

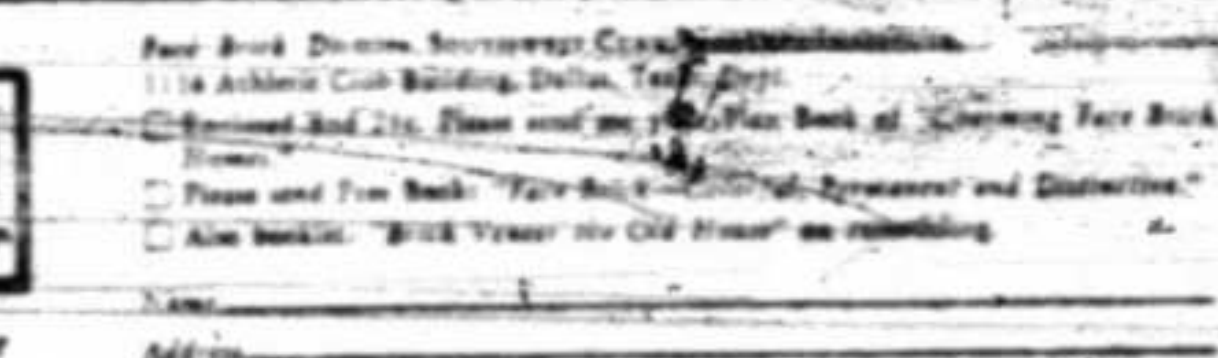

U. S. MEN TO AID IN SOUTH

DEPARTMENT TO GIVE EDUCATIONAL AID TO SOUTHLAND

The United States department of agriculture has announced that agricultural extension service in the 16 cotton-growing states, which includes more than 1,200 county agents, will cooperate in an educational way with the Farm Board in the plan to secure orderly marketing of the present cotton crop.

"By delivering cotton to a state cooperative cotton marketing association instead of selling it on the open market, the grower can now get almost the present local selling price as an immediate advance from the association," says J. A. Evans, assistant chief of the department office of Cooperative Extension Work and regional agent in charge of extension work in the Southern States, participating on the board's announcement. "This advance to the grower is made possible by primary loans obtained from the Federal Intermediate Credit banks and from other sources and by the supplemental loans which the Federal Farm Board stands ready to make to these cooperative associations. In addition, when the cotton is finally sold the grower has reasonable expectations of obtaining a considerable advance over the price which the cotton crop could bring if marketed in an ordinary way. The success of the plan depends entirely on the action of the farmers themselves."

SENTIMENT ON ROADS STRONG

AWSON COUNTY BONDS PROJECT HAS GOOD OUTLOOK

LAMESA, Oct. 30.—According to Henry J. Price, president of the Lawson County Good Roads association, the public sentiment for the road surfacing program outlined by the association is just turning in favor of the program.

In a statement this week issued by Mr. Price he said: "If the election as now I believe the issue would be to have from 300 to 400 people under the organization set up working for the project and we are working for 80 per cent of the vote." The petition now being circulated will be in the hands of the commissioners court Tuesday of next week and call for a bond issue of \$1,250,000.

NINE FORMER GERMAN SOLDIERS ARE BUDDIES OF YANKS IN NEW YORK LEGION POST; LOYAL TO ADOPTED NATION

LANCASTER, N. Y., Oct. 30.—As far as this pleasant city is concerned, the World War and its international rivalries have been completely forgotten.

Nine former members of the Imperial German Army of Wilhelm II. living in Lancaster, have established themselves as the boon companions of the former doughboys, gobs and leathernecks of the local American Legion.

Ever since last Memorial Day, when the Legionnaires invited the former German soldiers to march with them in the parade, the German war veterans have been buddies of their former enemies. A number of them have attended meetings of the Legion post here, and all of them have been entertained in the homes of the Legion men.

One of the Germans is Richard Engelfried, who was at one time known as the youngest pilot in the German air forces. He spoke at a Legion meeting recently, describing his experiences as a member of a German combat patrol on the eastern front. It happened that all of Engelfried's service was against the Russians, so that none of his war endeavors had been directed against the Americans who made up his audience.

Engelfried expects to get his final American citizenship papers soon, and as soon as he has them hopes to enter some branch of aviation.

The other eight German veterans served in the infantry, artillery and machine gun battalions. Three of them bear wounds sustained in action, and five of them are proud possessors of the Iron Cross.

Karl Brunning, late of the "suicide squad" as the machine companies in the German army are called, is the original hard luck member of the group. He was wounded three times, the last wound being received on the morning of Nov. 11, 1918, a brief hour or so before the armistice ended all hostilities. This last wound nearly cost him his life, and he was kept in a hospital for a year by it.

Two of the men have their final American citizenship papers, and all the rest have their first papers. They are establishing themselves here as industrious hard-working residents, and Lancaster is glad of their presence. George Koehnlein, who saw service in France and Russia, was wounded and won an Iron Cross. He is a butcher. August Spaeth, who fought in France, Russia, Serbia and Italy, is a baker.

Other members of the group are Gustave Boch, a former non-commissioned officer, who holds both the Iron Cross and the Wurttemberg Medal; Bert Rataycyak, who served in France and Russia and won the Iron Cross; Albert Penocny, who was decorated for bravery on the Russian front; Frederick Burgin and Karl Fries.

All of these men intend to make their permanent homes here, and are very loyal to the land of their adoption. And they are, one and all,

TWITTY SAYS LUBBOCK IS PENALIZED THROUGH ITS FIRE INSURANCE RATE

"Lubbock is being unjustifiably penalized by the present key rate of the city," Fire Chief W. E. Twitty expressed this morning, after a comparative study of rates over the state.

The present key rate of the city is 30 cents, following a 2 cent reduction this year.

Amarillo's key rate, said Chief Twitty, "is 16 cents. That city is given credit, of course, for its fire alarm system, which creates a 4-cent reduction. Abilene's key rate is 21 cents, while the larger cities have rates ranging from 18 to 17 cents."

"Our firefighting apparatus, the personnel of the department and the water supply are up to standard," he continued. "We also have a

building code, for which other cities receive an 8-cent reduction in the basic rate, and are receiving no credit.

The fire insurance commission has pointed with disapproval to a few frame buildings in the mercantile district, but such a situation prevails in practically all the other cities which enjoy nominal key rates.

"I should like to know why our key rate is so high."

Each one-cent reduction in Lubbock's key rate means an annual saving of approximately \$7,000 in fire insurance premiums. The city is paying about \$153,000 annually in premiums.

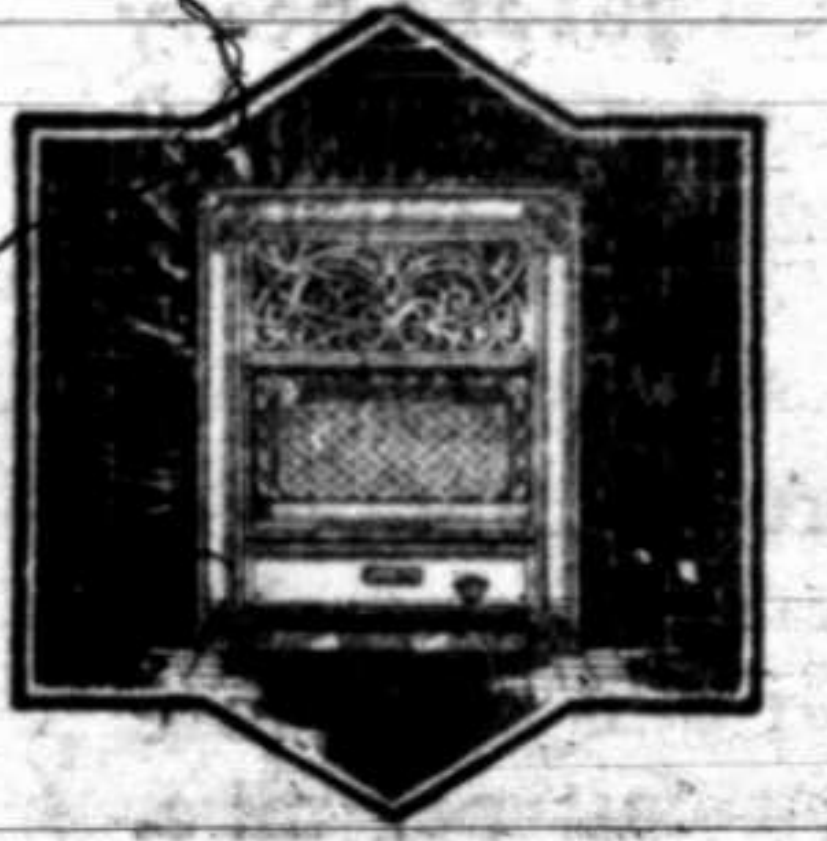

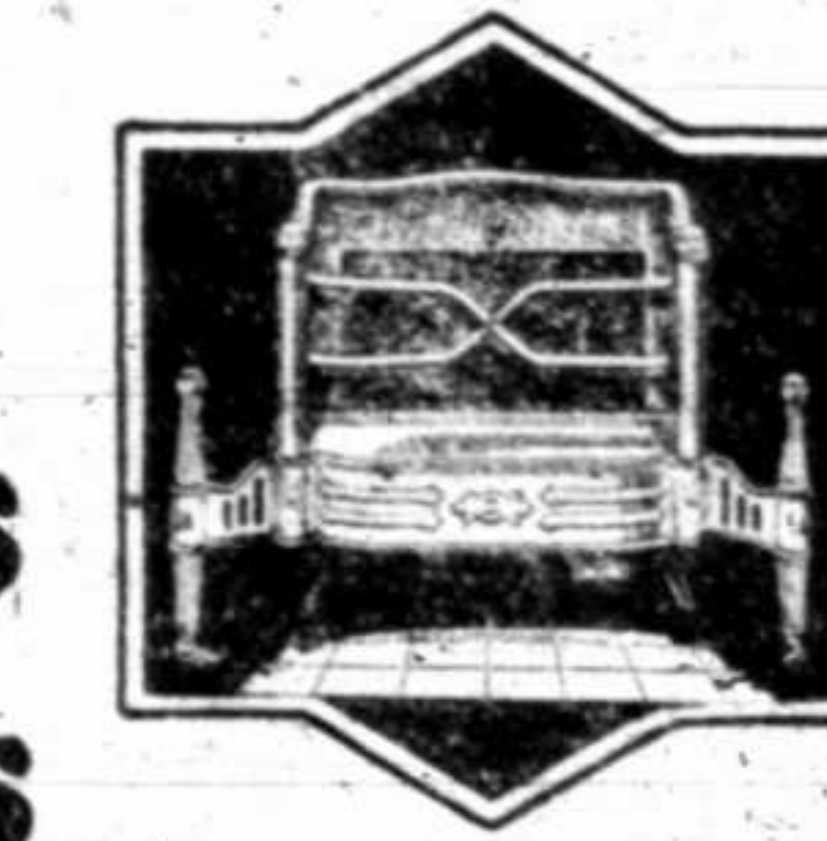

MILK STRIKE
IN CITY ENDSFRICTION IS CLOSED
WITH AGREEMENT
AMONG DEALERS

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, Oct. 30.—A
milk strike which has been char-
acterized by sabotage, threats and
the arrest of dairymen who used
violence ended today when pro-
ducers and distributors agreed to a
compromise.

Regular milk deliveries at the old
wholesale price began today to
pasteurization plants.
A production cost fact finding
investigation was promised by the
arbitration committee. A commit-
tee of nine persons, according to
terms of the pact, will be named to
study the results of the investiga-
tion. This committee will then
make price recommendations which
the warring factions have agreed to
accept.

Thousands of gallons of milk were
dumped from motor trucks by
bands of farmers during the strike.
Many arrests were made. Cases
against these four farmers were dis-
missed today in justice court when a
truck driver, alleged assault victim,
did not appear to prosecute.

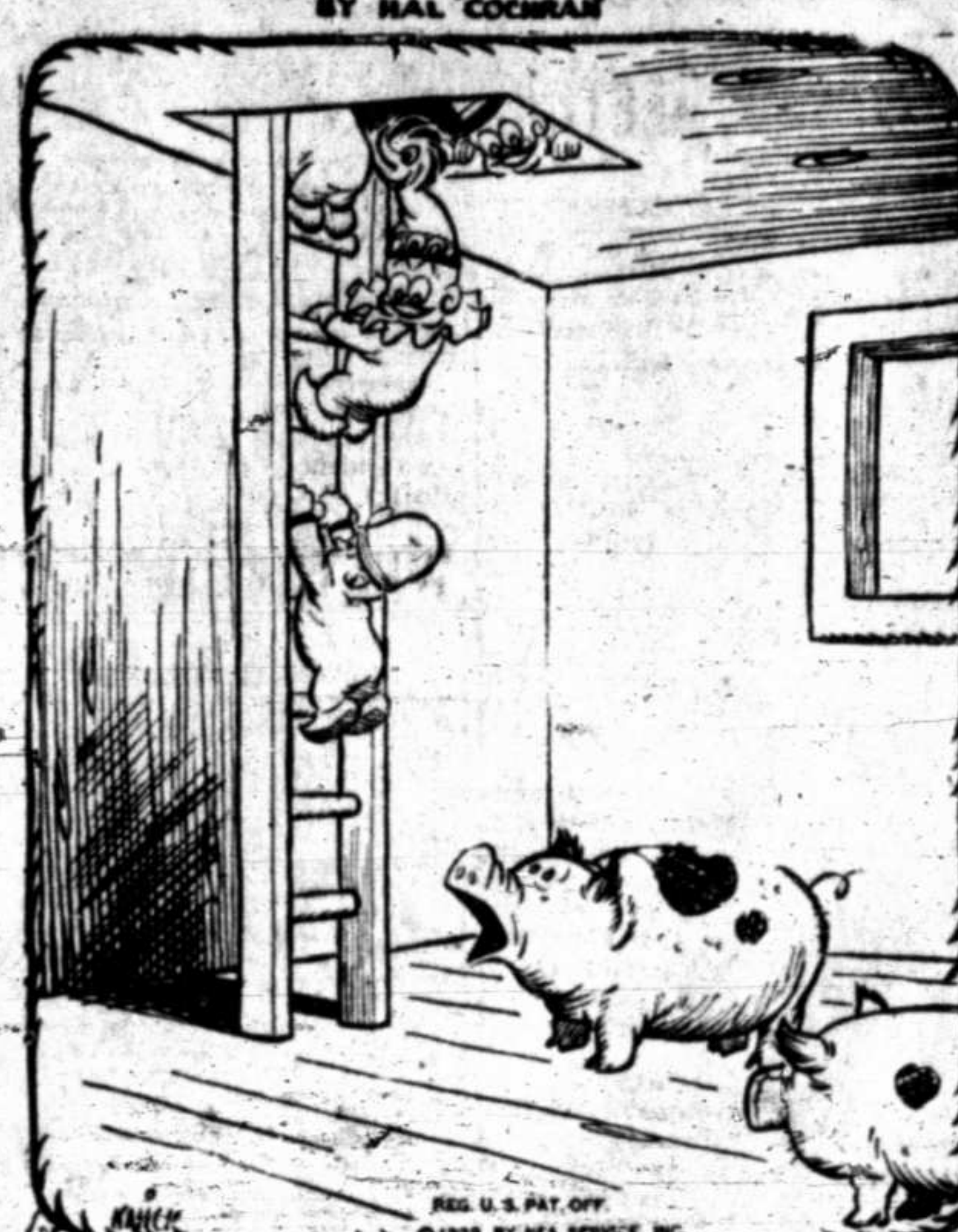
Aviatrix Is Held

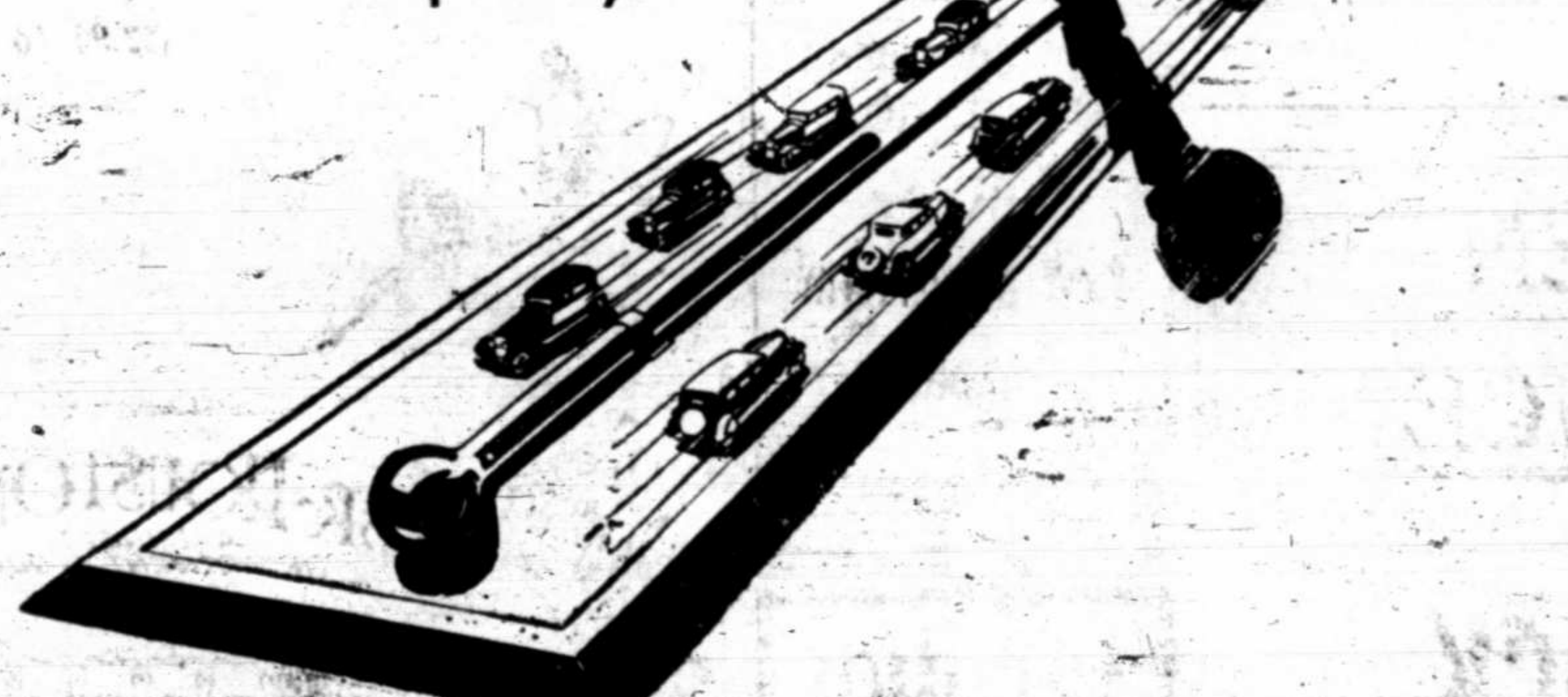

MATADORS WORK ON STRONGER OFFENSE FOR BAYLOR GAME

WESTERNERS PRIMED FOR SEASON'S CLASH WITH AMARILLO

TECH SQUAD TO ATTEMPT DOPE UPSET

NEW MEN TO BE SEEN IN ACTION IN WACO ON SATURDAY

Matador football warriors of Tech left no track of evidence Tuesday afternoon that they intend to be defeated Saturday when they meet the Baylor University Bears on the Cotton Palace gridiron in Waco.

The unmistakable evidence of conquest occurred when the varsity tackled the freshman gridiron in scrimmage practice and displayed more drive and speed than has been shown on Tech field all season.

With their offense clicking impressively, Coaches Higginbotham and Payne put several new backfield combinations into operation yesterday with the result that Matador stock has taken a decided rise over night.

Men who have failed to break into the lineup for the past three games took their turn in the varsity backfield yesterday.

It is expected that the Matador starting lineup will carry a number of new names Saturday. One of these is Julius Bergfelt, hard driving fullback, who literally tore the freshman line to ribbons. Bergfelt's injection into the fullback position followed the shift of Clarence Rodger from fullback to one of the halfback posts. Charley Woodridge, the other fullback, remains at his regular post.

Paul Hill, halfback, capable of turning and passing with equal alertness, is another leather totter who is likely to see service Saturday in the skirmish on the Cotton Palace gridiron. Hill has shown considerable improvement recently, and may get the opportunity to win his spurs in this week's tussle with the conference eleven.

The Matadors face the opportunity of gaining the attention of the entire southwest this week as they take on their second Southwest conference foe in as many weeks. Although counted as one of the stern contenders for the conference title, the Bears boast an entirely different style of attack from that of the Horned Frogs, and the Tech eleven is expected to be a tough nut to crack.

Twenty five squad members will make the trip to Waco on the special train which leaves here Friday night at 7:30. Coaches Higginbotham and Payne, together with Manager Martin T. Warlick will accompany the club.

Major Cavanaugh, an alumnus of Dartmouth, coached some formidable teams for the Green. In 1917 he went to the wars with the 102d Air Artillery. Up somewhere in Belgium he ran afoul of a few sharpshooters and has been earning metal souvenirs hidden in his body ever since.

He has taught his undefeated Fordham team—conquerors of New York University and Holy Cross, among others—"his stuff." That is the stuff he thought out while back in the trenches—those long nights.

It is the same as Rockne's stuff in the football game. The players catch the major's spirit, a win-or-lose spirit. This year they have been winning.

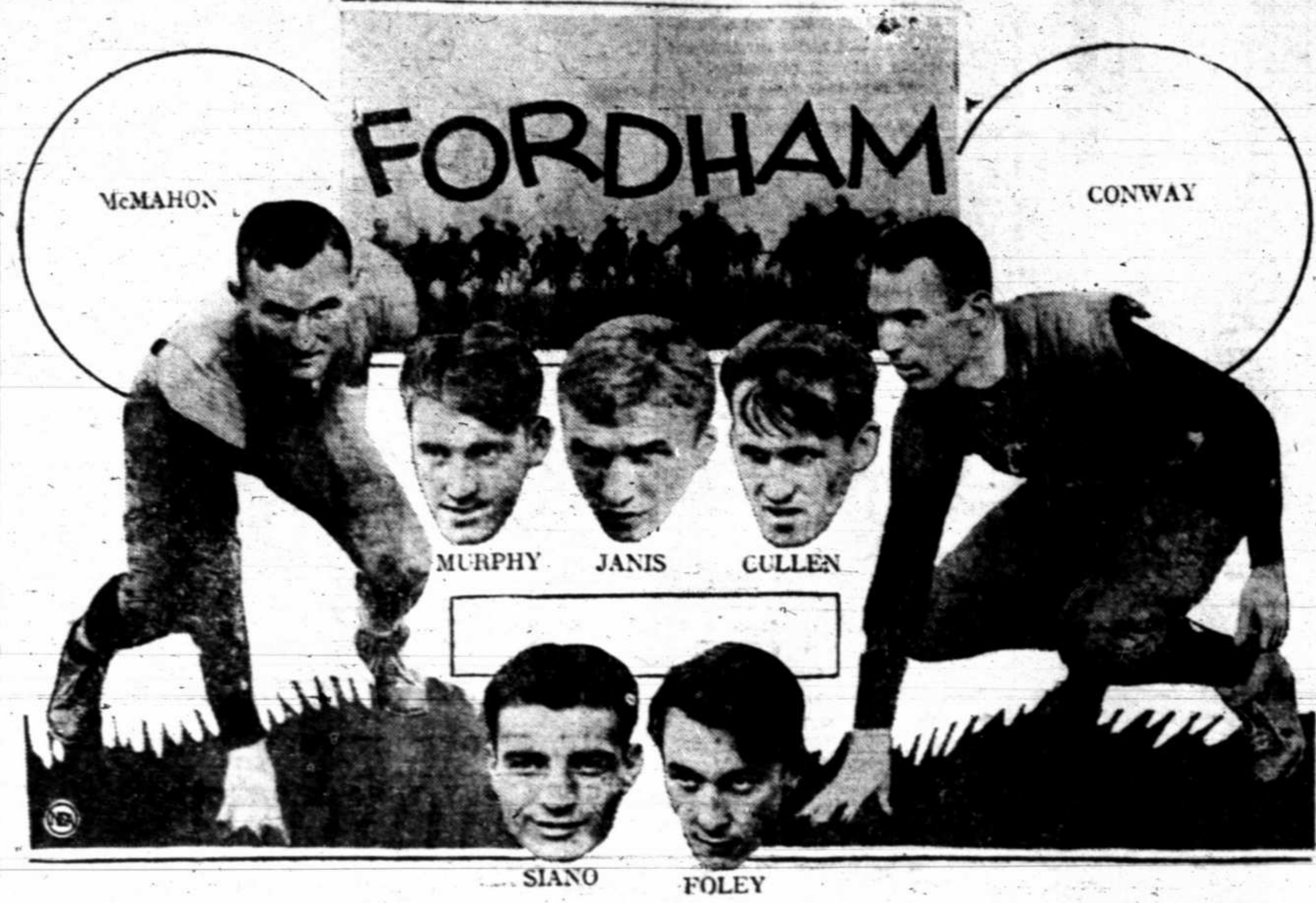
"We used to talk it over up in Belgium," says the major. "Football and war, they are both the same. The tactics of football and war are closely akin."

Fordham has a strong team this year—with a problem in building up reserve strength. The squad is only 22 strong, as compared to Rockne's seven full teams, but its first line of attack and defense is splendid.

The team has Captain Tom Siano at center, a huge giant for the position, but strong and an accurate passer. Murphy, Janis, Conway, McMahon, Barlow, Fisher are others on the major's company of charging doughboys. There are some other men, with names hard to spell like Piccolini, Wier and Wapewski, but not hard to watch as they go careening into the enemy's defenses. But who is the star of the team? Well, you have to ask somebody besides Major Cavanaugh—he says they're all stars.

All advance dope goes for the Sandies a decided advantage over Lubbock, but members of the local team are allowing no ghost stories to interfere with their plans of ousting the coach-coached eleven from their position as favorites in the district race.

Vernon's chances have been severely hurt by the injuries to a pair of their stars. Roy Rodman, first string center, is certain to miss the game from the sidelines, and Beck Lawrence, fleet Lion halfback is also on the injured list. Earnest Christian, another fast-stepping halfback, is likely to see service in the place of Lawrence.

Undeclared this season and with Harvard's latest victim, Dartmouth will carry a double mental burden into this game against Yale. 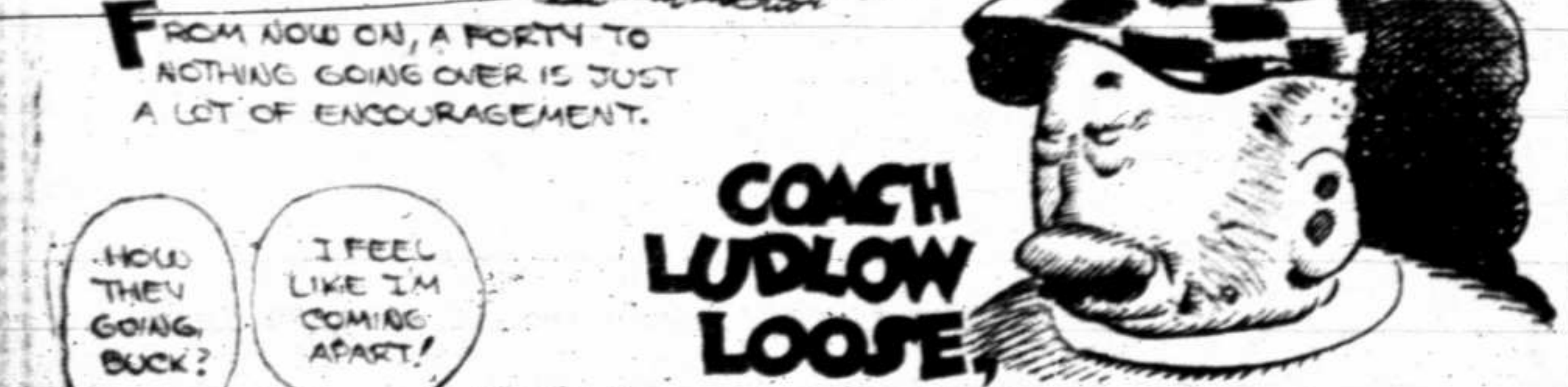

HUDKINS IS LOSER AGAIN

MICKY WALKER FLAYS NEBRASKA BEFORE 25,000 PEOPLE

WRIGHT FIELD, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30 (AP)—Fighting with the fury that won him the title in 1926, Micky Walker demonstrated his ability to wear the robes of middleweight champion when he pounded his way to an easy-ten round decision here last night over his most persistent challenger, Ace Hudkins.

With hefty punches to the jaw and a terrific body attack, the title holder not only met the rushes of the tough Nebraskan but showed him down to a walk before the mill was half over.

25,000 Look On

A throng of 25,000 persons, accounting for \$147,459, largest gate in the history of boxing in California, saw a furious encounter in which Hudkins took one of the worst beatings of his career. The Nebraskan's vaunted body attack failed to soften Walker, in fact, he wilted before the battering he received.

Hudkins, however, rallied to win the eighth round. In that session, the only one he won, he bored in to batter Walker with a devastating attack to the body.

Hudkins' rally was over with the round, and for the next two sessions he ran into powerful clips to the chin that had him dazed and bleeding when the bout was over.
