GAS EXPLOSION IN WYOMING KILLS 14

DE PINEDO'S PLANE IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

APACHE LODGE, Roosevelt Dam, Arizona, April 6.—The inter-continental flight of Commander Francisco De Pinedo, Italian aviator, came to a disastrous end today at noon when the Santa Maria, De Pinedo's plane, caught fire as it was being put under way preparatory to taking off for San Diego.

The plane was a total loss. The crew escaped uninjured.

KING'S HEALTH REMAINS GRAVE

BUCHAREST, April 6.—King Ferdinand's condition is extremely grave today, notwithstanding his slight rally which revived the hopes of his anxious country.

The Rumanian monarch was stricken with influenza several days ago and has never been fully conscious since.

Raby Again To Be Mayor

Dr. S. B. Raby was re-elected mayor of the city of Ballinger in the regular municipal election held Tuesday by a majority of 27 votes, the official count showed Wednesday morning. Mayor Raby received 308 votes. His opponent, C. J. Lynn, received 281 votes.

There was a total of 591 votes cast, two voters scratching both candidates for mayor. In the commissioners' race, E. M. Eubank and W. A. Holt were high men, with votes of 329 and 317, respectively. These two men will be city commissioners for the next two years.

Elmer Talbot, candidate for commissioner, received 226 votes, while Louis Cohen, candidate for the same office, received 281 votes.

While there was a large vote cast, it was not as large as was first expected. More than 300 of the votes were cast in the afternoon when many women came to the polling place.

The first meeting of the new commission will be held within the near future and plans for the next two-year program of the city administration will be outlined and announced.

Roy Reeder, elected about one year ago in a special, called election, did not ask for re-election and retired when Mr. Holt was elected.

ANGRY WORDS FLY AT TRIAL

DETROIT, April 6.—Senator James A. Reed, chief of Henry Ford's defense counsel, mentioned as an outstanding possibility for the Democratic presidential nomination, exchanged angry words with Aaron Sapiro today over the status of Frank O. Lowden, regarded as presidential timber for the Republican party.

Reed was seeking to gain from Sapiro the history of the national co-operative organizations he had represented.

He hit upon the National Wheat Growers' advisory committee, formed at a called meeting in Chicago in 1923.

In the list of who attended the meet was Lowden.

"Does he (Lowden) make his living farming or is he the son-in-law of Pullman?" demanded Reed, with a tone of sarcasm in his voice.

"He makes his living by his work as a farmer as a lawyer does by his work," Sapiro responded.

Rear Admiral Hough, of the American Yangtse patrol fleet, reported that virtually all ships in that area were coal burners and a shortage of fuel caused by labor troubles may require the vessels to be sent to Shanghai.

Conditions at Hankow were described by the admiral as "very bad."

MOODY VETOES MORE BILLS

AUSTIN, April 6.—Governor Moody today blue-penciled \$197,000 from several emergency appropriation bills passed by the last legislature.

Among items vetoed include an appropriation of \$25,000 for the purchase of one acre of land of the Breckenridge tract for the University of Texas, and \$20,000 for the maintenance of a steam plant at Texas A. & M. College.

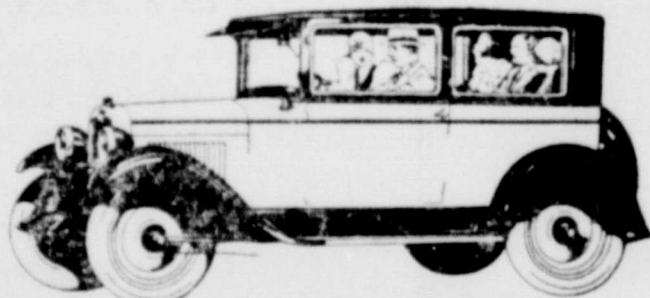

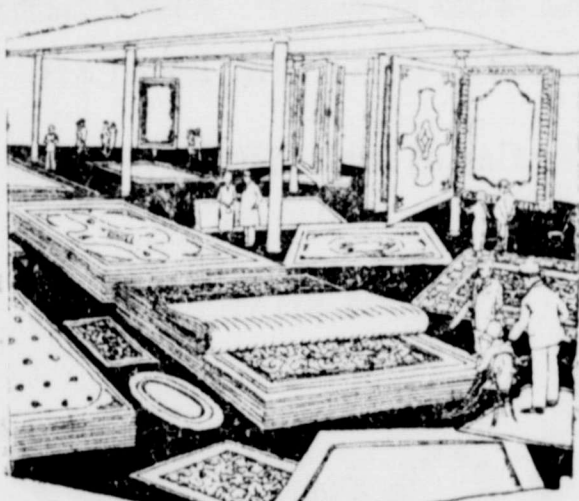

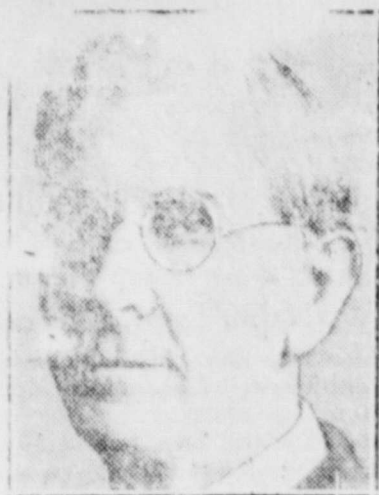
