

Rebounding Proves Difference in Game Lady Coyotes Put Bulldogs in the Pound; Lead District Race

Any coach will tell you—winning the battle of the boards is crucial to a game's outcome.

Borden High School's Lady Coyotes not only won that battle with a total of 39 rebounds, but took the scoreboard, too, as they beat Ira, 44-42, in a closely-contested district game.

The girls scored the first six points of the game thanks to the press. Junior Rika Copeland started off the scoring with a turnaround jumper at the 7:43 mark to give BHS the initial lead.

The Lady Coyotes led 6-2 for almost four minutes as both teams traded missed buckets and had turnovers.

Scoring remained tight as BHS held a 10-8 margin after one period.

Ira then went on a run, taking the lead at the 6:25 mark of the second quarter. They would hold this lead until nearly the end of the third quarter.

Ira's Morgan Clements hit for 10 points in the second quarter, and the two teams went into half-time tied at 19.

Sophomores Micah Hensley and Bobbie Kempf

continued to make a difference on the boards in the third quarter.

Six of the Lady Coyotes' seven points in the third quarter were from Micah, and Bobbie grabbed five rebounds in this period.

Once again, things were knotted up as BHS and Ira headed into the fourth quarter, 26-26.

Ira took the lead for a short time thanks to Clements jumpers. However, a big bucket by Micah at the 6:16 mark gave BHS a 30-29 lead, which they would keep.

One of the turning points in the game came at the 5:05 mark when Bobbie took a pass from Pati Rodriguez, made the lay-up, and got fouled.

Her free throw made it a 35-29 cushion and gave BHS the momentum it needed to overcome the foul trouble it was in.

Senior Bekah Hensley, Rika, Dalene Kempf, and Micah all played with four fouls in this final period. During this time, Carolina Arellanos and Pati Rodriguez stepped it up with Carolina grabbing four key rebounds and Pati stealing the ball three

times. Before fouling out, Micah contributed one more basket with 2:45 in the game to give the girls a 39-34 lead.

Ira stayed close with free throw shooting in the last two minutes. Clements made eight of those free throws and tied up the game again with only 20 seconds to play.

The Lady Coyotes tried to use the clock and take the last shot. Bekah drove the lane and scored with five seconds remaining to make it a 44-42 game.

Time remained, but Ira missed a chance to tie the game with one second remaining when a put-back just missed going in.

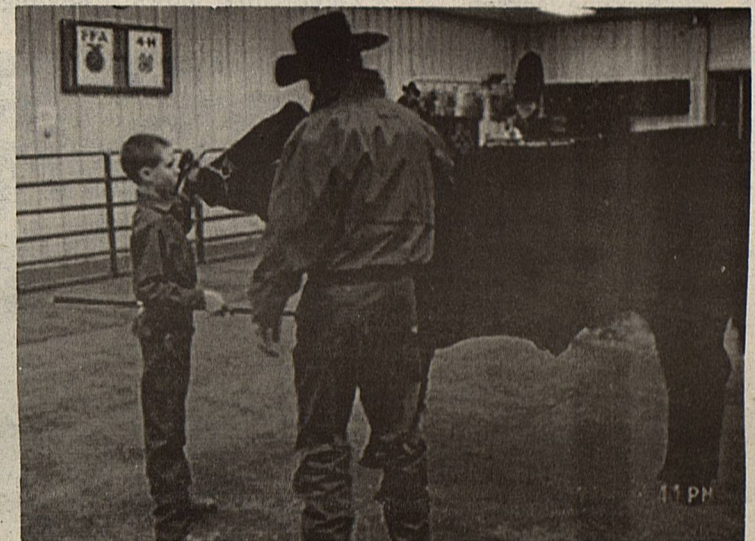

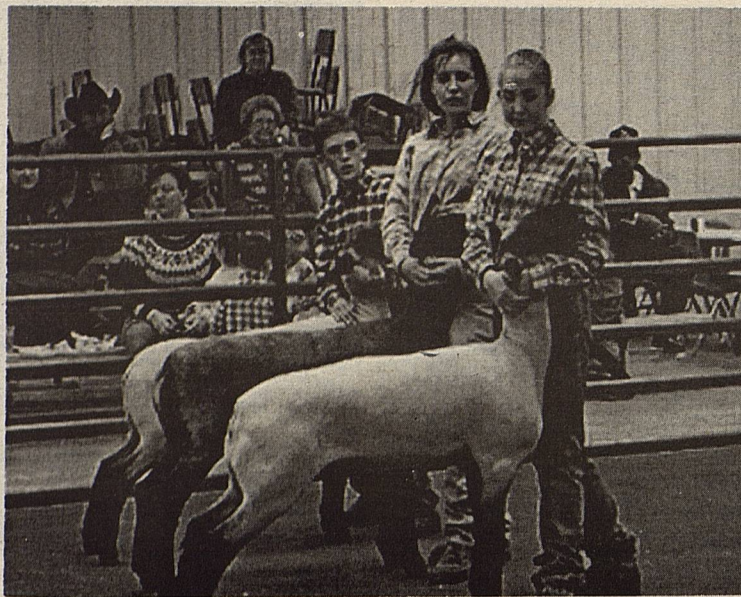

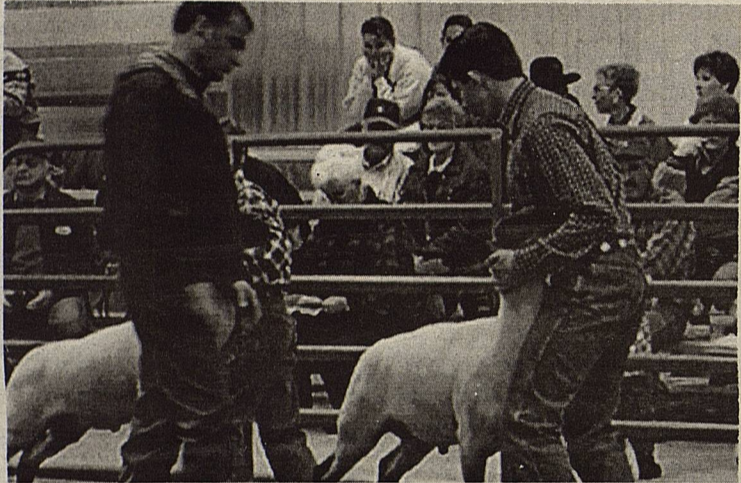

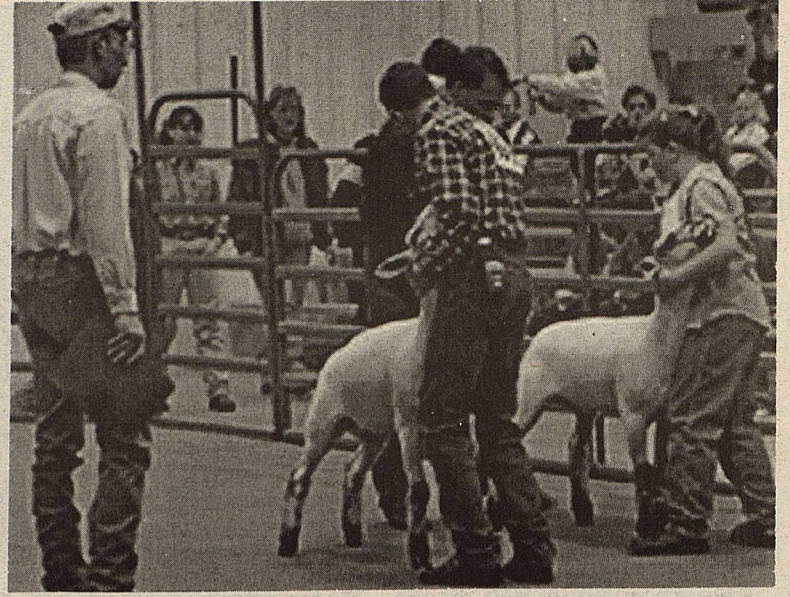
