Emphasis is placed on the nurse-patient relationship and the methods used in the care of the mentally ill patient; on community agencies established for the purpose of dealing with social problems arising out of mental illness; on the community health program directed toward the preservation of mental and research projects contributing toward a better understanding of mental illness.

Clear The Way For Reciprocation



News Note: Japanese operate
in U. S. under the same con-
ditions as American citizens
but red tape prevents U. S.
citizens setting up majority
owned subsidiaries in Japan.

Our treaty with Japan provides that Americans doing
business in Japan will be granted the same rights
which are enjoyed by Japanese citizens. In return, we
accord Japanese nationals the right to operate in The
United States under the same conditions as American citi-
zens.

However, Americans report that a Japanese govern-
ment policy of bogging their business activities down with
red tape and delay has been successful in preventing most
companies from setting up majority-owned subsidiaries
and expanding their operations as they do in other
developed countries of the world, and as Japanese business-
men do in the United States.

The recently signed Interest Equalization Extension
bill makes it possible for us to consider "whether the for-
eign country is according privileges to U. S. and such
foreign country, including privileges relating to invest-
ments in such country" and to cancel the exemptions in
offending nations.

The federal government should consider canceling
the exemptions in the case of Japan, if two-way coopera-
tion proves to be impossible.

THE LCL PROBLEM

LCS is the commonly used abbreviation for small ship-
ments of goods. It means Less-Than-Carload quantities.
And it poses a special and often vexing problem to many
enterprises.

How can these shipments be handled? A company,
of course, could buy and operate its own truck fleet.
That would be a costly operation, beset by all manners
of problems, and totally impractical in the vast major-
ity of cases. Then generally followed alternatives is to
send the small shipments by the common carrier trucking
companies.

But this, in the view of more and more LCL ship-
pers, is not a satisfactory solution. Some time ago, a
trade magazine polled traffic managers on the subject.
It found a general dissatisfaction with the rates. On Ohio
shipper expressed what appears to be a typical view when
he said that "The general approach of the trucking in-
dustry seems to be that small shipments traffic is fair
game for recovering the lion's share of increased revenue
needs brought about by increased labor costs. They use
this approach rather than develop more efficient and
labor-saving methods so small shipments could be profit-
ably handled at fair rates."

One major transporter of small shipments — REA
Express — has taken just the opposite position. Tech-
nological advances, coupled with an imaginative and ag-
gressive administrative attitude, have made it possible
for this organization, whose roots go far back into our
history, to offer, in instance after instance, better stand-
ards of service and lower rates. The shippers who know
this and take advantage of it benefit significantly, and
so do their customers.

SHOULD THE SENATE
HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE?

The Senate of the United States has been called the world's
greatest deliberative body. Purpose of all the deliberation, speeches
and debate is to polarize the positions of the 100 senators so that
the body may vote on an issue.

At the other wing of the Capitol, each member of the House can
have his say on a question and then a vote is taken. That's the
way — set by the Constitution — that we get the laws under
which we live.

Essentially, it's an orderly
process, as good or better than
any nation has achieved. Re-
cently, however, there has been
a disquieting development that
could disrupt this orderly march
of legislation from proposition
to law.

The minority leader of the Sen-
ate, Everett McKinley Dirksen
of Illinois, took the position in
the closing hours of the last
session of Congress that a measure
reported by an appropriate
committee of the Senate should
not be allowed to come to a vote.
It was the first time a leader of
either party had ever led a filibuster.
Because of the anxiety of
Congress for a quick adjournment
after a long and fruitful
session, Senator Dirksen's filibuster
prevailed.

The Illinois Republican has
promised a renewal of his filibuster
when Congress returns. He
has already announced that
he intends to deprive the Senate
of its essential right and duty
— to vote on an issue one way
or another.

Senator Dirksen made his
stand on the issue of repeal of
Section 14(b) of the Taft-
Hartley Act which permits states
to enact right-to-work laws
which hamper labor union organ-
ization and effectiveness. Nine-
teen states, most of them in the
agricultural South and South-
west, have such laws.

Before Senator Dirksen
started his filibuster, it seemed
that the Senate was ready to
look at the issue and vote.
Whether it might have followed

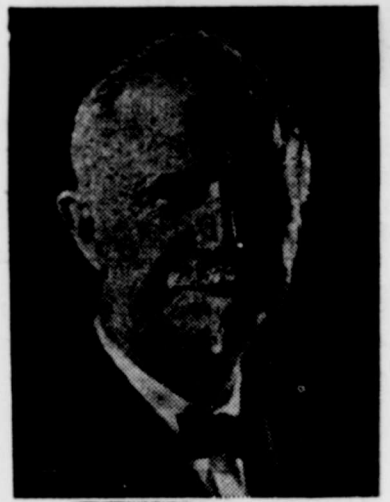


the example of the House and
voted for repeal of 14(b) is of
no matter here. The important
issue is that Mr. Dirksen's filibuster
tactic blocked any expres-
sion of opinion through a vote.

The issue is certain to come
before the Senate early in Janu-
ary. What remains to be seen is
whether the minority leader can
effectively thwart a vote — the
keystone of representative
democracy.

It may be unfortunate that
repeal of 14(b), an issue on
which opinions tend to be fixed,
is the matter on which Senator
Dirksen has taken his stand
against continuation of the or-
derly process of law-making. It
could as well have been some
less complex question.

The big problem, which only
the Senate itself can resolve, is
whether in this instance or at
any time in the future one man
should be permitted to deprive
an entire body of its right to do
the job for which it was elected.

Weekly ReportYOUNG BLOOD PROMISING
NEW UNION POWER

Babson Park, Mass., January
20 — For at least a decade the
labor movement has been almost
static. Organizing drives have
been half-hearted, and their re-
sults have been slight. Scandals
of various sorts within some of
the biggest unions have been
widely aired. There has been an
underlying incompatability be-
tween the conservative craft-
union men of the AFL-CIO and
the more ambitious "vertical"
unionists that re-entered the
Federation after years of sepa-
ration.

New Vitality Slowly Emerging

Over the past year or so, how-
ever, there have been changes
brewing beneath the surface.
Younger men have been moving
ahead in the hierarchy of labor
leaders, and they have begun to
displace some of the old-timers.
In brief, there is a new pulse
beating within the body of or-
ganized labor. Walter Reuther,
who has been holding together
his 6,000,000 members of the
AFL-CIO for the past ten
years, is getting restless within
the confines of the basically un-
venturesome Federation.

Reuther is beginning to speak
once more with a loud voice. He
is pointing out that there are
still some 15,000,000 unorgani-
zed workers who could readily
be brought within union bounds.
His declared objective is to
bring in what he calls the
"working poor", even if they
have to be given membership
without contributing any dues
payments. What this would
amount to would be adapting
the Great Society concept to the
unions — bringing up sub-
standard wages and gaining
fringe benefits — such as health
and death insurance, pensions,
unemployment and severance
pay, etc. — for those not now
covered.

Old Scheme Being Bridged
The sort of vibrancy that

Reuther and some of his young-
er followers create can be very
catching. Even many of those
unionists who have felt that la-
bor's days of growth were large-
ly over are being stirred anew.
The stand-off between AFL-CIO
President George Meany and the
far more revolutionary Walter
Reuther seems to be closing.
Union members have long re-
cognized that Reuther has his
eye on the presidency of the
Federation, when the day comes
that Meany must step down
from his top office.

Some 1,500,000 teamsters, who
have been going their separate
way under the direction of con-
troversial James Hoffa, may be
back within the Federation fold
before too long. Mr. Hoffa ap-
pears to be heading for jail,
indicted on some of the numer-
ous charges that have been
brought against him. His suc-
cessors are more than likely to ac-
cept an invitation to remerge
with the AFL-CIO once the
Teamsters Union is rid of the
forces that originally caused it
to be cast out of the Federation.
Readers may expect Reuther
and his cohorts to take every
possible step to cement all of
the major union units together.
Jurisdictions will be clarified,
and jurisdictional strife will
gradually become old-hat.

What This Means To
Management

Employers in most areas and
practically all industries will
feel the impact of this emerging
rebirth of union determination
and vigor. Organizing drives will
be hot and heavy, no longer
half-hearted. Young blood will
be encouraged for leadership at
all levels, with particular con-
centration on men (and women)
of outstanding intelligence and
resourcefulness. Leaders, and
candidates for union positions,
will be trained and educated in
bargaining tactics, statistical
analyses, oratory and debate,
and human psychology.

There will be drives for wages
and fringe concessions along a
steadily broadening front. Em-
ployers in relatively low-wage

localities must look for organiz-
ing drives even in smaller com-
panies. Concerns already union-
ized will be confronted with new
demands in terms of pay, hours,
health and death benefits, vaca-
tions, working conditions, and a
roster of other items. This does
not mean that management need
be hit today, or even tomorrow.
But it does mean that the trend
toward tougher bargaining (look
at the New York transit strike),
new demands, and more forceful
organizing campaigns is already
developing.

Control your temper. The life you save may be your own. You've heard of, perhaps even know, the woman who early in life decides "nobody's going to push me around." She then embarks on a lifelong battle to defend her "rights," real or imaginary. The ability to cope with stress eludes her. She stamps, slaps, screams and throws her way through life convinced she is building "respect" in those who handle her with kid gloves. Actually, she may well be building the weapons of her own destruction.

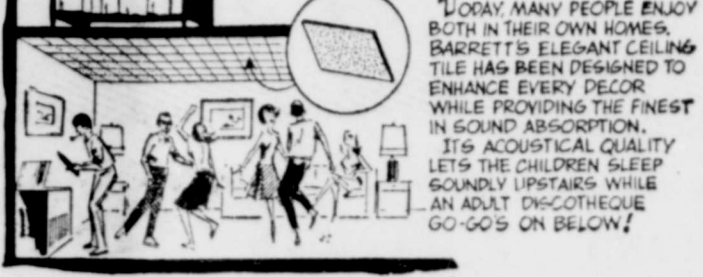

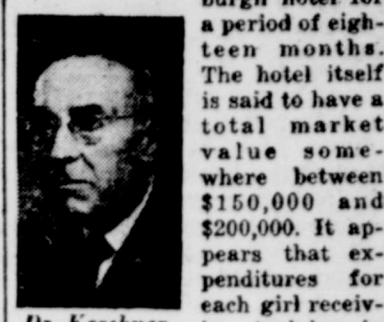

IT'S UP TO YOU

Job Corps Extravagance

IT is not generally known that Sargent Shriver's Women's Job Corps paid \$225,000 for the use of a St. Petersburg hotel for a period of eighteen months.



The hotel itself is said to have a total market value somewhere between \$150,000 and \$200,000. It appears that expenditures for each girl receiving training in this hotel are running at the rate of \$7,000 per year, about twice what it would cost to keep a girl in one of the better colleges.

Maids make the beds and keep the rooms for the girls and they are served by waitresses. They have been told to put in their time playing handball and other games to disguise the fact that there appears to be little to do. Drunkenness, dating, and noisy behavior are problems in the community. Eight girls have been expelled for drinking. The City Council of St. Petersburg has invited the government to take this project out of town. And this is the project on which the taxpayers are asked to spend \$290 million next year.

During the past three years the supply of money in our country has increased from \$145 billion to \$162.6 billion. That is at the rate of about 4% a year and it measures the amount of inflation that is taking place. The proper definition of inflation is an increase in the quantity of money and credit. This may or may not be reflected immediately in a comparable rise in prices, but over the long term prices tend to follow the supply of money. We are, therefore, proceeding with a rate of inflation which is destroying the dollar at the rate of about 4% per year. This will doubtless vary as time goes on, but it is an ominous warning.

LUNKER SEASON

If you've been yearning for a trophy bass to mount on your den or office wall, now's the time to start planning a fishing trip that has a reasonable chance of paying off.

The winter months present an interesting situation. This is a period for the big fish, notably "ol' bucketmouth," to be predominant in the day's catch.

Cold weather that generally causes fishing passions to ebb similarly affects aquatic dwellers, state the fishing folks at Mercury outboards. But for some unknown reason, they add, lunkers delay going dormant as long as waters remain open.

Meanwhile, their smaller and younger cousins have lapped into a winter coma and are no longer around to interfere with the offerings of the serious angler.

For winter fishing the assistance of a guide is almost a necessity. Fish congregate in fairly small areas that are difficult to locate, so that an intimate knowledge of local waters is mandatory.

In the best lakes, usually the big man-made impoundments, you'll have to fish at extreme depths. Often the upper levels are around 30 feet, but may vary down to 60 and below.

The action is decidedly slow. Usually a lead-head jig with either pork rind or plastic worm is recommended. This combo is inched along the bottom at a barely perceptible crawl. Snagged lures and strikes are often difficult to distinguish, and the loss of tackle is unavoidable.

When you do raise a fish, you can be certain there are more in that same spot, state the Mercury guys, so stick around for awhile.

If winter fishing sounds like a lot of hard, cold work, it is. But the resulting trophy mounted over the fireplace can be worth the effort.

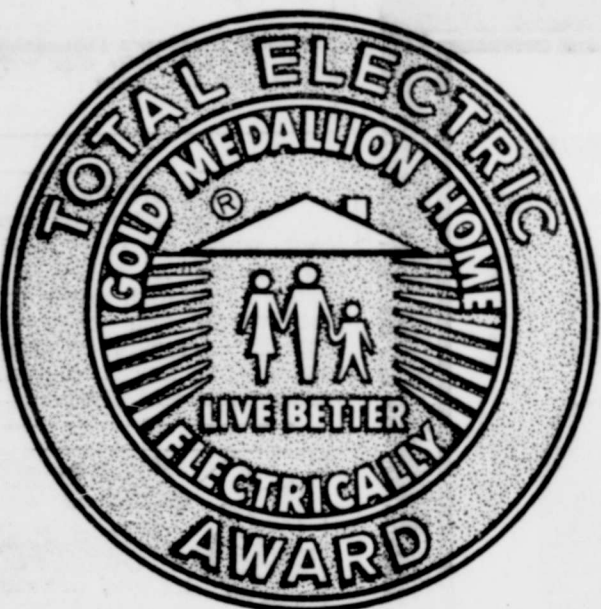

IT'S UP TO YOU

Extravagance Par Excellence

IN a recent issue of the *Sunday Times*, published in Lagos, Nigeria, there appeared an article written in Accra, capital of Ghana, which should prove of interest to every American taxpayer. It tells of the enormous extravagant building erected by Dictator Nkrumah to house the forthcoming meeting of the heads of the African states who recently held a conference in this new building. The building is described as "outstanding, astonishing, astounding, incredible, fantastic and magnificent." It is said to be typical of the way Nkrumah exploits his own people and begs all he can from abroad. Our own country has contributed \$30 million to Ghana during the past seven years.

The dispatch said "no building, no palace in Africa surpasses this awesome monument." The building is in three main parts. The residential part is twelve stories high and contains sixty fully equipped suites of exquisite taste and luxurious decor. It has every luxury and convenience and all this in the midst of a poverty-stricken country of primitive people.

In front of this residential building is a banquet hall reminiscent of the temples of ancient Rome, which will seat two-thousand guests and a conference hall which will hold one thousand conferees. All of these buildings are linked by a series of covered ways and basement tunnels. There are garages for forty heads of State and a parking area for over 750 cars.

The section in the conference hall devoted to each State is identified by its illuminated miniature coat of arms and its name written in pale-yellow letters, also illuminated. Each head of State will sit with four advisors in a straight line behind him. Around the conference chamber there are glass-paned cubicles for simultaneous translation, tape-recording, and the various paraphernalia that accompany these conferences.

The shoes of the conferees sink into rugs with long heavy pile and voices are mellowed by what is said to be the marvelous acoustics of this chamber. It is said that "Ghana has spared no expense." When one thinks of the misery of the people in that country, such luxury seems altogether inappropriate. And when one further recalls that our taxpayers are footing the bill in whole or in part, such useless expenditure is thoroughly disgusting as is so much of our foreign aid program.

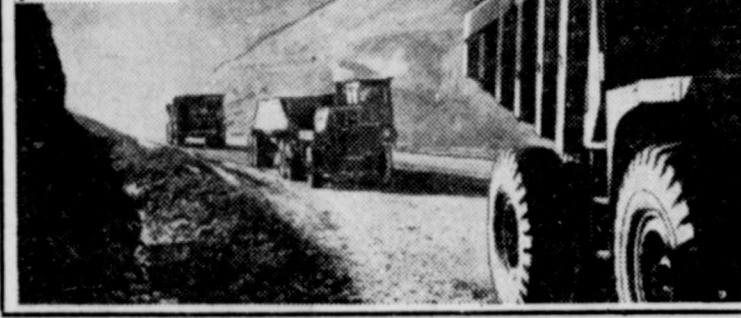

TATTLETALE FOOTPRINT

Police, investigating a murder, found the bloody print of a bare foot on the victim's bathroom floor. The print eventually played a vital role in convicting the killer, by placing him—unmistakably—at the scene of the crime.

Similar use has been made, more often, of palm prints. And most often, of course, of fingerprints. What all three have in common is a highly individual set of markings, made by the pressure ridges that corrugate the skin.

There is nothing new, at least with regard to fingerprints, in the realization that the markings are distinctive. Various peoples of the world probably knew this even before the time of Christ.

What is new is the development of classification systems that make fingerprints easy to compare. This development, along with improved techniques for obtaining prints, has made fingerprinting a preferred method of identification all over the world.

Is there any chance that two people will have the same fingerprint pattern. One scholar calculated that duplication would occur once in 64 billion prints.

But later studies call that far too cautious. Recently a fingerprint expert estimated that duplication is not likely to occur in 10,000 years. Up to now, of course, not a single duplication has ever been found.

Besides the virtue of individuality, prints also have the virtue of permanence. A person's print pattern is fully formed three months before his birth. Mark Twain called it a "natal autograph", and remains unchanged until after his death. Although the print may vary in size, just as the person does, the pattern itself stays the same always.

So sophisticated is fingerprinting today that even a part of a print may be enough to establish an identification. As a rule, experts figure it is sufficient if the suspect's prints and the incriminating prints are alike a 12 points of the pattern.

But if they should differ at even a single point, then the message is equally clear: This is positively not the right man.

SCIENCE briefs

Dowsing

Water shortages have created new interest in the nation's 25,000 dowsers—men who claim to find wells by using a divining rod. Recent tests, however, indicate that dowsers find water less than half as often as they would by chance alone.

Injury — Clue to Cancer?

A Chicago surgeon has uncovered evidence that lung cancer may be preceded by a serious injury or accident. He is asking other physicians to co-operate in a larger study of the hypothesis.

Beyond Pluto

The theory that there may be a tenth planet, beyond the orbit of Pluto, has been revived is there, other astronomers note, by Russian astronomers. If it it will be the coldest place in the solar system.

Diet and Heart Attacks

A low-fat diet failed to prevent heart attacks in a recent British study of 264 patients. The findings also suggest that a high intake of sweets may be more significant than a normal amount of fats in the diet.

Artificial Life

A living virus has been synthesized from non-living materials by a University of Illinois scientific team. The experiment is believed to open a new road to understanding heredity.

The Russians Had A Way With Redwood



That rustic chapel in the upper left hand corner is a real old-timer. Built by the Russians in 1812 as part of the Fort Ross complex in Northern California, it was one of the first redwood structures in the area, constructed of split boards from the trees that form its setting. Although damaged slightly by the earthquake of 1906, the chapel was restored — using the original redwood boards — in 1928, and is a feature of the State Historical Park today.

The Muscovites were among the first white settlers to use redwood in their building, but, obviously, a material that can withstand the rugged coastal climate with its damp, fog-drenched days for more than 150 years is a material to consider for a modern-day home in the same area. For that matter, in any part of the country where extremes of weather or decay-producing elements must be considered in addition to aesthetic qualities, redwood is ideal.

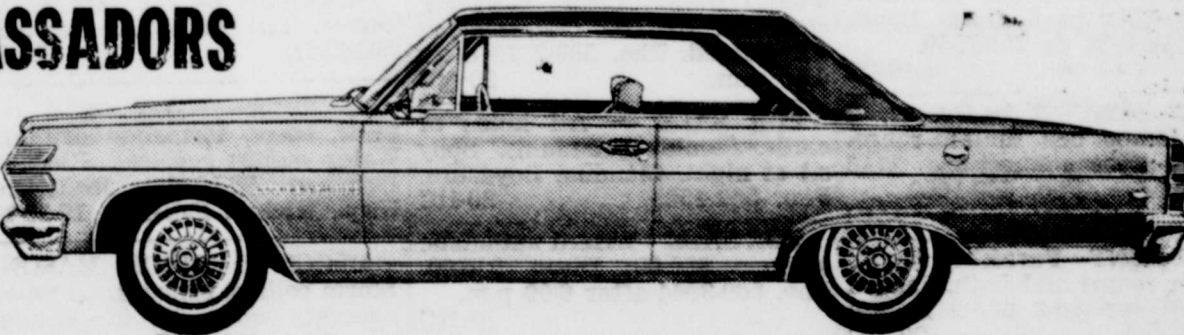
