Cotton, maize and other farm products that contribute so much to the economy of the three or four counties the fair was supposed to cover were there in such small quantities that the Loraine Community Fair, held a week earlier, looked like the State Fair in comparison. Somebody in Sweetwater needs to do a lot of work if they are going to have a Big Country Fair worthy of the name.

The plant was first placed in operation in the summer of 1950 with two generating units each having a capacity of 22,000 kilowatts. Four larger units have been added since that time, the latest a 500,000 kilowatt unit which went into service in 1966.

The plant is located five miles south of Colorado City on State Highway 163. Signs in Colorado City and on the highway will indicate the route to the plant.

## Purple Heart Award To Max Shepherd

Marine Gunnery Sergeant Arthur M. Shepherd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Shepherd of Rt. 2, Loraine, and husband of the former Miss Carolin A. Walls of Myrtle, Miss., was awarded a Purple Heart Medal for wounds sustained in combat action against the enemy.

He earned the medal while serving with the First Marine Aircraft Wing in the Republic of Vietnam.

The First Marine Aircraft Wing helps form the air element of the Marine Corps air-ground team and provides close air support for Marines on the ground conducting search and destroy missions against the enemy in South Vietnam.

The unit is also engaged in a civic action program designed to assist the Vietnamese people in completing self-help projects, such as the building of wells, culverts, small bridges and schools. Equipment and materials for the projects are made available through the Marine Corps Reserve Civic Action Fund. Marines in Vietnam provide the know-how and guide the Vietnamese people in carrying out these projects.

The Purple Heart was received for wounds received in April of this year. In September, Max was wounded a second time and was sent to Japan to a hospital. He had been released from the hospital and was back on duty until last week when his parents received a telephone call saying he was back in the hospital in Japan for treatment of these wounds.

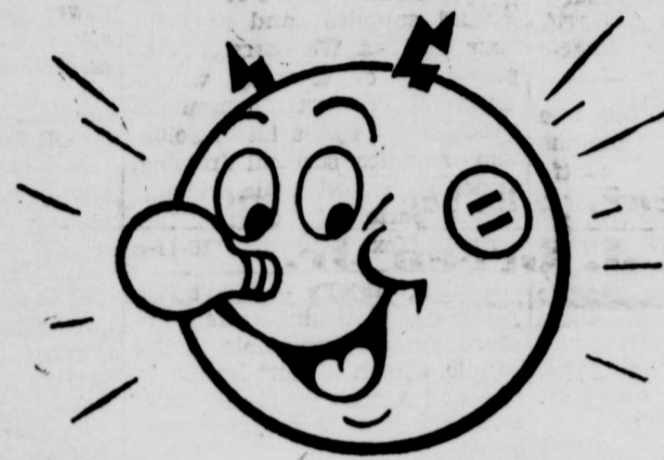

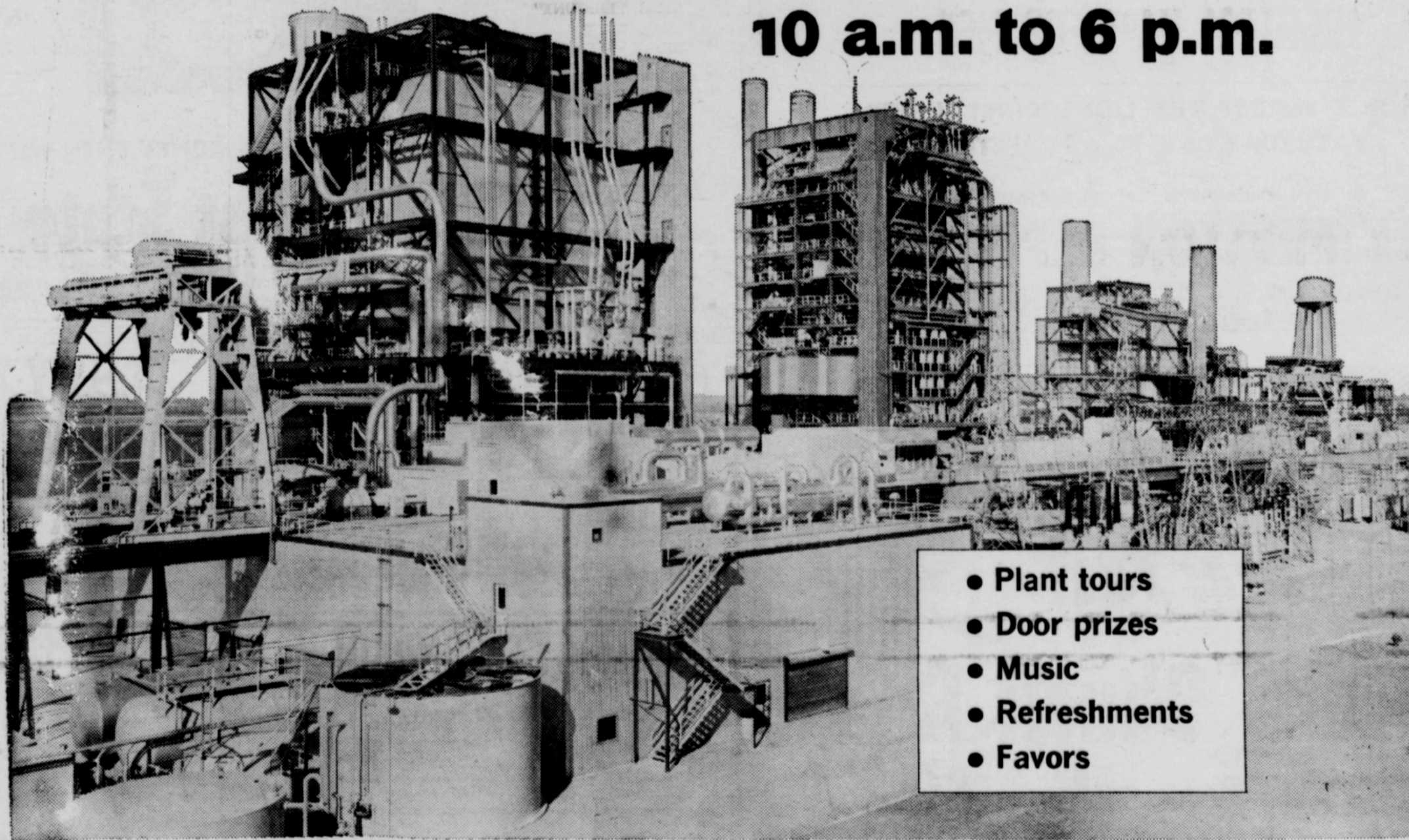

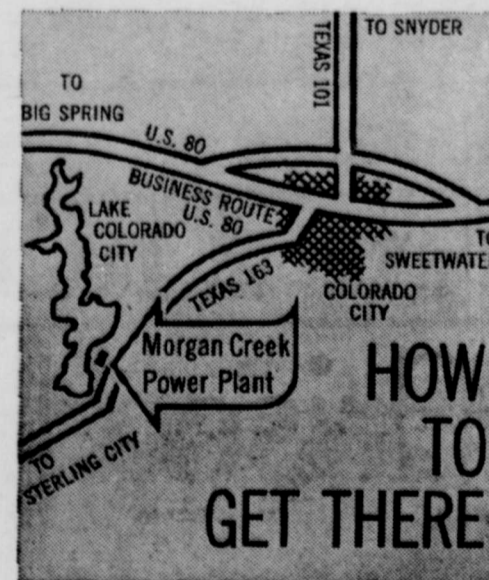
