TWO ELECTIONS SLATED HERE

The City of Lubbock will witness two elections this week, one which will concern the City of Lubbock and the other pertains to State.

Three items will be featured today, Thursday, in the City election, including Capital Improvement, a Straw Vote on Urban Renewal and the Sales Tax.

Meanwhile, Saturday, November 11, six amendments will constitute the Texas General Election.

Amendments to be considered include: Amendment No. 1-Authorizes counties to put all county tax revenue into one general fund without regard to source or purpose.

Amendment No. 2-Permits municipalities, political subdivisions and state supported entities located within a hospital district to participate in the establishment and operation of mental health, mental retardation and public health services.

Amendment No. 3-Extends the Veteran's Land Program by authorizing the sale of \$200 million of state bonds to purchase land to be sold to veterans and expands the program to include veterans of Viet Nam.

Amendment No. 4-Authorizes counties to pay medical doctor and hospital bills of county law enforcement officers for injuries received in line of duty and to continue to pay salaries of injured officials during period of incapacitation.

Amendment No. 5-Authorizes the Parks and Wild Life Department to issue and sell general obligation bonds in the amount of \$75 million to finance acquisition and development of lands for state parks and recreational areas.

Amendment No. 6-Permits non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective positions under the State or United States Government where there is no conflict or interest and where the State will benefit.

THINK CAREFULLY, THEN VOTE

Today, Thursday, and Saturday, November 9th and 11th respectively, should be considered most important by every citizen in our area. These two days will give our citizens the opportunity to vote on issues that will affect themselves and their children for a long time to come.

In the city election, which will be voted today, you as voters are asked to approve an additional 1% city sales tax to help support many new programs that will also be approved or not approved in the same election.

The people in favor of this sales tax have painted glowing pictures of the many programs and improvements that the new revenue raised from this tax will provide, new sewage disposal plant, water system improvements, and a civic center are just a few to mention.

Also included on the ballot will be a "straw vote" for the purpose of determining how the citizens of Lubbock feel about another Urban Renewal Project in our city. It had been brought to the attention of this newspaper some time back that the mayor did not regard it necessary to allow the people of Lubbock another vote on Urban Renewal projects since back some years ago the citizens had approved the initial Coronado Urban Renewal Project. This would seem a good idea on the city's part, after the experience our readers have had with the first Urban Renewal Project. At any rate, it was, as we see it, a good idea to test the public's opinion with the present "straw vote". It will be interesting to everyone to determine how the present voters who did or now live in the present Urban Renewal area voice their opinion.

At any rate, today's vote must be considered on the basis of how it will affect each and every individual voter. We all know that the city property tax, Lubbock independent school tax, and county property tax are enough tax load as is, not to mention the new hospital district tax, which will come into being in the very near future. We all know that everyone now pays state property taxes, school car taxes, and of course federal income tax and social security tax.

Now the question is, do you want just another 1% sales tax for the purpose of improving facilities in the immediate city? Do you as voting tax-paying citizens want to approve for yourself another \$1.00 tax on each \$100.00 you are now spending? Do you want to increase the amount of money you pay for sales taxes from \$2.00 per hundred (present state sales tax) on all items you have been purchasing for your family to \$3.00 per hundred dollars spent? That is the question, and only you the voter can determine how much you will be taxed.

The choice is yours, and you can make a difference if you will only vote as you see fit today.

THE VETS NEED YOUR HELP

Saturday, November 11th is Veterans Day. This paper knows of no better way to show the veterans in the state of Texas your appreciation for the things they have done for your personal freedom than to vote on that day for the reinstatement of the Veterans Land Program in Texas.

IT COSTS TAXPAYERS NOTHING . . . PAYS ITS OWN WAY . . . "BOOSTS" THE ECONOMY!

Since its inception in 1949, the Veterans Land Program has stood on its own as one of the soundest state endeavors in modern times. It has been most successful and throughout the years has not cost the taxpayers for its operation and the purchase of land. On the contrary, it has made it a profit for the people of Texas over and above its cost of operation.

On December 1, 1965, the last purchase of land was made under prior amendments permitting 35,300 veterans to buy approximately 3,000,000 acres of land. The purchase of land not only helps the veterans of Texas, but the economy as a whole derives great benefits from such an endeavor. From the sale of the first \$200,000,000 in bonds there has been over \$242,000,000 spent for the purchase of land. This includes the profit made by the program and also the 5 percent downpayment and the difference money paid by the veteran purchasers. Since each dollar spent turns over at least eight times, the spending of \$242,000,000 is equivalent to placing over one and a half billion dollars into the economy of the state. This is in addition to the benefits derived by the public as a whole from the improvements made on the various places and the money spent by each veteran purchaser in the community where the land is located. Attorneys, abstractors, title insurance companies, fire insurance companies, surveyors, real estate brokers, lumber yards, and tradesmen of all categories directly feel the effect of the increased business derived from the purchase of land by the 35,000 or more veteran purchasers.

Veterans of Vietnam have not had an opportunity to take part in the Veterans Land Program, and this amendment would also give them an opportunity to buy land in Texas, along with other veterans who fought in World War II and the Korean War. It would include any veteran who served from September 1940 to the date of formal withdrawal of troops from the present armed conflict in Vietnam. All veterans who entered service from Texas and are presently living in Texas would be permitted to purchase under the program. All those who have moved to Texas and have resided in Texas for at least five years prior to making application to purchase under the program would also be eligible.

If the Constitutional Amendment to be voted on November 11th of this year is approved by the people of Texas, the Veterans Land Board will start purchasing land for the veterans of Vietnam and other wars. Since Texas has never paid their veterans a cash bonus but has always followed the policy of making land available to them, this Constitutional Amendment follows a historic policy of the State of Texas and has proven beneficial to all the people of this State.

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Texan's Eyes Light On Road Viewed

Thousands of Texas motorists may be driving in today's heavy traffic with eyesight that does not match their speed, says the Texas Safety Association.

"Each year in Texas more than two million drivers licenses are renewed without the benefit of an eye examination," said Dr. Otto Lippmann of Austin, chairman of Texans for Traffic Safety. "Advancing age, diseases and eye injuries can adversely affect a person's vision. It is not unusual for a 40 or 50 year old driver who had good vision 20 years ago to have some visual problem now that calls for correction or treatment."

Lippmann said the Texas Safety Association and Texans for Traffic Safety both strongly advocate vision re-examination at the time for driver license renewal.

"I Bet \$500.00 That Teachers Of Our Children In America Cannot Read"

CHICAGO--(LDA)--Last week I wagered \$500 that not even half of the teachers in America could read at the adult level any better than the children they teach can read at the child's level. Not only will I wager \$500, but I will publicly demonstrate this fact.

I have long been opposed to the use of meaningless subject matter in the educational process. Therefore, the test I propose will be a significant and meaningful test that may be applied to the current problems of our time and for which our educators (If they really are true educators!) should be able to answer. Is this not the ultimate goal of education?

If teachers can educate children, they should also be able to educate themselves without some superior standing over them to crack them on the knuckles for remissions and errors in the process! After all, is this not the method used by the first educator? He did it himself!

This is the continuing educational process at the adult level. The stimulation was not one simply for salary lane advancement! It was for the love of true knowledge! It was not just the goal to acquire a string of meaningless degrees to flaunt and parade around as status symbols.

The meaningful problems of our times revolve around such issues as world wars, crime, universal involuntary poverty, unemployment, and last but not least, the racial conflicts that represent (within the field of discourse) the inadequate reasoning process of the eyes instead of the mind . . . leading to race as the highest viable factor in the universal struggle to survival!

The curriculum for this test for teachers at the adult level shall consist of just two books which our educators should run through in just ten weeks if they are to compare equitably with the conditions that are imposed upon the children they teach.

The first book is "Progress and Poverty," by Henry George. It can be purchased for \$2 plus postage from the Henry George School of Social Science, 50 E. 69th St., New York, N.Y. 10021. The second book is "Minimal Religion," by Fredrick Nymever, for \$3 from the Libertarian Press, South Holland, Ill., 60473.

Since the present black and white Judases of education will probably ignore and evade this challenge; I will offer a \$100 reward to the first reader who can persuade some individual within the educational structure of the nation to accept my challenge. Send the names and addresses of such educators who refuse to Lee Dale Associates, Dept. WJ, 2400 W. Madison St. Chicago, Ill., 60612. If I am going to be forced into paying taxes for education, then the educators are going to assume their proper roles and responsibilities as educators who should be entitled to the highest incomes in the land. Don't exclude the nation's boards of education because they are responsible for the system that produces retarded and deprived teachers!

Since we place a time limit on the children to acquire an education, it is only fair to place a time limit upon our educators! Three months should be sufficient if our educators are as unselfish and dedicated as they have pretended to be.

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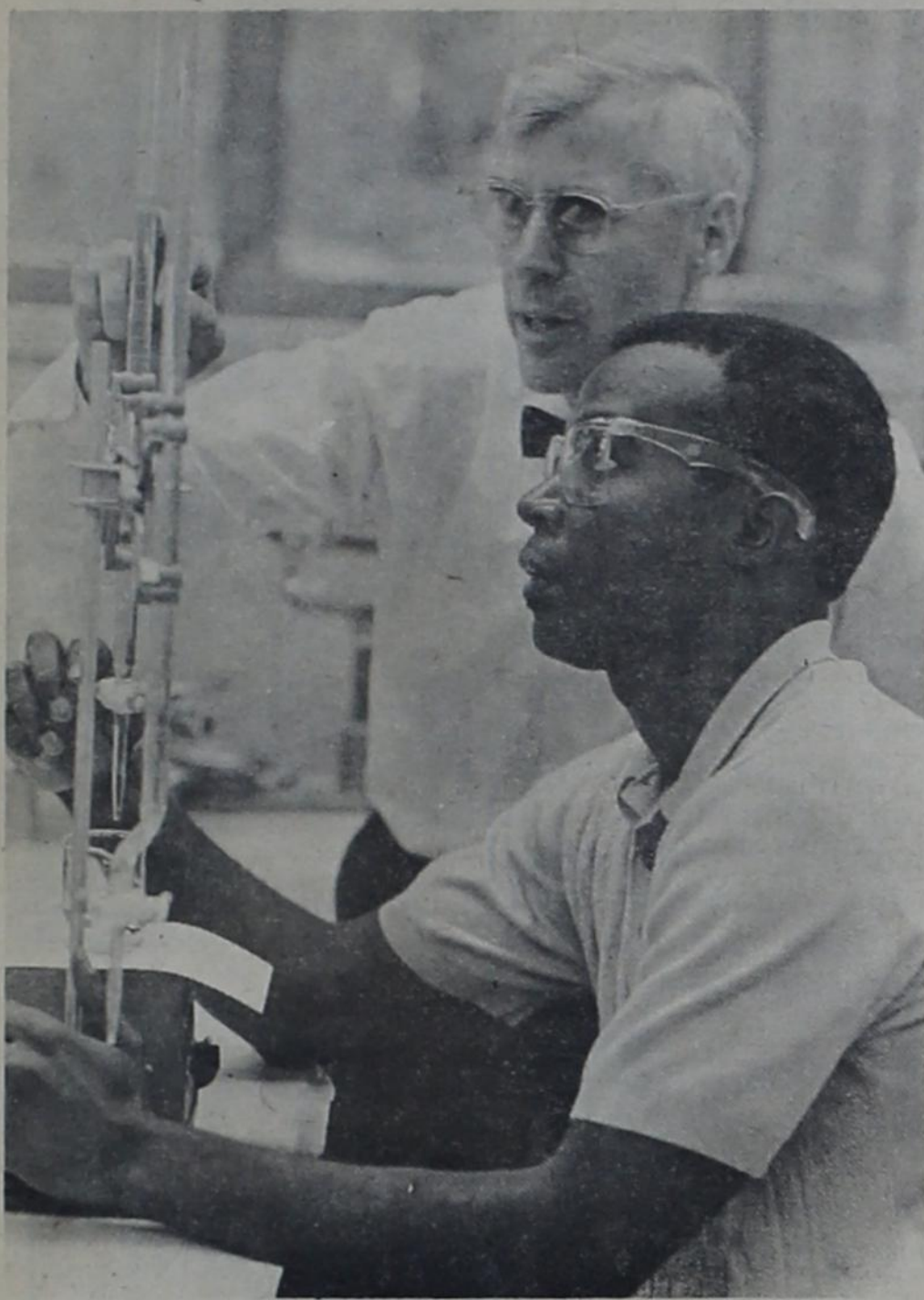

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (NPI) -- The young man had just put the finishing touches to a piece of metal place on which he had been working, wire-brushing the steel to clean up a few rough edges around the holes he had just countersunk -- and smiled with satisfaction.

He had used his hands, his eyes, his brain and machine tools he had never heard of a couple of weeks earlier to make something of value.

This was the beginning of a new life for Leland Smith. Lee, as he is known to friends, was born in a small town in South Carolina. He is the second oldest of six children (one older sister, a younger brother, and three younger sisters). In 1963, Lee and his family moved to to Rochester where his father is employed as a truck driver.

In the few years that Lee has been working he has had four jobs, none of which has much future as far as he was concerned. He has attended high school in Rochester for a short time, but his ability to read, write and understand arithmetic was equal to that of a fifth-grade student.

As such, he was then typical of many persons moving into the nation's industrial areas in search of opportunity. Now, however, it is different. He is one of a number of people of limited educational background in Rochester who are going back to school while working on a job.

The schooling is helping Lee and others acquire the necessary knowledge and develop the the skills to make them useful and productive citizens of the community.

Lee switched to the "high road of opportunity" last February, when he applied for a job at Eastman Kodak Company. He spent some time with an interviewer who decided that, in spite of a lack of industrial experience or skills, Lee had the desire and potential to learn a useful trade. He was put on the payroll and assigned to the company's Trade Trainee program.

During the next few weeks, he began to learn some of the fundamentals of holding a job in a business firm -- getting to work on time, doing each job right, and getting along with fellow workers.

At the same time, he was receiving what Kodak calls "hands on" training: Learning how to use hand tools and some of the less complicated power tools.

Lee also returned to school, through courses conducted by the Board for Fundamental Education at the plant, to bring his basic communication skills up to that of an eighth grader.

Following this, he entered another phase of training and currently is attending one four-hour classroom session under experienced instructors each week -- at full pay -- as part of his 40-hour week job as a trade trainee. The additional 36 hours a week are spent on the job, working with and learning from a skilled craftsman.

After approximately a year in this program, Lee will go either into a skilled trades apprenticeship -- if he qualifies -- or learn a trade through practical experience, depending on his own interest in getting ahead and his demonstrated ability.

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These referrals are originated by such groups and agencies as the New York State Employment Service, the five settlement houses, FIGHT, the Urban League, and others.

The special programs at Kodak, such as the one in which Lee is working, offer training opportunities for the trade trainee, laboratory trainee, trade handyman trainee and construction trainee.

About a year ago, Kodak retained the Board of Fundamental Education, a private, non-profit organization chartered by Congress in 1954, to help people upgrade their basic communication skills.

The BFE training, in which more than 200 Kodak people already have taken part, is offered to trainees as needed and is available on a voluntary basis to others in the company as well.

In addition to the special trainee programs, Kodak's long standing training and educational courses cover a broad field, from the elemental to the highly technical.

Also, for the individual who wants to pursue his education through courses offered by local educational institutions, the company has a 100 per cent tuition refund program.

The company cooperates with the Rochester Urban League in its on-the-job training program for unemployed and underemployed minority group members, and last year, employed some 60 persons referred by the league.

In addition, Kodak works with the Rochester Board of Education in a part time work project aimed at reducing high school drop-outs. In this program young men and women are employed part time during the school year. Their assignments help them to learn about and prepare for future employment.

In another area, working through the Urban League and Rochester Jobs, Inc., Kodak provides financial support for a special project to upgrade the clerical skills of minority-group members to qualify them for clerical positions. This effort also provides part time employment while the young women are in the League training program.

During 1966, Kodak employed more than 600 Negro men and women in its Rochester operations, bringing the total number employed to more than 1,400.

Kodak officials emphasize that the company's program to provide useful jobs for the unemployed is not "altruistic." Rather, as one official expressed it, "The size and extent of these programs are related to our job needs. As these needs grow, we feel it is in the best interests of the community and the company to find ways to provide employment for those who have few, if any, of the normal skills required for jobs in Rochester's technically-oriented industrial society."

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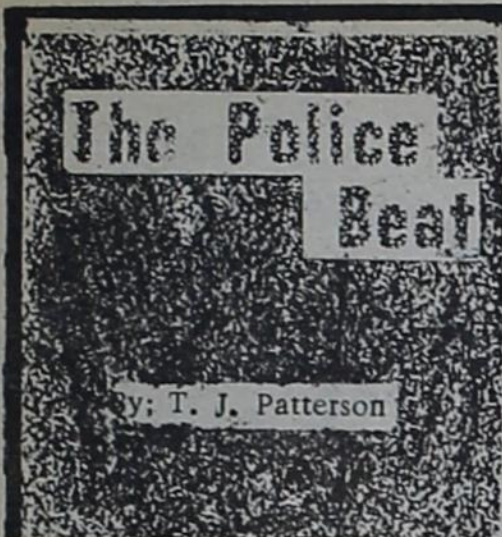

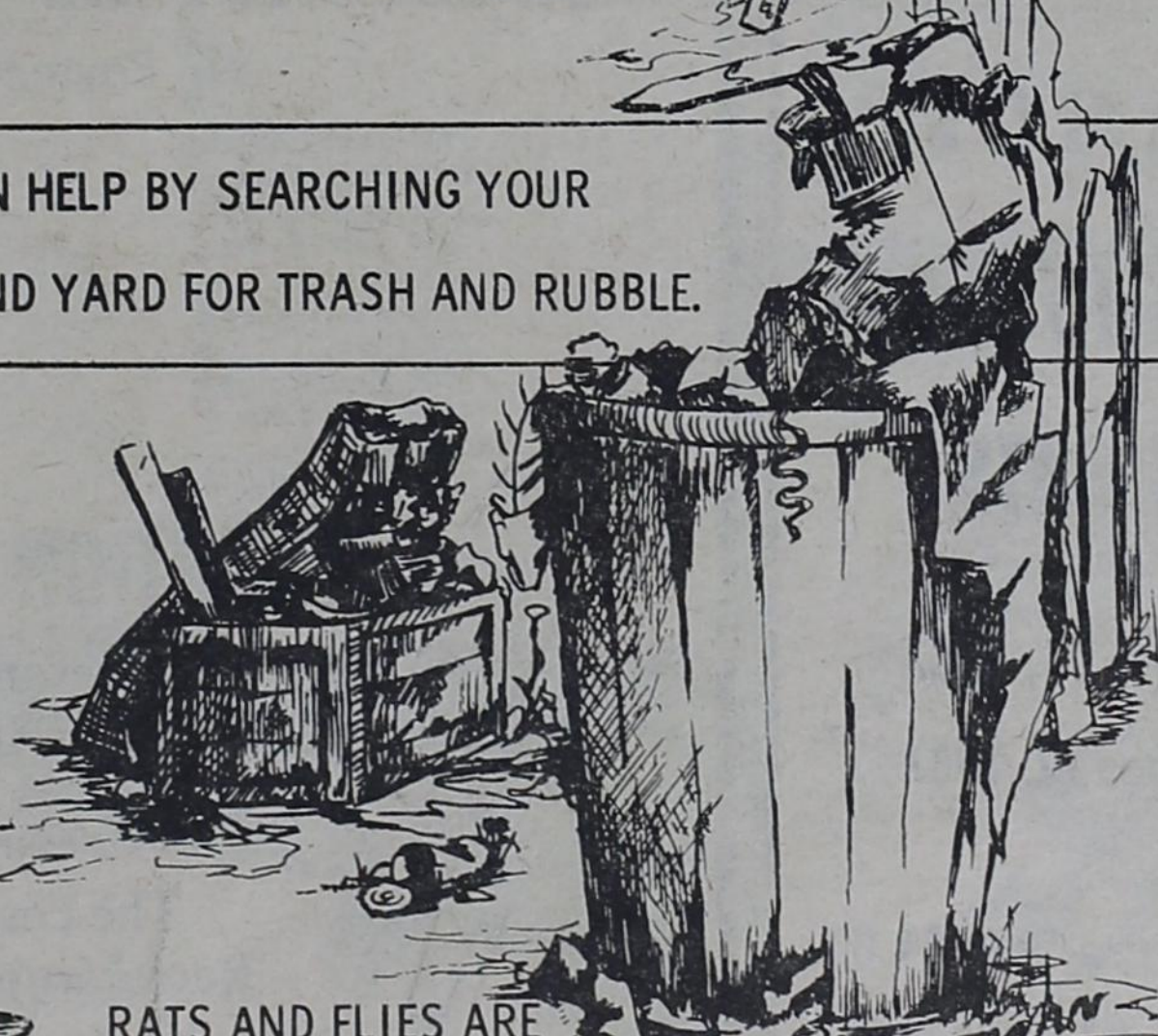

on your present age. If you are already 65 or reach 65 before the end of 1967, you need not have worked under social security to qualify for hospital insurance. If you reach that age after this year, you will need to have worked under social security, or you must be the wife, widow, etc., of someone who has worked in the system.

Q. If I should have to go to the hospital, how do they know I am signed up for medicare?

Your health insurance (medicare) identification card will show the hospital that you are entitled to medicare benefits. So be sure to take it with you if you should have to go to the hospital.

Lobby at the new building will be open on a 24-hour basis, and windows will open there for the first time at 8:30 a.m., Monday, November 13.

The new building and related facilities have been built by an Odessa firm, Area Builders, who commenced construction in mid-1966.

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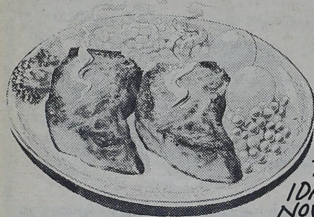
