Day for slaves in Texas. As the joyous ex-slaves began expressing their feelings with annual celebrations, the words "Nineteenth of June" were contracted to become "Juneteenth."

Since 1865, numerous celebrations have been held annually throughout Texas and by transplanted Texans in such widely scattered places as Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco and Oakland, California; Denver, Colorado; Chicago, Illinois; New York City, New York; Washington, D.C.; and Atlanta, Georgia.

Nearly 200 Juneteenth celebrations are being held in Texas this year, including week-long observances in Midland, Odessa, Dallas, Houston, Comanche Crossing (near Mexia) and several other Texas cities and towns.

Ex-slaves, their descendants and others have held intermittent observances of the "Juneteenth" in Mitchell County since the 1880s. Payne Chapel C.M.E. Church minister, Rev. S. H.

Washington, who served as the first teacher in the school for Negro pupils in Colorado City in 1884, and Mt. Zion Baptist Church minister, Rev. Pryor, were instrumental in launching the Juneteenth celebration movement in Colorado City and Mitchell County.

During the 1890s and after the turn of the century, Juneteenth celebrations were held on ranches owned by D. W. (80 John) Wallace and David (Dave) Robertson. During the 1920s and 1930s, the Charlie C. Gilroy ranch provided the setting for several Juneteenth observances. The Wallace and Gilroy properties were located south-east of Loraine, while the Robertson place was located between Colorado City and Loraine on the north side of what is now Interstate 20.

Other Juneteenth celebrations were held during the four decades from 1900 to 1939, though not continuously, in what was

Plant Problems Tour scheduled

Homeowners in Mitchell County are invited to participate in a Plant Problems Tour on Tuesday.

Dr. Tom Fuchs, extension entomologist from San Angelo, and Dr. Harold Kaufman, extension plant pathologist from Fort Stockton, will be on hand to diagnosis insect and disease problems in lawns, landscape, plants, gardens, fruit and pecan trees.

Any homeowners who are having insect or disease problems in their plants and would like to have the two specialists take a look at these, should call the County Extension Office at 728-3111.

"A schedule will be arranged so that we can make a stop at each home or garden site during the day," says Mitchell County Extension Agent Mike Mauldin.

Please call by Monday, June 10th, to have your name put on the list.

"With the recent rains, lawns and gardens are off to a real good start but we are experiencing some insect and disease damage," said Mauldin. "This will be a good opportunity to have your questions answered."

Wallace council selling U.S. flags

Flag Day is Friday, June 14. The Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 9178 Americanism Department offers these tips concerning proper display of the flag:

-display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaves in the open. However, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness;

-the flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously;

-the flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, except when an all-weather flag is displayed;

-the flag should be displayed on all days, especially holidays;

-the flag should not be displayed in a float in a parade except from a staff;

-the flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water or merchandise;

-the flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery;

-the flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

FRACTIONS

A fraction is a way to say that we have less than or only a part of one whole thing. When we have a whole dozen eggs, we have all 12 eggs. Suppose that 2 are broken. We don't have a dozen anymore. Out of a possible 12, we only have 10. A short way of saying that is $\frac{10}{12}$. The bottom number, the denominator, tells how many equal parts are possible to make a whole. The top number, the numerator, tells how many of these equal parts we really have. If we need a pound of hamburger for a recipe, but we only have 13 ounces, then instead of a possible 16 ounces, we have 13 or $\frac{13}{16}$ of a pound. Thinking of time in fractions, a normal work week is 5 days out of a possible 7, or $\frac{5}{7}$ of a week.

BASIC TERMS FOR FRACTIONS
PROPER A fraction with the numerator (top number) smaller than the denominator (bottom number). Example: $\frac{2}{3}$, $\frac{12}{9}$.
IMPROPER A fraction with the numerator (top) larger than the denominator (bottom), or both the same. Example: $\frac{4}{3}$, $\frac{32}{21}$, $\frac{7}{7}$.
MIXED NUMBER A whole number plus a fraction. Example: $3\frac{2}{5}$.
CHANGING FRACTIONS Fractional answers that are improper must be changed to either a mixed number or a whole number. Divide the numerator by the denominator. Examples: $\frac{24}{12} = 2$, $\frac{12}{24} = \frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{21}{4} = 4\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{5}{2} = 2\frac{1}{2}$.
PROBLEM 1 Change $\frac{15}{7}$ to a mixed number.
PROBLEM 2 Change $\frac{8}{5}$ to a mixed number.
PROBLEM 3 Change $\frac{17}{4}$ to a mixed number.

REDUCING FRACTIONS
 Reducing to lowest terms is another way to change fractions. In order to change the fraction $\frac{8}{12}$, divide the numerator and denominator by the largest number that will divide evenly into both. $\frac{8}{12} = \frac{2}{3}$.
PROBLEM 1 Reduce to lowest terms: $\frac{8}{20}$.
PROBLEM 2 Reduce to lowest terms: $\frac{12}{24}$.

Survivors include a son, James A. "Buddy" of Colorado City; three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

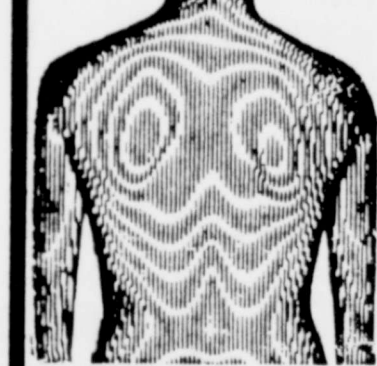

Brown rice in hot fat; season with salt and chili powder. Pour chili sauce (below) over rice. Sprinkle with grated cheese and toss gently. Serve hot!

SALSA de CHILI

2 tablespoons butter
1 cup chopped onion
1 chopped bell pepper

1 clove (minced) garlic
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon chili powder
1 cup chopped tomatoes
1 cup water
Cook onion, green pepper and garlic in butter until soft; add flour, salt, chili powder and stir until smooth. Add tomatoes and water. Cook until thick and smooth. Pour over rice and toss with cheese.

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Ranchers hoping for funds

Ranchers in 17 western states are keeping one eye on Washington this week and another one on the horizon.

The ranchers are awaiting the arrival of almost \$10,000,000 in federal funds to fight the expected onslaught of hordes of grasshoppers. Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) surveys indicate that this summer will bring more hoppers than any time in the last 30 years. Mild weather has already resulted in the early hatching of huge numbers of the hoppers in several western states.

The federal funds will be used to conduct spraying of federal, state and private rangeland threatened by the grasshoppers. APHIS is responsible for treatment on federal land and will pay 1/2 the cost of treatment on state land. Funding for the grasshopper eradication programs on private rangeland will be shared equally by the federal and state governments and participating ranchers.

Before Secretary Block released the emergency funds, things looked bleak for ranchers. Congress had allocated only \$500,000

to APHIS for grasshopper control programs, not even enough to treat federal lands and leaving nothing for private rangeland. Ranchers, already facing severe economic conditions, would have had to bear the entire cost of grasshopper control or watch their rangeland being destroyed by the pests.

Latest APHIS reports indicate that over 9.5 million acres of rangeland will be economically infested this year. APHIS defines economic infestation as eight adults or an equivalent number of immature grasshoppers per

square yard. At that population level, hoppers can consume on 10 acres, enough forage to feed one cow. If left unchecked, the grasshoppers could devour enough forage to feed 950,000 cows.

The APHIS grasshopper control programs have proven their effectiveness over the years, but timing is essential. A well organized spray program is like a large scale military operation. To gain effectiveness, spraying should be done as close to the hatch period as possible. There is little that can be done once the hoppers hit.

Pasta lovers can be tough customers when it comes to making changes in diet. But Italian recipes can be heart-healthy and still retain the qualities most admired by pasta connoisseurs — the key is using low-fat meats and cheeses. This manicotti recipe features chicken breasts.

In a 1-quart saucepan over medium heat, bring tomato juice, garlic, 1/4 of seasonings and pepper to boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer mixture 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Meanwhile, on a cutting board with mallet or dull edge of French knife, pound chicken pieces to about 1/2-inch thickness and set aside. In a small bowl combine cottage cheese and remainder of seasonings. Spoon cheese mixture onto center of breast, leaving a 1/2-inch edge all around. From a narrow end, roll each breast jelly-roll fashion. In bottom of 10 x 6-inch baking dish, spoon half of the tomato juice mixture, then arrange chicken rolls seam-side down. Spoon remaining tomato juice mixture over chicken rolls, top with mozzarella cheese and bake at 350 degrees F for about 45 minutes or until chicken is tender.

Recipe Tip: Poultry carries a layer of fat under the skin and several large deposits near the tail. The latter are easily removed. Israeli farming techniques studied

Texas Land Commissioner Texans have always considered themselves problem-solvers, and we at the Texas General Land Office are no exception. In our efforts to seek out new solutions to old problems, we have asked a team of Israeli experts to begin the second phase of a study to see if Israeli farming techniques can be used in arid West Texas.

If successful, the study would pave the way for new technology to be used to make the state's dry Trans-Pecos lands more productive. The first phase of the project, begun last year at a cost of \$16,000, found two tracts—one near El Paso and the other in Reeves County—that might be used for experimental farms. These tracts were chosen for their suitability to show how brackish (salty) water can be used for irrigation.

During the second phase of the project at an estimated cost of \$90,000, up to six Israeli engineers will be in Texas for six weeks to plan how the project can be made to work. After the on-site study, the Israeli team will return to Israel to complete a blueprint for the project.

Their report will give detailed information on such practices as drip irrigation and on crops such as pecans, almonds, pistachios and certain salt-tolerant vegetables. The project goal is to produce a new crop that will not compete with Texas crops that are already in oversupply. The more revenue we can raise through innovative land management, the less Texas taxpayers

will have to worry about tax increases. We're hoping we can make an investment in the future of West Texas by exploring this technology.

The technology to farm these arid lands was developed first in Texas at our universities—Texas A&M, Sul Ross University, Texas Tech University and the University of Texas. However, the Israelis have perfected the technology by necessity and will be working with our universities to perfect it for Texas.

The General Land Office manages more than 800,000 acres in West Texas that produce less than \$3 per acre per year. That's because nearly 200,000 acres have proven to be unleaseable, with much of the remaining acreage suitable only for grazing.

This plan is not an academic exercise—although the Israeli team will be working with our academic community—but is an exercise in making money. If successful, it will produce a

fruitful project not only for Texas farmers but also for the schoolchildren of Texas by making our lease lands more productive and valuable.

Once the Israeli study team comes up with a workable plan, it will be another step in our efforts to manage our state lands like a business—an income-producing business that seeks the highest and best use of our state lands to serve as a partial solution to the state's current fiscal crisis.

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Pesticide regulation stays at TDA

AUSTIN—"Thank God and Greyhound, it's gone," said Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower after the House voted against creation of a new, million-dollar state board to regulate pesticides. The bill failed on a 77-60 vote.

"This bill has been tough on everyone involved, with a lot of strong feelings and intense effort coming from all parties. I'm extremely grateful to the House majority for their vote," Hightower said.

"Now that we have this emotional vote behind us, I look forward to working closely with House Agriculture Committee Chairman Robert Saunders and others to satisfy their legitimate concerns about the way Texas pesticide regulations are proposed and implemented," Hightower said. "With the compromises we had agreed to in the bill passed in the Senate by Senator Buster Brown, we have shown our commitment to approach this critical issue of public health in a way that is reasonable and fair to all Texans. Chairman Saunders and I were at odds on this bill, but we both are people of commonsense and goodwill, and I intend to work closely with him in the future on all issues affecting Texas agriculture."

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

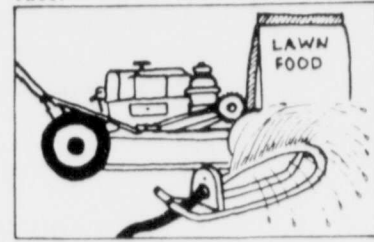
Maintaining an attractive landscape in the summer is a grueling task but can be done, if you're able to water and take good care of your plants and lawn.

Everyone seems to know watering is of primary importance, but how often and how much you need to water depends on many factors, such as soil type, temperatures and what type of grass and plants you are growing. As a rule of thumb, horticulturists recommend watering every five to six days, and the longer between waterings, the better.

If you water less frequently, but wet the soil deeply enough each time, you minimize the chances of diseases developing. You should always wet the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches. And don't assume that because water quits penetrating the soil and starts running off that the job is done. Sometimes

water will runoff before it's penetrated the soil as deeply as it should. In that case, you should turn off the water, let it soak in and resume watering until the soil is moist 4 to 6 inches below the surface.



One way to conserve moisture during hot, dry periods is to mulch your lawn, just as you would your vegetable garden. Leave grass clippings scattered over the lawn when you mow—unless you miss mowing and let the grass get too tall. Too many clippings in one spot will block the sun from the grass leaves.

Ideally, you should mow once a week.

You also can help your lawn endure the long hot summer by getting it off to a good start through proper maintenance. Fertilize at six-week intervals throughout the summer, mow as often as needed and watch for early signs of insect or disease damage.

Trees and shrubs also should be watered deeply at regular intervals to a depth of 4 to 6 inches. For trees, it's best to place your water hose at the base of the tree and let the water soak in slowly. Wherever possible, mulch around the trees and in flowerbeds to help conserve moisture and keep the ground as cool as possible.
