Pre-Registration Underway At PJC For Fall Term

Pre-registration for the fall semester is underway at Paris Junior College. All students who plan to attend classes during the fall semester are encouraged to contact the Office of the Registrar to complete the necessary forms so that a registration packet may be prepared.

Steps to be followed by each student in the pre-registration process include: (1) have your high school principal send a copy of your high school transcript to the Registrar at PJC; (2) get an application for admission form from the Registrar and complete it; (3) have your ACT scores sent to the Registrar, or if you have not taken the ACT test, make arrangements with the Registrar to do so; and (4) complete an application for housing form in the Business Office if you want to live in the dormitory.

When a student has completed these steps, he is officially pre-registered and a registration packet will be prepared for his use on the days of registration — September 7, 8, and 9.

The Dean, Registrar, and other staff members are available to counsel and assist students who have questions about registration procedures, the selection of courses, financial assistance, or other problems. The college offices are open from 7:00 a. m. until 4:00 p. m. Monday through Friday and from 8:00 a. m. until 12 noon on Saturday.

Frank Grimes, president of Paris Junior College, has announced the appointment of three instructors to the faculty of the college.

David Gillard of Cincinnati, Ohio, has been appointed to the music faculty, and Mrs. Lila French Smoot has been named physical education and women's physical training instructor. The third appointment is Ronald Lee Hayhurst, who will teach business administration and economics.

Dove Season Is Near At Hand

Austin. — The dove hunting season will open Sept. 1 in the big North Zone of Texas and Sept. 24 in the South Zone, with whitewing dove hunters in deep South Texas getting two extra days of hunting this year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced Friday.

The mourning dove season was kept at about the same as last year since only a slight increase in the number of breeding birds was reported in the state.

The North Zone, comprising roughly the upper half of Texas, morning dove season opens at noon Sept. 1 and runs through Oct. 30. The South Zone season opens Sept. 24 and runs through Nov. 22, except in those counties having a whitewing season.

Shooting hours for both species will be from noon to sunset. The daily bag limit for each species will be 12 birds each and the possession limit after the first day will be 24 birds of each species.

First Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

VETERANS DISABILITY AND DEATH PENSION BENEFITS. IF

you are receiving disability or death pension benefits from the Veterans Administration under the system in effect prior to July 1, 1960, you might wish to check with the VA Regional Office to make sure that you are receiving the maximum benefits allowable. It has been estimated that approximately 100,000 veterans, widows and children are losing about \$26 million a year in disability and death pension benefits resulting from the fact that they did not elect coverage under the "new" system, which became effective on July 1, 1960. It should be emphasized that not all those on the "old" system would benefit by changing to the current system—the amount of other income is the major factor. However, it would seem advisable for those receiving benefits under the prior pension system to explore the matter with the VA Regional Office to determine whether it would be advantageous to elect benefits under the current pension system. It is possible that your allowance could be increased.

SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE ORVILLE FREEMAN

recently stated that the concentration of 70 per cent of our population on only 1 per cent of the land is not desirable, nor is it an inevitable economic condition, but is instead a "national folly." Pointing out that many of our cities are "sick" with inner jungles where "crime breeds more crime" the Secretary added: "The ultimate victory in the war on urban poverty and urban blight will be won only when we have stemmed the exodus from rural America . . . and indeed reversed it. This will serve not only to help restore health to the cities . . . but also to cure an ailing rural America."

NOT SUFFICIENTLY PUBLICIZED

are those action of our fighting men in Viet Nam which give aid to the local people. For example, when units of our forces enter a village they set up a feeding station, and while the Americans are there, any inhabitant can get a square meal. A sick child, mainly for women and children is set up nearby for free medical service. Our troops have dug wells, built roads and bridges, repaired schools, meeting places, and dwellings. They have set up voluntary blood-donor programs, baked bread for orphans and taken care of maimed or helpless children. There is no denying that war is a brutal business, but American soldiers in Viet Nam have amply demonstrated that the necessities of war have not eroded the humane and generous traits that so well characterize the typical U. S. citizen.

WORLD DEMAND FOR WOOL

will increase 50% by 1975 over the amount produced in 1961 according to a recent United Nations report. About 1/2 the world wool production is still being used for fuel although this will decline with changing conditions. Africa and Latin America, for example, burn almost 90% of their wool whereas North America burns only 10%. It is estimated that 95 billion cubic feet of wool will be required by 1975, most of the increase coming from United States and Canadian forests where investment capital and management know-how are more readily available. Tropical forests in other parts of the world will probably not be able to increase their timber yield since they are being badly and wastefully managed.

RUSSIA is careful not to publish statistics on this subject, but crime and juvenile delinquency in that country have reached serious proportions. It is reported that since vodka and crime go hand in hand, the Russian militia have been given the power to fine drunk and disorderly individuals without trial. Juvenile offenders and alcoholics will also be deprived of pay bonuses, will lose their place in line for apartments and holiday accommodations, and will generally be made to feel the displeasure of the state. Possession of any kind of an offensive weapon may bring a penalty of as much as seven years in prison.

AMERICANS have the world record for losing money — at least \$100 million a year although there is probably a great deal more that is not reported. Men lose more than women do because they are more careless—with greatest losses during Christmas and the heavy travel months of July and August.

ARTHRITIS is the Nation's number one crippler with a cost to our economy of almost \$2 billion a year. Thirteen million Ameri-



Austin. — Heinous, inhuman, and unthinkable crimes — such as those that have left a trail of blood across Texas — must be stopped, say state officials.

Gov. John Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr both have strongly recommended changes in Texas' criminal laws.

Their proposals are the result of three terrible incidents . . . all committed over a period of two weeks. First, the sniping episode on the University of Texas campus during which Charles J. Whitman deliberately killed 16 innocent persons and wounded three dozen more; then the malicious murder of a night watchman in Roscoe, by a West Texas teenager; and finally, the grotesque murder of three youngsters in Fort Worth.

Connally said he would ask the Legislature for a law requiring a compulsory life sentence for anyone who commits murder, then is found not guilty because of insanity.

Carr concurred — adding that he plans to appear personally before the Texas House committee on revision of the code of criminal procedure in January.

Meanwhile, the attorney general has asked the governor to appoint a blue ribbon citizens committee to draft legislation for tougher laws and stronger penalties.

Up for study are:

- Stiffer penalties for crimes of violence.
- Stiffer penalties for sex crimes.

- Clarification of laws dealing with carrying arms in public.

- More effective methods of confining those who use insanity as a defense for crimes.

Both Connally and Carr made it clear they are firmly opposed to stringent laws regulating the sale of firearms.

DRAFT CALL INCREASES

Texas' draft call for October is the largest since May, 1953, when the Korean war ended.

State quota for October is 2,671, compared to 3,823 at close of the fighting in Korea, according to State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

September quota also is up — from 1,585 to 1,890. National call is for 46,200.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

—State Supreme Court chief justice may assign retired appellate court judges to duty on courts of civil appeals in case of vacancy or disqualification, Attorney General Carr has ruled. Assignment would be terminated by return to duty of regular judge.

In other opinions, Carr concluded that:

- Alien employees of Texas colleges, their husbands, wives and children, are entitled to resident tuition rates in all state institutions of higher education.

- Auto certificates of title laws do not permit creation of a joint estate with rights of survivorship out of community property.

- Victoria County school superintendent has general supervision over independent school districts of less than 500 scholastics in county.

- No credit union may serve as a depository for another credit union.

WATER SPORTS RECORDS

The 1966 summer vacation season seems destined to go into the records as setting a new high for cans suffer from arthritis. There has been an understandable tendency on the part of the government as well as professional people to concentrate on the diseases that kill, with the result that the problems of arthritis have possibly been to long overlooked. The limitations of activity and of earning power that mark this affliction impose special burdens on individuals and families with lower incomes. water recreational deaths and for establishing an amazing boating-skiing safety mark.

In a two-week study by the Parks and Wildlife Department, it was pointed out that during that period, 14 persons drowned in Texas, but none was a result of boating or skiing. Nine of the deaths were attributed to bathing accidents, and four were blamed on fishing.

Death toll for the season was increased to 181 and the total for the entire summer of 1965 was 200. So, with a month of vacation time left, the department figures this year's death count will surpass last year's by a substantial margin.

A spokesman for the department said that the new law passed by the last Legislature had cut boating-skiing accidents.

Measures to enforce life-preserver requirement and other phases of the safety law helped cut the accident rate.

COTTON DEADLINE EXTENDED

— Cotton farmers in Cameron, Willacy and southern portions of Hidalgo and Starr counties have been given another 30 days — until September 30, midnight — to gather crops under the Pink Bollworm Control Program.

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White extended the deadline after conferences with the U. S. and Mexican Departments of Agriculture and Pink Bollworm Advisory Committee concerning late and slow harvest.

White pointed out that only 26,858 bales had been ginned in the Zone 1 control area by August 7, compared with 177,426 by that same date last year.

Delayed spring plantings due to bad weather and adverse growing prompted the extension.

ELECTION LAW CHANGES

An election law committee, headed by Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, has named a subcommittee to meet September 29 and October 13 to study recommendations made to date. Afterwards the full committee will hold public hearings.

Texans will have an opportunity to vote on one election law change in November. Already on the November ballot is a constitutional amendment calling for annual voter registration to replace the poll tax voting requirement.

AFL-CIO is opposing this amendment, seeking instead permanent registration.

Committee's recommendations will be made after the November 8 election.

INTERSTATE SAFETY — A program to make Texas' safest highways — the interstate system — even safer has been launched by the Texas Highway Commission.

Commission approved a \$3,200,000 plan which includes replacement of conventional sign supports and illumination pole bases with new units incorporating "break-away" safety features.

New bases and supports already are in place along newer sections of inter-state highways in Texas. Program involves putting them in place of conventional equipment on older sections.

Instead of rigid, unyielding hazards, breakaway sign supports and pole bases shear on impact, pivoting up and away from an out-of-control vehicle. The vehicle then rolls to a more controlled stop.

Two Night Junior Rodeo At Bogata

At Bogata, a parade at 4 p. m. August 26 will get a two night championship junior rodeo underway. It will be sponsored by Bogata Rodeo Association and is their third annual show. Contestants may be 19 years of age or under. Smith, Massey and Gray, Inc. will furnish the stock.

Events will include calf roping, bareback riding, bull riding, barrel race, girls will cow riding. One hundred and seventy-five dollars has been added to the prize money. Paris Junior Quadrille will be present for the Friday night show.

There will be a calf scramble. A buckle trophy will be awarded in each event. The show will start at 8 p. m. nightly and the Association is using advertising in this edition to invite your attendance.

Red River County Designated For Emergency Loans

Representative Wright Patman (D-Tex.) today announced that Red River County has been designated eligible for Farmers Home Administration Emergency Loans thru end of this fiscal year, June 30, 1967, due to adverse weather conditions and insect infestation.

Mr. Patman stated that these emergency loans are authorized by Public Law 87-128 and that those interested should contact local FFA County Supervisor for further information.

Deer Hunting Prospects Bright East Texas Area

In a quick look over East Texas via reports from game wardens the deer hunting prospects look very bright indeed. Game Warden Phil Brooks in Red River County says deer populations up 20% hunting may well be very good.

Many other game wardens predict fair to good hunting, fair to good populations, including Hill Lawrence in Lamar, Jesse May in Titus and Franklin counties.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:
"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
Sec. 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned."

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."
Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law."

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:
"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:
"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water resources; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Law; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, and proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis."

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part."

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment."

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized."

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred."

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

Amendments For Nov. Gen. Election Listed In Brief

Following is a brief description of the sixteen constitutional amendments to be voted on at the general election this coming November.

AMENDMENT NO. 1 Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to

such agricultural use.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 Would withdraw Arlington State College from participating in the Permanent University Fund.

AMENDMENT NO. 4 increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years, and amending present statutory terms of office for such officials.

AMENDMENT NO. 5 Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for

county officials and employees and others.

AMENDMENT NO. 6 Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full-paid firemen.

AMENDMENT NO. 7 Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

AMENDMENT NO. 8 Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the United States without having fulfilled re-

quirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president.

AMENDMENT NO. 9 Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

AMENDMENT NO. 10 Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election.

AMENDMENT NO. 11 Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the legislature and expanding the uses to which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put.

AMENDMENT NO. 12 Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

AMENDMENT NO. 13 Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

AMENDMENT NO. 14 Would allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirements applicable to Texans in general.

AMENDMENT NO. 15 Authorizes the channeling of funds from private and federal sources through the state for use by privately owned or local agencies in establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed.

AMENDMENT NO. 16 Establishes the date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature qualify and take office.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

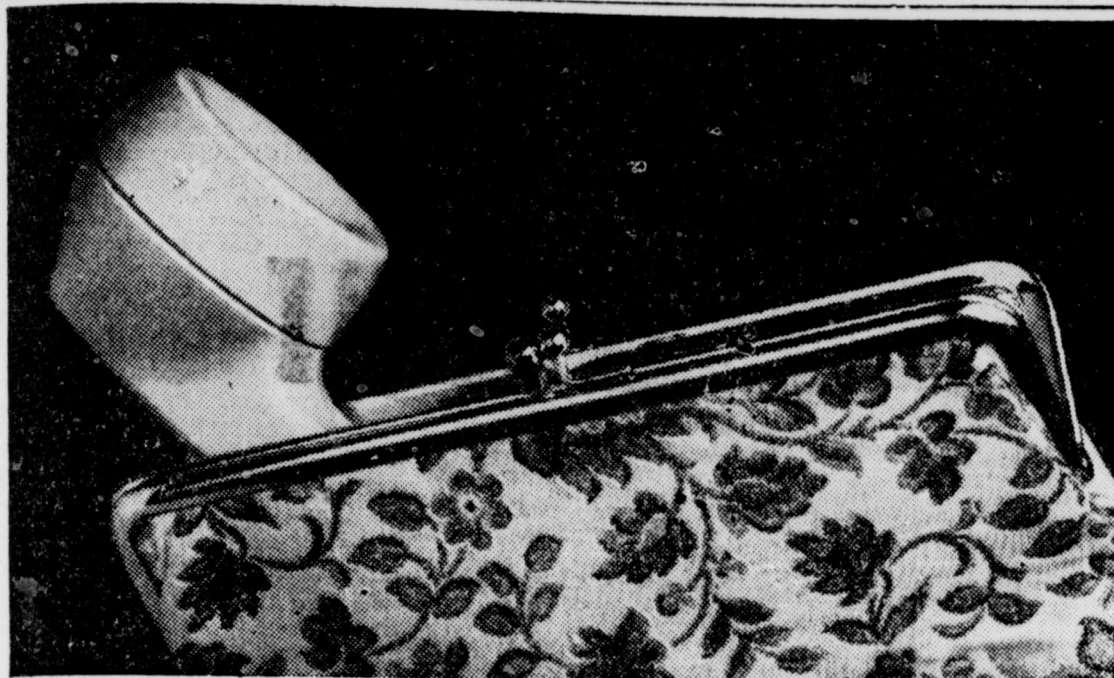

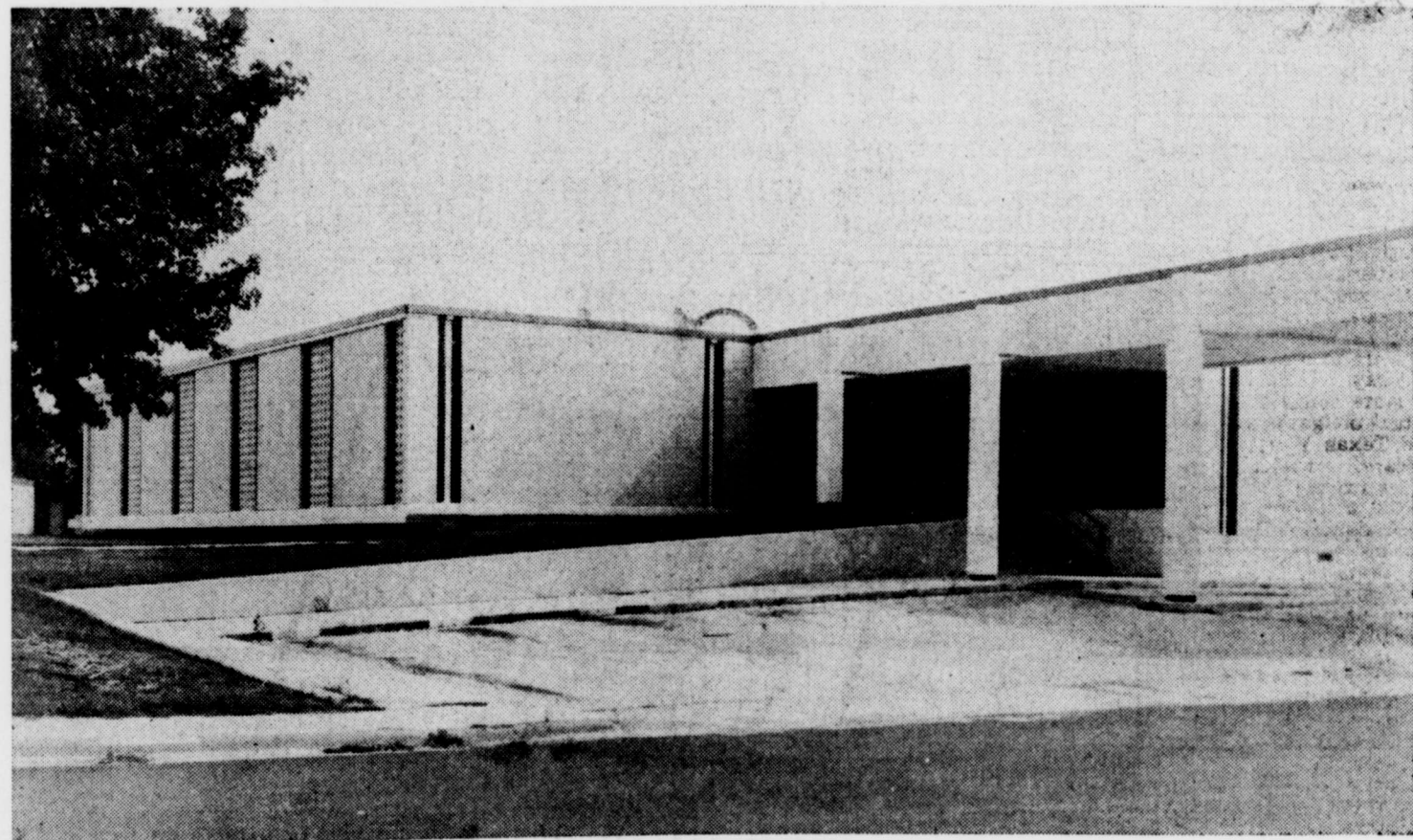

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows: "Section 63. (1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require. (2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

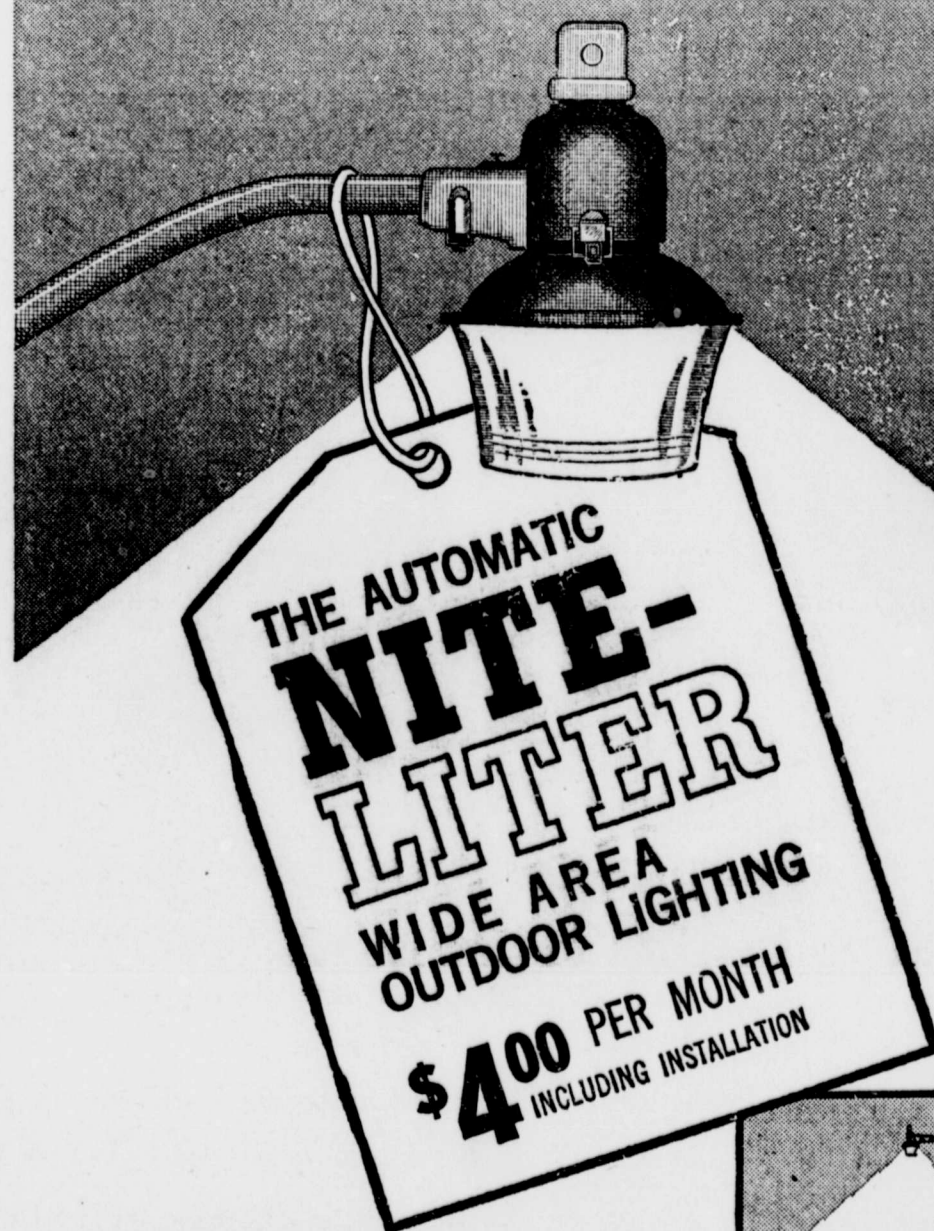

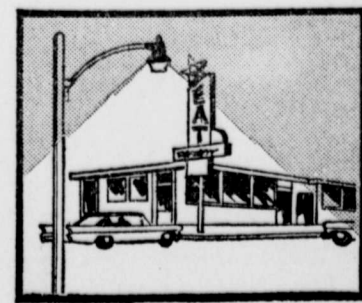
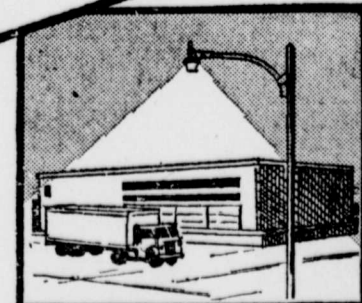

In counties using voting machines, the above provision for voting, for and against this Constitutional Amendment, shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
