Wheat Men Poised for Big Harvest as Fields Mature

Big Rain Southeast

The southeast one-fourth of Floyd county had rainfall Tuesday morning that ranged from half an inch to torrential downpours according to reports coming in from the area.

Dougherty had a rain that was the best in a period of a year and around Joe Bailey south of that city an estimated five inches flooded the country, making travel practically impossible for hours.

Portions of Baker, Campbell Fairview, Hillcrest, Cedar, Pleasant Hill and Lakeview areas had excellent rainfall and it "fell as pretty as you ever saw," as M. B. Johnston southwest of Dougherty, reported.

Harvest of the grain crop in Floyd county for 1946 is all but on.

The first load has been marketed, trial runs are being made in numerous fields and combine and tractor to be used in the harvest are getting the last-minute going over to be ready for the big event.

Grain undoubtedly will move to the elevators and be handled by them faster than has ever been done.

First load of wheat to come to Floydada reached the Producers elevator Saturday afternoon, a bit too wet to market. The crop was ready to go Monday however, and L. H. and Gus Hammonds, raisers, had combines going in their 300-acre field on Four Sections. They had harvested and delivered 1,500 bushels Monday night. Rains Tuesday morning stopped the rigs.

Seaton Howard, elevator manager, said the wheat is excellent, testing 62 and well inside marketable condition as to water content.

And although to the experts it appears there may be a shortage in combines and tractors and trucks due to unusual conditions this year to a newspaper reporter it looks like a combine is ready for every field and plenty of trucks to go with them. The unusual condition referred to is the early harvest in Kansas where it appears the crop will be nearly three weeks earlier than is usual. This condition may drain away machinery from this area before the growers are ready for it to leave.

Yield Estimate Higher

From several areas of the county come reports that the crop looks better now than it is mature, than it did earlier. Southeast and southwest there are many fields that will run 15 to 20 bushels per acre. Dougherty reports are more optimistic the past week, as also those from Starkey, McCoy and Allmon in particular.

There has been no wheat sent to the Floydada elevators except what the Producers Co-op received Monday before the rain, which was about 1500 bushels.

A sample was received at the Farmers Grain Company Thursday which tested 21% moisture.

R. E. Patterson elevator at Lockney had not received any wheat at all yesterday. Most of all the elevators expect some before the week ends unless it rains.

Alfalfa Cuts Excellent Crop First time Over

Alfalfa hay is turning out well on Floyd county's greatly increased acreage this spring and the protein content is reported high.

Fields harvested in the past two weeks were being added to daily this week, the crop on the average being 15 days early. Feed and bundle shortages and demand from commercial mills have combined too, to make marketing an easy job for every field. Trucks have been operating heavily.

It has been a good year to irrigate, says L. J. Welborn, who marketed a 40-acre field last week and this, including some new acreage with a nurse crop of oats. Little of the hay has been damaged or spoiled in the fields from rain.

E. T. Bingham, bookkeeper for Denver Alfalfa mill at Lockney said this morning the plant there will be put into operation beginning June 3 if additional hindrances do not arise.

Repairs are under way on wires and starter boxes which were burned out by lightning.

Prices posted at the mill today are \$23 for hay on the scales, \$21 in the field, for No. 1 bright, with \$15 as the price for hay for dehydrating.

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DISPUTES WITHOUT STRIKES

No less an authority than old Don Tubb, president of the Teamsters union, says that labor disputes can be settled without strikes.

One of his recent utterances to this effect was probably pointed at John L. Lewis, whose he delights to hate as only a brickbat can.

At any rate Don Tubb says that what the country needs is labor leaders who can get the rights of labor recognized and fair treatment without the loss that comes with strikes. It seems that Mr. Tubb ought to be right whether he is or not. Some of these days, unless we drift into something worse than at present, his prediction that such leadership will arise among laboring men, is due to be proven true.

RANK AND FILE DON'T KNOW

One of the things that we country people have not been knowing is that the rank and file of the union do not know what their strikes are about, nor do they know necessarily when they are to strike, any more than one of us knows. They read it in the newspapers and see it in bulletins and they read the fine print down below to find out what it is about. Even such highly

paid professional men as pilots of airplanes are included in this lot. This is not to say that these men are ignorant. It is merely that they have turned all of this over to a "business agent" who has authority to do things in their names. Sometime later this very unintelligent way of doing things by otherwise highly intelligent and respectable people of course, will be discarded. Then the large monopolies will become amenable to the consciences of their constituent masses and to the common sense of their neighbors.

HUNGER ABROAD

Of the Four Horsemen who always have followed war, at least one is rampant in the world as never before in its history. So many millions have starvation in this world that the mention of the total number is staggering if one would permit himself to reflect it.

Perhaps to those who have been in better position to see the situation develop it is not unexpected, this number of millions and millions in various parts of the world, due to lay down and die from lack of food. The many of us, however, it is amazing that hunger is striking in so many lands and will continue to be felt a year or more longer.

In some of these areas the specter of hunger is not a new one. It is an old-old story, recurring so often that its re-belling becomes monotonous. In other parts of the hunger across the population world and could lead itself had it the opportunity.

The responsibility comes to America solely as one of the countries which has and must share. One has to be, willy nilly, his brother's keeper.

DISEASE BETTER CONTROLLED

In contrast with the spectacle of millions starving, the ravage of pestilence, death from widespread, uncontrolled contagion, seems less of a problem. So well have medical men and scientists spread their beneficent work that today, even in the

most unsanitary conditions, pestilence is being met as it means to upbraid.

When the vitality of the people begins to wane from lack of nourishment it may be that pestilence will become prevalent also. But so far this aftermath usually following in the path of fire and sword has been avoided.

As A Farm Woman Thinks

We had a lovely day last Thursday at McKinney. True, the wind was raging out side the beautiful rock Methodist Church, dirt and gravel and sand was whipping up in the fields and blinding the eyes of men trying to work. But inside the church was peace and quietness and spiritual joy. The walls are gray and rose the soft colors being depicted by bouquets of larkspur, blue and rose. The grand old hymns of the church were played by Mrs. Hamilton of McKinney and Mrs. Nichols of McKinney and we were soothed and comforted as little children are by lullabies. We enjoyed and got inspiration from the low gentle voice of Miss Sister West as she told the history and needs of the Philippines. The dull meaning of the wind outside as she quietly talked made us think that she had calmly grown on as she heard the hum of bombs outside. "When we learn to help war instead of other people," she said, "then the world will be getting somewhere."

The fellowship during the noon hour when a beautiful dinner was served, made the day happier and all came away from McKinney with a blessing and a desire to go back again.

Today is Monday and the wind is blowing very hard again. We shudder as we think of 1934 and the Dust Bowl. Again? Surely not, but like a giant lady the wind is stirring in the bowl once more and with every stirring more and more sand is loosed to blow.

Memories of Floydada, May 25. I cannot recall the exact time I knew there was a town called Floydada, but it seems that it is one of my earliest memories. The big white back carried the mail from Emma to Floydada, taking the two places together. Then a telephone line was strung from town to town and on to Dickens City. One of the houses was in my father's store, one in Surpin's Hardware and the other I do not recall in the town of Dickens. It was always a thrill and a great pleasure when I was in the store to answer the phone and it made me proud when someone wanted to be connected from Floydada to Dickens. There were two houses side by side and we made the connection with a strip of metal.

The first time I went to Floydada was as a passenger on the mail back. I was on my way to Amarillo to take music and shorthand during my summer vacation, quite a trip. Then we did not think of going to a hotel or cafe when there was anyone in the town we knew so I had the driver to take me to the home of Emma and Charlie Watkins for dinner. Must have been a nice (?) surprise for them. Anyway that was the custom. I was already a little homesick, that was getting pretty far away. The next time I went to Floydada I was married and living here where I am now. I was dressed in some of my pretty clothes mother made before my wedding and felt very grownup and important as I bought groceries for my own home. I went to town in the cold of winter with a hot rock

at my feet and a sagan over my cold hands in my lap. In the summer, shaming from my sleepy eyes as the horses jugged about.

Times came when there was a little blue eyed boy to keep quiet and amuse on the long eight-hour miles, then there were twins and the same little boy, older and harder to entertain. When the new Buick car was bought we fairly sailed to town using only half a day when it had always taken the whole one. Then the children were grown and away Mr. Spikes and I went to town alone once more.

But the horses are all gone and sicker no longer on our place, the old back sits proudly ever at the museum at Tubb. The saggans are worn out, but more than all we miss faces we once knew and voices that welcomed us at the end of the long trip to town.

Once when I came into Floydada on the mail back after a visit to my people at Hemford, I had to wait in Mr. A. D. White's drugstore. He brought me a chair and took me to the books to make a selection to read while I waited to go on to Com. Some years after when I went in to make a purchase, he handed my little twin girls a glass of milk apiece. Little things, but how they have stood out as gracious things done by a good man. And how my three children liked to run and shout after the long ride when they got in the stores of Mr. Griggs and Mr. Olson. No one seemed to mind, and many a stick of candy was given them.

I liked to go to Floydada to buy a hat. You had to have one made to order then. What a task it was to make up one's mind about the material and the trimming sometimes the milliner made the whole hat from bread or straw.

I have seen Floydada in the first winter snow, in the boiling heat of a summer day, in the rain and in the dry drought. I still love to go. Crossing the canyon gives me the greatest pleasure—the misty blue the soft greens and browns and reds of the hills, how I love them all. And the years may come, I trust that I will still get to go to the lovely, friendly town of Floydada.

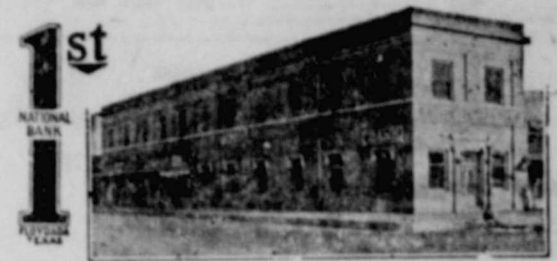

Side Lights From Washington

(By George Mahon)

This is Saturday noon. The President is scheduled to address a joint session of Congress at four p. m. today.

The intolerable industrial strife and strikes of recent months are retarding production, producing inflation, and wrecking the economy of the Nation.

A straightforward labor-management policy, which some of us have long advocated, would have avoided this tragic situation. Before Pearl Harbor, during the war, and since the war, the House of Representatives has passed legislation designed to protect the public from disastrous strikes and labor-management trouble, and at the same time give labor and management a fair deal.

But the efforts of the House have been ineffective. Why? Because the U. S. Senate has willfully failed and refused to take favorable action on what the House has done. In fairness it must be said that the Texas Senators have not been parties to this inexcusable delay.

To be more specific: On June 7, 1940, the House passed a bill to revise the National Labor relations act by a roll call vote of 258 to 129. It went to the Senate committee on education and labor and died there. On December 3, 1941 — four days before Pearl Harbor — the House again passed a bill for this purpose by a vote of 253 to 136. This bill also went to the Senate committee on education and labor and died there. On February 7, 1946, the House again passed a bill which is commonly referred to as the Case bill. That bill passed the House by a vote of 258 to 135. It also went to the Senate committee on education and labor and remained there until a few days ago. I am among those in the House who voted for each of these bills.

It is frequently hoped that those in the Senate who have blocked appropriate legislation in the past will now, at long last, join in a program of action for the common good of our Nation.

Influx of Machines

In discussing the shortage of labor and harvest equipment in prospect for Floyd county's wheat harvest this week, County Agent A. L. Hartzog said that the present indications point to an influx of migrant combines and trucks that will possibly be sufficient to handle the increased acreage of wheat grown in Floyd county over last year.

There is an estimated 300,000 acres of wheat for harvest. Probable yields will range from barely sufficient to pay cost of harvesting in some fields to around 40 bushels in some cases where wheat was grown under irrigation.

The agent took the occasion to suggest that farmers needing harvest equipment or labor could aid greatly in placement of migrant workers and machines throughout the county by making their needs for such labor and equipment known at his office at their earliest convenience. Considerable numbers of men and machines have already contacted the Floyd county agent's office and while some have been placed others may move into other areas if the agent and his farm labor or clerk cannot learn of the need of the local farmers in sufficient time to provide opportunity for them to contact the local farmer who desires to employ them.

The agent explained that many migrant machines have been referred here through the Extension Combine Placement program which operates throughout the wheat belt.

The agent urged that each person knowing of harvest job openings make that information available to his office in order that our local harvest may be completed as quickly and as efficiently as possible.
