Research Station Slated For Location In Area

Plans are being made to develop a satellite agricultural research station for the Munday area, according to Dr. Mack Fuque, assistant professor of Horticulture with the South Plains Research in Lubbock, guest speaker at the eleventh annual Knox County Farm and Ranch Day.

Other Farm and Ranch Day activities included individual programs for the men and women after the traditional free barbecue.

"Diversified Ranching" was presented by Jack Idol, manager of the League Ranch at Benjamin. John McHane, Economist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas A&M University, discussed "Subsidy Payments and Outlook Information and J. D. McNease, Marketing Specialist, Texas Department of Agriculture showed a film on marketing practices in the United States.

A skit and dress revue scheduled to open the ladies' program was cancelled due to weather conditions and illness. Supplementing this spot Rept. Vernon J. Stewart from Wichita Falls showed a film on the Hemisfair which will open soon in San Antonio. He then spoke on "Juvenile Crime and Delinquency" and the efforts being made to cope with needs in all areas.

To sum up the program, Mrs. Claudine Woodridge, assistant vice president of First National Bank in Abilene gave a talk on the importance of women becoming familiar with banking and handling money. Mrs. Woodridge counsels the women and shows them how to set up a home bookkeeping system and to stay within a budget.

Presenting the keynote address to both men and women was Mr. Bob Murdoch, Executive vice president of the East Texas Agricultural Council, from Tyler who introduced "The National F-I Heifer Program."

Mr. Murdoch discussed the process of crossbreeding cattle. This method was first organized in April of 1966 and is the only one in the world. As of now they have registered some 1500 cattle in this area. The process involves the crossing of two breeds of cattle producing a hybrid vigor. This enables the calves to grow faster and weigh more at weaning time. It also gives the cattle-men an increase of 25% in efficiency of production as well as longer life for the calves. A natural increase in profits is the result.

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cert music, the Tech musicians will feature the individual style and phrasing which brought them an invitation to sit in at rehearsals conducted by bandmaster-composer Henry Mancini preceding the Mancini band's fall concert in Lubbock.

The Tech band placed among the top three at the 1967 Intercollegiate Stage Band Festival in Salt Lake City and also was presented last spring at a campus concert with noted band leader Skitch Henderson.

Upcoming bookings include the Miss Lubbock Pageant in February and a Tech concert in March with Ed Shaughnessy, drummer for television's Tonight Show band.

Since becoming director of the band in 1966, Leach increased the group's repertoire to include arrangements by such professionals as Lenore Niehaus, George West, Robert Curnow, Stan Kenton, Count

Basie, Dave Grusin and others.

The band is composed of five trumpets, four trombones, five saxes, piano, vibes, bass and drums, a combination sometimes augmented by additional woodwind, brass and percussion instruments to explore current trends in "symphonic jazz."

A native Pennsylvanian, Leach holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Michigan State University where he taught prior to joining the Tech faculty in 1965.

He is the author of "A Percussion Manual for Music Educators", (Adler Belwin), and co-author of a textbook dealing with percussion scoring techniques slated for publication by Prentice-Hall early next year.

Leach also is frequently called upon to serve as a percussion clinician and judge for band clinics and summer music camps.

Farmers Invited To Coffee At City Cafe Here

How to reduce the damage nematodes do to cotton in Knox County will be discussed by experts at a coffee meeting at The City Cafe, at 9 a.m. Tuesday, January 30.

The meeting is being sponsored by The Dow Chemical Company to acquaint farmers with the nematode problem and effective methods of controlling this underground pest. All cotton farmers in the county are invited to attend, according to A. Charles Fischer, Lubbock, a nematode control specialist for Dow.

Fischer said nematodes--underground animals so small that 8,000 of them could lay on a single thumbnail without overlapping--have become recognized as a major threat to cotton growers in West Texas in recent years. He said experts at The South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock believe nematodes are causing an economic problem on at least 300,000 acres of irrigated cotton land.

Fischer said the meeting will cover methods of detecting and

Little James' clothes were ignited from fire from the sparklers and were burned off him before being rushed to the Baylor County Hospital. He received third degree burns over 50% of his body.

James was taken by plane to Galveston for further treatment and last reports were that skin grafting would cover

40% of his body. What started out as a happy occasion ended in a very sad affair.

Hightower of Vernon to serve on the Texas Legislative Council's committee to study the feasibility of establishing and operating an academy of science in crime prevention and detection. The study was requested by resolution (H.S.R. 37) adopted during the regular session of the 60th Legislature.

Under terms of the resolution, the Texas Legislative Council is requested to study the desirability and practicality of establishing and maintaining at state expense an academy dedicated to the training of law enforcement officials at all levels of government. The resolution also asks that the Council examine the possibilities of operating such an academy in conjunction with one or more of the state-supported institutions of higher learning in Texas. The Texas Department of Public Safety and the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, are authorized to cooperate with the Council during the course of the study.

Hightower was also appointed to serve on the Texas Legislative Council's subcommittee participating in a study of the fire record credit and debit system of the state. The Council, research arm of the Legislature, was requested to cooperate with the State Board of Insurance, the agency to which the study was directly assigned. The Texas Research League will also work on the project under terms of the resolution (S. R. 754) requesting the study.

Hightower, an attorney, has served in the Texas Senate since 1965, and had prior service in the House of Representatives for one term. In announcing the appointment of Hightower, Lieutenant Governor Smith commented that the senator is highly knowledgeable in the area to be studied. Hightower is a member of 11 Senate committees.

Others appointed by the Lieutenant Governor to the Council's committee to study the feasibility of establishing and operating an academy of science in crime prevention and detection are Senator David Ratliff of Stamford and Representatives Gene Hendryx of Alpine, Paul Floyd of Houston, and James Slider of Naples.

Lieutenant Governor Smith is chairman of the Texas Legislative Council, research arm of the legislature, which has a membership of five senators, appointed by him, and ten representatives, appointed by the Speaker. The Speaker of the House of Representatives serves the Council as vice chairman.

diagnosing nematode problems and most effective means of controlling them. Control most commonly is achieved by "fumigating" or dropping chemicals into the soil about two weeks before planting, Fischer said. He added that this practice, which usually costs about \$9 an acre, consistently has returned an average of \$4 to \$5 for every \$1 invested on irrigated cotton land where nematode populations have reached troublesome size.

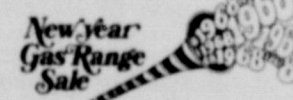

Texas Draft Delinquency Increased

The number of draft delinquency in Texas increased from 959 to 1,028 in the last quarter of 1967, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said here Thursday.

But the number of these cases involving failure to report for induction into the military service decreased from 547 to 511, the summary of delinquencies to the director of Selective Service showed.

Analysis of the reports from the state's 155 draft boards revealed that 569 men were listed as having been reported to United States attorneys for various failures to comply with the draft law and its regulations. All these were not reported in the final quarter of 1967, as the list is cumulative.

A total of 889 names was on the delinquent lists from Houston-Baytown, Dallas, and San Antonio, with 321 of these cases having been referred to federal attorneys.

Twenty boards, located at Lufkin, Pleasanton, Coleman, Van Horn, Eastland, Fairfield, Sulphur Springs, Benjamin, Lampasas, Groesbeck, Bowie, Robstown, Clarksville, Henderson, Abilene, San Angelo, Canton, Graham, Gainesville, and Calvert, reported no delinquencies.

The Selective Service regulations define a "delinquent" as "a person required to be registered under the Selective Service law who fails or neglects to perform any duty required of him under the provisions of the Selective Service law."

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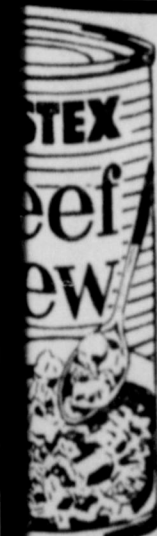

Improvement In '67 Cotton Crop Staple Length

A total of 205,000 bales from the 1967 cotton crop in the Rolling Plains counties have been classed to date in the Abilene office of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, according to B. B. Manly, Jr., officer in charge, in a report to Charles Bragg, executive vice president of Rolling Plains Cotton Growers this week.

"This compares with a total of about 395,000 bales classed in the office from the 1966 crop", he said.

"The 1967 crop has not only been significant from the standpoint of fewer bales harvested, but from the improvement noted in staple length and the demand for nearly all staples and grades produced in the area", he asserted.

The biggest increase in staple length over the season was in 31/32 - inch cotton. To date this staple has comprised 30 per cent of the cotton classed in the office compared to 5 per cent to the same date for cotton produced in 1966. Cotton of one-inch staple has comprised 8 per cent, compared to 1 per cent from the 1966 crop. The next three longer staples, 1 1/32, 1 1/16 and 1 1/8 inch, each comprised 2 per cent of the total bales classed, while the total of these staples were insignificant from the 1966 crop.

A buyer trend this season should, in Manly's opinion, convince producers to seek the longer staple varieties for planting in the coming season.

The season's market for the various staple lengths have averaged, according to AMS figures, as follows:

Staple less than 31/32 - inch sold from 3 to 4 cents a pound above loan; 31/32 - inch brought an average of 4 to 6 cents a pound over the loan; 1 - inch to 1 1/16 - inch sold from 6 to 7.50 cents a pound above loan; and some cotton up to 1 1/8 brought up to 15 cents a pound above loan.

There was a big demand for long staple varieties, Manly stated.

Buyers were paying a pre-

mium to growers of Acala, amounting to as much as 1350 points above the loan. Lankart 3840 sold for as much as 34 cents per pound, he stated.

Other long staple varieties which brought premium prices included Lockett 4789, Dunn 56C and Paymaster III, Manly reported.

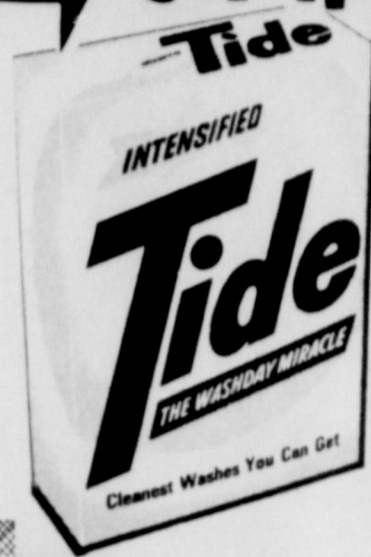

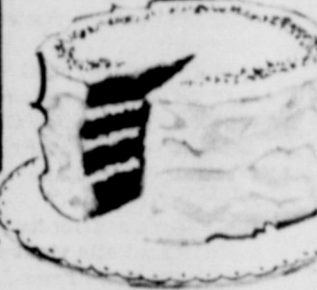

Belgian Chocolate—It's The Top-Ping



The elaborate dessert is making a comeback after years of easy-fix-it types, as homemakers realize how a regal dessert can be a royal treat. There's nothing more "ah-inspiring" than a lavish-looking, luscious-tasting chocolate recipe. Americans are now discovering what Europe sweet-toothers have known for a long time: lick for lick, the chocolate from Belgium, whether ready-to-eat candy or in liquid or block form for cooking purposes, can mean the difference between a merely good dessert and a really superior tasting one. Try making an appetite-whetting little mountain of cakelets topped with a creamy chocolate sauce that is tempting enough to make even the most dedicated dieter forsake the straight and narrow. Profiterole is a fancy French way of calling a cream puff a cream puff. The following is for Paté a Chou, "the easiest way to make cream puff dough."

PROFITEROLES AUX CHOCOLATES

Paté a Chou (cream puff dough)

1 Cup water
1/2 Cup butter
1/2 Teaspoon salt

1 Teaspoon sugar
1 Cup flour
4 Large eggs

In small saucepan, bring to boil water, sugar, butter, and salt. Add flour all at once. Cook over low heat, beating briskly and constantly until thoroughly combined. Mixture should roll away from sides of pan. Remove from heat. Cool for 2 minutes. Beat eggs one at a time. Drop paste from spoon onto greased baking sheet. Allow space for expansion between puffs.

Belgian Chocolate Sauce.

For each ounce of Belgian bittersweet chocolate, add 1/2 cup light or dark corn syrup, and heat thoroughly until blended, stirring constantly. Store in a cool place but do not refrigerate. Serve hot or cold. Note: For a more fudgy sauce, double the amount of chocolate.

clines to accept an assignment, it can be to his advantage to use the "Request for Payments" form in lieu of his standard receipted bill in the case of medicare beneficiaries. Experience has shown that payments can be processed much faster when the form is used. This, in turn, will result in the beneficiary's receiving his medicare check sooner, with its proceeds passed along that much sooner to the attending doctor. All the doctor's office needs to do is complete Part II of the standard form. That will serve as the itemized bill which the patient can send in, to claim his payment. As before, medicare pays \$4 out of every \$5 after the first \$50 medical bills in a year.

Simplified Method For Claiming Benefits

Edwin Draughon, Social Security manager in Vernon, advises that when medicare first started on July 1, 1966, there were two ways for older people to get their doctor bills paid under the program. The first called for the doctor's agreeing to claim the 80 percent payment direct from medicare, by filling out a very simple one-page application form. The other required that the beneficiary first pay the bill and then apply for the medicare payment, with or without the help of the doctor.

During the first year and a half of medicare, about half of the claims for doctor bills were put in directly by the doctors, while the beneficiaries had to apply, after paying the bill, in about half the cases. The system worked well enough — almost \$1.3 billion was paid in benefits under it — but not without hardship to those older people who could raise the money to pay the bill only by borrowing or by depriving themselves of necessities while waiting for the medicare payment to come in.

Now Congress has changed all this to eliminate the necessity for the beneficiary's paying the bill first, in cases where the doctor decides not to make the claim himself. Beginning January 1, 1968, all the beneficiary needs is an itemized bill — not an itemized, receipted bill as in the past.

Of course, the assignment-to-the-doctor method is still the simplest method for all concerned. It requires the use of only a single sheet of paper (the "Request for Payments" form), with no attachments or enclosures that might become separated from the claims form and delay a payment. Also it has blanks for all of the kinds of information needed to pay a claim, thus further preventing "write-backs" for missing data without which a claim cannot be paid. Under this method, the doctor agrees to accept the "reasonable charge" determined by the carrier, as his full charge, and the basis of the 80 percent payment made to him. The patient is responsible for the other 20 percent, plus any part of the \$50 annual deductible that might be remaining. But even if the doctor de-

Party History, Emblems To Be Feature In Paper

The Democrat Party has been under the banner of three Party Symbols. The hickory pole and broom which had been the emblems at the time of Jackson's administration were supplanted by a Rooster in the campaign of 1840.

In the 1840 campaign, Democrat Van Buren was opposing the Whig Party. The Whigs, borrowing their party name from England, had organized in 1834, behind the banner of Henry Clay. In the above mentioned campaign, Van Buren was opposing Harrison and Tyler ("Tippecanoe and Tyler too"). A Democrat, Mr. Joseph Chapman, known as "a famous son", was a Representative to the Indiana Legislature. He was characterized by his boundless optimism and would, at the beginning of each campaign claim every County in the State. To the people of that time, this style of electioneering was "crowing".

The Democrats, alarmed at the number who had bolted to the Whig Party, sent messages urging the people to crow, for they had a lot to crow about. Thus, their battle cry in the campaign was "Crow, Chapman, Crow!" and the characteristic fowl, the Rooster, was adopted for the Party emblem.

The present emblem of the Democratic Party, the donkey, is the creation of the eminent cartoonist, Thomas Nast. He was a great illustrator and caricaturist of the last century. Mr. Nast was affiliated with Harper's Weekly, a paper which ranked among the most influential as a political factor.

In the issue of January 15, 1870 of Harper's Weekly there appeared Thomas Nast's first cartoon using the donkey to represent the Democrats. The cartoon with the caption, "A LIVE JACKASS KICKING A DEAD LION" — and such a Lion! and such a Jackass! portrays a donkey labeled Copperhead Press kicking a dead lion, namely, Edwin M. Stanton, Abraham Lincoln's Secretary of War, who had died only a few weeks before.

Nast continued to use the donkey to typify the Democratic party more specifically when assured by popular acclaim that it had caught the public fancy. Gradually, the donkey evolved into a generally accepted Democrat symbol. The Republicans see in the donkey an object of ridicule, stupid

and stubborn, whereas the Democrats accept him fondly as a mascot, recognizing that his very humility and homeliness endear him to the people.

Home Demonstration clubs in Gilliland, Benjamin, Munday and Truscott engaged in programs and activities related to the major areas mentioned above. Sixty-six women were members in 1967. Club programs were planned through the council and included educational programs on sewing and care of modern fabrics, management of the food dollars, study of legislation and traffic laws, home furnishings, and meal planning.

Mrs. J. T. Murdock, Mrs. Homer Martin and Mrs. J. R. Brown attended the State Texas Home Demonstration Association Meeting in Fort Worth. Extension work is a continuing education program which coordinates youth and adult programs in a continuous learning process.

The underground moisture condition will add much to prospects for crops to be planted later in the year. Prospects should be good for nitrogen application on wheat as soon as weather permits.
