Four arrested in drug raids

Four persons were released on bonds of \$5,000 each Wednesday following drug raids Tuesday night by the Colorado City Police Department, the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department and the Department of Public Safety.

Police Chief Bobby Sparks said the raids were conducted simultaneously about midnight at two houses on Concho Street.

At 300 Concho Street, Larry Keen, 27, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. Jo Nell Mayes, also 27, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance.

Sparks said 28 bags of marijuana were seized as well as

illegal weapons including a sawed off 12-gauge shotgun. A stolen motorcycle was also recovered.

At 405 Concho Street, Donny Bell, 29, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. Also arrested at the residence was Jake McCartney, 19 of Loraine who was charged with possession of a controlled substance.

Sparks said drug paraphernalia was seized at the Bell residence as well as a white powder believed to be a controlled substance.

The four suspects were taken to Mitchell County Jail and arraigned before Justice of the Peace Billie Forbes Wednesday.

Electric customers to get refund

DALLAS-Texas Utilities Electric Company announced it plans to file in November its third application of 1986 asking the Public Utility Commission to authorize a refund of fuel cost savings to its customers. The refund, totaling approximately \$58 million, included interest, is the result of lower fuel costs in July, August and September.

Because the fuel cost savings are expected to continue in 1987, TUEC will also ask the PUC to approve lower fuel charges.

The company will ask the PUC

to authorize the refund at the earliest possible date, which probably would be in January, through a credit to customers' bills.

Under the company's proposal, the residential customer with an average January usage of 1200 kilowatt-hours would receive a refund of about \$10.

The refund will be made in accordance with the PUC's fuel rule requiring refunds to be made if amounts over-recorded from customers exceed four percent of an electric utility's

authorized annual fuel costs or \$40 million, whichever is lower.

Decreasing market prices of natural gas and the company's continuing efforts to obtain lower-priced gas supplies have resulted in lower fuel costs than expected in late 1985 and throughout 1986. As a result, the company requested a five percent reduction in fuel charges that was approved by the PUC effective with March 1986 billings. Refunds totaling \$205 million have been authorized. Approximately \$140 million was

refunded in May, and \$65 million is being refunded on customers' October bills.

Company senior vice president Tom Baker said the company will continue to pursue the lowest-priced fuel supplies available in order to provide further savings to its customers.

Texas Utilities Electric Company provides electric service to about one-third the population of Texas through its operating divisions-Dallas Power & Light, Texas Electric Service and Texas Power & Light.

This is something new - even in Houston - where peculiarity reigns.

The ad invited all singles to come in and meet new singles in the produce department, or in canned goods. Financial advisers were seated next to the detergents to advise singles on how to pay bills. Anything a singles person might be interested in was offered, including, no doubt, specials on all junk and health foods.

There was a time, back when men were men, and women were slaves, that ladies could hang out the laundry, then walk over to the fence to visit with the woman on the other side.

The electric dryer and sexual equality ended that. Peek over a neighbor's fence today, the police will show up at your front door within minutes.

Men used to borrow tools from each other and spend time visiting in the garage. Then tools got expensive. Now garages are locked tight with signs pasted on the window warning of burglar alarm systems.

There are still a few coffee shops around. But Burger Kings and the like are talking over. All you do is tell a speaker what you want, then drive up to the window.

"Here's your change, sir," isn't the cure all for America's loneliness, though.

Today some people can go for months without breathing fresh air. Sliding windows are still installed as a matter of tradition, but nobody uses them. Refrigerated air is expensive, and nobody wants to air-condition a neighborhood of strangers.

In the morning, a person can pack a sack lunch, walk to the garage - which is attached to the house - and then get inside a car with all the windows rolled up.

Not until you are fastened in, do you have to click the automatic garage - which is attached to the house - and then get inside a car with all the windows rolled up.

At work, these people can park in a garage underneath the building. They can walk straight into an elevator that transports them to their office. Again, they've avoided most of the danger of human contact - not to mention anything that nature might offer.

They even have drive-in speakers for some churches now. You just drive up in a huge parking lot, attach the speaker and never have to bother with "fellowship." Pledge payments can be deposited in one of those suction like devices they use at drive-in banks.

I had a call from a fellow free-lance writer the other day. It said, "This is Robert Vernon's machine speaking to Art Lawler's machine. Perhaps the day will come when we can talk live."

There was an old man in our community a few years ago who took to sitting on his front porch. He supposedly hadn't had company since 1949. He never said anything, just stared. A few kids taunted him on their way to school, but there was never any reaction.

D. M. Smith and Warren Anderson, both of Colorado City, were recently re-elected to the Mitchell SWCD Board of Directors on Oct. 14. Smith represents Zone 1 and Anderson represents Zone 2 of the district.

The purpose of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District, with headquarters in Colorado City, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreement with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As two of the five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Smith and Anderson will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Anderson serves on the board of directors of the First National Bank of Colorado City. Smith is active in the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce, Mitchell County Steering Committee and is a director on the Texas Pest Management Association and Mitchell County Farm Bureau. Smith is also chairman of the trustees of the First United Methodist Church and is on the executive committee of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowners or operator.

County Oil News

Production figures have been revealed for the No. 9 Ellis-Gray Unit "Tract 16", a developmental venture of LEM Operating in the Sharon Ridge Field, Mitchell County. The well is located nine miles northwest of Colorado City in the H&GN Survey. The operator has 1,930 acres leased.

The well showed potential to pump 43 barrels of oil per day, plus 85 barrels of water. It bottomed at 1,806 feet, and produces from perforations in the "1700" Formation, 1,541 to 1,741 feet into the wellbore.

Drilling is nearing the 1,300-ft. mark at the No. 1 O. B. Trulock "A", a developmental venture of Wayne Dodson in the Dockrey Field, Mitchell County. Drillsite is in a 40-acre lease in the T&P Survey, two miles southwest of Westbrook.

The operation was spudded Sept. 28, and is aimed at production in the Clear Fork Formation.

Mobil Producing's No. 189 Mary Foster is shut-in for potential testing in the East Iatan-Howard Field. The well was bottomed at 3,470 feet and plugged back to 2,840 feet.

Drillsite is nine miles southwest of Westbrook. The operation is located in a 3,840-acre lease in the T&P Survey. Drilling operations commenced March 5 of this year.

Production data have been revealed on a developmental well in the East Westbrook Field, with McKenney & Chambers Oil as the operator. The No. 2 McKenney "A" potentialized at five barrels of oil per day, plus 30 barrels of water. Production is from perforations in the Clear Fork Formation at 2,532 to 3,054 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,265 feet.

The well is located 4.5 miles northeast of Westbrook in a lease in the T&P Survey. McKenney & Associates replaced Awesome Drilling Co. as the operator.

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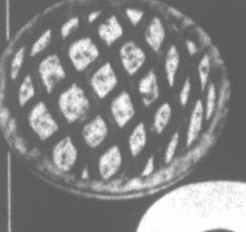
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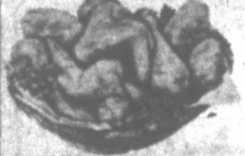

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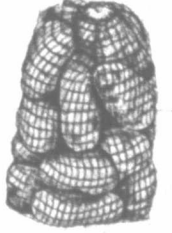

Badgers overtake Wolves, 32-12

MERKEL—The Purple Pride defense of Merkel held Colorado City in check here Friday and the Badgers corrected their own first quarter mistakes to claim a 32-12 5AAA victory.

The win improved Merkel to 4-3 and 2-2 in district. Colorado City sailed to 1-5-1 and 1-3. Merkel put together 460 yards of offense to 178 for the Wolves, who gained just 45 on the ground. The Badgers dominated both halves, but fumbles slowed both teams in the first half and

left the Badgers leading 12-0 at halftime.

Merkel used its ground attack early and throughout the game, but the passing game made the biggest blows.

The Badgers found good running behind the right side on their first scoring drive. Ramon Moreno, who rushed for 50 yards in the first quarter, gave Merkel a 6-0 lead with a 10 yard run at 7:15 of the opening period.

Quarterback Kenneth Jowers riddled the Colorado City defense for 12 first half completions in 19 attempts for 147 yards. A 25 yard screen pass to Doug Taylor made for a first and goal at the Wolves two.

From there, Shane Reagan, Merkel's top rusher with 65 yards on 10 carries, went over the right side for a 12-0 Merkel lead with 1:02 in the half.

The Wolves lost one of three fumbles and suffered two interceptions in the first half, which

saw them gain one yard rushing and 30 passing to 264 yards of offense for Merkel. Bright spots were fumble recoveries by Reese Moore and Cary Ritchey, who also stopped two possible Merkel scores with pass deflections.

Colorado City closed the gap to 12-6 with a three yard run by Beau Rees at 3:32 of the third quarter. A 33 yard completion from Ismael Silva to Larry Mayes, a five yard pass from Ritchey to Mayes and a seven yard run by Reggie Gardner were big plays of the drive.

The Wolves were not able to stop Merkel though. The Badgers made it 19-6 on a 79 yard screen pass from Jowers to Moreno at 2:13 of the third quarter. Shane Newberry kicked the point after.

Jowers intercepted twice for Merkel in the first half and Mark Aldrete and Eddie Proctor stole passes for the Badgers in the second half. Aldrete's steal led

to a 10 yard Reagan score. Colorado City's Jerry Hulme blocked the point after for a 25-6 score with 11:13 left in the game.

Merkel made it 32-6 on a 24 yard run by Moreno with 6:50 left.

The Wolves made it 32-12 with 1:03 left in the game on a one yard run by Silva, with a 25

yard pass to Gardner two plays earlier.

The biggest play was a defensive pass interference call on the Badgers that turned a Colorado City fourth and goal at the five into a first and goal at the one. From there Alvarez scored over the right side at 5:26 of the third period. Perkin passed to George Rivera for the points after and the score stood as the game winner.

It was the only drive of the ballgame, though the Wolves were inside the Merkel ten yard line twice in the waning minutes.

The Badgers controlled the first half though neither team was able to overcome it's own mistakes. Merkel ran 31 first half plays to 14 for the Wolves but lost three of six fumbles in seven possessions.

Five of Colorado City's six first half possessions ended in turnovers as the Wolves lost four of four fumbles and suffered one interception. For the game, Colorado High School lost 5 of 6 fumbles while Merkel lost 3 of 8.

The Badgers rushed for 129 yards to 96 for the Wolves though Colorado City averaged 4 yards a carry to 3 for Merkel. Alvarez gained 71 yards on 17 carries for a 4.1 average. Through the air, the Wolves completed 0 of 6 passes while the Badgers had no completions in three attempts.

The win improved the junior varsity to 2-5.

Bubba Bailey recorded one of three fumble recoveries for Colorado City and George Rivera caused another.

The freshmen averaged a whopping 9.8 yards a carry to improve to 4-3 with their third consecutive victory. The Wolves gained 244 yards on 25 rushes. Merkel was held to 121 yards on 48 carries for a 2.5 average.

Big plays highlighted the ballgame.

The first was made by defensive lineman Kevin Monroe, who stopped a fake Merkel punt four yards short of a first down.

On the next play, quarterback Ray Rivera faked to the first man then kept around the right side for a 65 yard touchdown run at 9:34 of the second period. Rivera kicked the point after for a 7-0 lead.

Merkel fumbled on its next play and Abel Arellano recovered for the Wolves. Five plays later Tracy Edwards cut inside the left end then cut outside for a 17 yard score at 7:40 of the second period. Two plays earlier, Bobby Arocha had picked up his own fumble and completed an 11 yard run.

On Colorado City's very next play following Edwards' score, Rivera threw deep to Rick Westbrook. The pass covered some 40 yards and hit Westbrook in stride at about the Merkel 15 to make for a 52 yard touchdown at 2:49 of the second period and a 19-0 score.

It took the Wolves two plays and 24 seconds of the second half to increase their lead to 26-0. The first play was a 31 yard pass play from Rivera to Stan Bradbury. The second play was a 24 yard touchdown run by Edwards at 9:36 of the third period. Rivera kicked the PAT.

John Pharris stripped a Merkel ballcarrier of the ball to set up the next Colorado City score. Frank Selvera recovered the fumble for the Wolves and Rivera turned it into a 23 yard field goal with six minutes left in the third quarter.

With 58 seconds left in the period, Selvera tackled a Badger runner in the endzone for a safety and a 31-0 lead. After the free kick, Edwards added a 54 yard score. Ken Land's extra points pass to Bradbury ended the scoring with 9:50 left in the game.

Leading ground gainers for the Wolves were Arocha with 29 yards on six carries for a 4.8 average, Rivera 77 yards on 6 carries for a 12.8 average and Edwards 109 yards on 7 carries for a 15.6 average. Through the air, the Wolves completed two of three for 83 yards and dropped one pass while Merkel registered no completions in three attempts.

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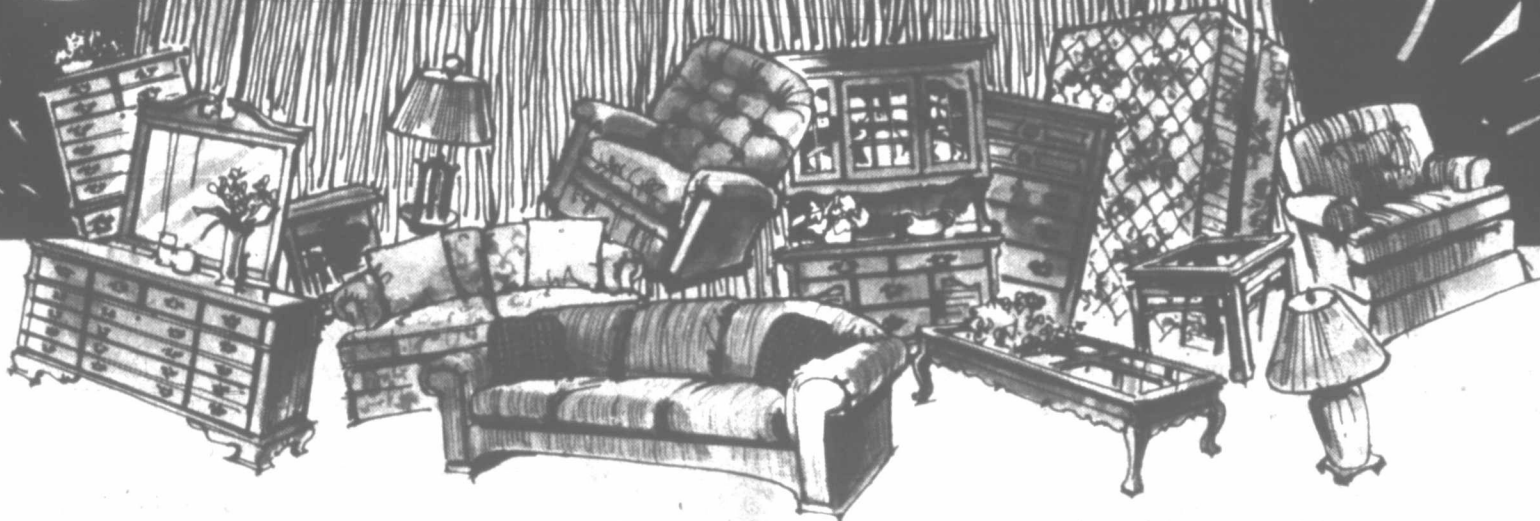
