LARGEST GRADUATING CLASS GET DIPLOMAS

Exercises Honoring Eighty-Six Seniors Friday Evening Closes Year

Time Honor Students

The graduation exercises at the Ochiltree high school, which were the most successful years work of the school, will come to a close Friday evening at 8:15 o'clock, after the graduation exercises.

Eighty-six young men and women, the largest class ever to graduate from a school in Ochiltree county, will receive their diplomas, which they have completed high school work and are now going to go on to a higher institution of learning or enter into life's work in the business field, the home or the farm.

There has been a week full of school activities. Starting with the commencement sermon by Rev. J. M. Taylor at the school auditorium on Monday evening, there has been nothing doing every night. The play, "The Forest Court", was presented by the pupils of the school on Monday evening. Miss Prater Prentiss was the director of this entertainment. Tuesday night was certificate night.

The Senior play, "Sunshine", played to a full house on Wednesday night. Tonight, Thursday, the Junior high graduation exercises will be held. Dr. Bryan Dacus, president of the A. M. C. of Goodwill, will deliver the graduation address to the class. Between 65 and 70 pupils will complete their Junior High work.

A. Woods, state superintendent of public schools, will deliver the address to the Seniors at the exercises tomorrow night. Honor students for the high school are as follows:

200 HEAD LIVE STOCK IS SOLD

COMMUNITY SALES YARD AUCTION OPENED WEDNESDAY WITH RECORD CROWD

A good sale with every buyer and seller satisfied was the result of the first weekly livestock auction sale conducted by the Community Sales Yard of Perryton on Wednesday afternoon of this week. A record crowd was in attendance at the opening auction session, it being estimated that two thousand people visited the sale pavilion during the afternoon.

Nearly two hundred head of stock was sold during the auction period, 109 head of cattle, 79 head of hogs and 10 head of horses changing hands. Quite a number of stock listed for the sale sold before the auction at private sale. Everything offered was sold and brought a fair price.

The Community Sales Yard will ship a car of fat hogs on Saturday morning of this week, a good part of which was sold through the ring. The sponsors of the yard, E. L. Turner and Wm. Van Guilder are opening a hog market at the yards where hogs will be bought at all times.

A good listing of stock is being arranged for the next auction, Wednesday, May 23. During the morning period, from 10:00 o'clock until noon, farm machinery, household goods and miscellaneous articles will be auctioned. A fee of four per cent is deducted for this auction service.

Rained Quarter Inch

Drizzling Rain Sunday Totals .21 Inch of Moisture; Heavier Towards Canadian

Almost a quarter of an inch of moisture from the drizzling showers Sunday and Sunday night, is the report of the Attorney Jack R. Allen, from the official government gauge. The exact reading was .21, so states Mr. Allen. The rain was much heavier towards Canadian.

These continued showers are of much benefit to the wheat fields. With no sub-soil moisture, it is very necessary that we get rain every week until cutting time.

With a very short crop in sight throughout the wheat belt, it now appears almost certain that wheat will bring at least a dollar a bushel by harvest. The drought and high winds have destroyed or damaged much of the wheat through the territory to the north of us extending on through Canada.

HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUBS OF PANHANDLE IN MEETING AT WEST TEXAS TEACHERS SCHOOL

Canyon, Texas May 12—Miss Dyora Crowder, agent, Mrs. Jerry Dodson, county chairman, and the home demonstration clubs of Ochiltree County have been invited to send delegates and to participate in the short course to be held on the campus of the West Texas State Teachers College on Friday, May 18, under the joint sponsorship of the home economics department of the college and the home demonstration extension service of Texas A. & M.

Miss Marion Northington, head of the college department, and Miss Ruby Mashburn and Miss Myrtle Murray, district agents, of College Station will be in charge.

"The Farm Woman's Place in the New Deal" is the theme of the short course, and will include, under its general head, talks on the Live-at-Home program, federal canning plants, state community canning centers, wardrobe planning, yard beautification, marketing and menu planning.

Pioneer Panhandle Cowman to be Buried Today at Higgins; Died Sunday Night

Many Perryton people are in Higgins this afternoon to attend the funeral of J. W. Kelly, pioneer cowman, who died suddenly at McAllen, Texas, Sunday night while visiting in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Lester Simpson.

Mr. Kelly, who was 79 years of age, has been in excellent health up to Sunday morning when he suffered a stroke which caused his death Sunday night. He had been in the cattle business at Higgins for 46 years. He came to Texas from Medicine Lodge, Kansas.

Mr. Kelly was a half-brother of D. D. Taliaferro, a deputy sheriff of this county and a resident of Perryton. He was the father of Mrs. Val McLanahan of the Wolf Creek country and the grandfather of Mrs. W. H. Lance of Perryton.

Other surviving children are L. C. Kelly, Wichita, Kansas; R. T. Kelly, Higgins; Mrs. Raymond Winstett, Galveston; and Mrs. Walter Berry, Higgins.

GREAT PLAINS HIGHWAY CONVENTION SOON

Two Hundred Delegates from Canada to Mexico Expected for 10th Annual Meeting

On Tuesday, May 29th Expect Spirited Fight Over Change of Route South from Abilene to Laredo and Mexico

Preparations are being made for the entertainment of two hundred people who will be in Perryton on Tuesday, May 29, for the 10th annual convention of the Great Plains Highway Convention. These delegates will come from all along the route of the highway which starts at Regina, Canada, traverses the United States, passing through the states of North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, going into Old Mexico at Laredo.

The last annual meeting was held at North Platte, Nebraska. J. V. Romigh of the latter place is president of the association and R. T. Shindler of this city is vice-president.

Business sessions of the convention will be held in the Ellis Theatre on Tuesday morning and afternoon.

One of the features of the convention will be a big community basket dinner to be held on Wolf Creek. Every citizen of Perryton and the county is invited to join in this affair honoring our guests. A committee consisting of C. E. Woods, Miles Edwards, R. B. Orrill and Virgil Castle are in charge of the dinner. Everyone is urged to bring well filled baskets with sufficient food for their party and enough to feed some of our guests. The convention will recess promptly at noon, drive to the creek, have dinner and be back ready to go into the afternoon business session at two o'clock. A short entertainment program is being arranged for the picnic dinner.

In the evening a huge banquet will be served in the high school cafeteria. At least 250 reservations are expected to be made for this affair. The Lions Club will have charge of the banquet.

Jas. W. Wilson heads a committee in charge of the advance registration of local people. It is the intent of the general convention committee to register at least 150 local citizens and insist on their attendance at the business and all other meetings. Every person registering gets a ticket to the banquet and additional tickets will be sold at actual cost per plate for the ladies.

W. B. Irvin and Jack R. Allen will have charge of the entertainment features of the convention. R. T. Due to the attitude of the students such a revolutionary move soon became impossible and the idea was changed to one of a Student Cooperative Council with a gradual educational campaign to fit the students, for conducting their own affairs. An official announcement now comes that the council will be continued next year.

Lesson VIII May 26, 134
The Future Of The Kingdom
I. Preparation For The Kingdom
(Matt. 25: 1)

The coming of the glorious kingdom of Christ was the theme often upon His lips. In the present lesson we are to study this great theme under the graphic picture of the Ten Virgins. This parable is one of the most beautiful, searching and solemn of any of the Saviour's similes.

II. The Five Foolish Virgins
(Matt. 25: 2, 3)

Three characteristic fools found in the bible are the man who lives foolishly, the man who thinks foolishly, and the man who dies foolishly. The particular group of foolish persons under our present review were not the sons of the earth, not criminals, but represented the pure and beautiful. But even these girls could neglect their opportunity to be saved. The bible is filled with warning that it is not only possible but dangerous for a child of God to miss the pearly gates if he gambles with neglect. Lamps without oil—what a tragedy. As the shades of night deepened, and the bridegroom delayed his coming, the 5 foolish girls let their lamps burn low. It isn't necessary to throw water on a fire to quench it—just neglect it. Finally it will engage in its death struggle—then take its flight forever. A sad thing about this story is that the virgins thought they were ready. There was perhaps no sting of conscience haunting their dreams. In fact, when the cry went out heralding the approach of the bridegroom, they arose and trimmed their lamps in confident expectancy of going in with him to the feast.

All the goodness of our friends cannot transfer merit to ourselves. So the wise didn't have oil for their sister comrades. It is futile and fatal to bank in the excellencies of our fellow pilgrims. Christianity is preeminently an individual affair. Let us prove true to our responsibilities.

(Verses 4, 5)

This group of five girls was wise in vigilance and preparation. They took no chances. They made sure. The way to eternity is a one-way path and admits of no speculation without terrible results. The pure oil of truth, so necessary to light our way, is the word of God (Psa. 119: 105). Only the blind feel their way along. The believer sees his way and walks by faith. There is no guess work about his footsteps. The unerring glow of Heaven's message shows him the road that leads ever upward to eternity's island in the great somewhere.

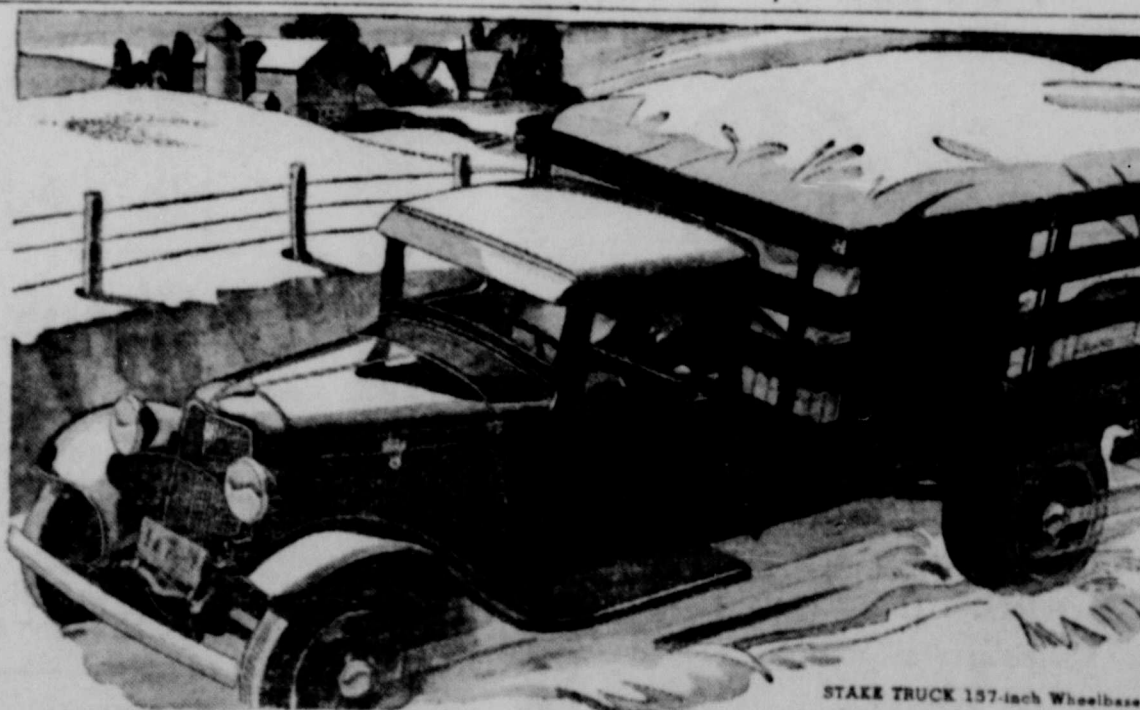
