600 Wounded Men Drown In Marne River

PARIS, Oct. 9.—(By mail to New York.)—Six hundred wounded allied soldiers were drowned when a train traveling south toward this city, plunged through a weakened bridge over the Marne river, September 20th.

The facts of the terrible accident are withheld and the details of the wreck are missing and hard to secure. The French officials will not discuss the wreck in any phase.

Nothing more awful has happened during the war, it is stated here.

The train carried 760 wounded men, and out of this number only 160 were taken from the coaches alive. The train carried eighteen cars.

Many of the wounded were too weak to struggle for their lives and were drowned like rats in the trap-like compartments. The dead soldiers were buried on the banks of the Marne River.

BERLIN SAYS ANTWERP CANNOT HOLD OUT LONGER

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—The complete investment of Antwerp, forecasting the city's early fall and declaring that the Germans have overwhelmingly repulsed the French attacks on the German right wing in France, is the substance of the official bulleting issued this morning by the German war office.

It is declared that the junction of the Austrian and German armies at Ivangorod, endangers the Russian center. The Russians are expected to be driven back at this point.

The Russian offensive has been stopped, it is stated by the bulletin, by the combined Austro-German troops which are working together with remarkable success. Great losses have been inflicted upon the Russian line all along, particularly at the center.

Germans Decoyed

LONDON, Oct. 9.—News agency dispatches received here this afternoon say that a big force of Germans who attempted to pierce the allied lines south of Antwerp were decoyed into unfavorable positions and almost annihilated in fierce fighting which followed.

It is stated here today that the allies are slowly pushing forward. Fierce fighting is in progress around Lille.

REPORTED THAT PRZEMYSL FALLS

ROME, Oct. 9.—It is reported that Przemyśl has fallen before the Russians. The statement is unconfirmed and unofficial.

REPORTED RUSSIANS WITHIN 95 MILES OF POSEN CITY

PETROGRAD, Oct. 9.—The official statement issued this morning declared the Russians are within 95 miles of Posen. Fighting continues but the Russian advance is steady and overwhelming.

It is also stated that the Russian center has mobilized at Warsaw and will be started soon on the first lap of the march to Berlin.

They are now entering action within 35 miles from Thorn.

"ATTACKS OF THE NIGHT ARE WEAK"

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Reviewing the actual fighting of the troop of last week, the War Office said today that the German night attacks were generally half-hearted affairs, in which the soldiers had little interest, whether they succeeded in their efforts or not.

Occasionally the German trenches were found at night perfectly empty because of fear that their comrades at the rear would fire on them by mistake.

By fighting behind entrenchments, the Germans are endeavoring to gain ground by advancing at dusk or dawn and digging themselves in the hopes of eventually getting near enough the allied line to carry the allies' trenches in one grand rush.

GERMAN AVIATORS SOURCE OF FEAR TO ANTWERP CITY

GHENT, Oct. 9.—German aviators are constantly hovering over Antwerp, dropping bombs many of which are filled with petrol. Fires have been started in some places about the city. At certain points about Antwerp, fires are always burning because the fire department is exhausted.

BELIAN KING MAY BE NEAR HOLLAND

GHENT, Oct. 9.—Antwerp still withstands the assault of the Germans.

King Albert left Antwerp at the head of the Belgian field army, it is stated here.

It is reported unofficially that he has arrived at Zelzale, which is located near the Holland frontier.

According to messages which have been received here, the Germans are dropping bombs on the city of Antwerp proper, destroying many fine buildings.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.—Five young automobile bandits who held up five saloons here last night getting \$505 encountered a squad of detectives who were searching for them. In the battle which followed the meeting, one of the robbers was killed and a second wounded. The third surrendered along with the second, believing he was shot. Two others escaped. The police are searching for them today.

BOSTON WINS FIRST GAME WITH SCORE 7 TO 1

SHIBE PARK, Philadelphia, Oct. 9.—Boston outplayed, outbatted and outguessed Philadelphia by every turn of the first game of the world's series this afternoon. The final score was 7 to 1.

Boston garnered seven runs, eleven hits and two errors; Philadelphia, one run, five hits, no errors.

The official attendance at the first game was 20,562. The receipts were \$49,630. Out of this sum the players of the two clubs will receive \$26,805, 60 per cent which will go to Boston.

PARIS SAYS NO CHANGE

PARIS, Oct. 9.—No change in the general situation was the gist of the regular afternoon official communique. The disposition of the troops remain the same. The cavalry fighting continues on the allies' left wing.

The communique declared that the French are endeavoring to pierce the German line above camp Des Homains.

MORALE OF ANTWERP DEFENDERS IS GOOD

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The morale of the Antwerp defenders is reported to be excellent. All the men within the fortifications of the Belgian city are confident that they will be able to withstand the German siege indefinitely.

The allies have every inch of the territory within the sweep of the Belgian guns plotted and ranged accurately and mapped.

No sorties are being attempted by the Belgians and the Germans are apparently satisfied for the present. They seem to realize that to envelope the forts at this time would mean the facing of a hail of artillery shells of every description.

PRESIDENT MAY NOT APPROVE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—It is doubtful whether President Wilson will approve of the Henry Sheppard Compromise Bill, providing for the issuance of \$250,000,000 in currency for the Panama Canal bonds for the loaning of money on cotton, at four per cent.

The federal reserve board and Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo have practically approved the plan of the bankers of Saint Louis to pool \$150,000,000 to make cotton loans to farmers of the country on the strength of distressed cotton.

Baseball War Opens With Vim

packed into the Athletic stands within two days. Moving on to Boston for the third and fourth games, Monday and Tuesday, even greater throngs are expected for there's more room in Fenway Park.

The series starting today present a struggle between a seasoned, highly organized, hard hitting machine as opposed to a dashing new outfit, untried in such a conflict as they are entering today, but full of confidence. Staling's main reliance is in his pitchers and the dash and confidence of his men. The great strategist, Mack presents the same array which has turned back the Cubs and Giants in defeat. His batsmen, the terror of their league and the wreckers of all who have faced them in World's series, his infield the greatest in the world, a steady, but not sensational pitching staff—the mainstays of which accomplish as much with their brains as

with their arms—are his assets. Mack is sending his great machine after the world's title for the fifth time. Every man is a veteran of at least one struggle. In the line-up of the Braves there are but two men who have ever before smelled the smoke of the big battle. They are Johnny Evers, who aided the Cubs in their fights for the title, and Josh Devore, a former New York Giant.

Of the Athletic's veterans, Bender has been under fire in four of the big league combats; Plank, Collins, Baker, Strunk, Lapp and Barry have been through three Oidinger, Melnes, Thomas and Coombs have taken part in two series while Schang, Bush and Eddie Murphy received their baptism of fire a year ago.

Taking the lead on May 30, the Athletics had a little trouble in again winning the American League pennant this year. They were never headed after they assumed command and enter the series today with the same driving force and strategy which has kept them to the fore. On the other hand, the Braves have made the most sensational fight in the history of baseball. On July 6, the Braves were in last place. They won four straight games after that date and this started them on their dash which carried them to a tie with the Giants by August 24, and clinched the pennant by October 1. Between July 6, and August 24 they won 33 games, lost only eight and tied one. They continued their winning and did not lose a single series while meeting every club in the league. Rudolph, James and Tyler carried the Braves along with steady consistent pitching, holding the rival club batters at bay, while their team-mates hammered in enough runs to keep the Braves in the lead should the enemy threaten.

Upon these same pitchers Stallings will pin his faith for victory over the Mackmen. They face the greatest test of their careers in their efforts to spike the guns of the heavy artillery which has wrecked the offerings of such men as Matthewson, Macquard, Tesreau, Overall, Brown and all who have faced them.

Standing on the main point of the firing line for the Athletics is the veteran Bender, the stolid Indian who has weathered the storm of so many previous conflicts. With him stands Plank with his great pitching knowledge, while Bush, the hero of last year's series Shawkey and other younger men in the Athletics camp are primed and ready for the call that will certainly come to them for service. Behind the bat Mack has Schang, who jumped to the fore in the last series as one of the greatest catchers of the game. Stallings has every confidence in Gowdy, but lanky Hank is hardly the equal of Schang.

About the second base will be waged a battle of brains between two of the greatest strategists on the playing field. In Eddie Collins and Johnny Evers the game's greatest second basemen are represented. Collins and Jack Barry at short stop have long stood out as the greatest combination in either league about the keystone

of the infield. Evers has a little "Rabbit" Maranville working for him. Maranville is not as old in experience as either Barry or Collins, but for speed confidence and dash nothing is lacking. He works with Evers in perfect fashion.

The Braves have everything to gain and nothing to lose. To Stallings not even a pennant has fallen before. Winning is an old story to the Athletics and to Mack. Four pennants and four world's series championships have fallen to them. They have proven invincible. The question the Braves will attempt to answer is whether the marvelous machine has finally outlived its greatness, and whether the jinx which has struck so many other champions this year is to work the downfall of the Athletics.

The same rules prevailing in other series exist for the games this year. The players will receive 60 percent for the receipts for the first four games. This money will be divided 60 percent to the winner and 40 percent to the loser. Of these receipts the clubs will receive 30 percent and the National Commission 10 percent. The players do not share in the receipts after the first four games, this money being divided 90 percent to the clubs and 10 percent to the National Commission.

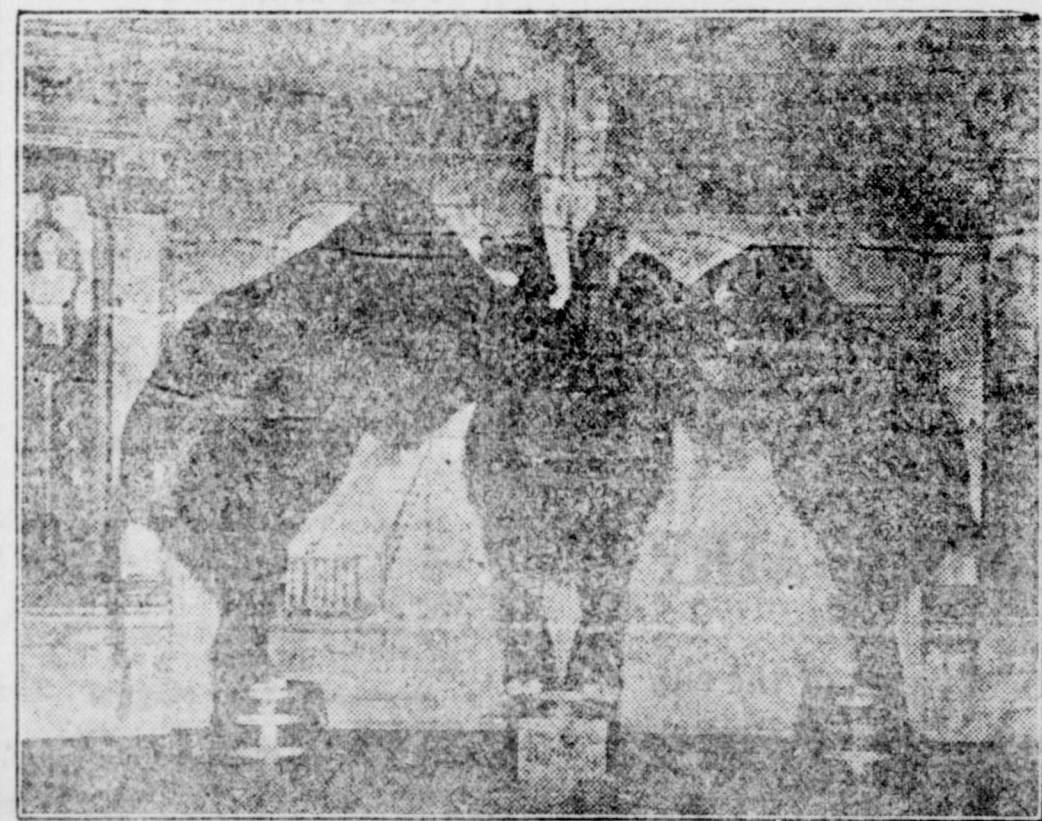
