CISD to sniff out illegal drugs

Members of the board of trustees of the Colorado Independent School District Monday night put their stamp of approval on a program designed to rid the schools of drugs by approving a contract with a dog-drug-sniffing firm from San Angelo.

Dr. Billy Bruce Bridgford said that Rodriguez and Associates will be coming to Colorado City schools at various times during the school year with dogs trained to sniff out drugs.

He said only Supt. Charlie Usetlon will know the exact

number of visits scheduled but that even Usetlon will not know when the visits will take place. Bridgford said the cost will average about \$300 a visit plus travel expense.

Roy Rodriguez, owner of the narcotics search and control company, visited local schools Friday with one of the drug-sniffing dogs and explained to students and faculty how the dogs are able to sniff out drugs.

Monday night's board meeting was in abbreviated form due to the absence of Usetlon, who was

home sick. The board will meet again this Monday night to consider, among other things, evaluation of supervisors, managers, directors, principals and the assistant superintendent.

In other business Monday night, the board approved the bid of Liberty Cushion of Colorado City in the amount of \$4,500 for a boiler located at the old junior high school. Liberty was the lone bidder for the boiler which was purchased in 1973 for \$8,341.

Trustees also adopted resolutions calling for a trustee elec-

tion April 4. The terms of J. C. Britton and Eddie Gregory are expiring.

The school calendar also was amended due to a bad weather day taken on Jan. 17. April 17 will be a regular work day instead of Good Friday holiday.

The board accepted the resignation of Frank Brownfield, vocational agriculture teacher at Colorado High School, who is retiring at the end of this school year.

An overnight trip request from the CHS band was also

approved. The band will be going to Sandy Lake in Carrollton on April 30, May 1-2 for a band contest.

A tax refund in the amount of \$56.52 was granted to Odessa Rogers Reeves who had paid taxes on a piece of property she does not own.

Asst. Supt. Don Nimmo said Public School Week is March 2-6 and that an effort will be made to get parents to visit the schools sometime during that week. He said no open houses are planned for the week, however.

Tax rebates down

Checks totaling \$36,849.80 were sent to Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook Friday in local tax payments as three of the 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said that payments to date are down 5 percent state-wide as compared to payments made in the same period last year and local checks reflect the downward trend as well.

Colorado City's check was for \$33,723.94, compared to \$38,436.28 for the same period last year. The 1987 payments to date total \$47,721.88, down 12.10 percent to the 1986 payments to date of \$54,289.57.

Loraine's check was for \$1,370.35, compared to \$1,008.64 for the same period last year. The 1987 payments to date total

\$1,370.35, down 12.64 percent from the 1986 payments to date of \$1,568.63.

Westbrook's check totaled \$1,755.51, compared to \$2,818.47 for the same period last year. The 1987 payments to date total \$31,755.51, down 49.08 percent from the 1986 payments to date of \$3,447.87.

County-wide, rebates are running 14.26 percent behind last year.

Nolan County is 2.67 percent behind last year while Scurry County is behind 24.52 percent. (Snyder is the only reporting outlet in Scurry County), Howard County's payments are down 12.77 percent.

February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and reported by Jan. 20.

More candidates file for city office

Five more candidates have filed for election to city posts, Colorado City city secretary Kay Craighead said Tuesday.

Among those filing are incumbents Tom Carlock and Dee Hearn, seeking election to two-year terms on the city council. Others seeking election to the council include Sherry B. Williams, and Wilson A. (Bill)

Glenn. Julie Walraven has filed for mayor.

There are three two-year terms expiring on the council as well as the mayor's spot and a one-year unexpired term.

Mayor Elmer Martin has announced he will not seek re-election.

Man shot during quarrel

A Colorado City man was in stable condition Tuesday at Humana Hospital in Abilene suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest he received during a domestic quarrel Sunday.

Mitchell County Sheriff Wendell Bryant said Robert Ellis McDonald, 24, was shot once in the chest with a 22 caliber rifle during the quarrel which occur-

red at the McDonald home southeast of Colorado City about 7:50 p.m. Sunday.

Bryant said McDonald's wife, Janie McDonald, 30, was arrested and charged with attempted murder. She was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Joan Merket who set bond at \$7,500. She was released on bond Monday.

City tables action on agreement

The Colorado City Council, meeting in regular session Tuesday night, took no action on a lease renewal agreement with the Colorado City Industrial Team until City Attorney Pete McKinney has a chance to study the liability insurance requirements.

City Manager Brenda Tarter explained that the city leases to the Industrial Team the Earnest Building on Walnut Street for \$1 a year. The Industrial Team then receives rent from the building as well as the old Armory building where Truse King is located. The lease agreement presented to the council Tuesday night was for the Earnest Building for a period of 10 years at \$1 per year.

Mayor Elmer Martin, who was recently elected chairman of the Industrial Team, said because of the cost of obtaining liability insurance on commercial buildings, the Team did not want to be responsible for obtaining insurance.

McKinney said he would report back to the council at a later meeting.

In other business, the council approved a resolution calling for a general election on April 4 with

absentee balloting to be from March 16-31. The mayor and four council positions are up for re-election this year. Filing deadline is Feb. 18.

Mrs. Tarter reported that the seal coat work at the airport has been completed as well as the striping and signs.

The council authorized Mrs. Tarter to advertise for bids on operation of the city pound. She said that although Dr. Jack Newkirk, owner of the Colorado City Veterinary Hospital, is running the pound at his hospital, there is not a formal agreement with him to do so. Dr. Charles Froneberger, owner of Mitchell County Veterinary Clinic, has also expressed an interest in running the pound, said Mrs. Tarter.

The council agreed to deny a payment request of \$15,500 to Freese and Nichols, consulting engineering firm, on work done on a city project. Mrs. Tarter explained that although the firm did have to do some extra work, it was not the city's fault and therefore the city shouldn't have to pay for more than what the original contract called for.

Mitchell County Commissioners, meeting in regular session Monday, selected City National Bank as the county's depository for the next two years.

City National Bank was the lone bidder, and Robert Alford, president and chief executive officer, was on hand to explain the details of the contract.

In other business, the commissioners accepted the final audit for former precinct three justice of the peace office. As of Jan. 1,

the county's four justice of the peace precincts were consolidated into two precincts.

Mike Burt, tax assessor-collector, asked the commissioners to consider purchasing an additional printer for the computer system. Burt said the present printer is not adequate at times and a second one is needed. Burt was instructed to get cost estimates for a second printer and report back to the commissioner's court.

Chamber eyes goals for year

A new slate of officers for the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce is embarking on a new program of work for the coming year.

The new officers include Ben Lancaster, president; Robert Alford, vice president; David Hoover, secretary-treasurer; and Woody Anderson, parliamentarian.

At Monday's regular board meeting, the board adopted an annual budget of \$36,684.30, about the same as last year, and heard updates on the annual banquet scheduled March 14.

A membership report shows 51 new members enlisted during the recent membership drive with a 24 percent increase in dues income. The chamber now boasts over 200 members, said Penny Solomon, manager.

Board members discussed Monday whether or not to continue sponsorship of the annual AJRA junior rodeo. Miss Solomon said that it is no longer economically feasible to sponsor the rodeo because of cost of liability insurance. She said the chamber hopes to secure another sponsor for the event.

Director Tandy Curlee is in charge of community development. Goals of that committee include creation of a new, positive image for Colorado City and devising some method for a continuing effort to keep Colorado City clean and beautiful.

Director Bob Rely is in charge of organizational development. Goals of that committee

are to create and conduct a year-round program that will assure the chamber of sufficient financial and volunteer base to accomplish its program and to involve at least 60 percent of members in the work.

Director Phil Anderson is in charge of retail and business development. Goals of that committee are to continue to furnish support to the Colorado City Industrial Team; develop effective existing business program; work to attract those businesses that will effectively improve Colorado City's market position; and conduct programs and seminars that will enable businesses to be more profitable.

Director Becky Manning is in charge of special programs which include the Railhead Arts and Crafts Roundup, homecoming festival, and sports committee and cultural affairs.

Director Maggie Compton is in charge of the tourism development. Goals of that committee are to develop and implement an aggressive advertising and promotional campaign to attract visitors to the area utilizing all possible means and funds; strengthening present visitor-attracting events and create at least one more unique event; and better exploitation of present attractions.

Other goals of the chamber as a whole are to study and update the by-laws and to develop a long range plan.

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

If you are a beginner planning your first rose garden, experts agree that you should start with no more than a dozen plants.

Select a site that gets full sun for at least half of the day. Light shade for a few hours at noon or early afternoon is acceptable and is often beneficial under the scorching summer sun.

The location should be protected from damaging winds, but should have free air circulation. This helps against disease and insects and also reduces damage to flowers. In addition, the site should be located away from competing plants with vigorous root systems.

Tips For Better Roses

winter months so that the roots can become established before top growth begins. Plants in most commercial rose growing areas are harvested until November or December. In most parts of Texas, gardeners can plant these dormant bushes as soon as they are available. In West Texas, plant in mid to late February.

Because roses require a well-drained area, gardeners in many locations prepare raised beds, anywhere from 3 to 12 inches above the natural surface. The addition of tile drains or gravel under the bed also will insure proper drainage.

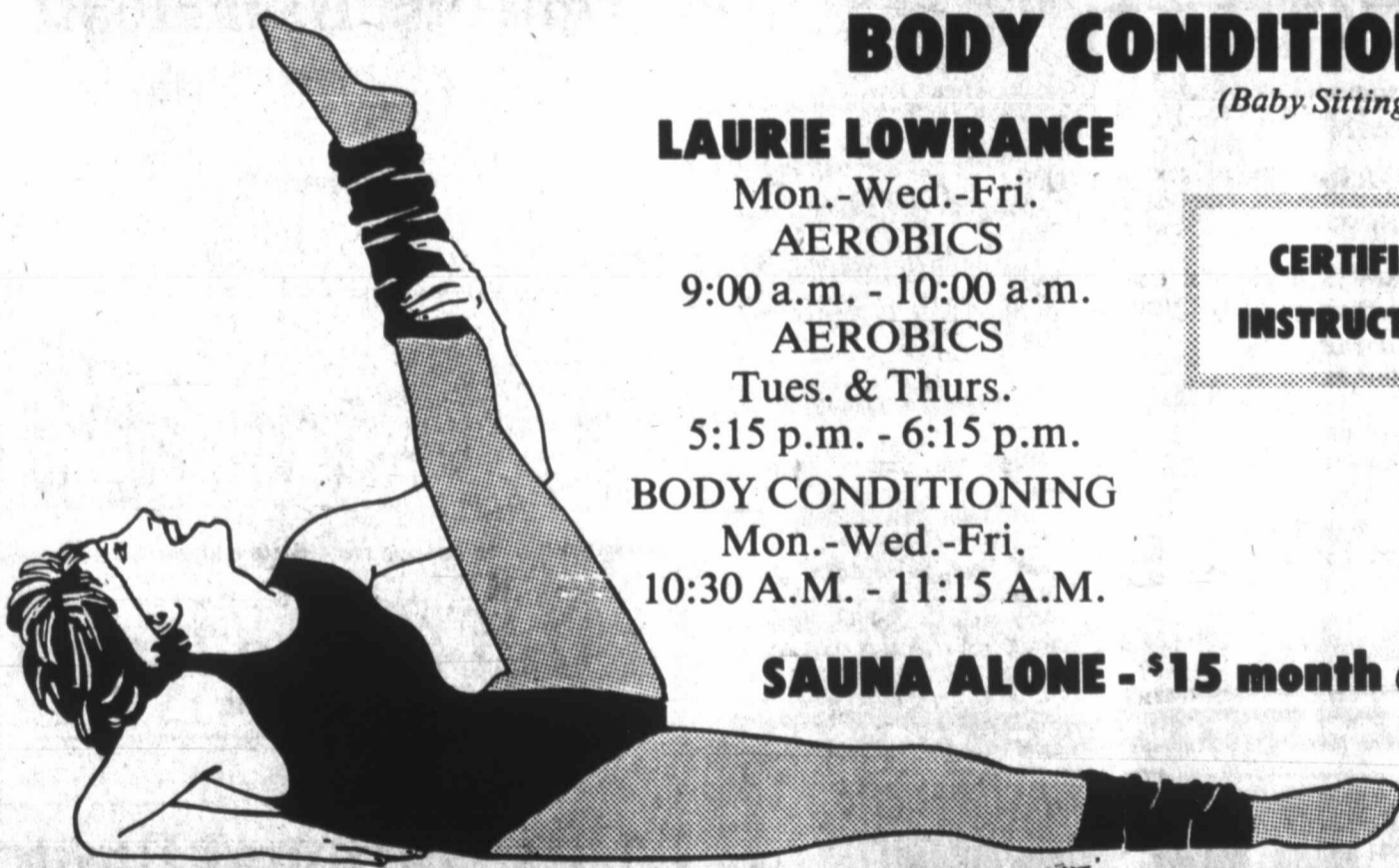

Texas Utilities Generating Company, Division of Texas Utilities Electric Co., Skyway Tower, 400 N. Olive St., L.B. 81, Dallas, Texas 75201 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for an amendment to Permit No. 00554 to authorize the addition of infrequent, low volume discharge of metal cleaning wastes. The permit currently authorizes a discharge of once through cooling water at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 1,000,000,000 gallons per day plus low volume wastes into Lake Colorado City. The proposed amendment would: add monitoring requirements for Total Suspended Solids and set limits for Temperature from Outfalls 901 and 902; add a new monitoring point to regulate infrequent discharges of metal cleaning wastes which discharge into the discharge canal at Outfall 102; and, all discharges of low volume wastes will now be regulated by Outfall 202 only. The applicant operates the Morgan Creek steam electric power station.

The plant site is adjacent to Lake Colorado City, approximately 5 miles southwest of the City of Colorado City, Mitchell County, Texas. The effluent from Lake Colorado City is discharged into Morgan Creek; thence to the Colorado River in Segment No. 1412 of the Colorado River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available. Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

Gramm bill gets nod of approval

WASHINGTON—The U.S. Senate has voted to approve U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's bill allowing states to increase interstate highway speed limits to 65 miles per hour in rural areas.

The Gramm legislation was added to the Highway Act on a vote of 63 to 36.

Gramm, R-Texas, said during the debate that the energy crisis which prompted imposition of the 55-MPH limit by the federal government "has long ago pass-

ed" and that, as a result, the speed limit is widely ignored.

"If you set out to drive from Fort Worth to Lubbock at 55 miles per hour, one of two things will happen to you," he said. "You are either going to get discouraged and turn back, or you're going to be run over by somebody going a lot faster than 55 miles an hour."

Gramm emphasized that the change allowing a higher speed limit is not mandatory, noting that some states may choose to preserve the 55 mile-an-hour speed limit. "If people in any state do not wish to drive 65 miles an hour on their rural interstates, they do not have to. This amendment would simply give those states that wish it, such as Texas, the modest ability to raise the speed limit on rural interstates."

"Those of us who live where there are huge driving distances should be allowed to set a limit that makes common sense, that we can enforce, that will be respected," he said.

Big Spring hearing slated

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Farmers concerned about the stringent conservation compliance provisions will have the opportunity to express their thoughts at a special U.S. House Agriculture Subcommittee hearing in Big Spring on Friday, February 13.

Congressman Ed Jones of Tennessee, Chairman of the Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit and Rural Development,

will oversee the hearing, which will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the East Room of the Coliseum on the campus of Howard College in Big Spring.

Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford said this congressional agriculture subcommittee is conducting the hearing to learn first-hand the reaction to the requirements, which are sometimes referred to as sod-

buster and were imposed by the conservation section of the 1985 Farm bill.

The provisions require farmers who participate in federal farm programs to implement a soil conservation plan, approved by the Soil Conservation Service, on different dates. Also taken into consideration was when and if farmers cultivated land classified as highly erodible.




