Upon a time a special kind of fire was threatening all the forests of the world. It sent showers of sparks high into the air, helping to spread from one forest to another.

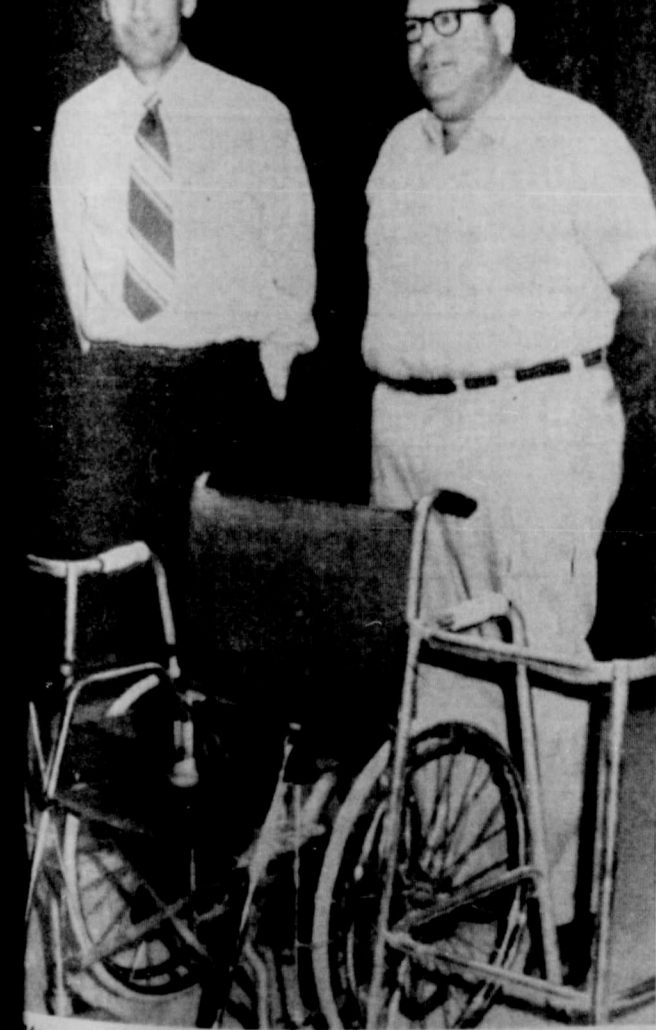
People had survived the fire, and didn't care about the spread of the fire; some of them actually helped the fire to spread because they were afraid of a world of burned forests.

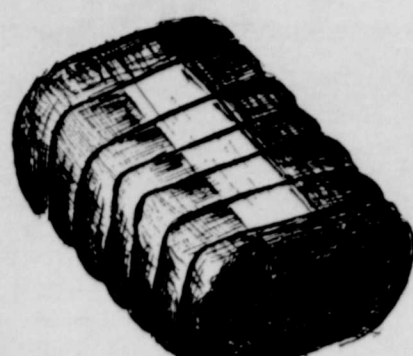
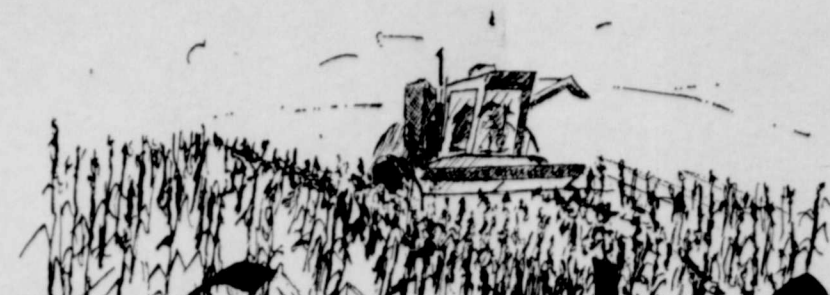

Mr. Graham's most outstanding work was his efforts over many years to control the largest gully in the Panhandle. Graham has over 12 miles of terraces to hold water out of the gully. He and two neighbors formed a pooling agreement and installed an erosion control dam at the head of the gully that controls floodwater from over 1,500 acres. Last year he built a large pipe drop structure that stabilized the floor of the gully.

He also built an irrigation reservoir on Cottonwood Creek that can store 1,000 acre feet of water. This structure also controls flooding on Cottonwood Creek and has caused springs downstream to start flowing.

Mr. Graham received technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service and cost-share assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program.

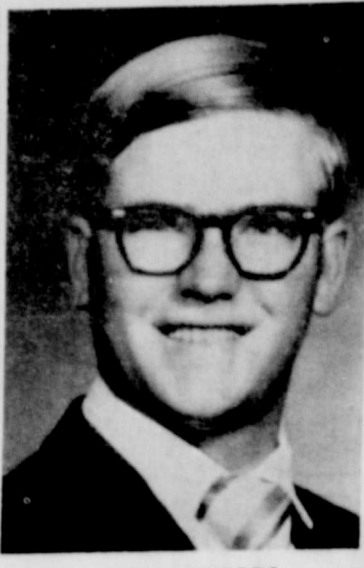

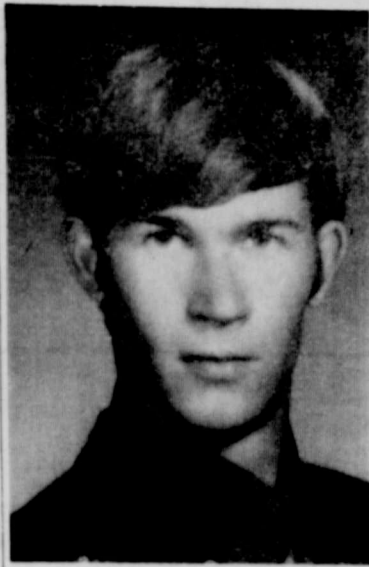

Fishpond Fertilization Is Recommended

Natural waters, as a rule, have low fertility. For good fish production, ponds usually need the addition of commercial fertilizer. Once started, fertilizing should be continued.

Fishing waters need enough nitrogen, phosphate and potash to grow vast numbers of microscopic plants. These microscopic plants use the fertilizer from the water to grow and multiply. Fish do not eat the fertilizer or the tiny plants to any extent; but they do eat the insect larvae and other water animals that feed on these tiny plants. The high production of microscopic plants in fertile water results in more pounds of fish.

High fertility also prevents the growth of submerged water weeds. With enough fertilizer, millions of microscopic plants color the water to a depth of 18 inches or more and prevents sunlight, without which the water weeds cannot grow, from reaching the pond bottom. Further, without weeds to harbor them, mosquito larvae are eaten by the fish.

Mills, associate professor in the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences, said the team competed with 11 other teams in the American Society of Agronomy sponsored contest.

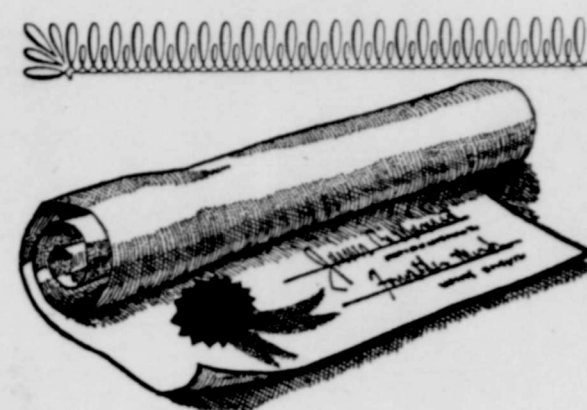
