## UF Drive Is Lacking \$500

"We are all going to have to dig a little deeper," That's the way David Fry, chairman of the United Fund campaign here, described the situation this morning. "We're about \$500 short of our goal of \$6500, and there is very little, if any, new money coming in," he summarized.

Fry said an old fashioned nail keg will be placed in the lobby of the Eastland National Bank. He urged citizens to put "just a little more money" in it so that the goal would be reached.

"We can finish the job with dollars, quarters, nickles and dimes," he asserted, "if everyone will just remember that the UF drive is so important."

This is the third Eastland United Fund Drive. The drive, in the past two years went over the top. Fry pointed out that the drive is to raise funds for not one, but five organizations—the Red Cross, United Drive Fund, Salvation Army, YMCA and Boy Scouts.

The action came at the Chamber's quarterly membership breakfast at the White Elephant restaurant.

Carl Johnson, C-C president, brought up the situation and it gained the form of a motion quickly. Earlier this year the C-C Board of Directors asked such action but City Commissioners turned down their plea, stating they thought that such action would cause parking problems, thus hurting business instead of helping it. Johnson pointed out this morning that both Ranger and Cisco cover their meters.

Virgil Seaberry Jr. introduced Joseph Perkins who reported on efforts he had made in New York and Boston to interest industrial firms in Eastland.

Ben Hamner, from the floor, urged the Chamber of Commerce to do something about getting Highway 6 from herd to Carbon rebuilt. He pointed out that the Highway Department is building a new road to the Cisco-Rising Star highway from Carbon, but no plans are on the board for any work on the Carbon-Eastland highway.

H. B. Tanner, chamber manager, reported on Christmas decorations in downtown Eastland.

Hubert Westfall, Lone Star Gas Co. manager, here, was introduced and it was announced he had been transferred to Oklahoma. Westfall said, "Eastland has done so much for us that we can never thank you enough, but we will always remember you in our hearts."

The new Lone Star manager, Arthur Goldston, was then introduced.

Several definite improvement trends show up in examining pastures in this area, although range recovery is usually a slow process. We actually can not expect recovery to be indicated in one year by the remnants of short grass found on much of our badly deteriorated rangeland a year ago. On these over abused pastures relief from prolonged drought along with relief from grazing pressure brought about a tremendous weed growth. In that weeds furnish ground cover this is a very definite desirable improvement trend. Weeds are the first stage of recovery on deteriorated ranges.

Range land which had more grass cover and better grass species a year ago shows fewer weeds. The grass itself gained in vigor and ground cover last spring and suppressed weed growth after relief from drought and grazing pressure. Forage production was abundant, although few new seedlings of the better species were produced.

Some grass seed has been produced on most ranges. Side oats grama seed stalks have been very abundant although actual seed fill has apparently been poor on all ranges examined. Blue stem seed stalks were less abundant but have showed better fill. Indian grass produced the best seed crop of all. In fact about 1200 pounds of Indian seed was actually harvested on two farms. Pete Hathcock combined a nice lot of seed for N. E. Richardson on the J. H. Littleton farm four miles north-east of Eastland. Joe Barnett combined a good lot of seed for Clint McCain from a planting four miles south of Carbon. This planting was made by McCain in 1950 and is the first seed produced by the planting.

Our sustained grass production depends on how we manage our ranges after this year's gains. Grass has several uses. Part may be harvested, part should be left on the stems, and part should be returned to the soil for maintaining soil condition. Neither the greatest total pounds of beef or the greatest number of animals will show the largest profit over a period of time. Only proper stocking invariably shows the most profit and is the most practice way of keeping soil and grass in best condition. 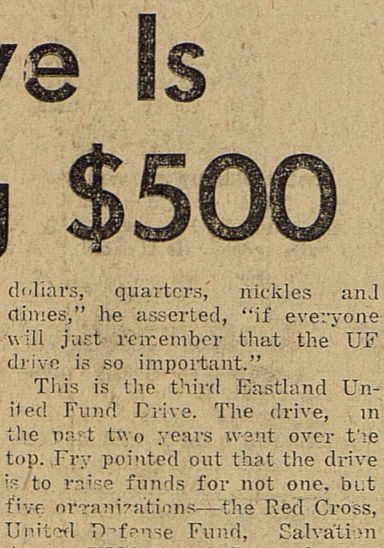

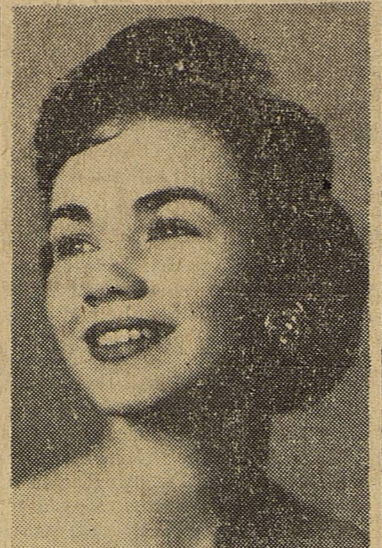

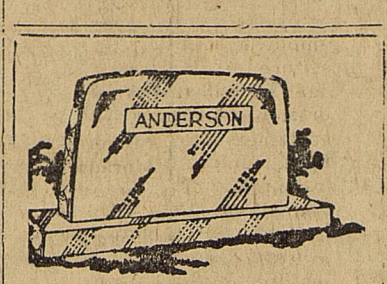

 was knocking Southwest conference schools around like so many bowling pins was Centenary down at Shreveport. Centenary tried for several years to get into the Southwest conference but never made it. Finally she gave up football altogether and doesn't even play the sport in intercollegiate sports today. She then was coached by Homer H. Norton. That's the same man who led the Texas Aggies to their national championship in 1939 and who is the sports writer for some Texas dailies now. He has retired from active football coaching.  
 Nineteen and twenty-seven was the year A&M and TCU played to the largest crowd ever to see a football game in Fort Worth, up til that time. That year they played to an estimated 18,000 fans in the old park that was just east of University Drive in Fort Worth, or right across the street from the main building at TCU and right behind the library.  
 That's about where Dan Rogers

Business Administration Hall now stands at that institution.  
 TCU and A&M tied, 3-3, that year and it was the only blot on the Aggies' record for the year. TCU had Rags Matthews on their squad in 1927 and he is recognized as one of the men who caused some of the eastern sports writers to sit up and take notice that some of the Southwest stars were as good as any in the country.  
 The Aggies had three men on their squad I would like to talk briefly about. They are Sikes, Petty, and Alsbrook.  
 This Petty was an end. He was Red Petty, who later coached at Eastland High. He coached here in the days of Jake Garrison and Darel Tulley. Petty went from here to East Texas State as head coach and took both Garrison and Tulley with him. They were stars on that club and received mention as all-American on the little all-American team.  
 Coach Petty suffered a heart attack and died quite suddenly while he was on the East Texas State faculty.  
 The Alsbrook on the 1927 Aggie team was Finky Alsbrook of Cisco. He was star on their team at about the same time we had Ed. T. Cox in Eastland. He's in the oil business in Dallas now.  
 The Sikes mentioned in this line-up was J. V. Siki Sikes. Sikes entered the coaching profession and was head coach at Kansas as late as five or six years ago. He got tired of all the pressure a head coach has to put up with in a conference where one has to worry about beating Oklahoma without any Texas boys, so he moved on to a school where the pressure was much less. He took the head coaching job at the same East Texas State College at Commerce where Red Petty had coached before him. However, he didn't immediately follow Petty in that job.  
 I think he is still head coach at that school.  
 Thirty years ago the New York sports writers had more influence than they do now in selecting the all-American teams each fall, but three men who played in the A&M-TCU of 1927 made the second team all-American, which was pretty good for a bunch of Southwest boys in those days. They

were Joel Hunt at halfback and a Spratt at tackles for the Aggies and Rags Matthews, the lineman, for TCU.  
 From that day forward the Southwest conference continued to gain in respect from the big eastern sports writers.  
 The East-West game of that year helped the cause too. Two of the biggest stars of that game were the three mentioned players and a fellow from SMU by the name of Jerry Mann who joined the West's cause in that annual all-star affair.  
 That's the same Mann who was later attorney general of this state.

We've been meaning to say something about the new awning they put up over at Nigs Cafe. It's amazing how much it improved the looks of the building.

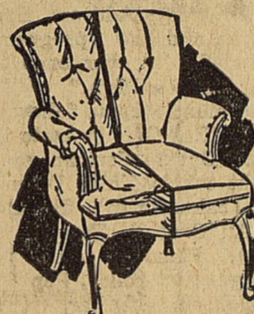

zed the first Baptist Church in Eastland with seven members. C. Brashears, J. R. Higgins, Enoch Dawson, Amanda Dawson, W. C. McGough and wife and the preacher. This was known as Providence Baptist Church, and was one of four in the county when the Rev. C. G. Stevens of sainted memory projected and accomplished the organization of that wonderful body known as the Red Gay Baptist Association, which not only included the churches in this county, but finally embraced all the territory to El Paso and New Mexico.

There now exists a Cisco Baptist Association which includes all the organizations in the County with two or three exceptions.

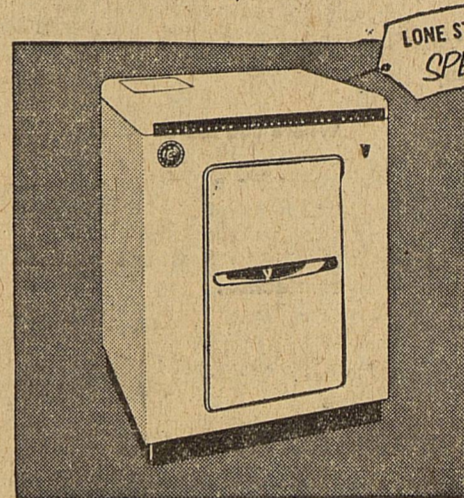
