Forrest Answers Questions About Consolidation

A barrage of questions was answered by Leo Forrest, president of the Board of Trustees of the Hereford Independent School district, following a talk before the Hereford Lions Club Wednesday noon regarding the proposed consolidation of schools in this county.

Forrest explained the proposed consolidation movement and the reasons for it, and offered with the aid of other school board members present, to answer any questions regarding the set-up.

The Board has voted unanimously, he told the Lions, to exclude transfers from the affected common school districts if the consolidation is voted down. Such action is necessary, he said, if the Hereford district is going to have to meet necessary expansion of facilities alone.

Some of the questions asked, and answers offered were:

Q. How many students would be dropped from the local schools if consolidation fails?

A. About 200.

Q. If consolidation carries, do you plan to offer consolidation to outlying school districts in the county?

A. Yes. The law provides that contiguous school districts may be consolidated. Outlying school districts, some of which are interested already in consolidation, cannot be included in the consolidated district unless the districts lying between them and the Hereford district (i. e. those districts which will vote in this election) agree to consolidate.

Canning Operations May Start Next Week at New Plant Here

Dalhart Man Will Be New School Superintendent

George Graham, superintendent of schools at Dalhart last year, will succeed Chester Strickland as School Superintendent in Hereford, the board of trustees announced this week.

Graham has submitted his resignation at Dalhart, effective immediately, and will move to Hereford with his family within a few days.

Supt. Strickland resigned last month to accept a position as head of the city schools at Denton, and has already moved to that city.

Graham has been superintendent of schools at Dalhart for the past year, having gone to that city on June 1, 1945, after five years as superintendent of the consolidated school at Plemmons, near Borger.

According to a spokesman of the Dalhart Board of Education, announcing Graham's resignation in that city, his resignation was accepted in order that he might accept the Hereford position "at a marked increase in salary."

Graham attended West Texas State College at Canyon, and graduated at Texas Technological College of Lubbock. He is married, has a boy 12, a girl 6.

Waste Water In Streets, Alleys, Must Be Stopped

City authorities dug way down deep in the files for this one, but there is a city ordinance prohibiting any business or residence from allowing waste water to run into the streets, alleys, or other places within the city limits to such a point that it becomes stagnant or causes a nuisance.

That statute is dated 1910, but its going to be enforced in 1946. According to the old ordinance, violation constitutes a misdemeanor and is punishable by fine not to exceed \$100.

The ordinance was fished out of the files for the particular benefit of several local business firms which are operating air conditioners and allowing the waste water to run freely into the streets, causing some rare and permanent mud-holes in spite of the general drought.

Pheasant Hunting In State Park Is Expensive Hobby

Pheasant hunting in Hereford State Park is an expensive hobby.

One local man paid a fine of \$50 and costs for shooting a pheasant on the creek last week, and, according to Justice of the Peace Andy Thomas, this one "got off light."

Even with the price of meat what it is, that's pretty expensive eating.

According to the game warden, and there is a game warden around as last week's hunter discovered to his sorrow, it doesn't make any difference to the law whether or not you hit the bird . . . just shooting is a fixable offense.

The pheasants in State Park have been placed there for breeding . . . not for eating. Shooting for sport is out, because the few birds in the park are so tame that a hunter might pick one up in his hand almost as easily as by shooting. Minimum fine is \$25 and cost, and the maximum is \$150. That's fair warning.

The Deaf Smith County Food Products Company's quarter of a million dollar canning plant, delayed by construction difficulties and material shortages plans to get into operation by the first of next week, Worth Ware, manager of the plant, said yesterday.

The plant is still far from complete, but work is going forward day and night in an effort to get the canning line into production within a few days, Ware said.

Harvesting of black-eyed peas and beans will be starting this week, he stated, and Field Manager Fred Owen has harvest crews organized and ready to go to work.

Machinery Damaged A shipment of machinery for the new plant arrived this week after long delay, and was found to have been considerably damaged in shipment. Local machine shops and welders have been pressed into service, Ware said, in an effort to repair and improvise parts to get the plant into immediate operation.

"We will buy all produce which we have contracted," Ware said, "and will pay top ceiling prices."

OPA Ceiling on black-eyed peas is now \$6.80 a ton, or three and a quarter cents a pound, and on green beans, ceiling price is 5 cents a pound, he said.

2000 Acres Planted The local plant has contracted for more than 2,000 acres of black-eyed peas and green beans. The plant will have a daily capacity of between 2,000 and 2,500 cases of canned goods when it is in full operation.

Ware expects to begin operations with nearly 100 employees, and says that that figure will be boosted to 250 when peak operations are reached on the present units. Completed facilities will provide for that number of workers.

The pea and bean harvest should run through October. No estimate can be made until harvesting is started on what the yield may be here, but plant officials predict that local irrigated fields should produce 3,000 pounds to the acre. Peas and beans are bought at the field.

All-Year Operation According to Ware, the Hereford plant is planning for year-around operation, rather than strictly seasonal business.

"When the pea and bean harvest is completed," he stated, "we expect to remain in operation by dry-packing English peas, re-packing other products, and canning meat."

Spud Growers Are Urged to Hurry With Bulk Sales

A warning was issued to potato growers this week by the Production Marketing Administration that bulk outlets for spuds are filling fast and spud growers were urged to rush harvesting as much as possible to get the crop on the way.

The bulk support program on potatoes will continue until September 1, with the government paying support prices up to \$2.25 on No. 1 spuds, but if outlets should close suddenly, PMA officials point out, it may cause considerable delay in moving the crop.

Closing of bulk outlets, according to PMA, might make it necessary for shippers to hold and store spuds for a time until the government could bill cars, and could affect the grade of the potatoes.

"We are anxious for all growers who want to take advantage of bulk sales to hurry," a spokesman for the PMA said yesterday.

It is estimated that there are still well over 500 acres of spuds yet to be harvested in this county.

Some Deaf Smith county spuds, however, are still bringing premium market prices even on the glutted spud market.

Reds and long whites are selling at \$2.80 for No. 1's, according to the Howard Clark warehouse, and shippers are unable to fill the demand.

"We are sold up now for the entire crop on long whites and reds," a Gault spokesman said, "and are not taking any more orders."

Plant Lice Are Attacking Row Crops in Area

An aphid, closely related to the green bug which caused considerable havoc with the wheat crop this spring, is giving a number of Deaf Smith county farmers headaches now with their row crops.

The insect is attacking grain sorghums primarily, according to County Agent Hugh Clearman, and is causing great damage in some localities.

The aphids are present in nearly all fields where grain sorghums are growing, Clearman said.

Hereford Veterans Plan Big V-Day Celebration on 14th

While no official city-wide observance of V-Day is planned here, Hereford war veterans will celebrate next Wednesday night, August 14, with a "Dutch Lunch" picnic and dance at the Hereford State Park and Clubhouse.

Members of the Roy Wendenbrook Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be joined by the Hereford Post of the American Legion in a gala celebration on the first anniversary of the end of the war.

Many members of both organizations were overseas when the Japanese surrender negotiations began last August 14 and will be taking part in their first "state-side" celebration of war's end.

Crash Victim Held Friday Funeral Services for Plane

Funeral rites for W. A. (Bill) Bowman, 28, co-owner of Hereford's Clover alfalfa, were conducted Friday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the First Methodist Church in Hereford.

Rev. Marvin Boyd, pastor, was in charge of the rites. Interment was in West Park Cemetery under direction of E. B. Black Funeral Home.

Bowman died at the Deaf Smith County Hospital at 8:30 Thursday morning as a result of injuries received when his plane crashed into a field 20 miles northwest of Hereford an hour earlier.

Bowman was flying a Piper Cub, and had taken off from Clover Field shortly after dawn Thursday, accompanied by Elza Collier, a student pilot at the field, on an aerial coyote hunt.

The plane crashed into a field on the Alton Biggers farm at about 7:30 Thursday morning. Biggers, who witnessed the crash, said the plane was flying at about 15 feet when it banked into a turn and stalled, crashing nose first to the ground.

Biggers rushed Collier and Bowman to the Deaf Smith Hospital in Hereford, and Bowman succumbed to his injuries shortly after reaching the hospital. Collier suffered from lacerations and bruises and a crushed foot, but was not considered in a critical condition.

Bowman is survived by his wife, the former Hope Adams of Jumbo community; two sons, J. W. 5, and Ronald, 3; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Bowman of Bethany, Oklahoma; three sisters, Mrs. Delton Grayson of Amarillo; Mrs. J. D. Neely of Clovis; and Mrs. Charles Rodgers of Bethany, Oklahoma; and two brothers, Lawrence Bowman of Johnstown, Colo.; and Earl Bowman of Bethany, Oklahoma.

He was born at Viet, Oklahoma, on February 9, 1918, and came to Texas in 1936. He attended school at Bovina and

graduated from Bovina High school in 1936, when he moved to Hereford. He was married to Hope Adams of Jumbo on February 15, 1939.

Bowman had been associated with Carl Kropff in operating Clover Field here for the past year. He was an experienced pilot, with more than 300 hours flying time. The crash Thursday was the first fatal accident connected with Clover Field since it was opened more than a year ago.

Pallbearers at the funeral services were Carl Kropff, J. B. Cocanougher, Clarence Leasure, Chester Pinckert, Jimmie Allred, and Lyle Blanton.

City and School to Assess 75 Percent of Total Value

Initial reports from the tax survey of Hereford school district and city property indicate that total valuation of real property will be increased by nearly fifty percent on the tax rolls this year.

A preliminary report from the G. C. McKinney firm of tax engineers, employed to make the survey by joint action of city, county, and school district taxing authorities, places the total valuation of real property in the Independent School district at \$8,720,240, an increase of about 40 percent.

Valuation of city property was set at slightly under five million dollars, an increase of approximately 50 percent.

These figures do not include valuations of personal property which were not covered by the survey.

Personal property under jurisdiction of the school district in 1945 was assessed at \$1,561,000. Based on these figures, the Independent School district will base its tax program this year on a total valuation of approximately \$10,000,000.

Rates Unchanged

Both the city and school district will assess taxes this year based on 75 percent of total valuation. This figure was decided on at meetings of the school board and city commission this week.

The school tax rate remains unchanged at \$1.00 on the \$100. The city's tax rate, \$1.30 last year, has not been set yet for 1946.

Valuations set by the survey will be subject to action of the city and school boards of equalization. Dates for the equalization board hearings have not yet been set.

Detailed figures from the tax survey are not yet available. The totals were reported to city and school taxing authorities by telephone, and final and complete figures on the valuations will be received within a few days.

New Consolidation

A major portion of the increase in valuations of real property, however, will probably be accounted for by construction of new buildings and homes during the past year.

Another major increase over old valuations will be on unimproved property. An attempt was made in the valuation survey to equalize the valuations of all real estate, and vacant lots which have been rendered at low rates for a period of several years, and which are now selling at premium prices, are expected to take a big jump in valuation. Some property was picked up on the survey which had not been rendered for taxes before.

The McKinney Company, which made the survey here, specializes in valuation engineering, and has recently completed a similar project for the city of Lubbock. Under their system of assessing values, land and improvements are valued separately and an attempt is made to equalize all land values aside from improvements.

The school district budget, as tentatively set up by the board of trustees this week, calls for \$113,000 to cover teachers salaries, amortization of bonds and interest, and operating expenses.

The week-end rains followed the pattern of the previous month, one of the driest Julys on record . . . a pattern of scattered showers and no general rains. Hereford and immediate vicinity received more rain last month than most sections of the county, according to a still incomplete survey by the Deaf Smith Wind Erosion District.

Farmers Income Record Books Are Now Available

COLLEGE STATION, August 5—With the halfway mark in the year's business recently gone by, Tyrus Timm, economist in farm management for the A and M. College Extension Service, reminds farmers that the income tax will again be due on January 15, 1947, and that complete farm records should be kept. Like the last pay period, a farmer may elect to make a final return on March 15, 1947, but this last date is for final correction. The main bill still is due on January 15.

More than 95 per cent of Texas farm families file on a cash basis, says Mr. Timm. In this connection, various sections of the Texas Farm Record Book prepared by Texas A. and M. College will give the facts necessary for income tax returns. The total amount of money received for crops and livestock raised on the farm should be recorded on pages 10-23 of the Texas Farm Record Book. Cash received for such services as work on other farms, hire of tractor, AAA payments and the like should be itemized on the same pages in the miscellaneous sales column.

List sales of livestock and other items previously bought on pages 10-23 and purchase price on pages 24-25 under expenses. All cash farm operating expenses (not household) and the purchase price of animals that died during the year also should be put on these pages.

Depreciation on farm buildings and equipment goes on pages 1-7. If you don't have one, full particulars about the Texas Farm Record Book may be obtained from your local County Agent!

Late Onions Will Start Moving in Week to Ten Days

Seed onion crop in this area is expected to start moving within a week or ten days, growers report, with a few onions going on the market now. Most plant onions are already harvested.

Early onions are bringing prices ranging from 75 cents to \$1.20 on the market now, shippers report. No estimates on what the market on the late crop may be available.

F. G. Collier of the local ACA office reported yesterday that this county has been allotted four cars for government purchase of onions at the support price of \$1.00 per 50-pound bag on U. S. No. 1's.

The government price is on No. 1 grades with 2 inch minimum center up to and including Jumbos.

The entire West Texas area has been allotted ten cars, Collier said. More cars may be allotted in the area if needed, but no definite commitment to this effect has been made.

"We don't know yet when the movement under government purchase will start," he stated.

There are 200 acres of land in onions in this county. Some of the early crop is already out and sold, and the late crop should start moving in about a week. H. L. Coffin, biggest planter in this county, has 60 acres in onions. D. W. Finland has 50 acres, part of which has been harvested and sold.

Strawberries Can Be Frozen Now For Winter Use

Freezing is the way of ways to preserve strawberries. Frozen strawberries keep their fresh summertime color and flavor long after winter snows are on the ground. Preparing the berries for the home freezer is surprisingly easy, say home economists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Here are main points:

Select firm, table-ripe strawberries of a good variety for freezing. If in doubt about which varieties in the locality are suitable, write to the State college of agriculture or extension service.

Get the berries ready for the freezer as quickly as possible. Sort and cap them carefully, discarding any that are green, bruised, or overripe. Then wash a few at a time in cold water and drain in a colander. Leave strawberries whole or slice, according to taste.

Most kinds of berries can be frozen without sugar, but strawberries have better texture and flavor when sweetened with dry sugar before freezing. About 1 cup sugar to 5 to 8 cups strawberries gives good results. Add the sugar slowly, turning the berries over and over until it dissolves. Be careful not to crush the berries.

Pack the sweetened strawberries in moisture-vapor-resistant containers. Make sure the berries are covered with juice. If necessary, press them down with a spoon until juice covers them. Leave room for the

berries to expand as they freeze—about 1 inch in a carton or bag. 1½ inches in glass jars or tin cans. Seal containers tightly.

Once the berries are packed, lose no time getting them into the freezer. Place the packages against the freezing plates or coils, spreading them out so air can circulate between them. After freezing, store at zero degrees F. or lower.

DDT Used To Spray Cattle and Dairy Barns

J. Bynum of Amarillo, who has a cattle ranch north of Dawn, reports a successful experiment in spraying cattle with DDT, according to county agent Hugh Clearman.

Bynum used wettable DDT powder in proportion of one pound of powder to 23 gallons of water.

He sprayed 155 head of cattle, steers averaging 950 pounds each, with the mixture, using a knapsack sprayer. The entire operation required about two hours, Bynum said.

Approximately 30 gallons of the mixture was used, and Bynum figures the cost per head of cattle at one cent.

Before spraying, he reports, the cattle were covered with flies. The spray was used on July 22, and no flies have been noticed since.

Bynum used a few gallons of spray which was left over from the cattle spraying to cover his dairy barn and well house, and says there've been no flies in these places since the spray was used.

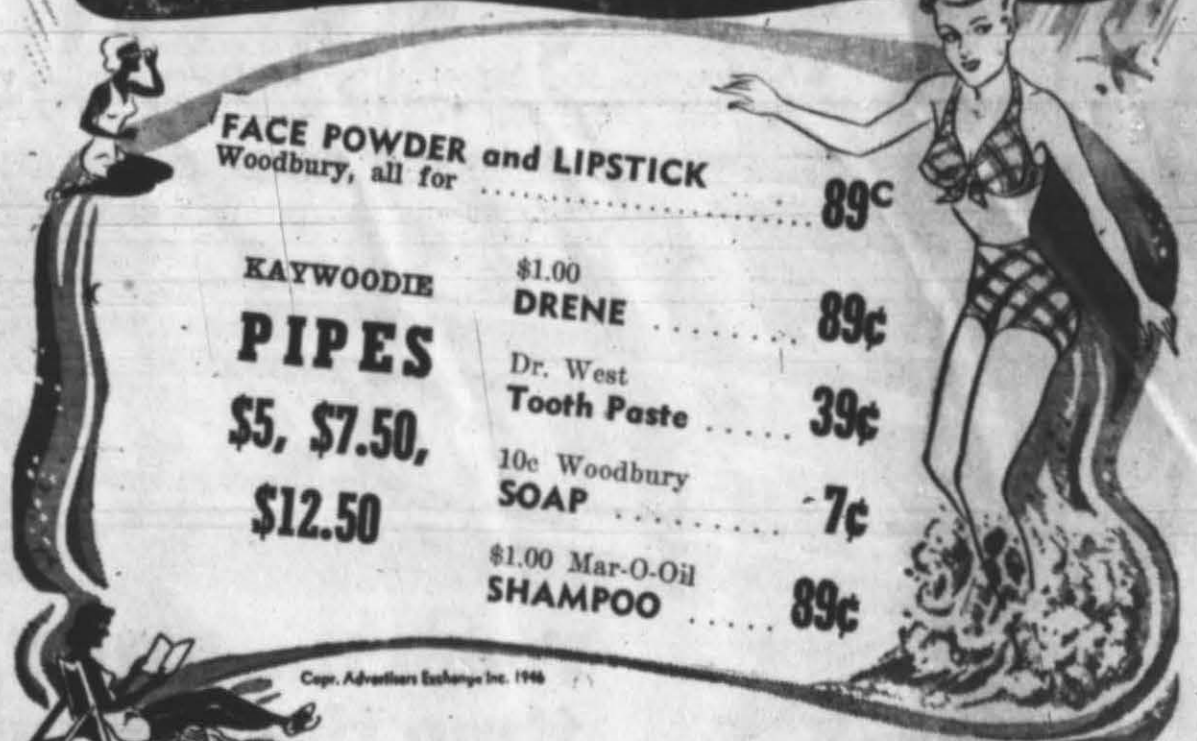

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Swimming in Polluted Water Spreads Infantile Paralysis

Fifth of a series of articles on the scientific background of the safeguards against polio.

"Don't swim in polluted water," says The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in its list of safeguards against polio. Pointing out that scientists have long known that the virus causing infantile paralysis is readily found in the bow-

els of many patients and healthy contacts, many scientists believe that swimming in water polluted by sewage which contains this deadly virus may lead to infection.

Although positive proof is still lacking that cases of infantile paralysis infection have resulted directly from swimming in polluted water, scientific research has piled up a

wealth of circumstantial evidence which indicates that this might be one of the many ways of getting the disease.

One of the more recent studies along this line was made in the small town of Perrysburg, Ohio, which suffered an outbreak of polio in the summer of 1944. Perrysburg is a community of only 3,500 persons, and the occurrence of eleven cases of infantile paralysis was a catastrophe. The townspeople were in a state of panic and fear. How many of their children would be stricken by this crippling disease?

At the request of the local health authorities three scientists whose work was supported by the National Foundation came to the town to try to track down the reasons for the epidemic. Doctors John A. Toomey and William S. Tekacs of Western Reserve University and Doctor H. M. Weaver of Wayne University surveyed the town and discovered that a majority of the patients lived in homes bordering a creek that ran through the settlement. The scientists decided to make a search for the virus in the waters of that muddy stream.

Their suspicions of the water were strengthened when the local chief of police told them that he knew of several children who had contracted infantile paralysis after wading and swimming in the creek. "Some of them," he said, "had upset stomachs after swimming in the water." There was evidence also that the stream was being polluted at a number of places by water containing sewage.

The polio scientists set up their testing stations at various sections of the creek: (1) where it entered the town; (2) where it left the town; and (3) at a mid-point near where contaminated sewage flowing into the creek. After collecting many samples of creek water the scientists left Perrysburg and returned to the laboratory to begin the arduous work of proving the presence of the virus.

The first animals used were wild cotton rats but not much success was had with these animals as they died shortly after inoculation with samples of creek water without showing signs of infantile paralysis. Undismayed by these apparent failures, the scientists removed the spinal cord and brains of the dead rats and made emulsions of these organs which they injected into another group of cotton rats.

The second series of animals also died without signs of polio, but doggedly the scientists continued inoculations into other

rats. Finally their efforts were rewarded. The seventh series of injected cotton rats showed symptoms of infantile paralysis. To confirm their results they once more removed the spinal cord and brains of the dead rats and injected an emulsion of this into monkeys. When the monkeys became sick and paralyzed with polio the research work was complete. The polio scientists had proved that the creek water contained the virus of infantile paralysis.

Although the doctors were unable to prove conclusively that any of the cases of polio in Perrysburg had been directly caused by swimming in the creek, there was the undeniable fact that many of the children had waded in the water prior to their illness.

When the results of the scientific experiments demonstrated the presence of the infecting virus in the polluted stream, the chain of circumstantial evidence was complete. Once again it strengthened the precaution which should be followed during epidemics. "Do not swim in polluted water."

Official Canvass Of Primary Vote Make No Change

Official canvass of Deaf Smith county election returns made by the county Democratic Committee 96 days after the election revealed no change in the un-official totals in any places listed by The Brand.

In the primary race which might have been affected by a change in the official tabulation, the race between John Aldridge and Harry D. Schultz for district judge, the official tabulation was unchanged, with Aldridge leading in county 970 to 910.

There is no indication from other counties that the official totals have been altered, and Schultz is apparently the nominee by a margin of 26 votes.

According to the official tabulation, 2,002 ballots were cast in Deaf Smith county to set a new election record.

Q. What about the school-age children in these common school districts? Don't they

have the same right to an education as those in town?

A. Yes... but not at the expense of somebody else. If those districts refuse to consolidate with the Hereford district, it will be up to the boards of

trustees in the individual districts to provide for that education.

Q. What about the outlying school districts which have not had a chance to vote on consolidation? Will they be excluded from sending their students to the Hereford school?

A. No. The Board's attitude is that, until they have the opportunity to vote for or against consolidation, it is only fair to continue to accept their transfers. Such districts are Rance, Frio, and part of Progressive.

Q. If consolidation is voted down in only one district, will another election be called to give the favoring districts a chance to consolidate?

A. Yes, if the districts which vote in favor of consolidation present a petition asking for another election, it can be called in 15 days; and the district opposing consolidation can be left out of the second election.

Q. Is it going to be necessary to have half-day school this year?

A. We hope not. After many delays, the school has finally been notified that application to purchase three of the six buildings applied for from the Prisoner of War Camp has been approved. Two of these are buildings which will be used for additional classrooms.

Q. If consolidation carries, will it be necessary to add more teachers?

A. Probably. If an additional 200 students are added, we may need to add more teachers than we are now planning for.

Q. If a second vote on consolidation in some of the districts becomes necessary, and such election is called after school starts this fall, will students from those districts voting be excluded from attending school in Hereford until after the election?

A. No. They will be accepted until their districts have opportunity to vote on consolidation.
