

1st Lt. Joe W. Gill, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Jones of Abernathy, was awarded an Oak Leaf Cluster in lieu of a second Silver Star for gallantry in action in Italy early last month. He was promoted to the grade of first lieutenant after receiving the decoration.

The following citation was read when the decoration was awarded:

"JOE W. GILL, 01702996, Second Lieutenant (then First Sergeant), 142nd Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 9 December 1943 on MOUNT MAGGIORE, ITALY. After having taken part in his unit's successful advance on Mount Maggiore, Sergeant Gill volunteered to lead an important three man patrol to locate enemy defenses deep in enemy occupied territory. He stealthily advanced through the darkness and rain, over steep, muddy trails in the rugged mountains, encountering hostile as well as friendly artillery fire along the way and enemy patrols which he skillfully evade. With utter disregard for his own safety, he remained in this hazardous area during most of the night to observe enemy movements and to secure valuable information, which he later successfully returned to his unit, thereby materially aiding the security of the positions held by Company F. His gallant action reflects great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered the Service from Canyon, Texas."

School Election Scheduled Saturday

In an election scheduled for Saturday, May 27, voters of the Abernathy County Line Independent School District are to vote on two propositions of vital interest to the district.

M. Z. Holland, election judge, will be in charge of balloting at Abernathy school building. Assistants will be Mrs. Holland and Mrs. J. W. Harris.

Proposition number one, as set out in the election order, follows: "Shall the Board of Trustees of Abernathy County Line Independent School District, as now constituted, be authorized to levy a maintenance tax on all of the taxable property in said District at the rate of \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation of taxable property, provided that the maintenance tax and bond tax for any one year shall never exceed \$1.00 on the \$100.00 valuation of said property."

Ballot for voting on the above proposition will read: "FOR Maintenance Tax" and "AGAINST Maintenance Tax."

Official ballot for voting on the second proposition will read as follows: "FOR Assumption of Bonds and Levying the Tax in Payment Thereof" and "AGAINST Assumption of Bonds and Levying the Tax in Payment Thereof."

Following is a brief summary of the second proposition: Shall the Abernathy County Line Independent School District of Hale and Lubbock Counties, Texas as now constituted, assume and pay off the outstanding bonded indebtedness of: Abernathy County Line Independent School District, Eagle Springs school house bonds, Harrah County Line schoolhouse bonds, Lakeview Independent School District. All of the above mentioned schools are now consolidated in the Abernathy County Line Independent School District. Section B of the second proposition: "Shall the Board of Trustees of said Abernathy County Line Independent School District of Hale and Lubbock Counties, as now constituted, have the power to levy, assess and collect annually taxes sufficient to pay the current interest on said outstanding bonds and pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due."

We dedicate this church in loving memory of all those who have gone before, and of all whose hearts and hands have served this Church; with deep gratitude for loyal comrades who have made with us this spiritual adventure; and with high hope for those who shall walk this way in days to come.

Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts!
Heaven and earth are full of Thee.

Heaven and earth are praising Thee, O Lord most high!
The BISHOP & THE PEOPLE: We dedicate this house to the glory of God and our Father, by whose favor it has been builded; in the honor of Jesus Christ, the son of the living God, our Lord and Saviour; to the praise of the Holy Spirit, the source of light and life.

Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it. We, the minister and the people of this Church and Congregation compassed about by so great a cloud of witnesses, do here and now dedicate ourselves anew to the worship of God in this sanctuary and to the establishment of His kingdom among men everywhere.

Therefore, with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify Thy glorious Name, evermore praising Thee and saying: Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts, heaven and earth are full of Thy glory; glory be to Thee, O Lord most high. Amen.

Then shall the Bishop say: Let us pray.

The BISHOP: O Eternal God, whom the heaven of heavens cannot contain, much less the walls of temples made with hands, graciously accept the dedication of this house to thy honor and glory. Amen. Grant, O Lord, that all who are here share in the Sacraments, the ministry of the Word, and the fellowship of praise and prayer that may know that God is in this place, may hear His voice within their hearts, and may go forth to extend to the uttermost bounds of life the Lord Christ's kingdom. Amen.

Now, therefore, O Lord, let thine eyes be open toward this house day and night; and let Thine ears be ready toward the prayers of Thy children, which they shall make unto Thee in this place. And whensoever Thy servants shall make to Thee their petitions, do Thou hear them, and when Thou hearest, forgive. Grant, O Lord, we beseech Thee, that here and elsewhere, Thy ministers may be clothed with righteousness, and Thy saints rejoice in Thy salvation. And may we all, with Thy people everywhere, grow up into a holy temple in the Lord, and be at last received into the glorious temple, above, the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. And to the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be glory and praise, world without end. Amen.
