missed a good opportunity at move 23 when he could have used the pawn instead of the bishop to capture the bishop.

Thatcher, attorney general accused of covering up spy ring

LONDON (AP) — A Laborite member of Parliament has accused Conservative Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and her attorney general of trying to cover up the extent of the Soviet spy ring in British intelligence services. He renewed his demand for a full investigation.

"It seems that the attorney general misled the House," Dennis Canavan told the House of Commons Monday. "It seems, too, that the prime minister was involved in a cover-up."

Canavan's charges stemmed from the revelation during the weekend by a former military intelligence agent, Leo Long, that during World War II he passed secrets to the Russians through art historian Anthony Blunt and confessed in 1964 when Blunt did.

Long said he had not been formally given immunity from prosecution when he confessed, as Blunt was. But he said he was told by counter-espionage officials that he probably would never be prosecuted.

Canavan and other members of Commons were angered because Attorney General Sir Michale Havers told them in 1979, after Blunt's treachery came to light, that he was the only double agent in the security services who had been granted immunity since World War II.

"It seems to me that this man (Long) did, in fact, receive immunity from prosecution," said Canavan. "I am still convinced that there is a massive Establishment cover-up here."

Canavan said he would "reiterate my demand for a public inquiry into the operation of the entire British security system" since the war.

A Conservative member of Commons, Harvey Proctor, said he would demand that Mrs. Thatcher specify whether Long had access to information about British counter-intelligence operations against the Russians in Germany between 1946 and 1950.

Long was a member of a spy ring of pro-Communist Cambridge students that included Blunt, who later became one of the world's leading art historians; Donald MacLean and the late Guy Burgess, who defected to Moscow in 1951, and Harold "Kim" Philby, who joined them in 1963.

After Blunt's connection with the group was revealed, there were reports of spying for the Russians by other members of the intelligence service. But none had been proved until The Sunday Times tracked Long down.

British Leyland workers vote to call off 3-day-old walk-out

BIRMINGHAM, England (AP) — Striking British Leyland car workers, defying their shop stewards, were voting 2-1 today in favor of calling off a 3-day-old walkout over a pay dispute that could cripple the state-owned company.

Early voting by the rank and file today showed they were opposed to Monday's decision by union shop stewards to turn down the company's contract offer and continue the strike at 29 plants across the country.

Engineering union officials said the overall vote from all the plants would be added together and the collective majority would decide whether the strike continues.

Union shop stewards voted Monday 208-12 to reject the contract and urged the company's 58,000 striking workers to follow suit.

Company chairman Sir Michael Edwardes had said Saturday that if there was no further disruption and strikers voted to return to work he would withdraw his threat to liquidate the company and fire strikers without notice or lay-off pay.

Everett paternity case goes to jury

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jurors must not be influenced by sympathy or passion in deciding whether actor Chad Everett is the father of an 8-year-old boy born to former movie extra Shelia Scott, a judge advised.

In his instructions to the Superior Court jury Monday, Judge Raymond Cardenas said the key question to be resolved is whether Everett, 45, had sexual intercourse with Ms. Scott on the day she claims her son was conceived.

A jury began deliberations Monday in the paternity suit lodged against Everett by Ms. Scott, 44, a onetime extra on Everett's since-canceled "Medical Center" television series.

Everett claimed during the trial that he never had sexual intercourse with Ms. Scott on the night of Aug. 16, 1972. Her son, whom she named Dale Andre Lee Everett, was born May 25, 1973.

Cardenas told the jurors to disregard the boy's name in reaching their decision.

He said that if the jury decided Everett did have intercourse with Ms. Scott as she claimed, it must then take into consideration the results of relatively new human leucocyte antigens blood tests introduced as evidence at the trial.

# Cynthia Boston bail set at \$250,000

NEW YORK (AP) — With her lawyer protesting that charges against her were "totally fabricated," bail was reduced from \$500,000 to \$250,000 for Cynthia Boston, charged with conspiracy involving a Brink's truck robbery and three killings last month.

Meanwhile, in Rockland County Court in New City, Eve Rosahn, the woman accused of supplying two vehicles used in the bloody heist in which two policemen and one Brink's guard were killed, also was held Monday on \$250,000 bail.

Miss Rosahn, 30, faces up to 15 years in prison if convicted on charges of criminal facilitation.

Earlier in the day, in U.S. District Court in Manhattan, Miss Boston's arrest in Mississippi on federal conspiracy charges last week was denounced by her lawyers, William Kunstler and Chokwe Lumumba, who is also a regional vice president of an

organization calling itself the Republic of New Afrika.

MISS BOSTON, 33, was said to be minister of information for the New Afrika group, which seeks to make an independent black nation out of the territory of five Southern states. Lumumba charged that Miss Boston was arrested by "a heavily armed band of U.S. terror troops" on "totally fabricated" charges and that "she was thousands of miles away at the time of the Brink's incident."

At Miss Rosahn's bail hearing, Judge Harry Edelstein fixed the \$250,000 bail despite a claim by the state that she was a poor bail risk.

"The court feels this is a serious matter and it would be very easy to set no bail," Edelstein declared. But he added that he was persuaded that the defendant, who has lived all her life in New York City, and whose

mother was present in court, should have bail set in a sum "large enough to make sure she appears in court."

"That bail isn't reasonable; it's punitive," declared Miss Rosahn's attorney, Sharon Flood.

EDELSTEIN ORDERED the defense bail application and the district attorney's answering papers sealed from press and public. The judge said they contained hearsay information from New York City police and the FBI about Miss Rosahn's reputation and character.

Outside court, Rockland County District Attorney Kenneth Gribetz denied a defense charge that his office was responsible for Miss Rosahn being fired from her New York City job during the course of the Brink's investigation. He did not say where she had worked. Gribetz also said there were no

plans to move her from the Rockland County jail, as has been done in the case of four suspects charged in the robbery-murders.

Three of four people arrested in Nyack, N.Y., and charged with taking part in the Oct. 20 heist and killings were described by the FBI as members of the radical Weather Underground. They were the long-sought Katherine Boudin, Judith Clark and David Gilbert.

MISS BOSTON'S arrest resulted from a photo identification of her as one of the people seen loading the contents of a Weather Underground "safe house" in Mount Vernon onto a van after the Brink's robbery.

The apartment contained bloody clothing and a fingerprint of another person, William Johnson, for whom a warrant has been issued.

## Clark to fight for life

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Condemned killer Colin Clark, who once said he'd rather die than live out his days in prison, now says the reprieve his mother won from an appeals court is a sign from God that he should fight his death sentence.

"It has to be," said Clark, whose execution — scheduled for early Thursday — was postponed Monday by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

"Being two days within death and then having this happen — it's a sign," Clark said.

"I didn't want to die. There were things that were brought to my attention in the last couple of days that make it look a lot better for my case," he said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press a few hours after he was returned to Death Row. He did not say what he had learned.

ALTHOUGH CLARK has always maintained he is innocent in the death of 24-year-old restaurant manager Frederick Schmidt, he gave up his appeals last summer, saying he would rather die than spend the rest of his life in prison.

The 5th Circuit ruled on a plea from his mother, Mrs. Jean Beavans of Cairo, Ga. She contended her son was suicidal and deranged by drugs and prison life.

The appeals court ordered state District Judge John V. Parker to hold a "full and meaningful hearing to determine the mental competence of Colin Clark to waive future legal action in his behalf."

"That's my miracle!" said Clark, 27. Last month he said only an act of God could keep him from walking to Louisiana's electric chair Nov. 5.

He had been moved to the Death House that holds the electric chair

last Thursday.

Mrs. Beavans took the case to the federal appeals court late Saturday after Parker rejected her argument Thursday and rejected a request for a stay on Friday.

"I was ready to see the Lord, but I don't think the Lord was ready to see me," he said.

"I hope I will get a new trial," he said.

CLARK MAINTAINS Schmidt was stabbed 30 times and shot in the head by Michael Glover, an accomplice who received a life sentence after testifying against Clark.

The Rev. Jimmy Spillman, Clark's pastor, said they were talking about the possibility of a stay just before Clark learned of the 5th Circuit order.

"He and I had just been talking about it and he had told me just what he told you, that if he got a stay he would look at it as a miracle from God," Spillman said. "But he didn't anticipate a stay."

Clark said his fiancée, Shirley Hunter, and another minister were with him when a reporter from WAFB-TV in Baton Rouge told him about the stay during a telephone conversation.

Miss Hunter had arrived at the Death House cell only five minutes before that happened, Spillman said.

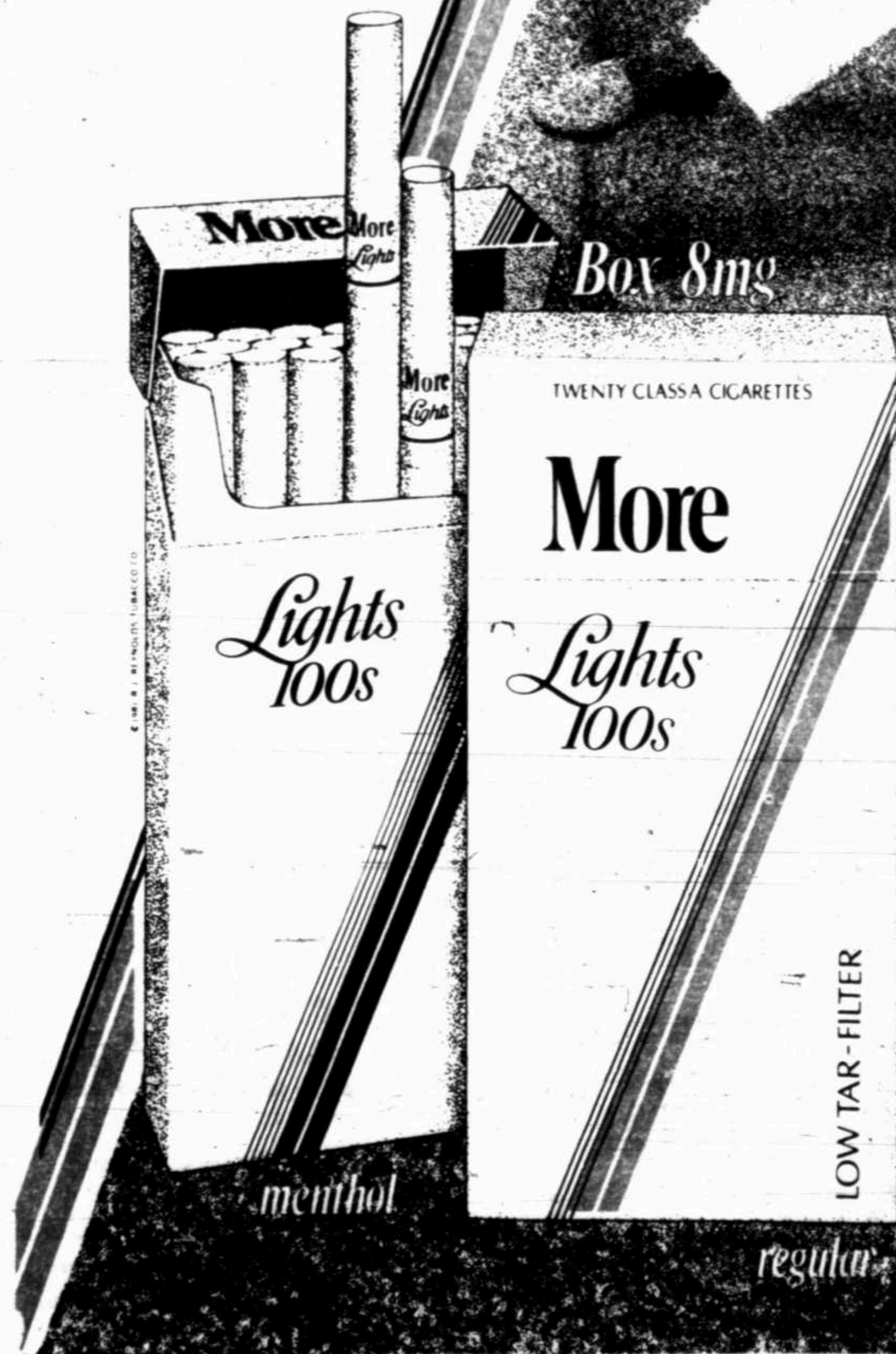
"I was standing right beside him, anticipating him hanging up because he had said, 'Good-bye,'" said Spillman.

"All of a sudden he said, 'Really?' and he looked at me and said, 'I got a stay.'"

The four-paragraph order imposed an indefinite stay on the execution. Lawyers had said such action could put it off at least six months.

Vikings rally falls short, Broncos win 19-17

DENVER (AP) — A 19-3 lead with 8 1/2 minutes remaining ought to be safe, and the Denver Broncos apparently thought so, too. But they hadn't taken into account the Minnesota Vikings' two-minute offense, which produced two quick touchdowns in the closing minutes and nearly a winning field goal. But when Rick Danmeier's long field-goal try fell short on the final play, the Broncos escaped with a 19-17 National Football League victory Monday night. "You have to wind up and hit it just right, and I just didn't kick it far

enough," said Danmeier. Danmeier's chance for a winning boot was made possible by an ill-advised decision by Denver Coach Dan Reeves, who ordered his team to go for a first down on fourth-and-one at the Bronco 40 with three minutes remaining. "I may have done some stupider things in my life, but I must have been real little when I did them," said Reeves. "Thank God it didn't cost us the game." MINUTES EARLIER, the Vikings, using a hurry-up, no-huddle offense, had scored to draw within 19-10. Reeves' decision backfired as full-back Larry Canada was stopped for

no gain by defensive end Randy Holloway. Two plays later, the Vikings made it 19-17 on Tony Galbreath's second TD of the quarter.

The Vikings got the ball one more time with 2:09 left. With Tommy Kramer finding the open receiver repeatedly, they drove to the Bronco 26. On third down, Ted Brown was

dumped for a 2-yard loss by Denver cornerback Perry Smith, and Danmeier came on for the 46-yard field goal effort, which fell about 5 yards short.

Smith, who started the game in place of Louis Wright who had suffered a strained calf muscle in pregame warmups, said he was just try-

ing to make a solid tackle on Brown's run. "On something like that, you either make it or miss it. I made it. "We were surprised they went into the hurry-up offense so early. We couldn't get set on defense, and they hurt us."

THE FIRST half ended in a 3-3 tie as Danmeier and Fred Steinfort trad-

ed field goals. Denver went ahead 6-3 midway through the third period when Steinfort, mired in a season-long slump, connected from 49 yards out.

After a Minnesota fumble at the Denver 6, the Broncos marched 94 yards for the game's first touchdown, which came on Rob Lytle's 5-yard run with 10:16 left. Three plays later, cornerback Aaron Kyle intercepted, setting up Craig Morton's 15-yard TD pass to Steve Watson with 8:32 left.

The Vikings then staged their furious rally. "We knew our only chance was to put the ball in the end zone quick," said Kramer of the decision to go to the two-minute drill so early. "We were trying to get it close enough to kick a field goal at the end, but Denver has a very fine defense."

The victory raised Denver's record to 6-3, while Minnesota dropped to 5-4.

Pitt Panthers sixth new No. 1 team

The Pitt Panthers moved into the No. 1 position today in The Associated Press college football poll, the first time in the poll's 46-year history that six teams have held the top spot in a single season.

Michigan, Notre Dame, Southern California, Texas and Penn State also have been No. 1 this season but failed to hold the lead. The other years with five No. 1 teams were 1950, 1958, 1960, 1961, 1962, 1965 and 1977.

Penn State was the latest No. 1 team to fall, losing 17-14 to Miami of Florida. That opened the door for Pitt, a 29-24 winner over Boston College, to move up from second place. The Panthers received 49 of 65 first-place votes and 1,283 of a possible 1,300 points from a nationwide panel of sports writers and sportscasters.

This week's poll is the 500th, not counting preseason polls, since The AP ratings began in 1936.

Clemson, which crushed Wake Forest 82-24, moved up from third place to second with nine first-place ballots and 1,201 points. Southern Cal rose from third to second with seven firsts and 1,178 points following a 41-17 victory over Washington State that knocked the Cougars, 14th last week, out of the Top Twenty.

Defending national champ Georgia trounced Temple 49-3 and climbed from fifth to fourth with 1,075 points. The Bulldogs are followed by Texas, up from sixth to fifth with 1,007 points after whipping Texas Tech 26-9. Penn State is sixth with 869 points.

Alabama's 13-10 triumph over Mississippi State boosted the Crimson

Tide from eighth to seventh with 861 points and dropped MSU from seventh to 15th. North Carolina, a 17-10 victor over Maryland, jumped from ninth to eighth with 767 points. The Tar Heels entertain Clemson in Chapel Hill on Saturday.

Arizona State, idle last weekend, moved up from 10th to ninth with 658 points, while Southern Methodist rose from 13th to 10th with 626 points after beating Texas A&M 27-7. Mississippi State was the only team to fall out of the Top Ten.

THE SECOND Ten consists of Nebraska, Michigan, Miami, Florida State, Mississippi State, Washington, Oklahoma, Ohio State, Arkansas and Southern Mississippi.

Last week, it was Iowa State, Nebraska, SMU, Washington State, Michigan, Iowa, Florida State, Washington, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Iowa State dropped out of the Top Twenty by losing to Kansas State 10-7. Washington State was bumped out by Southern Cal and Iowa fell out after a 24-7 loss to Illinois.

Replacing them are Miami, Ohio State and Southern Mississippi. Miami, which was as high as 13th earlier in the year, returned after defeating Penn State. Ohio State, which had been as high as seventh, had been out of the rankings for three weeks but made it back with a 45-33 triumph over Purdue. Southern Mississippi, which blanked North Texas State 22-0, made it for the first time this season. The Golden Eagles have a 6-0-1 record, the only blemish being a 13-13 tie with Alabama.

Arkansas wins eighth title

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Led by unheralded Dave Barney, the Arkansas Razorbacks raced to their eighth straight team championship Monday in the 62nd Southwest Conference cross-country meet.

Barney, a senior from Scottsdale, Ariz., covered the 10,000-meter course in 29 minutes, 58.4 seconds and finished 12 yards ahead of Baylor's Todd Harbour and David Taylor of Arkansas.

Arkansas posted a team total of 32 points, well ahead of runner-up Texas with 67. Rice came in third with 99 points, followed by Baylor with 92, Houston with 106, Texas A&M with 136, SMU with 173 and Texas Tech with 221. TCU did not enter.

Arkansas had five finishers in the top 11, just off its showing of last season when five Razorbacks finished in the top seven.

This is the third time in the last four years that a Razorback runner took individual honors in the meet. Barney finished fourth last year.

Harbour, the collegiate record-holder in the mile, had not lost a distance race in five starts this season and Taylor had won his two distance starts this year.

Scott Jones, Tom Moloney and Ronnie Carroll of Arkansas finished eighth, ninth and 11th to complete Arkansas' scoring. The worst a Razorback runner placed was 20th as Arkansas claimed its 15th SWC cross-country title in school history.

Texas newcomer Sam Sitonik was fourth with teammates Pedro Rivero Flores fifth and Geoffrey Koech sixth.

Others in the top ten were Wilson Kigen of Southern Methodist in seventh and Houston's Earl Zilles in tenth.

Ellis possible as Olympic track coach

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Princeton University track coach Larry Ellis has been recommended to coach the 1984 U.S. Olympic men's track team. The Athletics Congress announced Monday.

Ellis and 19 other persons were recommended for staff positions of U.S. track teams that will compete in the Olympics, the 1983 Pan American Games and the inaugural World Championships scheduled for Helsinki, Finland, in August 1983.

The appointments were recommended after a Sunday meeting of The Athletics Congress, the national governing body for track and field in the United States. The recommendations are by a 37-member subcommittee are subject to approval on Dec. 3 at TAC's annual convention, scheduled for Reno, Nev.

Ellis, a 23-year-coaching veteran who has spent the last 11 as Princeton's coach, was one of nine persons recommended for the Olympic team: Roy Griak, University of Minnesota, was recommended as head manager with 1976 Olympic silver medalist as one of his assistants.

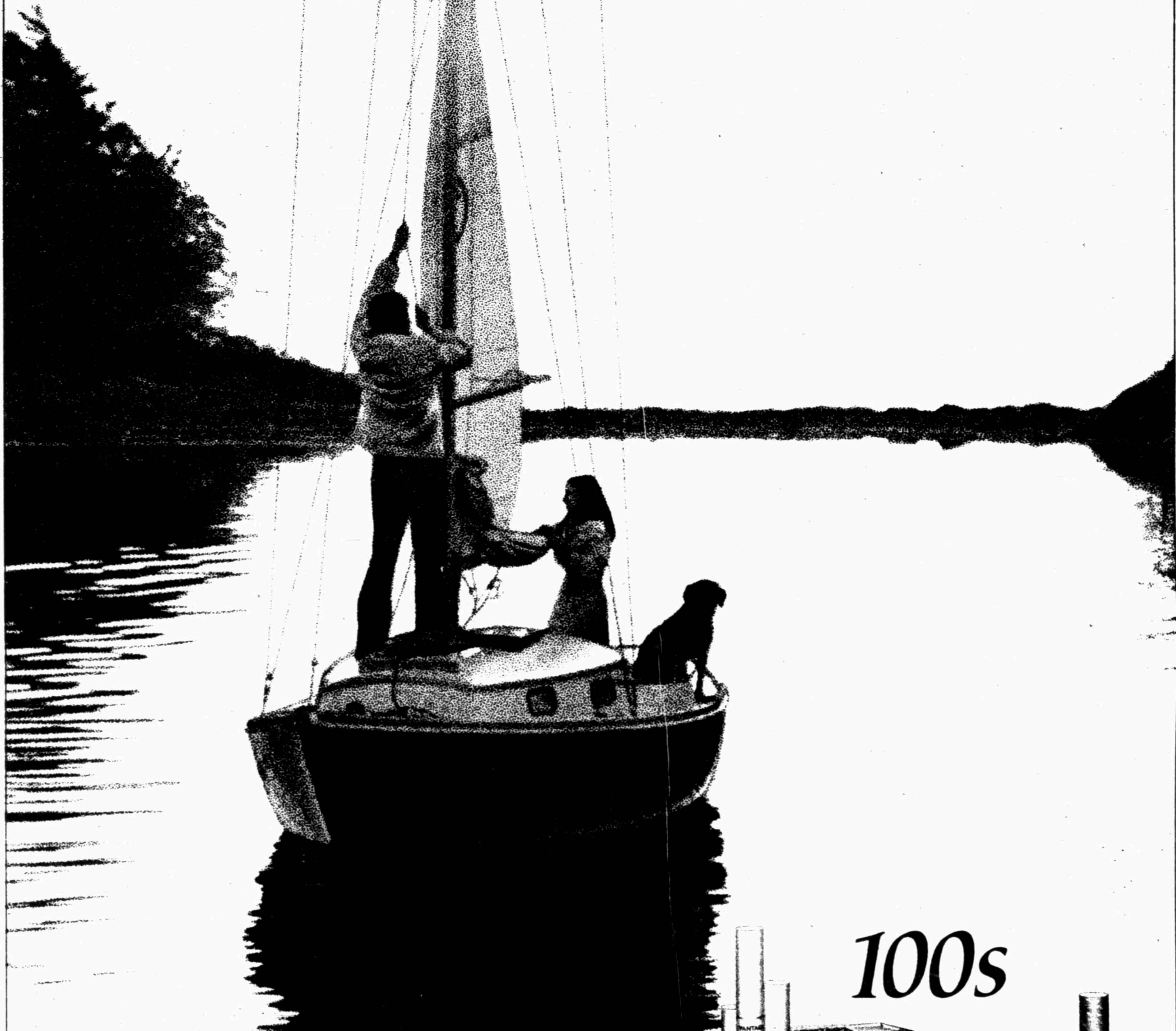

## Former basketball player admits shaving points

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Boston College basketball player James Sweeney says he took \$500 from gamblers to shave points in one game but never did anything to earn it.

Sweeney testified Monday in U.S. District Court that during a game with Holy Cross on which the gamblers hoped to make "the big kill," he deliberately got five fouls and "bowed out of the game" although he had been told each BC player would get \$10,000 if the game were dumped.

Sweeney, 23, co-captain of the 1978-79 BC team and now an executive talent scout in New Jersey, was a witness at the conspiracy-bribery trial of former BC forward Rick Kuhn, of Swissvale, Pa.; Anthony and Rocco Perla of Bradford Hills, Pa.; Paul Mazzei of Pittsburgh and James Burke of Queens.

The government's star witness, Henry Hill, has named all five defendants as conspirators in a scheme to rig the scores of BC games.

Sweeney testified Monday that he and Kuhn attended a series of meetings at a Logan Airport hotel with Hill, Anthony Perla and others and that on one occasion was told by the alleged gamblers that he and Kuhn were perfect for their purposes because "no one would suspect us."

Sweeney said he first refused \$1,000 from Kuhn but later pretended to go along with the plot and took the \$500 because "I was afraid." He insisted, however, that he never shaved points or helped to dump a game.

He said Perla said before the Holy Cross game that it would be "the grand finale" to make up for previous games which had not gone as the gamblers planned.

Sweeney said he was told that "people from all over the country are betting — they mentioned Las Vegas," and Kuhn urged him to make sure he shaved points and did not "run around pulling a Ron Perry," a reference to the top scorer at Holy Cross that year.

He quoted Kuhn as saying he was also speaking to BC players Ernie Cobb and Joe Beaulieu.

Sweeney testified that he deliberately fouled out of the game despite a promise of \$10,000 each if they threw the game.

"I didn't want to be a part of it so that someone could say, 'Yeah, that kid Sweeney was a part of it,'" he added.

After the game, he said, Kuhn approached

him and asked: "Are you crazy? Do you know what you did? I have to go back and face Tony Perla." Later, he said, Kuhn told him that Perla was furious because "he had lost an extraordinary amount of money," and the bettors had threatened to "break Joe Beaulieu's thumbs" because Beaulieu had played well.

## Akers says Tate will miss Houston game Saturday

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Rodney Tate, whose 4.3-second speed makes him Texas' most dangerous breakaway runner, has a severely bruised thigh and will miss the Houston game Saturday, Coach Fred Akers said Monday.

Tate started in place of A.J. "Jam" Jones — Texas fifth all-time leading rusher — in the Texas Tech game last Saturday and responded with a 52-yard scoring sprint before he was injured in the first quarter.

"Tate's not going to be ready this week," Akers told his weekly news conference. "He gave us that extra speed we needed back there. He was running tough and recklessly."

Akers said Tate's bruised knee was better, but his thigh "has a lot of swelling."

He said Jones, who fumbled two pitchouts and had only 20 yards on 10 carries against Tech, probably would replace Tate. "He (Jones) wasn't having one of his better days," said Akers.

Texas coaches selected wide receiver Donnie Little as the Longhorns' most valuable offensive player in the 26-9 victory over Tech and chose tackle Mark Weber as the MVP on defense.

Little had key blocks on the touchdown run by Tate and a 20-yard scoring dash by Herkie Walls and caught

four passes for 64 yards. Weber had three of Texas' 15 quarterback sacks against Tech and pressured the passer five times.

All seven Longhorn offensive linemen graded 90 percent or better against Tech, Akers said.

The Texas coach said Houston has "as much physical talent as anyone in the country," with quarterback Lionel Wilson giving the Cougars an "extra dimension."

"He runs better than the other quarterbacks we've seen," said Akers. "I think they came upon a jewel in Wilson."

He said Houston's defense "is as good or better" than Southern Methodist, which held Texas to only 177 yards total offense but lost 9-7 on three Texas field goals. "They really are tough but they usually are. They have a lot of size and unbelievable quickness."

"They're playing great defense, and no one has really stopped them (on offense)," said Akers.

He also said split end Lonell Phea "is the best receiver we will have faced. He's a top one."

Although Arkansas bombed Texas 42-11, Akers said, "I don't think Arkansas puts the kind of pressure on you that a team like Houston can. They don't give you much room for error."

Houston defeated Arkansas 20-17 the week after the Razorbacks thrashed Texas.

# Eagles may have sights on Thurman

DALLAS (AP) — Dennis Thurman says he will probably be a marked man when the Dallas Cowboys and Philadelphia Eagles tangle again Dec. 13 in Texas Stadium.

Thurman tackled Jaworski just after he threw downfield.

"I'm not a dirty player," said Thurman. "Everybody knows that. I didn't mean to hurt Ron. I sent word with a couple of Eagle players that I was worried about Ron."

Jaworski said after the game: "I don't know if the hit he put on me was late or not. I don't worry about the hits. They're part of the game."

Thurman also knocked running back Wilbert Montgomery down near the sidelines on a tackle the Eagles thought was late. There was no flag.

"The play on Wilbert was an obvious foul," said Jaworski. "It was the same type of play on which we lost Harold."

Thurman said, "I'm not going to worry about being a marked man. If they want to pull a guard and have him come after me, fine...if he can hit me a solid shot he deserves a solid hit."

He said the victory over the Eagles "was one of the big wins since I've been here...we are at the top of the (National Conference) East now and the Eagles have to come here to play us."

Expected back in the Dominican Republic in 10 days, Guerrero will play winter ball with the Lions, a team spokesman said.

## Interrogation of Soviet officers continues

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Swedish authorities, apparently dissatisfied with explanations about a grounded Soviet submarine, said today that questioning of the ship's officers would continue and it could be "a lengthy affair."

"The interrogation will be resumed, but it is not yet decided when," naval spokesman Cmdr. Gunnar Rasmusson said. "The whole thing might turn out to be a lengthy affair."

After a go-ahead from Moscow, the sub's captain, Lt. Cmdr. Pyotr Gushin, and his navigation officer were questioned for six hours Monday aboard a Swedish navy ship about the grounding of the sub last Tuesday night in a restricted military area off the southeast coast in the Baltic Sea near the Karlskrona naval base.

The commander-in-chief of Sweden's armed forces, Gen. Lennart Ljung, told a news conference the Soviet government also agreed to an inspection of the sub's navigational equipment, charts and duty lists. Swedish officials claimed that the aged, Whiskey-class sub had been fitted with

special intelligence-gathering gear. The Swedish government, after barring Soviet salvage ships from rescuing the sub, had said Swedish tugs would not refloat it until the government received a satisfactory explanation of the grounding. But a storm blew up while Gushin was being interrogated.

"The submarine sent Mayday signals over the radio and fired emergency red flares and asked for assistance," Rasmusson said. "The rough weather threatened to break up the submarine." Despite 90-mile winds, two tugs completed the salvage operation in less than an hour, and the sub was anchored about 10 miles from the Karlskrona base.

"The submarine is safely secured and blocked, with no possibility to break loose and escape," said Cmdr. Lennart Forsman, the commander of the naval base.

A navy spokesman said Swedish engineers would go over the ship to determine if it was still seaworthy.

## Pentagon denies it reached agreement with Saudi Arabia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Although acknowledging the Reagan administration has a long-range goal of establishing an air defense network throughout the Middle East, the Pentagon denies a report an agreement toward that end already has been reached with Saudi Arabia.

Discussions have been held aimed at having combat equipment stored in Saudi Arabia for use by American troops if they had to mobilize in the Middle East, Pentagon spokesman Benjamin Welles acknowledged Monday. He said that would be part of a plan to eventually help Persian Gulf nations develop an "integrated air defense."

But such agreements could be adopted only at the Cabinet level, said Welles, and the discussions — "about strategy, about long long-range ideas" — involved only lower-level personnel.

The Washington Post reported in Sunday editions that the Reagan administration's plan to sell five AWACS radar planes to Saudi Arabia is "one small piece" of a grand defense strategy, including locating U.S. combat equipment in Saudi Arabia and a Saudi-coordinated air defense network involving five other Arab states.

The article said Congress did not have to confront such long-term defense plans while debating the AWACS sale.
