Austin. — The chairman of the State Railroad Commission has issued a grim warning that natural gas shortages will hit Texans hard this winter.

In a speech to Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association at Dallas, Chairman Jim Langdon said:

● Propane already is in short supply due to stockpiling to offset the natural gas shortage.

● As much as 500,000 barrels daily of distillate fuel oil will be needed from November to March.

● If distillate use is as high as predicted in the state, three to five times above normal, shipments to out-of-state consumers may have to be cut 50 per cent.

● Out-of-state commitments, mandatory federal allocations and other factors may require that Texans share proportionally in shortages.

"This means that Texas might not only be denied access to its total distillate needs, but that access to its normal requirements could be cut," said Langdon. "The gasoline supply-demand situation, as well as every other petroleum product, will experience shortage this winter. As in the case of natural gas, a shortage in any type of fuel which results in an unsatisfied demand will exert pressure on available supplies of other fuels, setting up a domino-like effect."

Langdon recommended early construction of offshore deep-water ports to accommodate super tankers from foreign countries and stepped-up development of domestic reserves of oil and gas (including shale oil) and increased use of coal.

Meanwhile, only one major customer of Lo-Vaca Gathering Company, Lone Star Gas Company of Dallas, rejected a Railroad Commission temporary rate increase — to 29.55 cents per 1,000 cubic feet — on natural gas delivered by the big Houston-based company to its customers around the state.

CREDIT INSURANCE CUT UNCERTAIN — Credit life insurance rates, which haven't been cut since 1968 in spite of reductions in losses, are going down, but it isn't certain how much.

The subject caused a minor hassle between State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie and Marcom Shockley, Board life insurance division head, at a hearing on credit insurance.

Shockley recommended a 23 per cent cut in single premium reducing term rates and 10 per cent reduction in rates for level-term coverage based on a three-year experience factor.

Christie wanted to figure on the basis of 1972 losses only, which would cut reducing term rates 25.3 per cent and level term rates 18.6 per cent. The chairman later told newsmen Shockley had recommended the larger reduction during Board conferences.

Board statistics point to \$15 million to \$18 million overcharges annually.

TASK FORCE CREATED — Gov. Dolph Briscoe set up a multi-agency task force on youth care and rehabilitation to coordinate efforts at problem solving in the area.

Said Briscoe:

There is too much duplication of effort and overlapping of service; too much emphasis on institutionalization and not enough on prevention; not enough interplay between governmental agencies; not enough study to determine how to correct deficiencies; and too many cases of child abuse and neglect.

He named his executive assistant, Charles Purnell, chairman. Other members of the task force are the Welfare Commissioner, Mental Health, Mental Retardation Commissioner; Health Com-

missioner; Education Commissioner and executive directors of the Texas Rehabilitation Commission and Texas Youth Council. Units of the Governor's office will assist in evolving a statewide plan for development of effective programs of youth social services.

COURTS SPEAK — The Court of Criminal Appeals held unconstitutional a resentencing provision of the new law reducing marijuana penalties, designed to be final lighter sentences for those convicted under old statutes.

U. S. District Judge Jack Roberts directed the federal government to spend the entire \$11 billion appropriated by Congress to build water treatment plants. He granted a summary judgment sought by Texas.

The State Supreme Court agreed to review a case involving the amount of recoveries under uninsured motorist insurance policies.

The U. S. Supreme Court held Texas cannot hold back on giving prisoners credit for good behavior until their appeals are final. The decision affirmed lower court findings that the system rewards some prisoners while denying time credit to others.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill held cities can charge regulatory fees (but not taxes) on coin-operated amusement machines for children.

In other opinions, Hill concluded:

● Appeals court judges must be paid at least \$1,000 a year more than state district judges; and courts of civil appeals judges must get at least \$1,000 less than State Supreme Court justices.

● Texas Mass Transportation Commission may accept federal grants when authorized by the legislature or an agency. It may grant financial aid to political subdivisions for planning public mass transportation either out of funds which may be appropriated for that purpose by the legislature, private gifts or federal grants for the purpose.

● An appraisal study on assets of a Houston rapid transit line can be withheld from public disclosure under an exception to the open records law because the city is negotiating for purchase of the company, and publicity may have a detrimental effect on the negotiating position of the governing body.

● The chairman of the 1973 constitutional convention must be one of the 181 legislators who are delegates.

● State law does not permit deduction of the value of real property owned by a subsidiary of a bank or held in trust for the bank, though it allows reduction of the actual cash value of bank shares by a proportionate amount per share at which the real estate directly owned by the bank is assessed to its for taxes.

SHORT SNORTS
Texas Safety Association launched a campaign to eliminate "booby traps" on 187,000 miles of county roads and city streets.

Rep. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi asked an investigation of 38 deaths in state mental institutions during the last two years.

A manpower policy report to the Governor recommends eliminating all discrimination in state hiring and creation of a Texas Fair Employment Practices Commission.

The Governor has asked for federal disaster aid in flood-damaged Guadalupe, Hidalgo and Wilson counties.

Texas is the first state in a single year to rehabilitate more than 25,000 through vocational retraining programs.

Orn Gerald Brooks of Jeff Davis County received the 1973 Lady Bird Johnson award for highway beautification efforts.

Mission project for the year will be to help support the Westwood Missionary Baptist Church in Paris. Bro. Johnny Umphries was elected to preach annual message in 1974.

Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

NOLO CONTENDERE. This plea of "no contest" entered in Federal Court on October 10 by the former Vice President of the United States marked a unique moment of stark tragedy, not only for the man himself, but for all Americans.

Together with sympathy for the individual we can, however, be thankful that our Republic is so strongly constructed that we have sustained this unprecedented blow without impairment of the orderly and essential processes of government, and further that in our system, no man is above the law.

As set forth in my speech on the Floor of the House, we can now make and end to all the shoddy questions bearing on Executive integrity — if the President will cooperate with the Congress.

NO STRINGS ATTACHED — BUT! Revenue Sharing money which went to all the states and to 110 political entities in Texas' First Congressional District is free of most of the directives that apply to other types of grants (categorical grants, so called), but recipients must comply with a number of stipulations including audit, reporting and accounting requirements and some restrictions upon the actual use of the money. They should all be kept in mind to avoid problems down the road.

GENERAL REVENUE SHARING COMPLIANCE. Federal Revenue Sharing officials recently completed a review of 103 jurisdictions, including the State of Texas and three Texas cities, to determine how state and local governments are complying with the law. A 45-page report on their findings has been published and will be sent free to officials of any of our 110 jurisdictions upon request to my office.

SOON—YOU WILL BE ABLE TO BUY STAMPS BY MAIL. Particularly useful to shut-ins, the elderly, and working people, this new plan will provide an order blank for your use in asking for one or more of four basic packages of 50 to 100 stamps. All you do is enclose a personal check for the face amount of the stamps plus 40¢ additional to cover processing costs. It is refreshing to observe the Postal Service actually trying to improve service — but in view of past performance, I wonder if they are paying the way for closing more of our smaller post offices? I certainly hope not.

Cotton Market News, USDA

Harvesting was delayed by rains in Central and South Texas and in the San Joaquin Valley of California during the week according to the Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. The Arizona harvest was gaining momentum. In Oklahoma, New Mexico and in the El Paso - Pecos and Plains areas of Texas the harvest was in the early stages. Most current ginnings were being delivered into marketing pools or against contracts made earlier in the year. Demand was good for uncommitted cotton. Buyers were active bidders on cotton offered by growers. Contracting of the 1973 and 1974 crops continued in some locations. Domestic mills purchased San Joaquin Valley, California growth at 85.00 cents per pound, basis grade 31 staple 35. Merchants offered 58.00 to 60.00 cents per pound for 1974 crop San Joaquin Valley growth but most growers were holding out for 65.00 cents, basis grade 31 staple 35. In the El Paso, Texas area growers received 60.00 cents per pound for 1974-crop, Acala varieties, basis grade 31 staple 37. Medium staple varieties brought 52.00 to 56.00 cents per pound, basis grade 31 staple 34. Some Arizona growers rejected offering prices of 80.00 cents per pound for early ginned, mixed lots of most grade 31 staple 35. South Texas growers were offered 40.00 to 60.00 cents per pound for small mixed in-grade lots and 25.00 to 40.00 cents for below grade lots. Growers were reluctant to sell at these prices. Some 1974 acreage was contracted at 62.00 cents per pound in the Harlingen area. Central Texas growers received up to 70.00 cents per pound for selected lots of grades 32 and 42, staples 32 and 38. Most mixed lot brought 55.00 to 63.00 cents per pound, however. On the Texas plains a limited volume of mixed quality, early ginned cotton brought 60.00 to 68.00 cents per pound. Plains area growers contracted 1973-crop cotton at up to 41.00 cents per pound above loan rates for better quality, premium mike cotton.

TIPS ON SAVING ENERGY



Heavy automobiles and appliances that need rich diets of gas and electricity aren't the only offenders in the energy crisis. Many persons unwittingly waste energy around the house without realizing what's consuming so many kilowatts.

During the heating season, aluminum storm windows will cut in half the heat energy that is needlessly lost through windows of a house. The National Bureau of Standards advises that an investment in storm windows (or thermally insulated windows) will pay for itself within a decade. You'll enjoy greater comfort in your home, and also save scarce fuel supplies.

Room air conditioners keep their cool better while killing off fewer kilowatts when aluminum awnings are used to keep the sunshine out of the room they are cooling. (According to the National Bureau of Standards, awnings can reduce heat gain by as much as 80 percent.) Inside the house, window shades and draperies can reduce heat penetration through windows by as much as 50 percent. Storm windows during air conditioning season keep the hot outdoor air outdoors.

Clever cooks save gas and electricity by applying production line efficiencies to food preparation. They don't heat up a 30-inch oven to bake a pie. Four pies will bake in the same time and energy it takes for one. Surplus pies get wrapped in aluminum foil and popped into the freezer during evening hours. They'll freeze while demand for energy is low.

Warped pots and pans heat the kitchen and the cook, wasting energy. They're a safety hazard, too. Manufacturers of gas and electric ranges recommend medium weight aluminum cookware because it conducts heat so well, saving fuel as well as energy. Match the size of pans to burners and heating units for efficient use of fuel. A cover on the pot keeps heat inside and speeds up cooking, too.

An innocent looking iron needs an ample diet of kilowatts to remove wrinkles. A shiny sheet of aluminum foil, placed between the ironing board pad and its cover, will bounce heat from the board to the garment. And when the iron's sole plate is made of aluminum, it heats quickly and evenly, lightens work, too.
