My dear Senator:

Replying further to your favor of July 3, 1934, with reference to the payment of the Pink Bollworm claim, I am pleased to advise that those claims are being paid as fast as they are filed in this department.

Up to this time warrants have issued in payment of claims from Midland and Martin counties, and have been returned to the Compensation Claims Board of the Agricultural Department for distribution. This morning I received approximately one-third of the claims for Howard county. I am preparing to issue warrants in payment of these claims this date. No other claims have been filed in this department covering the Pink Bollworm claims.

My force is working over time in order that there may be no delay in getting these claims paid. I will thank you to assure all those interested in this matter that I am doing everything possible to get these claims paid without delay.

The impression that seems to prevail in the Pink Bollworm section is that these claims are being held up in this department. That situation is not true. As above stated, all claims that have been filed have been paid immediately, and will be paid as fast as presented.

ONCE more, the 4th of July has passed away into recorded history. Of course, that date is connected chiefly with the Declaration of Independence, but that paper, important as it was, could not stop other events from taking place on the national birthday. The list might be extended to great length, but a few of the more important or interesting occurrences will be mentioned. On the 4th of July 1826, President Adams and Jefferson died, and President Monroe passed to his rest in 1831. The first passenger railroad in the United States was begun in 1828. For the 4th of July event in 1848, the treaty of peace between the United States and Mexico was signed. In 1804, Nathaniel Hawthorne, New England author, whose writings still retain their charm, made his appearance in the world which thereafter was to regard him so kindly. Firecrackers announced the birth of President Coolidge in 1872. The hymn "America," now considered as an accepted part of a Fourth of July celebration, was first sung in Boston in 1833. The memorable words, "Lafayette we are here," were spoken in an oration at Paris in 1917. No doubt 1934 will add its item of interest. For the present, let us be contented with the statement that 115 persons were killed in the merry-making of the holiday of that year; a record which, although bad enough, is slightly below that of many other years.

FACTS RELATIVE PINK BOLL WORM EXPLAINED BY BOARD

MISSING AND INCOMPLETE GIN RECORDS HAVE PLACED THE CLAIMANTS AT A GREAT DISADVANTAGE.

The following communication from the Pink Boll Worm Compensation Claim Board, Ben F. Chapman, ex-officio secretary, Austin, Texas, July 9, 1934, has been received:

Stanton, Texas
Dear Editor:

That the Pink Bollworm claimants of Martin county may know the facts and the efforts that have been set forth by the Pink Bollworm Claim Board in an effort to serve them in an appreciable way, we want to make the following statement:

In the first place, if all gin records covering the period affected by this refund had been in the hands of the Legislature at the time the appropriation was voted, they would have known the exact amount to have been appropriated to cover the claims, but instead of this, the only records that were available in this office at the time the Pink Bollworm Claim Board was appointed and sworn in, were the records of 1929, assembled through the efforts of the Honorable George B. Terrell during his last year in office and covered the year 1929 up to December 31st.

To secure the records of the gins for the other years affected, it was necessary that the Board send a representative into the affected area and contact the ginners in an effort to get these records with the least possible delay. During this lapse of time many gins had changed ownership, records had become lost or misplaced and in a number of instances, destroyed by fire by the burning of the different gins. Had the records of all these gins been in the possession of the Legislature at the time the appropriation was made, it would not have been necessary to hold up payment of all claims until all were filed and approved, but immediately upon the correct filing and approving of the individual claims, same could have been paid without delay. These missing and incomplete gin records have placed the claimants at a very great disadvantage in the preparation of their claims and has caused untold amount of correspondence between the claimants and the Board in an effort to get the claims in shape that they might be paid for the full amount for which they were justly entitled to claim. But owing to the long delay many of them had destroyed or misplaced gin tickets and other evidence that would have assisted them in substantiating their claims and we want to here compliment the fairness displayed in almost all cases by the claimants in trying to present their claims for only the amount to which they were justly entitled to claim reimbursement.

In the handling of nearly 10,000 claims there has been no apparent effort or intent on the part of the claimants to defraud anyone in the filing of his claim and where the records were available, it is interesting indeed, to note that in most instances claims and the gin records corresponded in toto.

Something like one-half of the Martin county warrants were delivered to the mails on Saturday afternoon, July 7th, and the balance of the warrants for this county will go in the mails tonight, if we have to work until 8 o'clock to accomplish the work.

We wish it were possible that more of the claimants could look in upon our office and grasp the bigness and intricacy of this work that the Board had in handling this work and to see the systematic working of everyone connected with this work.

Those Refusing Work Not To Get Relief

Upon instructions embraced in a Resolution passed by the Texas Relief Commission June 27, 1934, notice is hereby given to the effect that persons physically able to work who are offered employment at the prevailing wage scale in the locality wherein the work is to be performed, and who refuses to accept without good cause, shall not be furnished relief.

The following instructions are issued to all citizens of Martin county, to wit:

Any person or persons offering employment to others, whether on relief rolls or not, will inform the local County Relief Board chairman in writing immediately when employment offered by such citizen is refused. Such advice to the County Board chairman will include, when possible, the work-seeker's full name, address, employment offered and wages offered.

When any person has been offered employment, and has refused it, under the conditions above stated, the County Relief Board of Martin county is prohibited from giving either direct or work relief to such person.

This pronouncement is published under direction of the Texas Relief Commission, whose membership requests the universal cooperation of the people of Texas in support of this action which is directed at the displacement of persons on relief who refuse to accept work.

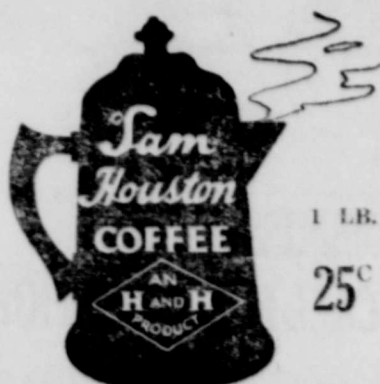

TRUCKS NOT CARRYING NRA
NOT WORK ON FED. PROJECTS

After July 13 no truck operating for hire without NRA insignia plates will be allowed to work upon any project upon which Federal funds are being spent, according to Col. H. F. Stewart, chairman of the Texas trucking code authority. "This will include much of the road construction, public building renovations and other public works projects under way," he said.

The names of over 400 truck drivers who have not registered under the code have been certified to the NRA Compliance Office at San Antonio, according to Mr. Stewart.

"Almost 2000 registrations have been made in Texas," he continued, "but of course there are always some laggards who stay out until the last minute. July 13 is the last day on which anyone operating a truck for hire can operate legally without the NRA plate, but the code authority will continue to accept registrations from those who can show reason for not having registered. Anyone who should register and who has not done so by that date will be subject to the full penalties of the Recovery Act, and each day is a separate offense under the code."

Full information on registration may be had from the headquarters of the code authority in the Littlefield Building at Austin.

EIGHT POUND BASS HANGS SELF IN MESQUITE TREE

A party of fishermen, composed of French Gray and John Whitson of Stanton and his brother-in-law Olton Davis of Bedias, Texas, and Dick Whitson of Midland, returned Friday night from angling in the waters of Lake Sweetwater. They were guests of Palmer Leeper, of Sweetwater, manager of the Western Wind Mill Co., who turned over to them his modern little beach home at the lake and left it with them. Mr. Leeper even provided them with all fishing tackle.

According to French Gray the fish seemed to be more of a playful mood than they were in the mood of biting artificial bait. While out on the lake fishing a huge bass hopped out of the water and struck Gray on the hip almost dislocating that member. A scrub mesquite out in the water had a bass hanging to it that weighed about 8 pounds according to Gray. It is thought the bass had jumped from the water after a mesquite bean and hung himself through the gill and mouth on a stub limb of the tree. The Tarzan community received the heaviest rainfall of any point in the county—farmers reporting from 5 to 7 inches. This community and Goldsmith, about the two driest in the county received a good rain. In the Courtney section, northwest of Stanton, a heavy rain fell, which, together with a good rain a few weeks ago, has practically insured the crops in that community.

Reports have it that Woodard community has received no rain to date, and no crops have been planted. The community is suffering more from the ravages of the drought than any other point in the county.

On the Son Powell ranch, 20 miles south of Stanton, a good rain was reported.

Farm lands adjacent to Stanton to the southeast, received beneficial precipitation.

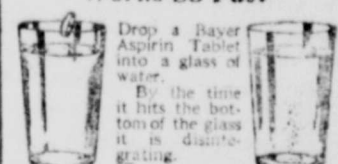
