"Heart of the Gulf Southwest" 1st Congressional Dist. of Texas
Texas to double national growth rate in industry. The National Planning Association predicts that the Southwest, including Texas, will be one of the big winners in the scramble for new industry. By 1976 it sees the growth in industry in our area as double the national average growth of 25%. Also predicted are higher income gains for Southwest than the national average. Continued growth in space and defense industries is seen as big contributors to area growth. Missile industry—unknown ten years ago—is already the third largest in nation, surpassed only by steel and auto industries.

March employment sets record. The 66.3-million employed last month set a new all-time high for that month. There was a decrease in the number of unemployed by 160,000.

Tiny new electronic circuits, small enough to be dwarfed by the average sized ant are the latest breakthrough in technology. The reduction in size obtained by replacing vacuum tubes by transistors made possible many necessary advances in miniaturization for rockets, space capsules, computers, and other uses. The new ultra-small circuits, three or four times as thick as this page, smaller than the soldered joint between two wires, are scheduled to turn the entire electronic industry upside down.

It is as though your new car had a motor that cost one tenth as much, ran ten times as long without overhaul, took one tenth the fuel, weighed one hundredth as much, and still produced the same horsepower.

These new circuits are expected to operate at switching speeds measured in "nanoseconds"—billionths of a second.

Research grows even faster than our population. The \$13-billion spent on research and development in 1961 is double the total for 1955. By 1970 it is estimated we will be spending \$23-billion per year.

What do we get for these vast amounts? Much of it is unpredictable. Research in any line produces technological "fall-out" that may produce breakthroughs in unforeseen areas.

The new program for space is the most spectacular in terms of predictable results—heat resistant materials from rocket noses will be used in automobiles. The

performance reliability that brought John Glenn and his capsule back will cut down on appliance repairs. Physicians will use techniques perfected in telemetering space probes to obtain reports from within a patient's body.

The Bell Telephone Company in the next month or so will send aloft a low altitude satellite, "Telstar," which will transmit telephone and television signals. Eventual result will be worldwide transmission.

Medical research teams also have high hopes. Particularly sought is a non-specific vaccination which would raise the general body level of resistance by developing a broad group of anti-bodies. Already discovered—interferon—which may prevent virus penetration into human cells.

Science also runs ahead of diplomacy. Biggest roadblock to negotiation for reduced armaments is Soviet insistence on maintaining secrecy. The U-2 airplane was one way we cracked Soviet secrecy. Even more effective will be our reconnaissance satellite. Only a handful of our top-level insiders will know how effective it is in revealing Russian secrets. Russians, however, are well aware of our "spy in the sky" program and its implications. Only time will tell what effect on their thinking this may have. They have consistently refused any inspection system. If they are going to be inspected anyway by our satellites, will this make them more or less willing to negotiate in a reasonable manner?

Nuclear tests expected for later this month. It is expected that the President will announce the commencing of nuclear tests in the South Pacific any day now. Tests will consist of 20 to 30 blasts over a two month period of time. Top priority will be given to testing methods to knock out approaching enemy missiles. Also expected to be tested are under-

Squirrel Season To Open Here May 1

Squirrel season will open May 1 in Lamar, Titus and Red River Counties and will remain open through May 30, Bentley Wood, Conservation Officer, said Monday.

Wood said in Franklin County squirrel season will be open May, June and July. Morris and Camp Counties will be closed, Wood said.

The general law open season is for May, June and July, with the bag limit of ten squirrels in any one day and not more than 20 in possession at any one time.

Special bag limits are in some counties. This includes Lamar, Delta, Franklin and Hopkins Counties. In Lamar the limit is not more than 8 per day, not more than 16 in possession. Delta, Franklin and Hopkins is not more than 8 per day or in possession.

Campbell Awards Contract for Food Processing Plant

Campbell Soup Company has awarded a contract for construction of a new food processing plant at Paris to S. H. Leavell & Company of El Paso.

Scheduled for completion in 1964, the plant will be a modern brick structure containing more than 900,000 square feet of working area. It will be erected on the company's 684-acre site just northwest of Paris on Loop Highway 286. When completed, it will be the fifth largest of Campbell's 23 plants in the United States and Canada. Initially, the plant will employ about 750 persons, with expectations of subsequently increasing employment to approximately 1,200.

Lockwood Greene Engineers, Inc. of New York are the architects and engineers for the plant, and Wyatt C. Hedrick of Dallas, as consulting architect.

In designing the interior, plans have been made for the ultimate in cleanliness and maximum illumination. All food preparation areas will be tiled and will have floors of a specially-treated concrete. Most work areas will be ventilated with refrigerated air. Facilities for employees include: locker rooms, medical facilities, and a cafeteria.

Equipped for the production of soup, bean and spaghetti products, the Paris plant will make use of preparation, blending, and simmering methods developed by Campbell over its 93 years of food processing. One out of every 12 employees will be concerned with quality control or supervision.

The plant will also contain a department where cans will be made as well as equipment for automatically labeling the cans, packing them into cases, and loading the coles on pallets for shipment.

It is expected that when in operation the plant will spend approximately \$20,000,000 annually for ingredients, containers, and other supplies.

While construction is in progress, Campbell will continue a program of agricultural research in several Texas areas which was begun in 1953. This program has involved not only tomatoes but also asparagus, pole beans, beets, cabbage, carrots, lima beans, okra, onions, parsley, peas, peppers, white potatoes, sweet corn, and sweet potatoes.

Austin. — Next week some 2,500,000 Texans will make up their minds whom to cast their ballots for among a huge list of candidates for local, district, state and federal offices.

Prime interest is in the governor's race, where five democrats and two republicans are hoping to replace Gov. Price Daniel. The governor is working hard to see that they don't.

Down the list, to the office of precinct chairman, there are more candidates than in many years. This is due primarily to the "open races" for the major state offices... namely those of attorney general and lieutenant governor. These openings have allowed those down the line to try to move up while at the same time leaving lesser offices open.

Also on May 5, the two parties will hold precinct conventions. They will name delegates to county conventions. County delegates, in turn, will name delegates to state conventions to be held in September. This is where party platforms will be written.

Big side-bar issues on May 5 will be the referendums on horse race betting and poll tax repeal. These will appear on both the republican and the democratic ballots. Also on the GOP ballot is the question whether Padre Island should be developed as a state park. Results of the balloting on these referendums are not binding. But they provide a public opinion poll and legislators are likely to follow the mandates set out by the voters.

DANIEL BACKS IMPORTS LIMIT — Governor Daniel sent telegrams to the governors of the other 31 oil-producing states, and

asked them to join him in supporting an oil imports limitation amendment. U. S. Congressman Tom Steed of Oklahoma introduced the proposal. It would require oil imports to be cut to the 1956 ratio with U. S. production.

At the 1957 Governors' Conference, Daniel was successful in getting 32 gubernatorial signatures on a petition to Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower, urging mandatory import controls. But he feels that nothing has been done to prevent imports from supplanting domestic production.

Daniel said that the recent schedule of eight-day allowables in Texas has resulted in a loss of more than \$100,000,000 in tax revenue for the State. May will be another eight-day producing month.

NO SECRETS ALLOWED IN SCHOOLS — A Texas law that says that public school authorities can suspend or expel a student who solicits members for a fraternity, or other secret society, also prohibits other organizations from doing so. Attorney General Will Wilson has so ruled.

The law allows the formation in schools of Boy Scouts, Hi-Y, Girl Scouts, DeMolay, Rainbow Girls, Pan-American clubs, scholarship societies, and other "kindred education organizations sponsored by state or national education authorities."

But any "public welfare" group which isn't on the list of specifics is forbidden.

NEW HIGHWAY MARKERS — The 57th Legislature failed to appropriate funds for advertising Texas' tourist attractions out of the state. But the Texas Highway Commission has come up

with a dazzling device for pointing out places of interest to travelers once they get in the State.

Historic sites and other spots of unusual interest will be pointed out by big, cast-aluminum markers, such as those used in Virginia. These markers will be erected at roadside parks and turnoffs, so drivers can pull over and read the legends at leisure.

Markers are three feet wide and four feet 10 inches, high and look like they're made of Swedish steel. They'll be mounted on six-foot aluminum poles.

Two already have been erected at a cost of \$1,000 each. One, placed two miles northeast of Tyler, marks the site of the largest Confederate Army prisoner of war camp west of the Mississippi. It was paid for by the grandson of a Union soldier who spent some time there.

The other was purchased by the Odessa Chamber of Commerce to point to the famous Meteor Crater near Odessa.

On May 4, a third plaque will be set up at McCamey. It will mark Castle Gap—the old Butterfield State pass.

Attorney general ruled that such markers are necessary for maximum use of modern highways, and thus okayed the expenditure of state funds for future plaques.

Cost of plaques can be reduced to \$700 each in mass lots.

A committee headed by George W. Hill of the State Historical Survey Committee and composed of representatives from the Highway Department, the Parks Board and the Game and Fish Commission screens all recommended sites. About 100 spots are being considered right now.

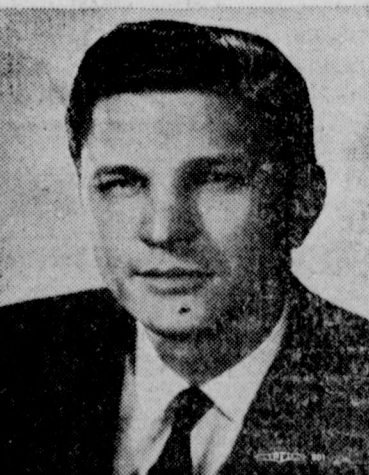

Alcorn Can't Figure Advantages Of New Plan to Finance Candidates

Editor's note: Achin Al-
corn Philosopher on his John-
son grass farm on Sulphur
tries to throw some light on a
complicated problem, his let-
ter this week reveals.

Dear editor: According to an
article I read last night, the farm-
ers aren't the only people suffer-
ing from the high costs of operat-
ing. High costs have now hit poli-
tics.

As I understand it, the cost of
running for office has gotten so
high that there is a move on for
financial relief to candidates. It
just costs too much to wage a na-
tional campaign, not to mention a
state or even local one.

I can see the country can't af-
ford to have a lot of public of-
fices unfilled because it costs too
much to run for them, although I
for one have been unable to de-
tect any shortage along this line.
As far as I can determine, every
public office we've got is filled
and there's always a good many
defeated candidates left over and
willing to try again next time.

At any rate, a commission in
Washington has been studying
this situation and has come up
with suggestion that more peo-
ple ought to contribute to cam-
paigns, to ease the burden on the
candidates, and the commission

has suggested that people be al-
lowed to deduct a part of their
campaign contributions from
their income tax.

For instance, it suggested, if
you contributed \$25 to a cam-
paign, you could take \$10 off your
income tax.

Now I have thought this matter
over, and while I have a great
deal of sympathy for candidates
and believe it'd be an unwhole-
some situation if we ever got to
the point where only a wealthy
man could afford to run for of-
fice, still, looking at it from the
voter's standpoint, we've got high
costs staring us in the face too
and spending \$25 on a candidate
in order to save \$10 on your in-
come tax, ain't exactly the way
to balance your personal budget.
The way I figure it, you're still
out \$15, and maybe even more, if
the candidate gets elected and
raises your government expenses
by \$10.

As I see it, the situation is en-
volved. The candidates are ask-
ing the public for financial re-
lief in running, and then after
they get elected the public needs
financial relief from what hap-
pens after they get there.

This makes the farm problem
look simple.

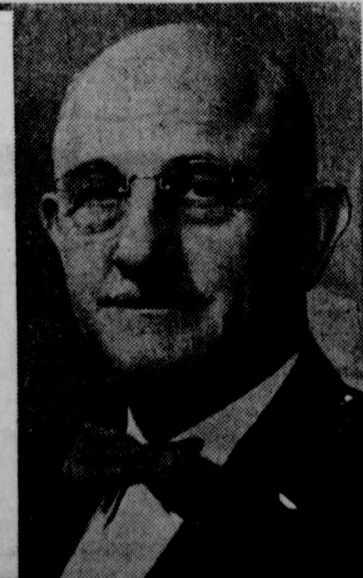
