If Third Of Farmers Vote On Program Price Support Will Be 50% Of Parity

How farmers vote in the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held throughout the cotton growing area of the nation on December 15 will determine whether quota penalties will apply, the kind of allotment program in effect, and also the level of price support for 1959 crop cotton. The referendum therefore is of vital concern to every cotton grower, says W. R. McGuire, Chairman of the Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, the chairman explains, if at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, farm operators will have an opportunity to elect a choice between (A) complying with their "regular" farm allotments, with price support available at not less than 80 percent of parity for the 1959 crop of upland cotton, or (B) complying with an increased farm allotment 40 percent larger than the "regular" farm allotment, with support at a level 15 percent of parity lower than under the first choice; quota penalties will apply to any cotton produced in excess of the chosen allotment.

If more than one-third of the voters are against quotas, there will be no quota penalties, only the "regular" allotments would be available, and the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 50 percent of parity.

All farmers who were engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

The referendum will be held between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m. on Monday, December 15, at the following polling places: Community A and B, Westbrook, Gln office; C and D, Colorado City, ASC office; E and F, Lorraine, Lions Building.

Polling Places Are Announced For Cotton Referendum December 15

Community referendum committees who will be responsible for conducting the cotton marketing quota referendum throughout the county on December 15, 1958 have been announced by the Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. All members are farmers eligible to vote in the referendum. Many of the referendum committees are also elected community committees.

Arrangements for the establishment of polling places in all of Mitchell County's six cotton growing communities have been completed. Notices showing the date of the referendum, the rules governing eligibility to vote, and the location of polling places have been posted in conspicuous places in the county. Notices are also being mailed to each farmer who has a cotton acreage allotment, informing him of the place where he may vote in the referendum.

All persons who, as landlord, tenant, or sharecropper, engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 are eligible to vote in the upland referendum. If there is any question about eligibility, farmers are asked to check with their County ASC office.

Peak Is Reached In Cotton Harvest

The peak of the ginning season has been reached here but cotton is still coming in at a rapid rate.

The heaviest week was from Nov. 19 to Nov. 26, when 1138 bales were ginned. The past week, Nov. 26 to Dec. 3, only 687 bales were ginned.

Because of the fair weather and pullers reasonably plentiful there has been very little cotton stripped thus far.

Total for the season in Lorraine up to Wednesday morning was 6,738 bales.

Cotton growers will make an important decision on Monday, December 15, W. R. McGuire, Chairman of the Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers.

On that day growers will vote in a referendum to decide whether marketing quotas will be in effect for their 1959 upland cotton crop. All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas, Mr. McGuire explains, "marketing" quotas will be in effect on all farms growing upland cotton in 1959, penalties will apply on "excess" cotton, and growers will have an opportunity to elect a choice between complying with their "regular" Choice (A)—farm allotments or increasing their cotton acreage by as much as 40 percent; this second choice is called Choice (B).

"By complying with the Choice (A) allotment, a grower will be eligible for price support at the full level available—not less than 80 percent of parity in 1959; by complying with the Choice (B) allotment, a grower will be eligible for price support at a level 15 percent of parity lower than under the Choice (A) program.

"If more than one-third of the growers disapprove quotas, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties, only regular Choice (A) allotments will be in effect, and price supports to eligible growers (those who comply with their "regular" allotments) will be available at 50 percent of parity.

"In either case, acreage allotments of some kind will continue in effect for the 1959 cotton crop as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support."

The Chairman pointed out that legislation directs the Secretary of Agriculture to proclaim marketing quotas for the next upland cotton crop when the cotton supply exceeds normal. Quotas are not put into operation, however, unless they are approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in a referendum on the question.

Mitchell County Soil Conservation District Officers Were Elected At November Meeting

The Board of Supervisors of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District met in regular session Tuesday, Nov. 18, at which time the following officers were elected: Perry Bowles, Chairman; M. A. Dunnahoo, Vice Chairman; and W. W. Hester, Secretary. Roy Carey and M. A. Webb, other members of the board, were also present.

Among several items of business were: 1. Receiving, reviewing and approving their annual audit prepared by Mr. Roy Davis. 2. Developed plans for board members to attend the convention of the Texas Association of Soil Conservation Districts to be held in Abilene, January 7, 8, 9, 1959. 3. Discussed and developed plans to render technical assistance to district cooperators during the heavy terracing season.

Terrace lines have been run on Thomas Gale's and Hubert Howell's farms. The terraces are level with ends closed. Each terrace system was designed to hold all the water that falls on the area protected by the terrace. Each terrace will also help to hold the soil. The personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted with the layout. Both are receiving financial assistance from Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation.

Two ponds were staked last week. One each of R. L. Solomon ranch West of Culbert, and Jack Walker, Lorraine farmer. The ponds are a part of Solomon's and Walker's conservation plan that they are applying as district cooperators with the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District. The ponds were located and designed to provide better distribution of "livestock water" on their ranch and farm. Jasper Woods has signed and had approved a Great Plains Conservation Program Plan on his farm located in the Buford community. The plan was developed by Mr. Woods with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service Technicians. The plan includes brush control, livestock water development, grass seeding, conservation cropping system, cover crops, deferred

grazing and proper use of his grass land. Mr. Woods' plan runs for a period of 3 years and is for \$139.48.

Drs. Rhude and Cowan completed and signed a Great Plains Conservation Program Plan on their farm located in the Longfellow community last week. The plan was developed to use each acre of land within its capability and treat the land according to its needs. Contour farming, terrace construction, diversion construction, protecting crop stubble, seeding of cover and soil improving crops, controlling mesquite and cactus, seeding range and pasture grasses, proper use of rangeland, and deferred grazing are the major practices included in the plan.

Other landowners that are working on Great Plains Conservation Plans include R. A. Hood and T. C. Moore, Bodine Bros., J. A. Pickens, R. E. McMillan, A. A. Herrington, Bob McGuire, Elwood and Towle and R. F. Fee.

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Quail Season Opened Monday

Austin, November 23.—With
the reminder that quail season
begins December 1, comes the
warning "Don't become a fence-
line fatality," from the director
of law enforcement of the Game
and Fish Commission.

"Hunters are in for one of the
best seasons ever," the director
said. "With the abundant cover
growth there should be plenty of
quail throughout the state."

"Safety afield cannot be stress-
ed too much. It would be a good
idea to wear bright red or yel-
low clothing while hunting."

"Guns should not only be un-
loaded while traveling to the
hunting area, but also, as an

added precaution, while crossing
fences. If hunting alone, lay the
gun down along the fence line
pointing away from the cross-
over spot," he added.

Cripple losses can be reduced
in dense grasses by taking a
good pointer or retriever dog
along.

"Hunters should remember,"
he concluded, "that shotguns
must be plugged for a three-
shell capacity." Shotguns may
not be larger than 10 gauge.

Bag limit is 12 quail a day
and not more than 36 a week, or
in possession. Shooting hours
are from one-half hour before
sunrise to one-half hour after
sunset.

Lone Star 4-H Champs Win Chicago Trip

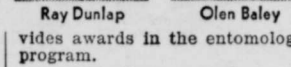
Young Texas 4-H residents of Carson, Fayette, Kent and Wichita

and Girls Club Work.



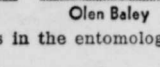

beginning of safety awareness
for this young man.

His survey resulted in laying
electric wires underground, and
attaching lightning rods to build-
ings. The workshop was trans-
ferred to a Quonset building and
gasoline storage was moved away
from wires. The windmill pump
was enclosed, and safety designs
were incorporated into plans for
a new home.

Young Warminski joined his
sister in over 30 demonstrations
on "The Use of Volatile Liquids
on the Farm and in the Home."
The pair also tested drinking
water on 10 farms and found
nine contaminated.

This safety-minded 4-H'er is a
member of the Carson County
Red Cross and Disaster Commit-
tees, and also of the Civil De-
fense Ground Observer Corps.

Bugs Rate High

There's more to an insect than
meets the eye, according to
young entomologist Jeanette
Pfeiffer, 15, of Carman. In her
4-H Entomology project she
learned all about harmful and
beneficial insects, and how to
control the bad ones.

Miss Pfeiffer was one of four
girls in the Round Top-Carmine
Community Sr. 4-H Club who ex-
hibited insect collections at Fay-
ette County and district fairs.
Her team won blue and red
awards, and she was high indi-
vidual. Her collection consists of
35 insects from 12 different spe-
cies. She also has entered two
spelling "bees".

This year Miss Pfeiffer attend-
ed a training course and is now
a junior entomology leader.
The Hercules Powder Co. pro-

Chemicals Used To Kill Prickly Pear

Refugio, Nov. 21.—Refugio county ranchman, John J. O'Brien, had a prickly pear problem. Some two miles of fence row had become heavily infested with pear which had become an eyesore as well as being a favorite hideout for rattlesnakes and

rodents.

He figured the cost of grubbing at a thousand or more dollars. He also knew that this method of eradication would not completely rid the fence row of the prickly pear. So, he turned to chemicals. County Agent D. F. Bredthauer checked with O'Brien on the chemicals recommended for the purpose and it was decided that a mixture of a half gallon of 2-4-D and a like

amount of 2-4-5T in 40 gallons of kerosene would do the job.

The solution was sprayed on the prickly pear with special care to make sure that each plant was thoroughly covered with the material. Since the plants varied in height from four to six feet, it was necessary said Bredthauer, to spray the pear from both sides of the fence. Rancher O'Brien used 160 gallons of kerosene and 2 gallons

each of the chemicals. Bredthauer reported that by mid-Sept. the pear was dead and on the ground. The total cost of carrying out the eradication program was only a fraction of what hand grubbing or other mechanical means would have cost, said Bredthauer.
