Payments Of Poll Taxes In County Slow

Southland Greyhound Lines Prepares For Greater Traffic During New Year

Maintaining practically the same amount of passenger traffic during 1931 as in the prior year, the Southland Greyhound Lines, spanning Texas with a network of 1,870 miles, optimistically lays plans for an increase in traffic during the coming year, according to Paul W. Tibbets, president and general manager. In the past year Southland hauled more than 850,000 passengers.

During 1931, Mr. Tibbets reports that Southland is improving its service throughout Texas, spending approximately \$100,000 on the purchase of new buses. In addition, a payroll of approximately \$50,000 a month and taxes to the amount of \$34,000, or about \$1,000 per bus, were paid during the year.

The company today is operating 85 buses over 1,870 miles of lines and pays the state approximately \$45 per mile per year. As it costs \$415 per mile for the regular maintenance of highways, according to latest figures released by the State Highway Department, it is declared by Mr. Tibbets that Southland Greyhound Lines is paying enough taxes to provide for a little more than one-tenth of the cost of maintaining the public highways over which it operates.
