Another Organizational Meeting On N-S Hwy. Held Monday Night

Monday night at Clifton, rep-
resentatives from Ft. Worth, Dal-
las, Cleburne, Hillsboro, Morgan,
Burleson, Kopperal, Meridian, Clif-

School Population

Of County Gets Down To Work This Month

According to informaton re-
leased this week from the office
of County Superintendent Ollie
Little, the public schools of Cor-
yell county are either already or-
ganized and the teachers and
students at work, or will begin
next Monday.

The three independent districts,
Gatesville, Oglesby and Copperas
Cove are open with record en-
tries for the beginning of the se-
mester and a fair teacher person-
nel, the teacher shortage still being
felt.

Scheduled to open Monday,
September 16 are the following
schools: Evant with O. C. Cook,
superintendent, and a prospective
enrollment of 275 students.

Ireland, Mrs. Elizabeth What-
ley, principal, and 45 pupils.

Jonesboro with P. T. Lemmons,
superintendent, eight teachers and
a student body of 200 normal en-
rollment.

Coryell City, a two-teacher fa-
culty and 40 students.

Osage, two-teacher faculty and
40 students.

Rural schools already underway
are the following:

Flat, an eight-teacher faculty
with W. T. Brumalow, superin-
tendent, and an enrollment of 200
pupils.

Pearl, Earl Culp, superintendent
and an enrollment of 175 students.
Mr. Culp has a supporting faculty
of five teachers.

Levita opened with a student
enrollment of 50 and Mrs. Ouida
Wiggins, principal, with two other
teachers completing the faculty.

Mound School is headed by Ted
Brumalow, principal, with a com-
plement of three other teachers
and a student entry of 80 children.

The Grove school has Mrs.
Myrtle Sapp as principal with a
supporting faculty of two teachers
and the student body numbers
50 children.

Whitehall is headed by W. G.
Hancock, principal, with one as-
sistant. Student entries number 40.

Turnersville has Virgil Jones
as superintendent and eight as-
sistant teachers. Opening enroll-
ment numbers 225 students.

Purmela with Mrs. Eva Dun-
can, principal, has two other teach-
ers and an enrollment of 50 stu-
dents.

Arnett with Mrs. Daisy Jones as
principal has an enrollment of
40 students, and one assistant
teacher.

LONDON, Sept. 12 (AP)—British sources said sev-
eral Arab League delegates at the Palestine Conference
emphatically rejected today the British-American expert's
plan for the Holy Land's Federalization.

ECONOMIC ADMINISTRATION TO GERMANS

BERLIN, Sept. 12 (AP)—The economic administra-
tion of the American-British Occupation Zones was en-
trusted to a special six-man German Committee in a move
acclaimed by an American spokesman as a step toward
fulfillment of the Potsdam Agreement.

ENGLISH COMMUNISTS SAYS "HEADED TO WAR"

LONDON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Britains No. 1 Communist
Harry Pollitt, charged today that "British War Prepara-
tions" caused the housing shortage which has resulted in
the Communist led squatter influx into London's vacant
apartment houses and hotels. He said the government's
foreign policy was "leading to new wars".

"Action" Is The Word On School Facilities: City Gets It Back

One, the city thought had been
"pitched out" was the school
housing situation. They got it back.

The school board pitched it back
Monday night, saying simply that
something had to be done, and
the Council was willing, on a tem-
porary basis, and here's what's
happening.

old CCC Camp buildings we used

probably be purchased and put
somewhere for the band, and the
elementary grades will probably
come out of the basement boiler
room.

The board, composed of Chair-
man O. N. Hix, J. D. Brown, Jr.,
Dr. Otis Ray, Miller Stinnett and
Pete Patterson met with Supt.
George W. Wier and the Council,
minus H. Wade Sadler and Donald
McKinney, and this was proposed
and started.

Two other proposals mentioned:
for the city to acquire new prop-
erty. This'un blew up. The other
was about the basement. It did
too.

All looks difficult, but it seems
to us, both the city and the school
board is trying to get along, and
they're both in difficulties. The
housing shortage everywhere is no
worse than the school housing
shortage everywhere.

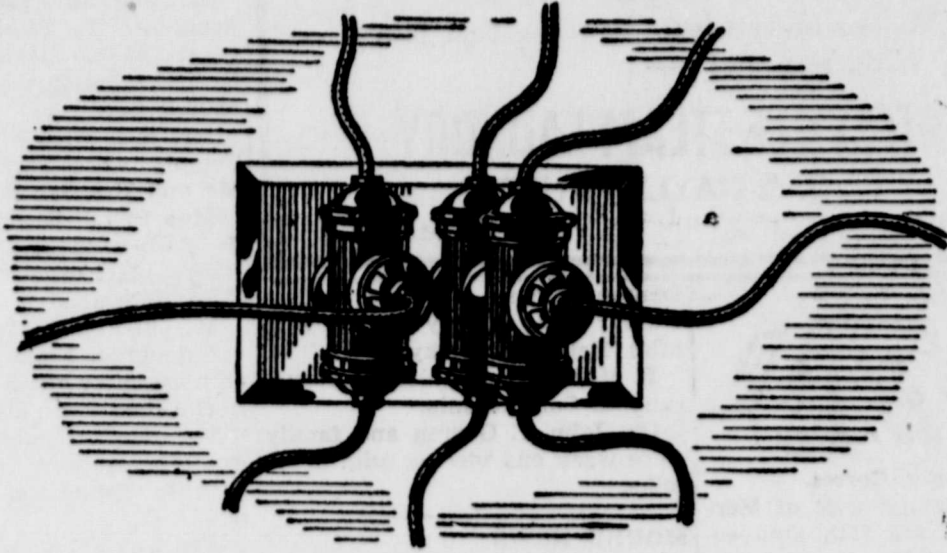
