Recent Increase In Oil Price To Help West Texas

Recent increases in the price of crude oil, averaging 25 cents per barrel, will add approximately \$11,500,000 per month to income of West Texas producers and royalty owners according to estimates prepared by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The estimate was based on production reported to the Texas Railroad Commission in March, the last month for which the commission's detailed statement of crude oil allowable, production and removal from leases has been distributed. March production in West Texas districts of the commission's Oil and Gas Division totaled 46,061,406 barrels. This would have added \$11,515,352 to the market value at an average hike of 25 cents per barrel.

The additional revenue by districts in West Texas, is estimated as follows: No. 7-B, \$878,734; No. 7-C, \$1,342,097; No. 8, \$7,266,860; No. 9, \$1,435,259; No. 10, \$592,402. Make-up of the districts by counties includes: No. 7-B — Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Parker, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Coleman, Brown, Comanche, Hamilton, Coryell, Lampasas, San Saba and Mills.

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT MAY CLOSE SMALL COUNTY OFFICES

The United States Post Office Department has ordered a study of four Eastland County fourth class post offices along with 23 others of the 17th Congressional district to determine if they can be served more economically by rural mail carriers.

Following the study there is a possibility that the fourth class offices at Nimrod, Scranton, Pioneer and Okra may be closed. Ben Guile, executive assistant to the postmaster general, notified the postmaster of the 17th Rep. Omar Burleson of the 17th District. Mr. Guile said that many fourth class post offices were outmoded and expensive and that the study was being made to determine if service could be given by rural carriers with less expense.

Representative Burleson said that he would oppose the closing of any offices in the 17th Congressional District. He said that he would keep closely in touch

Local Team Plays Olney Wednesday

The Cisco Little League All-Stars were eliminated from the area tournament in Breckenridge Monday night when they lost to a fine Albany team 6-10.

The Cisco team blew a 5-run lead which they ran up in the bottom half of the first inning. Errors in the infield were costly to the local team. Miscues cost the team six of the Albany runs.

The Cisco team went to work in the first inning to score five runs on four hits off Scott, starting Albany hurler. The five run inning was climaxed by a two run homer by Dal Elder over the left center field fence. It was one of the longest hits ever clouted in the Breckenridge park.

Charles Lipsey was the starting Cisco pitcher. He held the Albany team hitless for the first two innings but yielded the mound to King in the third when Albany got two hits. Cisco made three errors in the third to allow Albany to put across four tallies. Albany scored two more runs in the fourth on two hits and one Cisco error.

Albany put the game on ice in the top half of the sixth when they scored four more runs off one hit and four Cisco errors. Daniels, Albany first sacker, got a round tripper off King to highlight the action in the sixth. Dickie Bennie took over the pitching chores in the sixth to put out the Albany fire. Cisco started a rally in the bottom of the sixth but Eubank, who had replaced Scott on the mound for Albany, put on the steam to retire the side after they had made one run off two hits.

Milton King was charged with the loss. Jerry Blackwell, playing right field, was the fielding star of the game. He handled five difficult chances without a bobble and his sensational catches held Albany runners in check.

In the second game of the tournament Breckenridge eliminated Olney from the championship running. Tuesday night two Abilene teams met in the first game, and the third Abilene entry meets Brownwood in the second game to complete the first round of play.

Wednesday night, Cisco meets Olney at 7 o'clock in the first game for consolation honors. In the second game Wednesday night Breckenridge and Albany meet to see who goes on to the finals. If Cisco wins over Olney they go into the consolation finals Friday night.

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FIGHTING DROUGHT IS NOTHING NEW FOR A&M FIELD PERSONNEL

COLLEGE STATION, July 28. — Fighting drought emergencies is not a new experience to research and field personnel of the Texas A. & M. System. They have been meeting these crises for a half century. The 375 agricultural research and extension workers of the System who live in the 1552 designated drought counties have been working side by side with the farmers and stockmen in their fight to remain in business.

In some counties the battle has been going on for four years, in others for two or more years. From the beginning, the System personnel has furnished details on the developing situations for those planning future action and in return carried to the farmers and ranchmen information which they could use to lessen the effects of the drought.

In late June Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson visited Lubbock and other parts of the drought area. Extension District Agent W. H. Jones and Superintendent Don Jones of the Lubbock Experiment Station accompanied the Secretary on the Plainspart of the tour and gave him facts covering the entire development of the drought in that area. Afterward the Secretary spoke at the American Cotton Congress in Lubbock and talked with farmers and stockmen from the drought areas of Texas and other states.

Upon his return to Washington, immediate attention was given to providing emergency federal aid in the form of feed at reduced prices from the government-held stocks of corn, oats, wheat, cottonseed meal and cottonseed pellets.

County USDA Drought Committees were set up in each of the designated drought disaster counties with the county agricultural agent as a member and Extension Director G. G. Gibson was named to membership on the Texas USDA Drought Committee. These committees immediately began the job of getting the emergency feed program underway. In less than 20 days, orders, totaling 4,943 carloads of emergency feeds had been received in the state PMA office from the county groups. Information has been released through the Extension Service on how best to use the emergency feeds under drought conditions. New information is being released almost daily or as the situation changes.

Extension workers from the drought states and those from states where feed and pasture conditions are good met early in July in Kansas City to develop plans for exchanging information to bring together the man with the feed and the man with the

need. A series of drought letters since this plan was developed has carried lists to and from the counties of Texas to other states. The rains which began in mid-July, though spotted, have been a stimulus to those in the drought areas. Without moisture, not much can be done in agriculture, but with the coming of rain System employees in the field were ready with advice on what crops could be planted with reasonable chances for producing a crop or what practices should be followed in rebuilding ranges, fields or pastures.

Each of the 18 agricultural experiment stations in the drought area have submitted a summary of local conditions, experience of the station in similar situations over the years along with recommendations on what farmers and stockmen could do before and after rain is received. County agents and research workers in the area are familiar with the growth habits of the crops grown and can make recommendations as to where seed supplies might be obtained if unavailable in the area.

The county home demonstration agents too are in the fight. They are furnishing information to farm and ranch women on food preservation, clothing design, food production, including the growing of fall gardens and on many other subjects which help families cut corners during the emergency.

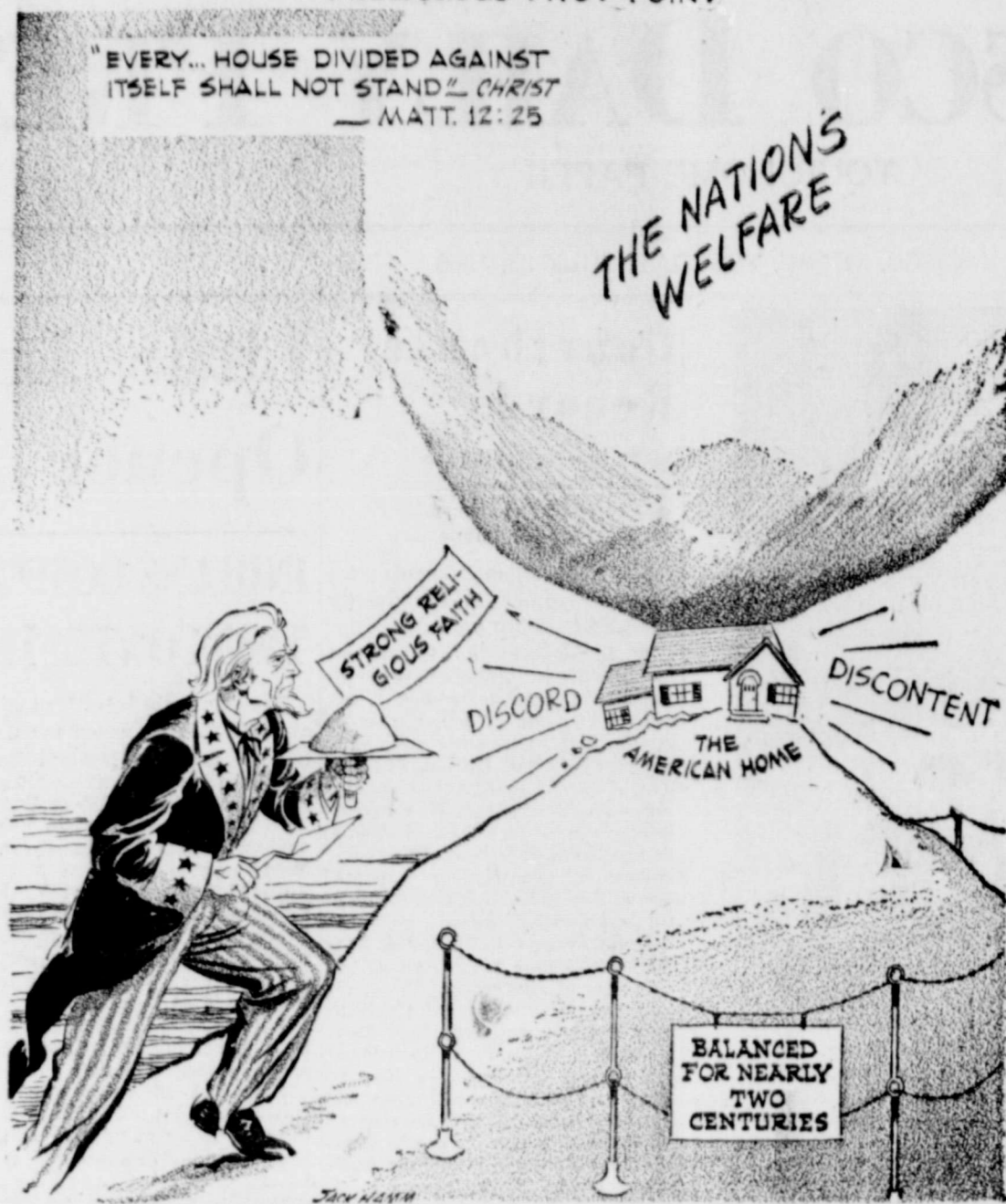
The battle goes on day by day. As new situations develop, new needs arise and new or different kind of information will be needed. The research and extension workers see it as their job to furnish it. They know that in almost any year drought conditions can be found in some part of the state and about every 20 years it will assume major proportions. They see the fight as a long one; a fight in which man will never whip the drought but can learn to live with it. Their principal weapon is knowledge and their attack is education.

Out of emergencies and disasters come new weapons for fighting future battles. Individual plants which survive such a drought as the present one are obviously drought-resistant. Selections and increase of the seed may furnish hardy new varieties of crops for planting during the next series of dry years. Methods developed by research and by farmers and stockmen themselves will aid in improving life in rural Texas.

A big hope of the professional workers is that the drought emergency will bring home to Texans the need for putting into use the best practices developed over the years in range management, soil and water conservation, crop production, cropping systems, water utilization and livestock breeding and management. They hope, too, that the citizens of the state will be impressed with the necessity for a long-range program of research and demonstration for making Texas agriculture drought-resistant if not drought-proof.

Thousands of farmers south of a line drawn from central Oklahoma through Tennessee, and North Carolina will plant Coastal Bermuda in 1937 for the first time. Its excellent performance during the 1932 drought convinced them that it has a place in their pasture, hay, and silage programs.

This highly productive hybrid, developed by Glenn W. Burton at the Georgia Coastal Plain Experiment Station, has longer leaves and stems, grows taller, and spreads faster than common Bermuda. It will grow on wetter soils, yet is more drought resistant. Its greater resistance to the leaf-spot diseases and its frost-tolerance mean more and better quality feed and more fall grazing. The high resistance of this grass to root knot nematode favors its growth with clovers and legumes on nematode-infested soils.

These characteristics mean more feed per acre with the same amount of fertilizer and water. A six-acre test pasture at Tifton, Georgia, carried eight steers throughout the summer for 5 years and produced an average of 278 pounds of beef per acre. A similar pasture of common Bermuda carried only five steers and produced an average of 162 pounds of beef per acre.

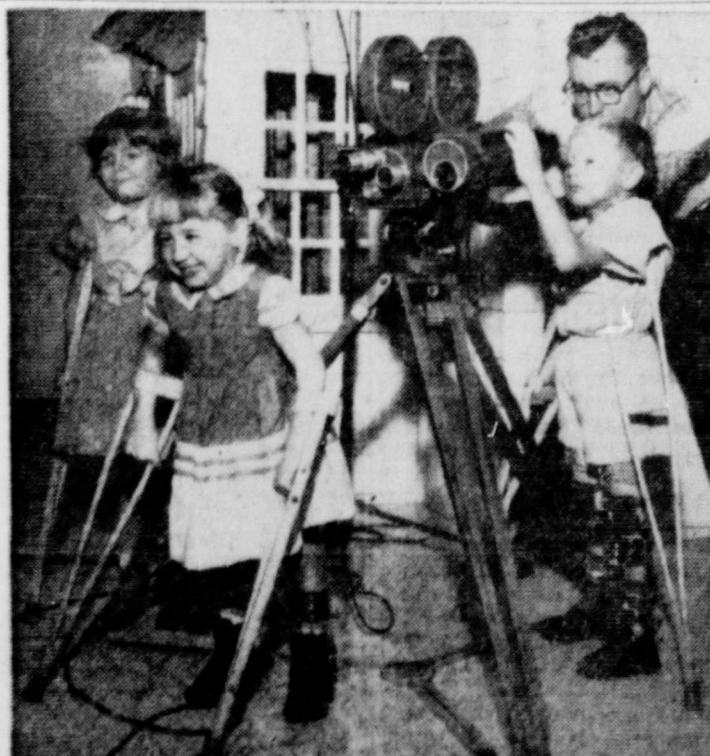

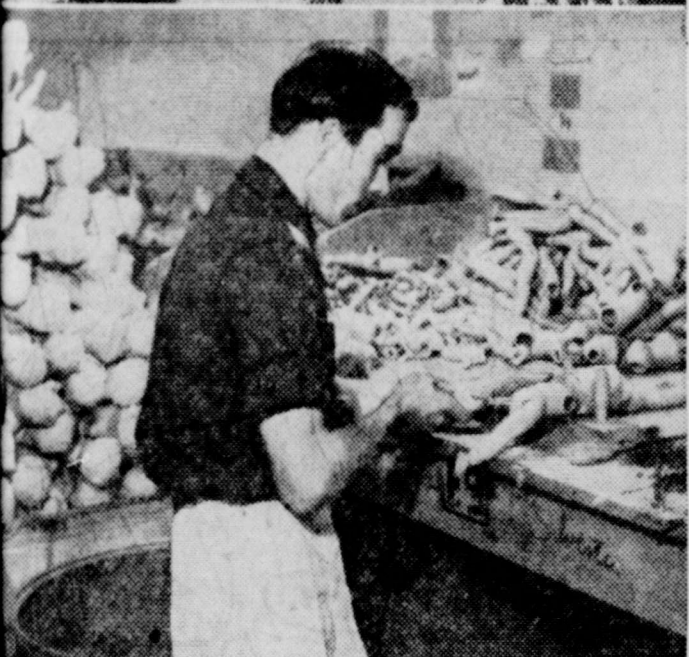

An all too common trap for the prospective home buyer is a sales contract signed under the delusion that he is merely signing a "receipt" for his earnest money payment. Once the buyer has signed such a contract, he is bound by its provisions. Many unfortunate entanglements have been announced by clients to lawyers with the words, "I have just signed a receipt for a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that everything is O.K."

Sales contracts are often called by other names, such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and almost without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligations lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understanding as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its contents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appearance of the contract, and perhaps the fact that a partially printed form is used may contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a lapse of good business judgment.

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described. A complete description of the property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds, is a must, the street number being inadequate by itself.

Articles and fixtures included in the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items as venetian blinds, removable floor coverings, draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration in cash.

The sales contract should also

state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

The buyer's individual circumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. A partially printed form may or may not provide sufficient blank space for the addition of all essential details in your case. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form."

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I have a National Service Life Insurance term policy, and I've decided to leave my dividend money with the VA to pay premiums that I happen to miss. What will VA do if my term insurance expires and I don't take action to renew and pay the premium myself?

A — At the end of the term period, VA will pay the premium required for renewing your term policy out of your dividend credit — unless you write to VA and request otherwise before the present term expires.

Q — I plan to take my medical interne training under the Korean GI Bill. Will I be paid GI allowance as an on-the-job trainee, or will I get the higher rates paid to full-time classroom students?

A — You will receive the rates paid to those taking full-time classroom training. However, your medical internship course must be accredited and approved by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association. Its length also must be approved by the Council. No allowances at all may be paid to veterans in non-approved internships.

Q — A few years ago I received an automobile under VA's program of providing up to \$1,600 toward the cost of a car for certain disabled veterans. My car is beginning to show signs of wear, and I wonder if I could get another VA grant to buy a new car.

A — Under the law, you are not entitled to another grant to buy a new car.

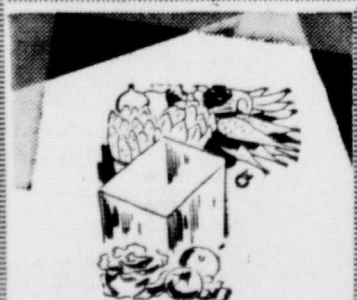
