Local man injured in one vehicle mishap

A local Colorado City man was seriously injured in a one-car incident early Friday morning around 1:19 a.m. on Hickory Street, said a spokesman from the Colorado City Police Department.

Gerry Hamilton was driving a late-model Ford pickup truck when it spun out of control and hit a light post, said one eyewitness.

Hamilton, 19, was transferred from Colorado City's Root Memorial Hospital, where he was initially taken to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital later Friday morning.

He was listed in guarded condition in Lubbock, according to a hospital spokesman. Hamilton is reported to have received injuries to the head and chest area.

The accident and cause is still under investigation by the CCPD. The officer on the scene was Bill Grimes.

Loraine mayor resigns post

The Loraine City Council accepted the resignation of recently elected Mayor Royce Beights and tentatively approved the 1984-85 budget during a meeting of the council Thursday night.

Beights, who resigned because of health reasons, stated in his letter of resignation that he would resign effective April 2, 1984. Council member and Mayor Pro Tem Tommy Green was appointed to fulfill the unexpired term of Mayor Beights. The oath of office for mayor was

given by City Secretary Kaye Nell Cornutt.

The City of Loraine's Budget was also tentatively approved during the meeting.

A Public Hearing will be held on the Budget and a grant application on May 3, 1984 at 8 p.m. at the City Hall.

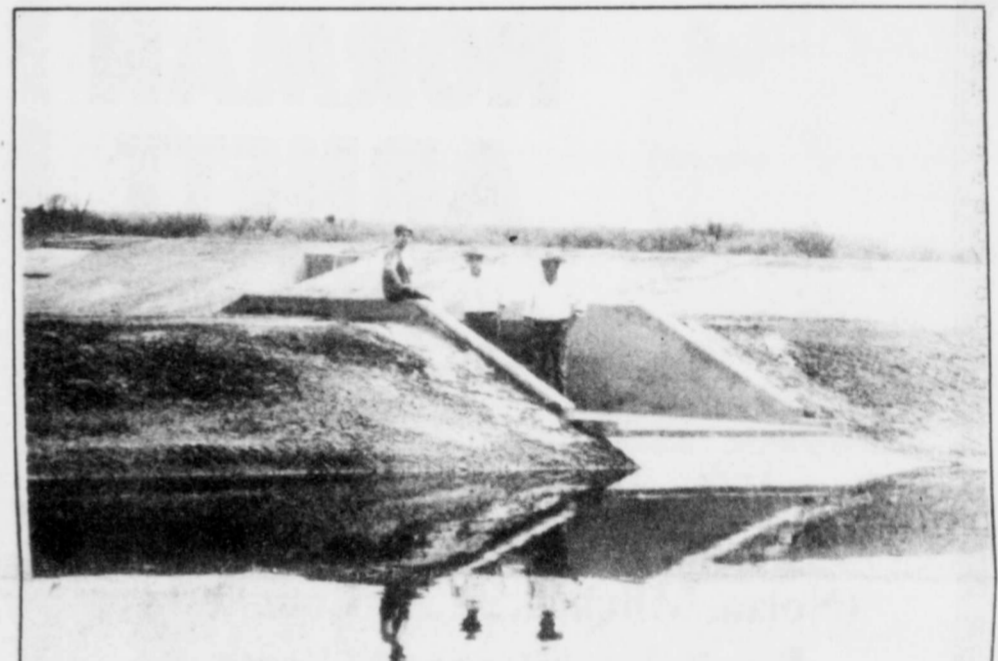
The Budget proposal for 1984-85 will include a minimal increase in water rates. The increase in revenue will be: 2,000 gallons-\$10; each additional thousand gallons will be current, \$1.25 per 1,000 gal., \$5 for sewer serve, \$5 for garbage

fees, \$1 fire truck, \$1 for landfill payment and expenses incurred toward a new landfill.

Loraine had accepted a contract with Freese and Nichols, Inc. to apply for a sewer grant with the Texas Department Community Affairs during a meeting April 13.

Loraine had earlier received a planning grant for \$22,500 which built a foundation for the larger grant, Secretary Cornutt said.

Dirt work on Phase 1 of sewer project completed

The final phase of the dirt work for the two holding ponds at the

Morris Hammond property has been completed, said City Water Works Superintendent Buzz Rich, who is working with the Colorado City Sewer Treatment Plant Project.

The two ponds are located two miles South of the city limits on land furnished by Morris Hammond.

Both ponds can hold 21 million gallons of water, said Rich. There is a

42-day detention period before the water has to be discharged, he said. Hammond will be using the discharge water to irrigate the land and fields, Rich said.

The two ponds are located adjacent to each other and two spillways separate the two ponds. The boards, which look like steps leading into the ponds, can be adjusted to let water in from the North pond into the South pond, Rich said.

The ponds have two outlets for irrigation purposes. The pond

child. The three persons are students at Colorado High School and are 17-years old.

Kenneth Kay Green, 27, was indicted for entering a habitation with the intent to commit aggravated assault. Green is of Colorado City. Green was also indicted and convicted on August 14, 1981 for an aggravated assault charge.

Brian Dale Williams was also indicted for theft of at least \$750 and not more than \$20,000 from James L. Williams. He was indicted on two charges from incidences occurring February 18 and another on March 10.

the plant, he said. The lift station consists of two 550 gallon a minute pumps which will pump water into the ponds.

Phase II of the Sewer Treatment Plant project will include the renovation of the primary clarifier, the trickling filter, the renovation of the final clarifier and the building of some new drying beds, Rich said.

The pump house will also be completely renovated at this time, he added. The cost of Phase II renovation and work will be \$322,000 with Phase I costing approximately the same amount.

The renovation included in both Phase I and Phase II will be a great asset to the city, Rich said.

"It should improve efficiency greatly," he said. "We will practically have a new plant, except for cement tanks and pump house. Everything else will be new."

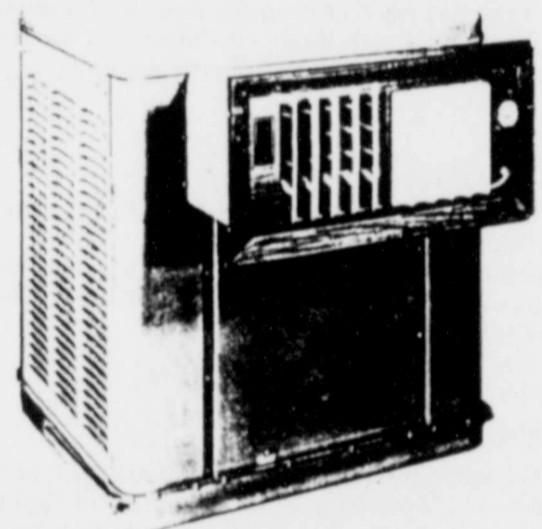

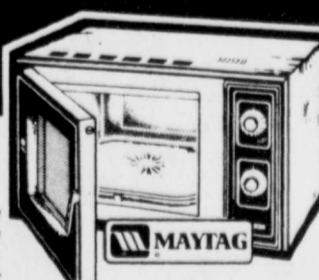

Once best; highways now in disrepair

Traffic congestion, overweight trucks, and delayed construction and maintenance programs have undermined Texas' mammoth highway system, once touted as the best in the nation.

One segment of Interstate 610 in Houston handles as many cars each day as the total population of Corpus Christi, according to a study prepared by the University of Texas Center for Transportation Research.

With another seven million people expected to move to Texas between now and the year 2000, state government can no longer afford to postpone badly needed highway projects.

Highways are designed to last for 20 years with regular maintenance and, after that point, must be totally rebuilt.

Texas has not kept pace with growth or the aging of its overall highway system, which now averages 20.5 years old. The state's farm-to-market roads lag even further behind with an average age of 22.7 years.

In 1982, the state surveyed its highway needs for a 20-year period and found it will cost \$61 billion to repair existing highways and build new ones to carry the state into the 21st Century.

Only \$4.8 billion would go to build highways at new locations, while the largest share, or \$35.2 billion, would pay to rebuild deteriorating roads. Another \$17.1 billion is needed over the next 20 years to rehabilitate and maintain existing highways.

A major boost in federal funding for Texas highway projects came in 1982 when Texas Sen.

Lloyd Bentsen amended the Surface Transportation Assistance Act to guarantee that 85 percent of all federal motor fuel taxes paid by Texas motorists is returned to the state. Last year's nickel-per-gallon increase in federal motor fuel taxes raised more dollars to construct and rehabilitate Texas' interstates and federal highways.

But none of this federal highway money can pay for work on state-built roads. Deterioration of state highways was aggravated by this year's freeze, which caused \$45 million more damage than occurs during a normal mild winter.

Complicating the problem is a requirement that all federal highway dollars be matched in kind with state dollars, leaving accounts for state-

ate-built roads close to empty.

Because highway and education funding require immediate attention, I will include both items on a special session legislative agenda early this summer.

I am pleased that Texas has a pay-as-you-go highway funding program, but user taxes and transfers from the state's General Revenue Fund has not kept pace with highway needs. New sources of highway funding are still under review.

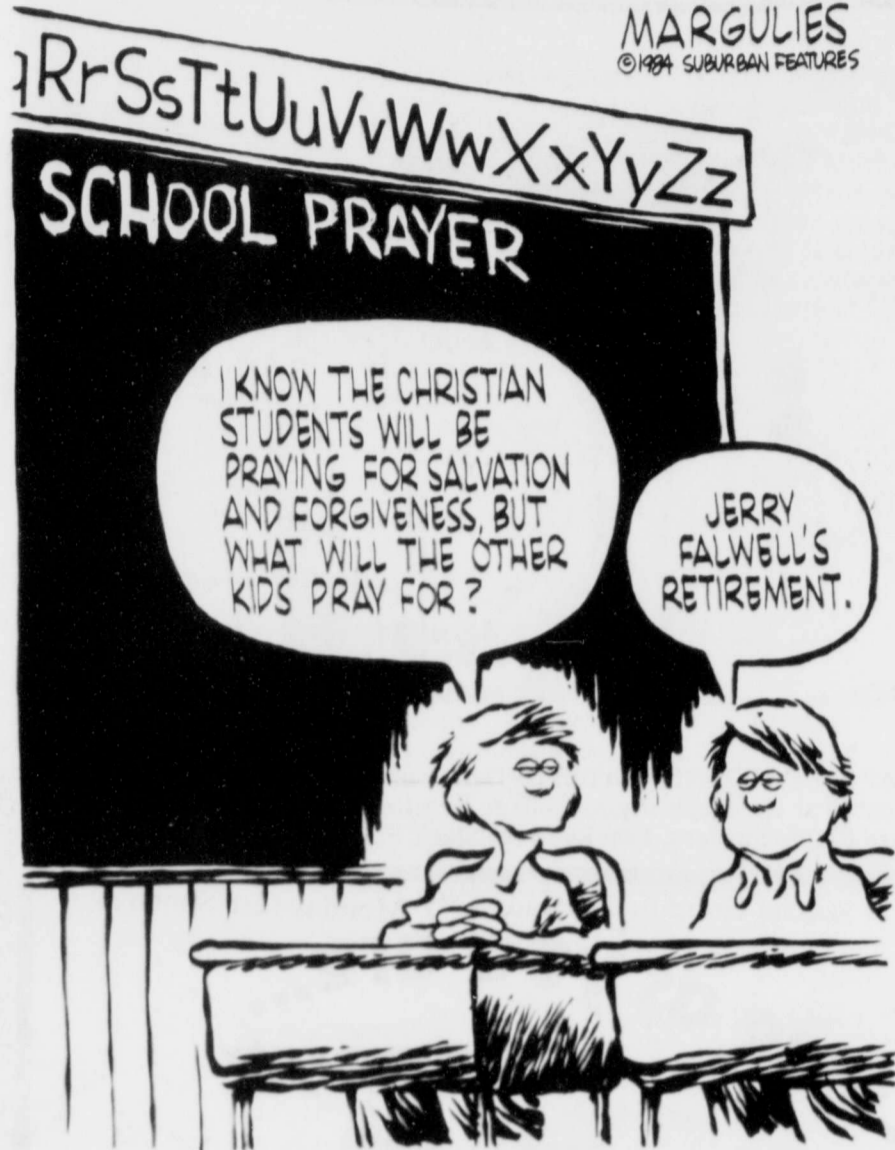
No study of highway needs would be complete without an assessment of the demand for public transportation, estimated to cost \$700 million in state funds between now and 2002. If that amount is appropriated, this state "seed money" would leverage federal and local funds

to raise a total \$5.4 billion for public transportation.

To prevent premature wear and tear on our state highways, the Texas Department of Public Safety must enforce weight restrictions for trucks. During the 1983 legislative session, I wrote state lawmakers in support of a bill to increase such enforcement and prevent Texas from losing more than \$340 million in federal highway funds.

The legislation passed and my staff is working to identify additional measures that could strengthen this enforcement effort.

By planning ahead for the orderly care and upgrading of Texas' highway system, we can better manage growth without being strangled by it.

Fighting over defense budget proves costly

The Constitution sets forth separate but equally important responsibilities for the executive and legislative branches of our government. But in recent years, the relationship between the two branches in the area of national security has been polarized to the extent that it has frustrated efforts to develop and execute balanced and stable defense programs.

This is particularly true in dealing with the

budget. Some in Congress have assumed an almost sanctimonious attitude that I believe vastly inflates our individual and collective competence.

Some members of Congress have begun ignoring Presidential budgets; not just parts of them, but whole budgets. Rather than working through the committee system, some ask the President to send up a "more realistic budget," or we barter back

and forth in highly informal, politicized and public "negotiations." Members of Congress, even freshman members, write their own prescriptive budgets for the entire federal government.

The role of Congressional oversight is important, but there are

limitations. We must recognize that senators and representatives are elected to serve individual constituencies, not

all Americans as is the President. We need Presidential leadership. We cannot function as 535 "maverick" representatives poised to act as a second executive branch.

In dealing with defense, Congressional intrusion has elevated the cost of many programs. The innumerable restrictions placed on defense programs often amount to Congressionally-mandated waste. Many

of the restrictions are outdated and ineffective. It is interesting to note that while Congress has never had a stronger grip on defense management than it has today, we have never complained louder about waste, fraud and abuse.

Arms control is another example of how our responsibilities of Congressional oversight are taken to extreme areas far removed from

our immediate Constitutional duties. Too few can resist the temptation to publicly advise the President on how to negotiate with the Soviet Union and to propose their own schemes for arms control.

This type of Congressional intrusion is detrimental to our negotiations with the Soviets. Many times this Congressional intrusion is politically motivated. Since our structure prevents us from develop-

ing a cohesive Congressional alternative foreign policy, Congress too often finds itself thwarting presidential initiatives but unable to advise U.S. interests in a positive manner.

It is time for Congress to compare its Constitutional roots with current Congressional practices and consider legislative reforms such as a reorganization of the Committee system and the Congressional budget process, to remove un-

necessary layering and overlapping jurisdictions.

Further, we must exercise the leadership required to rebuild a bipartisan consensus on defense and foreign policy. I hope that we in Congress and the Administration can approach this problem with open minds. Together, we can meet our Constitutional obligation to provide for the common defense.

Residents ask about clover mites

Clover mites are a nuisance pest that have been seen indoors by several Mitchell County residents in the past few weeks. They are tiny, smaller than pinhead, reddish or brown with eight legs. They are not insects since insects have only six legs.

The best distinguishing feature is the pair of front legs that are longer than the body and about twice the length of the other legs. When crushed, they leave a reddish stain that is especially noticeable on white surfaces.

They feed on grasses, trees, and shrubs around buildings and on lawns. Clover mites may enter homes when their host plants have

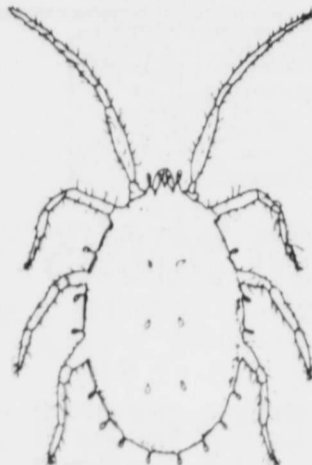
been removed (adjacent fields cut or plants dried up by dry weather) or when the weather turns cold.

The mite develops from egg to larvae into two different nymphal stages to adult. The young mites may sometimes be seen in such numbers on the bark of trees, rocks, and cracks and crevices of foundation walls as to give the appearance of brick dust.

Although the mite may appear on floors, furniture, windowpanes, beds and clothing they will not bite people, transmit diseases or feed on household furnishings or pantry supplies.

If you have infestation in the home, control

should be carried out in the home and outside the home. Outdoors a grass-free strip, 18 to 24 inches wide around the foundation may be maintained or treatment of lower exterior walls, foundation and a 10 to 20

foot wide strip of adjacent lawn. If infestations are heavy an additional application may be required in seven to 10 days. Chemicals recommended for use are Dursban(R), diazinon, Kelthane(R), or Malathion.

Indoors, cracks around doors, windows and other places mites may enter should be sealed. A vacuum cleaner may be used to pick up live mites. The dust bag should be sealed and disposed of to prevent mites from escaping and reinfesting homes. Spot treatments with Baygon(R), diazinon, Dursban(R), or malathion may be applied to base boards, around windows and

doors, and between windows and screens.

To be effective treatment should be made both indoors and outdoors. Labels on pesticides should always be read and followed.

Benson attends workshop

Bob Benson, Mitchell County Agricultural Extension Agent was one of 23 Extension Agents from District 7 attending a special agricultural agent's training workshop April 12 and 13 at the Texas Agricultural Extension and Research Center in San Angelo.

The workshop, the first of its kind in the district, was aimed at acquainting the agents with the latest developments in the agricultural chemical field. Presenting the program were representatives from 18 commercial chemical companies. The program covered topics ranging from chemicals applicable for use in controlling noxious weeds and brush to livestock pests and pesticides which affect crop production.

ASCS News

These reminders are from Don Stewart with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

Congress passed the Agricultural Programs Adjustment Act of 1984, reopening the 1984 wheat sign-up April 16-May 4. Operators of farms with a wheat base who did not previously sign-up in the ARP or PIK wheat program may now sign up.

The previously required 30 percent unpaid wheat acreage reduction has been replaced with a combination of paid diversion for 10 percent of a farm's acreage base and a 20 percent unpaid acreage reduction requirement.

The diversion rate payment is \$.70 per bushel. Producers may hay and graze wheat acreage indefinitely, if they are currently enrolled in a 1984 cotton, feed grain, or wheat program.

Also, any wheat seeded before January 12, 1984 qualifies for ACR acreage, and may be hayed or grazed.

Rules now require terraces to meet the minimum width of one chain (66 ft.) and contain five acres in size to be eligible for ACR. This is the same requirement for all plots of ACR. (You may have one plot that does not meet the requirement.)

The second sign-up for Agricultural Conserva-

tion Program (ACP) begins May 1 and ends May 16. Practices covered under this program include grass seeding, brush control, building terraces, ponds and waterways.

The final sales closing date for cotton and grain sorghum has been extended to April 30. Before you can purchase insurance, you must file a request in our office for an actual yield determination.

You need to make this request as soon as possible so that our office can figure them. A list of sales agents is available at the ASCS office.

Producers must certify small feed grains by May 1.

Anyone who has oats, wheat, or barley that was damaged must file a disaster report.

Steak & potatoes leads to other things

2 lbs. carrots, sliced and cooked

1 can tomato soup
Two-thirds cup sugar
1 cup vegetable oil
3/4 cup vinegar, light or dark

1 medium green pepper, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped

1 tablespoon dry mustard

1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Tall can sliced mushrooms

While carrots are cooking, chop pepper and onion. Mix other ingredients and add carrots and pepper and onion. Store in refrigerator for several hours before serving. Best if made the day before. Keeps well for quite a few days—if it lasts that long.

HOMINY CASSEROLE
1 can hominy—white or yellow

1 can whole kernel corn
1 can Cream of Mushroom Soup, undiluted
Chopped green chilies to taste

1 can sliced mushrooms

Drain hominy and corn. Place in greased casserole. Stir in soup and green chilies. Sprinkle cheese on top and bake at 350 degrees till cheese is melted and casserole bubbles. My family thinks this is snack food.

3 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons cinnamon
2 teaspoons baking soda

1 cup vegetable oil
2 cups flour
1 cup mango juice
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup coconut

Beat eggs well and add cinnamon, soda, salt, sugar and vanilla. Stir in oil. Alternately add flour and mango juice. Stir in nuts and coconut. Bake in floured tube pan for about 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Test for doneness. Remove from pan when done, then re-cover with pan till cake is cool. Very good for Thanksgiving, Christmas or anytime.

Varsity, JV Wolves nab District 6-3A track crown

How do you explain such a thing?

Prior to last Thursday's district 6-3A track meet, Colorado City coach Rick Robinson actually tried to make people believe the Wolves didn't figure into the chase for the team championship.

"I think Sonora has the depth," he said. "We're hurting in the field events," said Robinson.

He event went as far as to put all the pressure on the junior varsity squad, saying they "Should" win, and they did.

It became evident that Robinson had deliberately played down the varsity's chances when he and the rest of

the Colorado City coaches were spotted grinning ear to ear even before the running of the final event—the 1600 meter relay.

The Wolves placed third in the event, but could have skipped the event because the district crown was already theirs—thanks to glittering performances by the "hurting" field event specialists and a strong show of depth in both the field and running events.

Junior Don Randle quickly set the tone for Colorado City's efforts.

Randle won the high jump by clearing 6'4"—four inches better than his previous best and threatened to go higher, barely missing twice at

6'5". Then came big Fred Dakan. Throughout the season, Dakan had to be satisfied with one second place finish after another with 49 feet throws.

Reaching for that something extra inside him, Dakan uncorked a heave of 51'9" to win the event and propel himself among the area leaders.

Behind the two firsts, Colorado City found itself in a surprising 45 to 32 lead over Crane following the field events.

Or was it surprising, Coach Robinson?

Another very bright performance came from the 400 meter relay team of Larry Hamilton, Perry Conner, Kev-

in Norman and Joey Ritchey.

The foursome, fresh from setting a school record 44.3 at Kermit's Permian Basin Relays the week before, took advantage of a Crane baton drop to win the event and further lower the record to an impressive 43.88.

Norman also qualified for regional in the 100 meter dash—taking second in 11.28. Also making the trip to regional will be CHS senior Jay Claxton, who took second in the 3200 with a 10:35.94 clocking.

Credit for the district championship should go to the whole team though.

The squad hungrily hoarded the points in most of the events and were paced by third place finishes by Hamilton in the long jump (19'0"), Armando Rivera in the pole vault (12'6"), Dennis Rivera in the 110 hurdles (16.01), Randle in the 800 (2:03.19) and the 1600 relay of Mike Ligon, Perry Conner, Randle and Norman (3:33.88).

In the junior varsity division, the Wolves overcame a strong field event showing by both Crane and Sonora, and as expected, edged the Golden Cranes 173½ to 162 in the team standings.

Through the Pack got only one first and one second in the field events, Stu Howell in the pole vault (11'0") and Ricky Salazar in the shotput (37'11½") respectively, Colorado

City blazed through the running events.

The Wolves got first, second and third in the 400 dash from Domingo Salazar (54.75), Jerry Salazar (55.75) and Jimmy Thompson (55.83); first and second in the 100 from Ralph Gonzales (12.12) and David Birmingham (12.19); first from the 400 meter relay of Larry Mayes, D. Salazar, R. Gonzales and Thompson (46.04) and from the 1600 relay of D. Salazar, Mike Swann, J. Salazar and Thompson (3:42.62).

Second places came from Sammy Martinez in the 800 (2:12.03); Swann in the 300 hurdles (44.53); Birmingham in the 200 (23.99) and Scott Dennis in the 1600 (5:12.25).

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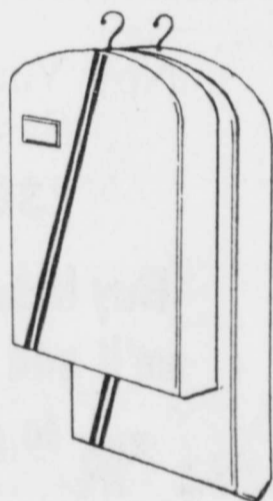
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Six to make Austin trip

Williams got the baton in fourth place but quickly blew by the runners from Littlefield and Coleman and narrowly missed catching front runner Breckenridge.

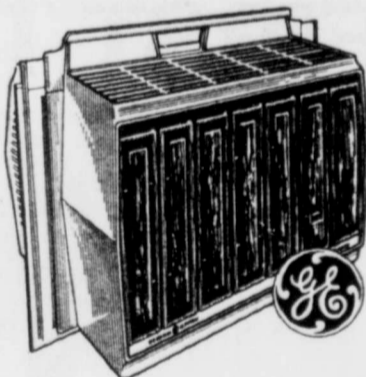
In a photo finish result, the Buckaroos edged the Wolves 50.18 to 50.2.

The relay members felt they could and should have beaten Breckenridge, were it not for some shaky handoffs.

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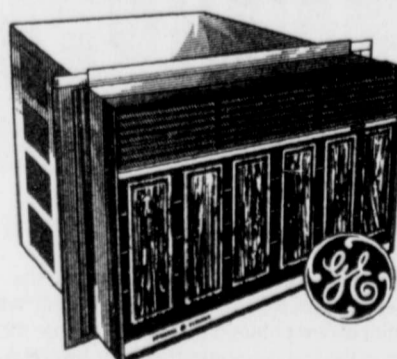
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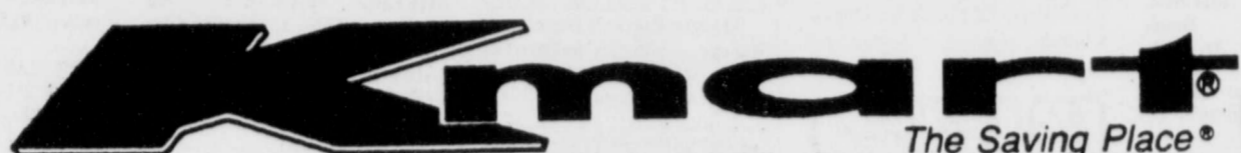
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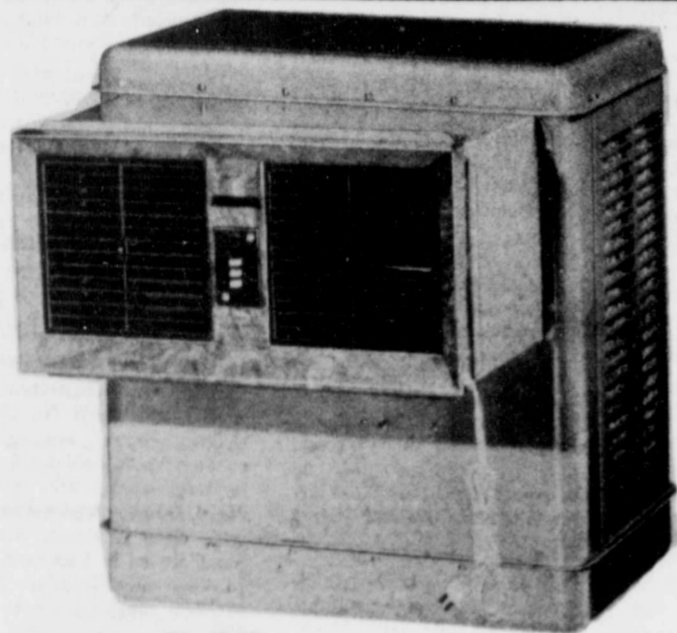

A HEALTHY YOU

We are told by doctors and psychologists that there is no single or simple reason why so many Americans are too fat and why so many carefully planned diets and exercise programs fail. It has been estimated that at any given time, some 10 to 20 million Americans are dieting to lose weight and millions more probably should. Older persons should be particularly conscious of being a normal weight as hypertension, heart trouble, diabetes and other ailments are more prone to settle in their bodies. It is now being established, what we long felt to be true, that some people retain fat and build up fat cells faster and longer than other people. It is a comforting thought and an excuse for us who tend to be heavy but we still must try to be thinner for good health.

Why are we fat? Why do we overeat? There are so many reasons. Yours may be one reason, yours may be several. Many programs fail because the dieter simply doesn't have a strong enough desire to lose weight by eating less and or by exercising more. Some men and women unconsciously use their fatness as a way of protecting themselves from the opposite sex. They feel that persons who are obese are less likely to have advances made to them by the opposite sex. Other dieters feel a psychological need for self-

punishment. They are annoyed with themselves and may express their anger (or guilt) by doing something to harm themselves like overindulging in chocolates and disregarding their diet.

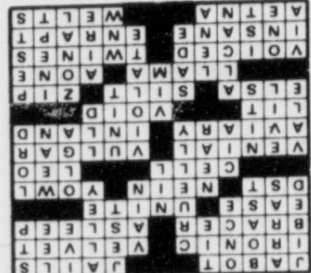

The relationship between mother and child is an emotional experience. Our first activities as babies is sucking and swallowing. Many of us use food for emotional reasons, rather than because of physical need.

People with these extra fat cells have a biological need as well as a psychological need for food. It makes their dieting harder. 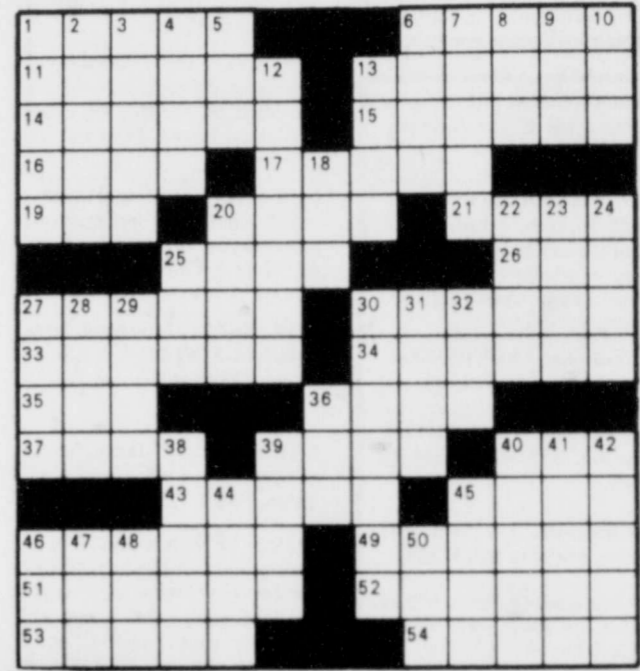
