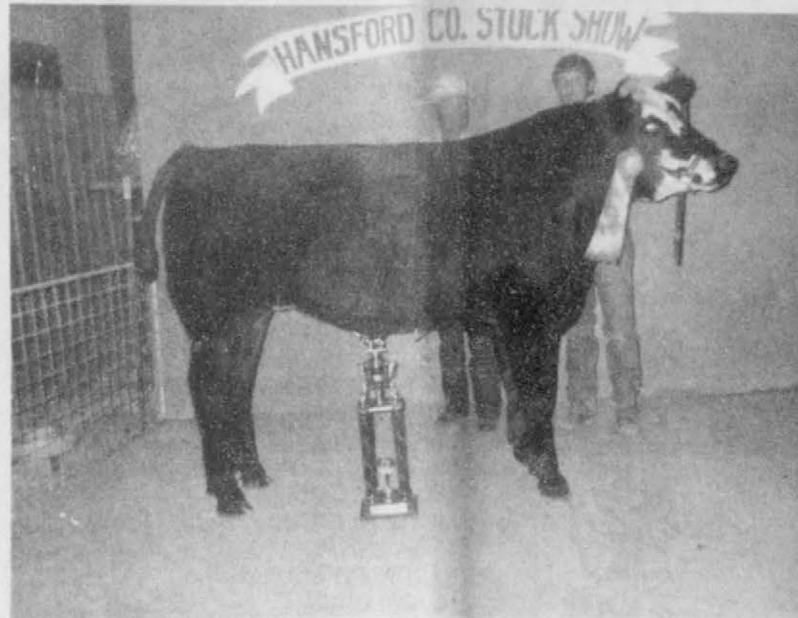

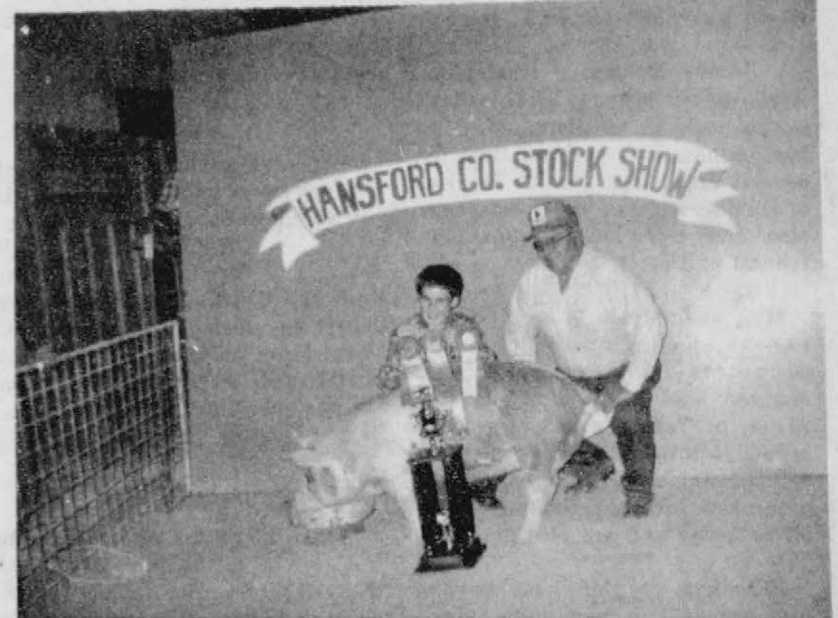

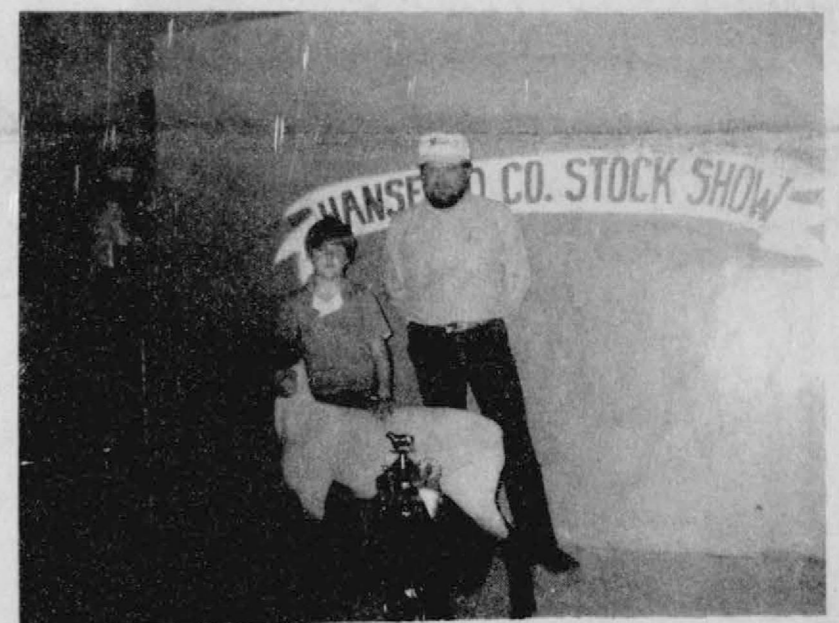

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1985, you won't need to apply again for 1986 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1986.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1986. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

EMS News

You're scared. Suddenly, without warning, you're in pain, or you can't breathe, or you feel so weak that you collapse. You think maybe it's not so bad. It'll go away. But it doesn't. You don't know what to do.

"Call the Emergency Medical Services," says Ed Williamson, director for the H & S Emergency Medical Service (EMS). "That's what we're here for, so you can get help when you need it. Just dial 659-3707, and an ambulance staffed with trained people who know what to do will be there."

"Anytime there's a severe, sudden, or unexpected change in how you feel or how you're able to function can be considered an emergency," says Williamson.

"It can happen to you, or to someone you love-- and it's frightening. But getting help fast is the most important part of saving that life."

"Many people don't get help as quickly as they need it because they're hesitant to call an ambulance," says Romeo Sangalang, M.D., medical director for the Spearman EMS program.

"One reason people don't call is that they're not sure if they're sick enough to need emergency care," says Dr. Sangalang. "They think they'll be embarrassed if the problem turns out to be a minor one and they don't want to put doctors, nurses and the ambulance attendants to a lot of trouble for nothing."

"But since prompt care is so important," he says, "it's a person's duty to himself and his loved ones to learn to recognize symptoms of emergency situations, so he can call for help."

Dr. Sangalang explains some of the more common emergencies and how they feel:

Heart Attack causes severe pain, pressure or squeezing in the center of the chest. The pain may spread to the shoulder, neck, arms, jaw or back. The victim may also have shortness of breath, nausea, sweating or feelings of weakness and restlessness.

Choking is an emergency when the person is unable to speak, breath or swallow. The person may turn blue in the face and/or collapse. Other respiratory difficulties cause similar

symptoms--gaspings, a different rate of breathing, foaming from the mouth and a blue tinge to the skin, tongue, lips and nails.

Hemorrhage is excessive, uncontrollable bleeding, or any bleeding from the eyes or ears.

Stroke causes a sudden, rapid loss of ability to move one side of the body. There's a feeling of weakness complicated by slow breathing in which the cheeks puff and the mouth sags. The victim is usually in a state of confusion and his speech isn't clear.

Fractures or broken bones are present when there is pain, tenderness, swelling and bruising. Bone ends may be exposed or the broken part of the body, such as the arm, may be twisted in a strange manner. The patient may not be able to move or feel anything in the area of the break.

Burns are serious enough to call an ambulance when there is a deep reddening of the skin and formation of blisters or when the skin is whitened or charred. Other burns can be treated promptly at home or by a doctor.

Poisoning causes a variety of symp-

toms, depending on what the cause is. They include nausea, vomiting and cramping; unexplained collapse, shortness of breath or swelling of the skin. Dr. Sangalang stresses that you should look for and keep any suspected poison in its container so emergency care personnel will know how to treat the patient.

Convulsions demand immediate attention when the patient has repeated fits or seizures without regaining consciousness. A single convulsion can be waited out and the patient taken to a doctor afterwards.

Allergic reactions include itching, burning, skin and swelling of the face and tongue. The victim's lips may turn blue and he may faint or have difficulty breathing.

Unexplained sleepiness, failure to hear or respond, confusion or change in behavior, can also be emergency symptoms.

"The rule of thumb is: When in doubt, call the EMS ambulance," says Dr. Sangalang. "Don't hesitate because you think it's not serious enough."

"We'd alot rather give help to someone who could have waited a few minutes than not reach someone in time."

¿Cuáles exenciones están disponibles?

Los distritos escolares ofrecen una exención de residencia a todos los dueños de hogar y exenciones adicionales para personas incapacitadas o personas de 65 años de edad o más.

Los condados ofrecen exenciones de residencia de los impuestos dedicados a las carreteras de granja a mercado y al control de inundaciones. Algunos condados también ofrecen exenciones adicionales a ancianos y personas incapacitadas.

Las ciudades y otros gobiernos locales pueden ofrecer exenciones adicionales a ancianos y personas incapacitadas.

Todos los gobiernos locales ofrecen una exención a veteranos incapacitados que cumplan con los requisitos a cierta propiedad designada.

Además, los gobiernos locales pueden conceder un tanto por ciento en las exenciones de residencia a los dueños de residencias hogares.

¿Cómo puede solicitarse?

Si usted recibió una exención de residencia para su residencia actual en 1985, no es necesario hacer una solicitud nueva para 1986 en este distrito de valuación.

Si usted tenía 65 años de edad o

fue incapacitado el 1º de enero y no había solicitado previamente para exenciones de incapacidad o de 65 años, necesita llenar un formulario nuevo este año.


O, si usted nunca ha recibido exención de residencia en su hogar actual, necesita hacer una solicitud original en 1986.

Solicitudes para estas exenciones deberían hacerse en la oficina del distrito de valuación de su condado, la cual se ubica en la dirección escrita abajo. También, formularios de exenciones en español se encuentran disponibles en la oficina del distrito de valuación.

¿Hay un límite de tiempo?

Para el año 1986, debería solicitarse antes del 1º de mayo. Aunque se aceptan solicitudes tardes en ciertas instancias, al solicitarlas antes del 1º de mayo usted podrá proteger sus derechos.

La Oficina Estatal de Impuestos sobre la Propiedad (State Property Tax Board) ahora tiene un folleto en español, *Los Derechos, los Remedios y las Responsabilidades del Contribuyente a los Impuestos*, que puede ayudarle a comprender sus impuestos locales sobre la propiedad. Puede obtenerse una copia gratuita en la oficina de su distrito de valuación o por medio de la Oficina Estatal de Impuestos sobre la Propiedad en Austin.

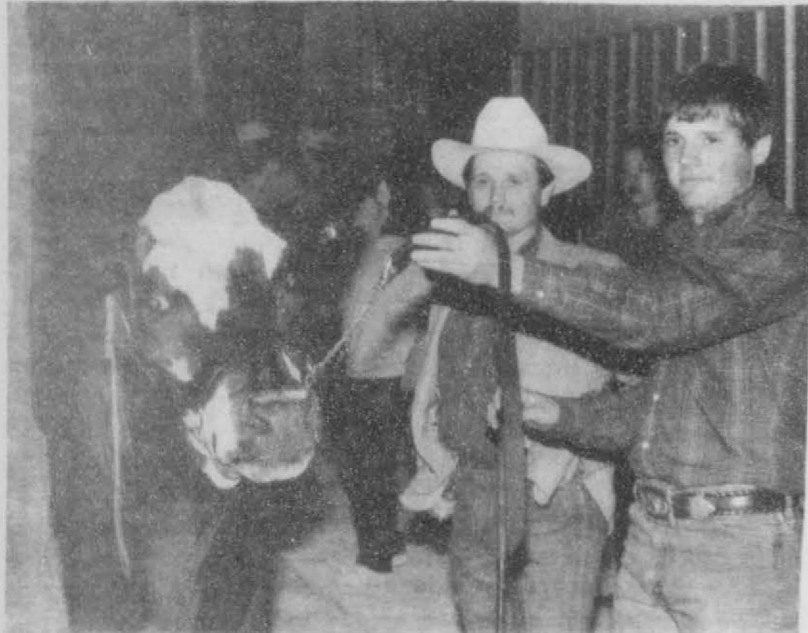
Ella Buschman

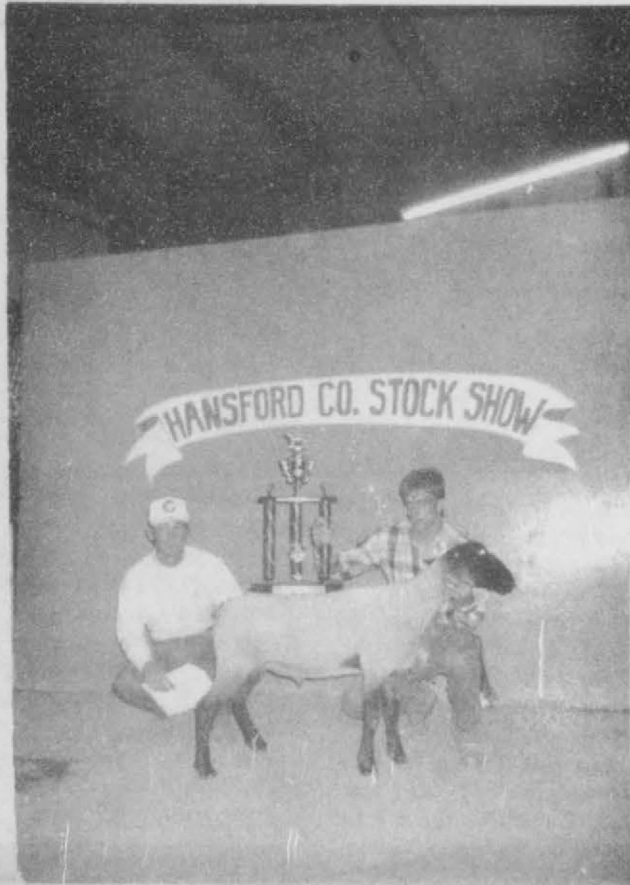
