GOV'T. TO PROBE INSULL FINANCING Anti-Ferguson Democrats for Sterling or Bullington

ARMSTRONG GROUP QUILTS CONVENTION

DALLAS, Sept. 24.—Indorsement of Gov. Ross Sterling, if his nomination for governor is declared before October 8 and if not named the nominee, of Orville Bullington, of Wichita Falls, republican nominee for governor, was voted here today at a democratic rally called to oppose the candidacy of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson.

ARMSTRONG FORCES SECEDE

DALLAS, Sept. 24.—The rally of democrats for the purpose of opposing the candidacy of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, nominee for governor, was thrown into an uproar here this afternoon when it was charged leaders sought the endorsement of Orville Bullington, Wichita Falls, republican nominee. The attack was launched by George W. Armstrong, Fort Worth, independent candidate for governor and spokesman for about 150 delegates.

Armstrong's fight for recognition was defeated by a vote of 209 to 167. The Armstrong forces retired from the meeting and held a separate convention in another hall.

Carr P. Oclins, chairman, declared in an opening statement that the meeting was assembled for the purpose of "forever eliminating Fergusonism from Texas." He warned delegates that no mention of state or national campaign issues would be permitted.

"This meeting," the chairman said, "is the declaration of independence for people not interested in obtaining corrupt road contracts, pardons for criminals or political office."

"EVER-PRESENT CHRIST" THEME OF EVANGELIST

Sunday services at the First Christian church will be conducted by Dr. C. C. Schurman in the absence of the pastor who is expected to preach at Brownwood in the evangelist's pulpit.

The Bible school will be conducted as usual with Dr. Schurman teaching the Men's Bible class. Morning worship at 10:45. The subject of the discourse will be, "The Ever Present Christ." This promises to be one of the best sermons of the series and a large attendance is expected.

The evening worship will begin at 7:30 with a song service led by the pastor of the church. A large choir has been present each evening and adding much to the meeting. The evening sermon announced by the evangelist will be "The Plan, Plea and Purpose of the New Testament Church." Dr. Schurman urges all young men and women of the congregation as well as others interested in the present. "Dr. Schurman is clear, forceful, kind and considerate in every discourse and has but one desire, and that is to magnify the Lord and give His teaching regarding His church and program for our lives," said Rev. Riley.

Rev. Riley announces that the meeting will continue another week.

ENDEAVORERS WILL RALLY AT BRECKENRIDGE

Christian Endeavorers of 23 mid-west Texas counties will be guests of the Breckenridge societies on Sunday, September 25 for the first of a series of four mid-west district C. E. rallies. The district includes Taylor, Shackelford, Jones, Runnels, Brown, Irion, Stephens, Eastland, Tom Green, San Saba, Callahan, Coleman, Mitchell, McCulloch, Scurry, Schleicher, Haskell, Fisher, Concho, Menard, Coke, and Sterling counties.

A council meeting, addresses, music, reports, a fellowship dinner, a sharp shooting contest and a concert hour will be among the features offered to instruct and entertain the visitors.

Weldon Fry will give the welcome address at the opening session and Rev. F. M. Warren of Abilene will respond. The program will be centered around 3 addresses "On Your Mark," by Rev. Ben Parker of Breckenridge; "Get Set," by Rev. H. G. Markley of Breckenridge, and "Go" by Harold Lovitt, of Dallas, general secretary of the Texas Christian Endeavor union. Reports will be in charge of C. I. Reid, Sweetwater, junior Supt.; Lenora Cook, Colorado, intermediate Supt.; Mrs. G. C. Skinner, Brownwood, alumni Supt.; Juanita Durham, Albany, C. E. CHARGES FILED IN FATAL FT. WORTH DUEL

FORT WORTH, Sept. 24.—Alvin A. Hefflin, 40 years old, was charged with murder today in connection with the slaying of Floyd L. Kelly last night in the lobby of a theater here.

Kelly, accompanied by Hefflin's former wife and another woman, according to police, was entering the theater foyer as Hefflin came out. Both men wheeled, drew guns. Two shots were fired as Kelly ran behind the ticket booth, Hefflin following.

A negro porter, Hardy Fuller, was wounded in the cross fire. The victim fell before the ticket window after asking the cashier to call an ambulance. Blood spouted from bullet holes in his chest. He died at a hospital, five wounds in his body.

Kelly was one of 26 persons recently indicted here after federal prohibition agents tapped telephone wires in an investigation of liquor activities. Hefflin told the district attorney's office he had aided drug agents and that Kelly had threatened his life.

DOVES PLENTIFUL

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 24.—Guy Amsler, Secretary of the State Fish and Game Commission, reports that doves are plentiful in Arkansas—"more numerous, perhaps, than at any time in 15 years." The season closes Dec. 15. The bag limit is 18 a day.

New "Circuit Rider" Era Inaugurated By Methodists for Rural Church Problem

FORT WORTH, Sept. 25.—No longer will the modern circuit rider clatter up to the church door in his "flivver," preach a "fire and brimstone" sermon, then rattle away again to the next meeting house.

Rural churches, many abandoned, some neglected, presented a problem the Central Texas conference of the Methodist Episcopal church has set about to solve.

"Stop by the kitchen and shell peas, help the farmer milk his cows, and walk beside him in the field as he gathers his cotton," Bishop Sam R. Hay admonished 100 rural pastors in conference here.

"And when Sunday comes, the farmer will be at church to hear you," he added.

MAN HELD IN SHOOTING OF STEP-FATHER

AUSTIN, Sept. 24.—William Priest was held here today pending charges after making a statement to county officers in the fatal shooting of his step-father Jasper M. Mills, 50.

Priest said his step-father had been "mean" to his 12-year-old sister, and that he had come to take her to a married sister's home in Sweetwater. The father would not agree, he said, nor would he agree to go to Briggs where the family, in need of money, could obtain work as cotton pickers.

The step-son said he went to a nearby store yesterday and borrowed a pistol. His step-father met him at the gate of the house armed with a rifle. He shot Mills, he said, when Mills tried to turn the gun on him. Priest said he shot five times, one bullet striking Mills in the heart.

Mrs. Mills, mother of Priest, said Priest and Mills had quarreled previously and that the step-father had threatened to kill her son.

Houston Company In Receivership

HOUSTON, Sept. 24.—The Houston Gas and Fuel company went into the hands of a receiver today following the filing of a suit to foreclose a \$6,000,000 mortgage against the company. R. B. Greager, Brownsville, republican national committeeman for Texas, was named receiver.

Fear Radio of Plane Failed

DUTCH HARBOR, Alaska, Sept. 24.—Belief that a radio transmitter out of the Junkers monoplane, seeking to fly from Japan to California, might have failed was expressed here today when radio stations and ships along the route failed to contact the goodwill plane.

knowledge on poultry, livestock and dirt farming supplied by Texas A. & M. college in addition to their bibles—prepared to aid the farmer in his problems, spiritual or physical.

SNAP OF GUN SCARES TRIO FROM STATION

Because the shell had been removed from a shotgun as a matter of safety the night before three nameless burglars were saved a terrible fright if not a more serious consequence when early Saturday morning they attempted to rob the I. D. Smith service station and grocery store at 21st street and D avenue.

The gun which Lloyd Smith, 19, pointed through the window merely snapped. But it was warning enough and the three fled from the place without an instant's hesitation.

The station had been victimized by robbers only a about a month before. Smith and his younger brother since that time had been dividing up a watch, sleeping in the store. Shortly after 2 o'clock Saturday morning a small car containing three men entered the driveway. One of the trio reclined on the running board, peering through the door crack. Another sat at the wheel of the machine with the motor running. A third dismounted, took a lever and broke the lock on a pump. It was empty. He broke the lock on another pump.

At that moment the gun snapped. Lloyd Smith had heard the trio and had crept to the barred front window with the gun. He pointed it through the bars and pulled the trigger. The sound of the hammer falling on the empty chamber sent the burglars leaping into the car as the machine tore from the driveway. Young Smith said it was too dark to distinguish any of their features.

Shearer will call a meeting of all pastors and workers of the district at the local church. They will bring lunch to be served at the church. N. Johnson, will use as his subject "Sonship."

At that meeting Dr. Frank P. Culver, a former presiding elder of the Cisco district, will be the principal speaker.

Shearer to Act

Dr. Shearer was named acting presiding elder in the stead of Dr. Cullum H. Booth, seriously ill at the home of a brother in Dallas. Bishop Sam Hay and his cabinet made the appointment last Tuesday at a meeting in Dallas when it was made known the condition of Dr. Booth prohibited his continuing his duties. Dr. Booth returned from California only a few days ago after undergoing treatment there. He will rest at the home of his brother until conference.

While he looks after the duties which Dr. Booth's condition forced him to surrender, Dr. Shearer will continue as pastor of the First Methodist church at Eastland, his pulpits there being filled in his absence by pastors whose churches he visits.

At the Dallas meeting Bishop Hay appointed Rev. C. C. Hinson, of Forest Hill church, Fort Worth, to assume the DeLeon pastorate made vacant by the recent death in Denver, Colorado, of the Rev. S. J. Rucker.

Committee Appears in Dilemma Over Appeal of Cisco Football Decision

There were no further announced developments Saturday in the status of the Cisco football case in which Judge Geo. L. Davenport, of the 91st district court, Eastland, has ruled that the Cisco high school Lobos be restored to the interscholastic league for the season of 1932.

Whether or not the district and state committees will appeal the district judge's decision was uncertain on the face of such reports as transpired from a meeting of Roy B. Henderson, state league secretary, and members of the district committee at Eastland Thursday afternoon.

In that meeting Henderson is reported to have hinted broadly at the possible dropping of football from league-sponsored high school activities in the event the judge's decision is sustained.

Want Ruling, But—?

Members of the district committee were reported to have expressed themselves as eager for an appellate court ruling on the case but no action was taken to authorize an appeal. The question of who pays seems to be a disturbing factor in the committee's cogitations on its future action. In the event an appeal is taken the committee, if the Lobos are restrained from taking part in football during the appeal period, must post a supersedeas bond of proportions to be fixed by the judge. The state of the league's finances is not such as to provide the wherewithal for such a bond and it is probable that no friend of the league cares to risk having to reimburse the Lobo treasury for lost gate receipts should the appellate court sustain the decision of the lower court.

Virtual Nullification.

In the event the appeal is made without supersedeas bond the Lobos must be treated as participating members of the league during the appeal period. No doubt that is

about as unsavory a prospect as the supersedeas bond is a healthy obstacle, for an appeal will require two or three months normally, and by that time the Lobos will have played the season out and will have received all the benefits of the season. An adverse decision in the final court would then be only a tactical victory for the committee.

It begins to look more and more that the league committees have gotten themselves in a real mess. In effect an appeal without supersedeas bond will nullify the motive of the league in suspending Cisco even if the higher courts were to sustain the league's position in the final analysis. That is what appears to have created Mr. Henderson's disgust and to have inspired the statement that the league may drop football if the lower court is sustained.

In view of it, it may be regarded as unlikely that the league will appeal the case without supersedeas bond. And on the other side of the problem is the fact that to appeal with a supersedeas bond requires the presence of financial responsibility in large quantities to take care of Cisco gate losses should the lower court be finally sustained.

That appears to be the dilemma in which the district and state committees are placed.

Flag-Pole Sitter Plans Daring Stunt

DALLAS, Sept. 24.—Shipwreck Kelly who has done flag-pole sitting from Maine to California, will make a daring experiment here tomorrow, he declared today.

Kelly is having a flagpole set up in the cockpit of an airplane and will sit on it while the plane makes a flight tomorrow. Kelly will not wear a parachute.

Hunting Accident Victim Succumbs

FORT WORTH, Sept. 24.—T. G. Rainey, accidentally shot while hunting doves near Eagle Mountain dam, died in a hospital here today. His shotgun had blown away part of his right side.

A. H. Johnson, his hunting companion, said he heard a shot and a low moan. He found Rainey lying on the ground about five feet from a fence.

WOMEN'S SMOKER

BRIDGEWATER, Mass., Sept. 24.—A smoking room has been opened at the women's prison here. The purpose, according to Superintendent Robert C. Sherman is to reduce fire hazards.

ONE BILLION LOSS CLAIMED TO INVESTORS

CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—The United States district attorney's office, the agency which shattered Chicago's gangs and sent Al Capone to prison, will start a thorough inquiry into the Insull empire's financing immediately.

Announcement of the investigation made today by the district attorney followed closely a promise of a senatorial investigation and demands that Samuel Insull and his brother, Marti, be returned to the United States.

The debacle of the utilities company is estimated to have cost investors close to \$1,000,000,000.

3 REGIONAL C. OF C's. WILL CLEAR LOANS

AUSTIN, Sept. 24.—Applications from Texas counties and cities for emergency relief funds provided by the Reconstruction Finance corporation should be addressed to the regional chamber of commerce in which the county or city is located. Gov. Ross S. Sterling has announced.

Gov. Sterling has placed the handling of these funds in the hands of the three regional chambers of commerce. These bodies in turn will turn the applications to the governor who will transmit them to the Washington board. Applications must be made by Oct. 15.

No local community applications will be received by the governor except as they clear through the regional chambers of commerce, it was announced.

Decision to handle the program in this manner was reached at a conference between the governor; Hubert M. Harrison, general manager of the East Chamber of Commerce, Longview; D. A. Banden, general manager of the West Texas chamber, Stamford; Ray Leeman, general manager of the South Texas Chamber, San Antonio, and Robert W. Kelso, field representative of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

Kelso provided the governor's office with application forms which will be forwarded through the regional chambers of commerce to every county in Texas within the next few days.

This phase of emergency relief applies only to funds for actual relief of needy persons and for payments for labor to unemployed persons who have no other means of support, and does not apply to the federal provisions for loans to cities for self-liquidating construction projects.

Relief funds will be advanced to the counties and cities upon approval of the governor, and will be deducted from federal highway aid funds beginning in 1935. A total of \$300,000,000 is provided for the relief work in the nation, and not more than 15 per cent of the total funds can go to any one state.

Sheriff Confident He Holds Arledge Slayer

AUSTIN, Sept. 24.—Sheriff Coley White today believed he held the slayer of Edgar Arledge, university of Texas student fatally shot here Tuesday night while sitting in a automobile with a woman companion on the outskirts of Austin.

The suspect was a 20-year-old youth identified as the person who had robbed a private home the night before.

White said he believed the young man wandered about the vicinity of the slaying for 24 hours after the house had been robbed, slept in a pasture and dropped a purse which officers later found. Arledge was shot about midnight.

A GRAND OLD MOTHER IN ISRAEL.

An unspeakable grief came into the life of John N. Garner in the passing of his aged beloved mother after great honors had come to him and he had reached the pinnacle of fame in this republic. Mrs. Sarah Jane Garner was ambitious to see her son vice president of the United States. Fate decreed otherwise. She passed away in the midst of the campaign. Her life journey was over. She was 81. She was born on the soil of Texas. Her grandfather was one of the earliest pioneers. Indeed, he first landed on the Texas side of the Red river in 1821. He was one of the builders of the civilization that was planted in the wilderness. She had a pioneer heritage. She passed it on to her children and her grandchildren. She was of the rugged pioneer stock. She loved mankind. She was charitable at all times, and her name was a household word in that territory which had been invaded by her grandfather 111 years ago. She had lived a long life well. She died as beautifully as she had lived according to the lights of those who believe in doing good to the less fortunate and making the sacrifices necessary in this vale of tears. Why mourn her passing? Peaceful sleep was her reward and a life everlasting beyond the grave was her fondest hope.

A DEAD LETTER—"THOU SHALT NOT KILL."

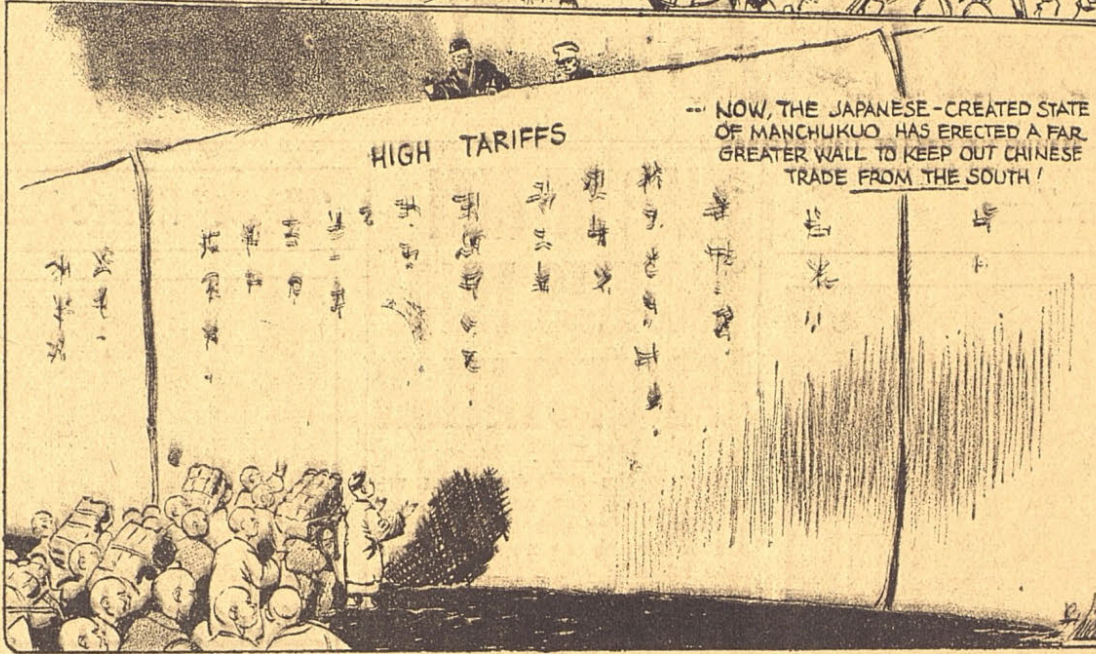
HOOVER SNUBS PINCHOT.

TEXAS HOME BANK MEASURE NOW A LAW.

Life insurance companies and building and loan associations of Texas are authorized under bills signed and filed by Gov. Sterling to invest in stock of home loan banks. Settlement of the emotional atmosphere about the decision of Judge Geo. L. Davenport in the Cisco football case leaves prominent the quandary in which the members of the state and district interscholastic league committees have found themselves. These gentlemen, plainly confused by the league's first court experience, forse disaster for the league in the adverse decision. Even while the case was on trial they were too convinced of the organization's inviolability to recognize the possibility of interference with its functioning. That its mandates might be questioned on the score of procedure seemed presumptive in view of what appeared to be the plain justice of the mandate.

In the Cisco case Cisco was at fault. That was clear in the league mind. It followed that the penalty assessed was righteous and should be sustained. It did not occur that certain essential principles underlie the application of justice—that by disregarding these principles justice might become an instrument of oppression.

And it has not yet occurred, to all evidence, that the decision of the court was a sympathetic effort not merely to restore a needed orderliness but to strengthen the league administration. As this column remarked before the district committee can get a great deal of satisfaction out of Judge Davenport's decision.

The truth of the matter is that the Hightower case, beginning as a small pimple on the nose of the district, has drawn into a carbuncle the virus of every isolated instance of mistake or dissatisfaction. In dealing with such a case it becomes evident that it is not a question of whether or not Cisco should have been expelled from the league, or a question of whether or not the district and state committees of the league have authority to discipline

TEXAS TOPICS

By RAYMOND BROOKS

AUSTIN, Sept. 24.—Mrs. Ferguson in her campaign has asked the voters to consider her election, if she be elected in November, as a mandate for removal of the entire present state highway commission. With her nomination declared by a state convention in a state whose democratic nomination has been equivalent to election so far, voters, and possibly members of the highway commission are now asking: "What about it?"

The answer now seems to be that she wouldn't be able to do anything about it, and that her administration could not put more than a minority of one of the three members upon the commission.

Any further change would require legislative action first. While the house may very likely have as many pro as anti-Ferguson members next year, it is certain a majority of the senate would not be under the leadership of the Ferguson.

Furthermore an organized minority effectively can block legislation, such as for instance the proposal to enlarge the highway commission sufficiently to give the appointive power a controlling majority, or to change the system into an elective commission.

It is doubtful if an elective commission could be placed in office, even if decreed by the legislature, before the general election of 1934.

The governor cannot bust officeholders, except in case of going into court and proving misfeasance in office. The commission was changed to a six-year term basis after Mrs. Ferguson's first administration because of the troubles Mrs. Ferguson as governor had with the commission of her own appointment, when she had named all three members.

The same condition applies with respect to the board of control, except that the incoming governor does not name a member until the beginning of the second year of the term.

As to the board of education, which also buys textbooks, the retiring governor names two members on Jan. 1, so that a governor does not have a chance there to place appointees on the board until the last few days of an administration. The livestock sanitary commission of three members is the only administrative board all of whose members are appointed by an incoming governor.

The banking commissioner is appointed Sept. 1.

The secretary of state and adjutant general are appointed at the beginning of an administration. The governor appoints one member of the insurance commission at the beginning of a term.

the rejection of the Hebrews and the call of the Gentiles.

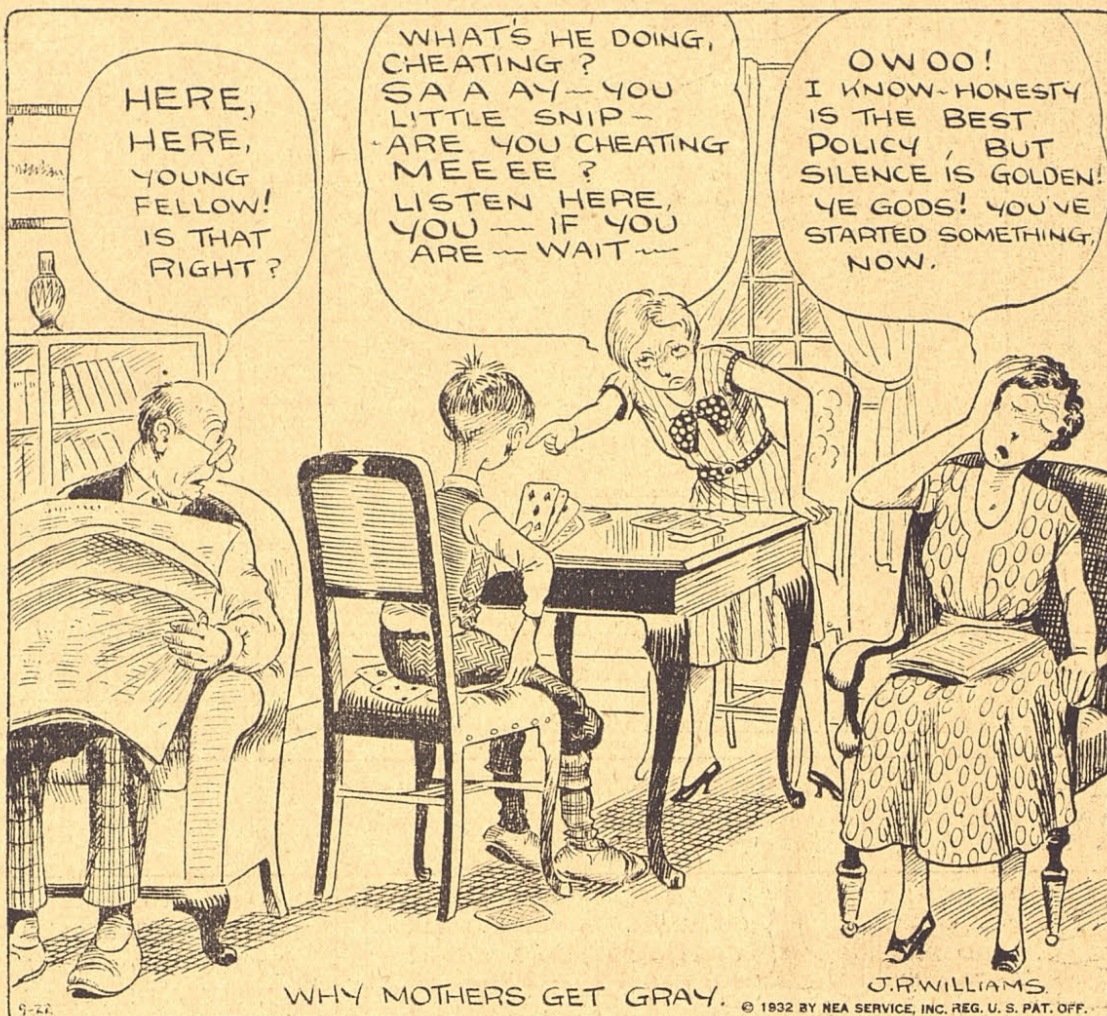
