CONGRESSMAN VISITS

George Mahon In
C-City Saturday

Mitchell County Democrats came out in force to greet Congressman George H. Mahon Saturday morning in Civic House at Colorado City.

Mahon stopped for an informal coffee hour here with friends and constituents. He and Mrs. Mahon were enroute to Loraine where the Congressman addressed the Loraine

High School Homecoming noon luncheon crowds. Both Mahon and his wife are graduates of Loraine High.

Congressman Mahon and his wife are in the process of making campaign stops in towns throughout the 20 counties which make up 19th Congressional District. He seeks reelection to the seat in the House of Representatives, Washington D. C., to which he was first elected in 1934.

At 10 a. m. here in Colorado City Congressman Mahon spoke to the coffee hour guests, including a number from Loraine Westbrook and surrounding communities.

Joe Bell, campaign chairman of Mitchell County Democratic Party, introduced Mahon who began by reviewing the rigorous itinerary he and his wife, Helen, have been following with visits in Loveland, Muleshoe, Littlefield, Spring, Ralls, Floydada, Lubbock, Stanton, Big Spring and other towns.

"It has been a wonderful week," Mahon said. "Not in the last decade have we seen such

a generous, wholesome, understanding spirit from the people in this district.

"Fears seem to have been dissipated, somewhat, and there is a wonderful spirit abroad in the land," Mahon said.

"We want the people to know that we do not take them for granted," the Congressman said with evident feeling.

He then spoke of his added responsibilities this year since the death of Congressman Cannon and his own elevation to the position of chairman of the 50-member Appropriations Committee for the House.

Congressman Mahon admitted to "some loss of sleep and some pounds of weight" since he became head of the powerful committee with the "say-so" about the spending of 100 billion dollars a year for the running of the United States government.

"I am not the dictator," Mahon smiled, "just the chairman." This week has brought some

Wolves Lose 29-0
To Heavy Blizzards

Wolves of Colorado High School went down to Winters High Blizzards by 29-0 in a football tussle at Winters Friday night.

Scoring once in the second quarter, once in the third and twice in the fourth the Blizzards pulled off 16 first downs to C-City 6.

Wolves used for the first time this season a new spread formation with quarterback David McKay 10 yards back from center Coach Truman Nix pinned his hopes to McKay's passing arm and to the air.

McKay completed 16 passes out of 36 tries as the Wolves stuck to a passing game against a college-sized line from Winters. (Blizzards actually out-weight the Texas Tech Red Raiders.)

Pass receivers were Pe Y Millsap, LHB Ricky Houston, RLB Roger Proctor, FB and Donny Lindsey, RHB. Millsap ran one pass from the C-City 35 to the Winters 40. Millsap got off one quick kick for 71 yards in second quarter on third down.

Defensive standouts for the Wolves were Dee Dearen, Reggie Noble, Sam Moser, Robert Stewart, Dickie Shimer, and McKay. McKay played an outstanding game from start to finish, intercepted one pass and ran it back about 20 yards. Considered a top contender for the State title, in pre-season guessing, Winters has lost one conference game, won two. Temporary loss of their star quarterback, Benny Aldridge who suffered a broken collar bone in the first game, had set Winters back earlier in season.

Aldridge was back in the game Friday night against the Wolves. And how! It was Aldridge who took care of three of the four Blizzard touchdowns. After a 75-yard drive in the second, Aldridge tossed a pass from the five to Chester Puckett, end, in the end zone. Larry Ketter, HB, ran over for the two extra points.

A second short pass from Aldridge to Jimmy Adams, failed and the Wolves took a

WB, accounted for the second touchdown. Two points were gained by a pass.

Interceptions of pass tries cost the Wolves the two fourth quarter touchdowns. Mike Patterson grabbed one on the Wolf 24. Seven plays later Aldridge threw another pass caught by Paul Jones for pay dirt.

Van Spill kicked the extra point. Interception of another Wolf pass, late in the final quarter by Mike, Deike brought the Blizzards another six points after a run by Deike from the C-City 18 across goal.

Speaks to
Republicans

John Matthews, Republican candidate running against Jerry Sadler, Democrat incumbent, for the office of Land Commissioner, was in Colorado City as speaker for the official opening of Republican Party campaign headquarters.

Matthews, endorsed by two area dailies of long Democratic tradition, Abilene Reporter-News and Big Spring Herald, declared here that "Texans need better administration than they are getting in the sensitive and important state land office."

Matthews charged that incumbent Jerry Sadler is operating the office, a \$66-million operation, more from his East Texas home base than from the state capital.

"How can he manage this great public trust in absentia?" Matthews asked.

"The vast operation of the State Land Office demands proper supervision as some happenings in earlier years in that particular wing of our state government should have proved to Texans," he said.

Matthews, who is devoting full time now to his candidacy, pledged that he will, if elected, give to the office his full attention and abilities.

The West Texas rancher-businessman, seeking his first public office, declared here that the state constitution requires all executive officers, including the land commissioner, to reside in Austin during tenure of office.

"Mr. Sadler doesn't have a telephone or address listed in the Austin telephone directory," Matthews said. "I think the land commissioner should make himself available to the people—not turn over the responsibility of office to his chief clerk."

Fisher Here
As Speaker

Ground breaking ceremony for Texas Electric Service Company's \$30 million Morgan Creek Power Plant addition was the Thursday big event in Colorado City.

Beeman Fisher, president of TESCO, was in charge of the dedicatory program at 11 a. m. on the site of the giant generating plant to be built at Lake Colorado City, adding 300,000 kilowatts to the Morgan Creek Power capacity.

With Dr. John Chinn, mayor of Colorado City, Charles C. Thompson, chairman of the Colorado City Industrial Team, Inc., and Elmer Martin, Mitchell County judge, Fisher turned the first sod at the project site. Gilded shovels used were presented to the four ground-breakers as souvenirs of the sod-turning occasion.

Roy Bates, manager of TESCO's Morgan Creek Power Plant, gave figures and facts about the mammoth project before the ceremony and Tye Franklin, construction superintendent for EBASCO, described the giant machines already on the construction scene.

Fisher and Joe Bell, publisher of the Colorado City Record were speakers after the luncheon served in the power plant's conference room, buffet-style to 14 TESCO executives and 50 invited guests. Guests included a number of Colorado Citizens and citizens from Abilene, Big Spring, Sweetwater, Lodi and Snyder and San Angelo.

"Today we mark the beginning of the construction of a new addition of 300,000 kilowatts, more than doubling the present generating capability and making Morgan Creek the largest plant in the Texas Electric Service Company power system," Fisher said after summarizing the growth of the plant here.

Morgan Creek Plant began operation in 1950 with a total capacity of 44,000 kilowatts. In 1952 TESCO doubled the capacity by adding a 22,000 kilowatt generating unit. In 1954, a 70,000 kilowatt unit was added. Five years later, in 1959, a 175,000 kilowatt unit again doubled the plant's power capability.

"It is interesting to note," Fisher said, "that this single new one-half million kilowatt unit will have a generating capacity greater than that of all our power plants just seven years ago." Fisher cited the expansion of the plant

at Colorado City as "an example of growth in this part of the country."

Completion of the new unit, Fisher said, was first set for early 1967 but has now been stepped up for the middle of 1966. Peak of construction will bring in 350 highly skilled workers, Fisher added.

"You are looking at a man under pressure—Tye Franklin," Fisher said of EBASCO's construction superintendent here.

Fisher pointed out the long range planning which resulted in the building of two lakes here, Lake Colorado City and Lake Champion. "These two lakes make possible the water necessary for continued area growth and for operation of the plant," he said.

"Our substantial investment here in the Morgan Creek Plant and its related facilities shows, that we have confidence in this area and its people. I can assure you that it is our sincerest intention to continue to be partners with you in the growth and progress of this area," he concluded.

Bell, spokesman for Colorado City, predicted that the power plant would "make Colorado City the power hub of West

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Texas. He praised the "progress, cooperation, partnership for all of us—TESCO, Colorado City, Snyder, Lorraine, Big Spring, Abilene."

"We're tied together," Bell said, "and growth here means growth elsewhere across our entire West Texas area. But here in Mitchell County and Colorado City, especially, we are proud of something extra in this partnership in progress."

"This tremendous plant here on the shores of Lake Colorado City is a landmark, an example extraordinary of how a small community joins hands in a working, thriving partnership with industry," Bell said.

"Colorado City has linked its arms with industry from the very start until today. Colorado City is proud of this particular partnership. Proud especially so, to light the way for all West Texas and a brighter tomorrow," he said.

Guests were presented five sheets of the plant project and engraved souvenir plaques bearing miniature shovels.

When the new unit goes into operation total generating capability of Morgan Creek Plant will be 830,000 kilowatts making the total TESCO system capable of generating 2,250,000 kilowatts.

Bates, in his presentation remarks, told the group the home new turbine will weigh 2,400,000 lbs., will rise 14

stories high. The pedestal will be 176 feet long. Boiler of the new unit will contain 202,000 cubic feet, compared to the 104,000 cubic feet of the 175,000 kilowatt number 5 unit added to the plant here in 1959.

Steel tower transmission lines from Lake Colorado City west of Odessa and east to Ft. Worth are being readied to carry 345,000 volts, among the highest in the industry. Lines now carry 138,000 volts. Towers in the new lines are about as tall as a 10-story office building. Construction of the line required nearly 500 carloads of steel and conductors.

Work of "bundling" the line for converting it to higher voltage is now going on.

In Colorado City for the "ground-breaking" ceremony and noon luncheon in addition to Fisher were TESCO vice-president B. B. Hulsey, assistant to the president, and W. G. Marquardt, in charge of division operations. D. E. Lubev, chief engineer, J. M. Penabaker, superintendent of power.

Other TESCO men present were Larry Kinard, assistant superintendent of Morgan Creek Plant, Bates, B. L. Brown, Sweetwater division superintendent, H. E. Clark, Sweetwater local manager, Dan W. Benson, Colorado City local manager, R. L. Beale, Big Spring division manager, J. L. Edwards, advertising executive, J. D. Womack, executive department, and W. E. Payne, superintendent of production.

Franklin and J. L. Forbus, in charge of Ebasco southwest operations, represented the construction company which is building the addition under contract.

exciting things, he went on to say, "with things of great magnitude happening throughout the world. Now that Khrushchev is deposed, there will be unsettled international relations."

Mahon explained the fall of the Russian premier and Communist party secretary by saying, "We looked, had in Cuba, Khrushchev looked worse. He did not do the things he said he would do. He did not drive us out of Berlin. Now that he is deposed, the new leaders will try to do what Khrushchev told the world he would do."

"We need a strong President. We need a strong Congress," he said. "Not a rubber stamp or a 'Yes' Congress. We will need the check balance to keep a strong country."

The Congressman expressed the belief that the United States will "never" disaster, "since maintained." The Nation, he said, needs to keep strong not only from a military standpoint but strong with moral and spiritual strength as well.

"We just came here today," Mahon said in conclusion, "to let you know, Helen and I, that we love the people." The Congressman was given a rousing round of applause.

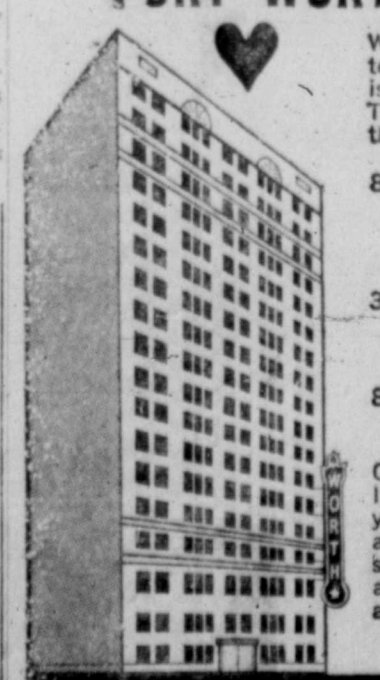

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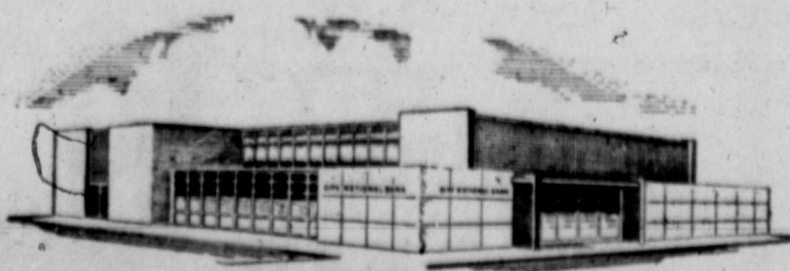
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
