Republicans Split On Policy Program Issues

Steering Committees Continue Work, As Young Men Object

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Danger signals for any early agreement of a mid-term republican policy program were raised today by a group of first and second term house republicans.

As senate and house GOP steering committees continued meetings in an effort to present an affirmative policy statement to the party's national committee meeting Dec. 7, in Chicago, 39 house members whose service started with the last congress joined today in this warning to the leadership.

They intend to express their own views on major matters and not let party leaders speak for them. The group issued a formal statement which contained no reference to any rift. But several members said privately that one has developed between the younger and older republicans.

Made public by Rep. Augustus W. Bennett of New York, the statement called for non-partisanship in the current Pearl Harbor investigation and in consideration of universal training proposals now under study.

"Some press and radio comments have attributed to the republican party certain positions on current controversial issues," the declaration read. "These comments are based upon views expressed by individual members." The only purpose of the Pearl Harbor inquiry, the group said, "is to bring all the facts to light so that, on the basis of full knowledge, we may be in a position to avoid a repetition of this awful disaster. We emphatically reject any suggestions that our government should have acquiesced in Japan's program of aggression."

Russia Said Able To Produce Bombs Sooner And Faster

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. (P)—Dr. Irving Langmuir predicted today that if an atomic armament race developed Russia will produce its first atomic bomb in about three years and possibly accumulate them "far faster" than the United States.

The associate research director of General Electric gave the Senate Atomic Energy committee half a dozen reasons why he said the Russians would have an advantage:

1. "A larger population and it can be regimented."
2. "They have a remarkable system of incentives which is rapidly increasing the efficiency of their industrial production."
3. "No unemployment."
4. "No strikes."
5. "They have a deep appreciation of pure and applied science."
6. "They have already planned a far more extensive program in science than any contemplated by us."

Langmuir proposed that the governments of Great Britain, Canada and this nation seek immediate contact with the Soviet government to secure a tentative agreement based on the Truman-Atlee-Mackenzie King formula of November 15.

FRANKFURT, Germany, Nov. 30 (P)—Approximately \$75,000,000 worth of United States wheat, processed foods and gasoline have been imported into Germany and have been paid for by war department funds.

Marshal Terauchi Surrenders In Asia To Mountbatten

RANGOON, Nov. 30 (P)—Field Marshal Count Juichi Terauchi, invalid supreme commander of Japanese expeditionary forces in the southern regions of Asia, formally surrendered to Adm. Lord Louis Mountbatten today.

Terauchi turned over his long and short swords, dating back to the 13th and 15th centuries, in the ceremony held outside the portico of the palace of the governor-general of Ceylon.

Continued illness of the Japanese Field Marshal, 67, forestalled efforts to move him to Singapore to yield his weapons, symbols of authority from Emperor Hirohito, to the supreme commander in Southeast Asia. The physical surrender to the troops, however, was made in the period after Tokyo capitulated.

Leaning heavily on a cane, Terauchi walked with his chief of staff, Lt. Gen. Takaso Numata, about 50 feet to the surrender site. Aides carried the blades in wooden boxes.

"I am now going to accept the sword of Field Marshal Count Terauchi as a symbol of the final act of surrender of the supreme commander of the Japanese expeditionary forces of the southern regions to the supreme commander of the Southeast Asia command," Mountbatten said.

They exchanged salutes and Terauchi trudged away.

West Texas Oil Stocks For Week Show Increase

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (P)—The bureau of mines reported today that stocks of domestic and foreign crude petroleum totaled 219,385,000 barrels on Nov. 24, a net decrease of 1,140,000 barrels for the week. Domestic crude decreased 838,000 barrels; foreign crude decreased 202,000.

Daily average production was 4,469,000 barrels, a decrease of 6,000. Runs to stills averaged 4,648,000, a decrease of 45,000.

GM PROTESTS ILLEGAL PICKETING

Says Meet Vain Until Union Backs Down

DETROIT, Nov. 30 (AP)

While awaiting conferences next week with federal conciliators, General Motors Corp. today took up with the CIO United Auto Workers Union what it considers one of the knottiest problems in the ten-day strike — "illegal picketing" at the struck plants.

The corporation agreed to meet with Chief US Conciliator Edgar L. Warren in Washington next Tuesday but told him negotiations with the union, as recommended yesterday by President Truman, would not be resumed until the latter modifies its picketing practices and its "30 per cent or else" wage demands.

Representing the UAW-CIO at today's discussion — the first meeting of the two parties since the strike which has idled 225,000 workers began — was Vice President Walter P. Reuther, who has denied the company charge of illegality on the picket lines.

The Washington conference was arranged by Warren after President C. E. Wilson expressed GM's willingness to meet with government officials and offered the services of Harry W. Anderson, GM vice president in charge of personnel.

Warren said he would attempt to get negotiations resumed "as soon as possible," but Wilson, at a press conference after receiving the government invitation, was emphatic in the company's refusal to consider merits of the dispute under present conditions.

The "illegal picketing," Wilson said, has prevented supervisory employees from entering and leaving GM plants at will, has led to a "situation of lawlessness" at the plants.

If present methods of picketing are continued, he said he "supposed" the company would resort to court injunctions.

Wilson declined to say on what terms the company would settle the wage controversy.

"The way I feel at the moment," he declared, "it is something less than we offered to avoid the strike," the difference representing "the loss to us." The company's last offer was for a cost of living increase estimated to average about 10 per cent.

Reuther repeated his statement that the union would be willing to accept less than a 30 per cent increase if the "arithmetic" disclosed by an impartial investigation of the corporation's books showed that amount could not be granted without price increases.

Cut Ordered In Pan-Am Transcontinental Hops

LONDON, Nov. 30 (P)—Pan American World Airways said tonight the British government had ordered the company to reduce its transatlantic schedule from five flights a week to two.

A company statement said the order was in "retaliation for the low rates established by Pan American for transatlantic air travel."

Pan American's new \$275 fare for London to New York flights is about \$300 less than the wartime rate.

Flare-Up Expected In Labor Meeting

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. (P)—The labor-management conference turned today from harmonious action on agreed-upon declarations to final sessions threatening to flare into controversy over points still at issue.

Chief among the latter is the relation of wages to the storm of reconversion labor disputes. This point was raised by CIO President Philip Murray whose unions already have come to grips over it with the auto-oil and steel industries.

Murray has indicated he will raise the wage issue on the conference floor if it is not disposed of to his satisfaction in a final session of the executive committee.

Murray is a member of the group, but the unanimity rule, which he and other labor and management delegates suddenly endorsed yesterday at the request of John L. Lewis, may block any agreement. That would force Murray to fight from the conference floor for a declaration in favor of substantial pay increases to offset losses of high wartime earnings.

Other controversies too may enliven the concluding sessions of the conference to which the government had looked for a way out of postwar industrial disputes.

At yesterday's meeting, the first since the conference split up into committees November 7, the 36 labor and management delegates unanimously adopted reports of three committees.

One called for the strengthening of the US Conciliation Service in the Labor Department, with additional funds to be requested from Congress.

The other two ruled out strikes or lockouts until "all other peaceful procedures" such as voluntary arbitration had been tried in negotiating initial contracts or in resolving disputes over present ones.

The conferees also accepted unanimously executive committee resolutions calling for a semi-permanent labor-management advisory committee of eight men and declaring against racial discrimination in jobs.

HC Chairman's Bond Sales Make Thursday Big Day

Rotary Shoots Ahead In Service Club Race \$34,000

County Bond Chairman Ira Thurman went bond berserk Thursday and Thursday, for the first time, Howard county showed a greater per centage of the E bond quota made than time elapsed of the Victory Loan drive.

Almost jubilant, Ted Groehl, Victory Loan chairman, announced today that Thursday sales totaled \$62,175, by far the biggest day of the campaign. Of the amount, he said, Thurman was responsible for selling approximately \$34,000.

Thurman said that John C. Adams, Coahoma, bought \$10,050 in E bonds after selling his cattle.

Grover Dunham, former mayor of Big Spring and now temporarily located at El Paso, stopped here with his family long enough Thursday for Thurman to sell him \$7,500 in E bonds to be applied to "the home county" quota. Then another \$17,000 sale was reported late in the day by Thurman. All figures were on cash value.

Previously, Groehl had made a \$15,000 sale and credited it to the Lions club, but by the time Thurman was through Thursday, the Rotary club was so far out in front that Groehl confessed he was almost bewildered. The Rotary total was \$91,047.50. In second place were the Lions with \$54,225, followed by the ABC club with \$35,081.25, the Kiwanis with \$14,356, and the B&PW with \$7,087.50. Increases for the day included Rotary \$35,868.75, ABC club \$5,812.50, and Kiwanis \$2,450.

On a per capita basis, the Rotary was far out in front with \$1,750.90, the Lions next with \$661, ABC club \$523.60, Kiwanis \$326.30, B&PW \$186.75.

Groehl reported the county total on E bonds at \$200,823.75, or 79 per cent. Only 77.7 per cent of the drive time has elapsed, he said. On Nov. 26, Howard county had pulled up to 41 in the state.

In addition to the E sales, Southwestern Life Insurance company bought \$10,000, Firestone \$2,000, and Magnolia Petroleum \$3,000 to be applied to the over-all quota. Over-all figure now is \$590,235.75, but a quarter of a million in pledges has not been included in the total.

Texan Named Chief Of Transportation

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (P)—Another Texas-born army man has been elevated to a high-ranking Washington assignment.

He is Maj. Gen. Edmond Harrison Leavy, a native of Longview, Tex., who assumes duties as chief of transportation tomorrow, the war department announced.

The 51-year-old Texan succeeds Mag. Gen. C. P. Gross who is retiring.

A graduate of Texarkana high school, General Leavy attended Texas A. and M. college before being appointed to the United States Military academy in 1913.

He returned from extensive overseas assignments this month. The general has served in three war theaters, European, Mediterranean and Pacific.

Intelligence Feared Attack At Any Time

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP) — Maj. Gen. Sherman Miles said today that army intelligence "very much feared" the Japanese would attack when they delivered their diplomatic note here at 1 p. m., Dec. 7, 1941, but did not know where the attack was coming.

Miles, head of the intelligence division at the time of the Pearl Harbor disaster, told a senate-house inquiry committee today that war with Japan had become a strong probability in the minds of army leaders early in December, 1941.

He said that interception of Tokyo's direction to its "peace" envoys to deliver their note on the fateful Sunday caused him to call the attention of Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff, to the critical situation.

"We didn't know where it was coming," the general testified, "but we very much feared that the attack was coming coincident with the 1 p. m. delivery of the Japanese reply."

Earlier in the diplomatic negotiations leading up to the outbreak of war, Secretary of State Hull had given the Japanese a set of counter proposals.

Gerhard Gessel, committee counsel, asked Miles what the intelligence division had thought about the possibilities of war with Japan in mid-November of 1941.

"One thing I felt sure was that Japan faced a crisis that would almost certainly result in radical action on her part," Miles replied.

He added that this action could have taken one or more of several forms such as an attack on Russia, expansion to the south, an assault on Hong Kong, increased efforts to crush China and "lastly, Japan might add to her enormous burdens and the strain on her military establishment by attacking the two great naval powers, the United States and Great Britain."

Rep. Keefe (R-Wis.) told a reporter he intends to ask Maj. Gen. Sherman Miles, former army intelligence chief, what he knows about the purported recording of a Tokyo radio broadcast which Keefe said meant the was was on.

The Japanese prepared a code to signal their diplomats that a break with the United States was near.

Committee members said there is dispute in official records of previous Pearl Harbor inquiries as to whether the message ever was broadcast, whether it was recorded by American monitoring stations and whether copies of it were filed.

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) attempted unsuccessfully earlier to let the committee's permission to look at what he said he suspects may be a vacant war department file that might once have contained a copy of the message.

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DEAD PIDGIN

LAGOS, Nigeria. (P)—A new and simplified system of teaching English, adopted by the army in West Africa, will, it is hoped, eventually eliminate pidgin English in the British territories.

Russians To Remain In Manchuria Until Nationalists Arrive

CHUNGKING, Nov. 30 (P)—The Chinese press and Moscow radio reported an agreement today by which Russian forces will remain in Manchuria long enough for the Chinese government to bring in control troops.

A communist statement here meanwhile charged that 52 civilians were killed or wounded Nov. 24 when two P-51 fighter planes with unidentified markings strafed villagers going to a fair in a town 80 miles northwest of Paoing in Hopei province.

The insurgents claimed they had routed a body of "puppet troops" eight miles south of Shihkiachwang rail junction in Hopei Nov. 14, inflicting 2,200 casualties.

It was alleged that more than 1,000 Japanese troops with a number of armored cars have been sent to reinforce nationalist troops 35 miles northeast of Peiping.

Hess Said Accepting Full Responsibility

NUERNBERG, Nov. 30. (P)—Rudolf Hess told the international military tribunal today that he accepted "full responsibility for all I have done, signed or co-signed," and that he wished to continue on trial with his fellow Nazis.

Hess declared that he had feigned loss of memory, even to his own attorney, for "tactical reasons."

The court adjourned for the day without announcing a ruling on the mental fitness of the former No. 2 deputy Fuehrer, whom Allied psychiatrists have reported sane, but suffering from hysteria.

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British Airplanes Attack Indonesians

BATAVIA, Nov. 30. (P)—British airplanes attacked with bombs and rockets today against Indonesian guns which yesterday hurled 95 shells in the Ambarawa camp area where Allied refugees had been gathered.

Thirteen persons were killed and 34 wounded by the Indonesian shelling. Among those killed were five British soldiers.

Mass Suicide Tried By Swede Internees

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 30 (AP)—Hundreds of German, Polish, Austrian and Baltic internees delayed their transportation from Swedish internment camps to Russian-occupied territories today by mass suicide attempts and self-inflicted wounds.

Prisoners attacked themselves with knives, razors, bits of glass and even sharp stones.

Some of the internees formed tight rings against Swedish military and police who surrounded their barracks preparatory to carrying them to a Soviet deportation ship. They held off the officials while others stabbed themselves. Many barracks soon were splashed with blood.

The leader plunged a knife into his breast and several others followed the example. Others shouted "Slab me, stab me here."

Two Events Bring Change Of Feeling On Military Union

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. (AP)—The Senate Military committee was told today that two events in the spring of 1945 brought about "a general change of feeling" among Navy officers in the Pacific about the feasibility of a single department of national defense.

Rear Adm. Forrest Sherman, who was Deputy Chief of Staff to Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, listed the events in his prepared testimony as:

(1) "The establishment within the War Department structure of the 20th Air Force to be based in the Marianas for attacks on Japan, both of which were with the Pacific ocean areas, but with its command located in the Pentagon building 8,600 miles away.

(2) "The directive issued by the joint chiefs of staff at the instance of the chief of staff of the Army, which transferred to the control of General of the Army MacArthur all the Army resources, except air, in the Pacific ocean areas."

Sherman, testifying against proposals to merge the services, said, "these two events disrupted unified command in the Pacific and disillusioned Naval officers who had given support to the theories of a single department."

Jet Plane On View
DENISON, Nov. 30. (AP)—North Texans will get their first view Sunday of the Army's new jet plane, "The Shooting Star," during another open house at Perrin Field. The P-80 plane will be flown here from Randolph Field.

Campaign To Add Library Volumes Opens This Week

A quick campaign to raise funds for providing sorely needed volumes for the Howard County Free library will be undertaken within the next week.

Library supporters, attending a meeting Thursday afternoon at the Settles, adopted a plan presented by Henry D. Norris, general chairman, whereby women's organizations will canvass the business district for contributions.

Norris named a steering committee composed of Mrs. Shine Phillips, Mrs. A. H. Ryal and Edith Gay to map plans for the rapid-fire drive. At the same time, J. H. Greene was named chairman of a special gifts committee composed of Jack Smith, Rev. J. E. McCoy, Pancho Hall, J. H. Greene, and Joe Pickle.

At the meeting, it was developed that following withdrawal of state volumes, on loan for starting the library here, the total volumes now stands at only 3,917. This figures only .15 of a book per person as against 1.9 per person in Panhandle, 1.8 in Hereford, 1.2 in Midland, and .7 in Odessa, which is only slightly older than the local library.

Objective of the campaign is to raise sufficient funds to add 1,000 additional volumes to the local library. A total of 706 volumes have been added through county funds this year and 211 by service clubs, reported Doris Nesbitt, librarian.

Circulation is from 50 to 125 per day, she said, in spite of the fact that many have "read out" the supply of volumes. Because of the heavy reader traffic, she estimated that fully one-third of the volumes now available were "dead" so far as the majority of readers were concerned.

The drive for funds will be officially concluded as of Dec. 7, if plans go through, followed by a climactic library "tag day" on Dec. 8.

March 19. Col. Warren was succeeded Feb. 26, 1944 by Col. H. M. Wittkop, who served until appointment of Col. John P. Kenney the following May 16. After transfer of Col. Kenney, Col. Ralph C. Rockwood assumed command Aug. 4, 1944. Col. John K. Nissley assumed command on July 15, 1945 and was relieved by Lt. Col. Joseph F. Hunter, who took over Oct. 26 and served through to inactivation of the post.

Among those who served as acting commanders were Lt. Col. James F. Reed and Lt. Col. Albert W. Satterwhite, former directors of training.

During the time the field was active, 42 classes of cadets finished the training course, the last getting its silver bombardier wings on Sept. 26, 1945. Not only has the post graduated around 6,000 students, but it had the distinction of being sort of an "international" training point, for in addition to American cadets, students from France, Brazil and China were added to the field for simultaneous training. The final class was composed entirely of 35 Chinese cadets who mastered techniques in use of the Norden bomb-sight.

The post hospital was made a central station for a large area in West Texas.

Although two crashes in the later stages of activity marred the record, the Big Spring Bombardier school finished its work with one of the outstanding safety achievements in the AAF. The field's training planes had flown approximately 400,000 hours and more than 60,000,000 miles with only four accidents producing fatalities. Only the last two accidents involved cadets.

Big Spring Bombardier School students fared well in the all-American Bombing Olympics, which were held until 1943. In the real contest of war, graduates of the school earned literally thousands of medals and citations for extraordinary achievement.

During the course of operation, length of the training course was extended from 12 to 24 weeks and navigation was added as a part of the training. In the final stages, a 24-week redeployment course, designed to maintain bombardier officers' proficiency and to raise military standards in leadership and performance of duties, and to further broaden the officers' knowledge of flying duties, was offered. Courses included bombing, navigation, weather, radar, orientation, radio, administration, supply, military law, courtesy and custom and flying training.

Many famous persons, including Gen. Hap Arnold, commanding general of the AAF, Bob Hope, Jacqueline Cochran, in charge of the army's women's pilot training, and others, visited the post.

One of the final acts of the field was to transfer some 3,000 officers and men from the post to separation centers in keeping with the AAF redeployment program.

Big Spring citizens maintained an active interest in the post throughout its period of operation. An open house occasions they flocked by the thousands to visit post installations and to watch flying operations. They watched scores of reviews and decorations, hundreds of chapel weddings and otherwise keep a close hand on the pulse of the post they came to point with pride as "our school."

Terrell Man Passes

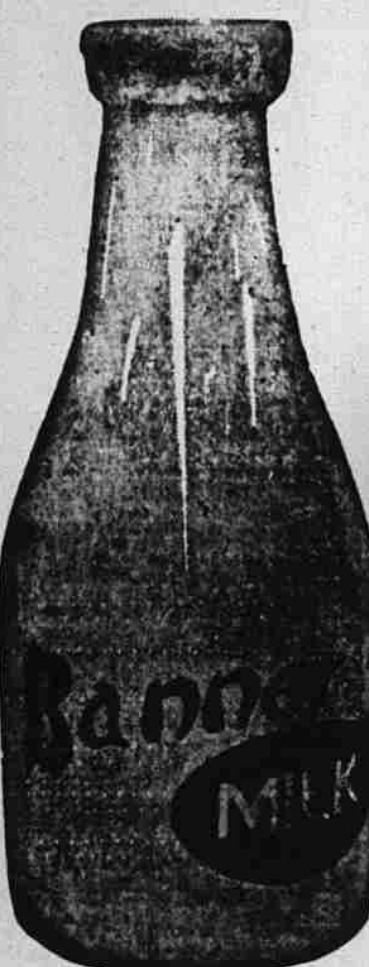
TERRELL, Nov. 30. (AP)—W. J. Davis, 73, a Terrell business man since 1900, died here last night. He had been ill two months.

A Family Scrap Fight With Fala Costs Elliott's Dog Its Life

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 30. (AP)—Blaze, Elliott Roosevelt's bull mastiff of transcontinental plane ride fame, licked the late president's Scottie, Fala, but paid for the victory with his life.

The state health department said today Blaze was destroyed, as a precaution, by Dr. Thomas Sheldon, Rhinebeck veterinarian, but that examination of Blaze's head showed the dog did not have rabies.

The department received Blaze's head Tuesday from Dr. Sheldon. Fala was admitted to Dr. Sheldon's hospital Saturday. Several stitches were needed to close Fala's wounds and he was weak from loss of blood, Dr. Sheldon said.

Fala, a visitor Saturday at the Roosevelt Hyde Park estate, while ambling across a lawn met the 135-pound Blaze. Fur began to fly from the Scottie—but the mastiff was unharmed.

Blaze broke into the news last January when three service men were "bumped off" a transport plane because the mastiff had a higher priority. The dog was enroute to Elliott Roosevelt's wife, actress Faye Emerson in California. Roosevelt, then an officer in the army air forces, sent Blaze from England.

In New York, the Herald Tribune said Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt gave short answers when asked about the fight between the dogs.

"I don't see that this is anyone's business except the family's," she said. "Furthermore, I don't know what you're talking about."

Then she asked the reporter: "I don't see how you even heard about it—who told you?"

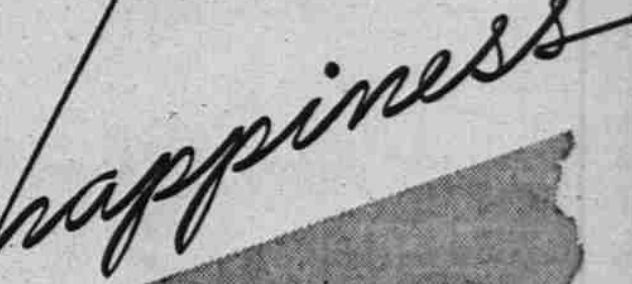

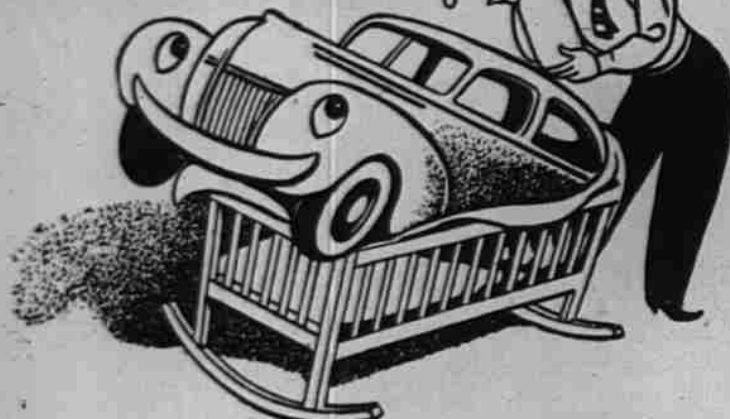

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—The army has asked its commander in Hawaii for a report on the asserted return of 54 football players to the United States by air although they had too few points to be discharged.

Editorial —

Eliminating Incompetents

With The News

LONDON, Nov. 30 — Former Prime Minister Churchill's all-out attack on the new labor government, as leader of the recently defeated conservative party, represents the sudden though not unexpected opening of a conservative offensive to discredit the laborites (or socialists, as they frequently designate themselves) and regain public support.

Churchill made a daring challenge—daring because it is one from which there is no retreat—when he defined the issue as that of "the people versus the socialists."

He put it in this grim fashion: "The vote of the electors at the general election was one of the greatest disasters that has smitten this country through its long and checkered history. x x x I foresee with sorrow, but without fear, that in the next few years we shall come to fundamental quarrels in this country. It seems impossible to escape the fact that events are moving and will move toward the issue—the people versus the socialists."

"I'm afraid that anyone with imagination must see in this statement the implications of a fierce political struggle in which one class of the population tries to subjugate another."

Churchill is a great political strategist, but an impartial observer can only remark that the old maestro is playing a very long shot. The socialists at this writing are holding a strong position.

Britain's wartime premier has employed the political tactics of pushing the laborites onto a premise which they themselves not only had not taken but had disavowed. This is, as he puts it, that the "socialist doctrinaires" in carrying out their program will rob the country of "that reasonable prosperity and freedom for all classes on which we have hitherto built our English and British way of life." Such a claim of course envisages extreme nationalization and regimentation of the individual.

That's strong mustard, and when Mr. Churchill states the position in this way he is voicing the extreme view of the socialist intentions. Certainly they plan to regulate society to some degree, but the rank and file disavows any intention of regimentation. Their announced program calls for nationalization of the nation's vital industries, but they say that others will be left free of control. The party has come out officially against communism and totalitarianism.

News that over 600 UNRRA employees have been dismissed for incompetence within the last few months is not shocking. On the contrary, in our book it is a good sign.

In an organization as large as UNRRA, a certain percentage of incompetents is bound to creep in. Moreover, the speed with which forces were assembled increases that margin. Too, there is a certain glamour which attends to this type of program and a belief in some quarters that here would be a nice soft spot. Consequently, some workers doubtless were added due to various types of pressure.

Leo J. Mangolin, chief of the UNRRA, denied previous reports attributed to him that most of those dismissed had been arrested. Certainly, he is bound to have uncovered a certain amount of dishonesty and in the interest of accuracy, he will be wise to bare such instances instead of yielding to the temptation to whitewash.

Dishonesty rather than incompetence is the thing which should shock human conscience. Dishonesty is multiplied in offense when it feeds on funds and materials set aside for the relief of human suffering.

It is therefore a good sign that incompetents are being weeded out of the UNRRA organization, and it will be a better sign if any vestige of dishonesty is eliminated and vigorously punished.

One of the most shocking developments is the vast black market in which GIs and officers participated with relish until recently, and which probably still flourishes to a lesser extent.

There can be no real justification for participation in this sort of thing. It is a shameful business, and the fact that men in American uniforms have had a part in it does not lend any dignity to it. On the contrary, it is bound to lessen respect for the nation for which those uniforms stand. Small wonder some of them regard us as money changers.

Nearer The Time

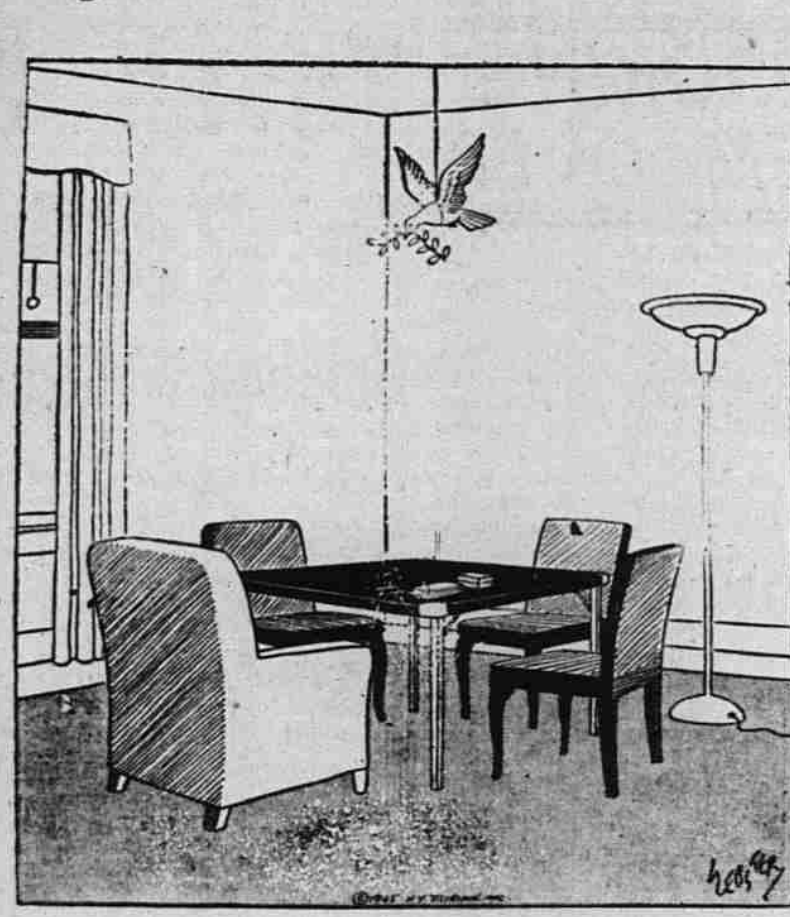

With The AEF: Admiral Wears Six Stars, One For Each Ship

SHANGHAI, Nov. 30. (AP) — China's top admiral, Chen Shao-Kwan, wears six stars, one more than any other admiral in the world. And right now the Chinese navy is down to six ships, one for each star.

It wasn't always that way. Hundreds of years ago the Chinese Navy had so many ships — wooden junkies, of course — that they could be chained together to form a sea blockade 200 miles long.

That was back in the Han Dynasty and the Three-Kingdom Dynasty, when three warlords were fighting one another on sea and land. They fought a close-quarter war in those days. They set quarter after with flaming arrows, boarded, and beat in enemy heads with spiked clubs.

The modern Chinese navy began to take shape after the Opium war in 1842. China built dockyards and a naval training station.

After the 1911 Chinese revolution the Navy obtained ships from Japan, Britain and Germany and eventually floated a fleet of 20 vessels, including several cruisers.

In 1937 the Navy had 53 ships, including five cruisers; total tonnage, 44,000 tons.

The fleet was destroyed — except for six small vessels — in three blockade operations on the Yangtze river in late 1937 and early 1938. These blockades were more or less delaying actions, and were costly in men and ships, but prevented the Japanese from sending invasion forces into the interior aboard transport ships.

These three blockades cost seven-eighths of the Chinese navy. The few ships that survived were taken upriver to Chungking after their guns had been removed and replaced as shore batteries. The Chinese navy as such ceased to exist, but Chinese sailors went into the countryside as guerrilla forces. Some operated mine-fields along the Yangtze.

Soon there will be more than 20 ships, but nothing heavier than a gunboat, in the Chinese navy. Some are being raised from the river bottom by the Japanese and turned over to China. Others are gifts from Britain, the United States and France. At least one American gunboat, the Tutuila, is now in Chinese hands.

Washington—Legislative Bog Eyed From Distance

WASHINGTON—It's hardly any time at all since I passed along the prediction that increasing desire for a recess, a vacation for the holidays, would drive Congress to enactment of some of the important pending legislation.

I could have saved some ink. The legislative log jam seems tighter than ever and is being threatened now with something that could prevent its being broken at all before Christmas. That is absenteeism.

It hasn't been long since Democratic Sen. Tydings of Maryland, who lives practically within commuting distance of the Capitol, berated his absent colleagues for not sticking more closely to the legislative halls until pending measures are cleared.

Several other members have spoken up on the subject — the last Sen. Abe Murdock (D-Utah). During debate on the important Government Reorganization Bill he noted that there were only ten senators on the floor.

It was only a few minutes later that Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) pointed out that the few senators present were mostly those "who had come recently from the people" and warned that after another election or two, the people might express their will for a reorganization of Congress by sending men to the Senate who would see it through.

Actually on that day, only 26 senators were ill, out of town, or too otherwise occupied to show for roll call, but a little later, when a roll call vote was taken on an amendment, 39 of the senators failed to answer to their names.

On the previous day in the House while the Full Employment Bill was being debated, the point of a lack of quorum was raised and the speaker could count only 70 representatives on the floor. A roll call brought only 274 members to their seats, out of the 430-odd.

These absences on the floor aren't serious. Routine business can and is transacted through the floor leaders. It's when the absenteeism runs over into the committees that business really bogs down.

District Attorneys, Law Officers Calling For Revised Parole System

AUSTIN, Nov. 29. (AP) — District and county attorneys of Texas have joined with police and sheriffs in calling for revision of the laws under which prisoners are pardoned or paroled from the penitentiary system.

E. A. Gormley of Dallas, president of the Police Chiefs Association, appointed a committee to study "the effects of pardons and paroles on the apparent increase in crime being experienced in Texas."

The district and county attorneys, noting that "it has never been hard to get signatures to a petition for a pardon," released a committee report suggesting the law be made more stringent. This was sent to the governor and members of the legislature.

One recommendation was that a prisoner be required to notify prosecuting witnesses or injured parties of his intention to obtain a pardon, so they would have an opportunity to present their views. Chairman Elster Halle of the Board of Pardons and Paroles says he welcomes any investigation of

the system, and believes "co-operation of all branches of law enforcement is needed to strengthen the parole system."

He disagrees with the police association criticism that both paroles and convictions are increasing. He cites these figures: convictions dropped from 2,663 in 1940 to 1,611 in 1944; paroles dropped from 1,942 in 1940 to 1,680 last year, and both these factors served to lower the entire parole population. The rise in parole violations from six percent five years ago to 10 percent last year, he attributed to the unsettled condition brought on by the war.

Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, believes some of the trouble lies in the provision of law under which a prisoner comes up for parole automatically, with "good time" subtracted from the minimum end of his sentence.

"A 'wise convict' often plays good," said Garrison, "because he knows it will get him out of the pen in a hurry."

"Therefore, before a man can be safely recommended for parole, we need a thorough study of his past social history and present disposition to crime as analyzed by a trained psychiatrist."

Garrison also noted that "every law passed during the past few years has made it harder to convict a man, but easier to get him out of the pen."

It is becoming evident that the next legislature will face a strong demand for revision of the pardon and parole laws. Gov. Coke Stevenson says he has the situation under constant study, and may

WASHINGTON, — It has, now become fashionable in some quarters to get out the dead cats and sling them in the direction of the White House. Some of the ivory-tower columnists are limbering up their arms. Some of the newspapers, hitherto gentle, have taken off the gloves. In other words, the honeymoon is definitely over—and no one knows it better than Truman himself.

However, the Truman administration marriage has got to last three more years, and there is no use brandishing the rolling pin or waving the skillet unless it gets us somewhere. Instead let's take an unbiased look at the man who didn't want to be President—his mistakes, his qualities, his achievements.

In the first place, you can chalk up two definite accomplishments for Truman: (1) He has appointed a better cabinet than Roosevelt; and (2) He has carried on Roosevelt policies unflinchingly.

The latter, of course, will not be considered much of an achievement by Republicans or many Southern Democrats. However, Truman was elected on a Roosevelt ticket, pledged his word to continue the Roosevelt program and has lived up to his word.

Truman sticks chin out. In fact he has shown more courage than FDR in many things. For instance, the late President had been urged to recommend a broad national health program, but he always side-stepped. Truman has now sent a message to Congress urging what Roosevelt balked at doing. Again when it came to the FEPC, FDR ducked at too openly opposing Southern Congressmen and let others carry the ball. But Truman stuck his chin out by writing a letter to the Rules Committee urging immediate action. Roosevelt never wrote a letter to the Rules Committee during all his 12 long years in office.

Truman has been equally forthright in regard to full employment, anti-trust suits, and offending his own friends by tackling the question of submerged oil. Roosevelt, though officially committed to this program, sometimes ducked. Truman not only hasn't ducked, he has led with his chin. And whether you agree with him or not, you can't help admiring his courage.

Republicans who don't like the Truman-Roosevelt policies will agree that taken man for man, his cabinet far surpasses FDR's in ability, political acumen and general stature. Why then has he failed to get off the ground, while his predecessor, working with less able men and the same program, kept in the air?

Four Truman Troubles. The answer lies in four general reasons:

1. Roosevelt had the gift of going on the radio and swaying the public over the heads of Congress. Truman lacks the radio technique, the theatrics, the ability to make that appeal. He is just as sincere as Roosevelt — perhaps more so. He is desperately trying to do a good job. But he can't whip Congress into line by mobilizing public opinion. That was the most powerful weapon Roosevelt had.

2. Truman has been seriously wounded by the very group he has consistently sought to help—labor. Unauthorized strikes, such as the Washington, D. C., transit

strike and the nationwide vote walk-out of telephone workers confined many people that Truman-Roosevelt policies of aiding labor had gone too far. All the strikes have hurt Truman politically, but the wildest strikes especially have ruined Truman's hand when it comes to social legislation and is bound to have its effect on the next election.

Dewey Was Right. Truman has let himself be dominated by the military when it comes to conscription, the garbled discharge of veterans and the use of ships for bringing men home, politically he has played right into the hands of Governor Dewey who in the campaign of 1944 predicted this would happen.

Truman's whole experience as chairman of his investigating committee showed him how inefficient the Army and Navy could be when it came to shipping and manpower. Yet as President, he trusted the very same men whom he did not trust as Senator. As a result, thousands of soldiers and sailors, plus several million members of their families are bitter. And when any president loses a big block of political support, he undermines his own strength with Congress.

Truman Lacks "Brain Trust." Finally, Truman has not been able to gather round him sufficient men with governmental "know-how." Running a delicate governmental machine is one of the toughest jobs in the world. There aren't many who can do it. In addition to good cabinet members, it requires skilled assistants in the White House.

FDR had a weak cabinet, but he had around him in the White House a group of expert, energetic trouble-shooters who knew government inside and out and served as a flying football squad to go into this department or that on special jobs. What Truman needs today is a few Tommy Corcorans. Instead he has surrounded himself with a bunch of genial, well-meaning gentlemen, largely from Missouri or Mississippi, who know little about government and spend almost as much time swimming in the White House pool as they do grappling with the vital problems of post-war America.

This is the most obvious weak-spot for Truman to remedy. The others are not easy to repair. In fact the political reactions from the labor situation may be beyond repair.

These are some of the problems Truman faces, plus the general problem that after any war there is a depressing, disillusioning let-down. As qualifications for meeting these problems Truman has sincerity, honesty, energy, courage and a reasonable amount of intelligence. But he is seriously lacking in experience and government know-how. Let's hope he picks up more of the latter before the air becomes too full of dead cats. After all, for better or for worse, he's our president until January 1949 — and that's quite a long way off.

Tyler's Bulldogs buzz-bombed their way to a touchdown in the last two minutes of play to repulse the Lakeview (colored) Lions of Big Spring, 13-6, in a thrill-packed football game played before a large throng of spectators here Thursday night.

It was give-and-take for both sides all the way, and in the end the rock-ribbed defense of the East Texans told the difference between the two elevens.

The invaders' Cunningham put the game on ice when he split the Big Spring forward wall for a TD from the three-yard stripe. The clock was running out on the Bulldogs when they gained possession of the ball in their own territory in the last five minutes of play. Relentlessly, they began to move and nothing, not even the courageous defensive combine of Claude Tucker and Pete Jones, could stop them. Aided by penalties and a strong penchant to run to the weak side, they maneuvered 60 yards for the payoff.

Cunningham also tallied the Tyler team's initial six-pointer, going over on a line buck in the leadoff stanza.

The Lions rallied in the second canto to deadlock the score after the Bulldog forward had twice thrown back Big Spring offensives squarely on the goal line.

Edward J. Wright put the charges of Frank Miller back in the ball game shortly early in the second inning when he churned his way through the Tyler line from the six-yard stripe and went across standing up.

Wright's Junior Pollard and the big Tucker were perennial threats in the Lion secondary while Harry Dooley and Jones turned in magnificent shows up front. Dooley's wing could not be turned. Too, he used his sky hooks dextrously to gather in several weirdly-thrown passes, one time snagging an aerial while flat on his back.

Wright's hand-off to Tucker was perhaps the trickiest play employed by the Lions. Tucker would stall somewhere in the shadows long enough to let Pollard and Junior Crockett make passes at the swineskin, then cruise in for the oval and be off before the Tyler defenders would know what was up.

The Tyler clan rolled up 13 first downs as against five renewals for the homelings.

Landlord Wants You To Get Out? These Are Things You Must Know

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. (P)—So the landlord wants you to get out? If he says so, here's the best advice: Check immediately with the OPA rental director in your area.

There are general OPA rules on vacating, applying to the whole country. Since each OPA area has its own director and problems, the rules and time limit vary a bit from area to area.

In addition, there are local laws on evictions. They, too, vary. Some say a landlord can't evict within 30 days, some 60, some more.

In a certain case in a certain place, local law may say a landlord can evict in 30 days. But the OPA director may rule in that case—or that kind of case—that he can't evict for six months. His rule sticks.
