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New Stand Pipe For Junction.

J. N. Hodges, C. W. Atchison, and W. P. Riley, of Junction Water Works, returned Tuesday from Brownwood where they purchased a stand pipe for use in Junction. The pipe is 30 ft. in diameter, 100 ft. high, and has a capacity of 255,000 gallons. The pipe was used in Brownwood till the town grew to a population of 7000 inhabitants, and was amply sufficient for their purpose. It will be erected beside the old reservoir near the gin. It is expected to have it up in the next sixty or ninety days. This will give the water works the power and force so much needed for our town, and the people of Junction will rejoice to learn of this new improvement. Messrs. Hodges, Atchison, and Riley have the thanks of our people for this progressive step in supplying a much felt need.

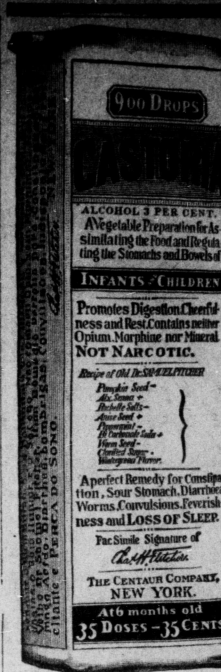
